ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

Patients are required to contribute in accordance with their means towards the cost of their maintenance. The amount of a Patient's contribution is agreed upon after enquiries made, either before or after admission to the Hospital, from the Patient or the Patient's relatives or friends; but no distinction is made between those who can and those who cannot afford to contribute.

Patients are required to contribute 1/- at each attendance, but are excused from payment if their circumstances warrant it. Further contributions are invited from those attending the Special Departments.

Patients are received for admission, or for Out-Patient Treatment :-

Admissions-Nassau Street Entrance, 11.30 a.m., on any week-day.

Accidents and Urgent Cases—Nassau Street Entrance, at any time of the day or night.

In all cases where the Patients are too poor to provide themselves with these articles they are supplied to them by the Lady Almoner from special funds which she has at her disposal for the purpose.

Any Officer, Sister, Nurse, Servant, or person employed in any Department of the Hospital accepting Money, or Presents of any kind, from a Patient, or relative or friend of any Patient, on any pretence whatever, is liable to dismissal.

The following Cases are not admitted into the Hospital:-

- 1. Those which are, upon due examination, deemed *Incurable*, as Advanced Consumption, etc.
- 2. Complaints so tedious of cure as to preclude for a long time the admission of more urgent cases, as *Chronic* Ulcers of the Legs, etc.
- 3. Disorders to the cure of which other establishments are devoted, as Persons of Unsound Mind, etc.
- 4. Those which are more properly objects for Public Assistance, as wanting Food and not Medicine.
- 5. Those whose admission might endanger the other Patients, as persons suffering from *Infectious Diseases*.
- 6. Complaints likely to be aggravated rather than relieved by confinement within the walls of a Hospital, but such cases, if deemed proper objects, may receive advice and medicine as *Out-Patients*.

Prior to sending up Patients from the Country, the Resident Medical Officer should be applied to, in order to learn whether there is room, and such application should be accompanied by a medical certificate setting out fully the nature of the case.

REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

OF THE

MIDDLESEX HOSPITAL, 1940.

The Report for the year 1940 covers, for the Hospital, eight months of preparation and adjustment, and four months of the air bombardment of London. Happily the Middlesex has been more fortunate than so many of the Hospitals of London, great and small, although, as the photograph of part of our Cancer Wing at the front of this report shows, we have not escaped without scars.

This photograph, it should be said, is of damage caused by one of two bombs which hit the Hospital early in 1941. An earlier hit in 1940 on the Annexe courtyard demolished the outer wall and so damaged the two upper floors of the central block of the Out-Patients' Department as to render them unsafe for use. The service was transferred immediately to the Cancer Wing, and has never ceased to function.

In the direct hit on that wing there were, we regret to say, four casualties, though not among our in-patients. A member of that devoted unit, the Friends' Ambulance Workers, which is housed in the wing, was killed, and another sustained injuries. In the College, where nearly all the windows on the North front were broken, only one serious casualty to a medical student resulted.

The work of the Hospital staff, medical and lay, in all these emergencies was magnificent. The many diverse jobs, under the general direction of the Medical Commandant, have been extremely efficiently dealt with, and, to quote the Hospital Journal:—" There were a multitude of helpers, and of these we shall not forget the

Engineers and their prompt treatment of the broken pipes: the moppers up of messes who coped with the dust and water: and the knockers-out of broken windows, who, we believe, secretly enjoyed themselves."

In the earlier damage to the Annexe the baffle-wall outside the entrance and hall windows undoubtedly saved the lives of members of the staff, porters, and patients of the Aid Post, and others who were in the hall at the time.

