



ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1927.

THE Committee of Management have pleasure in presenting the Eighth Annual Report and Statement of Accounts. The Accounts appear in full detail in the latter part of this booklet, but the following information with regard to Hospital matters during the past year will, no doubt, be of interest to subscribers and the general public.

The Admissions for 1927 were slightly less than the previous twelve months, being 484 (as against 491). Of the total of 484, 387 were patients in the Free Wards (as against 370 in 1926) and 97 were received in the Private Wards (121 the previous year). It will thus be seen that while there was an increase in the number of those admitted to the Free Wards of 17, there was a decrease of 24 in Paying Patients.

The Admissions into the Free Wards, which consist of 5 beds in the Men's Ward, 7 in the Women's Ward, and 6 in the Children's Ward, were as follows:—

The demand for these Paying Beds was not so great last year as in 1926, the decrease in the Males being particularly marked. There was a similar drop in 1924, and it is therefore only reasonable to anticipate that these fluctuations will periodically take place.

The following is the Record of Admissions since the Hospital was established:—

The daily average number of beds occupied in 1927 was 20.

The above figures include both Free and Paying Patients. The expenses of the X Ray Department are excluded from the calculations.

The following report of the work done in the **X** Ray Room during the past year proves this Department to be a most valuable adjunct to the Hospital. Of the total of 525 cases mentioned in the report 402 were Free Patients (including Hospital cases).

Of the Treatment cases, 85 treatments were administered to 25 patients of which 10 were cured, 11 improved, and 4 remained unaffected. Of the cases of examination of the digestive tract, 11 were recommended for operative treatment. Of these, ten were operated upon in this Hospital, and one at Leicester. Of the former, nine were cured and one died. Of the case operated upon at Leicester the result has not been reported.

The following yearly Record of Cases dealt with in this Department may help us to realize what a great boon this Section of the Hospital has been to the town and district

The increasing importance of X Ray work is very apparent even to the ordinary individual. There have been many changes and improvements in the Apparatus in the last few years and many thousands of pounds have been spent by hospitals up and down the country in order to keep as up-to-date as possible in this respect. In an endeavour to extend the usefulness of this Department at our Institution, the Committee has, after careful consideration, authorised the purchase of a new Radiographic Outfit at a cost of £250 and it is confidently hoped that the results will justify this expenditure.

We desire to express to Dr. Dixon the gratitude of the Committee and the public generally for the great amount of honorary work performed by him in this Department. The very intelligent help given throughout the year by Sister Slough should also be mentioned.

The valuable services rendered to the Institution by the Medical Staff (which comprises the the Doctors practising in the town of Melton) call for the best thanks of the supporters of the Hospital. The Analysis of Cases which appears later on in this booklet will give some idea of the character and extent of the honorary work accomplished by the Medical Staff, and those who have been under their care can no doubt give ample testimony to the attention and skill that has been devoted to this work. We must also express our gratitude to the Specialists from London and elsewhere who have periodically during the past year given the benefit

of their advice and skill in several cases in the Free Wards. The **Matron** (Miss E. Gibson) and **Nursing Staff** have proved equal to the calls made upon them and we desire to express the satisfaction of the Committee at the way in which they have so ably supplemented the work of the Doctors. Many expressions of appreciation, in writing and otherwise, have been received testifying to the care and consideration with which patients have been treated.

The House Committee have again carried out their duties in a most satisfactory way and have co-operated whole-heartedly in the efforts made by all those responsible for the management of the Hospital to maintain the efficiency of the Institution without any unnecessary expenditure. We are pleased to have Mr. Barnes (the Chairman of this Committee) back again with us after his enjoyable trip to the Antipodes, and we are also gratified to observe that his trip abroad has not had the effect of lessening his keen interest in Hospital matters. Miss Hack, in the position of Hon. Sec. to the House Committee, has rendered much valuable help over a period of six years and we trust that her approaching marriage will not have the effect of depriving the Institution of her services.

Turning to the financial side, the Maintenance **Account** is in a flourishing condition. The total amount paid into this Fund in the course of the year has, in addition to furnishing the ordinary maintenance expenses, been sufficient to provide the cost of building the new Staff Recreation Room. We also have in hand sufficient to pay for the new Apparatus for the X Ray Department, and a new Operating Table. The principal contributing factor to this happy state of affairs was the sum (£650) raised for the Hospital in connection with the Craven Lodge Ball and Horse Competition in March last. Help of this magnitude is most encouraging to those responsible for carrying on the Institution, and it has certainly enabled us to pay our way and at the same time make some very necessary improvements. We take this opportunity of expressing the Committee's gratitude to the hunting people of the district for assisting the Hospital in this handsome manner.

