

To be presented to the Annual Meeting of Governors and Subscribers at the Town Hall, Colne, on Thursday, the 4th March, 1948, at 7.45 p.m.

The Annual Meeting of Representatives of Contributors to the Voluntary Weekly Contributory Scheme will be held at the Town Hall, Colne, on Thursday, the 4th March, 1948, at 7.0 p.m.



THE Hospital, fully equipped, was the gift to their native town, of the late Sir William and Lady Hartley, and was opened on the 21st June, 1924, by Miss Christiana Hartley, J.P., of Southport. The Hartley Hospital superseded the Colne Jubilee Cottage Hospital, also the gift of Sir William and Lady Hartley, which was opened on the 20th April, 1900.

The Hartley Hospital stands on the northerly side of the highway leading from Colne to Keighley. The site rises steeply from the highway, and the buildings are set back 100 feet, the intervening space being laid out in terraced lawns. The whole site occupies an area of about 4½ acres.

ACCOMMODATION.

Women's Ward.—66ft. long, 27ft. wide, 12ft. high; Sixteen beds, with day room and necessary conveniences.

Children's Ward.—30ft. long, 22ft. wide, 11ft. high; Eight beds and one baby's cot, with day room and necessary conveniences.

Men's Ward.—50ft. long, 27ft. wide, 12ft. high; Twelve beds, with day room and necessary conveniences.

Private Wards.—Four in two pairs, each pair having its own bathroom and sanitary accommodation.

Emergency or Isolation Ward-Two beds.

Operating Theatre, with sterilising and anæsthetising rooms; Dispensary, etc.

An extension of the buildings was completed during the year 1934 to accommodate new X-Ray Department and Out-Patients' Department, with waiting hall, Consulting and Treatment Rooms.

A suite of Sitting Rooms, with Kitchenette, etc., were completed and occupied by the Nursing Staff in October, 1939.

The Hospital serves the Borough of Colne and the adjoining districts of Trawden and Foulridge.

REPORT

For the Year 1947

The Board of Management present their Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1947.

During the year 2,626 patients (795 In-patients and 1,831 Out-patients) received treatment at the Hospital. Detailed statistics follow at the end of this Report.

The year ended with a deficiency of £3,448, the combined effect of increased salaries and wages and higher costs being largely responsible. The increase in salaries and wages compared with last year amounts to no less than £1,350, or more than one-third of the deficiency and there are also large increases in the cost of fuel (£190), Consultants' Honoraria (£159), Establishment Renewals and Repairs (£270), and Dressings, etc., (£263). The increase in fuel costs is caused by higher prices, whilst the increase in establishment costs is accounted for by outside painting and interior decoration. The large increase in the cost of dressings is explained by the fact that the figure for 1946 was abnormally low as the stocks held during the War were being used up, whereas this year new stock has had to be bought.

In comparison with 1938, the last complete pre-war year, the increased cost of the Hospital is £8,703, which compares with a total expenditure in 1938 of £8,089 or less than one-half the cost in 1947.

Increased costs are, of course, common to practically every business to-day, but whilst the Hospital has to pay higher prices for its labour and supplies it is not able to pass on the increased cost to its "consumers" as other businesses do, and although some increase has been made in the charges

for patients and contributors the gap between income and expenditure has gradually widened until to-day we are faced with a deficit which earlier administrators of the Hospital would never have conceived possible.

On the Income side of the accounts the net increase compared with 1946 is £509. Fairly substantial increases on Subscriptions (£43), Alexandra Rose Day (£43), Contributory Scheme (£158), Patients' Payments (£217), Grants (£467) and Extraordinary Income (£200), were balanced to some extent by the large decrease of £532 in the income from Donations, which is due no doubt to the impending transfer of Voluntary Hospitals to State control.

The Endowment Fund amounted to £52,321 3s. 0d., at the end of the year.

In August, the members of the Board of Management lost a valued colleague by the death of Mr. Rennie Knight, J.P. He had been a member of the Board since 1935 and until illness curtailed his activities he took a very keen interest in the work of the Hospital. The vacancy thus caused was filled by the appointment of Miss Christiana Hartley, C.B.E., M.A., J.P., who, at the invitation of the Board, agreed to accept appointment as one of the two Representative Members under Rule 20(1).

The three Elective Members who retire in accordance with Rule 24 are:—Mr. R. Duckworth, J.P., Mr. H. Bannister, J.P., and Miss E. M. Whitworth, who are eligible for reelection.

The Board again express their sincere thanks to the Honorary Medical Staff and the visiting Consultants, Surgeons and Physicians for the excellent services which they have given during the year.

In January, Mr. H. A. Rippiner, M.B., Ch.B., F.R.C.S., M.R.C.O.G., resigned from the staff of Honorary Surgeons after giving very valuable service for a period of twelve years.

To fill the vacancy Mr. F. R. R. Martin, M.A., M.B., F.R.C.S. Eng., was appointed Honorary Surgeon, and at the same time Mr. R. Davidson, M.B., Ch.B., F.R.C.S. Eng., was also appointed Assistant Honorary Surgeon to relieve the pressure of work.

