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

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

Sixty years ago a child entered the Luton Cottage Hospital as a patient—during the time she was there the kindness of Doctors and Nurses was impressed indelibly on her mind.





ANNUAL REPORT for 1940.

THE Board of Management have pleasure in presenting to the Governors the second annual report of the Luton and Dunstable Hospital.

THE FIRST FULL YEAR.

The first full year's work of the Hospital has been marked by an enormous increase in the activities of all departments. The pressure of work was constant throughout the year both in the Wards and the Out-patient department, where it became apparent that further accommodation was urgently required. That this position should have arisen so soon after the opening of the hopsital, is an indication of the confidence with which the hospital is regarded, not only in Luton and Dunstable but throughout the southern part of the County. Patients are gradually coming from a wider and wider area and the Governors have only to refer to the "Residences of Patients" statement on page 26 to see how substantial is the number of patients coming from the rural district.

The volume of work the Hospital was called upon to undertake called for some increases in staff and from time to time during 1940 the Board found it necessary to purchase additional instruments and equipment.

The shortage of accommodation in the Out-Patient Department is so acute that the Board have agreed to extensions which, with the necessary equipment, will cost approximately £2,500. They will provide a room for Physiotherapy, relieving the Fracture Clinic of this work, an increase in the size of the waiting hall, additional office accommodation for the Almoner's Department, and for a Registration Office which is urgently needed. In the present financial circumstances of the Hospital, the Board regrets the necessity of undertaking this extension, but the extraordinary growth of the Hospital work during the past year leaves them no alternative if their services to the Public are to be maintained and developed in accordance with the demands made upon them and in keeping with the high standard they have set themselves.

THE WAR AND THE HOSPITAL.

On several occasions during the year the Hospital had to deal with numbers of air raid casualties. Those who are closely associated with the Hospital know how magnificently the emergencies were met and the experiences of the past year enable the Board to face with confidence whatever trials might be forthcoming in 1941.

Various additional measures have been taken to give greater security to patients and staff. The windows of the hospital have been treated with netting, blast walls have been erected at many points and measures put in hand to give protected sleeping accommodation to the Nursing and Domestic Staff. All these steps have been taken in consultation with officers of the Minister of Health who will bear a substantial part of the expenditure involved.

On the instructions of the Minister a team of voluntary stretcher bearers has been enrolled. The co-operation of the British Red Cross and the St. John's Ambulance organisations was readily forthcoming and some 80 volunteers are available for service; they have been called on many occasions and have always responded willingly to the demands made upon them. In present conditions their services are invaluable. Four bearers stay at the hospital each night, on call for any emergency.

Other voluntary organisations, such as the Women's Voluntary Services, British Red Cross and St. John's Ambulance of Luton and Dunstable, and the panel of car volunteers, have rendered most useful aid during the year; to all these the Board express their gratitude and thanks.

Late in the year Dr. J. W. Bone relinquished his post as Medical Officer in charge of the E.M.S. work and the Minister of Health appointed Dr. G. de Bec Turtle to succeed him.

The Board take this opportunity of emphasizing that the Hospital retains its voluntary status and has in no way been taken over by the Ministry of Health.

PATIENTS.

During the year 2,652 patients were admitted to the General Wards and 361 to the Private Wards, the comparative figures for last year being 1,663 and 319. The average number of patients resident daily was 126.59 General Wards and 15.65 Private Wards compared with 80.03 and 13.37 respectively in 1939.

New Out-patients totalled 14,189 and attendances 25,127 as against 9,051 and 12,906 the previous year.

The statistical tables and Medical Advisory Committee Report give comprehensive details of the year's work ; the figures given show clearly the heavy demands being made on our services.

FINANCE.

The accounts, published on page 18, are in a much simpler form than last year and the cost of the Hospital is now shown in the Balance Sheet. The following summary shows the income and expenditure for the year compared with 1939 :--

The loss of £3,838 on the year's working is a matter of serious concern; there was a maintenance account deficit of £4,239 carried forward at the beginning of the year and the total deficiency is now £8,077. The Building Fund deficit stands at approximately £31,600 and although this figure is not as astronomical as might have been expected, bearing in mind that the total cost of the Hospital was £146,147, the possibility of having in addition a steadily mounting deficiency on maintenance is alarming.

