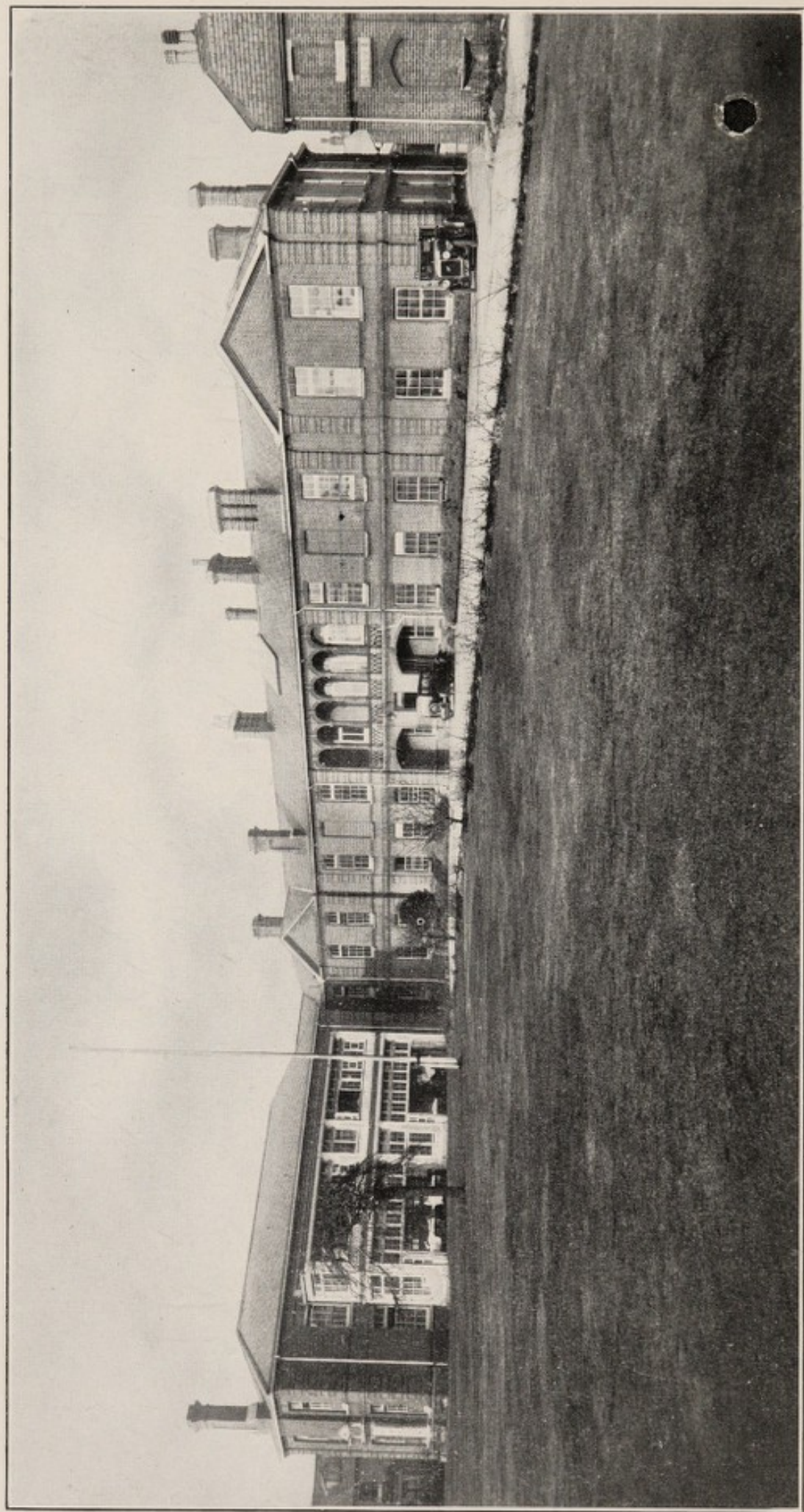

MINUTES

The Minutes of the last Meeting, having been read and confirmed, were signed by the Chairman.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Mr. P. L. Swindell presented the Financial Statement of Income and Expenditure for the half-year ended 31st March, 1934.

