ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

OF

HOVE GENERAL HOSPITAL

With Audited Statement of Accounts for the Year 1945

A GAIN we have to present an abridged Report, as the restrictions on paper are still enforced by the Ministry of Supply. As a result, we are unable to present a list of our Governors and Subscribers and similar detail and we must, therefore, crave your kindly consideration. This form of Report has been agreed by all the Voluntary Hospitals who are members of the British Hospitals Association.

The Year's Work

During the year restriction of the number of beds reserved under the E.M.S. Scheme has been further reduced, and comes to an end on 1st April this year. Owing to this fact we have been able to admit more patients to the wards and so reduce our waiting list, which still amounts to 100. This has the serious attention of the Board of Management. The number of patients admitted to the wards has increased by 200, and the number of operations has increased by a similar figure. X-Ray examinations have increased by 1,000 during the year. These figures will show that the work of the Hospital is steadily growing and is caused chiefly by the return of the evacuated population, and also new residents in the district. Our Honorary Staff have, therefore, had to work at great pressure in order to give the desired attention and full service to patients.

Attendances at the Northern Branch still diminish and this is caused by the small amount of unemployment and the fact that many of the local population are members of the Sussex Provident Scheme.

Finance

The amount received from the Ministry of Health under the E.M.S. Scheme, owing to the reduction in Government requirements, has, naturally, been considerably reduced. At the same time, the expenses of the Hospital, owing to the adoption of the Rushcliffe Scheme of Nurses' Salaries and the Hetherington Scheme of Domestic Staff Wages, have increased. The Finance Committee, therefore, have still to keep very steady watch on all items of expenditure, at the same time seeing that all surgical and medical requisites are maintained in first-class order and kept well up-to-date. They have also to see that the comfort and well-being of the patients and staff receive every attention. The Board very much regret that, under these circumstances, accounts now show an overdraft of £11,000 at the end of the year, and there is still a loan against Building and Extension of £5,000.

During the last year there have been indications that the Government propose to bring in a Bill to nationalise all public and voluntary hospitals. This, we regret to report, has had a detrimental effect on voluntary subscriptions. By the time this Report is in your hands the Government proposals will probably be known to you, but the Board still consider that there is great work to be done by voluntary hospitals, and sincerely trust they will be allowed to continue their good work. This is the only general hospital in

Hove and, therefore, the Board hope that we shall receive growing and substantial support from local industrial undertakings. We have been able to render efficient service to many of the casualties from local firms, and it is gratifying to know that our work in this direction has been so well appreciated.

We have again to thank Hove Corporation for their generous grant of £350 during the last year. This has been a great encouragement to the Board of Management and at present covers the local rates paid by the Institution, although we are afraid that the demands of the local services will further increase.

The Hospital is represented on the Sussex Area Committee and Brighton and Hove Sub-Area Committee of the British Hospitals Association, and this Association is rendering valuable assistance to all voluntary hospitals in their efforts to meet the demands of the various Government departments.

The following were elected Life Governors of the Hospital by virtue of their donations: Dr. E. P. Daniell, Edgar Jones, Esq., F. J. Miller, Esq., A. Martin, Esq., also L. E. Brookes, Esq., and G. H. Warren, Esq. (representing Messrs. C.V.A. Jigs, Moulds and Tools, Ltd.)

Mr. H. Chesshire was elected an Honorary Life Governor in recognition of his good work on behalf of the Hospital.

THE LADIES' ASSOCIATION

The Association, founded in 1940, has again been presided over by Mrs. R. W. McKergow, wife of our President, Lt.-Col. R. W. McKergow, with the Mayoress of Hove, Mrs. A. H. Clarke, as Chairman. (Mrs. Clarke has now been succeeded by the present Mayoress, Mrs. H. C. Andrews.) The ladies have been able to hand to the Hospital a cheque for £337 17s. 8d. The increased amount is largely due to the holding of a Christmas Gift Shop in the Hove Town Hall in November. This was a great success and drew the attention of many of the residents of the Borough to the fact that they had a General Hospital in their own area. The President and Chairman will be pleased to welcome new members. There is no annual subscription and full particulars can be obtained from Miss M. L. Saul, Appeals Secretary, at the Hospital.

