

The following cases only are admitted to the ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL: Skin Diseases, Rheumatic and kindred Diseases (Arthritis, Myalgia, Neuritis, &c.), Disorders of the Liver, Gout, Locomotor Ataxy, and Lead Poisoning.

The following cases are NOT eligible for admission to EITHER Institution:—

- (1) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (2) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (3) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (4) Persons suffering from fits or of unsound mind.
- (5) Persons suffering from neurasthenia.
- (6) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.
- (7) Persons of advanced age or in too feeble health to undergo the treatment.

Cases convalescent from an infectious disease are not admissible until the expiration of six weeks from the period of infection ceasing. Any infringement of the rules or misconduct will render the Patient liable to instant dismissal.



ANNUAL MEETING,

WEDNESDAY, 16th FEBRUARY, 1927.

The 101st Annual General Meeting of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home was held on Wednesday, 16th February, in the Board Room.

Mr. Matthew Stephenson, J.P. (Vice-President), presided. Among those present were the Chairman of Committee (Mr. C. A. Rhodes), the Hon. Treasurer (Mr. Walter Freeman), Sir Loraine Dunbar, Col. W. F. Collins, D.S.O., Lt.-Col. A. Kirk, Major E. P. Cross, Stanley Barnes, Esq., J. S. Cowell, Esq., J. A. Eddison, Esq., W. Murray-Wilson, Esq., F. Wood, Esq., Dr. L. J. Hobson, Dr. A. W. Hinsley Walker, Dr. G. L. Kerr Pringle, Dr. David Brown, Dr. G. Holmes, Dr. L. C. E. Calthrop.

Apologies for absence were received from Lord Harewood, Viscount Lascelles, Major Dent, Mr. W. Sheepshanks, Sir John Eaglesome, Mr. W. L. Kirby, and Mr. J. H. Ainley.

Mr. Stephenson, in moving the adoption of the various Reports and Accounts, said that the Report confirmed what was in the minds of many people in this country with regard to rheumatism, that it was not a complaint confined to any one class of the community, but that it was a most serious industrial complaint. Apparently there was now a widespread movement growing up that Harrogate and other Spas should play a greater part than they had hitherto done for the benefit of the industrial classes. It would be noticed that with regard to the Hospital nearly ninety per cent. of the patients were of a rheumatic character. There was a large number of people who were granted relief through the Friendly Societies, in addition to others, who were suffering from these complaints, for which the waters of Harrogate had, in the past, been considered eminently suitable. Other methods of treatment had been found to supplement the waters and, in that respect, their Staff had succeeded in making that Institution a very workable hospital.

Walter Freeman, Esq., J.P., in seconding the resolution, said that the year's work from the financial side had proved very satisfactory. If the figures were compared with those of the previous year, they would be seen to be almost identical. They had been in some doubt as to what would be the effect

of their closing in November, through a shortage of fuel, but to their agreeable surprise it had not had any serious effect one way or the other. They were able to carry forward a surplus of £300 11s. 1d., after setting aside £1,000 to the Contingencies' Reserve Account. This money they did not propose to spend at once, because it was absolutely insufficient for what they urgently needed. They had spent about £8,000 on new additions, which were now complete and would shortly be in operation. That would practically absorb all the money they had in hand. They were greatly in need of additional electrical accommodation and required more room for massage. Year by year these forms of treatment were increasing and, under present conditions, they were seriously handicapped. These additional alterations, which were absolutely necessary, would involve the expenditure of approximately £4,000.

The Reports and Accounts were then adopted.

Mr. Matthew Stephenson then moved a vote of thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Committee of Management and that they be re-elected.

MISS M. E. JONES (Harrogate Ladies' College), who seconded the resolution, said she welcomed that opportunity of voicing the confidence of the outside public in the work of the Hospital. She had never heard a single word of adverse criticism directed against it. On the contrary she had been impressed by the esteem and regard in which it was held. The Committee might be truly congratulated upon the way in which they were carrying it on and upon the efficiency of their administration.

Mr. C. A. Rhodes (Chairman of the Committee), in replying, thanked the Meeting for its reception of the resolution. He did not think any chairman could have a better committee or one whose assiduity of attendance and willingness to undertake various matters could be surpassed. In connection with the Centenary Fund they had raised £7,900, of which the greater part had now been spent. They asked originally for £12,000, and that sum they still required, for it was most essential that they should have increased facilities for electrical treatments as well as more accommodation for their medical staff, who at the present time were working under great difficulties. He commended the efforts of the Matron and Nursing Staff, whose efforts had realised a sum adequate to furnish the new extensions without encroaching upon the Centenary Fund in any way.

