# REPORT

## For the Year ending 31st December, 1929.

The Council of the Hornsey Central Hospital beg to submit the annual report for 1929, and are pleased to give details of a year's steady progress.

The number of admissions decreased from 923 in 1928 to 867 in 1929, and the number of operations also show a decrease. This is, to a large extent, accounted for by the decrease in short period cases. The numbers of out-patients and their attendances also show a slight decrease.

In the Income and Expenditure Account the amount on both sides of the account are lower than in 1928. The decrease on the expenditure side points to economical and smooth running in all departments. The decrease in income for general account is, no doubt, attributable to the generous responses made to our appeals for the Nurses' Home Fund.

The Home itself is now in course of erection, and will be opened during the summer or early autumn of this year (1930). The foundation stone was laid by Mr. Jas. Anderson on 22nd March, 1930, and arrangements will shortly be put in hand regarding the furnishing and equipment. Donations towards the cost of this will be very greatly appreciated, the average cost of furnishing a bedroom being about £20. In-patients' payments during the year were as follows :---

In addition to the 76 in-patients' fees remitted (representing 132 weeks), no fewer than 821 treatments were given entirely free in the out-patients clinics, made up as follows:—

Massage, 371; ultra-violet ray, 207; X-ray, 111; dressings, 132.

The Visitors from King Edward's Hospital Fund for London were T. H. Openshaw, Esq., C.B., C.M.G., F.R.C.S., and Brig.-Gen. the Hon. Charles Willoughby, C.B., C.M.G., and they made the annual inspection in June, expressing their satisfaction at the working of the Hospital.

The Council are pleased to report that, through the kind recommendation of Mr. Openshaw, they have received a cheque for £80 from a legacy specially left to provide surgical appliances to Hospitals, which has enabled them to purchase a Diathermy apparatus.

The Council regret to report the death of one of the Life Governors, Mr. Bernhard Baron, who had been a generous friend to the Hospital. The Council are deeply indebted to Mr. J. J. Hamilton, of the Stock Exchange Mutual Subscription Fund, for the magnificent gift of £1,000 made to the Nurses' Home Fund.

The Council wish to place on record their indebtedness to Mr. James Edmondson for endowing a bed in the Scott Balfour Ward, part of the extension to the Hospital premises opened by his son, Major A. J. Edmondson, in 1924

Captain Euan Wallace, M.P. for Hornsey, has accepted a Vice-Presidency of the Hospital.

The Council desire to congratulate Mr. Jas. Anderson upon receiving the freedom of his native town of Forfar.

The Nurses' Home Fund has been enriched by many generous gifts during the year, notably the grant of £600 from the Thank-offering Fund for the King's Recovery, per King Edward's Fund, also £150 from the King's Fund. £250 was received from the Corporation of London, £105 from the Ladies' Visiting Committee of the Hospital, three gifts of £100 each, one from Mr. T. B. Taylor and two sent anonymously. The sale of "Help Yourself" Annuals brought in £150 from the Stock Exchange Dramatic and Operatic Society, and many smaller gifts were received, among them being £30 raised by the members of the Nursing Staff themselves.

A special Charity Meeting was arranged by the Greyhound Racing Association at the Harringay Park Track, and we received £227 Os. 10d. as our portion of the proceeds; also a special donation of £5 5s. 0d., given by Mr. E. Emanuel, was allocated to the Hornsey Central Hospital Nurses' Home Fund. The Council wish to record their appreciation of all the help afforded them by this Association.

The "Rosebuds" surpassed themselves in their gifts last year, as no less than £100 was paid into the General Funds for the support of the "Rosebud" Cot, and £36 to the Nurses' Home Fund. The Council wish to place on record their great indebtedness to the Misses Caldicott and to these youthful entertainers. The Council desire to express their thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Hardin, who gave a Garden Party for the benefit of the Nurses' Home Fund, resulting in £94 2s. 0d. being added to it.

The Swimming Gala arranged by the Hornsey Central Hospital Charity Competition added £87 14s. 3d. to the Fund, and the Football Section contributed £26 5s. 0d. The help afforded by these Competitions is gratefully acknowledged.

The Council tender their hearty thanks to Messrs. Wight and Co. for executing repairs and renovations to the wireless installation. Sincere thanks are also due to the Harefield, Independent, and Barrington Lawn Tennis Clubs for permitting the nursing staff to use their courts.

