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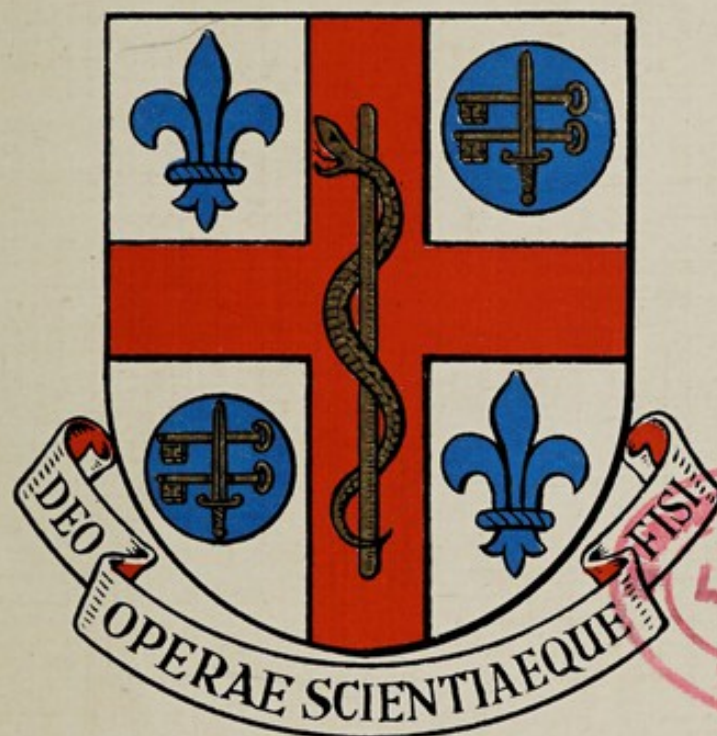


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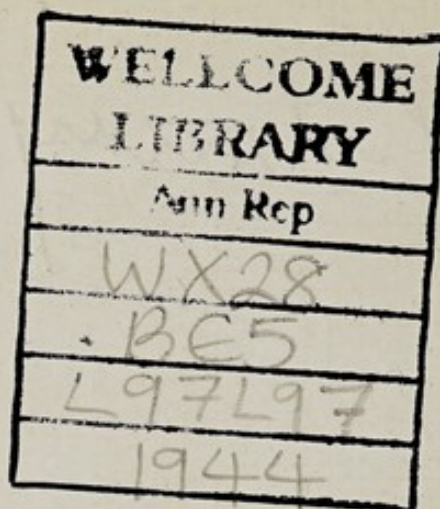