More Subscribers and Donors are a most urgent need and the Board hope that 1941 will see a further substantial rise in voluntary gifts.

It was extremely gratifying to achieve an increase of $\pounds 2,500$ under this heading during 1940 and in this connection acknowledgments are due to the Appeals Committee, whose report appears on page 25, and to our friends of the Industrial Safety Association. The Appeals Committee commenced work in August under the Chairmanship of the Rev. Wm. Morgan and it has already fully justified its formation. The Board's warm thanks are extended to Mr. Morgan and his Committee for their successful activities during 1940.

Expenditure, as will be seen, showed an increase of some $\pounds 10,000$ over 1939. Considing all the circumstances, and in particular the substantial increase in the work of the Hospital, the Governors will no doubt agree that this figure is not excessive.

The Board and its Committees are concerned to see that every reasonable economy is practised in the administration of the Hospital, but there can be little doubt that expenditure will be a persistently rising figure. Continued development of our services, rising costs, and the application of the purchase tax will result in substantial additions to the expenditure during the current year.

LEGACIES.

The Board acknowledge with gratitude receipt of the following legacies during the year:—

The late Mr. F. C. Ellingham $\pounds 100$ The late Miss E. K. Higgins . $\pounds 20$

Generally speaking it is the Board's policy to utilize legacies left free of conditions to reduce the deficit on the Building Fund, but they look forward to the time when it will be possible to invest all legacies since the receipts from invested funds are a very small proportion of our total income; the building up of an Endowment and General Purposes Fund commensurate with the size of the Hospital is a most desirable aim.

Under a scheme sanctioned by the Charity Commissioners the bequest of Flora Lucretia Blackwell of $\pounds70$ was transferred to the Endowment Fund of the Hospital. This bequest was originally intended for the maintenance of a Cottage Hospital at Dunstable, and its transfer was a natural sequel to the transfer of the Buckingham Charity.

DUNSTABLE.

It will be interesting to our Dunstable friends to know that almost one-tenth of the Patients come from that Borough, and it gives the Board great satisfaction to feel that the partnership into which our two towns entered a few years ago has been so successful. The Dunstable Hospital fund continues its activities on behalf of the Hospital and its latest effort, the House Collection Box Scheme, should prove a most useful source of income.

The 1940 grant from the Fund was $\pounds 175$ and another outstanding effort was the House to House collection organised in October which realised the splendid sum of $\pounds 133$.

The Board would like to take this opportunity of expressing their gratitude to Alderman Keep for the great help he gave to the Hospital during his years of office. His successor Alderman Sharman has continued with equal enthusiasm to advance the cause of the Hospital on all possible occasions.

INDUSTRIAL SAFETY ASSOCIATION.

It is with satisfaction that the Board are able to report a most substantial increase in the contributions from member firms of the Industrial Safety Association. Many firms have more than doubled their previous subscriptions and it is most encouraging to the Board to feel that the local industrial firms' appreciation of the services rendered to them by the Hospital is expressed in such a practical manner.

As will be seen from the list on page 46, a total of $\pounds 1,626$ was received from this source during 1940, some $\pounds 800$ more than 1939. A further substantial increase will be achieved during the present year.

LUTON AND DISTRICT CONTRIBUTORY FUND.

Receipts from the above fund, run in conjunction with the Hospital Saving Association, amounted to $\pounds7,068$ during the year, an increase of $\pounds1,500$ over 1939. This fund is one of the Hospital's most valuable sources of income, and the Board would like to express their heartfelt thanks to the Fund's Committee and to the Group Secretaries, whose voluntary labours have resulted in the scheme's outstanding success in Luton and district.

ALDERMAN J. H. STADDON.

