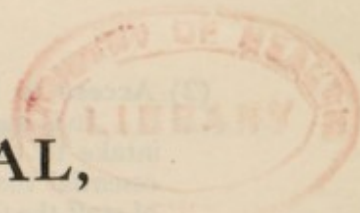
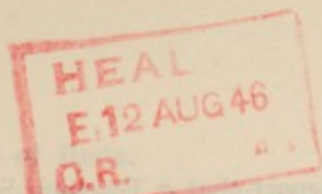

The New St. George's Hospital.

"NEW HOSPITAL" SUB-COMMITTEE'S PRELIMINARY TERMS OF REFERENCE TO MEDICAL STAFF COMMITTEE AND MEDICAL SCHOOL COUNCIL, JULY, 1946.

The assumption is that the new St. George's will be built at the Springfield site at Tooting, in the Borough of Wandsworth. It will be a general teaching hospital in a well-populated area with a complete Medical School for the pre-clinical and clinical courses. Our information is that if a general hospital of about 1,000 beds is built in this neighbourhood there will be no lack of patients. It is assumed that the Atkinson Morley Hospital (100-150 beds) will be retained, although for what purpose is not known. We are advised that the project can be completed in five years if everything is favourable, and that is the time-table to which we are working.

Within easy reach of this site there are the following hospitals with which an association might be formed for clinical purposes if it were so desired:—

St. James' Hospital, Balham (general, 900 beds),
The Grove (fever, 616 beds),
Tooting Bec (mental, 2,355 beds),
St. Benedict's (chronic, 318 beds).

The "New Hospital" Sub-Committee feel that we must first reach agreement on the kind of Medical School and Hospital we hope to build; the departmental details can be considered later. They would therefore like the Medical Staff Committee and the Medical School Council (afterwards referred to as the "Medical Committees") to give their considered answers as soon as possible to the following specific questions:—

(1) The Size of a Medical School.

The Goodenough Committee recommended a Medical School with an annual intake of about 100 students to the **clinical** course which means a total of upwards of 300 hospital students; other bodies have recommended a somewhat smaller number. The total number of medical students, including those attending the pre-clinical and clinical courses, might reach 500.

Question 1.

What is the ideal number of students (a) pre-clinical, and (b) clinical, for a Medical School?

(2) Access to Beds.

It is suggested in the Goodenough Report that a Teaching School with 100 annual intake to the clinical course should have access to about 1,000 beds, but that it is not essential that all these beds should be in one hospital; so long as there is close linkage of staff the Goodenough Report goes on, the beds could be in several geographically associated hospitals. Such an arrangement it is said would be beneficial to the associated hospitals.

Question 2.

(a) Do the Medical Committees concur in the view that 1,000 beds are necessary for 100 student intake to the clinical course

(i) if all are in one hospital?

(ii) if some are in a parent hospital and remainder in associated hospitals?

If not, what figures are recommended?

(b) If it should prove possible to link up with these associated hospitals, would such a link be desirable? in all cases? in which?

(3) The size of a Hospital in one Unit.

A view has been expressed that while a certain number of beds, *e.g.*, 800, is possibly the best number of beds for a general hospital from the point of view of ensuring intimate relationships between all members of the staff and all departments of the hospital, and of medical, nursing and lay administration, yet the optimum clinical student intake might demand that a greater number of beds be provided in the one unit.

Question 3.

(i) What number of beds do the Medical Committees consider is the optimum for a general hospital in one unit?

(ii) On the balance of **all** the factors, what do the Medical Committees consider to be the optimum size for a general **teaching** hospital in one unit? and why?

(4) Allocation of Beds.

The Goodenough Committee recommended that in a hospital of 1,000 beds:—

- 25 per cent. should be allocated for general surgery,
- 25 per cent. should be allocated for general medicine,
- 25 per cent. should be allocated for maternity, gynaecology and children,
- 25 per cent. should be allocated for special departments and special purposes.

Question 4.

Do the Medical Committees accept this broad division?

(5) Bed Allocation—in more detail.

On that assumption, and based on a hospital of 1,000 beds, the "New Hospital" Sub-Committee made the following tentative suggestions for the bed allocation, (excluding beds for private patients, chronic sick and sick staff), based on the academic needs and not the patient needs of the particular area.