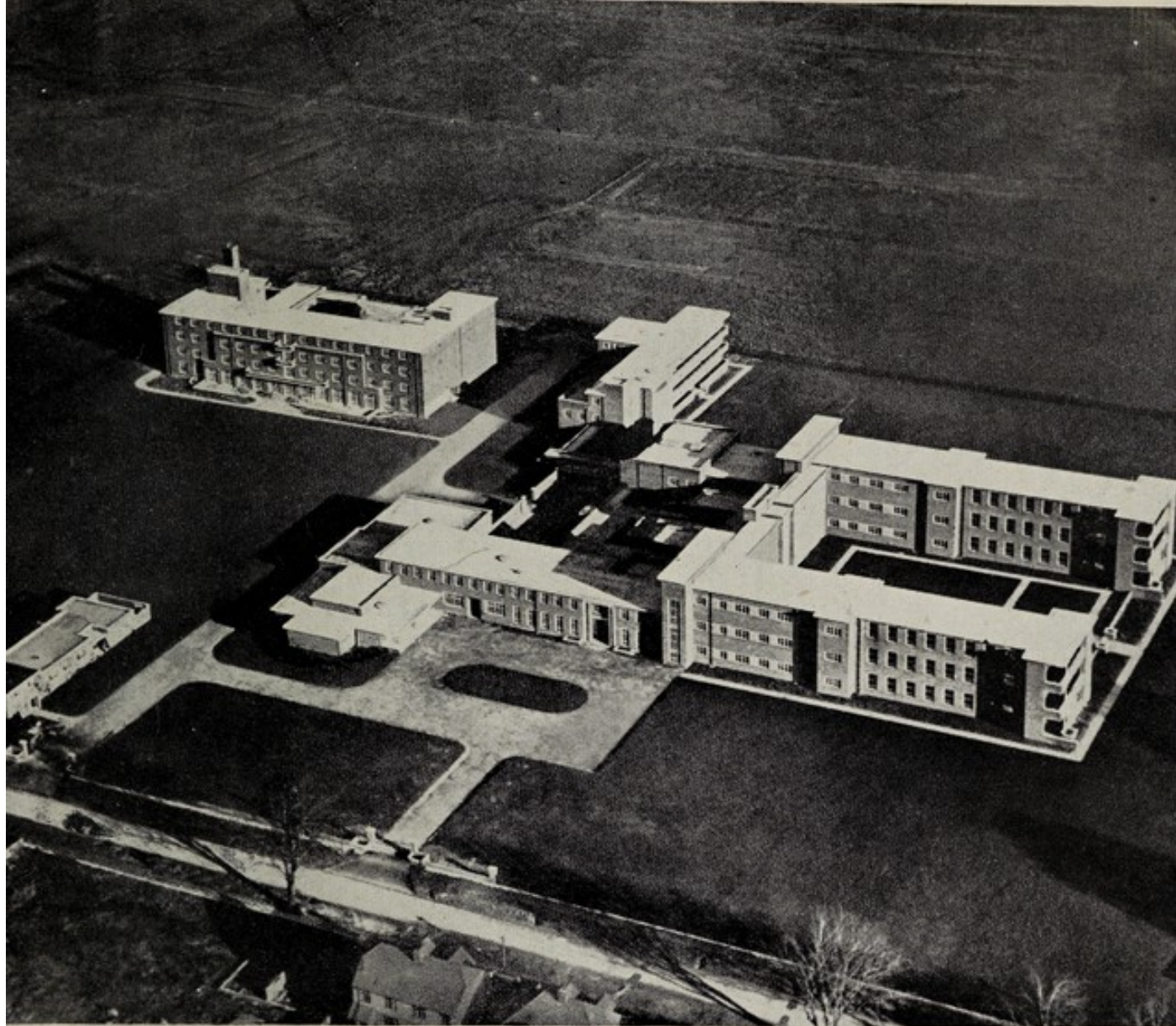
The Coat of Arms

The Armorial Bearings illustrated on the cover were granted to the hospital by the College of Arms in 1944. The Fleurs de Lis in the first and fourth quarters are a reference to St. Mary's, the Parish Church of Luton, and the crossed keys and sword in the second and third quarters to the Church of St. Peter and St. Paul, Dunstable. The Rod of Aesculapius may be taken as the symbol of healing.

The Latin motto "Deo Operae Scientiaeque Fisi," literally translated, means "Our Faith is in God, science and devotion to duty."

Foreword

TO-DAY we look forward to the new renaissance which may follow the triumph of Allied arms and the promise of the four freedoms.

Science, Art and Industry, no longer harnessed to war, will turn with new vigour to the problems of peace and the rebuilding of our national life. In the field of social security a new conception of social responsibility has arisen; in this there are great possibilities for the betterment of the common lot—but there is also the potential danger of a decay in the consciousness of individual responsibility.

FOR eight hundred years voluntary hospitals have served the community. They have established traditions which will leave their mark for all time; they have done more than merely provide a hospital service—they have been the means through which countless thousands have taken thought for others, have given service without thought of self and have voluntarily co-operated in the maintenance of a great institution. In scores of towns and villages they have been at once an expression of true democracy and a rallying point for those of goodwill.

THEIR continuance will not only bring a great contribution to the new health service—it will keep alive the spirit of voluntary service, be a safeguard against bureaucratic control of medicine, surgery and research, and leave a field wherein local patriotism and individual charity and compassion may still find expression and fulfilment.

Annual Report

THE Board of Management have pleasure in presenting their Annual Report to the Governors, the seventy-third since the establishment of the original cottage hospital in 1872.

It is hard to convey through such a medium a complete picture of the activities of the Hospital ; the Annual Report must of necessity contain much that is dull and matter of fact, so that however well produced, the usual report is at best an effort to present a factual story in as interesting a way as possible, and at worst a dull and unattractive array of facts and figures.

We have tried to avoid the latter and we hope that the Report will be acceptable to the Governors and to all those friends of the Hospital whom it reaches. Those who seek only a bird's eye view of the year's work and progress will find all that they need on pages five to sixteen ; those who delight in statistics and accounts will find them on later pages, together with the lists of subscriptions and donations.