Alderman Staddon who held the office of Chairman of the Board of Management from July, 1939, unfortunately found it necessary to resign this position and his seat on the Board for reasons of health in April, 1940. The Governors will remember that in recognition of his services to the Hospital he was made a life governor at the last annual meeting. Although Alderman Staddon is no longer closely connected with the management of the Hospital, he continues to take a keen interest in its work and has rendered important services

in various directions during the past year. The Board appreciated Alderman Staddon's leadership most highly and keenly regretted his inability to continue in office.

THE LATE MR. F. C. ELLINGHAM.

The Hospital suffered a great loss in February by the death of its Vice-President and Vice-Chairman of the Board, Mr. F. C. Ellingham. Mr. Ellingham was a life governor and had been a member of the Board since 1932 and Chairman from 1936 until failing health compelled him to relinquish this office in June, 1939. His business experience and wide understanding of affairs had been applied with the utmost keenness to the many problems the Hospital had to face during the time he was associated with it, and the Board could ill afford to lose a so valuable colleague.

THOMAS LYE CONVALESCENT HOME.

The war has had the effect of reducing considerably the number of patients sent to the Convalescent Home at Brighton; only 46 were admitted during the year, the average resident daily being 3.49. The desirability of closing the Home for the duration of the war was carefully considered by the Board and its Committees, but it was finally decided to keep it open and reconsider the matter in the light of circumstances prevailing from time to time.

The Board would again express their appreciation of the way in which the Home has been managed by the Matron, Miss Masterton. Patients benefit very considerably from their stay at the Home, and continue to speak very appreciatively of the attention they receive.

NAMING THE WARDS.

Her Majesty Queen Mary graciously gave the Board permission to name Ward 1 "The Queen Mary Ward," and Lady Ludlow consented to Ward 4 being named "The Lady Ludlow Ward." Ward 2 was named "The Arthur Frederick Buckingham Ward" in order to commemorate the transfer to the Hospital of the trust fund established by the late Mr. A. F. Buckingham for the erection of a Cottage Hospital at Dunstable. The Governors will remember that this fund, which amounted to £10,050, was placed to the Building Fund under a scheme sanctioned by the Charity Commissioners.

BEDS. COUNTY COUNCIL.

The financial prospects of the Hospital received the serious consideration of the Board and the Finance Committee during the year. It appeared that the annual expenditure on maintenance would be more than treble that of the Bute Hospital, and the likelihood of raising income in a similar ratio appeared to be remote. Although every effort had been and will continue to be made to increase income from voluntary and other sources, it appeared inevitable that there would remain a serious gap to be bridged, particularly when the present payments from the Ministry of Health cease as they probably will on the cessation of hostilities, or shortly afterwards. The Board therefore, after much thought, decided to approach the Bedfordshire County Council in the matter, and a scheme has now been approved by the County Council whereby financial aid will be forthcoming. That it should be given is in full accord with the Report of the Voluntary Hospital Commission, and it is a matter of great satisfaction to the Board that the promise of aid should have been so readily given by the Council and with no suggestion of irksome restrictions, or alterations to the voluntary status of the Hospital.

LINEN LEAGUE.

The Linen League, whose report is given on page 51, has continued its activities with increasing success, and a substantial quantity of linen was provided during the year. The Board are most grateful to the President, Mrs. Crawley Ross-Skinner; the Chairman, Miss Redman; the Treasurer, Mrs. Eberlie; the Honorary Secretary, Miss Durler and to the Committee and members of the League for their most welcome and valuable assistance.

MEDICAL STAFF.

The Board would again express their high appreciation of the work of the Medical Staff. It has been a most arduous year, and their untiring and efficient services on all occasions are greatly appreciated. During the year it was necessary to add to the resident medical staff, which now consists of a Resident Surgical Officer, two House Surgeons and one House Physician.

NURSING STAFF.

The Board would like to acknowledge their debt of gratitude to the Matron, and to the Nursing Staff for their loyal services during the past year. Their work has not been easy, but it has been carried out with a high standard of efficiency and in that happy spirit which has always been characteristic of our Nursing Staff. The training school for nurses has made very good progress, and Matron's report on page 36 gives further information on this matter.

AUDITORS.