ANNUAL BALL

Mrs. Wm. Mercer has again acted as Chairman of the Ball Committee, and to her and her hard-working members the Board express their deep gratitude for the sum of £170 towards the expenses of the Institution.

FLAG DAY

The Flag Day held on Saturday, 9th June, was again a great success and realised £417 5s. 1d. The Board wish to thank all those ladies who so kindly undertook control of stalls and gave their able assistance to increase the receipts. Flag Day will be held this year either at the end of May or early in June, and the Appeals Secretary will be glad to receive, during the next few weeks, names and addresses of persons who are willing to assist as they are urgently required to enable the Hospital to further this effort.

BOX COLLECTION

The Board are very grateful to all those good friends who have assisted in the collection of £313 2s. during 1945. They feel, however, that this Scheme could, with small effort, be enlarged considerably and bring in an increased revenue. The Appeals Secretary, Miss M. L. Saul, at the Hospital, will be more than pleased to receive names and addresses of ladies or gentlemen who are willing to give a few hours every month to assist in extending this Scheme.

POUND DAY

Even after Victory the difficulties of rationing still persist, and thus it makes it difficult for our friends to contribute what they would like to the Hospital. Under the circumstances the Board consider the results very good. 996lbs. in goods were received and £90 in cash. When rationing diminishes the Board have no doubt that the receipt of goods on Pound Day will again increase considerably.

Obituary

During the year the Hospital sustained a very great loss in the death of Dr. R. A. Clapham, M.A., M.D., senior honorary physician. For thirty-two years he gave untiring help and advice to the patients of this Hospital, never considering himself even when very much over-worked. He will be greatly missed by many of the inhabitants of the district.

By the death of Mrs. Francis Todhunter the Board have lost a very good friend of the Hospital, who had been a member of the Board of Management for many years. She assisted the Hospital in many ways and acted as honorary secretary of the Ladies' Linen Guild for some long time. By so doing, with her lady helpers, Mrs. Todhunter saved the Hospital some very considerable expense and she will be greatly missed by everybody in the Institution.

Honorary Staff

Now that Victory has been achieved we are glad to hear that Lt.-Col. R. Kemball Price and Lt.-Col. J. C. F. Lloyd Williamson, who have been serving with H.M. Forces, will shortly be resuming their honorary duties at this Hospital.

Major L. W. Lauste, whom we are more than glad to see after his having been a prisoner-of-war since Dunkirk, has already been released from the Forces and is rendering good service to the Hospital in his old position.

Staff

It was with very great regret that the Board received the resignation of Miss M. T. O'Halloran, who had been on the Staff of this Hospital for over twenty years, for the last fifteen of which she was Matron. She has rendered yeoman service to the Hospital, and all our good wishes go with her for her future happy retirement and good health. Her successor, Miss A. M. Gibson, takes up her duties on 1st March, 1946.

The Secretary-Superintendent, Lt.-Col. K. C. Booker, has recently resigned. P-O. R. A. Kingsnorth, Assistant Secretary, is at present stationed near Aden and hopes shortly to resume his duties at the Hospital. F-O. R. G. Thomsett does not intend to return to his duties here and we wish him every success in the future. His brother, Sig. K. E. Thomsett, former clerk, is still serving with the Royal Navy. For the time being Mr. J. V. Roe is continuing to carry out the duties of Secretary-Superintendent.

The Board wish to tender their sincere and grateful thanks to the Honorary Medical Staff, Matron and Nursing Staff, whose work, in spite of great difficulties, has been maintained at the usual high standard, and to the Administrative Staff who have so ably carried out their various duties.

The Board sincerely trust that the Government restrictions on allowing this Hospital only one House Surgeon will soon terminate. They consider there is too much work for one House Surgeon, and this fact has made it very difficult to render to patients the service we should wish. To those who have carried out these onerous duties we owe deep gratitude.

The Hospital Staff Savings Group is still carrying on, the amount invested this year being £480, and we owe our grateful thanks to Mr. Cosstick, our Pharmacist, who has taken such a great interest in the scheme.