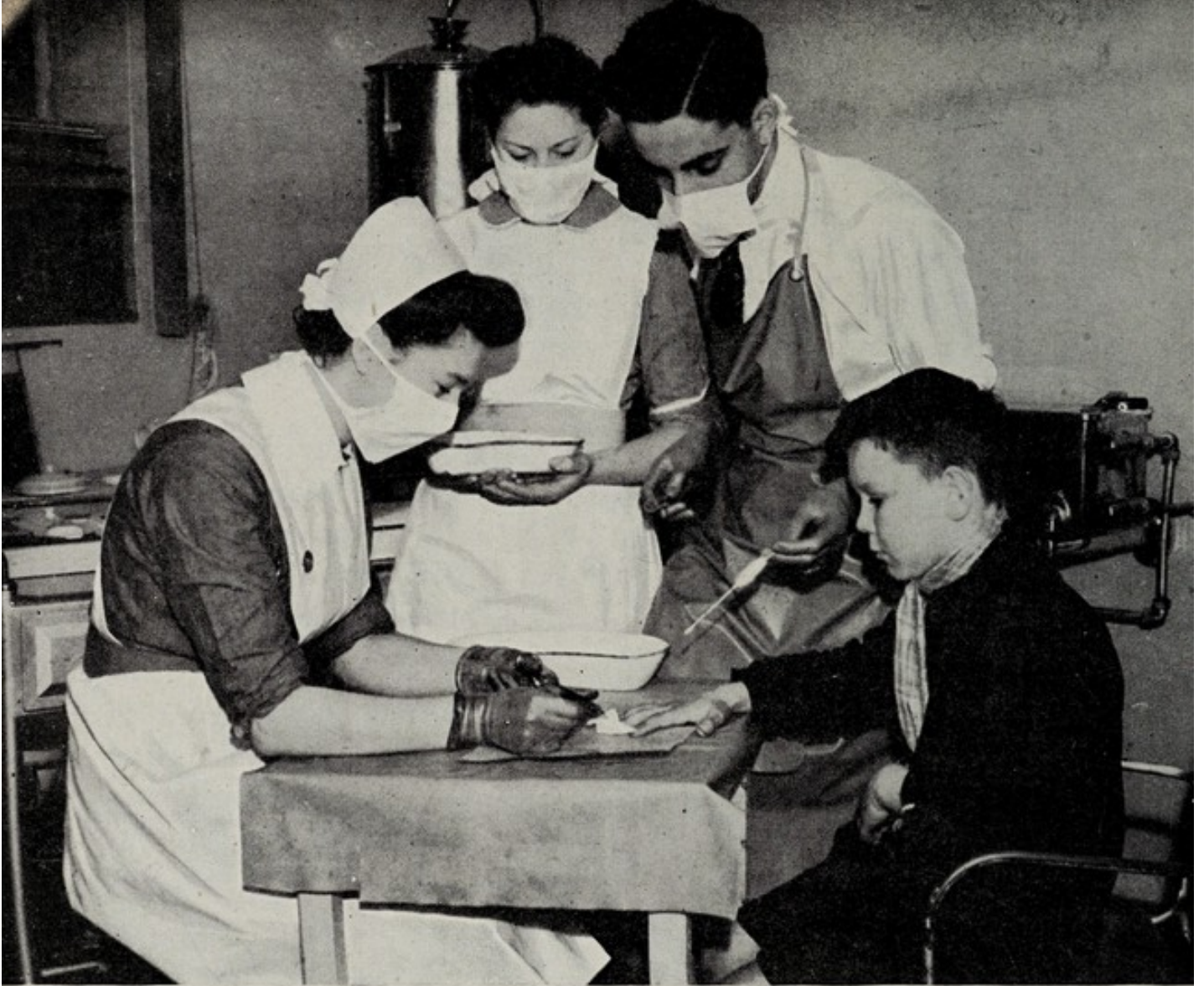

A MINOR INJURY

Great progress has been made in the treatment of minor injuries ; they are treated with the same skill and with the same aseptic safeguards as the major operation. This, together with the use of modern drugs—the sulphonamides and penicillin—has reduced enormously the risk of complication from septic infections.




In the application and changing of dressings the hospital employs what is known as the "non-touch" technique. The seated nurse shown in the above photograph, has been scrubbed-up and wears sterile gloves ; during the course of the dressing clinic she touches nothing that is not sterile. All that she needs is on the sterile trolley and is passed to her by the other nurse who acts as a "feeder." The patient's hand rests on a sterile towel ; the Surgeon is about to take a swab to test the wound for bacterial infection. Both nurses and surgeon wear masks to reduce the risk of infection from respiratory droplets. In the new Accident Unit it is hoped one day to build, air purification will be one of the features, so that the risk of air-borne infection may be further reduced.

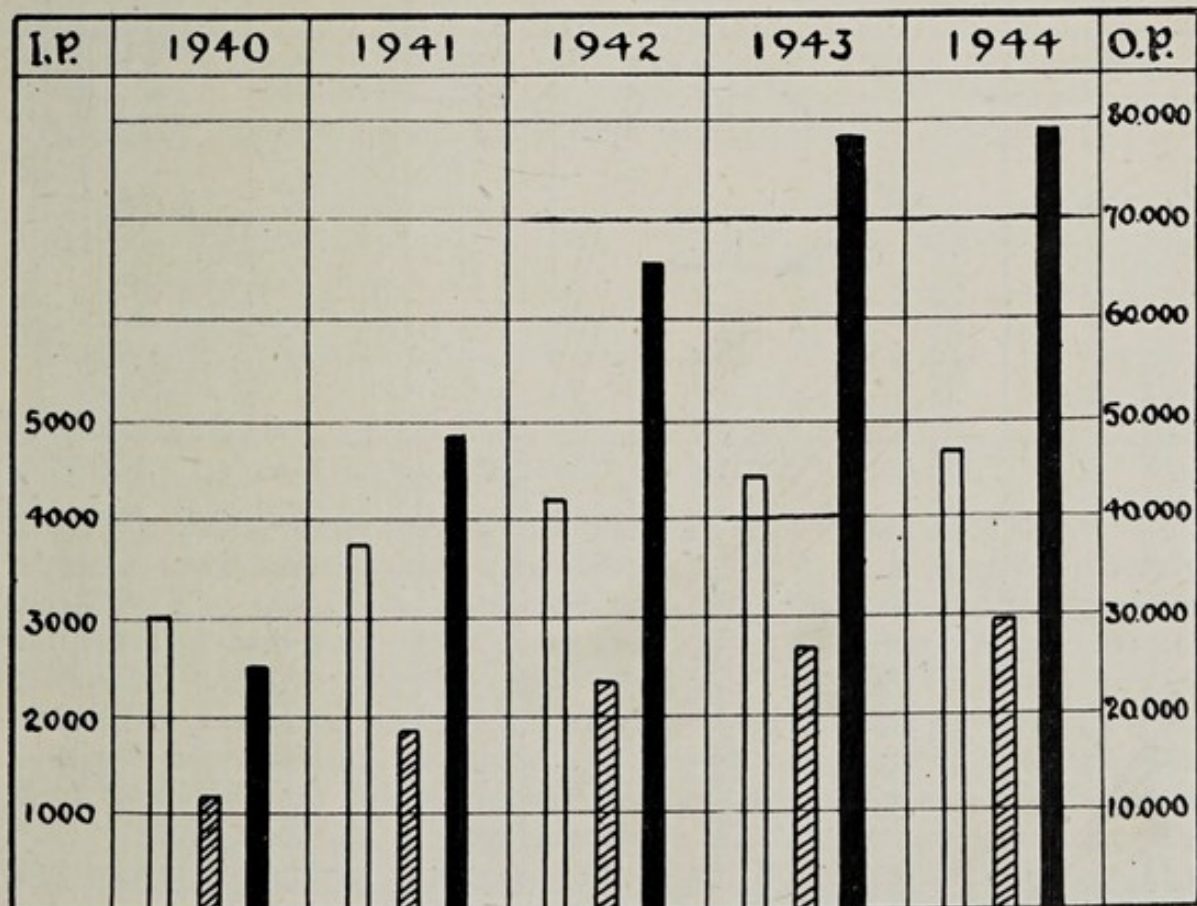
The importance of minor injuries lies in the fact that in the aggregate, more man-hours are lost from these than from major injuries.