Major E. P. Cross, in moving a vote of thanks to Mr. Freeman for his honorary and efficient services as Treasurer and proposing his election for the ensuing year, said they all felt that in being associated with Mr. Freeman they were associated with one who not only had the best interests of the Hospital at heart, but who put his best efforts into everything he did on its behalf. He thought the time had come when some more tangible proof should be shown of their appreciation.


Dr. L. J. Hobson cordially seconded.

In thanking the Meeting, Mr. Freeman said that the work of the Hospital was one of his hobbies, and that he would gladly serve it as long as he could.

Mr. J. A. Eddison, in moving a vote of thanks to the Medical Staff, said that their work was a public service of the highest importance and was vital to the well-being of the Hospital. They welcomed the addition to the Staff of Dr. Shirley Kidd and Dr. Nimmo Watson as Honorary Physicians.

SIR L. G. DUNBAR seconded.

Dr. Geoffrey Holmes, in responding to the vote on behalf of his colleagues, said it might not be untimely to emphasise the point that the Institution was, and must remain, primarily a Bath Hospital. Whilst the value of electrical, bacteriological, and other ancillary treatments should not be under-estimated, it must not be forgotten that it was the skilled use of the natural waters which had established the reputation of the three large mineral water hospitals of Bath, Buxton and Harrogate for the successful treatment of rheumatism and allied diseases. had been more than whispered of late that, owing to more recent methods of treatment, Spa doctors no longer attached so much importance to the use of the natural mineral waters as formerly, he and his medical colleagues thought it was high time that it was publicly stated that the water drinking and bathing still formed the basis of the treatment which gave such excellent results. He did not intend to discuss the relative virtues of the waters of the different spas, but those who had studied the subject, knew from experience that results could be obtained, in suitable cases, by the scientific use of fresh, natural, mineral waters, which would bear comparison with the results of any other known methods of treatment. Consequently, it was an

obligation on those practising in the Spas—where alone these methods could be applied—to see that the waters were properly used. In this Institution they had the privilege of using the Harrogate waters and, he suggested that a little more attention to this work of national importance might profitably be given by the "City Fathers." The work of the Royal Bath Hospital was one of the best advertisements of the Spa and was worthy of more generous local recognition than it had of late years received.

MR. THISTLETHWAITE moved, and MR. KENNAIR (Messrs. Armstrong, Whitworth, Newcastle) seconded, the appointment of Messrs. Lowrey, Weston and Whalley as Auditors for the ensuing year.—Carried.

The Meeting closed with a vote of thanks to the Chairman, proposed by Mr. Rhodes and seconded by Mr. Freeman, to which Mr. Stephenson suitably replied.

Report of the Committee of Management.

To The Right Honourable The Earl of Harewood, G.C.V.O., and Subscribers of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home, Harrogate.

In presenting the 101st Annual Report, your Committee beg to state that the number of patients admitted up to Nov. 3rd was 2,361 as against 2,337 up to the same date in 1925, an increase of 24.

On account of the difficulty of obtaining fuel to heat the Hospital adequately, your Committee decided to close on that date until 6th January, 1927. Your Committee have taken advantage of the period during which the Hospital was closed to effect several necessary repairs and renewals, together with certain desirable—if not very important—improvements. Chief among these is the provision of a new cloakroom for men patients.

During the year the heating system has been extended to the upper wards in the Hospital, with the result that the Hospital is now thoroughly and entirely warmed, and we again urge upon patients the advisability of coming for treatment in the earliest stages of disease, regardless of whether it be winter or summer. In the early part of the year patients can be admitted with far less delay than during the summer and autumn, when there is invariably a long waiting list.

CENTENARY FUND.

Of the £7,900 received in response to our appeal for £12,000, a sum of upwards of £3,700 has been expended on the erection and equipment of the Bacteriological Laboratory, and when the new accommodation for the Nursing and Domestic Staffs is completed and paid for, the Centenary Fund will be practically exhausted. This new accommodation consists of a new Dining Hall for the Domestic Staff, a new Dining Room for the Nurses. and eight additional bedrooms for Nurses. It is expected that these additions will be ready for occupation early in the new year.