It is very satisfactory to observe a reduction in some of the items of expenditure. We know that the **Finance Committee** (under the Chairmanship of Mr. S. C. Hobson) are keenly alive to the necessity for "cutting down" wherever it is possible without lessening the standard of the work accomplished in the Institution.

The Melton Amateur Dramatic Society signified its revival by giving two performances of "Aren't We All?" on November 25th and 26th on behalf of the Hospital. The performances were most enjoyable, well attended, and the net proceeds amounted to £109. We are much indebted to all those connected in any way with the effort, and should like to specially mention Mrs. Jack Hobson (the Producer) Mr. P. D. Prior (Stage Manager, etc.), and Mr. Fred Wright.

The Third Annual Ball and the Second Annual Children's Fancy Dress Dance passed off quite successfully, the attendance at the Children's Dance being much larger than the previous year. The sum of £100 was again handed over to the Maintenance Fund and the Ball Committee (especially the indefatigable Hon. Secretaries, Messrs. A. L. Sleath and L. Hewes) are to be congratulated on the result of their efforts. We must not forget to thank the Ladies who are responsible for the Refreshment Department—quite an outstanding feature of these social gatherings

In order to provide the cost of furnishing the new Recreation Room for the Hospital Staff, a Garden Party in the Hospital Grounds was arranged for Thursday, August 18th. Unfortunately, however, persistent rain fell in the morning and it was decided to postpone the effort until Saturday. However, the weather on that day was just as bad as Thursday, and at ten o'clock on Saturday morning the Committee were in a quandary as to whether they should risk a further postponement or abandon the affair altogether. However, Mr. F. H. Brewitt (on behalf of Messrs. T. W. Rust & Co.) solved the problem by offering us the use of the Canteen at the Wyvern Mills. This offer was gratefully accepted and a speedy transfer made. Although the room was very congested, especially during the Dance, everybody made the best of it and the net proceeds amounted to £113—quite a satisfactory result in view of the exceptional circumstances. It would be invidious to mention names, and we therefore wish to take this opportunity of thanking all who by gifts, or personal service, assisted in any way. We cannot, however, let the occasion pass without expressing our appreciation of the manner in which Messrs. Rust & Co. and their Employees promptly came forward and helped us out of a difficulty.

The second Annual Pound Day was held on Thursday, October 20th, the arrangements being, as hitherto, carried out by the Lady Representatives in conjunction with the Matron. The gifts were received by the latter at the Hospital in the afternoon, and a temporary Receiving Depôt

in the Market Place was also open on that day and on the previous Tuesday. The total value of the goods brought in was quite equal to that of the previous year, and the gifts in money amounted to £23 19s. 6d. (£15 18s. 6d. in 1926). The Pound Day has without doubt established itself as a yearly event.

The Lady Representatives in Melton and the rural parishes collected in subscriptions or raised by means of various social efforts a total sum of over £500. In addition to this these ladies are ever to the fore in rendering assistance in connection with other efforts made on behalf of the Institution, and the work done by them in the last 7 years has certainly been of great assistance to the Committee in their efforts to keep the finances of the Hospital in a sound condition.

During the past year the sum of £784 was paid into the Maintenance Fund in respect of Contributions and Grants from Employees' Hospital Funds (as against £742 in 1926 and £849 in 1925). The largest amount (£375) came from the Melton Saturday Hospital Society. This amount was £25 less than 1926, but this is explained by the fact that the Society had not so much money to allocate, their total receipts being £51 less than the previous year. Further, they had a new expenditure to meet, £33 12s. Doctors' fees for operations for Tonsils and Adenoids performed at our Hospital. Owing to fluctuations in trade the income of this Society is bound to vary from year to year, but there is every reason for the expectation that it will be the means of providing substantial regular financial support for this and other similar Institutions for years to come. The payment by the Society of the Tonsils Operation fees has certainly had the effect of removing some dissatisfaction which existed among the members.

The Holwell Works Workmen and Staff Hospital Fund contributed £300 to our Maintenance Fund in respect of 1927 (as against £220 in 1926, the "Strike" year, and £365 in 1925). We are most grateful to the Committee and subscribers to this Fund for this very substantial grant towards the upkeep of the Hospital.

