THE 52nd ANNUAL REPORT

TO THE SUBSCRIBERS AND FRIENDS OF THE
MARGATE COTTAGE HOSPITAL.

THE Committee of Management of the Hospital have pleasure in presenting to the Subscribers their report for 1928, which has been a year of more than ordinary interest, witnessing the extension of the present building to meet the needs of the ever-increasing volume of work, and substantial advance in the building of the New General Hospital for the town and district.

The year began on a regretful note with the resignation of Dr. F. E. Nichol from the Hon. Surgical Staff after thirty years of loyal and eminent service, during which he had earned the high esteem and gratitude of thousands of patients.

A patient of nearly twenty years ago, now in S. Africa, on a recent short visit to Margate, called at the Hospital in the hope of seeing her old friend and Medical Attendant, Dr. Nichol, and on failing to do so, expressed her disappointment as the greatest she had experienced on her visit to England; this expression typifies the general esteem in which Dr. Nichol is held.

The Subscribers will be glad to learn that Dr. Nichol will retain his connection with the Hospital as Vice-President and Hon. Consulting Surgeon, and that his son, Dr. Robert Nichol, has been elected to the Medical Staff, and is following worthily the great example of his father. The Committee have also appointed Mr. A. J. Haddock, L.D.S., R.C.S. Eng., Hon. Dental Surgeon.

At the Annual Meeting in February, Captain J. I. H. Friend was appointed President for a second year, having rendered valuable service in his first year, and having proved himself well-fitted for the important duties of the immediate future. Messrs. F. C. Cobb, G. S. Dowling, and T. D. Wood, were thanked for their past services and re-elected on the Management for a further four years.

The Rev. C. P. Banks, of Westgate, and Messrs. H. E. Epps and P. H. R. Venner complete their term at the forthcoming Annual Meeting, and are due for re-election.

The work for patients and the financial progress in 1928 again broke all records—the latter in spite of the strenuous public effort now being made for the building of the New General Hospital. The old Ship has not been forsaken by its many friends, but has, instead, brought to port a richer cargo than ever—a Maintenance Income of nearly £5,600, exclusive of legacies (£457) and £283 in advance of 1927.

The number of cases treated at the Hospital, including all grades, was 3,891, 397 in excess of the preceding year. Five hundred and eighty-four operations were performed, against 472 in 1927.

A full analysis of the Medical and Surgical work is included in this report by the courtesy of the Medical Superintendent (Mr. W. G. Sutcliffe, F.R.C.S.), and will prove interesting to many.

Early in the year severe congestion in the wards, with consequent overwork to the Nurses, was emphasized by the Medical Staff. The Committee, therefore, decided to provide two temporary wards of ten beds each, pending the completion of the New Hospital.

The new wards and full equipment entailed an expenditure of £1,467, which has been met from ordinary income and reserve funds without drawing on Capital. Without this fresh accommodation the work of the Hospital in the height of the season would have been very seriously crippled, and rendered well-nigh impossible.

Financially the year has been full of encouragement for the future needs of a greater Hospital.

Among the many faithful supporters (fully detailed in the accompanying lists) were the Mayoress of Margate (Mrs. E. T. Fasham), who organized the Alexandra Rose Day, and resuscitated the Annual Flag Day (lapsed during 1926-7), raising £372 for Maintenance in the two efforts; the ever-faithful "Penny Weekly Fund" Committee, who maintained their highest record (£700); the Amalgamated Societies of Margate (£175), Birchington (£58), and Broadstairs (£60); the "Brotherhood of the Cheerful Sparrows" (Broadstairs Branch), (£100); the Misses Eveling and Daniels (Broadstairs Rose Day Collection), £82; Messrs. Cleveland, for Maintenance of St.

George's Bed, £76; Mr. Epps of "Kingsley" and "Hereward," £74; and many contributors of other much-appreciated help.

Income from boxes and workshops exceeded £600 during the year, more than half being derived from Employees. It is gratifying to note that the employees of more than sixty firms contribute in this way, many on an organized weekly system, entirely voluntarily. Notably the Employees of the Isle of Thanet Gas Company contributed £50.

It is pleasing to report that the two existing Appeal Sub-Committees of Birchington and Westgate propose in 1929 to retain their organizations and concentrate on largely increased support to the Maintenance Fund.

The Committee greatly appreciate this foretaste of things to come for the New Hospital, and feel that with this and the continued help of friends here recorded, extension of support in other directions, and, realizing that the Maintenance Income for 1928 exceeded Expenditure by nearly £1,000, they may, with the help of paying wards, look forward with every confidence as regards Maintenance of the New Hospital.

Much progress has been made since the issue of the last Annual Report with the actual building of the New Hospital, and the great financial effort it demands. A full report of the Appeal Committee's work and progress in 1928 is appended to this Report.

In the middle of the year tenders were invited to carry out the plans of the eminent Hospital Architects, Messrs. Adams, Holden and Pearson, of Knightsbridge. Thirty-one tenders were received, and that of Reg. Elliott and Company, of Margate, accepted for £56,301 (for the main building and engineering work), excluding the making of roads and paths and other minor work. The whole contract is subject to variation, and it is gratifying that modifications have reduced the original estimate by about £3,000. The land cost an extra £4,380, and the equipment is estimated to need a larger sum, although it will be considerably relieved by transferences from the present Hospital.

The men employed at the new building are nearly all local.

The great event of the year was the laying of the Foundation Stone of the New Hospital by the Rt. Hon. Sir Charles Batho, Bart., Lord Mayor of London, who paid a State visit to the Town on the invitation of the Mayor

(Councillor E. T. Fasham) and Corporation, and who was accompanied by the Lady Mayoress, the Sheriffs and their ladies, and County dignitaries.

The occasion was historic and eminently successful from all points of view except the weather. After lunch at the Queen's Highcliffe Hotel and a State procession, the impressive ceremony was carried out with due dignity and grace, and resulted in large financial support and widened sympathy and interest in the Hospital's beneficent work.

The Hospital Committee tender sincerest thanks to the Mayor and Corporation, and all who contributed in any degree to the success of this great function.

The year just closed has been very strenuous for all connected with the management and work of the present and future Hospitals.

Many Meetings of the General and various Sub-Committees, dealing with ordinary Management, Finance, Trustees, Appeal Work, Building, Medical, New Constitution and Rules, etc., etc., have been held, and many details in plans and proposals have received attention, necessitating, perhaps, apparent slow progress. But the Committee confidently expect that the New Hospital will be completed, furnished, and opened under a new and wider Constitution next year.

To accomplish this, much remains to be done financially and otherwise.

In concluding their report the Committee desire to thank most sincerely all their many friends who have enabled them to complete a successful year's work.

To the Medical Staff, for its invaluable service, the town and district is deeply indebted, and to others not on the Hospital Staff who have kindly assisted as Anæsthetists at operations. The Nursing Staff, too, under the Matron (Miss Garnett), deserve warm recognition.

