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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1947.

The House Committee have the honour to submit their Annual Report. The audited accounts and statistics are for the year ended 31st December, 1947, but the general review of the Hospital's affairs has been brought up to May, 1948. The accounts and statistics of the Atkinson Morley Hospital are included in St. George's.

Statistics. During the year 1947, 7,599 patients were admitted to the wards of the Hospital, a daily average of 381, compared with 6,741 and 339 in 1946, an increase of just over 12 per cent. New out-patients increased by 6,500 to 42,265 and attendances by 23,000 to 168,248, an increase in new patients of over 18 per cent. and in attendances of 16 per cent. These are the highest numbers recorded in the Hospital's history. No further increase is likely to take place at St. George's for in-patients, but it is hoped to add about 20 beds for male psychiatric patients at Atkinson Morley Hospital when the new staff dining and sitting-room scheme is carried out.

The cost of treating each in-patient rose from £10 13s. 2d. a week to £14 9s. 1d., an increase of nearly 35 per cent., and the cost of each out-patient attendance rose from 4s. to 6s. 2d., an increase of nearly 55 per cent. It will be seen in the tables of comparative costs that this is chiefly due to increases in salaries and wages. In nearly all departments the number of medical and other staff has been increased, partly owing to the greater numbers of patients and partly to the greater complexity of the investigations involved. It has also been necessary to spend a considerable sum of money in replacing out-worn equipment and in essential renewals and repairs to plant and fabric. This is an old building whose main services need constant care and attention.

Ordinary expenditure amounted to £338,678. The Hospital received legacies of £19,215 and ordinary income totalled £319,463, but the Income and Expenditure Account would not have balanced had it not been for the interim financial assistance received from the Government. Patients themselves and Societies and Public Bodies contributed £65,124 towards the cost of maintenance and treatment. Although voluntary gifts received towards the general funds of the Hospital decreased from £17,708 to £15,893, a number of gifts were received for the Endowment Funds which remain with the Hospital on the Appointed Day and become available for research and other purposes at the discretion of the Board of Governors.

The New St. George's. The Special Sub-Committee under the Chairmanship of Sir Malcolm Trustram Eve have continued their labours throughout the year, and a Report including the Architect's first rough plans has now been sent to the Ministry of Health and the University of London. This Report describes a proposed Hospital of about 1,300 beds, and a Medical School capable of admitting up to 100 students a year to the clinical part of the course, or, with the pre-clinical students, a total of about 500 medical students. The Committee are also considering details of a proposed new Dental School to be included in the scheme, which would give accommodation for about 300 dental students.

The Sub-Committee see no reason to alter their opinion that if labour and materials are made available, the New St. George's can be brought into being within five years.

Victoria Hospital for Children. The Association between St. George's and the Victoria Hospital for Children brought about by Agreement in September, 1947, has worked extremely well. Medical students and nurses from St. George's attend there for experience in children's diseases, and several mutually helpful arrangements have been made. By making some accommodation available in one of our Nurses' Homes and increasing the number of student nurses attending from St. George's it has been possible for the Victoria Hospital to open additional wards, and to raise the complement of beds to 114.

Retirement of Miss Helen Hanks. Miss Hanks retired in August, 1947, at her own request after 37 years' service to St. George's, 17 of them as Matron. The Governors, Medical Staff and many others joined in paying tribute to Miss Hanks for her devoted service to St. George's.

Appointment of New Matron. Miss Muriel B. Powell was appointed to succeed Miss Hanks, and took up her duties on 1st September, 1947. Miss Powell was trained at St. George's, and immediately prior to her appointment as Matron held the post of Senior Sister Tutor at Manchester Royal Infirmary.

Miss G. E. Hickie and Miss A. C. Walsh. Miss Hickie retired in September, 1947, from the post of Assistant Matron which she had held since 1929. Miss Hickie shared with Miss Hanks the very great responsibility of war-time nursing, and in the reorganisation which took place after the war.

Miss Walsh, for many years Senior Office Sister and Acting Assistant Matron from September, 1947, to February, 1948, retired in March, 1948.

The House Committee wish to place on record their high appreciation of the services given to St. George's by Miss Hickie and Miss Walsh, and wish them great happiness in their retirement.

Miss H. Downton, formerly second Assistant Matron at St. Bartholomew's Hospital, has been appointed Assistant Matron.

NURSING.

The Preliminary Training School. The Preliminary Training School has been considerably enlarged during the year, 30 student-nurses being now admitted every two months. This increase was made possible by the opening of a new Hostel at Courtfield Gardens and the redistribution of existing accommodation in Knightsbridge where the Preliminary Training School is still housed. Classroom facilities remain inadequate and alternative accommodation for the school may have to be considered before the end of the year.