Question 5.

(a) Do the Medical Committees agree with this allocation? If not, of what should the general and special departments consist, and how many beds should be allocated to each?

(b) Could some of these be "token" units in the parent hospital with access to beds in other hospital? If so, which departments and how many beds?

(6) Other Beds.

The "New Hospital" Sub-Committee thought that in addition to the general and recognised special department beds there should be approximately 10 per cent. of the total added for private patients, 10 per cent. for the chronic sick, and 5 per cent. for sick staff. This gives a Hospital with a total of 1,216 beds, *i.e.*, 966+250.

Question 6.

Do the Medical Committees agree in this view? If not, what do they suggest?

(7) The Ward Unit.

It will be agreed that a decision upon a standard ward unit is of great importance and that widely varying views are held. The Departmental Committee which reported in 1939, recommended ward units of 30 with at least 4 beds in single rooms. The L.C.C. also regarded 30 as the maximum number of beds that could be efficiently managed by one Ward Sister.

The "New Hospital" Sub-Committee suggest that a 26-bed unit is the ideal. Of this number 6 should be in single rooms and the remainder divided up, or capable of being divided up, into smaller units of, say, 4 or 6 beds.

Question 7.

What do the Medical Committees consider to be the optimum size for a ward unit and how should the ward be divided?

General Notes.

No reference has been made in this preliminary enquiry to the laboratory and teaching accommodation or administrative accommodation that will be required. The "New Hospital" Sub-Committee feel that decisions upon the foregoing questions must first be arrived at. The addition of very highly specialised units will depend upon the needs of the whole area, e.g., radiotherapy will almost certainly be concentrated in one centre serving a number of hospitals, each teaching hospital having only a few token beds.

Constitution of "New Hospital" Sub-Committee.

This Sub-Committee was appointed by the House Committee to consider all matters relating to the building of the new Hospital, except the appeal for funds.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1946.

The House Committee have the honour to submit their Annual Report. The audited accounts and statistics are for the year ended 31st December, 1946, but the general review of the Hospital's affairs has been brought up to April, 1947. For the first time the accounts and statistics of the Atkinson Morley Hospital are included in St. George's.

Statistics. During the year 6,741 patients were admitted to the wards of the Hospital, a daily average of 339, compared with 6,223 and 307 in 1945. New out-patients increased by over 3,000 to 35,742, and attendances by 10,000 to 145,430. The additional wards were not available until the last quarter of the year; the daily average number of in-patients at the date of this report is about 380.

The cost of treating each in-patient rose from £9 7s. 7d. per week to £10 13s. 2d. Each out-patient attendance cost 4s. compared with 3s. 4d.

Finance. Ordinary expenditure amounted to £217,546, an increase of £55,016. This was due to the considerable expansion of work described in the previous paragraph, to increases in salaries and wages, and to essential renewals and repairs of all kinds. With very few exceptions every member of the Hospital's staff—nursing, administrative, and domestic, is now being paid at rates agreed upon nationally.

Income was £184,772, an increase of £26,700 on the previous year, but leaving a deficit to be met out of the General Fund of £32,895. This would have been very much greater but for the exceptionally large amount received in the year as a result of legacies which amounted to £32,405. The income from purely voluntary sources, apart from legacies, was in fact more than in 1945. It had always been the custom to include the amount received from the advertisement hoarding space in "donations," about £3,000 a year: Governors will have noticed that these hoardings were removed early in 1946.

The House Committee wish to express on behalf of the Governors their most grateful thanks to all those who have supported the Hospital by subscriptions and donations and by organized events, and hope that this support will be continued up to the introduction of the National Health Service and afterwards though perhaps in a different form.

The Hospital Policy and progress.

The programme adopted by the Governors in December, 1945, has been carried through. When the new Nurses' Home was opened in Earl's Court Square in May, 1946, alterations were at once started on the top floor at St. George's. These consisted of converting bedrooms in the south wing to provide a sick room for six nurses, two sitting-rooms and writing rooms; re-designing and extending the changing and locker rooms to accommodate about 150 nurses, and converting the whole of the north wing into a maternity ward.