As will be seen from the Honorary Physicians' Report, which follows, there is much yet which urgently needs to be done, and we earnestly appeal for further donations to bring the Centenary Fund up to the sum of £12,000 for which we originally asked.

SALE OF WORK & GARDEN FETE.

A most successful Sale was organised by the Matron and Nursing Staff for the purpose of raising funds for furnishing the additional rooms for the Nurses. This was opened by Viscountess Mountgarret on Wednesday, 18th August. The proceeds, together with monetary gifts from many kind friends, realised nearly £750.

Your Committee desire to place on record their gratitude to the Matron and Nurses, and all others, for their most welcome and valuable help towards this object.

BACTERIOLOGICAL LABORATORY.

During the year the Laboratory Endowment Fund has received from an anonymous donor its second gift in the form of £1,000 L.N.E. Railway Co. 3% Debenture Stock. It will be seen, however, from the separate account published on page 20 that the total expenditure, in connection with this work, has amounted to £425 8s. 1d., as against an income of only £66 2s. 11d., leaving a deficit of £359 5s. 2d. to be met out of the income of the Hospital. As the expenditure under this head may be expected to increase still further as the work develops, the urgent need for further gifts, to ease the burden on the Hospital finances, is obvious.

FINANCE.

Comparison with the figures for the previous year is, to some extent, invalidated by the earlier closing of the Hospital. This naturally had the effect of slightly decreasing the figures for both income and expenditure. In spite of this, however, the amount received in subscriptions to both Institutions shows a slight increase. Under the other heads there is a slight—and it is to be hoped, merely temporary—decrease.

LEGACY ACCOUNT.

During the past year Legacies have been received as follows: Rev. G. D. Davenport, £25; Miss Bell, £440 11s. 2d.; Mrs. M. B. Smith, £180 12s. 3d.; Surg.-Genl. Lofthouse (final distribution), £19 6s. 5d.; H. Wilson, £250; and Mrs. E. A.

Ormerod, £363 9s. 6d. The sum of £19 6s. 5d. was also received for the Rawson Convalescent Home as a final distribution under the will of the late Surg.-Genl. Lofthouse. In accordance with the usual practice, these sums have been placed to the credit of the Endowment Accounts of the Institutions concerned and the bulk of the money has been invested in Trustee Securities.

The Household Expenses for the Maintenance of Patients in the Hospital and Home amounted to £2,299 4s. 4d.—a decrease on the figure for the previous year of £152 17s. 2d. Some reduction was, however, only to be looked for in view of the fact that the number of patients admitted was only 2,361, compared with 2,630 in 1925.

The General Expenses have been £6,762 9s. 4d., and show an increase under this head of £174 5s. 3d., despite the fewer patients treated. This increase, however, is more than accounted for by the increased cost of the Laboratory, to which reference has already been made.

The Average Cost of each Patient for a stay of two weeks amounted to £3 19s. 10d., as against £3 11s. 6d. in 1925—an increase of 8s. 4d. per fortnight or 4s. 2d. per week. The difference, therefore, between the amount received on behalf of the patient (£3 3s.) and the cost of the patient to the Hospital is no less than 16s. 10d. per fortnight, or 8s. 5d. per week. This discrepancy has to be met by donations, collections, and interest on investments. The total expenditure of the year shows an increase of only £21 8s. 1d., but the per capita rate is increased by reason of the fewer number of patients admitted, owing to the coal strike, since the overhead charges continue to operate independently of this factor.

THE WORK OF THE HOSPITAL.

(HONORARY PHYSICIANS' REPORT.)

In reviewing the work of 1926, the Medical Staff are pleased to observe that the number of unsuitable cases admitted remains at the low level of the preceding year (3%). The number of cases refused as unsuitable on the Medical Certificates alone amounts to about 10% of those applying for admission.

These results are due in part to the increasing care shown in certification by outside practitioners—a most welcome event to the Medical Staff, who select the cases for admission. Hospital work is thereby greatly facilitated and in addition is rendered more efficient.

For this voluntary and unpaid work by Doctors, having no direct relationship to the Institution, your Honorary Physicians feel they cannot be too grateful.

But for the unavoidable closure of the Hospital owing to fuel shortage, the number of admissions during the year would have exceeded that for 1925. As it is, the admissions from January to November show an increase as compared with the corresponding period of last year (2,361, as against 2,337).

Every such increase in admissions marks the greater use of the Hospital accommodation during the early months of the year. Thanks to the open and sunny position of the Hospital and its efficient system of heating, treatment can be carried on as efficiently and successfully as in the warmer parts of the year.