A special word of thanks is due to the local Ambulance Corps of Margate, Broadstairs, Westgate, and Birchington for their co-operation, and to the Margate Men for their special help in the Wards and Theatre at the Hospital in the evenings as "Hospital Orderlies"—a new departure.

The year 1929 will be the last complete year in the long history of the Cottage Hospital.

The Committee of Management are confident that a generous public will see that it does not fail to maintain in 1929, as far as financial support can provide, the high character for public service that the Cottage Hospital has borne for so long, and that its traditions shall be carried on on broader lines in the greater Hospital to be opened in the Summer of 1930.

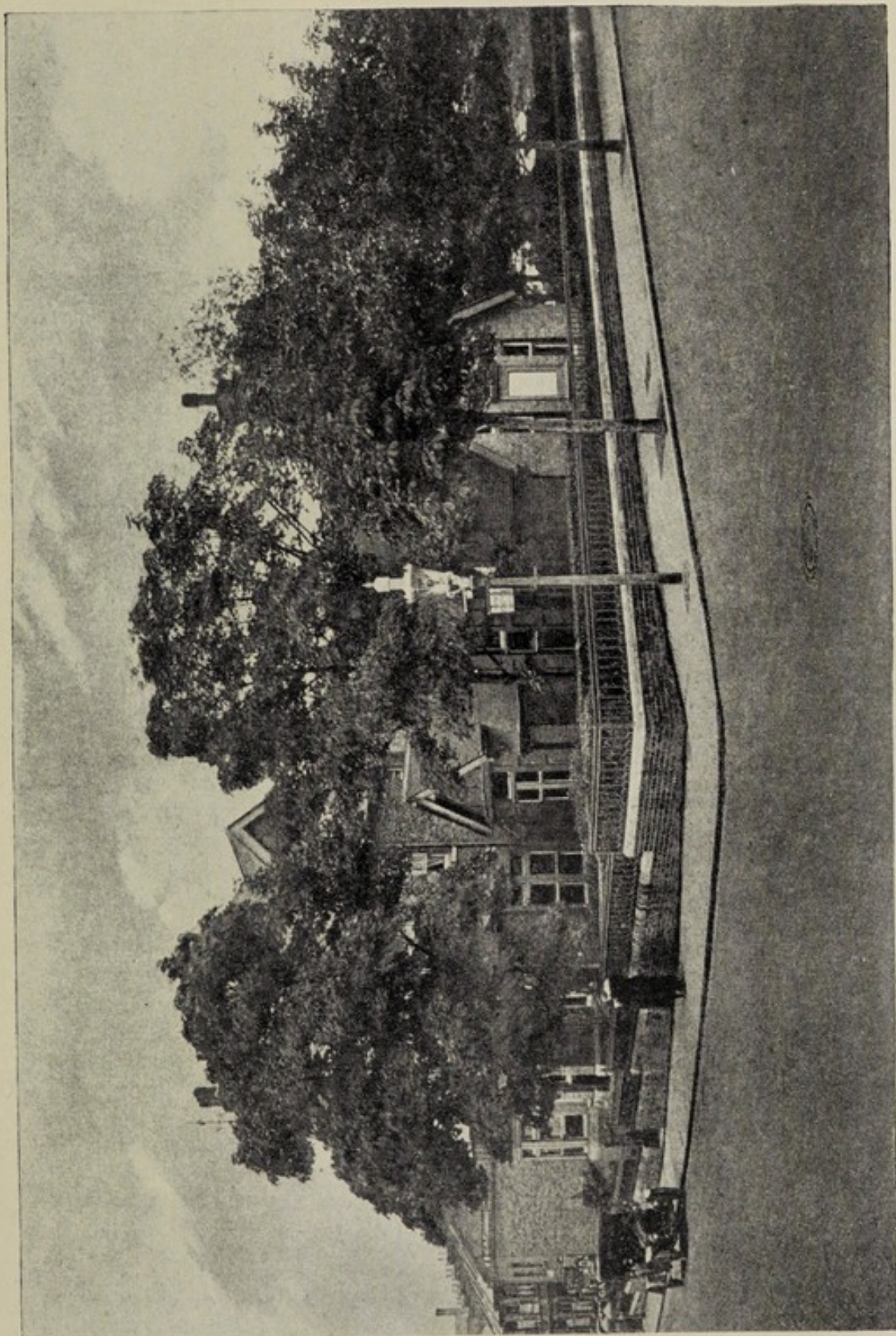

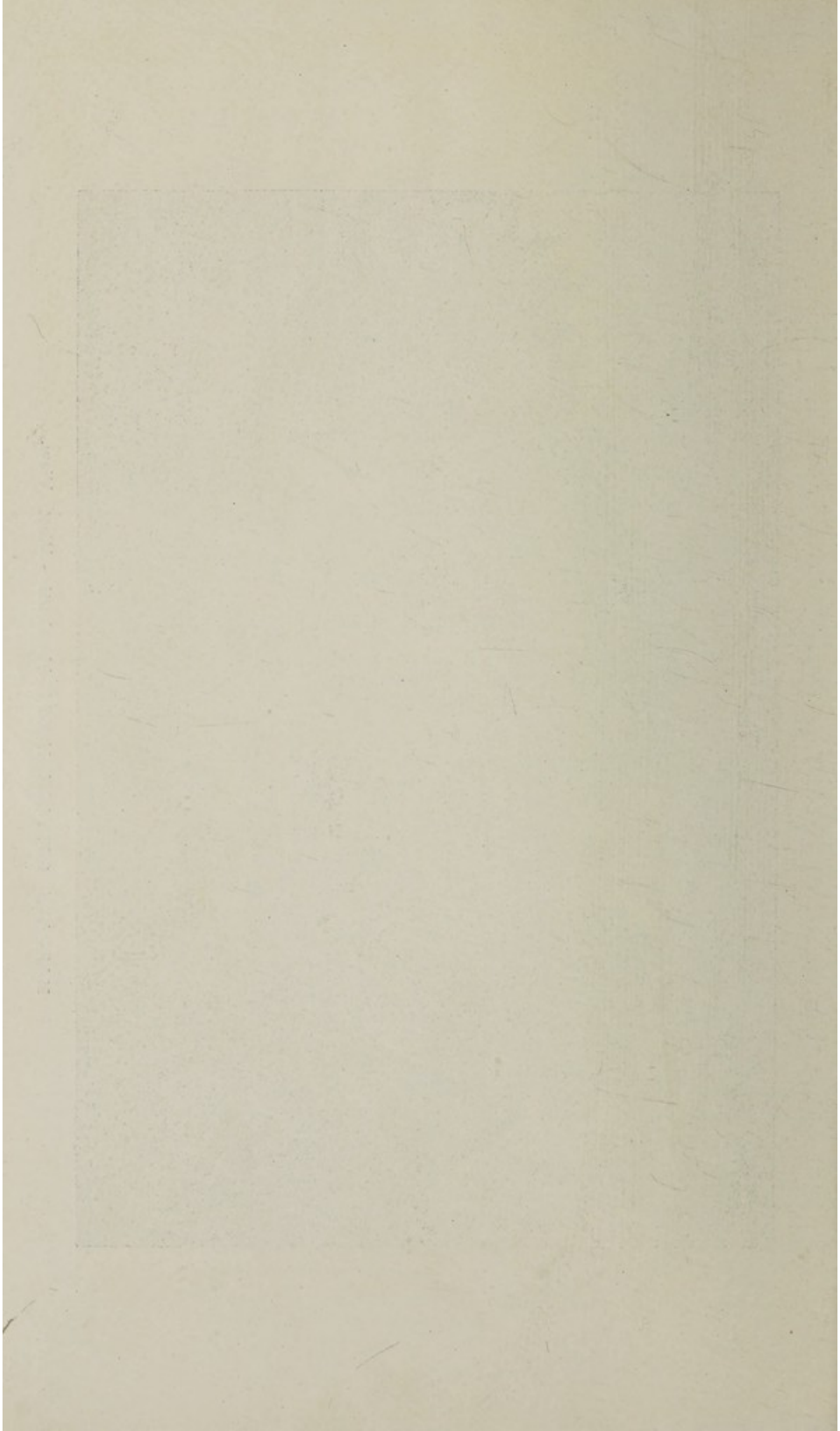

THE LAYING OF THE FOUNDATION STONE.

The great event of 1928 was the laying of the Foundation Stone of the new building in St. Peter's Road, Margate, on Tuesday, 25th September, by the Right Hon. the Lord Mayor of London (Colonel Sir Chas. Batho, Bart.), who paid a State Visit to the town for this purpose, accompanied by the Lady Mayoress, the Sheriffs of the City of London and their Ladies, Alderman Sir Charles Wakefield, Bart., and other distinguished visitors. It was a red-letter day for the town and district. The occasion will be long remembered, and the enthusiasm shown left no doubt that the Committee have the goodwill and support of all classes of the community with them in this great project. Grateful acknowledgments are tendered to the Ex-Mayor (Councillor E. Tofts Fasham, J.P.) and Corporation, who secured the honour of a State Visit by the Lord Mayor and other dignitaries, who were accorded a civic reception worthy of the occasion and of the Borough of Margate. Extensive publicity was given to this great event both in the national and local Press, several London papers giving illustrations of the ceremony. The issue of the "Isle of Thanet Gazette," dated September 29th, 1928, devoted two full pages to this historic function, and is well worth preserving.



THE PRESENTATION OF PURSES ON SEPTEMBER 25th, 1928.

Any reference to the function would be incomplete without special mention of the wonderful generosity of the public on that great occasion. At the conclusion of the beautiful dedication service, no less than £13,700 was handed to the Hon. Treasurer, of which sum approximately £10,000 was new money not previously accounted for. Eighty-six purses were presented. For this magnificent support the Appeal Committee are deeply indebted to thousands of contributors of large and small amounts in Margate, Westgate-on-Sea, Birchington, Broadstairs and St. Peter's, London and the Provinces. The Appeal Committee would like particularly to mention at this stage three of these personal gifts—the one from the Hon. E. and Mrs. Harmsworth of £1,500, which, with their previous donation of £515, brings their total gift to the fund to £2,015; from Alderman Sir Charles Wakefield, Bart., a leading and honoured citizen of the City of London, of £1,000; also another of £1,000 from "An

Anonymous Donor," per Mr. F. Gore, given by a Margate resident in gratitude for the good work of the Margate Cottage Hospital. That such noble gifts may be emulated by others and so hasten the day when the total amount needed is reached is the one and earnest desire of the Appeal Committee.



THE EX-MAYOR AND MAYORESS'S PERSONAL EFFORTS.

During the past year Councillor and Mrs. E. Tofts Fasham were never weary in well-doing in their help to the New Hospital Fund. As a result of their many labours in this direction, they were able to raise and hand over a sum of £1,285. The Appeal Committee have expressed to the Ex-Mayor and Mayoress of Margate their grateful thanks for this valued help.



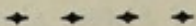
THE "CHEERFUL SPARROWS" FURTHER EFFORTS.