Meanwhile alterations were made in the houses in Knightsbridge to give suitable alternative accommodation for the sisters. It was not a problem simply of providing alternative accommodation for the pre-war number of sisters and nurses. In 1938 there were 180 sisters and nurses, and in 1946 there were 250. These increases are due to the greater number of patients and more complex methods of treatment, changes in the methods of training nurses such as the "block system," and also to a reduction in the nurses' hours of duty.

Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Kent opened the maternity ward on the 12th December, 1946. The ward consists of 30 beds; 13 in single rooms of which six are available for private patients, one two bed ward, one of eight and one of seven. It has been used to capacity. This ward, and the alterations in nurses' accommodation, cost £5,900.

The old operating theatres which had not been used since 1939 were completely re-designed at a cost of £2,250, and opened on 30th September, 1946. The note which follows is reproduced from St. George's Hospital Gazette:—

"The general shortage of space, the unusual shape of the block, the differences in floor level, all have put difficulties in the way and have forced us to accept much less than could reasonably have been asked for. Nevertheless, much space has been gained and better working arrangements have been achieved.

The gallery, the old white elephant, has gone, leaving a great space from which have been carved a new anaesthetic room, a surgeon's changing room and a comparatively spacious theatre. The inadequate sterilising room has been more than doubled in size, by having knocked into it the adjacent anaesthetic room. This new room opens directly into either theatre and into the new instrument room, which has been fashioned from the old surgeon's 'wash-up.' It does not, however, open into the central vestibule; this is to ensure that the 'clean' and 'dirty' traffic of the theatres can be kept apart. The anaesthetic room which used to serve the East theatre now opens into and serves the West theatre. All the wiring of the light and power has been renewed and tubular lighting is being tried. The yellowing old tiles are painted over in mild but cheerful shades of cream and green, and all the washbasins now have elbow-control mixing valves. The metamorphosis has to be seen to be appreciated. May it serve us well! And may it not have to serve us for long!"

Winchester Ward and Wellington Ward, used throughout the war as operating theatres were thus released, and Winchester was re-opened as a Women's accident ward with twelve beds on the 7th November, 1946. Wellington, after serving temporarily as a maternity ward, is being converted into a new X-ray Department.

The Psychiatric Department for in-patients is now established at the Atkinson Morley Hospital, but at present limited to women. There are also at Atkinson Morley beds for neurology, neuro-surgery and 50 beds for the recovery and rehabilitation of patients from St. George's. It is hoped that the second psychiatric ward for male patients will be opened this year, but this depends upon the erection of some new buildings in the grounds.

There are now 472 beds available, 337 in St. George's, and 135 in Atkinson Morley, the highest number in the Hospital's history.

The House Committee are considering further schemes for the expansion of the work at Atkinson Morley, which include an extended X-ray Department, accommodation for rehabilitation and occupational therapy, and a thoracic unit.

The Psychiatric Out-patient Department was transferred to the first floor of No. 15 Knightsbridge, on the 8th July, 1946.

The work grew so rapidly that the second and third floors have now been allocated : the third floor is used for the Children's Psychiatric Department in the charge of Dr. Emanuel Miller.

A canteen was opened on the ground floor of No. 15, Knightsbridge in January, 1947. Since then a daily average of 178 mid-day meals have been served and much appreciated by the non-resident staff and medical students.

The New Hospital. A special Committee has been set up under the Chairmanship of Sir Malcolm Trustram Eve to advise the House Committee in all matters relating to the building of the New Hospital.

The question of a site has at last been settled. As a result of discussions between the Ministry of Health and the Middlesex County Council an adequate site has been made available on the Springfield Estate at Tooting in the Borough of Wandsworth. The new St. George's will serve the very large population in that district as well as sharing with the Westminster Hospital and St. Thomas's Hospital in meeting the Teaching Hospital needs of the new South-west Region. The Hospital is closely in touch with the Ministry of Health on all matters affecting this project, and representatives of the University of London, the London County Council and the Surrey County Council serve on the Sub-Committee.

It is estimated that the New Hospital will have altogether about 1,250 beds. There will be an annual entry of between 80 and 100 medical students to the clinical course, a total, with the pre-clinical students, of nearly 500 medical students.