Moved by Mr. P. L. Swindell, seconded by Rev. Canon H. J. Enraght, M.A., and resolved that the Financial Statement be approved and adopted.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Mr. C. W. Dance presented the Report of the Management Committee as follows :—

The financial position of the Hospital at 31st March was more satisfactory than a year ago—the gross ordinary income for the half-year being £5468 13s. 0d., compared with £5090 18s. 8d. last year.

Annual Subscriptions show an increase of £9 16s. 8d., which is due to recovery of Income Tax on Subscriptions paid under a 7 years agreement. There are a few Subscriptions in arrears, otherwise the increase shown would have been larger.

The Contributory Scheme maintains steady progress. The total sum received being £2579 11s. 9d., compared with £2395 17s. 2d. a year ago.

Payments by and on behalf of patients have increased from £542 5s. 5d. to £658 18s. 5d., due chiefly to the settlement of several claims under the Road Traffic Act.

Donations and Boxes amount to £285 16s. 1d., an increase of £51 12s. 3d. compared with last year.

Entertainments total £98 2s. 8d., compared with £53 13s. 4d. last year.

The Receipts from Maternity Cases amount to £116 0s. 6d., compared with £94 1s. 0d. in the previous year.

£97 was received from the Stock Exchange Dramatic and Operatic Society compared with £85 last year. This represents the Hospital's share of participation in the sale of the Society's "Help-Yourself" Annuals. It is hoped that the efforts of Dr. Walker and Mr. W. H. Hallett may be rewarded with successful results again this year.

It is regretted that payments by Private Ward Patients have again declined. The total receipts were £191 18s. 0d. compared with £237 11d. 0d. a year ago. Private Ward Subscriptions also show a small decrease.

Collections in places of Worship and from other sources show a decline from £95 6s. 9d. to £84 10s. 4d.

A Legacy of £100 has been received from the Exors. of Mr. Paul Aggio of Elmstead, Essex. This Legacy has been invested in War Loan 3½% Inscribed Stock.

Your Committee are pleased to report that a Hospital Ball was held at the Grand Hotel on 30th November last, and realized £32 8s. 8d., for the benefit of the Hospital. The organization of this effort was splendidly carried out by Messrs. J. E. and T. H. Tuttle.

The Ordinary Expenditure for the six months amounted to £4703 18s. 3d. against £4528 13s. 1d. for the corresponding period a year ago. The Chief headings under which increases are shown are—Domestic, Salaries and Wages (Nurses, etc.), and Establishment.

The Patients' Days Maintenance for the six months ended 31st March were 9,623 compared with 9,432 for the corresponding period last year. The Staff Days Maintenance were 8,266 compared with 8,072 in the previous year.

The Programme of Cleaning and Painting for this year will be carried out for the sum of £178 10s. 0d.

Alexandra Rose Day will be celebrated on Wednesday, 13th June, and Lady Jackson has very kindly promised to organize the effort again this year. An appeal is made to all who have given assistance in previous years to continue their help.

The Lowestoft Town Council has kindly granted permission for the use of Nicholas Everitt Park for a Fete on Thursday, 12th July, and a Committee under the Chairmanship of Mr. Leslie Freeman, has undertaken the organizing of this effort.

The Town Council has also given permission for a Fete to be held on the South Pier on 16th August, upon the same terms as last year.

The Lowestoft Operatic and Dramatic Society has again kindly promised to organize this event.

It is hoped that the Governors will render all support possible to both Fetes.

The Honorary Secretaries and Collectors of the Contributory Scheme and Depot Holders for "Egg" and "Pound" Days were entertained to afternoon Tea on Thursday, 3rd May, at St. Margaret's Institute. An interesting address was given by Mr. Arthur E. Tuttle, J.P., and was much appreciated. The Management Committee looks upon this annual function as an excellent means of keeping in touch with those who, by their zeal, do so much for the Hospital.