The continued success of the Block System is a tribute to the enthusiasm and excellent teaching given by the Sister Tutors, the Senior members of the Medical Staff and the Ward and Departmental Sisters. The latter have arranged and conducted clinical teaching for the nurses during their study periods. But the danger of the divorce of theory and practice remains, and with this and other limitations of the Block System in mind, an experiment in the method of Case Assignment is being carried out in one of the wards. Under this system of supervision the student-nurses are given charge of the total nursing care of a certain number of patients. The aim is to provide opportunity for study of the social and preventive, as well as the curative, aspects of nursing care, and formal teaching is closely integrated with nursing practice.

The introduction of a full-time ward-help service has further relieved the student-nurses of repetitive domestic and non-nursing duties.

The Nursing School continues to offer a comprehensive training in all branches of nursing including psychiatry and neurosurgery with opportunities for specialising in these after qualification.

All student-nurses receive training in the nursing of sick children at the Victoria Hospital. Training for nurses on the Sick Children's Register has been reduced to two years.

The Reference Library. The Reference Library now receives a substantial annual grant and has been removed to a comfortably furnished room in Knightsbridge. Up-to-date reference books and current medical and nursing periodicals are available and the Library is open daily.

Two Sisters, Miss V. M. Jenkinson and Miss J. Bourne gained the Diploma in Nursing, the latter having also been awarded a Florence Nightingale International Foundation Scholarship for study abroad.

Chaplain. The Rev. Anthony Rouse resigned at the end of his three-year period of service in December, 1947, and the Rev. H. E. Woodhams has been appointed to this office.

New X-Ray Department. The former Wellington Ward has been converted into a diagnostic X-ray department and becomes a Memorial to the late Mr. Shaool Eskill, whose son, Mr. Albert Eskill, gave £10,000 towards the cost of providing the new department. It is about two-and-a-

half times the size of the old, and except for one diagnostic room is now fully equipped, for the most part with new apparatus.

Plans are being considered to re-establish the deep X-ray department in the old diagnostic rooms on the other side of the corridor.

Atkinson Morley Hospital. Many improvements have been made at this Hospital. The wards, corridors and departments have been re-decorated in lighter colours; the outside is now being repainted and the whole building will have an entirely brighter atmosphere.

The Psychiatric Department now extends along the top floor, taking in the rooms formerly used as Matron's quarters and domestic staff rooms. This has provided a compact six-bedded psychiatric male ward. Two Nissen huts have been erected in the grounds, and these are being used for occupational therapy, a carpenter's shop and porters' staff room.

In the grounds to the south of the main building, a poultry farm of about 300 birds is now in full running order, supplying eggs in substantial numbers both to St. George's and the Atkinson Morley Hospital. We are greatly indebted to Mr. D. Nugent for his expert advice in establishing this enterprise. A much larger area of ground has been cultivated and bush and standard fruit trees have been planted.

The sports facilities have been greatly improved by the addition of two hard tennis courts and two grass courts, and by the erection of a temporary pavilion in the form of a marquee; it will be remembered that the original pavilion was destroyed by fire.

Work is well advanced on the new pathological laboratories, post-mortem room and mortuary being built just north of the west wing. Apart from the great improvement in facilities, this will release accommodation in the adjoining Cottenham House urgently needed for other purposes.

The Laundry. Very considerable improvements have been made in the Laundry, both in equipment and in the organisation of the work. All the washing for patients and staff of St. George's and Atkinson Morley is now carried out in our own Laundry, and it is probable that some, if not all, of the laundry from the Associated Hospitals can be done there. The Committee are greatly indebted to Mr. E. K. M. Hilleary for his advice and practical help in this connection, and they recommend that he be made an Honorary Life Governor of the Hospital.

The Jumble Sales Committee, under the Chairmanship of Mrs. Wilfred Bleaden, organised two Jumble Sales which raised the splendid sum of £1,170. Unfortunately the rooms used for receiving, sorting and selling jumble have had to be taken over for hospital purposes, and so the Jumble Sales have ended after 20 years, in which time they raised no less a sum than £11,278. Mrs. Wilfred Bleaden has been elected an Honorary Life Governor in recognition of her services.

At a special final meeting held at the Hospital on 10th May the Chairman expressed the heartfelt thanks of the Governors to the Committee and all those who had helped in this truly remarkable effort. It is gratifying to learn that already many of those who helped in the Jumble Sales are considering ways and means of continuing their assistance to the Hospital.

An Exhibition of Embroidery was held in December and January in co-operation with members of the Ladies' Association and the Embroiderers' Guild. The Chairman was Margareta, Countess of Winchelsea, and the Chairman of the Executive Committee, Mrs. Bernard Briant. This event raised over £1,000 for St. George's, but the actual amount will appear in the accounts for the year 1948.

The Works Society. The Works Society, which is a branch of the Ladies' Association, has reported good progress, and the Honorary Secretary, Miss Mary Stephenson, has expressed the hope that the substantial funds now in hand may be used to purchase more material to be made up by the willing members into garments and other things required in the Hospital.