Further, the usefulness of the Hospital is increased and the overhead charges per patient are correspondingly decreased by these early admissions.

The proportion of cases admitted which belonged to the Rheumatic group of Diseases is about the same as for the year 1925 (85-90%).

The Honorary Staff once again urge the earlier certification and application for admission of cases of this class. Many such patients apply too late for the attainment of any result better than that of alleviation. Early investigation and treatment of these sufferers, before irremediable damage has taken place in joints and tissues, is an essential, if complete recovery is to be obtained.

A very welcome feature of our work is the increasing number of letters received from ex-patients detailing their appreciation of the kindness and care exerted on their behalf and the great benefits ensuing from a course of treatment in this Institution.

This result is in part due to the fact that here the patient's individuality is sedulously preserved. Each inmate is known by his or her own name, with its conventional prefix, instead of being known as Mrs. No. so and so of such and such a ward—this last a necessary but unwelcome feature of the large general hospital. This is a practice greatly appreciated by our patients. It has a consequential effect on the care and treatment of the individual and is only rendered possible by the constant efforts of the Matron and Sisters in charge of our cases.

The building addition foreshadowed in the report for 1925 is now happily approaching completion. Accommodation for the increased Nursing Staff will be completed early in 1927, and the eight additional nurses' bedrooms will allow such an augmentation of the work of the Hospital as should permit us to keep our 150 beds in constant occupation throughout the year.

During the regretted illness of our colleague, Dr. Calthrop (now happily restored to health), the Hospital obtained the services of Dr. Shirley Kidd (Hon. Anæsthetist to the Hospital) as Honorary Physician pro tem, and your Medical Staff hope that Dr. Kidd may be permanently added to the list of Honorary Physicians. Such an election will mark the first occasion of the appointment of a seventh Honorary Physician to the Hospital.

Last year the Report discussed the question whether our combined Team Diagnosis and Treatment could be improved.

1.—Diagnosis. We still lack a Radiological Department, but its institution and equipment as an item of ordinary Hospital expenditure is at present impossible.

In this deficiency our Hospital compares unfavourably with all modern institutions, and your Honorary Staff once more stresses the urgent need for the installation of such a department.

2.—Treatment. During the year a Diathermy department has been instituted and the Medical Staff look forward to many very beneficial applications of this Electrical treatment.

The association of pelvic disorders with certain forms of Arthritis is a late development of medical knowledge, and diathermy treatment of such cases by the pelvic route has led to the amelioration and even dramatic cure of cases hitherto regarded as hopeless.

The favourable possibilities of this treatment are immense, its development is inevitable, and if the Hospital is to keep in the forefront, duplication and even triplication of the apparatus will soon become necessary.

Here is a new and almost undreamt of means of successfully combating the crippling effects of Rheumatic diseases—diseases at present responsible for almost one-sixth of the total invalidity among the industrial population.

Some readjustment of the Bathing arrangements will be necessary if we are to cope successfully with the anticipated increase of patients rendered possible by the additional nursing facilities now provided.

A second Aix and Vichy Douche Room will be required. The only place available is the room now used for Paraffin Wax Baths and Berthollet treatments. Other provision for these will be necessary.

The need for "Occupational Therapy" grows rather than decreases, and a new department for systematic remedial orthopædic treatment is a necessity of the near future.

An ancillary factor of such a department involves the provision of a passenger lift large enough to accommodate stretcher patients and their attendants. Crippled patients could then be housed on all three dormitory floors. This would avoid the segregation of our more helpless patients on the ground floor, which is necessary under present conditions, an arrangement, in the opinion of your Medical Staff, which is neither salutary nor convenient.

The expansion of the Electrical Department is a matter of prime urgency, the congestion of the auxiliary treatments here grows more serious every month, and the strain on apparatus and attendants alike has become well-nigh unbearable.

The Consulting Room accommodation for your Physicians and Specialist members of the Honorary Staff still consists of one small room of 12ft. by 12ft. without an attached waiting room for patients—a condition of affairs much worse than when the Physicians numbered only two instead of as at present seven.

This takes no account of the Specialist Officers appointed since 1921, who, together with the Physicians, form the large total of 22 active professional workers connected with the Institution.

Provision of an adequate series of consulting rooms and waiting rooms is an immediate necessity, if the professional work of the Hospital is to be carried on with efficiency, comfort and despatch—alike to Physicians, Nurses and Patients.

