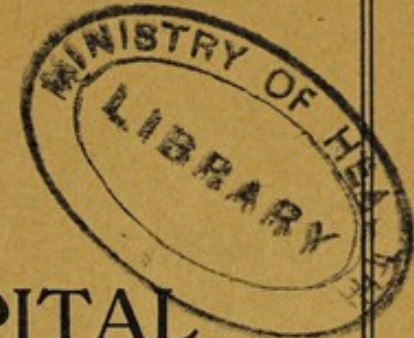

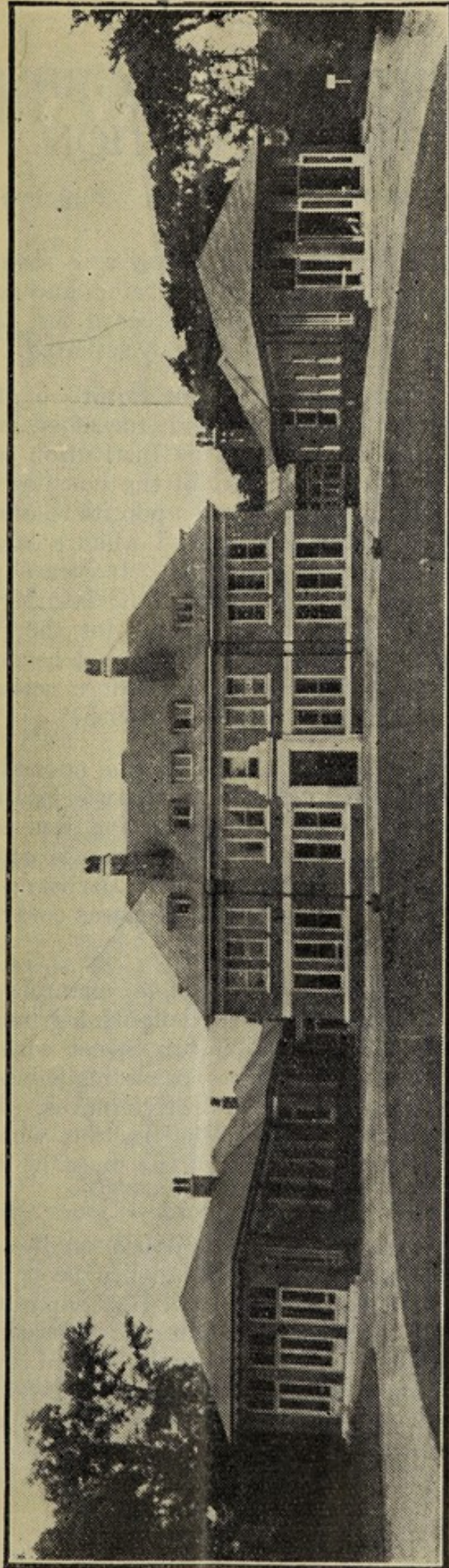

THE RISE AND PROGRESS OF THE INSTITUTION.

THE Lytham Hospital stands to-day as a monument to the benefactors who brought it into being, and as a permanent tribute to their sympathetic regard for the well-being of the community and relief of human suffering.

Sixty-one years ago, the then Squire of Lytham gave the land, built the structure, and furnished and equipped the Lytham Cottage Hospital. This Institution served its day and generation, and was the start of the hospital movement in the Lytham district. The demand upon its resources increased as time went on, and the day arrived when a larger and more up-to-date Hospital became essential. It was a prospect that made a strong appeal to the heart of the late Mr. Edward W. Mellor, J.P., who encouraged a scheme for the reconstruction of the building in such a way that it would become a hospital possessing all the advantages which modern science, operative skill and nursing efficiency could establish.

The original Cottage Hospital was opened on the 3rd August, 1871, and on October 19th, 1929, was laid the first stone of the present building. The construction was commenced in 1927, and was completed, at an approximate cost of £21,000, in time for the official opening by Lord Derby on October 4th, 1930. The greater proportion of the cost was contributed by the late Mr. Mellor.

The present structure is a fine example of Georgian architecture, standing in its own delightful grounds, of about two acres, at the junction of Warton Street with East Beach. The layout is of independent blocks, providing men's and women's wards joined to the main administrative offices. To the rear of the women's ward is the maternity section which, according to the Ministry of Health, is one of the finest of its kind in the country.