The L.M. & S. Railway Servants' Hospital Fund contributed £92 is. 6d. last year, made up of £47 19s. 6d. grants in respect of members or dependents who have been in-patients, £42 a special annual grant and £2 2s. the operation fee in a Tonsils case in the early part of

the year (this fee being paid over to the Doctor). We have received from this Fund in the last four years a sum of nearly £400 and the progress this organization has made is most satisfactory, from the Hospital point of view at any rate, and it also confers many advantages on its members. As most of the latter are aware, the Secretary of the Fund has stated that they have ceased the practice of paying the Tonsils Operation fee direct to the Institution, and the member himself must pay the fee to the Doctor and then claim from the Fund the appropriate allowance.

The Approved Societies contributed £145 to our Maintenance Fund (an increase of £35 over the previous twelve months), being grants in respect of their members who were in-patients during the year. The Prudential Approved Societies sent £74. The Manchester Unity State Insurance Lodge (Melton Mowbray) £26. The United Women's Insurance Society £16. The National Amalgamated Approved Society £12 and the National Deposit Friendly Society £11. It is very gratifying to note the increase in the total amount received by these grants and we hope that the other Friendly Societies will find themselves in a position to follow the lead given by those mentioned above and institute similar schemes of rendering financial assistance to the Voluntary Hospitals serving their members.

The Church, Chapel and School Collections amounted to nearly £100. This is slightly less than the previous year, but nevertheless it is a very useful sum. We desire once more to express our appreciation of the trouble taken by the representatives of the religious bodies and the School Staffs in organising these collections.

The amount (£60) raised by The Hospital Football Charity Cup Competition last winter was easily a record. It was really a marvellous achievement, especially in view of the "slump" in local football in recent years. We congratulate and at the same time express our gratitude:

Mr. W. Hewes (the Chairman), Mr. J. N. Ryder (the Hon. Secretary) and the other gentlemen who form the Committee responsible for the Competition, and also the Clubs participating.

The Hospital Cricket Cup Competition was quite a success last season, the fifth of its career, and the Hospital finances once more received the sum of £25 from this Competition. The matches in this Competition arouse great interest in cricket circles in Melton and the surrounding villages and the final match in Egerton Park is looked upon

by many as the most enjoyable local sporting event of the summer months. It is pleasing to observe that Messrs. F. H. Brock (as Chairman of the Committee) and Mr. J. W. Hubbard (as Hon. Sec.) are still closely associated with the effort and we assure them that the services rendered by them and their colleagues on the Competition Committee are sincerely appreciated.

The Annual Fete by the people of Ashby Folville and Barsby on behalf of the local Hospitals was the means of benefitting the Institution financially to the extent of £45. We are very grateful to Mrs. Smith-Carington and other friends for the very substantial and regular financial assistance given to our Hospital by the two parishes mentioned ever since we opened our doors.

The New Year's Eve Social arranged by the Asfordby Hill Entertainments Committee which produced £40 for the Hospital Maintenance Fund was a striking example of what weekly wage earners can do in the way of money raising when they put their shoulders to the wheel. This record will take a lot of beating, but we do not think our Asfordby Hill friends will be content to rest on their laurels.

Another outstanding contribution was the sum of £30 from the Fete organised by the **Great Dalby Girls' Club** in June. We are informed that the girls worked very hard to ensure success and they deserve our congratulations on the result.

An exceedingly useful grant (£80) was received from **The Ministry of Pensions** in respect of the treatment and maintenance of an ex-soldier who was an in-patient of our Hospital for 9 months of last year suffering from the effects of war injuries

The Gifts in Kind have been fairly numerous. The collections of fruit and vegetables from the Harvest Festivals were very useful. The Committee would be very grateful for vegetables of the "keeping" variety, such as Potatoes, etc., a large quantity of which is required during the winter. The Staff and Pupils of the County Grammar School once more carried out a Collection of Eggs on behalt of this and similar Institutions, and as a result 5,000 eggs were handed over to this Hospital. We tender our thanks to all who contributed eggs or helped in any way with the collection.

Last year the Committee, on the suggestion of Mrs. Allport, inaugurated a collection of **Tinfoil**, the object of course being, when a sufficient quantity has accumulated, to sell the same on behalf of our funds. The Committee hopes to be in a position to send off the first load in two or three months time, so it is hoped therefore that collectors will send their Tinfoil to the Hospital before the end of April.