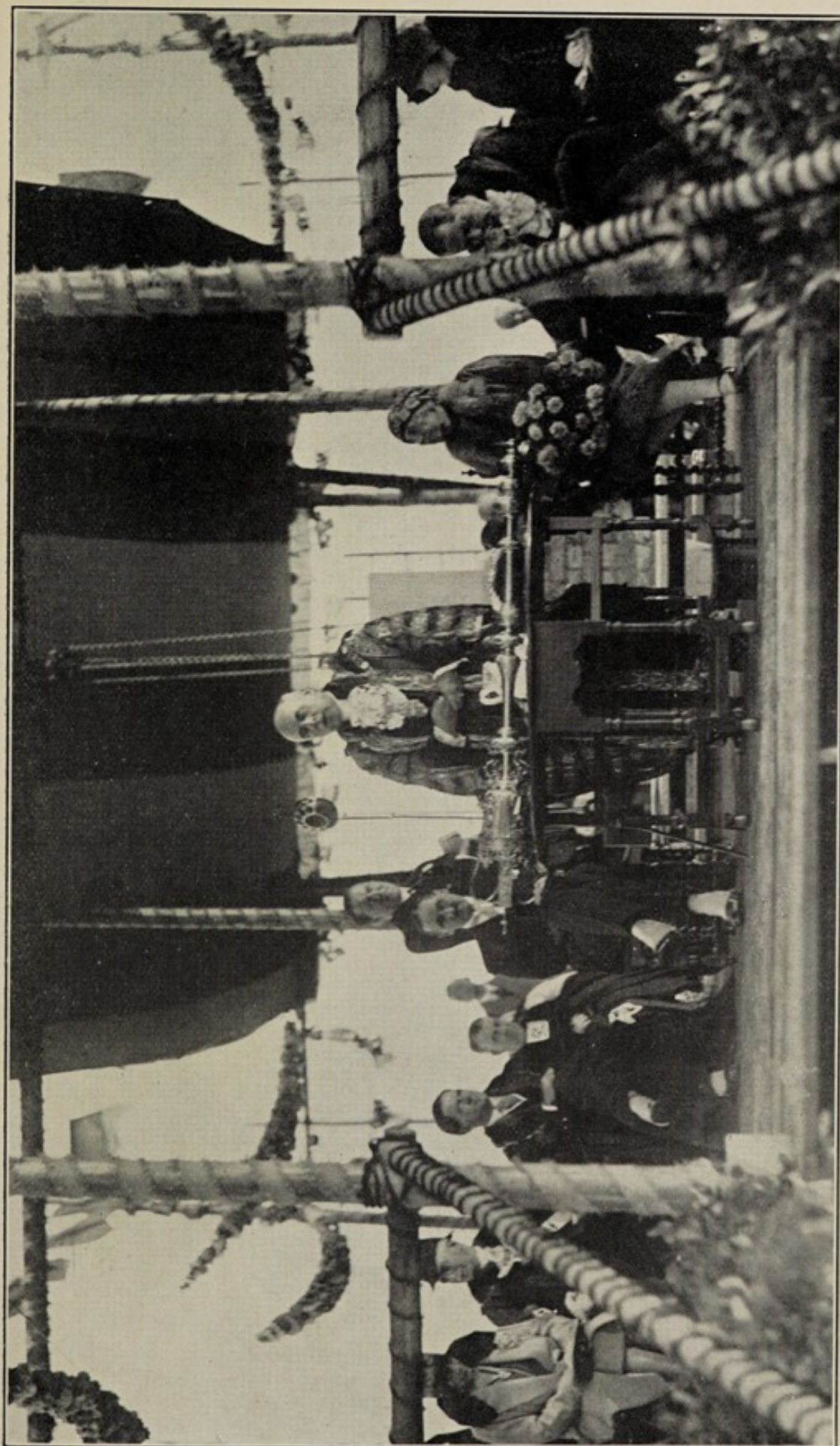

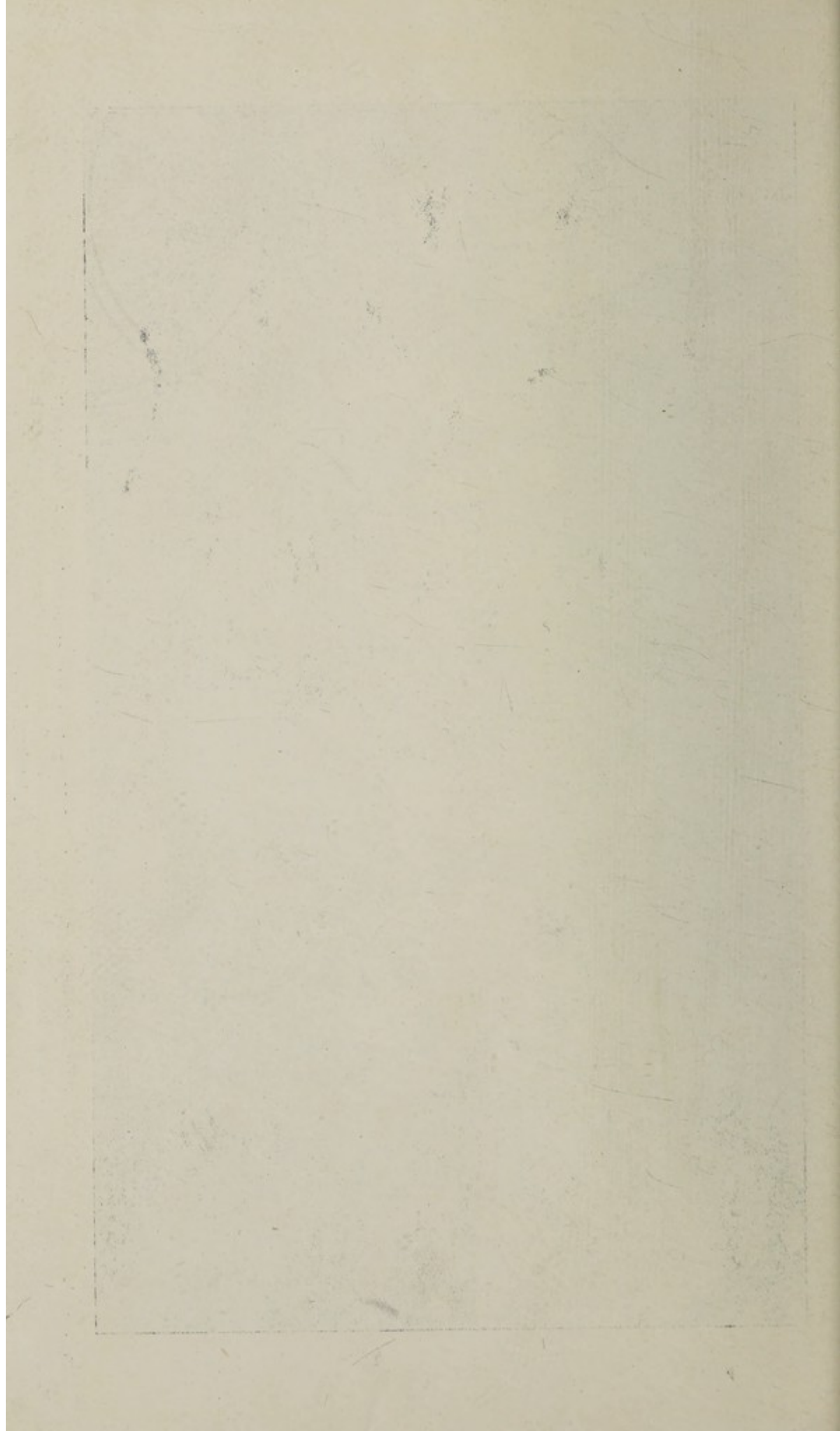
OTHER EFFORTS.

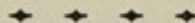
Westgate-on-Sea, too, has achieved its objective by raising over £2,000 for the fund. To the local Committee and to their many helpers, grateful thanks are tendered.

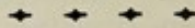

**THE PROGRESS OF THE FUND.**

The fund was inaugurated on **March 1st, 1926**. At the end of that year the fund—including donations, efforts and promises given—had reached £18,000. A sum of actually £10,000 was on Deposit at the Bank after the necessary expenses had been met. At the end of 1927, the fund (including promises) had reached £27,000. There was actually a sum of £20,000 on

Deposit Account at the end of that year. On December 31st, 1928, the amount raised had reached £43,000, made up as follows:—

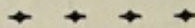

THE PRESENT FINANCIAL POSITION.

From the total shown in the preceding paragraph, the incidental expenses of the fund, including advertising, printing and stationery, have to be deducted. During the past year a sum of £7,618 15s. 5d. was paid over to the New Hospital Building Account. The Bank Balances at 31st December last, including value of £1,662 3s. 11d. India 3% Stock (£1,000) were £30,923 1s. 1d. But by including the sum of £1,946 10s., the amount of the cheque presented by the Westgate-on-Sea Ward Committee, payable on 1st January, 1929; £484 13s. 8d. Interest on Deposit Account for the six months ending 31st December, 1928; and £830 19s. 10d. in hand at Lloyds Bank, Broadstairs, on account of the Broadstairs and St. Peter's Fund, the actual money in hand at the beginning of 1929 amounted to £34,185 4s. 7d. The net cost to the Appeal Fund in connection with the ceremony of laying the Foundation Stone on 25th September last amounted to £14 only.

It is estimated that the total sum needed for the new Hospital—including the Building and other services, Site, Furnishing, Architects' Fees and Sundries, and allowing for the value of the present site—will be £62,000, and that a further sum of approximately £22,000 is now needed to enable the new Hospital to be opened in 1930 free of debt.



A VISION—AND AN APPEAL.