Acknowledgments. Year by year in this Annual Report acknowledgment is made to those who have given their time and skill to help the Hospital and the patients by voluntary service. The Red Cross Library, the Shop—which once again made a substantial profit—and the Out-patient Canteen have continued to give daily service of great value. Blood Donors have given their blood at regular intervals of three

months, and even more donors are needed. Volunteer car drivers, welfare workers and British Red Cross and St. John's nurses have continued to serve the Hospital throughout the year.

To all those who have helped St. George's Hospital in any way the Committee offer their most grateful thanks.

Psychiatric Department. This department has again expanded during the year, several more rooms have been made available in No. 15, Knightsbridge, for out-patient investigation and treatment, and six beds were opened for male patients at Atkinson Morley Hospital.

Catering. Further improvements have been made in the equipment for preparing, cooking and serving food to patients and staff. Vegetables are now prepared at ground floor level in what was the china store, and space freed in the kitchen used for a new food mixer and an ice-cream maker. The new equipment includes large gas ovens, hot plates and electrically heated food trolleys. The whole of the catering at St. George's, Atkinson Morley and the several Nurses' Homes is now supervised by the Catering Officer under the control of the Catering Committee.

Cleaning and Repairs. A very great deal of work has been carried out in the wards and departments. Lighter colours have been chosen for the wards and corridors, and the use of strip lighting in the corridors and some treatment rooms has made a big improvement.

Occupational and Diversional Therapy. Both at St. George's and Atkinson Morley many patients have become interested in various forms of handicraft, and an additional Occupational Therapist has been appointed. Lack of room severely limits the scope of this work, especially at St. George's, but it is now agreed after an experimental period, that occupational therapy has a very real part to play in the treatment of patients.

Staff Canteen. An average of about 170 daily have a mid-day meal in the canteen on the ground floor of No. 15, Knightsbridge. The canteen is open to all non-resident staff and medical students. The staff canteen which has been established during the year at the Atkinson Morley Hospital and run on the same lines is very much appreciated.

Special Donations. In addition to the gift of £10,000 from Mr. Albert Eskell referred to earlier, the Hospital has received a further £5,000 from the Trustees of the Bernhard Baron Trust Fund, and in consideration of this and past gifts from the late Mr. Bernhard Baron it is proposed to name a ward in the New Hospital "The Bernhard Baron Ward."

Gifts in Kind. Gifts have come to the Hospital from many parts of the world—from Australia, South Africa, New Zealand and Canada. The Palestine Citrous Marketing Board have sent large quantities of oranges and small parcels containing food and gifts of clothing have come from private sources in the Dominions, and from the Overseas Relief Committee in Alabama. In this way the diets have been made more attractive, particularly for the patients, and we are deeply grateful to all those who have contributed in this way.

The National Health Service Act. St. George's Hospital has been Designated as a Teaching Hospital, and included with it are the Victoria Hospital for Children, the Royal Dental Hospital and the Princess Beatrice Hospital.

This new Teaching Hospital will be administered from 5th July, 1948, by a Board of Governors appointed by the Minister of Health. Everyone will wish the new Board of Governors well in their task, and if the future is to be worthy of the past, the changes now coming about must be regarded as providing new opportunities for the spirit of initiative and humanity which has always characterised the voluntary hospitals. Voluntary effort will be as necessary as in the old days, whether on the Board of Governors or the Sub-Committees, in the Ladies' Association, the Shop, Canteen or Library, or in the wards and departments.

St. George's is left free with its Associated Hospitals to use endowment funds for special purposes such as research in medicine, nursing and other branches of teaching hospital work, and of course to add to these funds by annual subscriptions, donations, or by organised events. Similarly, those funds which enable the donor and the hospital together to play the part of Good Samaritan will go on.

We appeal to all friends of St. George's Hospital to maintain the support and service which has been so freely given in the past.

ALMONER'S REPORT.

Social Service Department. The increased number of patients attending during 1947 is reflected in increased work in all the Social Service Departments. It is interesting to note that comparatively few patients are really poor, for example, of the £1,924 spent on the supply of surgical appliances, £853 was paid by the patients themselves.

The provision of Convalescent Treatment is easier as there are more Convalescent Homes open. Beds in Sanatoria are still inadequate in numbers, patients having to wait four to five months for admission. Fortunately patients with negative sputa are now accepted at Atkinson Morley Hospital. The Chest Clinic shows 78 patients regularly attending; an increase of 43 on 1946.

The British Red Cross Society Hospital Car Service has been of great help. The Hospital has paid out £86 17s. 3d. on this service, although a few patients have paid the cost themselves, and we are grateful to some drivers who make no charge. This service is apart from the provision of ambulances for the need of individual patients.

During the past two years the numbers of both men and women patients registering in the V.D. Department have dropped by about 25 per cent. This may be due to post-war conditions or possibly to the fact that present methods of treatment considerably reduce the period of infectivity. Many of those who have attended need constant following by letters and by home visits, which are undertaken whenever possible.

Over 1,200 letters were sent and 50 visits paid by the Almoner in 1947 as part of the campaign, but the personal interview on the first or second visit to the clinics often proves the most helpful method of getting satisfactory results.
