



ANNUAL REPORT

FOR 1928.

THE Committee of Management have pleasure in presenting the Ninth Annual Report and Statement of Accounts. The accounts, which appear in the second part of this booklet, speak for themselves, but the following details and remarks with regard to the work of the Hospital, and events connected with the Institution, since the date of the last Report, may be of interest to subscribers and supporters generally.

The figures of admissions for 1928 shew a marked increase over the previous year, being 548 (as against 484). Of the total of 548, 422 were patients in the Free Wards (as against 387 in 1927) and 126 were received as Paying Patients (97 the previous twelve months). It will be noticed, therefore, that there was an increase of 35 in the number of Admissions to the Free Wards, and an increase of 29 paying patients.

The Admissions into the Free Wards (which consist of 5 beds in the Men's Ward, 7 in the Women's Ward, and 6 in the Children's Ward) were as follows:—

These paying beds are no doubt a great boon to a considerable section of the Hospital's supporters in the town and district, besides furnishing about a quarter of the income required for the maintenance. The Private Wards Committee, by means of its weekly meetings, has kept in touch with all admissions to this section of the Hospital. Several "Borderline" cases have been submitted to them for consideration and their decisions appear to have given general satisfaction.

The developments made in the X-Ray Department during the past year are manifest from the following interesting report by Dr. Dixon.

RADIOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT. REPORT-1928.

During the year a new apparatus was installed at the cost of some £250, which has brought the plant well up to date. The new apparatus has enabled the Radiologist to take radiograms at a speed ten times greater than with the old machine.

A new German tube of the most up-to-date design, whose "life" will be very much longer than that of the old tubes, has also been added at the cost of nearly £50.

The Department is now most efficiently equipped, and can do the very best work.

The total number of cases which passed through this department for examination or treatment was 633.

Of these 633 cases, 470 were free, making no payment.

Treatments.—Most of these were cases of skin disease, and 38 persons in all received treatment, 92 actual applications being made Of these 20 were cured, 15 relieved, and 3 remained in statu quo.

The increased number of cases treated intensified the difficulties this department has to contend with in lack of space in the X-Ray Room, lack of a waiting room, of dressing rooms and of a convenient and healthy Dark room.

Sister Slough continued to give the most efficient and devoted services.

We should like once more to pay tribute to the untiring efforts put forth by Dr. Dixon at all times in order to make the investigations, etc., of this section of the Institution as thorough as possible despite the handicaps under which the Department is carried on. As will be observed from the above Report, three-fourths of the cases last year were entirely gratis—no payment in respect of these being made either to the Hospital or to the Radiologist.

The Analysis of Cases set out in another part of this booklet affords ample evidence of the extremely valuable services rendered to the Institution, and the public generally, by the Honorary Medical Staff. We consider that a town of this size is very fortunate in having medical practitioners of such outstanding ability in our midst. It will be noticed that last year an increased number of very difficult operations have been performed with successful results in the great majority of cases. We are also greatly indebted to the Specialists from London and elsewhere who have visited the Hospital several times during the year, and given without charge invaluable help in the way of advice and surgical skill in connection with several cases in the Free Wards.

We are still fortunate in having as our Matron Miss E. Gibson. She has now been with us 9 years, and her capabilities are therefore well known in the town and district. Her task has been by no means a light one during the past twelve months in view of the increase in patients and illness amongst the Nursing Staff, but she has surmounted difficulties with credit to herself and the Institution. The Matron has been most ably supplemented in her efforts by the remainder of the Nursing Staff, who have carried out their duties in a thorough and conscientious manner. We continually receive letters from patients expressing appreciation of the treatment received by them in the Hospital.

Under the Chairmanship of Mr. W. Barnes, the House Committee have again satisfactorily carried out the duties that have fallen to their lot, although on occasions only a small number of members have been present at the meetings. Mrs. G. M. Robinson, in the position of Hon. Sec. to this Sub-Committee, continues to render valuable help.

With regard to matters financial, the Accounts shew that the Institution is still being steadily supported by all Sections of the community, with the result that the **Finance** Committee (through Mr. S. C. Hobson, Chairman) are once more able to shew a balance on the right side. The Suspense Account carried forward from last year enabled us, as will be seen from Dr. Dixon's report, to provide more up-to-date Apparatus for the X-Ray Department, and also a new Operating Table of the very latest pattern. There is still a balance of £82 on this Suspense Account, which the Committee have earmarked for a Shadowless Light for the Operating Theatre.

It is comforting to note that notwithstanding the increased number of Admissions the ordinary expenditure has not increased.

A glance at the Maintenance Account will shew that a very useful sum, over £500, has been received from the **Lady Representatives** in respect of subscriptions collected in Melton, and amounts collected or raised by Fetês and other Social Gatherings in the rural parishes. The help so willingly rendered by these ladies in so many ways is a source of much gratification and encouragement to those responsible for the upkeep of the Hospital.