It has been the object of the Board to open up as many beds as possible for the service of the civilian sick and our ordinary Hospital patients. The War Emergency Committee, a joint body of members of the Board and of the Honorary Staff, to which were committed the powers of the Board, House Committee, and Finance Committee, welcomed, in January, 1940, a decision of the Ministry of Health to reduce the number of casualty beds and increase those for Hospital patients. The Ministry reduced casualty beds from 200 to 160, and authorised the Hospital to open up to two-thirds of its normal beds, including the casualty beds. This gave us 207 beds for the general public, exclusive of private patient beds, and the Medical Committee was consulted on the allocation of them to provide the best possible service. The top floors of the main buildings, the Cancer Wing, and the Woolavington Wing remain empty because of the danger to patients if they were housed there.

Within the limits set by the Ministry the Board is anxious to provide the maximum service possible. One instance of this is the arrangement come to with the Mount Vernon Hospital, Northwood, where we have leased 15 beds for Radiotherapy treatment, where our own patients are sent and are under the care of members of our own staff. Another is the opening, towards the end of the year, of negotiations between the Middlesex Hospital and Mount Vernon, presided over by the Ministry of Health, to open at Mount Vernon, in the Ministry's E.M.S. huts, a Middlesex Hospital annexe of 200 beds, for Middlesex Hospital patients evacuated there, under our own Medical and Nursing staff. Domestic administration will remain under the direction of Mount Vernon since we are sharing

kitchen and other services. This annexe is to be capable of immediate expansion to 400 beds in the event of the Hospital being put out of action to any great extent. Therefore, between a well-organised service within the Hospital, ensuring the maximum efficiency of Medical service, and of protection to life and buildings, and alternative quarters should we be forced out, the identity of our Hospital and the continuity of its service is assured.

We wish to put on record our deep appreciation of the work done under difficult and dangerous conditions by every member of our community, for all who serve the Middlesex are more keenly aware than ever before that they are "members one of another." It is impossible to enumerate all who, at the Middlesex or at the hut-expanded hospitals outside, served by our Staff, Nurses, and Students, belong to this community of the Middlesex, but, to exemplify them, let us take the members of the Medical Staff who, working with the War Emergency Committee, have carried the responsibility for the administration of the whole.

Dr. H. E. A. Boldero, at the outset, adapted our organisation to its war-time conditions and, as we recorded last year, his energy, unflagging care, and tact, were very largely responsible for the smooth working of the scheme. He then took over the duties of Group Officer to Sector-V, which is based on the Middlesex, and his success in that wider administration has been equally marked. At the same time, as Dean of the Medical School, he has met and most successfully overcome the innumerable difficulties which the dispersal of our students and teaching staff have entailed. Brief reference to this appears in the Medical School Report which follows this Hospital report: but there is no indication, under the section devoted to Teaching in War Time, of the forethought, care, and tireless consideration which the Dean has brought to this side of his incessant task.

In the Hospital administration there followed him Dr. Marriott, who so successfully maintained and further developed the war-time organisation until his specialised work on blood transfusion took him into the R.A.M.C.

And, since the Hospital is so fortunate in its sons, we found, for the final preparations and the great test of the air bombardment of London, Dr. Alan Moncrieff. He stands for all sides of our work—tireless, firm, patient, and good-humoured in all circumstances. A permanent record of one part of his work inside the Hospital is the Hospital A.R.P. Booklet which, revised by him, was printed by order of the Board for general issue. Elaborating it came a series of orders on the allocation of sub-basement shelters, on the duties of persons in charge of various sections, on sleeping quarters, silence rooms, recreation rooms and provision of games and amusements. It was largely due to his foresight and organising ability that the Hospital has played its part so well in the Emergency Medical Service.

At the end of the year he left the Hospital, on transfer to Aylesbury, where we staff two hospitals wholly in the one case, almost wholly in the other, with a total of some 1,500 beds, filled either by patients sent out in convoys from the Middlesex, or by convoys of naval and military patients. We owe him our warmest thanks, which the Board placed on record by a formal resolution, and we welcomed Dr. Windeyer with complete confidence, which he at once justified, as Dr. Moncrieff's successor in the position of Medical Commandant.