In view of the splendid support given to the Hospital by the Contributory Scheme, your Committee recommends that the Contributory Scheme Honorary Secretaries at their next Annual Meeting be permitted to elect four members to serve on the Management Committee instead of two as heretofore.

After a great deal of consideration and obtaining samples of various coverings for floors, your Committee has decided to have the section of the Top Corridor, from Archway to Lift Door, covered in rubber.

It is hoped that quietness will thus be obtained and so remove a cause of complaint from those occupying the Private Wards.

It has been decided to strengthen the Nursing Staff by the addition of a Sister and a Staff Nurse, while the services of the most promising of the Probationer Nurses are to be retained for a longer period than hitherto.

The Hospital has sustained a serious loss by the death of Mr. Arthur Youngman, Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee and Chairman of Finance Committee. The invaluable services rendered to the Institution by Mr. Youngman are eloquently reflected in the present sound position of its finances.

Mr. C. W. Dance who has been a member of the Management Committee since 1919 and whose services as Chairman of the Contributory Scheme are well known to all, has been elected Vice-Chairman.

Mr. P. L. Swindell has been elected Chairman of the Finance Committee.

A Development Committee has been formed to consider the present and future needs of the Hospital, with a view to careful planning to avoid overlapping and duplicating of expenditure.

The first step must necessarily be the provision of a suitable Nurses' Hostel, and it is hoped shortly to proceed with this urgent necessity.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The Management Committee has pleasure in submitting its Report for the year ended 30th September, 1934.

IN-PATIENTS

The number of In-Patients admitted during the year was 1,153, compared with 1,121 in the previous year. Included in these figures are 46 patients admitted to the Private Wards compared with 47 last year, and the average period of residence in the Private Wards was 17 days.

OUT-PATIENTS

The Out-Patient attendances, including Dental, Ophthalmic, and X-Ray, number 7,872, in addition to 2,249 Minor Casualties and 9,158 Dressings, a total of 19,279 attendances compared with 15,161 in the previous year.

There were also 249 Operations performed in the Out-Patients' Department, compared with 243 last year.

ALMONRY SUB-COMMITTEE

The Almonry Sub-Committee considered 47 cases during the past year. Individual investigation has been carried out in nearly every instance, and this Committee has enlarged its scope by helping necessitous cases.

Your Committee appreciates the very helpful work which this Sub-Committee continues to carry out.

VENEREAL DISEASES CLINIC

This Centre has now been in operation for eleven months, and the arrangements with the East Suffolk County Council are working quite satisfactorily.

MOTOR ACCIDENTS

During the year 24 cases arising from accidents, in which Motor Vehicles have been concerned, have been admitted.

16 Claims have been settled during the year. There are still a number of cases in which negotiations are proceeding with insurance companies.

The total expenditure for the financial year amounted to £9,813 15s. 0d., compared with £9,224 16s. 1d., an increase of £588 18s. 11d., and leaving a debit balance of £250 6s. 5d. on the year's Working. EXPENDITURE

The liabilities at the end of the financial year were £4,546 2s. 6d., consisting of Overdraft on current account £3,631 0s. 9d., and outstanding creditors £915 1s. 9d. FINANCE

Against these liabilities are assets £1,220 3s. 10d., consisting of sundry debtors £893 8s. 7d., value of Stock in hand £271 14s. 11d., cash in hand £53 4s. 2d., and National Health Insurance Stamps £1 16s. 2d.

The sum of £990 16s. 6d. has been received from Annual Subscriptions, being an increase of £20 3s. 10d. compared with the previous year. The increase is due to the recovery of Income Tax on Subscriptions paid under Deed of Covenant. Four new subscribers have been obtained. Six subscribers have been lost by death, and 8 subscriptions have been discontinued owing to removal from the district or on financial grounds. The proportion of surgical and medical cases remains fairly constant—this year, instead of including births in the Hospital in the list of Medical cases, they are shown among the Maternity Department cases—otherwise the number of medical cases would be 329 compared with 321 last year.

Attention is called to the number of casualties admitted—these number 152, including 50 fractures. These latter accounted for 1,631 days' detention—an average of 32.6 days per patient.