The Council wish to thank the annual subscribers and donors to the General Fund, also the donors to the Nurses' Home Fund, and all who have given gifts in kind during the year. All the assistance thus given has been invaluable.

The Council also tender their thanks to the local Press for the regular insertion of news items week by week.

The Council record their deep appreciation of, and gratitude for, the large amount of gratuitous work done by the Consulting Staff and local medical practitioners during the year, and also to Mrs. Daffarn and Miss Hearle for their untiring work in the massage department; and to the Honorary Dispenser, Miss Jayne. They also express their appreciation of the efficient manner in which the work of Hospital has been carried out by the Matron and her staff during the year.

The Council also wish to express their very great appreciation of the services rendered by all the honorary workers in the Hospital. Some are able to give more time than others, but all give of their best and with an equal amount of enthusiasm for the well-being of the Hospital.

# Annual Report of Medical Committee

The usual monthly meetings were held on the first Tuesday in each month, and also one emergency meeting.

Dr. Girling was elected Chairman and Dr. Victor Feldman Secretary.

The Committee wish to express their thanks to the retiring Chairman, Dr. Downton, for his services during his year of office.

The following were elected to the various Committees :--

House.—Drs. Downes, Downton, French, Fuller and Drs. Girling and Feldman (ex-officio).

Instruments and Drugs.-Drs. Cairns, French and Gregory.

Dr. Downton was re-elected Medical Officer of the Resident Staff under National Health Insurance.

A Special Meeting of Practitioners was held and addressed by Drs. Brackenbury and Garrow (Medical Officer of Health) and others. The following resolutions were passed :—

- (1) That this Meeting of the Medical Practitioners of the Borough of Hornsey approves the suggested arrangement between the Hospital and the Borough Council for the purpose of treatment of Enlarged Tonsils and Adenoids in school children, and agrees to help the matter forward, subject to satisfactory arrangements being made by the Authorities concerned. (It is hoped that early in 1930 the treatment of school children for Enlarged Tonsils and Adenoids will be started.)
- (2) That action be taken for representation of the smaller Hospital of Middlesex on the Advisory Committees under the Local Government Act, 1929.

Dr. Fuller was appointed Medical Representative for the Hornsey Central Hospital on this Committee.

Dr. Garrow, the Medical Officer of Health, attended many meetings and placed before the Committee at various times schemes which he proposed to bring before the Borough Council.

The Committee note with regret that Dr. Prior has given up certain of his duties, and wish to place on record the deep thanks of the medical practitioners of Hornsey for his generous help and advice at all times, and to acknowledge the pleasant relationship between him and the practitioners.

The Committee note with pleasure that building operations have begun on the new Nurses' Home, and trust that by the time the building is completed the total cost will have been subscribed. The Committee feel that the erection of the building will be of great help in carrying on the work of the Hospital and will greatly assist the Nursing Staff in maintaining good health while carrying out their arduous duties.

A Swimming Gala was held in August in the open-air pool, in aid of the Hospital, in which a Doctors' Race was held. The Committee wish to thank those doctors who took part in the race, thus helping to make the function a success.

The Doctors' Stall at the Annual Garden Party was a success and a substantial sum was realised from the sale of fruit, etc.

The Committee trust that the unavoidable absence of Mrs. Fuller as organiser of the Medical Stall will only be temporary, and that the Committee will have the benefit of her help again next year.

The Committee are pleased to report that certain alterations have been made in the Theatre, and hope that when the new Nurses' Home is complete further additional space will be allotted for the use of the X-ray department and that the Medical Staff will be provided with a room for their sole use. The Committee are pleased to note that the names of the Consulting Medical Staff have been placed on a board in a prominent place in the hall of the Hospital.

The Committee wish to place on record their grateful thanks to the Honorary Consulting Staff for their work during the past year, and also to the many local practitioners who have done work in the Hospital gratuitously.

The Committee also express their warmest thanks to the Matron and her Staff for their untiring and successful efforts to maintain the efficiency of the nursing during 1929 at its wellknown high standard.

There has been a slight reduction both in the number of cases for operations and also in the number admitted to Hospital. The decrease being almost entirely in the minor cases.

# THE RULES

## OF THE

# HORNSEY CENTRAL HOSPITAL.

## INSTITUTION.

I .- The Hospital shall be called "THE HORNSEY CENTRAL HOSPITAL."