In acknowledgments, the services rendered by the London Fire Brigade must not be overlooked, nor the Brigade's refusal to take payment. They did an immense service in pumping water into our storage tanks when the water supply was disrupted. We are also greatly indebted to the Rover Scouts for their valuable nightly help particularly on a certain date "in transferring patients from Wards to sub-basements, and casualties up to the Wards," and to the stretcher bearers from the Harley Street Aid Post in dealing with convoys from the Hospital to Sector hospitals.

The Chairman welcomed these particular opportunities of writing to thank those who had given us so much assistance. On

his midnight visits to the roof of the Hospital he was much impressed by the efficiency of the fire-watching and fire-fighting service. On one occasion the Chief Engineer regretted that—whose fault it was he did not say—"better Blitzes" were not provided. Others may not have been quite so disappointed.

Queen Mary's Visit.

In January of this year the Hospital was honoured by a visit from Her Majesty Queen Mary who wished to see how the Hospital which she has so often inspected was adapted to war conditions.

Canadian Medical Officers visited the Hospital and on their first visit in February were welcomed by Lord Athlone, late Chairman of the Hospital, then newly-appointed Governor General of Canada.

Medical Services.

During the year we lost still more members of the Medical Staff to the Army. In addition to Dr. Marriott, Dr. Howitt and Dr. Bernard Johnson joined the R.A.M.C.

The normal development of Medical Service proceeds unaffected by external confusion. The recommendation of the Medical Committee of the year before to add to the Staff a Plastic Surgeon was implemented by the appointment of Mr. R. Mowlem, M.B., Ch.B., F.R.C.S.

Medical Research.

A most important series of investigations has been proceeding during the year in the Bland-Sutton Institute of Pathology concerning the new "chemotherapeutic" drugs which have already achieved so much in the treatment of such dread diseases as pneumonia and blood-poisoning. It is necessary to have an exact knowledge of the nature and habits, especially as regards "food," of bacteria and viruses, as by a detailed study of the chemistry of

these disease-producing organisms it may prove possible to devise further chemotherapeutic drugs with a wider range of attack. During the year particular attention has been paid to the effects of the newest chemotherapeutic drugs upon war wounds (with special reference to a serious infection producing what is called "gas gangrene") and upon types of peritonitis following certain surgical procedures. These investigations have been carried out in conjunction with the Department of Bacterial Chemistry of the Medical Research Council. Another line of research has been concerned with the theory that cancer is caused by a virus, that is by a living organism. Certain tumours (in fowls and in rabbits) known to be caused by a virus have been the object of special study. In conjunction with the British Empire Cancer Compaign Diagnostic Centre microscopic examination of cancer growths has been another important form of research.

The work of the Barnato Joel, Laboratories is mainly concerned with radiology, especially in its application to the treatment of cancer. The problems of dosage are studied and methods devised by which the doses of X rays or of radium given to patients can be accurately measured or estimated. Experimental studies are also made of the various ways in which tumours and normal tissues react to those radiations. Facilities are provided in the laboratories for postgraduates in medical radiology wanting to carry out experimental work.

In the Courtauld Institute of Biochemistry some of the research work of the past year has a special bearing on war-time problems. For example, the profound chemical disturbances of the body resulting from "enemy action" as found in air-raid casualties have been carefully studied with the object of discovering how such changes from the normal can be prevented from developing. The supply of calcium (lime) in war-time is of great importance in the national diet and special studies have been made of this problem. Perhaps the most important work in this department in the past year has been concerned with the chemistry of

certain of the important glands of the body. It has been found possible to prepare in the laboratory chemical substances having the same action as the chemical secretions made in the body by the endocrine glands and in particular the female sex glands. This has revolutionised treatment of certain disorders and research is proceeding on further elucidation of the connexion between chemical structure and the activity of various substances which have been prepared as "imitators" of naturally occurring secretions.

Obituary.

We greatly regret to report the deaths of three friends of the Hospital, all closely connected in their different ways with its corporate life.

