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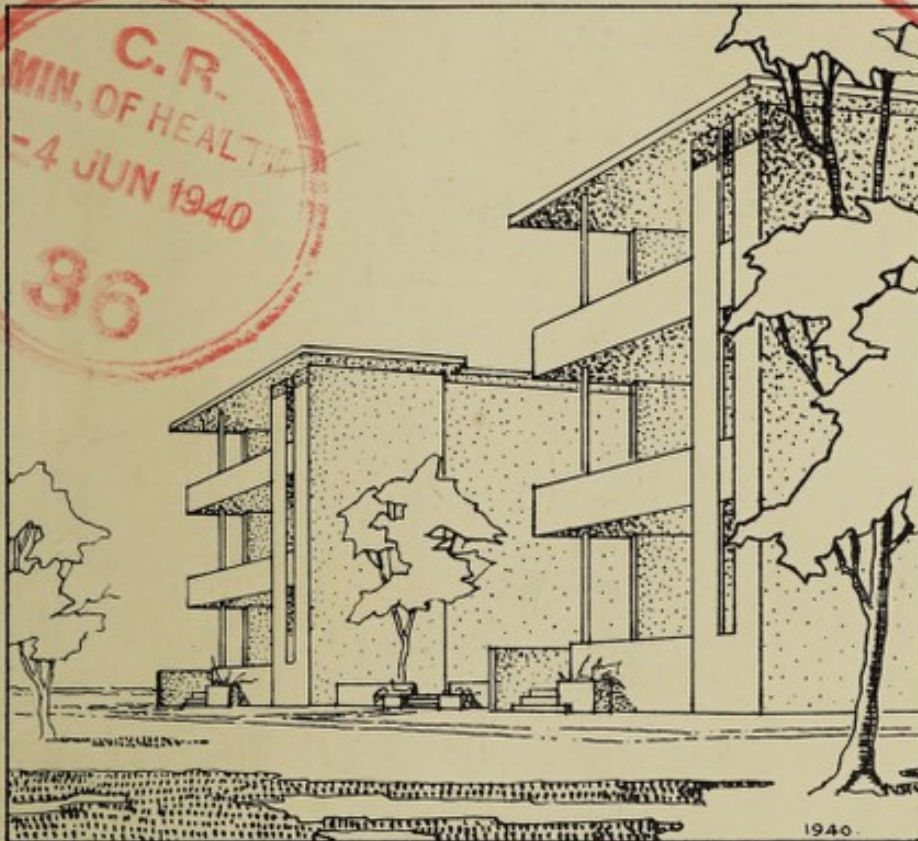

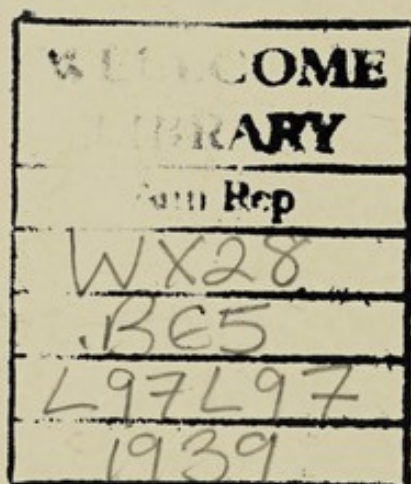

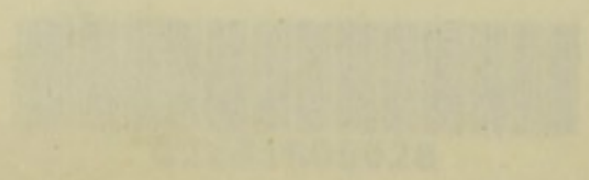

ANNUAL REPORT for 1939.

THE Board of Management has pleasure in presenting to the Governors the first annual report of the Luton and Dunstable Hospital.

PROGRESS.

The new Hospital was declared open by Her Majesty Queen Mary on the 14th February, 1939. Her Majesty's presence on this occasion was a greatly appreciated honour, and after a thorough inspection of the Hospital, she expressed her admiration of the planning and equipment. The keen interest of the people of Luton and Dunstable was clearly indicated by the very large number of visitors during the "open week" which followed, and it was a matter of satisfaction to the Board that so many took the opportunity of seeing something of the fine Hospital which the efforts of the past four years have made possible.

On the 9th March, 1939, the doors of the Bute Hospital were closed to patients for the first time since the establishment of the Hospital in 1872, and Staff, Patients and equipment were transferred to the new buildings. This difficult task was carried through smoothly and efficiently, and the thanks of the Board are due to all those who gave voluntary assistance in the transport of the Patients and Staff.