II.—The Hospital is intended for the treatment of persons residing in the Borough of Hornsey, not being in receipt of relief at the cost of the Poor Rate, suffering from non-infectious diseases (including typhoid fever), who are unable to obtain in their own homes suitable accommodation, care and attention, and for persons suffering from accidents or sudden illness; but no case of midwifery, epilepsy, or advanced pulmonary, mental, or incurable disease shall be admitted. The Council hereinafter mentioned shall have the power of receiving patients for whose maintenance special payment shall be made, and it is understood that the Medical Men in attendance on such Patients may charge medical fees. There shall be no Out-patients' Department, except that provision may be made for the treatment of emergency cases where the Patients are not detained as In-patients.

III.—The funds of the Hospital may be provided by voluntary contributions and grants, by bequests, and by payments of Patients, their friends, or employers.

## GOVERNMENT.

IV.—The management of the Hospital shall be vested in a Council consisting of ex-officio, elected and nominated Members. The President, Life Governors, Vice-Presidents, Trustees, and Honorary Officers shall be ex-officio Members. The number of elected and nominated Members shall be in the proportion of one such Member (whether elected or nominated) for every full sum of £25 of income received for the Hospital during the year ending on the 31st day of December next preceding the Annual General Meeting of Subscribers. The names of nominated Members (see Rule vii.) must be received by the Secretary prior to the said meeting, or the right of nomination shall lapse. The remaining Members of the Council shall be elected at the said Annual General Meeting of Subscribers.

V.—The Annual General Meeting of Subscribers shall be held in the month of February or March in each year, at such time and place as the Council shall determine. At this Meeting a Report and Statement of Acuounts for the year ending on the next preceding 31st day of December, duly audited, shall be presented by the Council; the President, Vice-President, Council, Ladies' Visiting Committee, two Auditors and Officers other than the Medical Staff, shall be nominated, appointed and elected for the ensuing year, and Life Governors nominated and qualified during the year shall be elected; and, subject to Rule xxxvii., alterations in the Rules may be made, and such other business transacted as may be regularly brought forward.

VI.—Each Subscriber of half-a-guinea and upwards, which may be subscribed during the year ending on the next preceding 31st day of December, each ex-officio Member of the Council, and each Medical Practitioner who has gratuitously attended Patients in the Hospital during such year, shall be entitled to a vote at every Meeting of Subscribers held during the current year; and a donor of Ten Guineas and upwards shall be entitled to a vote at each Meeting of Subscribers held in his lifetime, provided that no person shall be entitled to more than one vote at any one time of voting.

VII .- A contribution of Twenty-five Guineas in one year by an individual. r Fifty Guineas in two years by a Church, Club, Society, public or private institution or body, shall entitle the donors to nominate a Life Governorship, with a vote at any General Meeting of Subscribers held during the life of the nominee. A contribution amounting to less than £25 in any one year towards the funds of the Hospital from a Church or Congregation, Club, Society, public or private institution or body, or persons holding Bazaars, Entertainments, and the like, shall entitle the contributing Church or Congregation, Club, Society, Institution, body or persons to the appointment of one representative Voter for each full sum of £5 so contributed to attend and vote at any General Meeting of Subscribers convened during the year next succeeding the 31st day of December following the date of acknowledgment on behalf of the Hospital of the receipt of the money. The authorisation of the Representative Voter must be in writing and to the satisfaction of the Chairman of any such Meeting; and otherwise the person to whom the receipt shall have been issued shall alone be admitted to vote. A similar contribution amounting to £10 and upwards in any one year shall entitle the contributing Church or Congregation, Club, Society, Institution, body or persons to nominate one Member of the Council at the next Annual General Meeting of Subscribers for every full sum of £10 so contributed, and such nominated Member shall hold office until the next succeeding Annual General Meeting of Subscribers. Provided that no such contribution shall entitle the contributing Church or Congregation, Club, Society, Institution, body or persons to appoint a Representative Voter or Voters in addition to nominating a Member or Members of the Council.

VIII.—A Vice-President shall be a Subscriber of not less than £10 10s. a year, and an elected Member of the Council of not less than £1 1s. a year towards the funds of the Hospital.