At the last annual meeting the Governors referred to the Board of Management the appointment of Auditors, and the Board appointed Messrs. Godfrey, Laws & Co.

At this time we should like to place on record the Board's warmest thanks to Messrs. Godfrey, Laws & Co., for the services they have rendered over many years as Auditors in an entirely voluntary capacity. Present conditions and the size of the Hospital made it impossible for Messrs. Godfrey, Laws & Co. to continue as Honorary Auditors, but the terms under which they have now been appointed are most generous and were gratefully accepted by the Board.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

Mr. A. T. Worboys was elected to the Board to fill the vacancy created by the election of Lady Keens as Vice-President. Later in the year the Board were sorry to receive the resignation of Alderman Kenworthy who had done much useful work for the Hospital. The Rev. Wm. Morgan was appointed in his place.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

Unfortunately it is not possible within the compass of this report to acknowledge individually and fully all the voluntary help the Hospital has received during the year. It is true to say that the Hospital has never had more generous support nor a greater number of willing and active workers of all kinds.

On such foundations are voluntary Hospitals built and the Board's good fortune in this respect gives them hope and confidence in facing whatever trials and difficulties the future may bring.

To all those who have served this great cause, either by way of gifts or voluntary service, the Board express their high sense of gratitude and appreciation.





REPORT FOR 1940.

The Committee made their first effort a house-to-house collection which was held in September. The town was divided into 18 districts and each member of the Committee accepted the responsibility for the work of organisation. The total collection in Luton amounted to £755 13s. 10d. and this was regarded as a most satisfactory result and a sufficient reward for the enormous amount of work entailed. The Mayor of Dunstable kindly agreed to accept responsibility for a similar collection in his Borough, and the splendid sum of f 133 10s. was collected.

In December a house-to-house collection was held in many of the villages and resulted in a total of f_{65} 18s. 3d. The Committee are very grateful to all the ladies who undertook the organisation of these most successful efforts. Later in the year members of the Committee carried out the collection of annual subscriptions, and efforts during 1941 will be to substantially increase income from this source.

It is our intention to increase the revenue from the villages served by the Hospital; much remains to be done in this connection, but I feel that we have made a good beginning with the house-tohouse collection of 1940, and our experiences in this connection make me confident that we shall have a good response to the appeals we shall make in 1941.

Unfortunately, the conditions created by the war limit considerably the activities of the Committee with regard to special efforts, but members are doing what they can in the way of Bridge Drives, etc., and 1941 will, I hope, bring forth useful sums as a result.

The Committee have various schemes under consideration to increase the voluntary income, and they will continue to do all they can to help the fine Hospital with which we are very proud to be associated.

Finally, the Committee would like to express their appreciation of the great help given to them by Mr. Lingard, the Hospital Secretary, and by his staff, who spared time from their already busy days to give invaluable assistance in the organisation of the Committee's 1940 efforts.

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REPORT OF THE MEDICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1940

The outstanding medical event of 1940 was the treatment of casualties arising from an air raid in the early autumn. A large number of patients, male and female, were admitted to the Wards in the one night and many more casualties were treated in the Casualty Department and subsequently allowed to go home. The medical organisation, under the direction of the Medical Superintendent, Dr. J. W. Bone, was severely tested. The ordeal was well borne and the Medical Staff was eminently satisfied with the result. The major surgery in the theatres was dealt with smoothly and easily-there was no undue haste or flurry. The Ward work was handled with the care, sympathy and speed that one would associate only with constant practice. The Medical Staff would like to take this opportunity of paying tribute to the superb efforts of the Nursing Staff in the Wards and the Theatres. Under the direction of the Matron, the Sisters and Nurses worked serenely and tirelessly for hour after hour. The Medical Staff realises that the excellent results of the treatment of the raid casualties were due largely to the skilful nursing they received on admission to the Wards and the Staff tender their special thanks to the Matron and Nurses. The results of the treatment were indeed excellent, the newest technique of wound surgery was used in all possible cases and the results were very gratifying. Fewer cases than were expected became infected; wounds healed rapidly and convalescence in a high percentage of cases was quickly established. However good an organisation, events will always find some error that needs rectifying and following the raid, after discussion with the Medical Superintendent, he and his Surgical Staff ordered various alterations and amendments which undoubtedly improve the organisation of the E.M.S.