The 9th Duke of Northumberland succeeded his father as President of the Hospital, in an unbroken chain in that office, and that House, since the foundation of the Hospital. We had to thank him, as his father, his mother, and his forebears, for very many instances of personal interest in and generosity towards a great philanthropic and educational centre.

All those who have come into contact with the General Office of the Hospital will miss very deeply Honor Shepherd. There was no kinder heart nor wiser mind under a sometimes somewhat sardonic humour than hers. Among so many to whom the Middlesex is the first object of service and of interest she came by no means the least.

In Eric Pearce Gould the Hospital as a whole, the Medical Staff more particularly, his patients in especial, have lost a very great friend. He was interested in every side of our activities, and whether as Surgeon, as Dean of the Medical School, as member of Committee, as colleague, as friend, was trusted for his absolute sincerity, admired for the courage with which he met and overcame physical handicap, and respected for his conscientious and brilliantly upheld convictions. When the war came he was called up in the Naval Rear-Medical Service, as Surgeon-Admiral, and died in its service, away from us. But his memory remains alive in the Hospital with which he was identified.

The Nursing Service.

The reputation of the Middlesex Hospital as a Training School stands as high as ever. Applications to enter it greatly exceed the number who can be accepted and trained and the success of the School continues unaffected by War conditions. During 1940 698 applications were received, 89 candidates entered the Preliminary Training School for four years general training, and 12 previously trained nurses entered for three years general training, while 73 nurses completed their training in this year and received the Hospital Certificate. Examination results show a percentage of 92.4 successes out of 606 total entries.

We congratulate three Sisters who took the Sister Tutor Course: Miss K. A. B. Fowler, with three distinctions, Miss K. M. Biggin with two, and Miss B. N. Fawkes.

We congratulate also on appointments to other hospitals:— Miss H. M. Burbury—Matron, the General Infirmary, Leeds. Miss G. A. Ramsden—Sister-Tutor, St. Mary's Hospital, W.2. Miss M. Hale—Sister-in-Charge, Preliminary Training School, Leicester Royal Infirmary.

Our Middlesex Hospital nurses are widely distributed throughout our Sector V and this dispersal and dilution has allowed us, with Voluntary Hospital Staff alone, to increase beds nursed by them from 968 in 1939 to 2,688 at the end of 1940. It must be remembered too that without the Medical Staff similarly spread over the Sector it would have been impossible for the L.C.C. and County and other authorities to have provided the service which enabled them to convert so many of their own beds into E.M.S. accommodation.

The Schools of Massage, Electro-Therapy, and Radiography also continue to flourish though they too are necessarily to some extent dispersed throughout the Sector hospitals, where there are, as for the nurses themselves, resident or visiting Teaching Staff in addition to Administrative and Ward Sisters.

Every effort has been made to look after the safety and comfort of the Staff, and they themselves have kept a gay and constant spirit. In the summer they won for the third time (and so outright) the Inter-Hospital Nurses' Cup. At Christmas, in spite of air bombardment, impromptu dances, taking the place of the Annual Ball, were a great success.

Officers' Wives' Maternity Unit.

The special Maternity Unit for wives of junior officers and other ranks in the Services, approved in the previous year, in which the Honorary Staff give their services whilst the Hospital charges only its actual costs or less, was fully operated.

There are many events recorded in our Minutes which in normal times, with no restriction on paper, and lesser costs, we should have wished to report at length. In to-day's circumstances we feel sure that both those to whom we report and those whose services should be reported will understand and approve our brevity.

American Generosity.

To the British War Relief Society, Inc., we desire to offer our profound gratitude for the magnificent American generosity which they have canalised and organised. Grants of money to be distributed by the Sectors for special help for those, victims of the raids or volunteers on duty in them, came like the personal gifts of friends. One special side of our work was singled out for special assistance by the gift of £5,000 to develop our Radon service, so that the relief or cure of cancer should not be interrupted by the dislocation caused by the bombardment of London.