The Committee have selected Mr. Alexander Gray, F.R.I.B.A., to be the Architect. Mr. Gray is a Partner in the firm of Messrs. W. H. Watkins & Partners, who in 1939 won the Open Architectural Competition for a design to rebuild St. George's Hospital on the present site.

At a time when housing, factories, schools and other public works make strong claims on available labour and materials, it is impossible to forecast how long it will take to build the new St. George's, but it could be accomplished in little more than five years if labour and materials were made available, and that is the timetable to which the Committees are working.

Proposed Amalgamation. The Board of Management of the Victoria Hospital for Children, Tite Street, Chelsea, and the House Committee of St. George's have agreed upon the desirability of amalgamating the two hospitals, and the Ministry of Health have approved. St. George's has always lacked sufficient children's beds and this amalgamation which will bring into association with St. George's upwards of 100 children's beds is heartily welcomed.

Matron's retirement. Miss Helen Hanks, R.R.C., retires this year at her own request after thirty-seven years' service to St. George's, seventeen of them as Matron. Miss Hanks came to St. George's as a probationer nurse in 1910, and in due course became a Sister and finally Matron in 1930. The high place St. George's holds in the nursing world is largely due to her. Not least of Miss Hanks' services was the splendid leadership she gave in the war years.

The House Committee wish to place on record their sense of profound gratitude to Miss Hanks for the devoted service she has given to St. George's.

Appointments. Mr. Anthony Greenwood, M.P., was appointed a member of the House Committee in July, 1946.

Mrs. Meyer Sassoon resigned her membership in May, 1946, although maintaining a close interest in the Hospital.

Dr. E. Bellingham Smith retired in April, 1946, after 26 years' service as Assistant Physician and Physician, and was appointed Consulting Physician.

Mr. E. L. Fickling retired in January, 1947, after 27 years' service and was appointed Consulting Dental Surgeon.

Obituary. The Committee record with regret the death of General Sir John Du Cane and of Major Leslie Renton. Sir John Du Cane had been a member of the House Committee since 1933, and Major Leslie Renton since 1938.

NURSING REPORT.

Student nurses. Several hundred enquiries were received for training and 129 candidates were interviewed of whom 76 were accepted.

It is hoped that means may be found of increasing the Preliminary Training School: the recent expansion to eighteen is the limit that can be reached in the present building. Prospective amalgamation with other hospitals, particularly with a Children's Hospital is welcomed as the nurses have not been receiving sufficient training in children's work.

Twenty-eight student nurses left before completing their training, eight to be married. Eight left either because they did not like the work or were unable to manage the theoretical side.

Senior Nursing Staff. Nine sisters have left—several to be married, and others to take advanced training. Fifty-three staff nurses left during the year—15 to be married: 23 were directed to other hospitals by the Ministry of Labour, and several others have received appointments as sisters, including three at the Atkinson Morley Hospital. Three have been appointed charge nurses and others are taking industrial nursing training and midwifery.

N.B.—In the Hospital Examinations the results are based on the work of the nurse in the wards as well as on her answers to examination questions.

Gifts in Kind. The Hospital has again received splendid gifts of many kinds from the British Red Cross and St. John (including a sum of £274 for the purchase of refrigerators for wards), the Society of St. Pantaleon, the Soldiers and Sailors Families Association and many others. Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Canada have sent gifts of fruit, jam, sweets, sugar and cooking fat which gladdened the hearts of those responsible for keeping up a sufficient and attractive diet for patients and staff.

Appeals Department. The Hospital's grateful thanks are due to those who assisted in the organizing of various events which brought in a substantial sum of money, including—

Generous help is always given by the staffs of hotels and firms in the neighbourhood. Quite often collections are made spontaneously on the Hospital's behalf and we never go to them in vain for practical help.

Acknowledgements. It is impossible to mention by name all those who have given their time and help to the Hospital and the patients by voluntary service. The Red Cross Library, the Shop, which once again made a substantial profit for the Rebuilding Fund, and the Out-patient Canteen, give a daily service of inestimable value. Blood donors, of whom there are many hundreds, are again giving blood at intervals of three months, and even more

donors would be welcomed. Volunteer car drivers, welfare workers, British Red Cross and St. John's nurses have continued to serve throughout the year.

