ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

Cases of serious accidents or other urgency will be admitted at any time.

Except in such cases patients will only be admitted at the discretion of the Committee, on the recommendation of one of the Honorary Medical Staff of the Hospital.

Patients from the Lee-on-the-Solent Ward of the Borough and the Parish of Crofton may be recommended by their Medical Attendant. If admitted to the Hospital they will be under the care of the Medical Officer for the week.

The Admission Committee meets on Friday of each week at the Hospital at 5 p.m.

Visiting Days are Sundays and Wednesdays from 2 to 4 p.m., and on Wednesdays from 6.30 to 7.30 p.m.

Not more than two visitors to any one patient shall be admitted to the Ward at the same time.

Children under fourteen years of age cannot be admitted to the Wards as visitors.

Parcels for patients may be received on Visiting Days only.

A Donor of £20 and upwards in one sum shall be a "Life Subscriber."

A Gift of £500 will endow a Cot and £1,000 a Bed.

Should any inaccuracies or omissions be noticed in this Report the Secretary would appreciate being advised of them at once.

The name of the Hospital shall not be used in connection with any Public Entertainment without the sanction of the Board of Management.

The Seventeenth Annual Report.

1939.

For the first time in the history of the Hospital the Board of Management have to report of activities carried on under the difficulties of emergency regulations, restrictions, etc., inseparable from modern war conditions. The year under review may well be divided into two parts (I) the months of uncertainty and preparation and (II) the four months of actual war. During the first period your Board were very concerned over precautionary measures to safeguard the Hospital buildings, equipment, etc., and the arrangements for dealing with the unknown number of local casualties which might be expected as a result of enemy action. Enquiries were made and official advice was sought as to the most effective means of protection, but without satisfactory results. At the end of August it was obvious that something must be done, and done quickly, if the Hospital was to be rendered reasonably safe. Accordingly, some 50,000 sandbags were drawn from official sources, and on Friday, August 25th an appeal was made to Gosport residents to "Protect your own Hospital." The response was truly wonderful and the greatest praise is due to all sections of the public for the manner in which the sandbags were filled and stacked—so well was this done that by the Sunday evening all vulnerable and important parts of the building had been protected. The thanks of the Board are extended to all who helped in this wonderful piece of work, and to the many firms of contractors who placed transport and filling materials at the disposal of the Hospital on this occasion. The second period has been marked by a distinct change in the normal procedure of the Hospital. It is an instruction that half the beds shall be reserved in readiness for casualties and the Hospital must be prepared to evacuate the remainder in the event of an air raid. It will be appreciated that this must upset the smooth running, especially when food rationing, lighting restrictions and other inconveniences are added. As a result there has been a slight decrease in the number of patients admitted and operations performed, viz. :—

775 admissions (806 in 1938).

557 major and 327 minor operations, total 884 (942 in 1938).

During the year the Board suffered a loss by the death of Mr. M. Davey, who had been interested in the work of the Hospital for many years. He was elected to the Board in 1938 and his services there, and on the Finance Committee, are greatly missed.

FINANCE.

The total income shows an increase, due mainly to the Government contribution towards the cost of casualty service and the increased amount collected by the Gosport Workers' Hospital Maintenance Fund. It is with much pleasure that your Board is able to announce a new record by this splendid organisation and the sum of £3,939 8s. 11d. paid by them reflects great credit on all concerned. Grateful thanks and congratulations are tendered to the Officers, Committee, Collectors and Members for their continued efforts during the past most difficult year. The Annual Report and Accounts of the Fund appear on pages 27—33.

The Board are grateful to note the increase in the amount of Annual Subscriptions, due to renewal by Subscribers who had lapsed during the past few years, but they must emphasise the necessity of enrolling new Subscribers to fill the gaps which are caused each year by death and removal.

Best thanks are tendered to Subscribers, Collectors and the many friends who arrange various functions for the benefit of the Hospital. Owing to the fact that several functions were abandoned during the war the income under this head shows a reduction.

The Birthday Gift Fund continues to afford an opportunity for friends and ex-patients to visit the Hospital and assist in a practical manner. The results this year were very satisfactory—gifts in cash showing a considerable increase. The difference in the value of the gifts in kind (£114 in 1938 and £73 in 1939) is accounted for by the fact that the gift of a refrigerator, valued at £40 was included in 1938. The Board wish to record their appreciation of the efforts of all who assisted in organising the event and especially the Staff and Scholars of the Schools in the Borough.

The legacy bequeathed by the late Mr. Frederick Blake was referred to in the last Annual Report and a bequest of £100 has been received from the executors of the late Alwyne Scarth Thornhill. A further amount will shortly become available from this source and the Board are grateful for the kindly thought which prompted these bequests.

The increasing cost of provisions, drugs, fuel, etc., is causing serious concern and the position is being carefully watched. The

strictest economy, consistent with the best results, is always practised but it is obvious that the effects of the increased costs operating throughout a full year will be reflected in the accounts for 1940. The apparent increase in the item "Maintenance of patients in other Hospitals" is due to the fact that all outstanding accounts, with the exception of the item referred to in the foot-note, were paid during the year under review. It will be noticed that an item of £716 4s. 11d. appears under the heading of Extraordinary Expenditure—Air Raid Precautions—and the Board have to report that they are still negotiating with the Ministry of Health regarding the repayment of this amount.

AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS.