We have received during the year in respect of Contributions and Grants from Employees' Hospital Funds a sum of £772 (as compared with £784 in 1927). The Melton Saturday Hospital Society had an income slightly less than the previous year, and consequently had not so much money for allocation. Our Hospital received the sum of £370 (£5 less than in 1927). Owing to this Society being practically dependent on industrial conditions its receipts are bound to fluctuate, but it is very satisfactory to observe that its income the last three years has averaged £760, striking testimony in itself to the valuable assistance given by weekly wage earners to this and kindred Institutions. Another interesting fact that should be mentioned is that Messrs. T. W. Rust & Co.'s employees contributed to the Society during 1928 a record sum of £254.

The Holwell Works Workmen and Staff Hospital Fund contributed to our Funds a sum of £314 in respect of last year (as against £300 for the previous twelve months). We take this opportunity of expressing to the Committee and Subscribers to this Fund the gratitude of the Hospital Committee for the substantial financial support accorded year by year to the Institution since it was first opened.

£74 10s. 0d. was received from The L.M. & S. Railway Servants' Hospital Fund last year (£92 in 1927) made up of £32 10s. 0d. grants in respect of members or depen-

dents who were in-patients during the twelve months, and £42 a special annual grant. The usefulness of this organisation, both to its members and to Institutions like our own, is becoming increasingly apparent as time goes on.

Our Maintenance Fund benefitted to the extent of £159 by contributions from the Approved Societies (an increase of £14 over 1927) being grants in respect of members who were in-patients during the year. Of the £159, £88 was received from the Prudential Approved Societies, £46 from the National Deposit Friendly Society, £16 from the National Amalgamated Approved Society, and £7 from the Manchester Unity State Insurance Lodge (Melton Mowbray). These grants are very welcome, and it is very pleasing to note that the total amount received from this source is steadily increasing.

The Fete held in the Hospital Grounds and Field on June 28th was the means of raising £300 for the Maintenance Fund. It was rather disappointing for the second year in succession to find that we had again to contend with unfavourable weather. However, this time the rain ceased after tea, and we were able to carry out practically the whole of the evening programme. A large crowd assembled during the latter part of the proceedings, thus proving once more that these Fêtes are very popular with the general public. We desire to take this opportunity of thanking all those ladies and gentlemen who by gifts or personal service assisted in any way in connection with the effort.

The Fourth Annual Ball and Third Annual Children's Fancy Dress Ball were quite as successful as their predecessors. Both events are now looked upon as established local functions, and in addition to providing enjoyment for the followers of the terpsichorean art, of all ages, they are also the means of raising a yearly sum of £100 for the Hospital exchequer. We tender our best thanks to the Ball Committee (particularly to the ladies responsible for the Refreshment Department) and wish to specially mention the untiring efforts of the Hon. Secs. (Messrs. A. L. Sleath and L. Hewes).

Two very useful amounts were received in the early part of the year, one being the sum of £50 9s. 0d. from Mrs. Vaughan, being part proceeds of a Dance at Craven Lodge, and the other £50 from the Melton Hunt Ball Committee. We much appreciate the action of the promoters in benefitting the local Institution in this way.

The Hospital Football Charity Cup Competition sent us £30 in respect of last season, quite a satisfactory amount

in view of the weather conditions that prevailed at some of the matches, and the continued lack of interest in local football. We cannot but admire the tenacity of the Competition Committee and its Chairman (Mr. W. Hewes) and are pleased to note that Mr. Alec Townend has consented to fill the position of Hon Secretary, which became vacant through the departure of Mr. J. N. Ryder from the town.

The Hospital Cricket Cup Competition still flourishes, and once more produced £25 for our Maintenance Fund. The final match in Egerton Park on the Tuesday following August Bank Holiday causes as much interest in the town and district as an "England v. Australia Test Match," and it is quite the "tit-bit" of the season in local cricket circles. We congratulate the Competition Committee on the results achieved by this tourney since its formation six years ago, and we are sure Mr. F. H. Brock (the Chairman) feels amply repaid now for his efforts in putting the Competition on its feet. Mr. J. W. Hubbard has been succeeded in the office of Hon. Secretary by another cricket enthusiast, Mr. J. W. Raven, and we feel confident that the latter will do all that lies in his power to ensure success.

A sum of £25 was received from the Melton Amateur Operatic Society during the year, and for this amount we are very grateful.

The Church, Chapel, and School Collections amounted to nearly £100 (practically the same as in 1927). We desire to express our thanks to the representatives of the various religious bodies, and to the school staffs, for the trouble

taken by them in organizing these collections.

The Third Annual Pound Day was held on Tuesday, October 30th, the arrangements being as usual in the hands of the Matron and Lady Representatives. The gifts were received by the former at the Hospital in the afternoon and by the ladies at a Temporary Receiving Depôt in Sherrard Street. The total value of the goods received was about equal to that of the previous year. The gifts in money amounted to £18 12s. 3d. (£23 19s. 6d. in 1927).

The Committee take this opportunity of expressing thanks to the donors of **Gifts in Kind**, which have again been fairly numerous. The fruit, vegetables, etc., from the Harvest Festivals, especially the potatoes, were very useful.