We have also received from Bundles for Britain, Inc., a splendid gift of £990 14s. 2d. for the maintenance of the Fracture Clinic. Wonderful news has also reached us that Westchester County Branch, New York, has decided to "adopt" the Middlesex Hospital. There is a personal link here which it is pleasant to recall, for Miss Josephi of White Plains worked for some time in London under Dr. Moncrieff, in his Children's Clinic.

Before this Report went to the printers, though after the year it covers, we learned of the immense and various gifts coming REPORT. 23

from the American Red Cross, through the British Red Cross, for the benefit of service and war casualties. These supplies, already reaching the Voluntary Hospitals, cover, in many instances, goods which we could not obtain here, or articles, as of clothing for women and children, which we could not afford to supply at the expense of our proper Hospital service. It is quite impossible to express in any adequate way our appreciation of this great spontaneous rush of supplies to us from the American people.

British Empire Cancer Campaign.

We owe, too, most grateful thanks to the British Empire Cancer Campaign for their swift recovery from the first effects of war, and their return to the splendid grant of £8,000 towards the cost of our cancer work for the year 1941. We have already mentioned the 15 beds which we have leased in the Mount Vernon Hospital for radiotherapy treatment to supplement what we can still manage to do in the Middlesex Hospital itself.

We have agreed with the King's Fund to co-operate in a proposed new Radio-Therapy centre, and to bear the costs of treating our patients in it as far as we can.

SERVICES, APPEALS, FUNCTIONS.

The voluntary workers for the Hospital have earned our thanks with our admiration for the way thay have carried on their various services.

Report of the Ladies' Association.

In spite of many changes of address and absence from Town, the Ladies' Association has carried on, and so long as we can be of use to the Hospital we shall continue to carry on.

We are proud to report that during the course of the year the calls on us have been many and varied, and in particular our Honorary Organiser, Ladies' Association National Emergency Branch, Miss Sichel, has responded magnificently to all of them. We greatly regretted losing her to the Women's Voluntary Service

at the end of the year, but are glad to report that our kind and energetic Honorary Treasurer has taken over this Branch.

The Second-hand Department has kept going splendidly, and recently, though there is no lack of customers, they are badly in need of goods and we should be most grateful for support.

The gardens have been kept tended, and we are particularly grateful to the guardians and their helpers.

Though calls on the Work Society, the Library and the Ambulance Branches have been considerably curtailed they have kept up their usual high standard and service.

We are sorry to report that the Mice Workshop was burnt out in a raid. Our sympathy goes out to our kind hosts in the loss of their home where a welcome was always awaiting our members.

It was with great regret that we heard of the death of Miss Abercrombie. All supporters of the Ladies' Association will remember her many years of devoted service to the Work Society.

Finally, the Ladies' Association is determined to keep on and hopes to consolidate its position so that when peace returns to us again it can render to the Hospital even more service than in the past.

We owe, also, to members of the Ladies' Association, as to the hundreds of volunteer Blood Donors, our thanks for the immediate response made by them at the outbreak of war, and for the sustained interest which has kept our supplies replenished. To the employees of the many friendly firms round us we offer our thanks: and they are particularly due to Mrs. Breakey for her unflagging efforts in the start and the continuance of this vital service.

Lady Webb-Johnson reported on the excellent work of the Red Cross Depot under her charge. She forwarded to the Board a letter of thanks to the Hospital from Lady Falmouth.

Seven-a-Sides.

The Middlesex Rugby Football Union, undeterred by the difficulties experienced by its Clubs, which naturally lost so many

members to the Services, organised once more a Seven-a-Side competition in aid of the Cancer Wing. It was held this year at Richmond and was, in the circumstances, a great success and realised £324 2s. 5d. We are most grateful to the Union for this and for their assurance that they will, if it is possible, keep the Seven-a-Side Tournament alive until it can be revived at Twickenham after the war.

Rose and Flag Days.