Casualties from subsequent raids have fortunately not been numerous and these have been handled and treated without strain on the resources of the E.M.S.

The normal civilian work of the Hospital has been carried on during 1940 under some difficulties. The population catered for by the Hospital has increased, owing to evacuations, chiefly from London, by about 20,000, but the beds available for patients from this population has had to be kept strictly limited. In consequence the waiting list for all departments, Gynæcological, Orthopaedic, Ear, Nose and Throat, Surgical and Medical has been steadily

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increasing. Emergencies which had to be admitted without delay have become more numerous. To offset this uncomfortable position there has been a marked "speeding up" of admissions and discharges. It has been found practicable to discharge patients after treatment much more rapidly to their homes or to other institutions to complete their convalescence. A larger volume of work has therefore passed through the Hospital. All departments, including the Casualty Department, showed a marked increase on the previous year and not only has the volume increased, but the quality of the treatment given to the patients has become of a definitely higher standard. The provision of new, intricate and often very costly instruments and appliances, together with improved team work and operating technique has made this standard possible in Surgery and on the medical side the Honorary Pathologist, with the pathological laboratory in full working order, has been of inestimable service. The best hospitals in the country have a standard of performance very little in advance of ours and we are rapidly approaching this standard.

The Hospital is fortunate in that Mr. Carew-Shaw, F.R.C.S. was able to return to his former position as E.N.T. Consultant after his resignation from the R.A.M.C. The Medical Staff owes its thanks to Mr. Ormerod, F.R.C.S., for the valuable work he did for the Hospital during Mr. Carew-Shaw's absence.

A considerably larger number of patients have been investigated and treated by the Consultants in their clinics than in 1939. Frequently they have been overburdened and have had to spend long hours in their consulting rooms. The Hospital is, however, remarkably fortunate in its Consultants who are second to none in their energy, keenness and sympathetic understanding. They all, moreover, rank in skill and knowledge with the best professional brains of the country.

At the end of the year Dr. de Bec Turtle was appointed Medical Superintendent of the E.M.S. by the Ministry of Health. The retirement of Dr. J. W. Bone, whose place he has taken, was an unexpected misfortune to his colleagues. The Medical Staff of the E.M.S. miss his presence at their head but fortunately, as a Consulting Surgeon and as President of the Hospital, he is still available, as he has been for many years, to guide us with experienced advice and wise counsel.

L. W. PLEWES, M.A., M.D. (Toronto), F.R.C.S. (Ed.). R. A. CHRISTIANSON, M.D. (Western Ontario). As the work of the nursing staff is such an integral part of the Hospital's activities, a brief survey of the year's work of the training school may be of interest.

The year 1940 was our first full year as a complete training school for nurses and saw our first prize-giving. Eleven trainees came up from the Bute Hospital to form the nucleus of the First Year Students. These have now increased to the present number of 50 who are receiving instruction in all the subjects laid down in the syllabus prescribed by the General Nursing Council. The year's curriculum has included Anatomy and Physiology, Hygiene and First Aid and practical and theoretical Nursing and Sick Room Cookery.

The courses of lectures on these subjects have been part of the task of our Sister Tutor, Miss Allison, except for the course of Advanced Anatomy which Mr. Plewes very kindly consented to give and who is now, in fact, well into the second course.

We are fortunate in having such an experienced Sister Tutor who is always willing, not only to give the prescribed lectures, but as many coaching classes as may be needed from time to time. Moreover, our Lecture and Demonstration Rooms, their equipment and kindred needs, have always been most sympathetically considered by the House Committee.

In November last we held our initial First Year examination and we were privileged in having Miss Joyce, the present Matron of The Evelina Hospital for Sick Children (my deputy at the Bute Hospital for several years) assisted by one of her senior staff, Sister Hoare, for our Examiner. She very kindly set and corrected the written work and conducted the viva voce and practical examinations in all the subjects mentioned above.