The Year's Work

IN-PATIENTS.—In spite of the restriction on admissions preceding and following "D" day and the serious shortage of nurses, more patients than ever before were dealt with in the wards. The admissions were 4,678, an increase of 219 over 1943, the average number resident daily being 153.67 against 156.47. The average length of stay was 12.01 compared with 12.81 in 1943.

The reduction in the average number resident daily does not mean that the wards were less busy; the "turnover" of patients was more rapid and the total admissions higher, with the result that the wards had a greater proportion of patients requiring intensive nursing and treatment, with fewer patients in a pre-convalescent stage when the nursing is easier. This entails greater strain on the staff, a heavier expenditure of all kinds of supplies and materials, and patients have to be sent home at an earlier stage than would be the case in normal times. Every effort is made to avoid hardship, but with a waiting list of four to five hundred patients, many of them in urgent need of hospital treatment, it is often a case of choosing the lesser of two evils. Never a day passes but the dire need of more hospital beds is brought home to the staff.

In-Patients  Out-Patients  O.P. attendances 

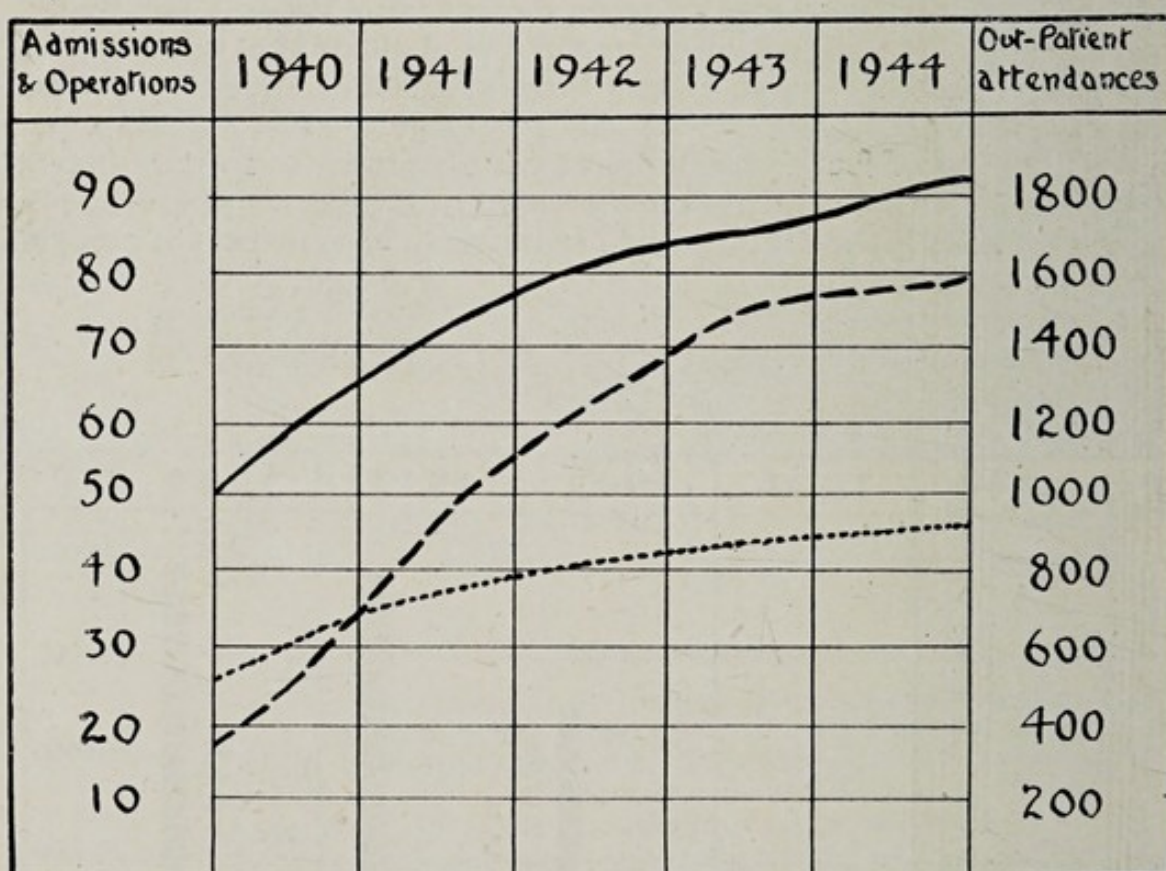