To Mrs. de Paula we wish we could offer an adequate expression of our gratitude for the time and trouble she gives, and of our appreciation of the tact and energy she brings to the organisation of functions in aid of the Hospital. During this year she organised the Combined Flag Days in our area, on May 7th and October 8th, which realised £749 19s. 4d., and also Alexandra Rose Day, in which her helpers collected £632, an increase of £22 on the previous year, the Hospital receiving, with its share of the pool, £650.

All Help League.

Our ex-patients are amongst the first to realise the addedburden placed upon their Hospital in war time. The £1,448 1s. 10d. contributed by the All Help League Members during 1940 is convincing evidence of their firm determination to see the Hospital does not suffer by the loss of their support even at the cost of real self-sacrifice on the part of many.

The League's subsidiary shilling collection to provide hospital equipment raised an additional £266 18s. 0d. Sir Alfred Webb-Johnson who takes a personal interest in this scheme, kindly acknowledged each individual collection greatly to the appreciation of the many patients who know him.

Although present conditions prevented the usual social activities of the League, the Members enthusiastically responded to the appeal for sellers for Hospitals' Combined Flag Day and Queen Alexandra Rose Day. Their untiring efforts provided invaluable financial assistance.

The Board greatly value the maintained strength of the League and realise with gratitude that it is an organisation to be relied upon in the days to come.

Lady Almoner's Department.

Though the numbers of patients seen in this Department shrank to some extent with the closing of some top floor wards which were considered to be unsafe, the greater speed at which patients are passed through the Hospital and out by convoys to the Sector country hospitals has meant that little less work goes on. The Department has been able to lend experienced almoners to the new hut hospitals as far out as Aylesbury.

In addition we have to acknowledge with most grateful thanks assistance and financial grants from the St. Patrick's Benevolent Society, the Invalid Kitchens of London, the Friends of the Poor, and the Charity Organisation Society. Subscribers to the Royal

Surgical Aid Society have helped us with their letters for special cases, whilst we have received clothing from the Friends of the Fighting Forces, who also provided us with dried milk, whilst other gifts of clothing have come from the American Relief Society.

Other gifts both for the Middlesex and for hospitals in its Sector came from Mrs. Felix Davis and Messrs. Carter & Sons of bulbs and seeds for the garden of Stoke Mandeville Hospital, and from Messrs. Marks & Spencer of tumblers for the use of patients.

Infant Welfare Department.

During 1940 the Infant Welfare Department "came of age" for it was 21 years ago in March, 1919 that it was first opened. The event was happily celebrated by the appearance of the first "grand-child," for in May a mother who had herself been a "welfare baby" brought her own baby to the department. A photographic record of the three generations was made. Work has proceeded under varying degrees of difficulty. Although the total numbers of attendances and of children who have attended are reduced for the year as compared with 1939 there has been an increase in the number of home visits paid, this being an important method of keeping in touch with mothers and babies.

Since September the numbers attending have dropped considerably despite an alteration of the times of the clinics to the mornings so as to avoid the difficulties of the black-out, but there are signs that this is only a temporary decrease. There has been no increase in serious illness during the year and only three deaths are known to have occurred. Towards the end of the year shelter conditions gave rise to an increase in coughs and colds and in skin disorders, but generally speaking the children remaining in London have not appeared to suffer seriously from ill-health. The number evacuated to the country varies and in November it was known that 164 were in reception areas.

During 1940 Miss Cooke, assistant to the Superintendent, left to take a post in Hammersmith and Miss B. Britton was appointed in her place. Thanks are due to three voluntary workers who have continued their valuable help, to the personnel of the First Aid Post who also help in the clinic and to the Kew Gardens Mothers' Union and other friends for knitting and sewing.

Convalescent Home.

The Convalescent Home, which had in 1939 been taken on the strength of E.M.S. Sector I, was later dropped from that service. In the spring of 1940 a bomb which burst nearby broke all the windows in the front, but did not damage the First Aid Post established in the rear block of the building. The Ministry agreed to meet the cost of the damage as the Home was at their disposal at the time.