To all those who have helped St. George's Hospital in any way the Committee offer their most grateful thanks.

Conclusion. The House Committee feel justified in referring with satisfaction to the work of re-instatement and expansion carried out during the year, and to the greatly improved prospect of building the New Hospital.

The utmost assistance has been received from the Honorary Medical Staff and the Medical School, and indeed from all members of the Hospital's staff, medical, nursing, administrative and household, in bringing about these desirable improvements.

Chaplain's Report. On St. George's Day, 1946, the Bishop of London visited the Hospital and preached to a packed chapel at the Festival Service in the evening. After the service Lord Greville unveiled a plaque of St. George in memory of the Duke of Kent. The Bishop dedicated the plaque. Mr. Wallace Wood, the artist in his design, bears in mind that this plaque will eventually be moved to a modern building when the new hospital is built. The Bishop came down to the Boardroom and spoke to many of the doctors and nurses ; it was extremely nice to see more of the Honorary Staff on St. George's Day than for many years.

During the year there has been a large increase of communicants amongst the patients and also an increase amongst the Staff. As many of the nurses now live at Earl's Court Square I am going to arrange with the Vicar there for an early celebration once a month in the Church nearby. During the past year the Bishop of Kensington has taken a confirmation and also a service in the Chapel and there have been a good many visiting preachers. The Chapel has recently been put to a new use and that is that it has been used for the Churching of Women. Mr. Kirwan-Taylor and the Maternity Staff have shown great interest in this as I have attempted to turn the short Service in the prayer book into some-

thing more applicable to the present day and have made the service into a blessing on the mother, child, her husband and her home.

Christmas this year was a very happy time, the doctors and nurses sang carols throughout the hospital and outside, returning to the hospital for the midnight service when the Chapel was full and the largest number of communicants at Christmas time that there has ever been.

On 12th January doctors and nurses sang carols at the service in the Chapel. The Chapel and gallery were full and a large number of people were unable to get in. We were extremely glad that Sir Walter Monckton was able to read the Lesson.

Holy Week and Easter was well kept in the wards and in the Chapel, and on St. George's Day our own Choir sang the service, the Bishop of St. Alban's preached and Miss Hanks unveiled a plaque in memory of the doctors and nurses who died in the last war. This plaque of St. Michael is companion to the one on the other wall. The Reverend R. Moline, Vicar of St. Paul's, Knightsbridge, Archbishop Designate of Perth, Dedicated the plaque. It was such a joy to see so many old doctors and nurses who had trained here in the past.

During the year Sister Walsh and Sister Mayo have done the Sacristan work, Sister Webley has run the Chapel bookstall and we have had a very beautiful gift from Sister Hickie of a beautifully worked shell for baptisms. In my opinion, Religion in the modern hospital should not be thrust at people, it should not be compulsory, but it should be there for those who feel that they want it, to help them in their sufferings and to help those who are trying to help them bear their sufferings and to bring healing to the afflicted in Body, Mind and Soul.

Almoners' Department. This Department has no difficulty in believing the statement that over a million persons have returned to live in the London area during the past year. Whereas statistically the number of patients dealt with shows an increase (and the number of Out-patient Clinics, excluding Psychiatric, has increased from 38 to 45 Clinics a week), such statistics do not

necessarily convey a corresponding increase in the volume of work dealt with by the Almoners' Department. More than double the number of social problems were dealt with in 1946 by the In-patient Department than in 1945.

The difficulty of making adequate arrangements for the care of patients has been immensely increased owing to shortage of all kinds of accommodation. The big increase in population has not been followed by a corresponding increase in accommodation either in the Hospital or the Institutions, and this has meant that many people who should be admitted either to Chronic Wards or to Institutions have had to remain at home where their relatives are unable to make suitable provision for them. While the cold weather and fuel shortages have no doubt exacerbated this situation, the problem of the old people in winter or summer will remain with us, and the Hospital was therefore grateful for the opportunity given by the Mayor of Westminster for representatives to attend a meeting at the City Hall, where it was decided to form an Association for the Care of Old People Resident in the City. Administratively, this Hospital is in the awkward position of drawing as many patients from Fulham, Wandsworth and Chelsea, as it does from Westminster thus adding to the perplexity of the administration in the Almoners' Department.