The Hospital is fitted and supplied on the most modern and efficient lines, and recently there has been installed what may be termed the "last word" in X-Ray apparatus. The cost of this, including the necessary internal alterations, has been about £2,000, which is being gradually raised by public subscription. This installation is proving of untold value to the medical staff in diagnosing the ailments of their patients and in giving relief to sufferers.

61st ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE COMMITTEE OF LYTHAM HOSPITAL,
For the Year ending 31st December, 1932.

THE Sixty-first Annual Report of the Lytham Hospital was presented at a meeting of the Governors held on March 29th, 1933, when the Chairman of the Committee, Captain W. E. Nuttall, presided. The Report is as follows:—

The year has been one of high endeavour and considerable achievement.

In every direction there has been increased pressure on the resources of the Hospital. There has been an increase of patients (in-patients and out-patients), with a corresponding increase of expense.

At the same time, however, the income has expanded, more money being received from subscribers and from patients themselves, and the Committee consider in the circumstances, that an excess of expenditure over income of only £224 for the year, is evidence of careful management.

With this economy there has been combined a high state of efficiency. The General Nursing Council for England and Wales, reporting on the condition of the Hospital, states that there is none better in the country.

This should be as gratifying to the subscribers as it is to the Committee. Within the limits of our funds, everything possible has been done to win back to health and strength those who have unfortunately needed the Hospital's help.

Our Institution, of course, is still far from complete. It must remain so until more money is available. In the first place, we need more beds. Several cases, fortunately not of an urgent nature, have had to wait for admission during the year, and it is apparent that as the district grows we shall have to provide more accommodation.

Then the necessity for a children's ward becomes more pronounced every year. Young children have to be placed in one of the main wards, often to the inconvenience of older patients.

We think that we can construct a convenient children's ward in the present group of buildings as soon as funds permit, which, we hope, will not be long delayed.

HOSPITAL STATISTICS.

These figures speak for themselves, but it should be stated in explanation that "out-patient attendances" means the total number of visits paid by out-patients to the department during the year.

In the same way, "in-patient days" means the total number of days spent in the Hospital by the total number of patients in residence during the year.

Thus, there have been 455 patients in the Hospital during the year, some for short periods, some for long periods, but for a total period of 8,065 days. The average duration of stay was 2 weeks 5 days.

The Income and Expenses Account is furnished in detail with this Report, but attention is directed to the low cost per "in-patient day," roughly, 9s. 6½d. This includes provisions, surgery, administration, and all overhead expenses.

It is a little more than last year, but remains a small figure compared with the inestimable boon of the Hospital treatment to patients.

The total expenditure for the year was £3,850 19s. 9d. as against £3,584 5s. 11d. This is an increase on last year of £120, establishment charges being £90 more, and provisions, £12 more.

Payment by in-patients amounted to £2,038 5s. 0d., an increase on the previous year of £261.

The increase of annual subscriptions by £150, to £412, is gratifying to the Committee, and they hope that the list will be further augmented in the current year.

MOTOR ACCIDENT CASES.

These cases have numbered 21 during the year, and have cost the Hospital £266. Against this we have received £156. For four cases, representing a sum of £45, which the Hospital should receive, we are unlikely to draw anything.

The loss incurred by hospitals all over the country, in connection with these cases, is causing grave concern.

THE GARDEN FETE.

The net proceeds for 1932 were £757 8s. 6d. This event has become of great importance to the Hospital. The Committee do not like being dependent for revenue to such an extent upon the chances of an English summer day, but until some other source of revenue can be found, it is essential that there should be no slackening of effort to make the Annual Garden Fete a success. The Committee owe profound thanks to the enthusiastic organisers.

THE X-RAY FUND.

Further donations during 1932 total £806 17s. 1d. The cost of the new equipment, together with the special expense attending the installation, is £1,428 10s. 6d. There is still a balance owing of £492 5s. 4d., and we have until June, 1936, in which to pay this off. It is the Committee's earnest hope that they will be able to extinguish this debt in the current year.

THE INVESTMENT FUND.

In the early part of 1932, we received £1,000 from Miss Rigg, in memory of her brother, the late James Henry Rigg, who was a friend to the Hospital over a number of years. This has been

added to the investment account, which, now standing at £11,687, shows a capital appreciation of nearly £500, as a result of selling our holdings in War Loan and the India 3½% Stock, and re-investing the proceeds.

THE LINEN LEAGUE.

Contributions, both in money and kind, from the ladies of the Linen League, continue to be a source of invaluable assistance to the Hospital. In addition to contributing £107 to the Garden Fete from the Linen League Stall, they provided £100 for the X-Ray Fund. To this Fund also the wives of the doctors gave £80 as the result of a Bridge Drive which they organised.