Although Miss Joyce set a high standard, she expressed her great satisfaction with the work and general bearing of the nurses, and the percentage of marks gained was most gratifying.

February 18th, 1941, was marked for all time as the day of our first prizegiving, and although this is outside the year under review I should like to include it in this report. Our President, Dr. J. W. Bone, graciously consented to distribute the prizes. We were fortunate indeed to have him in this capacity because, like most keen medical men, he has always taken a great interest in our nurses and the nursing profession generally, so that the prizes seemed to have their value enhanced thereby. These took the form of medical books, and the following awards were made :—

- Lady Keen's prize—a text book on Medicine—to Nurse J. E. M. Tibbett who obtained the highest aggregate marks in the examination.
- Mr. H. Richardson's prize-a similar book-to Nurse R. S. Holmes who obtained second place.
- Matron's prize—a text book on Surgery—to Nurse B. M. Williams for the highest marks in the practical examination.
- The Assistant Matron, Miss Hopkins's prize—a Medical Dictionary—to Nurse N. Wardell for uniform tidiness and good conduct.
- Sister Tutor, Miss Allison's prize—a text book on Surgery—to Nurse P. Nankervis for perseverance and good progress.

The function was brief but a very happy one, and, as the day was chosen to coincide with the monthly meeting of the Board of Management, a number of Committee members were present. We were pleased to have Canon Davison on the platform and he kindly congratulated the nurses and thanked our President. In spite of war conditions we were able to entertain the members present to tea in our pleasant sitting room before their meeting began.

With regard to the State Examination, one of our students left for marriage and one has already satisfied the examiners so that seventeen remain to take the Preliminary State Examination which will be held during the month of April.

Our Hospital has been chosen as a centre so candidates from nearby training schools will also be coming here for this important test in the Nurses' training.

Owing to war-time conditions and for other reasons, the medical and surgical work of the Hospital has been particularly varied and useful from the training point of view throughout the year, and the Honorary Staff and the Consultants have expressed their satisfaction with the standard of the practical work.

Work has not held the field entirely because, under the able chairmanship of the Sister Tutor, the Nursing Staff has evolved for themselves a splendid Nurses' Social Club. The Assistant Matron is their very efficient Treasurer, whilst Sister O'Farrell (Sister in charge of the Lady Ludlow Ward) has been the indomitable Secretary with ever-ready ideas and willingness to help. This Club has an energetic Committee and very entertaining sections of indoor and outdoor activities and hobbies, some of which have been greatly helped by members of the House Committee to whom we are most grateful. Among other things the Club has been responsible for, we would mention the excellent entertainment for the patients given at Christmas; an impromptu party which raised money for the Spitfire Fund; an American teaparty which raised $\xi 8$ 10s. 0d. for gifts for H.M. Submarine Undaunted (the child of our adoption for the duration of war) and lately, a well-supported Bazaar graced by His Worship the Mayor and Lord Kindersley, which raised $\xi 72$ 15s. 0d. for War Weapons Week. It may be of interest to mention that the Bonds purchased were given to the Hospital towards the maintenance of a child's cot.

As our own are not yet available, Messrs. Electrolux and the Borough Maternity Hospital have kindly given us the hospitality of their tennis courts, and these have proved most beneficial and have been greatly appreciated. At an American tennis match, Staff Nurse Evans and Probationer Nurse Derbyshire were the finalists, and at an informal coffee party held one morning last autumn Mrs. Hugh Melville very kindly presented the Prize (awarded by Matron) to the winner, Nurse Derbyshire. As Mrs. Melville was a County player herself we felt honoured and encouraged by the great interest she displayed.

Even a glance at the figures in the Annual Report will show how busy the wards and various departments have been throughout the past year, and much could be written on the additional work and difficulties caused by the "black-out" and war-time conditions. Like the rest of our countrymen, however, we realise that such circumstances prove but incentives to greater effort, and we are fortunate indeed to be a vital part of an institution so busily engaged on important national service, and to have the care of so many sick people. We have every reason to believe that when their training in this Hospital is completed and the Final State Examination has been successfully passed, the Nurses will be as well equipped for the career they have chosen as any in the land and will have just cause to be proud of their training school.