The death of Dr. W. Alexander shortly after the close of the year was a great shock to everyone. He had given loyal and devoted service to the Hospital since it was opened and was very popular. His place on the staff has been taken by Dr. T. Fletcher.

On the 1st July, Mr. W. Osborn was appointed Secretary in succession to Mr. H. W. Croasdale, whose services have been retained as Superintendent.

To the Matron and her staff, the Board once again express very high appreciation of the excellent manner in which their duties have been carried out. Not the least of Matron's difficulties during the year has been that of maintaining an adequate staff but by the loyalty and untiring devotion of both the Nursing and Domestic Staff the high standard of the work of the Hospital has been maintained.

The two District Nurses have continued their good work in the homes of the sick and during the year 5,775 visits were paid to 312 patients.

It is pleasing to observe that the Weekly Contributory Scheme has once again yielded a record amount, namely, £5,733 18s. 5d., an increase of £158 over the amount received last year. The assistance given by employers and their staffs in collecting the weekly contributions is greatly appreciated.

The ladies of the Linen League have continued their good work and in May linen to the value of £170 5s. 7d, was formally handed over to the Hospital. The Board are very grateful for their help and are happy to know that the League has expressed its intention to continue its activities in the interests of the Hospital after the Government assumes control.

From time to time kind friends of the Hospital have presented to Matron sums of money to be used at her discretion for such purposes as additional comforts for patients or members of the staff. As it was not always possible or expedient to use these gifts immediately, the Board agreed to meet the wishes of intending donors by opening a fund to be known as the Welfare Fund and the amount now in hand is £213 12s. 3d.

The condition of the Hospital buildings has been maintained and most of the paintwork has been renewed. The equipment remains efficient.

The sincere thanks of the Board are offered to: The generous friends who contributed to Matron's Christmas Fund to provide additional seasonal fare and entertainment for the patients; Those who have sent gifts and comforts for the patients during the year; The Members of the Police Force and the St. John Ambulance Corps for their willing help; All subscribers and organisers of functions in aid of the Hospital Funds; All others who have in any way contributed to the successful working of the Hospital.

The Hospital now enters the last phase of its life as a Voluntary Hospital as on the 5th July the Government will assume control but in the meantime the work must go on and the Board appeal for continued generous financial support.

VOLUNTARY WEEKLY CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME RULES

1.—The funds raised by the weekly contributions shall be applied:—

(a) In the maintenance of the Hartley Hospital.(b) In maintaining the services of district nurses.

(c) In contributing towards the cost of the consultations of

specialists.

- 2.—Contributors in need of benefits must in all cases present to the Organising Secretary at his office, 2a, Albert Road, Colne, a form obtained from their medical attendant before either a recommend for any hospital or authority to visit a specialist can be issued. In cases of grave urgency the form must be presented as early as possible.
- 3.—Twenty-six weeks after entry to the scheme, contributors, or their dependents* shall be entitled to:

(a) Maintenance and Nursing without charge in the general

wards of the Hartley Hospital.

- (b) A voucher for admission for special treatment (not maintenance charges) or for the consultation of specialists at other hospitals with whom arrangements have been made
- 4.—In the event of admission to any Hospital outside Colne the contributor should communicate with the Organising Secretary at the earliest opportunity.

5.—All benefits under the scheme will cease at the expiration of 26 weeks from the date of discontinuance of contributions to the fund.

- 6.—In urgent cases where it may be necessary, on the advice of the medical attendant, to consult a specialist at the home of the patient, a grant (not execeeding £1 1s. 0d.) may be made towards the cost incurred; providing that the conditions of Rules 2 and 3 above have been complied with.
- 7.—No responsibility will be accepted for any fees or expenses incurred by contributors or members of their families visiting specialists on their own initiative. No payment will be made for any treatment or operation by specialists privately arranged.
- 8.—No payment will be made from the Hospital funds for any expenses incurred for treatment in any private nursing home or private ward of any hospital, nor can contributions be made from the funds for any surgical or other appliances required by contributors.
- 9.—The funds shall not be applied in providing for treatment of infectious or contagious disease, tubercular (except surgical treatment), mental diseases, or maternity patients; such patients being otherwise provided for.

10.—Contributors may appeal to the Board of Management in any case not dealt with in the rules, and the decision of the Board shall be

final

- 11.—Contributors may make their weekly payments through the firm by whom they are employed or as individual contributors direct to the Organising Secretary.
- 12.—A meeting of the representatives of contributors shall be held annually to receive the report of the year's work and the application of the funds, and to elect representatives to serve upon the Board of Management.

*Dependents shall only include the wife and children (under 16 years of age) who are not workers.

The basis of the scheme is the payment of 2d. per week on earnings under £2 and 3d. per week where the earnings are £2 and over, such contributions to be deducted from weekly earnings by the employer, or paid direct at the office, 2a, Albert Road, Colne.