The organisers of the Alexandra Rose Day have been the means of contributing £82 19s. 1d. to the funds of the Hospital. We owe many thanks to Mrs. Sewell and her helpers for this.

ENTERTAINMENTS.

We have received a half-share of the Mellor Lecture Fund, value £70 ; £47 from an American Tea, organised by Mrs. Penry; £16 17s. 5½d., from the Fair Ground on Lytham Club Day ; £20 0s. 1d., from a Children's Swimming Gala ; and £1 from the Alicia Cottrell entertainments.

AFFILIATION WITH WAKEFIELD.

During the year, the details were completed whereby, thanks to the assistance of Mr. H. Gornall, Lytham Hospital is now affiliated with the Clayton Hospital at Wakefield. This enables us to accept probationary nurses for training, which will be to the ultimate advantage of hospitals in general, and Lytham in particular.

Incidentally, the Hospital has formed a branch of the National Savings Association, to which most of the members of the staff are contributing. A substantial sum has already accrued to the members, who have purchased Savings Certificates as the result of their thrift.

The Report and the Statement of Accounts were adopted at the Annual Meeting of Governors, when votes of thanks were accorded the President, the Honorary Officers of the Institution, the Medical Staff, Matron and Hospital Staff, the ladies of the Linen League, and the ladies who have undertaken special work during the year.

It was decided that the General Committee shall consist of not less than 18 and not more than 30 Governors, and the following members of the Committee were re-elected :—Mrs. A. Grime, Mrs. Tweedale, Mr. H. Gornall, Mr. J. W. Turner, Mr. W. Wilkinson, Mr. H. Williams and Mr. R. E. Whitaker.