These are the main lines of the development of the Hospital. This Institution must make progress each year and must be in the Front Rank if it is to maintain its position as a main centre for the treatment of the Rheumatic group of Diseases.

Report of the Honorary Pathologists.

The Clinical Laboratory continues to be a useful unit in the Hospital, not only for routine examination of patients, but also for the considered investigation of obscure aspects of the chemistry and bacteriology of a wide range of disorders.

Vaccines prepared in the laboratory from microbes isolated from sufferers from chronic joint disease continue to prove a useful agent in the treatment of these diseases.

Chronic arthritis is truly described as the most crippling of our industrial diseases, and ranks close to cancer in the production of pain and suffering. The large number of cases of this disease which are concentrated in the Hospital offers a valuable field for research.

The funds available for the research fund are still inadequate, but it is hoped in the near future that these will be so increased that a whole time research worker can be employed, when more rapid progress may be possible.

Detailed observations extending over two years on a series of 250 cases of chronic arthritic disease have recently been collected and summarised. The survey deals with the disorders of the secretions of the stomach, and their relationship to the types of micro-organisms inhabiting the bowel. Its publication will record information which previously has not been available to the medical profession, and will form a useful contribution to the complex problem of the causes of chronic arthritis.







RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL.

Revised January 30th, 1919.

Title and Purposes of the Hospital.

1. The Hospital having been built with a view to affording to deserving persons, free of expense, the benefits of the Harrogate waters and treatment, shall be denominated "The Royal Bath Hospital." No patients shall be admitted except such as in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and the Committee of Management are suitable cases for such treatment.

Constitution.

- 2. The Officers shall consist of a Patron, President, Vice-Presidents, Twelve Trustees, Honorary Consulting Physicians, Honorary Physicians (not exceeding four), and the Honorary Treasurer.
- 3. All the real estate belonging to the Hospital shall be vested in the names of six Trustees and their personal representatives and the personal estate in the names of six Trustees and their personal representatives, but subject to the control of the Subscribers as to any appropriation for the benefit of the Hospital, which may be agreed upon by them at any annual general meeting, or special meeting called for the purpose.
- 4. Whenever the number of Trustees, either of the real or personal trust estate, shall be reduced to three by all or any of the following means, viz., death, resignation, refusal, incapacity to act, or permanent residence out of England, the Committee of Management (as specified in Rule 31) shall by any writing under their hand fill up the vacancies by appointing three new Trustees, and upon every such appointment the surviving or continuing Trustees shall transfer such real or personal trust estate respectively vested in them so as to vest it respectively jointly in the surviving or continuing Trustees and such new Trustees.

Admission of Patients to the Royal Bath Hospital.

- 5 Recommendations for the admission of Patients are issued on the following terms:—
 - (a) Annual subscribers of two guineas and upwards shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for each two guineas so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued:

PROVIDED ALWAYS that Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards whose names appear in the Subscription List for 1924 shall, so long as they continue to subscribe annually, retain the privilege of recommending one patient for each guinea so subscribed, the number of recommendations to be issued at this rate to such old subscribers to be limited and determined by the amount of the first subscription sent in any one year, but in no case shall exceed Five. Old Subscribers entitled to this privilege who require to recommend additional patients beyond the number to which they may be entitled by their first subscription in any year may do so on payment of Two Guineas for each additional recommendation.

(b) Every donor of £40 to the Endowment Fund shall be a Life Subscriber, and shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for every full sum of £40 so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued.

- (c) Executors of persons bequeathing sums of money to the Endowment Fund of the Hospital shall be entitled to one recommendation for every £25 paid to the Treasurer, but to not more than four, whatever the amount of the legacy bequeathed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which the Legacy is paid, or in the following year.
- (d) Every Clergyman, or minister of any Denomination, who shall transmit a congregational collection to the Treasurer, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. so contributed during the year.
- (e) Every Hotel, Boarding-house, or Lodging-house Keeper or other person, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. collected and paid to the Treasurer during the year.

These recommendations (d) and (e) shall be available within 12 calendar months from the date of issue.

- 6. In no case shall any part of the cost of a recommendation be paid by the patient or any member of his or her family. Any such payment shall disqualify for admission.
- 7 Recommendations for the Hospital will be available for the Rawson Convalescent Home should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.
- 8. The following cases only are admitted to the Royal Bath Hospital: Skin Diseases, Rheumatism and kindred diseases (Arthritis, Myalgia and Neuritis), Disorders of the Liver, Gout, Locomotor Ataxy, and Lead Poisoning.