We think it right that mention should be made of the fact that we are indebted to Col. J. N. Price Wood (the tenant of the Stables forming part of the Hospital Estate) for generously defraying out of his own pocket for a number of years the cost of various repairs for which the Hospital Committee as Landlords were legally liable. The Committee desire to express to Col. Price Wood their appreciation of his action in relieving the funds of the Institution of this expense

The Religious Services which are held at the Hos pital on Sundays, when circumstances permit, are much appreciated by the Patients and Staff. These devotional gatherings are conducted in turn by representatives of the Church of England and the Free Churches.

Mrs. Allport (the President of the Hospital) still maintains the keenest interest in the Institution and frequently makes the long journey from her home in the south of England in order to attend meetings here of the Hospital Committee. She is, we regret to say, suffering from a chill just at the present time, but we earnestly hope she will be well enough to come to Melton for the Annual Meeting.

The only additions to the Extension Fund in the course of the year have been the Dividends on the amount invested in War Stock, Bank Interest and the contents of the Collecting Box in the Hospital Porch. No contributions to the Endowment Fund were actually received in 1927, but the Committee have been informed that a legacy of £500 was left to the Institution by the Will of the late Mr. T. G. Snodin, of Melton Mowbray. In accordance with the wish of the Executors of the Deceased, this amount, when paid, will be added to the Endowment Fund.

Arising out of a suggestion that an immediate start should be made with the Extension Scheme, a discussion took place at a meeting of the General Committee in June last and following this a report was asked for and received from the Hospital Medical Staff specifying in order of importance the necessity for increased accommodation for surgical, medical, maternity cases, etc. The first step recommended by the Medical Staff is that two new Free "Complete" Wards, one for male adults and one for female adults, of 8 beds each, capable of extension, be constructed—to be part of a larger scheme. The General Committee appointed a special Sub-Committee to fully consider the Report and submit their views thereon to a special meeting of the General Committee. The Sub-Committee, before coming to a decision, are obtaining certain necessary information from other Hospitals, and it does not, at the present moment, appear possible for the General Committee to receive and consider the Sub-Committee's report before the Annual Meeting.

In conclusion, we wish to express the sincere thanks of the Committee to the Subscribers and public generally for the manner in which the Institution has been supported during the eight years of its existence, and, knowing the valuable work that has been accomplished during that period, we feel confident that, in connection with the future maintenance and in any step that the Committee decide to take for the improvement and extension of the Hospital, we shall receive your encouragement and assistance.

Hospital Charges for Paying Patients.

Large Private Ward £8 8s. per week, or £1 5s. per day for periods less than a week.

Small Private Ward £5 5s. per week, or 15s. per day.

Semi-Private Wards (3 beds in each Ward) £3 13s. 6d. per week, or 10/6 per day.

Charge for use of Operating Theatre:—

Major Cases £1 1s.; Minor Cases 10/6.

- Note.—The above Fees include accommodation, nursing by Hospital Staff, and maintenance. In exceptional cases requiring individual attention an extra charge will be made for a special nurse, if certified as necessary by the medical man in attendance. Special Dressings are charged extra.
- The fees mentioned above do not include Surgeon's and Doctor's Fees, which are a matter for arrangement between doctor and patient and should be paid direct.
- The Hospital Charges should be paid to the Matron on Friday evening in each week or on the day of discharge if same is not a Friday.
- An account of the fees due will be handed to the patient by the Matron on Friday morning, or on the morning of the day of discharge.
- Forms of application for admission to the Private and Semi-Private Wards can be obtained from the Hospital Secretary or the Matron.

The Private Wards Committee meets at Bank Chambers each Saturday morning to receive the list of Patients admitted into the Private and Semi-Private Wards during the previous seven days, and this Committee deals with any question that may arise as to whether a patient is to be admitted into the free or paying part of the Institution.

COLLECTION OF TINFOIL, Etc.

On behalf of the Hospital Funds.

For the information of collectors, the following is a list of what is required: Foil from cigarettes and chocolates, tobacco wrappings, old toy soldiers, lead; tooth paste, toilet cream, and paint tubes of all kinds; lead capsules from wine, spirit and sauce bottles (not metal crowns), lead piping, type, disc or buttons, lead from tea chests and broken pieces of lead.

Tinfoil (silver paper) should be kept separate. Aluminium foil should be excluded, because this, if mixed with tinfoil, renders the tinfoil almost valueless when melted down. It can be easily distinguished from tinfoil, being lighter in weight, more rigid, and tears or crumples with a rending or crackling sound.

The tinfoil, &c., should be delivered at the Hospital and handed to the Porter