The work of the Maternity Ward is also increasing; thirty-five children were born in Hospital this year, an increase of 9 over last year.

Last year we commented with a note of optimism upon a tendency of the Out-Patient figures to shew signs of decreasing: this year there is at first glance a considerable increase in nearly every department. Most noticeably is this the case in the Orthopaedic Department where the figures are more than double those of last year. In this department 160 new cases were seen—evidence that there is a growing need in the public mind for this department, to which we welcome Mr. H. A. Brittain, F.R.C.S. on his appointment as Honorary Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon.

Last year the average attendance of casualties for dressings had been decreased from roughly $8\frac{1}{2}$ attendances per case to 6; this year the figure is roughly $4\frac{1}{2}$ attendances per case. This is a step in the right direction and is indicative of a realization that the Out-Patient Department exists primarily as a consultative centre and to render first aid to casualties, which subsequently should obtain treatment, where possible, from their private practitioners. It has thus come about that while the casualties increased by practically 80%, the dressings only increased by 25%.

REPORT OF OPHTHALMIC DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH SEPTEMBER, 1934

The number of new Out-Patients for the year was 211, 6 more than the previous year, and the total attendances numbered 1,752, an increase of 380 on the previous year, and giving an average attendance of about 36 on each Out-Patient Day.

The In-Patient figures are exactly the same as the previous year, i.e. 16 patients admitted and 13 operations.

REPORT OF THE ANTE-NATAL CLINIC FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH SEPTEMBER, 1934

During the last 12 months 20 sessions have been held. 18 patients have attended, an increase on last year's figures. The total attendances made were 43. This is an average of about 2.4 attendances per patient. This is a lower average than one would wish, but it is due, I think, to the fact that many patients do not attend until late in their pregnancy, when further attendances become impossible.

REPORT OF THE HONORARY MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

NURSING
SERVICE

The Nursing Staff has been augmented to meet the wishes of the Management Committee and of the Honorary Medical Staff and there is now a much larger proportion of trained Nurses.

The Nursing Service in small provincial Hospitals is a greater difficulty than in large Hospitals, as any well-educated and ambitious girl naturally wishes to get her training in a big Hospital and may be willing and able to pay for a preliminary training before she does any Ward Work.

A small provincial Hospital cannot afford to have a preliminary training school, and in any case the number of new probationers would hardly justify it, and so the nurses have to do their preliminary training and Ward Work together, which means much harder work.

The Matron of this Hospital is trying to arrange to get her probationers in batches and give them one month's preliminary training without full Ward Work.

It is not easy to arrange this as hitherto probationers have come at any time in the year and naturally finish their training at any time and require to be replaced at once, as the Staff is not large enough to supply spare nurses, but the idea is such an excellent one in promoting efficient nursing that Matron hopes to work it in gradually.

We still hope to have a Nurses' Hostel, but the new House in Alexandra Road is helping by housing five nurses, who would have been lodged outside at 12/- per week for each nurse, and has also released one bedroom in the Hospital to give an extra ward for Maternity Work.

These continue to do increasingly good work and justify the Committee's foresight in providing them.