The year just ended has been a very notable one in the history of our Cottage Hospital. For during the past year the plans for the new General Hospital were completed and adopted, the contracts signed, and the foundation stone laid, with appropriate ceremonial, of a greater hospital, of which the town and district may well be proud. It has already been stated—and it is worth repeating here—that the new Hospital as planned and designed will be fitted and furnished with everything that modern medical science can suggest for the help and recovery of those who will daily seek its beneficent help and service. It is the earnest wish of the Committee of Management that the wonderful atmosphere which has always happily characterized the work of the Cottage Hospital throughout the past fifty years—and there are many to-day who know what that atmosphere is—shall permeate the new Hospital and that the fine tradition of this glorious work may be efficiently carried on for many generations to come.

Such is the ideal and vision of those who are working hard to-day for this great project. The work in the past has been blessed with the unstinted honorary service of its Medical Staff, the devoted work of its Matrons and Nurses, and not least the goodwill and generous support of a sympathetic public. This is assured in even a greater degree in the

future. But the great goal at the present time is to raise the balance needed for this great work. To reach this happy consummation a sum of £22,000 is now needed. To those who know and value the work of our Cottage Hospital, an earnest appeal is now made to come forward and give generously as far as they are able. It may not be generally known that a gift of £500 carries the privilege of naming a Bed in the New Hospital. What more beautiful way could there possibly be to perpetuate the memory of some loved one than such an action as this? Every town is blessed with its benefactors and public-spirited citizens. No greater service can be rendered to-day than that this great task of building and equipping the new Hospital may be consummated in order that the work of healing the sick and suffering may go forward undiminished. Many have already nobly come forward and given of their best. That others will now follow on and by their generous aid see to it that this work for the cause of humanity shall not suffer is the hope and earnest wish of those who have shouldered this great and responsible task.