IX.—There shall be not fewer than three Trustees, in whom all the property of the Hospital shall be vested upon trust for the sole benefit of the Hospital, to be dealt with in such manner as the Council may from time to time direct, provided that the Hospital buildings and premises shall be held and dealt with from time to time in accordance with the provisions in that behalf contained in the Trust Deed comprising the premises. Should a Trustee die, resign, become incapable of acting, or be unwilling to act, a fit and proper person shall be nominated at the Annual General Meeting or at a Special General Meeting of Subscribers, and the surviving or continuing Trustee or Trustees shall thereupon appoint the person so nominated a new Trustee of the Hospital.

X.—Such funds of the Hospital as are not required for current purposes may be temporarily placed on deposit with the Bankers appointed by the Council. The Council may from time to time direct the investment of such funds in the names of the Trustees in such securities as Trustees are by law permitted to invest in, and may from time to time direct the Trustees to vary such investments into or for others of a like nature. An absolute majority of the Members of the Council may from time to time direct the Trustees to sell all or any part of the investments for the time being and to apply the proceeds of sale in such manner as such majority shall by resolution direct, conformably with the purposes of and for the benefit of the Hospital.

XI.—The Council shall meet at least once in each three calendar months of the year. Seven Members shall form a quorum.

XII.—On a vacancy occurring on the Council or the House Committee, or among the Officers of the Hospital, from death, resignation or otherwise, the Council shall have power to fill it up. XIII.—Any Official, Honorary or otherwise, may, after due inquiry, be removed by the Council for any conduct which the Council may in their absolute discretion consider detrimental to the interests or welfare of the Hospital.

XIV.—The Council may at any time and on a requisition signed by not fewer than ten Subscribers entitled to vote (stating the objects of the Meeting) call a Special General Meeting of Subscribers. The notice calling such Meeting shall state the business to be transacted at that Meeting.

XV.—Not less than seven days' notice shall be given of every Annual General or Special General Meeting of Subscribers, in such manner as the Council shall determine.

XVI.—All questions and matters except in the case of alterations of these Rules brought before any meeting of Subscribers shall be decided by a show of hands of persons entitled to vote; or, except in the case of alteration of these Rules, if the Chairman of the Meeting so direct, by a poll to be taken on such subsequent day and at such place, and in such manner (including voting by proxy, appointed in writing), as he may think fit. The Chairman shall, in the case of an equality of votes, have a second or casting vote.

XVII.—The internal administration and control of the Hospital shall be delegated to a House Committee, consisting of the President, the Treasurer, the Secretary, six Members of the Medical Committee, and nine other Members, not Medical Practitioners, annually appointed by the Council out of their own number.

XVIII.—The House Committee, three Members of whom shall form a quorum, shall meet at least once a fortnight at the Hospital or elsewhere, as they may decide, in order to check receipts and expenditure, authorise payments of accounts, inspect the Matron's diary and medical returns of cases, settle fees to be paid, and deal generally with all routine business. Minutes of the proceedings shall be kept by the Secretary.

XIX.—A Visiting Committee, consisting of Ladies, shall be appointed at each Annual General Meeting, with power to add both active and honorary Members to their number, active Members at no time to exceed twelve. The Members of such Committee shall from time to time visit the patients and inspect the Hospital.

XX.—No Member of the Council or Officer of the Hospital shall at any time be personally liable for any obligations contracted in the name of the Hospital, and the funds of the Hospital shall alone be liable for such obligations.

## MEDICAL.

XXI.—Any legally qualified and registered Medical Practitioner resident or practising in the Borough of Hornsey may recommend any suitable case for admission to the Hospital, provided his recommendation be countersigned on the prescribed form in accordance with Rule xxviii. Any such Medical Practitioner shall also (subject to any regulations made by the Council) have the opportunity of visiting and attending any patient admitted on his recommendation.

XXII.—The Council shall accept the services of any legally qualified Medical Practitioner who will render first aid to any patient brought to the Hospital.

XXIII.—The Medical Staff shall consist of Consulting Physicians and Consulting Surgeons, to be appointed for five years by the Council after consultation with the Medical Committee, and to be eligible for re-appointment, and of other Medical Officers wiling to give their services gratuitously. Each Medical Officer shall be a legally qualified and registered Medical Practitioner resident or practising in the Borough of Hornsey. XXIV.—There shall be a Medical Committee consisting of not less than ten, or more than fifteen, Medical Practitioners, elected annually in December from among their own number by the legally qualified and Registered Medical Practitioners resident and practising in the Borough of Hornsey, subject to approval by the Council. The Medical Committee shall formulate Rules for regulating their own Department, but such Rules shall not be contrary in their operation to any of these Rules. They shall prepare a rota of Medical Practitioners who will be prepared to give their services in cases of accident and sudden emergency and to take charge of patients admitted to the Hospital who have not previously been under their medical care. The Medical Committee shall report monthly to the House Committee the number and condition of the patients, and as to other matters in connection with the Medical Department.