OUT-PATIENTS.—The out-patient department has been busier than ever ; the total number of new patients dealt with in the various departments amounted to 29,773 compared with 27,500 in 1943 and the total attendances 78,938 against 78,528. All the clinics and special departments are working at high pressure and the limited accommodation creates many difficulties. During the past five years the number of patients has increased to a great extent—the figures are graphically illustrated on page 7.

The special value of the out-patient department, with its emphasis on purely consultative and specialist services is widely acknowledged and patients are received from a wide area. Any further development, however, will need to await the provision of new buildings.

FINANCE.—The ordinary income for the year amounted to £61,281, being £7,714 more than 1943. Voluntary gifts, which have shown a steady and encouraging rise during the past few years, amounted to £9,887, an increase of £800 over the previous year and £4,000 more than in 1940, the first full year in the new Hospital. The increase of £340 in annual subscriptions was most welcome ; many subscribers increased their contributions and entered into seven-year covenants, enabling the Hospital to recover the income tax paid on their subscriptions, thus doubling their value to the Hospital without additional cost to the subscriber. The Industrial Safety Association has continued to give generous support and

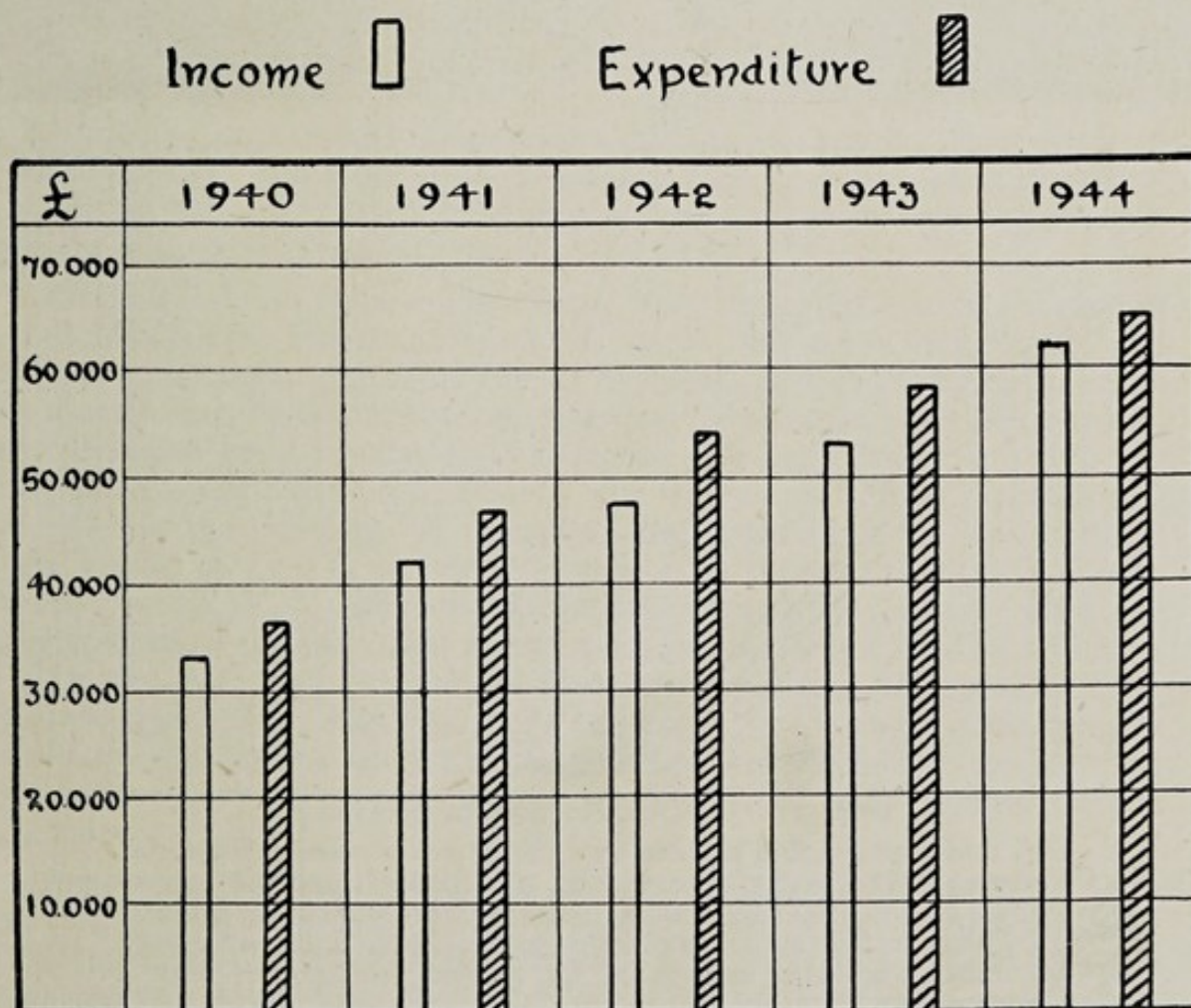
the contributions received from member firms will be found with the subscription lists on page 30.