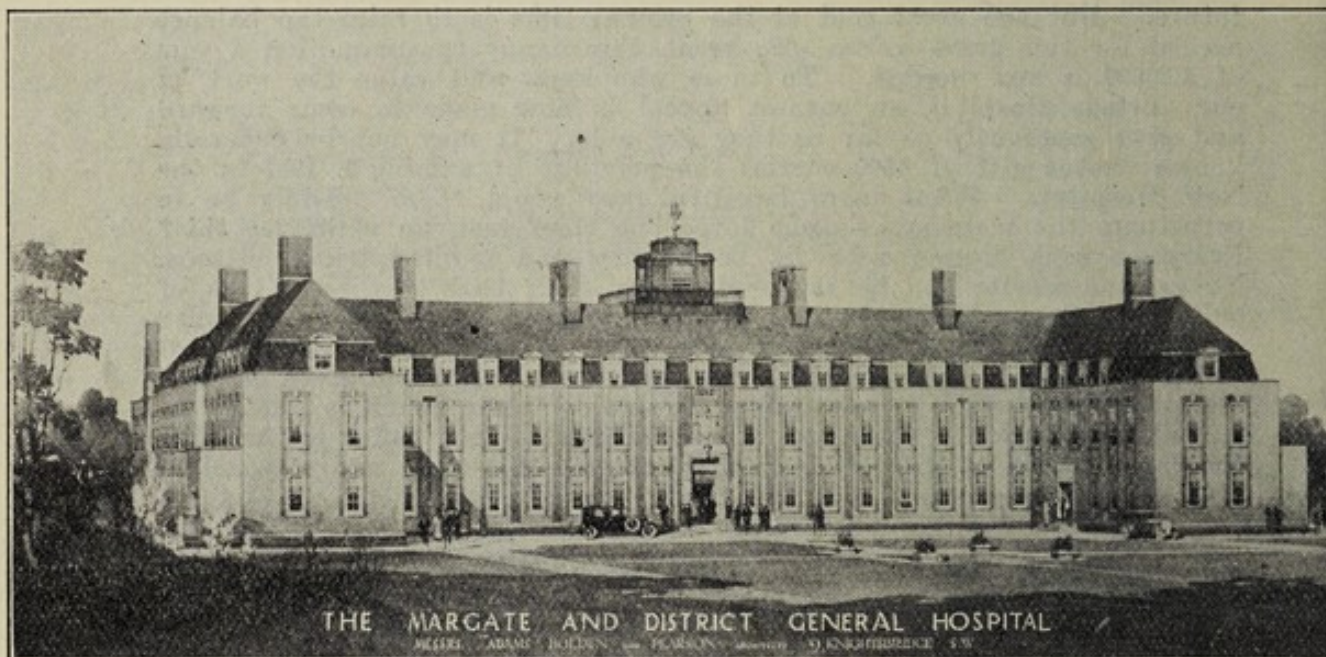

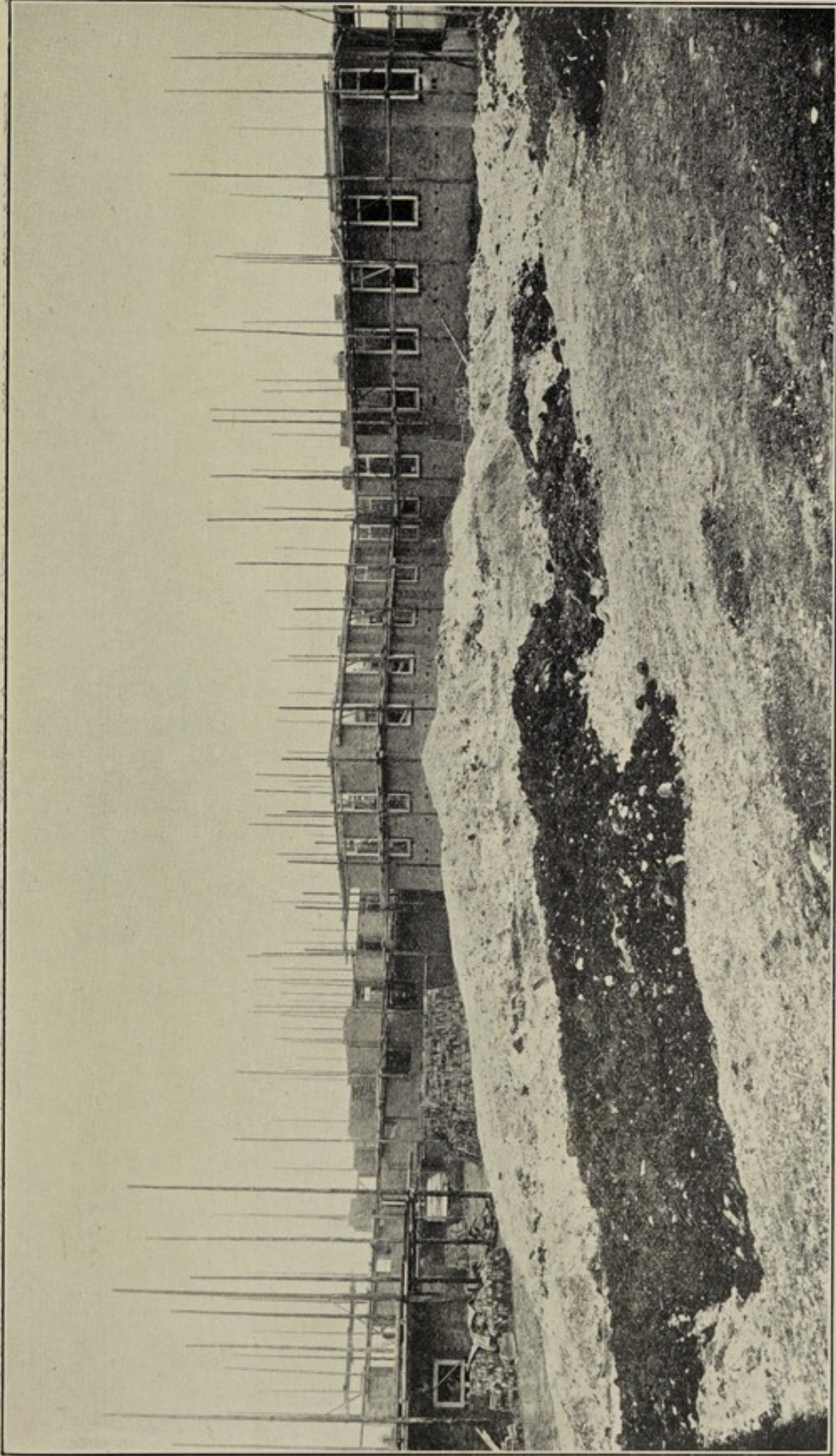


A WORD CONCERNING OUR NEW HOSPITAL.

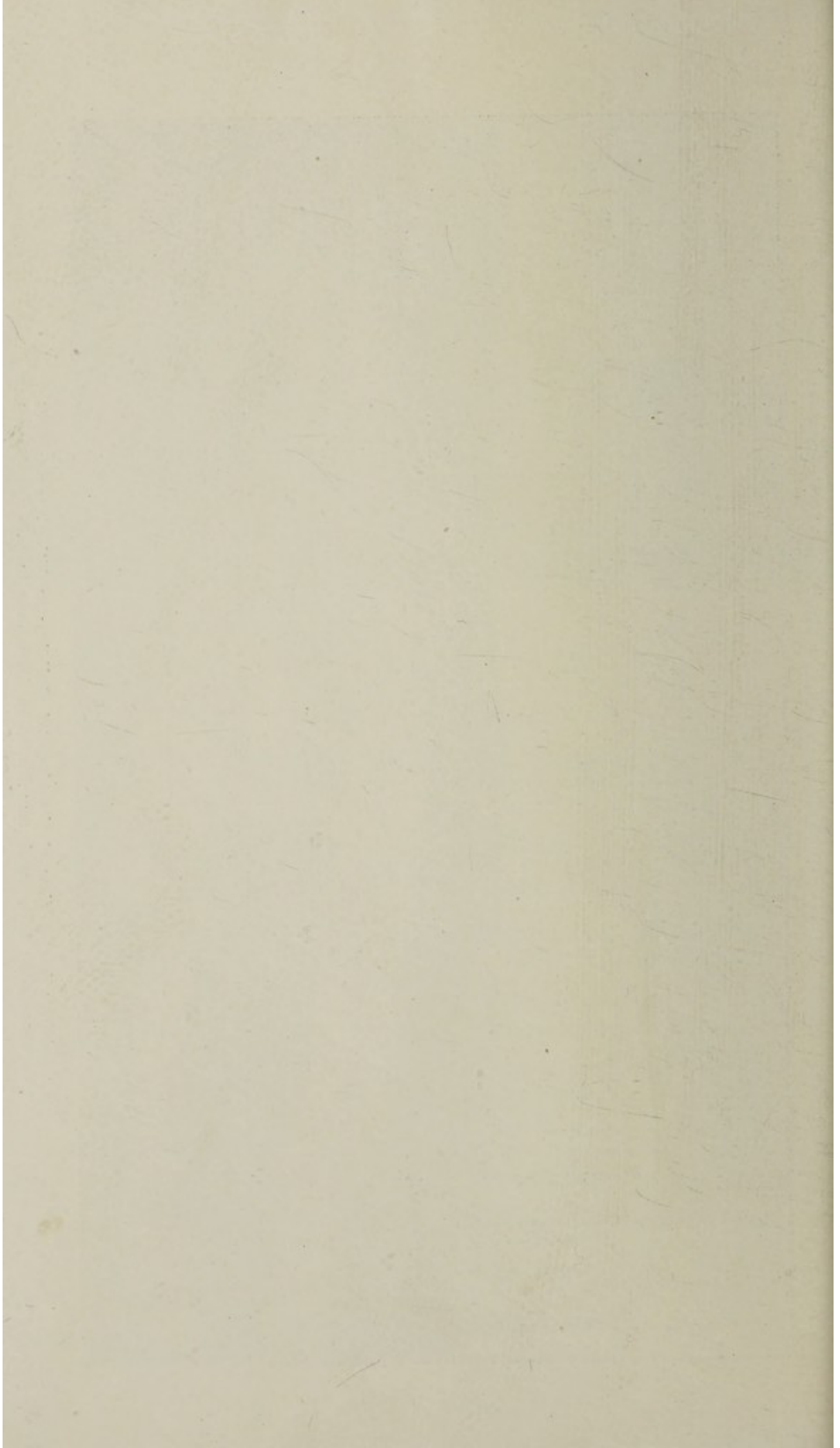
The new Hospital—of which an illustration of the front elevation appears on this page—is being built on an ideal open site on the south side of St. Peter's Road, Margate, and will command beautiful views both of the country and the sea. It will be easily accessible from Westgate-on-Sea, Birchington, Broadstairs, St. Peter's, and Kingsgate, as well as from all parts of the Borough of Margate.

The Architects are Messrs. Adams, Holden and Pearson, Knightsbridge, London, S.W.1. As will be seen from the photograph, they have designed a building which shows solidity with dignity, and as they have built over seventy hospitals throughout the country, it need hardly be said that the Hospital will be constructed on modern, scientific principles, with a strict regard to utility and economy in working.

The present design is for eighty beds, with ample room for extension when the occasion arises. There will be medical, surgical, and children's wards, and special departments for X-ray and ophthalmic cases, a section for out-patients, and special provision for paying patients—a much felt want.

The principal interior arrangements of the new Hospital are as follows:—

Ground Floor: X-ray department, out-patients' department, with special surgery, ophthalmic department, kitchen, domestic offices, medical wards for men and women, special wards for paying patients, together with administration department, board room, and Secretary's office.

First Floor: Children's ward, nurses' dining-room, matron's apartments, resident medical officer's rooms, operating theatre with anæsthetic room adjoining, special surgeons' room, large male and female surgical wards, with sun balconies adjoining.

Second Floor: Accommodation for nursing and domestic staffs, and nurses' recreation room.