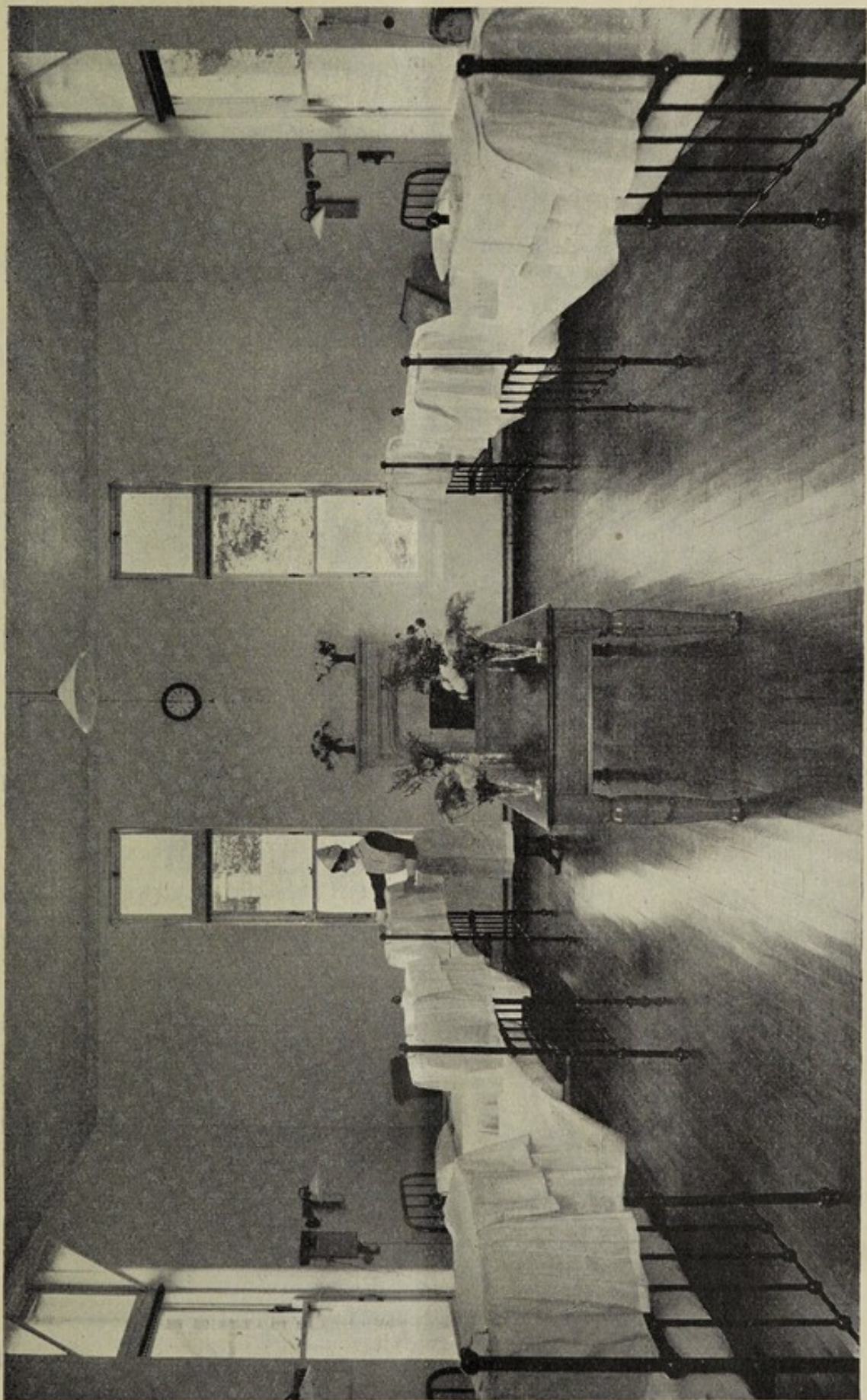