Donations and special efforts show an increase of nearly £600 and in this connection due acknowledgment should be made of the splendid work done by the Appeals Committee and the Dunstable Hospital Organisation.

The need for more subscriptions and donations, however, is still imperative and even greater support is hoped for during 1945. In receipts on account of services rendered, which amounted to £50,573, the most notable increase is in contributory scheme income, which, at £16,391, was £3,890 more than 1943. The full effect of the change over to the new County Association, however, was not revealed in the year's accounts and it is confidently hoped that 1945 will show an even more satisfactory position.

The ordinary expenditure amounted to £66,848, and the Board have felt it prudent to add a further £1,600 to the reserve of £2,400 set aside last year for deferred expenditure on maintenance and renewals and repairs. After allowing for this and certain extraordinary expenditure, the deficit for the year amounted to £7,949, compared with £7,596 in 1943.

THE PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT

A most outstanding achievement of the reorganised laboratories during 1945 was in the production of Penicillin ; but the department made a great contribution to the ordinary work of the hospital by undertaking thousands of investigations of all kinds and a large number were also undertaken for general practitioners over a wide area.

PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.—After discussions with the Luton Town Council, agreement was reached to terminate the arrangement under which the Hospital's Laboratories had operated in conjunction with the Borough Laboratories. Dr. Ludgater, whose services to the Hospital as Honorary Pathologist over a period of five years are gratefully acknowledged, resigned in June, and Dr. M. Seiler, formerly Assistant Pathologist, was appointed Pathologist in a temporary capacity for the duration of the war. Additional technical and other assistance was obtained, and the Board authorised an expenditure of £750 on equipment to bring the Laboratory up to the standard required. This expenditure, together with increased cost of maintenance, has been well justified by the results, and the department is now able to undertake a wide range of investigations and to submit reports with a minimum of delay. 10,680 examinations were undertaken last year.

An outstanding service rendered by the department during 1944 was in the production of Penicillin. A culture of the mould was obtained early in the year, and from April onwards a constant supply of this extraordinary drug was produced in the Laboratory and made available for the treatment of patients. It is only recently that Penicillin (the manufacturing sources of which are controlled by the Government) has become available in limited quantities for civilian use, and it is believed that this was the only hospital where Penicillin was in regular use for other than Service patients. Thousands of patients received benefit from this drug during the year and apart from this there is the additional advantage that by the time Penicillin is generally available, the Hospital Staff will have long experience in the technique of its use and application. Penicillin is now used as a matter of routine in the Casualty Department and in the wards, particularly in cases of injury; combined with blood transfusion, now used extensively, it is certain that many lives have been saved, and much suffering avoided by these modern methods of treatment.

REHABILITATION.—The Board have approved the establishment of a Rehabilitation Department, and a site of four acres in Lewsey Road has been purchased, to provide for the buildings and a playing field. It is unfortunate that restrictions on building have prevented a start being made, but application has been made for a licence and urgent representations are being made to the Ministry of Health, who will supply certain prefabricated materials for the building. The capital cost, apart from the land, will be in the region of £4,000, and it is gratifying to report that by the end of 1944 a sum of £3,342 had been subscribed towards this, mainly from the member firms of the Industrial Safety Association. A generous contribution of £234 9s. 8d. from the Jewish Fraternity of Luton is also gratefully acknowledged. Both employers and employees are taking a keen interest in this development and Advisory Committees have been formed representing both interests, to co-operate in the establishment and running of the department.

A note on the functions of the department might not be out of place here; rehabilitation will start on the patient's admission to the ward, with special exercises for different conditions. Convalescence will be planned with a view to speeding up the recovery of physical and psychological

function, and hastening the patient's return to full activity. Occupational therapy (productive industrial work, crafts, etc.) comes into the picture, not only as a means of avoiding boredom, but as an actual part of the treatment. Diversional therapy (organised games and many forms of indoor and outdoor exercise) all contribute to the final toning up: various forms of mental stimulus such as lectures, discussions, musical entertainment and so on, will form part of the day's programme, so that periods of complete physical relaxation might be combined with active mental exercise. Rehabilitation, therefore, is concerned with the patient not only in the wards, but daily throughout his convalescence until he is able to return to normal life.