The Special Appeal Committee is now working strenuously to raise by voluntary effort the large sum needed for the building and equipment. This will cost over £60,000. Towards this amount no less than £43,000 has now been raised, chiefly by local efforts. It may be mentioned that beds in the present Cottage Hospital are continuously being occupied by London and provincial visitors suffering from accidents or acute illness needing special attention. A considerable number of out-patient visitors are also treated each year. Already the present accommodation is taxed beyond its capacity, and has necessitated the erection of a new temporary ward to cope with the increasing pressure and to be ready for any emergency which may arise.

But the Committee are confident that the people of Thanet and friends of the Margate Cottage Hospital will rally round them in this great local effort. They would specially appeal to all Margate people who have left the town, to those who received their earlier education here or whose children are now here at School, to all who have recovered their health as a result of its wonderful air, and to the great number of visitors—to whom the doors of the Hospital are always open—who enjoy its many attractions each year. Any gift which they may feel disposed to give towards this effort will be most gratefully received and thankfully acknowledged.

RULES.

I.

THE Hospital is designed for the accommodation of the poor, when suffering from accident or acute disease requiring hospital treatment. Persons suffering from fits, mental diseases, or chronic complaints, and cases of an infectious or contagious nature will not be admitted. Accidents requiring hospital treatment are to be admitted by the Matron on application at the Hospital. Acute recent cases may be admitted by the Surgeon on duty. Cases not urgent will only be admitted on application to the Medical Superintendent.

II.

There shall be a President and five Vice-Presidents of the Hospital, all of whom shall be annual subscribers of not less than One Guinea, the first appointment of such to be made by the subscribers at a general meeting, subsequent vacancies arising to be filled by the subscribers at the Annual Meeting held in February, or at a Special General Meeting called for that purpose. The President shall be elected annually, and may be proposed for re-election, but no President shall hold office for more than three years consecutively.

III.

The Establishment shall be under the management and control of a committee, consisting of twelve members, all of whom shall be annual subscribers of not less than Half-a-Guinea, and one delegate from the local lodge of Odd Fellows (Manchester Unity), one from the local court of Ancient Order of Foresters, one from the Amalgamated Societies' Hospital Sunday Fund Committee to act in each year that a Church Parade is organized by that committee in aid of the Hospital, and one from the Penny Weekly Fund Committee. In case of vacancies arising among the representatives of Subscribers, the remaining members on the Committee may appoint other subscribers (duly qualified) to fill such vacancies, all such appointments to be subject to confirmation at the next general meeting of subscribers; any such vacancies can also be filled up at a general meeting. Three members of the Committee of Management shall retire by rotation each year, but they shall be eligible for re-election at the Annual General Meeting. The President, Vice-Presidents, Medical Officers and Treasurer shall be *ex-officio* members of the Committee.

The Committee of Management, five of whom shall form a quorum, shall meet on or about the second Thursday in the

months of January, April, July and October, to transact the business of the Hospital.

IV.

The Medical and Surgical Staff shall consist of the Medical Superintendent and other Surgeons, to be from time to time appointed by the Committee. These gentlemen shall be on duty (two at a time) for successive periods of one month, each taking chief duty for half such period. The names of the Surgeons on duty shall be posted at the Hospital, and it shall be a condition of the appointment of every such Surgeon that he shall be in telephonic communication with the Hospital at his own expense.

Each Surgeon to the Hospital, or Surgeon in charge of a patient, is expected to keep a record of his case by filling in the bed ticket, and also entering the necessary details in a book provided for the purpose.

The Committee shall have power from time to time to appoint a Medical and Surgical Superintendent or other Officer, and to remove him and appoint any other gentleman in his place, if they think such a step advisable in the interests of the Hospital.

V.

The domestic arrangements shall be under the Management and Superintendence of a Visiting Committee, consisting of the Finance Committee for the time being, which shall be appointed by the General Committee.

VI.

All patients (except in cases of emergency) must be provided with decent clothing, and proper change of linen. Every other requisite will be provided in the Hospital, and patients may not receive food or drink from any other source without the consent of their Medical Attendant. Patients will be expected to obey the rules of the Hospital, and submit to the control of the Surgeon in charge.

VII.

Friends of patients will be admitted from 2 to 4 p.m. on Sundays, and 1.30 to 3.0 p.m. on Thursdays, and at other times subject to the discretion of the Surgeon in charge.

VIII.

The Hospital shall be FREE, but patients and their friends are invited to contribute voluntarily to the maintenance of the Hospital in proportion to their means and the benefits received.

IX.

The funds for the establishment and support of the Hospital being raised by voluntary contributions, a statement

of the receipts and expenditure (examined by the Committee, and duly certified by an Auditor to be appointed at a general meeting of subscribers), shall be forwarded to each annual subscriber.

X.

A general meeting of subscribers to the amount of 5s. and upwards, and donors to the amount of £5 and upwards, shall be held annually in the month of February (notice of such meeting shall be sent to each subscriber qualified to vote, and duly advertised in the local press), and at such meeting the report of the Committee of Management shall be received and the accounts submitted. A special general meeting may be convened at any time on the requisition of ten annual subscribers of not less than 5s., and the purpose of such meeting shall be stated in the notice. For the purpose of voting at a general meeting, a person shall be deemed to be a subscriber who has duly paid an annual subscription before such meeting, or who has been the medium of collecting a sum of not less than £2 towards the funds of the Hospital during the period of twelve months immediately preceding such meeting.

An Executor or Trustee of a deceased person who has bequeathed a legacy of not less than £50 to the Hospital, shall be entitled to rank as a donor, the first named Executor or Trustee being entitled to exercise this right for the time being.

Subject to the approval of the Committee, and so far as it can be carried out, donors of a sum of £500 or upwards shall have the right to attach a special name or designation to any bed in the Hospital. If £500 be left to the Hospital by will, the bequest shall be free of legacy duty under this Rule.

XI.

The freehold property, hospital furniture and other effects, belonging to the Institution, shall be vested in the Trustees. In case of vacancies arising in the number of Trustees whereby they shall be reduced to less than three, the remaining Trustees shall nominate others to fill such vacancies.

XII.

These rules may be altered or added to at a general meeting of subscribers and donors, especially convened for that purpose, provided notice of such proposed alteration shall have been sent to the Secretary not less than fourteen days prior to such meeting, and shall have been stated on the notice convening the meeting. The Committee shall, however, have power to make alterations, which shall be in force until the next general meeting of subscribers, when they shall be submitted for confirmation or otherwise.