From this date onward progress was rapid, and by the end of the year all the services immediately contemplated had been brought into operation, and all the wards were in use. The success the new facilities have achieved may be visualised on reference to the figures and information given in this report; few people imagined that they would develop with such remarkable rapidity.

That they have done so is, we believe, an indication of the confidence the people of Luton and Dunstable have in the new Hospital.

THE WAR.

The course of the Hospital Building Appeal was marked by a series of crises of one kind and another, and after only a few months in the new buildings we were faced with war.

Structural precautions and black-out arrangements have involved the Hospital in heavy expenditure, and the appeal for funds to meet additional maintenance costs had to be postponed for the time being.

The Ministry of Health's Emergency Medical Service arrangements came into operation immediately on the outbreak of hostilities ; a number of additional beds were provided by the Ministry and these, together with some of the ordinary beds, are reserved for Service patients and air raid casualties. Appropriate payments are being received from the Ministry in respect of these beds and the patients who occupy them. The Minister appointed Dr. J. W. Bone as Medical Officer in Charge of his interests under the Emergency Medical Service scheme, but the responsibility for the administration and maintenance of the Hospital remains with the Board of Management.

With the consent of the Board, the Borough Council of Luton have erected a First Aid Post in the grounds of the Hospital.

PATIENTS.

The figures in the statistical tables show clearly the great increase in the work of the Hospital and reports on the Clinics and special departments give an interesting account of what is being done in the Out-patients Department. One of the busiest Clinics is the Fracture Clinic, which dealt with 891 Out-patients during the year, the total attendances being 4,640.

1,663 Patients were admitted to the General Hospital, compared with 784 the previous year ; Private Ward admissions 319 against 278. The total number of Out-patients was 9,051, as against 5,582 in 1938.

The pressure of work in the Out-patient Department is now extremely heavy ; a weekly total of four to five hundred attendances is by no means unusual.

FINANCE.

The Board wish that their report regarding Finance could be as satisfactory as that regarding the development of the Hospital Services, but, unfortunately, this is not the case. No one expected that income would meet expenditure during the first year or two, but until this has been achieved the position will be one of constant anxiety and a deterrent to further progress.

Expenditure on maintenance was heavier than was anticipated, because on the one hand the development of the Hospital facilities was more rapid than most people imagined it would be, and on the other hand, there have been substantial increases in the cost of supplies.

On the income side, there was a small but welcome increase in subscriptions and donations, and substantial increases in the receipts on account of services rendered to patients.

The accounts for the year are in three parts, The Bute Hospital and Private Wards separately for the period January 1st to March 8th, and the Luton and Dunstable Hospital as a whole from March 9th to 31st December. The following summary shows the position clearly for the full year; for comparative purposes, the figures for 1938 are also given:—

Whilst the position looks serious, the Board do not entirely despair. The Hospital is providing facilities which will bear comparison with any in the provinces and as its unique services to the townspeople and to local industries generally become thoroughly appreciated, the Board are confident that more substantial support will be forthcoming. Without this additional support the outlook will be black indeed, and when an appeal for more and increased annual subscriptions is made, as it must be in the near future, a generous response is hoped for. We have been pleased to add many new subscriptions during the past year, and many of our old subscribers have doubled, or more than doubled, their contributions.

BUILDING FUND.

Contributions to the Building Fund since the publication of the List in the 1938 Report amounted to £356 14s. 3d., bringing the total received or promised up to £117,522 14s. 9d.

The total payments made in respect of the building and equipment of the Hospital up to December 31st were £136,603. The final payment to the Contractors has yet to be made, and it appears likely that there will be a final deficit of not less than £30,000 on the Building Fund.

The interest on this will be a heavy burden for the Hospital to carry, and donations to reduce it will be more than welcome.

These gifts were greatly appreciated by the Board, and it is hoped that the practice of organising special efforts on behalf of the Funds will be continued by our many friends, both old and new.

THOMAS LYE CONVALESCENT HOME.

Eighty-two patients were admitted to the Home during the year, the average number resident daily being 3·7. The Home was closed for some weeks after the declaration of war, but following its reopening early in November, there was an average of five patients in residence.

There was a credit balance of £168 19s. 1d. on the year's working, the accumulated credit balance in the Maintenance Account now being £290 2s. 1d. A donation of £50 to the Endowment was received from Mr. A. J. Powdrill and was most welcome.

The Board would express their appreciation of the way in which the Home is managed by the Matron, Miss L. Masterton. All the patients who stay there speak most highly of the arrangements made for their comfort.

PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

It is the earnest desire of the Board to maintain the most cordial relations with the Borough Council of Luton and to co-operate with the Council in the provision of adequate health services for the Borough. An example of the value of such co-operation is seen in the scheme for a Pathological Service which has now been accepted by the two Bodies and will, it is hoped, come into full operation in the near future.

Dr. E. E. Ludgater, Pathologist to the Borough, has been appointed Honorary Pathologist to the Hospital and the Hospital building set aside for the Pathological Department is now to be completed and equipped.

LUTON AND DISTRICT HOSPITALS' CONTRIBUTORY FUND.

A sum of over £5,500 was received from the above fund during the year, being an increase of £1,600 over 1938. This substantial contribution was most welcome and the warm thanks of the Board are due to the Group Secretaries and the Scheme Committee whose voluntary efforts so freely given are responsible for the success the Fund has achieved during the last few years.

A report on the Contributory Fund is given on page 56.

LINEN LEAGUE.

The Linen League, whose report is given on page 68, has made splendid progress and has provided a substantial quantity of linen during the past year.

The Board are most grateful to the President, Mrs. Crawley Ross Skinner ; the Honorary Secretary, Miss Durler ; the Treasurer, Mrs. Eberlie ; Miss Redman, the Chairman ; and to the Committee for their most valuable work.

MEDICAL STAFF.

With the opening of the New Hospital the Medical Staff was considerably increased and further Consultants and Specialists appointed. The Board are very proud of the Medical Staff of the Hospital, whose untiring and valuable services are warmly appreciated. A great loss was suffered in November, by the death of Mr. J. Ellison, F.R.C.S., F.R.C.O.G., who, for six years had served the Hospital as Gynæcological Consulting Surgeon. Mr. Ellison had a deep interest in the work of the Hospital, and contributed much to the progress of the past few years.

He was one that the Hospital could ill afford to lose.

NURSING STAFF.

One of the important events of the year was the recognition of the Hospital by the General Nursing Council as a Training School for Nurses. For theoretical instruction a splendid Lecture and Demonstration Room has been provided and a Sister Tutor was appointed in November. The Training School is now in full operation and an adequate number of applications for training are being received.

The Board are indebted to Commander Kent and Employees of the firm of George Kent Limited for providing equipment for the Lecture Room at a cost of £150, as a Memorial to the late Sir Walter Kent.

The Board would also pay tribute to the work of the Matron, Miss M. E. Redman, and the Nursing Staff. Their untiring services through all the difficulties of the past year have been greatly appreciated.

Miss M. M. Hopkins, who has been a member of the Nursing Staff for some years, was appointed Assistant Matron on the opening of the new Hospital. To cope with the increased facilities and accommodation, the Nursing Staff has had to be more than doubled, and it is a matter of satisfaction to the Board that they have such an able and efficient Staff.

APPOINTMENTS.

The increase in the size of the Hospital and the extension of Out-patient services made the appointment of a trained Almoner essential, and in June the Board appointed Miss B. Bowman, A.I.H.A. Miss Bowman previously held a similar appointment at the Great Ormond Street Hospital for Sick Children and her Report for 1939 is given on page 21.

The Board are satisfied that this appointment has been fully justified.

The growth of the work of the Hospital necessitated the appointment of a Dispenser and in September, Mr. E. H. Burroughs, M.P.S., of Luton, was appointed in this capacity on a part-time basis.

Increases in the Administrative Staff also had to be made and Mr. B. A. Callam, who had acted as temporary Clerk for some months, was appointed Chief Clerk in the Secretary's Office.

CHAPLAINS.

The Rev. Wm. Morgan, Vicar of All Saints Church was appointed Church of England Chaplain, and the Rev. A. H. Gammage, Minister of the Wellington Street Baptist Church, was appointed as Chaplain representing the Free Churches.

The voluntary services of both these Reverend gentlemen are greatly appreciated throughout the Hospital.

SERVICES TO THE HOSPITAL.

The Board wish to express their appreciation of the services of the Honorary Auditors, Messrs. Godfrey Laws & Co., and the Honorary Solicitor, Mr. W. Birch Carnley.

It would be impossible to mention in this report all who have rendered the Hospital valuable assistance during 1939, but the gratitude of the Board is due to donors, subscribers and voluntary workers of all kinds, whose unflagging zeal and enthusiasm has been an inspiration and encouragement to all who are connected with the management of the Hospital.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1939

1939 in this Hospital's history spells four words—New Hospital and National Emergency. Each of these factors has produced great changes in the professional work of the Hospital and up to the time of writing the work has, in fact, been more profoundly influenced by the former than the latter.