It is hoped that the building scheme approved by the Board will not be too long delayed, but it would be well to point out that it is a temporary scheme and that provision has been made for the addition of permanent buildings, which must form part of the Hospital's post-war scheme if the Rehabilitation Department develops on the lines anticipated.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.—An efficient X-Ray Department is an essential part of the Hospital as an aid to diagnosis, and, however expensive, equipment must be kept up-to-date to ensure a competent radiological service. On the recommendation of the Radiologist, supported by the Medical Advisory Committee, the Board approved an expenditure of £2,000 on new apparatus of the latest type; a licence for the supply of this has been obtained from the appropriate Ministry, and it is expected that the apparatus will be installed early in 1945. An appeal for funds resulted in the whole cost of the equipment being raised, and the Board acknowledge gratefully the contributions received, particularly the munificent sum of £1,000 from the Bernhard Baron Charitable Trust.

Dr. G. White-Phillips, who was appointed second Radiologist in 1943, found it necessary to resign during 1944, and as Dr. Holdsworth was able to attend an additional weekly session, it was considered unnecessary to appoint a successor to Dr. White-Phillips. The Department was extremely busy throughout the year and the importance of the work done will be appreciated from the following classification of the 15,651 examinations undertaken:—

MEDICAL STAFF.—In addition to the resignations of Dr. Ludgater and Dr. White-Phillips, already referred to, Dr. B. R. Vickers found it necessary to relinquish his appointment as Assistant Surgeon at the end of the year. Dr. Vickers had been on the staff of the Hospital for over fifteen years and in recognition of the valuable service he had rendered, he was appointed Honorary Consulting Surgeon. The Board are happy to feel that although Dr. Vickers is no longer an active member of the surgical staff, he retains his association with the Hospital and his interest in its manage-

ment. Two new appointments were made during the year : Dr. Freeman Heal was appointed Consulting Ophthalmic Surgeon, and Mr. J. Barron, Consulting Plastic Surgeon. The Board welcome the appointment of these distinguished specialists to the Hospital Staff. The Board must again record their great appreciation of the work of the visiting medical staff and of the resident staff, ably directed by the Medical Registrar, Dr. S. D. Purcell. The Hospital's work is of the highest standard ; first class and modern equipment, which the Board are always ready to provide, is an important factor, but without the teamwork, up-to-date technique and professional skill of the staff the best of equipment would be of little value ; in all of these the Hospital is most fortunately placed.

NURSING STAFF.—However excellent the work of physicians and surgeons, it would be incomplete without skilful nursing and the Board appreciate the splendid part played by the nursing staff during the past year. The heavy pressure of work, the acute shortage of both trained and student nurses and the involved technical nature of the nursing required for modern treatments, all tend to make their duties arduous and exacting, but they are carried out with great efficiency and in that happy spirit which is a characteristic of our nursing staff. The Training School has had another successful year, passes in the State examinations being almost one hundred per cent. Unfortunately, due to the operation of Ministry of Labour regulations, qualified nurses are directed to other spheres of nursing shortly after State Registration. Frequent representations on this point have been made to the Ministry of Labour and the Ministry of Health, but they have led to little improvement, and only by long hours of duty and devoted labours have the nursing staff been able to maintain their usual high standard. The Board acknowledge most gratefully all that has been done and the way in which difficulties have been so ably overcome by Matron and her Staff. The only cheerful note regarding the nurses who are compelled to leave us, is the excellent reports Matron receives on their work and progress in other hospitals ; they reflect much credit on the Training School and the Hospital generally.

ALMONER'S DEPARTMENT.—Too frequently is the chief function of the Almoner's Department of a hospital regarded as the assessment and collection of patients' fees ; this aspect of the Almoner's work is important, but her main activities are in the field of social medicine. It is on these premises that our Almoner's Department has been developed and is doing really constructive work. So often the patient has special problems, sometimes material, sometimes on the human side, that prevent him obtaining the full benefit of medical or surgical treatment ; it is the Almoner's task to smooth out these difficulties, and in co-operation with the doctor, to ensure that no avoidable anxieties hinder the patient's progress. We are fortunate in having an excellent staff in Miss Bowman, the Almoner, and two Assistants, Mrs. Evans and Miss Garrett ; their training and experience enable them to call upon all available statutory and voluntary organisations to help in cases of difficulty, and much more has been done for our patients by way of after-care than ever before. In many cases material help is needed and a large number of agencies have rendered aid to our patients

THE TRAINING OF NURSES

The Training School for Nurses, now in its sixth year, has been one of the most successful features of the new Hospital. During 1944, seventeen of our students passed the State Examination ; but one of the urgent needs of the Hospital remains a Preliminary Training School where students could receive theoretical instruction before entering the Wards.

at the Almoner's request ; but there are times when such help cannot be obtained and in these the Samaritan Fund is the utmost help. It is gratifying to report that as a result of many generous contributions, the fund stood at £692 3s. 8d. at the end of the year ; contributions to this fund will be most welcome and will be gratefully acknowledged by the Almoner. The Almoner's thanks are extended to all outside agencies and organisations who have co-operated during the year, and to the voluntary workers who give valuable assistance in her department. It will interest the governors to learn that the Institute of Hospital Almoners sent five students during the year to undertake a part of their practical training in our department.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.—The Board were extremely sorry to receive in October the resignation of Mr. J. Llywarch, Honorary Treasurer for over twelve years, who was leaving Luton on his retirement from the Bank. Mr. Llywarch had taken much interest in the treasuryship and in the Hospital management and he is greatly missed. Pending confirmation by the Governors, Mr. A. C. Fellingham was elected Acting Honorary Treasurer. The Rev. Canon Morgan unfortunately felt it necessary to resign his seat on the Board and his appointment as Chaplain owing to health reasons, and the Board cordially acknowledge all that Canon Morgan did for the Hospital during the years he held these offices. The Rev. G. W. Clarkson was appointed Chaplain to succeed Canon Morgan, a position he filled most successfully, but had to relinquish on leaving Dunstable to take another living. He was succeeded as Chaplain by the Rev. W. Francis Hicks, who takes the same keen interest in the hospital as his predecessors. Mr. J. Gibbs and Mr. G. V. S. Cotton were appointed to fill the vacancies created on the Board of Management.