The following cases are not eligible for admission:

- (1) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (2) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (3) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (4) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (5) Persons suffering from fits or of unsound mind.
- (6) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.
- Cases convalescent from an infectious disease shall be inadmissible until a term of six weeks has elapsed from the period of infection ceasing.
- 10. The Committee of Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Hospital, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.

Bye-laws and Regulations for Patients in the Hospital.

11. Every applicant for admission must procure a recommendation from a Subscriber, accompanied by the Hospital Certificate, properly filled up by a qualified Medical Practitioner, as to the suitability of the case. Each patient, when so admitted, shall pay a sum not exceeding 10/6 for each week of his or her stay towards the cost of his or her board, unless it be proved to the satisfaction of the Committee that such patient is entirely unable to meet such charge, in which case the Committee may, in their absolute discretion, remit such charge, either wholly or in part.

Each patient may be admitted for a period not exceeding two weeks on production of a Subscriber's recommendation, and shall be entitled to board, lodging, baths, medical attendance, &c. When further treatment is deemed desirable by the Hon. Physicians an extension of time to four weeks may be granted, with the sanction of the Committee of Management, on production of a second recommendation. In cases specially certified by the Medical Staff sanction may be similarly given by the Committee to retain the patient in the Hospital for a further period not exceeding two weeks on production of one further recommendation for such two weeks.

- 12. In no case can a patient be retained in the Hospital for a longer period than six weeks at one time. No patient can be re-admitted until the expiration of three calendar months from the date when he or she was last discharged from the Hospital.
- 13. It shall be in the power of the Committee instantly to dismiss any patient who in their judgment conducts himself or herself in an improper manner, or who does not conform to the Rules, Regulations, and Bye-laws of the Institution.
- 14. Each patient is required to bring a proper change of clean bodylinen, and to pay for the washing of it outside the Hospital.



RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE

RAWSON CONVALESCENT HOME.

Revised January 30th, 1919.

Title and Purposes of the Home.

- 15. The Rawson Convalescent Home, having been erected in connection with the Royal Bath Hospital on land the property of the said Hospital, shall be conducted under the Officers and Committee of Management of the Royal Bath Hospital, with the addition of the three Trustees hereinafter referred to.
- 16. The Institution shall be used solely as a Convalescent Home. Only such patients shall be admitted as obtain a recommendation from a Subscriber of the Home or Hospital, and are, in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and Committee of Management, suitable. It is contrary to the design of the Home to relieve persons whose circumstances enable them to pay the full cost of a visit to Harrogate.

Constitution.

- 17. The Property belonging to this Institution shall be vested in three Trustees. Any vacancy in their number to be filled up by the remaining Trustee or Trustees.
- 18. The Convalescent Home shall be charged for all expenses of the Hospital and Home in proportion to the number of patients admitted. Donations from Hotels, Lodging-houses, Hospital Sunday, and other sources of revenue (excepting legacies or donations to the endowment funds, which shall be kept separate) shall be apportioned on the same principle. This apportionment of receipts and expenses shall commence January 1st, 1898, and shall not be altered without the approval of a Committee consisting of the Patron, the Chairman of the Committee of Management, the Honorary Treasurer, and the Home Trustees for the time being.

Admission of Patients to the Convalescent Home.

- 19. Recommendations for admission of Patients are issued on the following terms:—
 - (a) Annual subscribers of Two guineas and upwards shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for each Two guineas so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued:

PROVIDED ALWAYS that Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards whose names appear in the Subscription List for 1924 shall, so long as they continue to subscribe annually, retain the privilege of recommending one patient for each guinea so subscribed, the number of recommendations to be issued at this rate to such old subscribers to be limited and determined by the amount of the first subscription sent in any one year, but in no case shall exceed Five. Old Subscribers entitled to this privilege who require to recommend additional patients beyond the number to which they may be entitled by their first subscription in any year may do so on payment of Two Guineas for each additional recommendation.

- (b) Every donor of £40 or upwards to the Endowment Fund shall be a Life Subscriber, and be entitled to recommend one patient annually for every full sum of £40 so subscribed. These Recommendations are only available in the year in which they are issued.
- (c) Executors of persons bequeathing sums of money to the Endowment Fund of the Home shall be entitled to one recommendation for every £25 paid to the Treasurer, but to not more than four, whatever the amount of the legacy bequeathed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which the Legacy is paid, or in the following year.
- (d) Every Clergyman or Minister of any Denomination who shall transmit a congregational collection to the Treasurer shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. contributed during that year.
- (e) Every Hotel Proprietor, Boarding-house, Lodging-house keeper or other person, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. collected and paid to the Treasurer during the year.