ALMONER'S REPORT FOR 1940.

LAST YEAR was the first complete year in the existence of the Almoner's Department. From the very first it has been a very busy Department, but to quote statistics of the number of patients interviewed, the amount collected, the number of patients sent away for convalescence and to Sanatoria, the number of appliances supplied and the amount of money raised to pay for them, gives no real idea of the work of the Department, although such numbers testify to a very large and ever increasing amount of work.

Perhaps the work of the Department as a whole can best be described by quoting a few examples. Mrs. X, a patient typical of many, was a frail and rather elderly widow with only her widow's pension. She had had trouble with her back for years and the Surgeon recommended an appliance which was to cost more than the whole of her savings. She did not belong to any Contributory Fund that could be called upon to help and it meant applying to a number of Societies on her behalf. Fortunately these applications met with success, the money was raised and Mrs. X was left with her savings intact to give her courage to face her next " rainy day." This is only one instance, but over one hundred and fifty appliances have been supplied through the Almoner's Department during the year and a sum of £397 13s. 7d. raised from Approved Societies, from charitable sources and in some cases from patients themselves, to pay for them.

Convalescence and Sanatorium treatment has been arranged in a number of cases. Besides the patients who are sent to the Thomas Lye Home at Brighton, it is often a matter of arranging a Home to suit the special needs of the patient. Mrs. G., a rather lonely woman, lived in a furnished room by herself until she had an accident which made it impossible for her to look after herself. Fortunately she was in a position to make a small weekly contribution for her board and lodging and the care that she needed. A vacancy was found for her in a Home where she could have all the skilled care and attention she needed for a long as was necessary. Some weeks after her arrival she wrote to say how happy she was and then a letter came from the Matron saying "Mrs. G. is a delightful old lady. Thank you for sending us such a nice patient" and it was felt that here, at any rate, the right Home had been selected for the right patient.

Sometimes the Almoner's work is merely that of an intermediary, as in the case of an adolescent suffering from an injury due to the abnormal conditions in which he was living. He was reinstated in a more normal atmosphere merely by bringing him into contact again with an appropriate juvenile organisation.

The very grateful thanks of the Almoner are again due to the numerous Societies and persons who have co-operated so generously with the work of the Department; this help is the basis without which the Almoner could not function. The Board of Management has now agreed to the establishment of a Samaritan Fund in order that there may be something to fall back on to help with the last pound in the provision of an instrument or to help in a sudden urgent matter for which there is no time to apply to outside Societies. At present there is a sum of $\pounds 26$ 0s. 0d. in the fund and the Almoner very gratefully thanks those people who have already been generous enough to subscribe and earnestly appeals for further donations.

PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

DURING the year, the first complete year in which full pathological services have been available, 1,870 examinations have been carried out, without cost to the Hospital, in accordance with the arrangement with the Luton Borough Council.

The new Hospital Laboratories were completed and equipped in October, and have been in use since as far as circumstances permit. Arrangements are being made in 1941, with assistance from the Emergency Medical Service of the Ministry of Health, for full time opening of the Hospital Laboratories, and this should greatly increase their usefulness to the Hon. Medical Staff both for urgent examinations and for consultation with the Hon. Pathologist.

Report for the Year to 31st July, 1940.

In spite of the great difficulties created by the war, membership has not only been maintained, but shows some increase. At the beginning of the year under review the membership was 27,000 and had reached approximately 29,000 by July, 1940.

It is a source of great satisfaction to the Committee that they should be able to give such a report and they would like to take this opportunity of expressing their deep sense of gratitude to the Group Secretaries who have worked extremely hard to ensure the Scheme's progress in the face of all the difficulties of the past year.

The statement below gives the financial figures for the year to 31st July, 1940, and the previous year's figures are shown for comparative purposes. The Committee thought it prudent to transfer a substantial sum to the Reserve Fund which now stands at $\pounds 2,972$ 5s. 9d.

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