Transfer to the New Hospital, with its increased accommodation, was accompanied by :—

- (a) Addition of new forms of work ;
- (b) Increase in volume of work ;
- (c) Increase of professional staff.

Mercifully, there has not, so far, been occasion to put into anything like full service all the preparations made in connection with the National Emergency.

Three all-important new developments have been undertaken during the year under review :—

1. The provision of beds for Medical as distinct from Surgical cases and of Children's cots.
2. The completion of arrangements for a full Laboratory Service.
3. The establishment of a series of Consultative Clinics.

The first has become possible by reason of the larger size of the Luton and Dunstable Hospital than its predecessor the Bute Hospital, and this provision has already been of real value to the community. As a corollary to the establishment of medical beds the Visiting Staff has been largely increased and divided into Honorary Physicians and Honorary Surgeons in charge of medical and surgical beds respectively. Additional Anæsthetists have also been appointed. The greatly increased amount of work dealt with made it necessary to appoint a second House Surgeon and by the close of the year it had become clear that a staff of two residents was quite insufficient for the manifold duties arising, and the appointment of a third House Surgeon was decided upon.

The Pathological Service has been brought about by co-operation with the Local Authority. The Pathologist recently appointed by the Luton Borough Council holds an appointment as Honorary Pathologist at the Hospital and undertakes a wide range of investigations to the great advantage of the Hospital's patients. Of all the activities commenced in 1939 it is safe to say that none is more important than this, and the Honorary Medical Staff are grateful that the prolonged endeavours to secure this essential service have at last come to fruition. Lives have already, without doubt, been saved owing to this development.

The Consultative Clinics were inaugurated shortly after the opening of the Hospital with the object of providing the public of the district with a much-needed service in order to obviate the journeying to London by patients who could ill afford the time or expense of doing so. It is by now generally understood that these are not an ordinary " Out-patient Department " but are accurately described by their title. Patients are seen at these clinics only at the request of practitioners who, desiring the opinion of the Consultant concerned, refer them for the purpose.

A serious attempt is being made to avoid undue waiting and it is anticipated that this attempt will succeed in spite of difficulties.

The Reports on the work of the Clinics show clearly that the public have taken full advantage of these most desirable facilities.

IN-PATIENTS.

For reasons of economy the Medical Statistical Report has been omitted from this year's Report.

1663 Patients were admitted to the General Wards during the year, the results of treatment being as follows :—

There were 782 men, 713 women and 168 children admitted.

320 accident cases received treatment in the wards, and of these 107 were motor accidents.

1,105 operations were performed under anæsthetic on in-patients during the year, a large number of which were in the nature of acute emergency work undertaken by the Honorary Surgeons at various hours of the day and the night to save persons in urgent danger.

MEDICAL CLINIC.

This Clinic is held twice monthly and up to December 31st, 64 patients had been sent to the Clinic for consultations : a number of these have been admitted to the Wards.

SURGICAL CLINIC.

Since this weekly clinic commenced in May there has been 298 new patients, with a total of 368 attendances. 145 names were entered on the waiting list for admission to Hospital, the remainder being referred back to their own doctor with an opinion. Nearly all the patients entered on the waiting list were admitted before the end of the year, and in 129 cases major operations were carried out by the Consultant in charge of the Clinic.

GYNÆCOLOGICAL CLINIC.

149 patients attended this Clinic, which is also held twice monthly. Of these 75 were entered in the list for admission, the remainder being referred back to their own doctor with an opinion. The Honorary Gynæcological Surgeons performed 55 major operations on in-patients who had been seen at this Clinic.

EAR, NOSE AND THROAT CLINIC.

87 patients attended this clinic, held twice monthly. Many of these were subsequently admitted to Hospital.

PSYCHOLOGICAL MEDICINE CLINIC.

This weekly clinic has proved to be most valuable and up to the end of the year 91 patients saw the Physician in charge, the total attendances being 190.

FRACTURE AND ORTHOPÆDIC CLINICS.

The Fracture Clinic commenced immediately after the opening of the new Hospital, and the numbers alone are an indication of its success. 891 new patients attended, the total attendances being 4,640. The clinic is held daily and attracts patients from a wide area.

The Orthopædic Clinic, which is held weekly, commenced later in the year, the total attendances being 167.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

This busy department dealt with 4,751 patients during the year. Of these 806 were in-patients, the remainder being examinations requested by patients' own doctors or cases referred from the clinics or Casualty Department.