The Hospital Laundry, Hendon.

The Laundry also suffered, but more severely, a direct hit on the coal store wrecking the boiler house and sorting rooms, and the roofs and windows of other parts of the building. Mutual aid arrangements which we had made with some commercial laundries proved their value, for, though a few garments which were in the sorting room overnight disappeared for ever, not more than a twelve-hours' delay in any delivery of linen occurred. So thorough and effective was the work of the Hendon District Council on the buildings and our engineers on the boilers and plant that within three weeks the laundry was in operation again. We have been able to do their work for other hospitals in our Sector, and may be able to expand still further.

Finally, supported by so much evidence of the vitality and tenacity of our people and their belief in the voluntary spirit, we claim from all friends and supporters of the Middlesex more, in these difficult days, and not less, help, of money, service, and in kind. Just as it is an article of faith in general with us that freedom shall vanquish slavery, so, in a smaller but equally vital particular, do we hold that it is essential in a State System, of education or of medicine, to preserve and reinforce the individual and voluntary effort which acts both as stimulant and corrective to the service as a whole.

Hold to your heritage. Work for it. Induce others to share your efforts.

Teaching in War Time.

PRE-CLINICAL STUDENTS.

The Council of the Medical School last September decided that the pre-clinical students should be evacuated from London to Leeds, the Vice-Chancellor of the Univarsity of Leeds having most kindly offered to accommodate them. Our students, with their own teachers and laboratory staff, have, therefore, been transferred to Leeds. They are reading for the same examinations as if they were still in London.

When I have visited Leeds I have been delighted to find that the accommodation and teaching facilities provided by the University are excellent, and that both students and staff are working under most satisfactory conditions. Professor John Kirk, our Professor of Anatomy, has accepted the responsibility of supervising the teaching and students, and he, too, has expressed his grateful appreciation of the arrangements made at the University of Leeds on the School's behalf since its arrival in October, 1940.

CLINICAL STUDENTS.

Students who are doing their clinical work are posted, in addition to the Middlesex Hospital, to one of the following Sector Hospitals: - Tindal House Emergency Hospital, Aylesbury; Mount Vernon Hospital, Northwood; and Central Middlesex Hospital, N.W.10. These appointments are arranged so that the various stages of the curriculum are undertaken at a particular Hospital. At each of these Hospitals are attached members of the Honorary Staff of the Middlesex Hospital who are continuing their regular courses of instruction to our students. Our thanks are due to members of the staffs of these Hospitals who also take part in the instruction of these students. Students receive instruction in Midwifery at the Middlesex Hospital, St. Mary Abbots Hospital, Kensington, the Willesden Maternity Hospital, and at the New End Hospital, Hampstead. Recently arrangements have also been made for clinical students to attend the Royal Hospital, Wolverhampton, where the Staff have very kindly undertaken to teach and supervise their work. We are very grateful to the Royal Hospital, Wolverhampton, for this much valued help.

Deaths.

It is with the deepest regret that I record the deaths of Mr. Herbert Charles, Consulting Anaesthetist to the Hospital; Dr. H. Campbell Thomson, Consulting Neurologist; Mr. A. T. Pitts, Dental Surgeon; and Surgeon Rear-Admiral Eric Pearce Gould, Surgeon to the Hospital.

Mr. Herbert Charles was first appointed to the Staff of the Middlesex Hospital in 1907, Dr. Campbell Thompson in 1900, Surgeon Rear-Admiral Pearce Gould in 1920, and Mr. A. T. Pitts in 1922. The loss of these four members of our Staff is keenly felt

by all. Herbert Charles accomplished much for his speciality both in advancing the practice of Anaesthesia and the instruction of students. H. Campbell Thomson will best be remembered in the School for his great services as Dean from 1908-1919. He guided the School safely and successfully through those anxious years. Only his successors know the full extent of the value of his services to our Hospital and School. Both these men had completed their work. But the death of Eric Pearce Gould at the early age of 54 is a very grievous loss as we had hoped to benefit from his skill as a surgeon and his wise counsel and leadership for many years to come. He, too, will be remembered for his work as Dean from 1925-29, for his continued interest in the School and his active and able help with the Amalgamated Clubs and the Students' Restaurant. The sudden death of A. T. Pitts deprived us at Middlesex and the Dental Profession of a gifted and outstanding man.