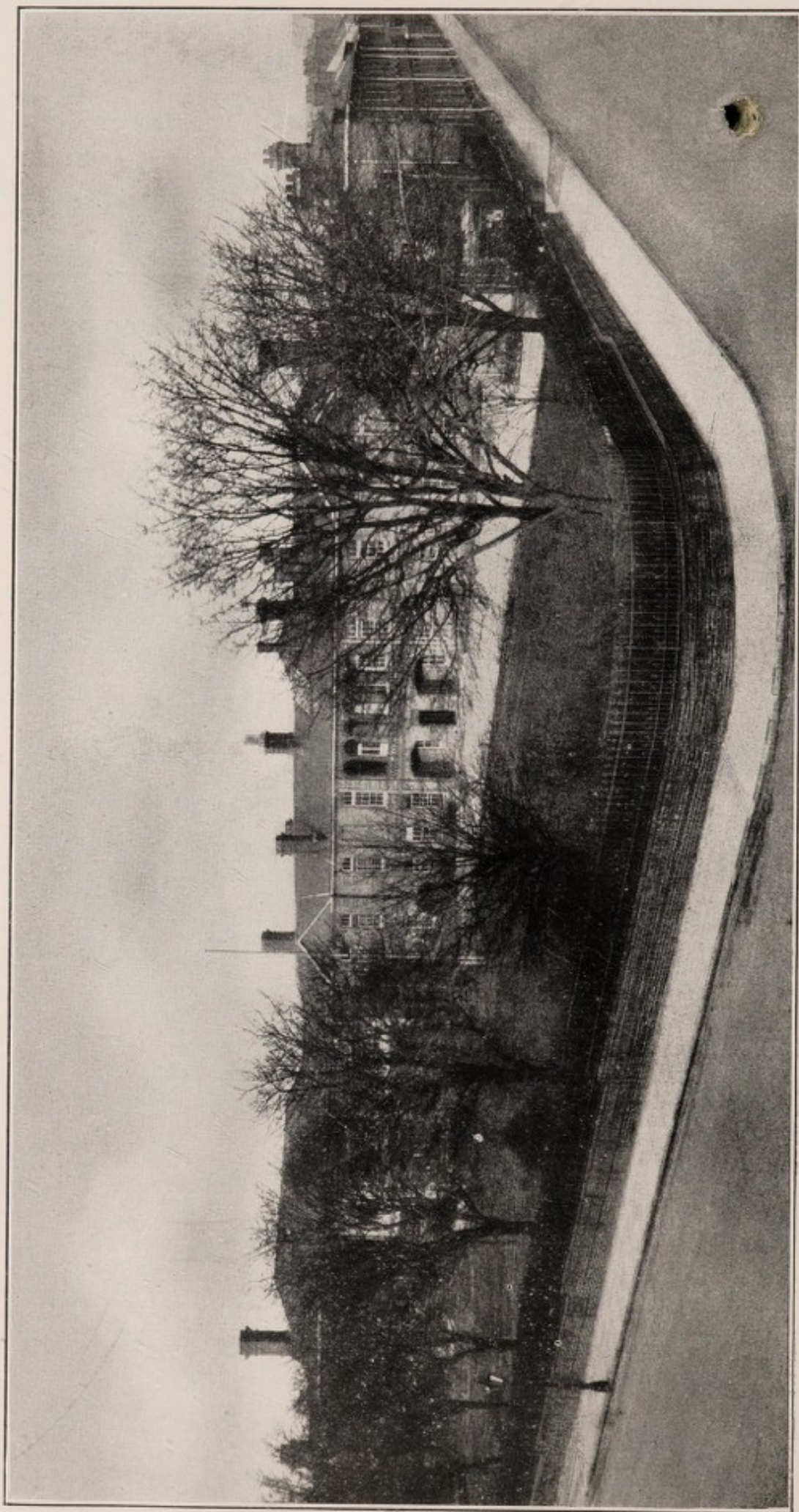

PRIVATE WARDS

THESE Wards were established to meet the requirements of those who desire privacy and at the same time wish to receive the advantages of Hospital treatment. The wards are very comfortable and are pleasantly situated.

Patients are under the care of a member of the Honorary Medical Staff, and have the services of the resident House Surgeons. In addition, their own Doctor, if not on the Staff of the Hospital, or any other doctor, may be called in as a consultant.

The charges for nursing and maintenance at present in force are :

Single Bed Ward, £5 5s. 0d. per week.

Two Bedded Ward, £4 14s. 6d. per week.

Medical Fees are a matter of arrangement between patient and doctor in all cases.

PRIVATE WARD SCHEME

This is a Contributory Scheme in connection with the Private Wards. A member of the Scheme, by the payment of a yearly Subscription, is able to have the use of one of these Wards for a Period of 28 days at the reduced charge of 3s. per day, but in the event of the 28 days being exceeded the standard rate then in force will be charged.

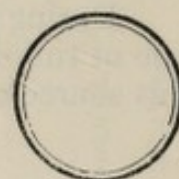