These recommendations (d) and (e) shall be available within 12 calendar months of the date of issue.

Admission by Payment.

- 20. In certain cases approved by the Committee patients may be admitted to the Home without recommendation on their own payment in advance at the rate of one and a half guineas for each week. In no case shall this privilege be granted for a longer period than four weeks.
- 21. Recommendations for the Home will be available for the Royal Bath Hospital should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.
- 22. Convalescent cases, or cases of debility, are eligible for admission to the Home. No Sulphur Water baths are given to patients in the Home.

The following cases are not eligible :-

- (1) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (2) Persons in advanced stages of consumption.
- (3) Persons suffering from any skin disease.
- (4) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (5) Persons suffering from intectious or contagious disease.
- (6) Persons subject to fits or of unsound mind.
- (7) Persons incapable of attending to themselves
- 23. Cases convalescent from an infectious disease are not admissible until the expiration of six weeks from the period of the infection ceasing.
- 24. The Committee of Management reserve the right to refuse admission or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Convalescent Home, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.

Bye-Laws and Regulations for Patients in the Home.

25. Every applicant for admission must procure a recommendation from a subscriber (except in the case of those persons admitted on their own payment under Rule 20), accompanied by the Home Certificate, properly filled in by a qualified Medical practitioner as to the suitability of the case. Each patient, when so admitted, shall pay a sum not exceeding 10/6 for each week of his or her stay towards the cost of his or her board, unless it be proved to the satisfaction of the Committee that such patient is entirely unable to meet such charge, in which case the Committee may, in their absolute discretion, remit such charge, either wholly or in part.

Each patient shall be admitted for a period of two weeks on production of a Subscriber's recommendation, and shall be entitled to board, lodging, medical attendance, &c., but no Sulphur Water baths shall be given to Home patients. When further treatment is deemed desirable by the Hon. Physicians an extension of time to four weeks may be granted with the sanction of the Committee of Management on production of a second recommendation.

- 26. In no case can a patient be retained in the Home for a longer period than four weeks at one time. No patient can be re-admitted until the expiration of three calendar months from the date when he or she was last discharged from the Home.
- 27. It shall be in the power of the Committee instantly to dismiss any patient who, in their judgment, conducts himself or herself in an improper manner, or who does not conform to the Rules, Regulations and Bye-laws of the Institution.
- 28. Each patient is required to bring a proper change of clean bodylinen, and to pay for the washing of the same outside the Home.



RULES RELATING TO BOTH

THE ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL and THE RAWSON CONVALESCENT HOME.

29 The Hospital shall be open throughout the year. The Home shall be opened in March each year and closed for the admission of patients on the second Thursday in November, or at such other times and such other periods in each year as the Committee of Management may decide to be necessary.

30. No Subscriber shall have power to recommend a patient or do any other special act until his or her subscription has been paid.

Annual Subscriptions shall be deemed due on the 1st January in each

When any subscription shall be in arrear for 2 years the subscriber's name shall be omitted from the published list.

31. The Government of the Royal Bath Hospital and of the Rawson Convalescent Home shall be vested in a Committee of Management consisting of the Patron, the President, the Vice-Presidents, the Trustees of both Institutions (all of whom shall be ex-officio members of the Committee), the Honorary Treasurer, the Honorary Consulting Physicians, four Honorary Physicians, and sixteen other members, who shall be elected from the Life and Annual Subscribers. Three members of the Committee shall form a quorum.

The Honorary Treasurer, the Honorary Consulting Physicians, the Honorary Physicians, and the 16 members elected from the list of Subscribers shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting, and shall hold office for one year, and shall be eligible for re-election at the next Annual General Meeting.

They shall have power to engage and dismiss all paid officials, to fix the amount of salaries, and make such orders, according to the spirit of these Rules, as they shall think expedient for the management of the Hospital

Three or more of the Committee shall attend at the Hospital every Thursday afternoon during the time the Hospital is open, to admit patients and transact general business. In the event of a special meeting of the Committee being requisite, the same shall be called by the Secretary, when directed to do so by the chairman of the Committee or three of its members.