BEDFORDSHIRE HOSPITAL SERVICE ASSOCIATION.—The new County Contributory Scheme was inaugurated in February, 1944, replacing the Bedford Hospital Scheme and the Luton Hospital Saving Association. It was some months before the Association was in full operation, but the results achieved are sufficient indication that this development was in the best interests of hospitals and contributors. Membership has largely increased, the Provident Fund has been an outstanding success, and the Hospital's contributory scheme income reached the record total of £16,391. The Board wish to express their sincere congratulations and appreciation to the Board and Officers of the Association, and their grateful thanks to the Group Secretaries, without whose voluntary labours little could have been achieved.

CONVALESCENT HOME.—The Thomas Lye Convalescent Home remained open throughout the year, and 95 patients were admitted, an increase of eleven over 1943, the average number resident daily being 4.61. Income during the year amounted to £1,165, an increase of £151, and expenditure £1,149, an increase of £85. The accounts show a credit balance of £15 compared with a deficit of £50 in 1943. With the lessening of enemy activity there has been an increase in the number of patients admitted, and the beds in use have been increased from six to eight. The Board wish to express their thanks to the Matron, Miss Masterton, and her staff,

for the way in which they have carried on throughout the war in the face of many difficulties and anxieties.

LINEN LEAGUE.—The Linen League had a most successful year and £285 was handed to the Hospital for the purchase of linen, £85 more than the previous year. Grateful thanks are due to the Chairman, Miss Redman, the Honorary Treasurer, Mrs. Mackenzie, the Honorary Secretary, Mrs. Seaward, and to the committee and members. Their activities have greatly strengthened the League during the past year and the Board are confident that this organisation will grow in value with the coming of normal conditions.

APPEALS COMMITTEE.—The Rev. Canon Morgan, who had been Chairman of the Appeals Committee since its inception, had, to the Committee's great regret, to resign in February, and he was succeeded by Mr. G. Seaward. As will be seen from the Accounts, the year's work was most successful and all the Committee's regular efforts, such as flag days, house-to-house collections, etc., showed substantial increases over 1943. The Committee also gave much assistance in raising funds to meet the cost of the new X-Ray equipment, and to increasing the income from annual subscriptions. The Committee's regular monthly meetings are well attended and the most satisfactory increase in voluntary gifts during 1944 is due in a large measure to their hard work and enthusiasm. They are greatly helped by friends and supporters in the villages served by the Hospital, from whom generous support is received. The Board acknowledge very gratefully the valuable work done by the Committee and their helpers under the chairmanship of Mr. Seaward. A list of the Committee and the village organisers will be found on page 19.

THE FUTURE.—With the end of the European War approaching, the thoughts of the Board must be more and more directed to problems of post-war development, and it must be admitted that these problems are extremely complicated, bound up as they are with the proposals for a National Health Service. We have no fear as to the continuance of the voluntary hospital movement; as the present Minister of Health has said, the Government have no wish to destroy or diminish a system which is so well rooted in the goodwill of its supporters, and its material assets and magnificent traditions are a heritage too valuable to be sacrificed to a hard uniformity. The danger we can see, and which we must strive to avoid is that urgently needed extensions and vital developments might be put off because, under a National Health Service, they may become "the Government's responsibility." It cannot be too strongly emphasised that good as the Hospital's services are, the accommodation and facilities fall far below the requirements of Luton, Dunstable and district. The present Hospital was built by voluntary effort; it must shortly be considered whether the large extensions required would not more adequately and quickly be achieved by the same method. The answer may be affected by factors outside the control of the Board, but whatever the course followed, let us do all we can to ensure that when the extensions come into being and wider fields of service are achieved, they are adequate alike in conception and execution and are of good report.

Milestones in the history of the Hospital

1872—Foundation of the Luton Cottage Hospital with three Beds.

1882—Opening of the Bute Hospital, Luton, with 26 Beds.

1904—New Wards, increasing Beds to 50.

1930—Private Ward Block of 20 Beds ; a new Nurses' Home.

1939—Her Majesty Queen Mary opened the Luton and Dunstable Hospital on the 14th February. 156 Hospital Beds, 24 Private Ward Beds.

1941—Extensions to the Out-Patient Department carried out at a cost of £3,300.

Q To-day every section of the Hospital is used to the limit of its capacity and accommodation for In-patients, Out-patients and Staff is very inadequate ; large extensions are urgently required and must be undertaken at the earliest possible moment if Luton and Dunstable are to have the hospital service they need.