The following summary gives the totals of some of the more important examinations carried out during the year :—

The total number of cases showed an increase of 1,000 over 1938.

CASUALTY DEPARTMENT.

The Casualty Department, which is open to receive cases day and night, treated 2,832 patients during the year, an increase of nearly 200 over the number in 1938.

CONSULTANT STAFF.

It is, unhappily, necessary to record the serious loss to the Hospital by the sudden death in November of Mr. John Ellison, for several years the Consultant Gynæcologist to the Hospital. Always very competent and very kind and not to be perturbed by any emergency, Mr. Ellison has left behind him a fragrant memory which will long be cherished by those who came into contact with him.

The vacancy caused by Mr. Ellison's death was filled by the appointment of Mr. John Beattie, M.D., F.R.C.S., M.R.C.O.G.

Early in 1939 it was decided to appoint an Honorary Assistant Surgeon, and from a large number of applicants, Mr. Donald Barlow, M.S. (Lond.), F.R.C.S., was chosen for appointment.

Certain other changes in the Consultant Staff have been necessitated through conditions imposed by the war and temporary appointments made.

Dr. J. W. Bone, who has been Chairman of this Committee since its establishment some years ago, retired from this position early in 1940. Although this was not strictly within the period under review, the Medical Advisory Committee would like to take this first opportunity of expressing publicly, as it has already done privately, its high sense of indebtedness to Dr. Bone for his continual guidance and the wealth of his experience at all times available to the Medical Staff.

ALMONER'S REPORT FOR 1939.

SINCE the Almoner's Department was opened in June, more than five thousand patients, their friends or relatives, have been interviewed. It is a very busy Department and the work is very varied. All patients for the special Clinics are interviewed on their first attendance and all In-patients are interviewed when they are admitted or whilst they are in the wards. Particulars are obtained so that payment can be arranged according to the patient's circumstances and also to be sure that the patient is in a position to obtain the maximum benefit from the medical treatment given. Sometimes help is required, often it is merely a matter of advice that is needed, particularly concerning benefits obtainable from the National Health Insurance and sometimes it is a matter of seeking help for the patients from an appropriate source.

A number of patients require special appliances, special belts in some cases, in others, spinal jackets, callipers, artificial limbs and various other instruments. Very few of the patients are able to manage the whole cost of these appliances themselves. Some patients, particularly those who, due to an accident or illness, have been unable to work for probably a matter of months, are not even able to make a contribution towards the cost, but whenever the Physician or Surgeon has recommended a special appliance, that appliance has been supplied and the Almoner's very grateful thanks are due to all those Societies who have helped. It is impossible to enumerate every source from which help has been obtained, but this report would certainly not be complete without mention of those employers who have so readily assisted in special cases. Thanks are also due to the Luton Guild of Service, the Medical Comforts Depot, the British Legion, the Churches, various Regimental Benevolent Funds, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, the Rowland Hill Benevolent Fund, the Timber Trades Benevolent Fund, the Soldiers', Sailors' & Airmen's Families Association, the Co-operative Society and many others.

Arrangements for the after care of patients such as sanatorium treatment or convalescence have been made in a number of cases. Forty-six patients were admitted to the Thomas Lye Home at Brighton during the last six months of the year and here again, very grateful thanks are due to those who have helped with the railway fares and the cost of convalescence. Those who have seen the patients on their return have probably felt more than repaid for the help they have given, by the very obvious improvement in the patients.

LUTON AND DISTRICT HOSPITALS CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME

In co-operation with the HOSPITAL SAVING ASSOCIATION

Report for the Year to 31st July, 1939.

The scheme has continued to make steady progress and during the year under review membership increased from 23,295 in July, 1938, to 27,000 in July, 1939, an increase of 3,705.

The number of groups increased from 188 to 210 during the same period.

Although the rate of increase is not so rapid as in the previous year the figures indicate a very satisfactory state of affairs. Saturation point however is still a long way off, and having passed the 25,000 mark, Group Secretaries now have 30,000 as their next milestone. It is worth mentioning that 5 years ago the membership was only 5,800.

The figures given below show the financial position and the great help the scheme is giving to local hospitals. It is gratifying to know that the year's work resulted in another substantial surplus which was distributed to the Luton and Dunstable Hospital and the Children's Hospital at the close of the year.

The thanks of the Contributory Scheme Committee are extended to all Group Secretaries for their work during the past year. Their efforts alone make the scheme possible and the Hospitals owe them a debt of gratitude. The Group Secretaries' Committee continue to hold regular meetings with most useful results.