The Staff and Pupils of the County Grammar School again carried out a Collection of Eggs on behalf of this and other local Hospitals. As the result, 3,900 eggs were received at our Institution. We are grateful to all who contributed eggs or assisted in any way with the collection,

The Collection of Tinfoil, etc. (for sale on behalf of the Hospital Funds) now seems to have been put on a proper basis, and during the year a sum of £18 was realised. Mrs. W. Barnes and Mr. S. W. Ennals have worked very energetically in connection with the organisation of the collection, and we desire to put on record the Committee's sincere appreciation of their efforts.

Mrs. Allport (our President) still keeps the Hospital prominently in her thoughts, as is plainly evident by her many journeys from the South of England to attend meetings at Melton, and her constant enquiries concerning the Institution.

A very forward step has been taken in connection with the Extension Scheme since the last Annual Report was issued. Twelve months or so ago a special Sub-Committee was appointed to obtain expert advice and information with reference to building the proposed extension and the cost of In July last this Sub-Committee submitted their report to the General Committee, and stated that they had consulted Mr. Leslie Moore, a London architect with considerable experience in building Hospitals, and that this gentleman had submitted plans for a complete new Hospital to be built in sections and to be erected near to and connected with the present building (which would then be used for administrative purposes). The first section of the Extension was then estimated to cost £12,000, and the General Committee decided that this section should be proceeded with when the sum of £9,000 had been collected for the purpose, and a special Committee was appointed to organise the Appeal.

The following month, Dr. Dixon informed the Committee that an anonymous donor had promised to give £6,000 for the Extension Fund, on condition that the Committee raised a similar amount, and start building the first section at the earliest possible date, the primary object of course being to secure an immediate start of the extension. The Committee gratefully accepted this magnificent gift, and a resolution was passed to the effect that the first part of the Extension be proceeded with without delay. A special Sub-Committee, called the Extension Buildings Committee, was appointed, and this Sub-Committee recently met the Architect and discussed the details, etc., of the first section of the Extension. As the result of certain alterations in the plans of this section the estimate for this is now about £14,000.

A special Extension Appeal Committee was also appointed, and a printed Appeal issued in December last,

The Appeal Committee have not yet submitted to the General Committee the result of the Appeal as they state they are still engaged in obtaining donations, and do not consider it advisable at the present time to give their report. We would strongly urge all supporters of the Hospital in the town and district to send in their donations to the Extension Fund as early as possible, and we would take the liberty of using the slogan of the Appeal Committee—No donation is too small—No donation is too large—Your Hospital needs Your help.

We quite foresee that in view of the forthcoming extension of the Institution the next few years will bring along much more work, and naturally some difficulties, for those responsible for carrying on the Hospital, but, encouraged by our experience of the past nine years, we feel that we can count on the generous support of the people of Melton and the rural parishes in the forward strides we are taking for the benefit of the town and district in this and future generations.

Hospital Charges for Paying Patients.

Large Private Ward £8 8s. per week, or £1 5s. per day for periods less than a week.

Small Private Ward £5 5s. per week, or 15s. per day.

Semi-Private Wards (3 beds in each Ward), £3 13 6d. per week, or 10/6 per day.

Paying Patients in Children's Ward 7/6 per day.

Charge for use of Operating Theatre:—

Major Cases £1 ls.; Minor Cases 10/6.

- Note.—The above Fees include accommodation, nursing by Hospital Staff, and maintenance. In exceptional cases requiring individual attention an extra charge will be made for a special nurse, if certified as necessary by the medical man in attendance. Special Dressings are charged extra.
- The fees mentioned above do not include Surgeon's and Doctor's Fees, which are a matter for arrangement between doctor and patient and should be paid direct.
- The Hospital Charges should be paid to the Matron on Friday evening in each week or on the day of discharge if same is not a Friday.
- An account of the fees due will be handed to the patient by the Matron on Friday morning, or on the morning of the day of discharge.
- Forms of application for admission to the Private and Semi-Private Wards can be obtained from the Hospital Secretary or the Matron.

The PRIVATE WARDS COMMITTEE meets at Bank Chambers each Saturday morning to receive the list of Patients admitted into the Private and Semi-Private Wards during the previous seven days, and this Committee deals with any question that may arise as to whether a patient is to be admitted into the free or paying part of the Institution,

COLLECTION OF TINFOIL, Etc.

On behalf of the Hospital Funds.

For the information of Collectors, the following is a list of what is required: Foil from cigarettes and chocolates, tobacco wrappings, old toy soldiers, lead; tooth paste, toilet cream, and paint tubes of all kinds; lead capsules from wine, spirit and sauce bottles (not metal crowns), lead piping, type, disc or buttons, lead from tea chests and broken pieces of lead.

Tinfoil (silver paper) should be kept separate. Aluminium foil should be excluded, because this, if mixed with tinfoil, renders the tinfoil almost valueless when melted down. It can be easily distinguished from tinfoil, being lighter in weight, more rigid, and tears or crumples with a rending or crackling sound.

The tinfoil, &c., should be delivered at the Hospital and handed to the Porter.