Attendance of Service men and women has decreased, but we have been privileged to help many returned civilian internees from the Far East, and not unnaturally an increasing number of War Pensioners. There are about 300 War Pensioners attending, many of whom need the help of the Almoner with their claims for Treatment Allowances and other personal problems.

The Ante-natal Clinics which were closed in 1939 were re-started on the 2nd July, 1946, and by the end of March, 1947, 457 women had booked for their confinement in the Hospital. In this Department the problems of the war-broken homes are only too evident, as also is the shortage of house accommodation.

An increased interest in Social Medicine is shown in the request of the Dean of the Medical School for a talk to the Medical Students on "The Social Implications of Disease."

St. George's Hospital Medical School (University of London).

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1946.

During 1946 the Medical School began to reap the benefit of the work and foresight of those who served it through the arduous war years. The School owes a great debt to these gentlemen, and in particular to the Vice-Dean, Dr. Gordon.

As a result of their efforts the School was not only kept going as an integrated teaching establishment, and this was not easy during those difficult years, but was provided with a new constitution and a basis on which expansions and improvements could readily be effected.

Perhaps the most noticeable result of the re-organisation has been a paradoxical one. Although the management of the School and of the Hospital is more separate, the collaboration and co-operation between the two is greater than ever before with obvious benefit to both.

This harmony is particularly important at the present time when we are planning for our future expansion on a new site and the realisation that the interests of the School and Hospital are complementary rather than conflicting will certainly lead to the planning of a fine teaching hospital with the best facilities for both patients and students.

Interim Period.

As things are at present, however, it will obviously be some years before we can achieve this and the School like the Hospital cannot stand still in the interim. The buildings of both were regarded as cramped in 1939 and would have been rebuilt had it not been for the war. Any extensive additions are clearly impossible at the moment, especially in view of our future move.

Since the last Report the new maternity block on the top floor of the Hospital has been opened and is a first-class modern midwifery department of 30 beds. The Atkinson Morley Hospital is working well as a Department of Psychiatry, Neurology and

Neurosurgery, and has also a number of beds for recovery cases. Both these changes have resulted in fuller clinical facilities for the students and the projected amalgamation with the Victoria Hospital for Children in Chelsea will add to these a large Pædiatric Department within easy distance of Hyde Park Corner.

It has always been the aim and tradition of St. George's Hospital Medical School that each student should have the closest possible supervision and attention by his teachers and a high ratio of clinical beds to each student. It has in fact been true that the ratio of patients per student has been the highest obtaining in any London Medical School. It has not, therefore, ever been the policy of the Medical School Authorities to have more than 100 active undergraduate students. In view, however, of the increased facilities mentioned above, it is now proposed to raise this maximum to 120. Every effort, however, will be made to maintain the previous standard and tradition of individual attention and tuition of students.

As stated in last year's Report, we have taken women students since October, 1945, and now have ten. It is proposed by October, 1947, to admit at least five more.

The Pathological services and teaching have been completely re-organised under a Director of Pathology, who is the head of a team of which the Bacteriologist, the Chemical Pathologist and the Clinical Pathologist are in charge of their various Departments. All these gentlemen are whole-time servants of the Hospital and Medical School and the appointments have lately been filled by men of academic distinction and teaching experience.

The Future. The Goodenough Report recommended that all teaching Schools should admit pre-clinical students for at least the 2nd M.B. and should admit an annual entry of up to 100. When the School and Hospital are rebuilt, therefore, the number of students will be considerably greater than we have ever had. Many new departments will have to be instituted and the administration of the School greatly enlarged. It is the aim of the School Authorities, in common with the Hospital Authorities, to try and build up a framework during the intervening years which will prepare us for the future.

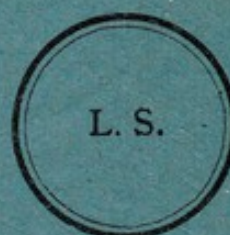
