



Greengate Hospital and Open-Air School. REPORT.

EIGHTEEN MONTHS ENDING JUNE 30th, 1938.

The Greengate Hospital and Open-Air School is established in one of the poorer districts of the City of Salford. The Hospital, which is in a narrow street (Garden Lane), comprises an Out-Patient Department for adults and children, and an In-Patient Department with forty beds for children suffering from rickets. A few cases of malnutrition and general debility which are likely to benefit from open-air treatment are also received. The School, which adjoins the Hospital, consists of a shed with the open side facing south, and a large playground, part of which is asphalted and part used for children's gardens. The ages of the children range from about two to nine years. They attend the Open-Air School daily, and in order that they shall not lose touch with their family, are sent home each week-end. This arrangement also has the great advantage of demonstrating the benefits of open-air life and good hygiene to the neighbourhood. One of the principal aims of the Hospital from its foundation has been to set an example of healthy life and to show the value of the open air, thus assisting the Public Health Service of the City of Salford

During the period under review the In-Patient Department has worked to its fullest capacity. Twenty-six new patients have been admitted from the waiting list in place of twenty-six discharged. The children live in the open air, have a generous diet, and are given medical treatment, and, in suitable cases, massage. Their progress in weight, height, and development is carefully watched and charted, and compared with the normal. It is found that not only do bony deformities and the stigmata of rickets disappear, but, before leaving, the children approximate to and sometimes even surpass the normal weight and height for their age.

The work of the School has continued summer and winter under strict open-air conditions, which are both health-giving and invigorating. The happiness, confidence, and initiative of the children are proof of their ready response to treatment. The curriculum, besides aiming at helping them, on leaving, to take their places in normal primary schools with children of their own age, is carefully planned to give them the best possible physical development. General and remedial exercises, rhythmic movement, games, and dancing, while strengthening weak muscles and assisting co-ordination of movement, play a prominent part in the correction of curvatures and postural defects.

The Out-Patient Department has carried on with four Out-Patient sessions a week. Here general medical cases, both adults and children, are treated, and the Department fills a real need in the treatment of the sick poor, catering especially for the non-insured class of patient. There have been 11,758 attendances during the period, and 1,303 new patients. The Massage Department has continued to be open three times a week and 1,474 treatments have been given, including both In-patients and Out-Patients, and much good work has been done.

Early in July the parents of the children attended at the school, so that they could see the children under the ordinary school routine; this also provided an opportunity of contact between the head teacher and the parents. An open day for friends and subscribers of the Hospital was also held in July, when the children gave an entertainment comprising dancing, drills, etc., at the school, and this entertainment was repeated later in the month for the parents, and members of the Blackfriars Fellowship.

Father Christmas personally attended at the Hospital on the date of the Children's Christmas Party; unfortunately owing to measles being prevalent in the district, it was felt advisable not to entertain guests on that day.

On May 12th, 1937, the children had a special party tea to celebrate the Coronation, and flags and decorations were kindly provided by Mr. Sutcliffe. Each child also had a Coronation Souvenir Programme thanks to the Philco and Television Corporation. The Salford Education Committee provided a beaker for each child. The residents of Durham Street and Paradise showed their appreciation of the Hospital by collecting £36 15s. 6d. towards the Hospital Funds.

In May 1938, the children again celebrated a Royal event, on the date of the King's visit to Salford.

A Linen Guild has been inaugurated by the House Committee. It is now in its initial stages, but it is hoped that it will eventually prove of great benefit to the Hospital. The suggested subscription is 5/- per annum, or any sum from 1/- to 2/6 and 2 articles yearly, and the first officers are Mrs. S. H. Hampson (Chairman), Mrs. C. T. Thompson (Secretary), and Mrs. Parkinson (Treasurer).


At midsummer last year, and again this year, thanks to the generosity of the Committee of Management of the Salford Children's Holiday Camp, the children had a very happy time at Prestatyn. This break at the sea is very much looked forward to by the children, quite apart from the health benefit.

For convenience in the audit, the date of the accounts has been altered from December 31st to June 30th. In making the change-over the present accounts necessarily cover an eighteen months period, and it is therefore not possible to compare them with those of the previous year, as subscriptions and voluntary grants are included as at the time of payment.

The attention of subscribers is drawn to the enclosed form whereby, on promising to subscribe for a period of seven years, the Income Tax payable on the amount of the subscription can be reclaimed for the benefit of the Hospital.