The Hospital Staff Social Club has again increased its activities and has proved a great source of recreation and enjoyment to the Nurses. We sincerely trust that this year the Club will further increase its membership to the mutual benefit of all concerned.

Included is the Annual Report of the Ladies' Linen Guild, which shows the volume of good work completed under the able guidance of the late Mrs. Francis Todhunter. With the aid of willing members, and under the Chairmanship of Miss E. Waghorn, and with the assistance of Miss M. E. Ridler, Vice-Chairman of the Hospital, acting as Hon. Secretary to the Guild, this fine work continues. To all these ladies the Board wish to express their gratitude.

To other good friends who have rendered valuable assistance to the Hospital from time to time the Board convey their sincere thanks, especially to Miss Macdonell and her assistant, who keep the Library so well organised. This is a source of joy to the patients and staff alike.

All voluntary hospitals are passing through a very difficult period. We need the help of our friends to-day more than ever before to keep this, their local hospital, in a state of efficiency so that the good work can go forward without interruption. We therefore pray that those who at present take no interest in the Institution will rally to our support.

REPORT OF THE LADIES LINEN GUILD FOR 1945

OBITUARY

With very deep regret the Committee record the death, in August, 1945, of Mrs. Francis Todhunter, who, as Hon. Secretary, so ably conducted the affairs of the Guild for a period of 17 years. Her efforts were untiring and her selfless devotion to the work in all its aspects will ever remain an incentive and an example to all who honour her memory and mourn her loss.

A further gap in the ranks has been caused by the death of Mrs. Collins, a member of the Committee for more than 20 years ; her helpful co-operation will be greatly missed.

Miss Dolan, a former colleague now returned to Hove, and her cousin, Mrs. Dorté, have been elected to fill the vacancies thus caused.

HON. OFFICERS

The resignation of Mrs. Malleson Butt from the chairmanship was regretfully received by the Committee, who are happy to have her continued active support as a member of their body. Miss Ethel Waghorn has consented to act as Chairman. The office of Hon. Secretary remains at present unfilled. Members are therefore requested to address communications to Miss Waghorn, at the address given on page 1.

THE YEAR'S WORK

While 1945 has been a year of anxiety it has also been one of encouragement. Anxious, because of the cancellation of the annual "At Home," owing to Mrs. Todhunter's illness, with consequent drop in income at a time when increasing demands necessitated augmented expenditure, yet encouraging, by reason of the added interest evinced by members and their assistance in obtaining fresh helpers.

As forecast in last year's report, a lengthy requisition list was anticipated, stocks of linen having been reduced to a very low level due to the difficulty of obtaining replacements of satisfactory quality.

During the past twelve months, in addition to material needed to meet Ward and Theatre requirements, the Guild has supplied a quantity of sheets, pillow cases, and towels, entailing an expenditure of £133, as against £51 for 1944.

Subscriptions and Donations for the past year totalled £89, against £78 in the previous year. Included in the former sum is an amount of £6 12s., representing donations sent in memory of Mrs. Todhunter.

It is the aim of the Committee to raise sufficient ordinary income to meet annual expenditure, a steady yearly income of at least £250 is required to enable them adequately to fulfil the obligations undertaken. With this end in view, special efforts are being made to obtain new subscribers. It is gratifying to report that eleven new recruits were enrolled during 1945. The Committee hope that during the current year this number may be multiplied many times.

The basic annual sum entitling to membership is 2s. 6d. only, although larger amounts are especially welcomed. In the large and influential Borough of Hove there must be many who would wish to aid their own General Hospital in a practical manner, by helping to provide its blankets and linen, if its needs in this respect were brought to their notice.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

The Committee desire to express their cordial thanks to all whose help has so materially assisted them in 1945 with especial appreciation of the substantial aid received from Mrs. Somers-Clarke, Mrs. Daniel Duff, Mrs. J. Fraser-Piggott, Vice-Presidents; also from Mrs. Herbert and Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Clark and family.

Tribute must also be paid to the invaluable aid given by the Working Party, who meet each Monday at the Hospital to make and mend, under the able leadership of Miss Robson.

The Committee conclude with the hope that each Member will endeavour to enlist fresh sympathy and active support, so that no call made upon them by the Hospital may have, for lack of funds, to be refused.