Re-appointment.

Professor Sidney Russ, Physicist to the Hospital and holder of the Joel Chair of Physics in the University of London, having reached the age of retirement, has been re-appointed to the Chair of Physics for a further period of 5 years. We are fortunate in continuing to have his distinguished services.

Distinctions and Honours.

Sir Alfred Webb-Johnson was elected a Vice-President of the Royal College of Surgeons of England and Bradshaw Lecturer for 1940; Surgeon Rear-Admiral G. Gordon-Taylor received the first award of the Moynihan Lectureship in the University of Leeds; Mr. D. H. Patey, Assistant Surgeon to the Hospital, was elected Erasmus Wilson Demonstrator by the Royal College of Surgeons; Professor E. C. Dodds, S.A. Courtauld Professor of Biochemistry in the University of London, was elected Cameron Prizeman for 1940 by the Senate of the University of Edinburgh; Colonel L. E. H. Whitby, Lecturer in Bacteriology, has been awarded the John Hunter Triennial Prize for his research work in Bacteriology, with

special reference to the sulphonamide compounds, and Mr. E. W. Riches, Assistant Surgeon to the Hospital, has been appointed to the Court of Examiners for 1941.

It was the wish of her late husband, Surgeon Rear-Admiral Eric Pearce Gould, that the money be invested and the interest be used to assist a student in need who shewed sufficient mental ability to become a good doctor, and that the grants should be repeated to the same student provided he made satisfactory progress and was still in need of such assistance.

We are very grateful to Mrs. Pearce Gould for this generous gift, particularly as it enables the Medical School to perpetuate the memory of her husband.

THREE Casualty Medical and Two Casualty Surgical Officers. Eight Resident Officers to the Special Departments, Ten Resident House Surgeons, Ten Resident House Physicians, Two Resident Gynæcological House Surgeons, Two Resident Officers to the Maternity and Children's Dept., Thirteen Registrars, Three Resident Anæsthetists, one Resident Dental House Surgeon and one Clinical Research Assistant to the Courtauld Wards, are appointed annually from among the qualified Students of the Hospital.

There are awarded annually, two Open Entrance Scholarships value £100 each, one in Arts and one in Science. Two Scholarships value £100 each open to Students of Oxford and Cambridge Universities who have completed their Anatomical and Physiological studies. Two Scholarships endowed by Sir Edward Meyerstein, value £100 each, open to University of London Students who have at the Middlesex Hospital Medical School completed the curriculum for the 2nd M.B., Examination. The Freer Lucas Scholarship and the Asher Asher Prize to a Pupil of Epsom College who has passed the 1st M.B., Examination. The Colin Mackenzie Prize value £10 10s., Anatomy and Physiology. The Hetley Clinical Prize of £25, the Leopold Hudson Prize value £11 11s., Surgical Pathology and Bacteriology, the Kingston Fowler Prize value £15, Pathology, Bacteriology, and Morbid Histology. The Lyell Medal and Scholarship value £55 5s., for proficiency in Surgical Anatomy and Dissection, etc. Two Broderip Scholarships, value £60 and £40 respectively for proficiency in Clinical knowledge. The Freeman Scholarship value £30 Obstetric Medicine. The John Murray Medal and Scholarship value £25, Theoretical and Practical Medicine, awarded every third year. Numerous Research Scholarships and Class Prizes are also awarded.

The Tutors superintend and assist Students in their studies without extra fee, and thus the necessity of obtaining private instruction away from the Medical School is obviated.