32. A House Committee shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, and shall meet at the Hospital as often as may be necessary, at such an hour as they may appoint. They shall examine the books of admission and discharge, and all other books kept by the officers, including the register of the attendance of the Honorary Physicians and Chaplain, and the "Visitors' Book." They shall investigate any complaint of neglect or misconduct of anyone connected with the Institution. They shall examine and sign all such accounts as may require to be laid before the next monthly meeting of the Committee of Management for payment. They shall procure and submit once a year to the Committee of Management for approval, all contracts for drugs, provisions, coals, &c., required for the use of the Hospital and Home. They shall examine, from time to time, the inventories of household goods, furniture, linen, &c., belonging to the Institutions. They shall replace and renew, from time to time, as circumstances may require, all such internal fittings and furniture of the Hospital and Home as may urgently require renewal, and shall superintend all alterations and improvements sanctioned by the Committee of Management, and shall be generally responsible for keeping the grounds and buildings in order.

- 33. Whenever a vacancy or vacancies shall occur in the Honorary Medical Staff, the Secretary shall, when requested by the Committee of Management, give notice thereof by advertisement. Applicants, who shall be fully qualified and registered, shall forward their diplomas and testimonials, if required, to the Committee of Management, who may thereupon proceed to election, or they may in their discretion defer the appointment to the next Annual General Meeting.
- 34. The Honorary Physicians or a sufficient number of them, shall attend at the Hospital, every Thursday, at 2 p.m., during the time the Institution is open, to examine applicants for admission; and shall visit the Hospital three times per week, or as often as they may think necessary
- 35. The Committee shall have power on the recommendation of the Hon. Medical Staff to appoint such specialists in an honorary capacity as may conduce to the better treatment of the patients. Such specialists so appointed shall not form part of the governing body of the Institution.
- 36. The Honorary Treasurer shall pay all monies which he shall receive to the credit of the Hospital and Home at its Bankers, and all payments due from the Hospital and Home shall be made by cheques, signed by himself and two of the Committee. He shall invest, on securities approved by the Committee, when requested by them, all monies available for investment.
- 37. The Auditor shall examine the accounts, and return the same properly audited, to the Secretary, within 14 days after they have been received, and shall receive such a fee as the Committee of Management may think proper.
- 38. The Secretary shall collect and forthwith pay over to the Treasurer all subscriptions; attend and act as Clerk at all meetings of the Subscribers and Committees; make out the annual accounts for the auditor, and perform such other duties as the Committee of Management may direct.
- 39. The Matron shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, subject to three months' notice on either side; she shall devote the whole of her time to her duties, and shall see that the affairs of the Hospital and Home are conducted with the greatest possible attention to regularity, cleanliness, and economy, and shall conform to such Bye-Laws and instructions as the Committee of Management may from time to time decide upon.
- 40. The Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers shall be held at the Hospital on the Third Thursday in January in each year, or within 28 days thereof (of which seven days' notice shall be given by circular), for the purpose of receiving the reports of the Committee and Auditor, determining if any and what substantial alterations of or additions to buildings, shall be undertaken, and for electing a Committee of Management, the Honorary Consulting Physicians, the Honorary Physicians, the Honorary Treasurer, and an Auditor.
- 41. The Chairman of the Committee of Management shall, within ten days after receiving a requisition in writing, signed by five Subscribers, convene by circular a special meeting of Subscribers for considering the purpose stated in such requisition only.

- 42. The Committee of Management shall have power to make such Bye-Laws (not inconsistent with these rules and regulations) as they may think necessary for the internal management of the Hospital and Home, and alter and annul the same as occasion may require; such new Bye-Laws to be in force until confirmed or otherwise at the next Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers, and printed copies of such Bye-Laws shall be affixed in conspicuous parts of the Hospital and Home, for the guidance of the Officers and the observance of the patients.
- 43. No general rule or regulation shall be altered, except by the Subscribers at the Annual General Meeting, or at a meeting specially called for the purpose; in all cases 14 days' notice shall be given to the Secretary of the proposed new rule; and seven days' notice shall be given by the Secretary to all Subscribers (together with the names of the Subscribers proposing the same), prior to the holding of the meeting at which such alteration is proposed to be made.
- 44. At all meetings, whether of the Subscribers or of the Committee of Management, all questions shall be decided by the vote of the majority of those present. In the event of the voting being equal the presiding Chairman of the meeting shall be entitled to give a second or casting vote. in no case is it permissible to vote by proxy.