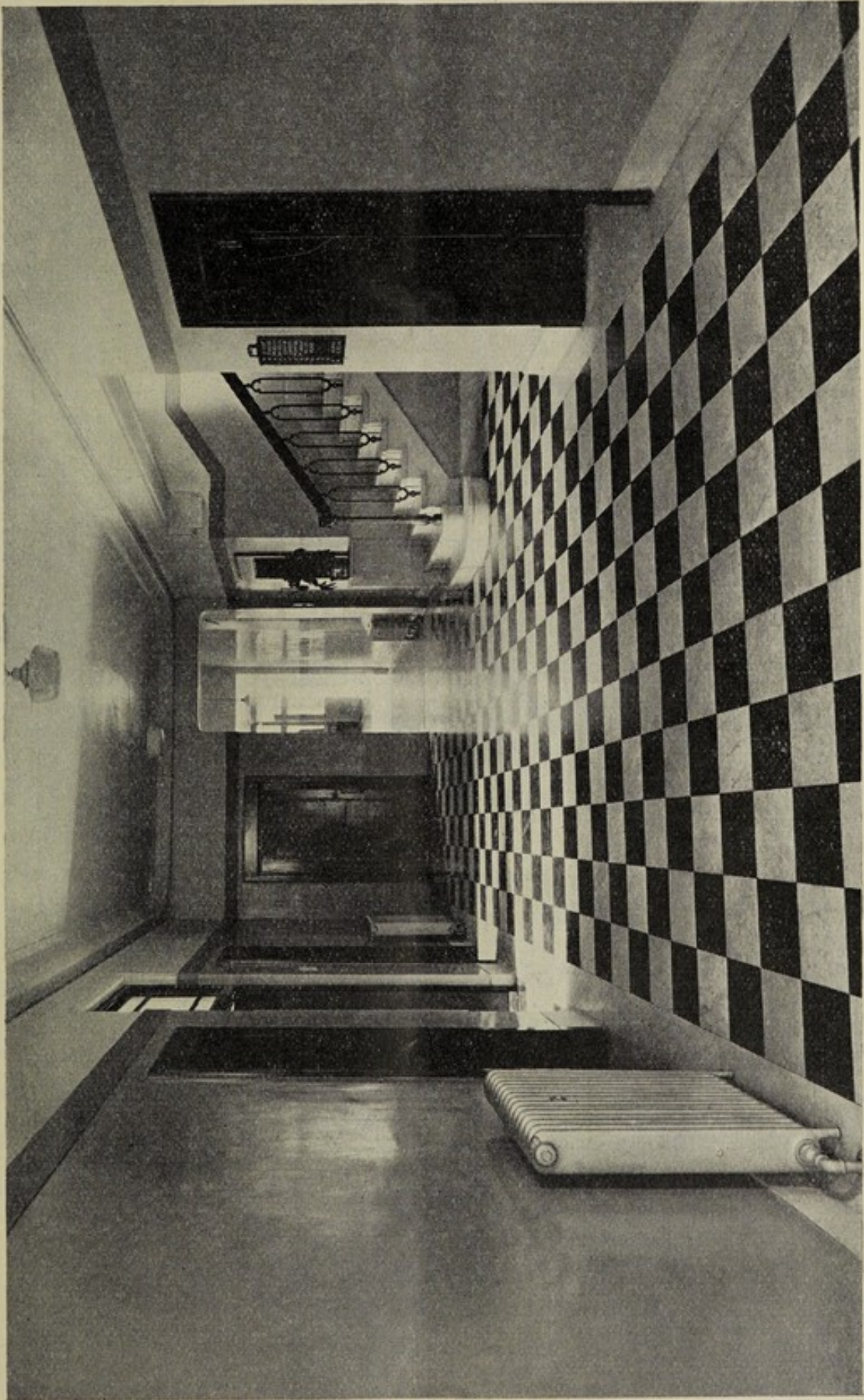

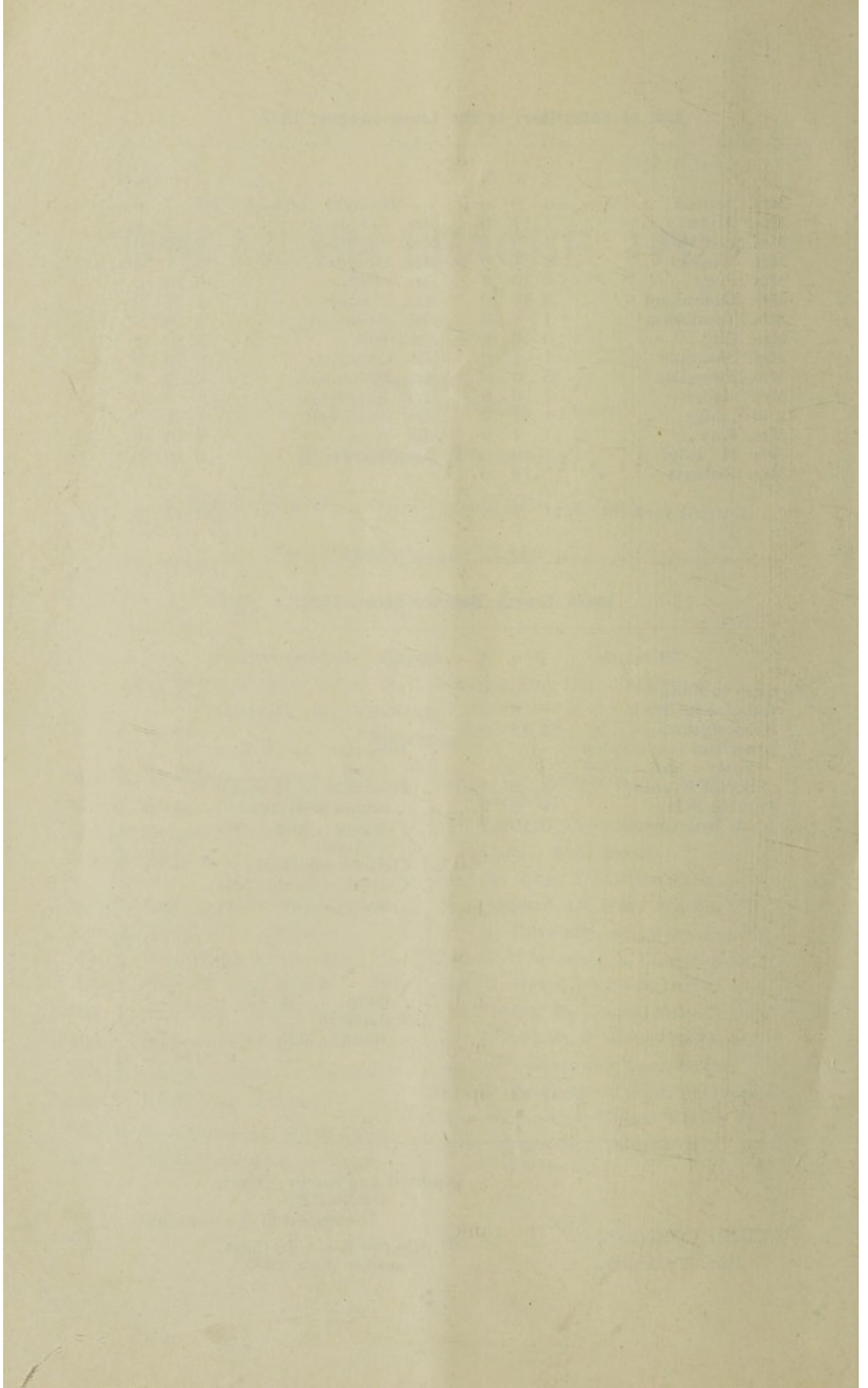