Unfortunately sandbagging has proved quite ineffective as a permanent form of protection and some alternative method must be found. The Board have suggested other methods to the Ministry of Health and correspondence with reference to financing these alternatives is now proceeding with the Ministry. Your Board are giving considerable attention to the suggestion for the provision of a decontamination unit required by the Ministry of Health. Subscribers may be assured that the interests of the Hospital will be adequately safeguarded in any scheme which may be adopted. The Hon. Architect, Mr. L. M. Field, L.R.I.B.A., is advising us on both these matters in addition to giving the benefit of his experience in so many other directions, and it is desired to record sincere appreciation of his many services during the past year.

EMERGENCY ARRANGEMENTS.

Tests of the arrangements for the reception and treatment of air raid casualties, under raid conditions, have demonstrated that the plan organised by the Hon. Medical Staff works admirably within the limited area available at the Hospital. Your Board have felt it their duty to draw the attention of the Minister of Health to the fact that the 42 beds in this Hospital are the only accommodation to serve a population of nearly 50,000—the nearest Hospital being at Cosham. The Minister has been assured that in the event of a raid everything possible will be done, but it is felt that the higher authorities should make provision for dealing with numerous casualties which might occur in an air raid.

STAFF.

Two members of the Hon. Medical Staff, Drs. C. N. Suter and N. L. Russell are now serving with the Forces and Dr. Charles Lamplough has rejoined the Staff for the duration of the war in place of Dr. Russell.

Dr. B. McDougall Johnson has joined the Hon. Medical Staff.

Once again your Board wish to record sincere appreciation of the services rendered by the Hon. Medical Staffs and visiting Specialists. The numerous letters received from time to time testify to the skill of the Surgeons, Physicians and Dental Surgeons, and these expressions from patients are recorded with much pleasure.

The excellent work of the Matron and Nursing Staff throughout the year, especially under the difficult war conditions is deserving of the highest praise and the Board tender grateful thanks to them.

LINEN LEAGUE.

It is noted with satisfaction that the Ladies' Linen League has resumed activities after a temporary lull at the beginning of the war. Mrs. Wharram Lamplough is now Hon. Secretary and the League Report, published on page 25 reveals much useful activity which the Board highly appreciate.

GENERAL.

The zeal of the Matron and Staff was amply demonstrated on the occasion of the first Nurses' Sale of Work in December. As a result of this venture, which was organised by the Staff and their friends a sum of £72 was realised. Essential training equipment for Student Nurses, cutlery and plate for the Staff Dining Room have been purchased from the proceeds and the balance of £23 is held in reserve for the provision of further "luxuries" for the Nursing Staff.

The Board would ask the co-operation of all Subscribers and friends in providing Probationers. In common with Voluntary Hospitals throughout the country some difficulty is experienced in obtaining candidates for this honourable profession, and enquiries from girls of 17½ upwards, of good character and education will always be welcomed by the Matron.

The Board desire to draw attention to the fact that from August 1st the post of Secretary has been filled by Mr. H. Fereday as a full-time official of the Board. This appointment has been amply justified by the zeal and business capacity he has brought to bear upon his work. The Board cannot conclude their Report without an expression of gratitude to him for his services.

Your Board realise that however uncertain the future course of events may appear there must be no uncertainty about the future of "our own Hospital." With the knowledge of the active interest and kindly help so freely given at all times the Board feel assured that they can face the future with complete confidence.

GOSPORT WORKERS' HOSPITAL MAINTENANCE FUND.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

In presenting the Nineteenth Annual Report of our Fund we are pleased to say that notwithstanding the national situation the Fund continues in a favourable position as compared with previous years.

Contributions for 1939 amounted to £5,727, an increase of £117 over that of 1938. £3,939 which was allocated to Gosport Hospital amounted to £74 over the previous year, and £1,125 was allotted to the Medical Committee.

During the year 2,057 cases were dealt with at the Hospital, either Contributors or their Dependents, and 337 received assistance through the Royal Surgical Aid Society at a cost of £220.

The Committee desire to place on record their thanks to all collectors, particularly to those ladies who so kindly came to the assistance of our Fund when many of our men collectors were called up for National Service, etc. Words of gratitude are difficult to find by the Committee to express their appreciation.

Queen's Institute of District Nursing.

During the year 3,077 visits were made by the Nurses to the homes of contributors to attend patients after Hospital treatment.

Regarding Queen's Nurses, 578 members of the Fund availed themselves of the opportunity of contributing 2/- per annum to the scheme started in March, 1939, whereby they were able to obtain the help of the Nurses at all times should this be needed.

BENEFITS.

In consideration of our handing over to the Hospital 70% of the total monies subscribed by the Gosport and Crofton contributing members, the Board of Management guarantee Free Hospital Maintenance to such contributors and dependents who conform to the following schedule, viz. :—

To those who contribute—

- (1) One Penny per week when the Income from all sources does not exceed £1 0 0 per week.
- (2) Twopence " " " £2 0 0 "
- (3) Threepence " " " £3 10 0 "
- (4) Fourpence " " " £4 0 0 "
- (5) Fivepence " " " £5 0 0 "
- (6) Sixpence " " " £6 0 0 "
- (7) Where persons have been contributing to the Fund prior to January, 1928, even should they be in receipt of Income larger than the above limit, the Hospital Committee will grant such persons consideration both for themselves and their dependents should Hospital Treatment be required.
- (8) The word "dependents" shall include the children of contributors providing they are not wage earners, and any person who acts as a housekeeper to a contributor.

The following agreement has been made with the Honorary Medical Committee.

In consideration of 20% of the total monies subscribed by Gosport and Crofton contributing members the Medical Committee guarantee Free Operative Treatment to contributors and dependents who conform to the above scale.

Meetings in connection with the Fund for the purpose of handing over Contributions are held at the Nicholson Memorial Hall, Stoke Road, Gosport, the first Thursday in each month, at 7.30 p.m., when full information as to the Funds method of working can be obtained.