## TREASURER.

XXV.—The Treasurer shall give authorised receipts for all moneys received on behalf of the Hospital, and shall lodge all such moneys with the Bankers appointed by the Council. All payments exceeding £2 shall be paid by cheque on the Bankers, drawn by order of the House Committee or the Council, signed by the Treasurer, and countersigned by the Secretary.

XXVI.—The Treasurer shall keep a true account of all receipts and payments, and shall produce such account at each Meeting of the Council. At each Meeting of the House Committee he shall enter all payments in an analysis book, showing them under the different headings recommended by the Council of the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund. At the end of each financial year he shall prepare a full and complete statement of the income and expenditure, to be submitted to the Auditors, together with the names and addresses of the Donors, Contributors and Subscribers, and the amounts of their Contributions, and showing those who are entitled to vote as Subscribers or Life-Voters.

## SECRETARY.

XXVII.—The Secretary shall issue the necessary notices convening all Annual General and Special General Meetings of Subscribers, and Meetings of the Council and House Committee, and shall keep a record of the business transacted thereat. He shall countersign all cheques for duly authorised payments, attend to the correspondence appertaining to his department, issue letters of recommendation, and generally further the interests of the Hospital. The Council may at any time, if they think fit, appoint a salaried Secretary or a salaried Assistant Secretary.

#### PATIENTS.

XXVIII.—With the exception of cases of recent accident or sudden emergency, which may be admitted on application, no case shall be admitted to the Hospital except on the written recommendation of a duly qualified and registered Medical Practitioner, resident or practising in the Borough of Hornsey, countersigned by a person entitled to do so under Rule xxix., but the counter-signature may be obtained at any time within thirty-six hours. Whenever practicable, security from some substantial person for payment of the expenses of burial or removal of a patient shall be taken.

XXIX.—For each £1 1s. 0d. subscribed or contributed, the Subscriber, or a Representative Voter or nominated Member of the Council under Rule vii., shall be entitled to a Letter of Recommendation, available for one year from the date of issue, for use in favour of any admissible patient. A Donor of ten guineas in one sum shall be entitled for life to recommend one such patient annually. Any Subscriber of £25 or upwards shall be entitled, during not more than one year from the date of the acknowledgment of the receipt of his subscription, to the use of a bed in the general wards free of charge, for any such patient recommended by him, subject to the approval of the House Committee. In the event of no bed being immediately available, notice of the first vacancy shall be given to him by the Matron. XXX.—Each patient or his guarantor shall pay such weekly contribution as the House Committee may fix, but the Committee shall have power to remit, at their discretion, the whole or any part of such payment.

XXXI.—Except in cases of emergency every patient shall come provided with proper clothing and a change of linen.

XXXII.—All patients shall be discharged at the end of one month after admission, unless the Medical Committee or Practitioner in charge of the case certify to the House Committee that there is a probability of cure or considerable relief resulting from further treatment. No patient shall remain in the Hospital for more than two months without the special leave of the House Committee.

XXXIII.—Friends of patients may be admitted on such days and at such times as the House Committee shall appoint.

XXXIV.—Subject to such regulations as the Council may make, patients may be visited by any Clergyman or Minister whom they may desire to see.

#### NURSING STAFF.

XXXV.—The Matron and such nurses as may be required shall be appointed by the House Committee, acting after consultation with the Medical Committee.

XXXVI.—The salary of the Matron shall be fixed by the Council. The salaries of Assistant Nurses, Servants, and others shall be fixed by the House Committee.

#### ALTERATION OF RULES.

XXXVII.—No rule shall be altered, nor any new rule made, except at an Annual or Special General Meeting of Subscribers, and except by a majority of two-thirds of those present and voting on the question; and no motion for a new rule, or alteration of an existing rule, shall be brought forward at such Meeting unless notice thereof, in writing, shall have been delivered to the Council or Secretary at least fourteen clear days previous to the holding of the Meeting. The Secretary shall give due notice of any such motion to all Subscribers entitled to vote.
