ANNUAL REPORT

YEAR ENDING JUNE 30th, 1939.

A hospital for small children stands or falls on its health record, and all, therefore, that need be done to estimate the value of this work, is to look at the photographs facing page nine. These striking improvements, obtained by a healthy open-air routine, good plain food, and gentle massage, speak for themselves. In many cases, not only do the signs and stigmata of rickets disappear, but our cures surpass the normal heights and weights for their ages. Add to this the striking fact that during the past year there has been only one case of infectious illness (passed to nobody else) and two queries, and it must be agreed that our method works. The freedom from infection is the more remarkable as these little children return to sleep in their own homes every week-end; this is considered of great importance, as they act the part of unconscious missionaries of hygiene and cleanliness. Their success is due largely to the influence of our Matron who has been with us for more than twenty years. She is well-known in Greengate, and where she is known she is loved.

We are proud also of our open-air school, in charge of a fully certificated teacher, where since January the storm-shutters have never been lowered, which was visited during the winter by His Majesty's Inspector. His report that the children were "making happy progress like normal children" and were "free in action and speech and very responsive," is in the true Greengate tradition. But he made one criticism, a very serious one, as music is of such vital importance in helping the handicapped little limbs to develop; he complained that the piano is a very inferior one and in a bad condition. This, unfortunately, is not

in our power to remedy; we have produced an excellent school, perhaps someone else could produce a piano? It need not be excellent to be a considerable improvement on ours.

The children are again, through the kindness of the Committee of Management of the Salford Children's Holiday Camp, enjoying a summer holiday at Prestatyn.

This year it is impossible to give a full report of any organisation without reference to "a possible emergency." If this should occur, accommodation for all the children and some of the staff will be provided in a country house with excellent cellars which have been thoroughly prepared.* Transport has been arranged, and the consent of each mother separately obtained. Their confidence in us is doubtless helped by the visits that they are encouraged to pay to the school.

Our forty beds for children aged two to nine, suffering from rickets and kindred ailments, have been full all the year, and as we are in one of the poorest districts of Salford, our out-patient department, which caters for adults and children (of the non-insured classes) has been well-attended by general medical cases. It has been open for 4 sessions a week and 6,752 attendances and 758 new patients have been recorded. The massage department has had 3 sessions weekly with a total attendance of 1,008.

In May, 1938, the Hospital inaugurated a Linen Guild, with Mrs. S. H. Hampson as Chairman, Mrs. C. T. Thompson, Hon. Secretary; and Mrs. E. M. Parkinson, Hon. Treasurer. Although the Guild has only been in existence for a short time it has already proved its value to the Hospital.

In December, Mrs. Edward Sutcliffe generously gave an American Tea, as a result of which Linen to the value of £20 was contributed to the Guild.

* The children were transferred here on September 1st, and have settled down well.

We record with very deep regret the death of two of our friends—Mrs. Frank Thompson and Doctor Alfred Brown.

Mrs. Thompson first undertook Committee work at the Hospital in 1923. Although for the past few years, for health reasons, she had been unable personally to visit the Hospital, she was always ready to help in any way possible. Her love for the children, and keen interest in details—however seemingly small—were an encouragement and help to those at Greengate.

Doctor Brown was one of the pioneers of the Hospital, and had watched it grow from its first stages of a Salford Medical Mission (a combination of religious and medical services) to the present day Institution. He, with Doctor Hamill, first began voluntary work at Greengate in 1889, and they were the first Honorary Medical Officers. Doctor Brown served as Chairman

from 1915 to 1924, and although he left the north of England a few years ago, he continued to be very keenly interested in the workings and welfare of the Institution.

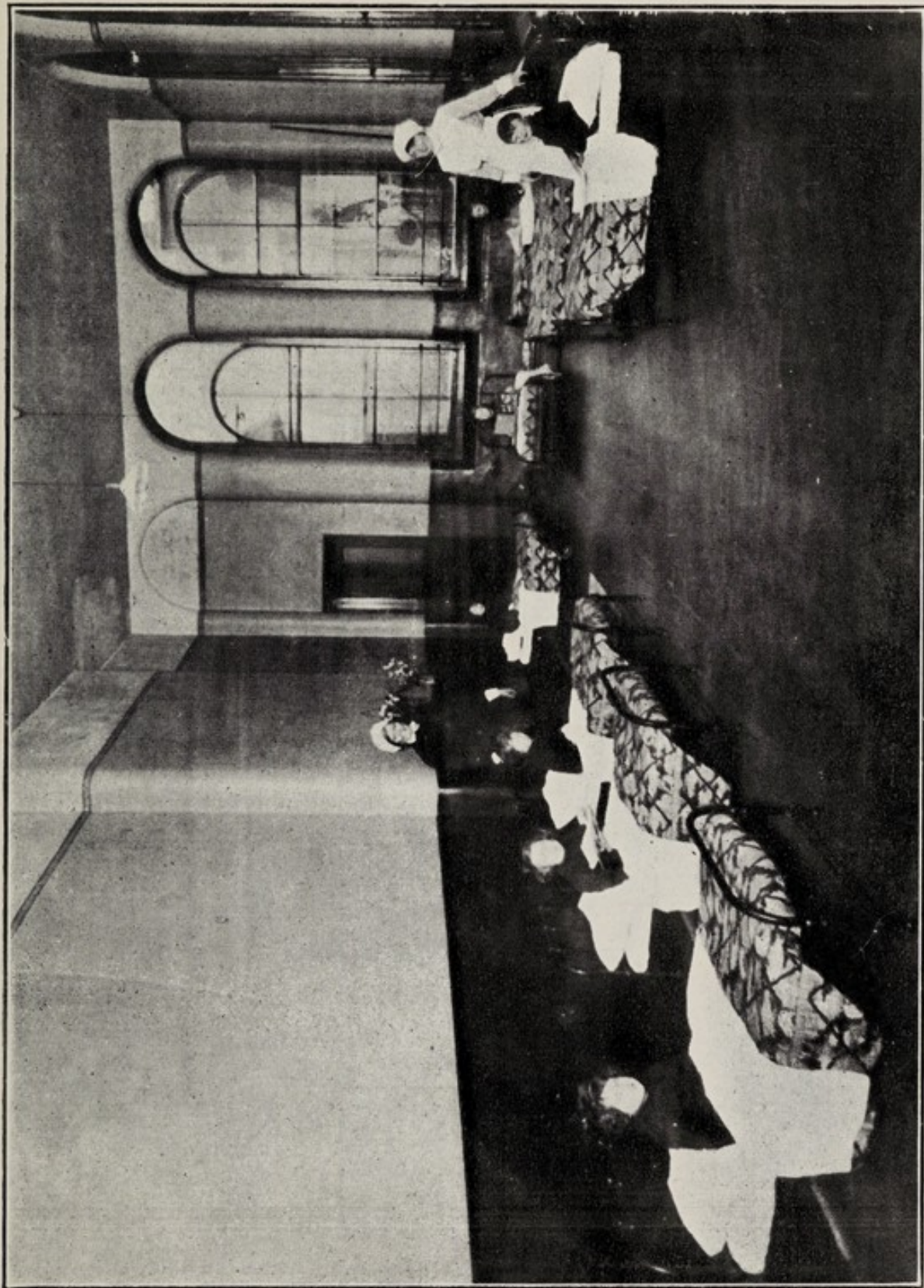