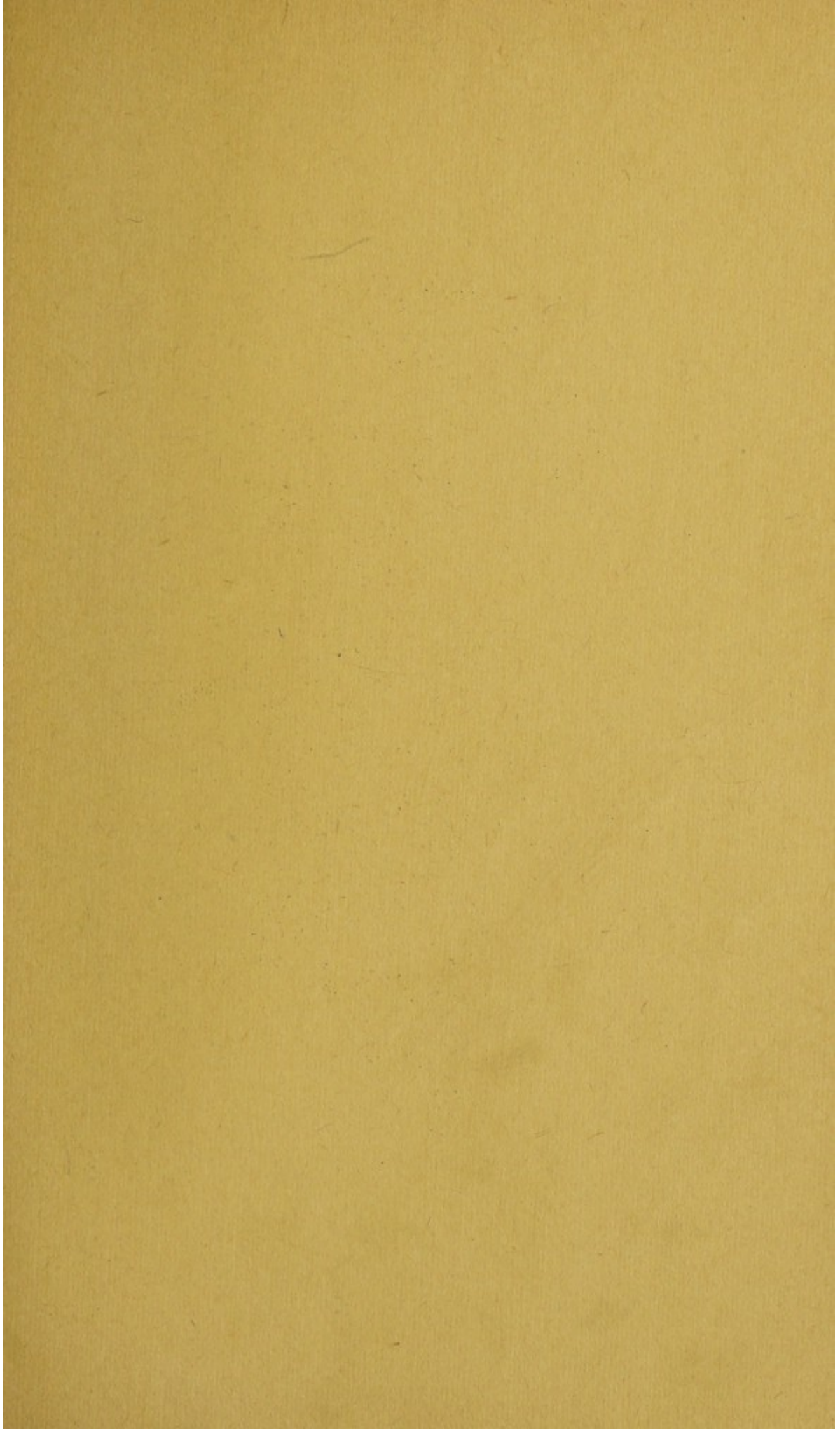

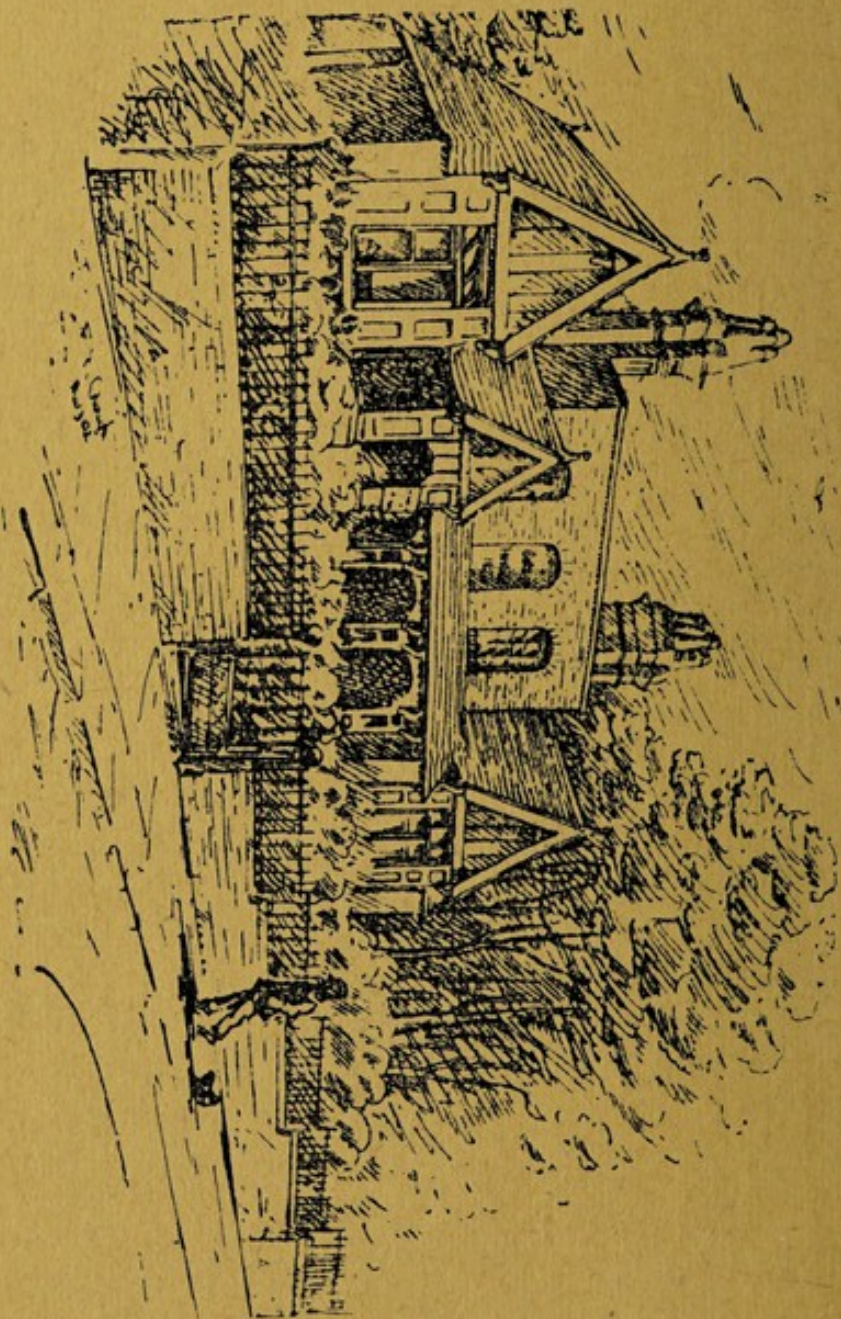
