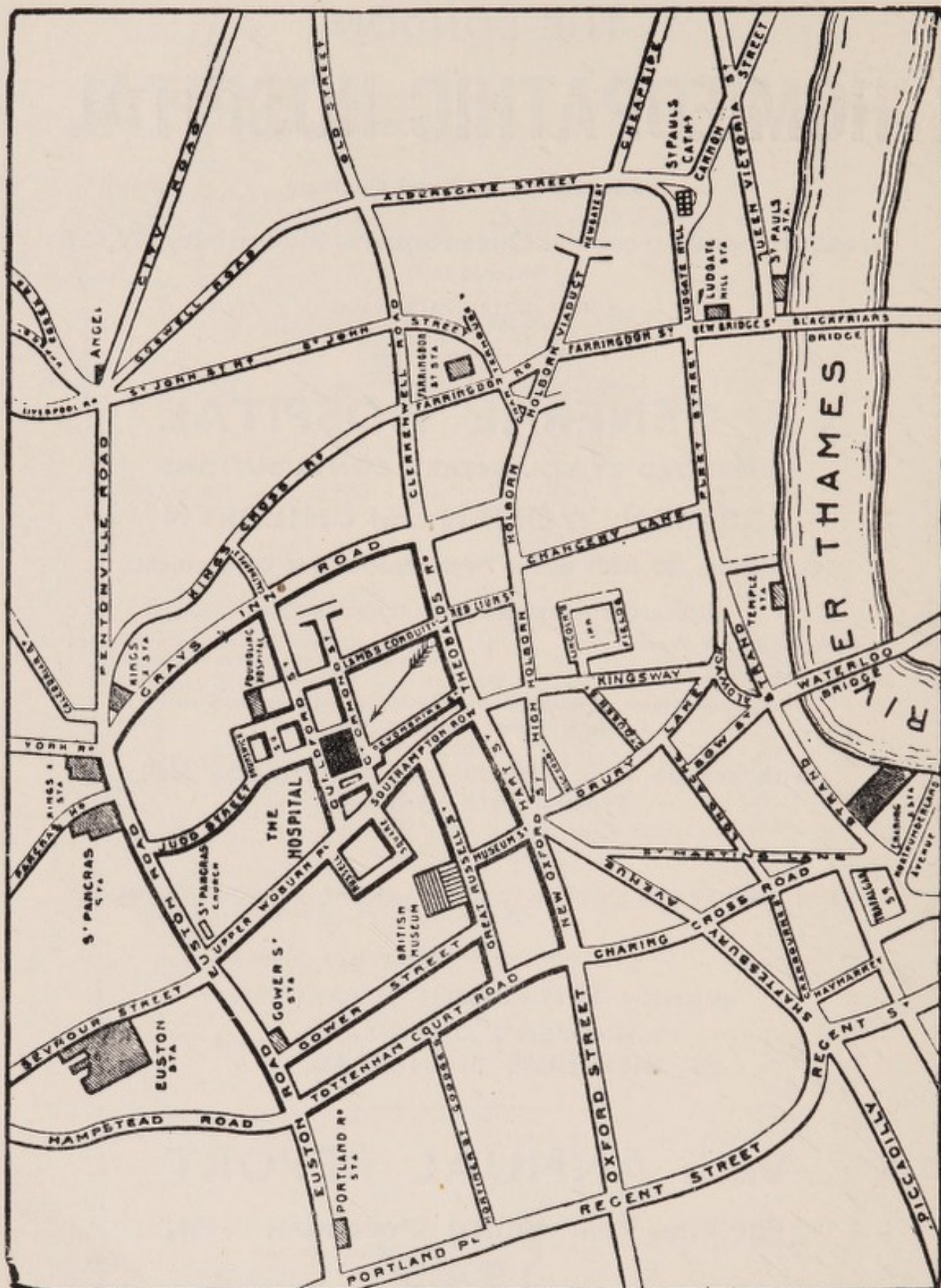

NINETY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT AND AUDITED ACCOUNTS

For the Year ending December 31st, 1945

The Board are pleased to report that some progress has been made during the past year with the repair of bomb damage to the Nurses' Home. Although this has been restricted to a part of the building only, it is anticipated that forty bedrooms will be ready very shortly for the accommodation of Nursing Staff, together with lecture room and sitting rooms. It will then be possible, subject to sufficient staff, to reopen more rooms for private patients and a public ward of sixteen beds, all of which have been used for temporary accommodation of staff.

Licences have also been obtained for the repair of bomb damage to Hahnemann and Vaughan Morgan Wards which, when completed, will almost restore the Hospital's normal complement of 200 beds, and good progress has been made with reglazing throughout the Hospital. At the same time much needed light and air have been introduced by the removal of all protective brickwork, and in this connection the Board wish to express their appreciation of the services of the Engineer and his staff who, through lack of outside labour, undertook the demolition of much of the more accessible brickwork in the basement.

The reinstatement of the Pathological Department and completion of repairs to the Chapel and Mortuary still remain in abeyance pending official sanction to proceed. The rebuilding of a major part of the Nurses' Home will also be necessary as soon as circumstances permit. Meanwhile, in order to provide for the necessary additional staff, the liability for renting Bernard Mansions for the nursing staff will remain. In addition to this the Hospital is faced with the urgent need for redecoration and other necessary improvements which should be undertaken as soon as the required materials and labour are available.

HONORARY TREASURER.

It is with considerable pleasure and satisfaction the Board announce the appointment in July last of Sir Clarence Sadd, C.B.E., J.P., D.L., Vice-Chairman of the Midland Bank, as Honorary Treasurer of the Hospital. This has already resulted in the Hospital receiving a sum of £760 (at December 31st) in donations in response to an appeal made by Sir Clarence to his

personal friends, and the Board are most grateful for this very encouraging evidence of his interest in the work and welfare of the Hospital.

THE YEAR'S WORK.

A further reduction in the number of beds reserved by the Ministry of Health for the Emergency Medical Service from 40 to 25 took effect on April 1st, and the reservation finally ceased on September 30th, since when no further grants have been received from the Ministry.

With the closing of the Annexe for surgical work on June 1st last, Dysart and Ebury Wards were reopened with 30 beds for female surgical patients, thus increasing the total number of available beds at the main Hospital to 120.

The total number of patients treated at the Hospital during the year has therefore increased as stated below :

COOMBE WOODHOUSE.

In view of staffing difficulties and the heavy financial liabilities attaching to the Hospital's Annexe at Kingston, it was decided in May last to transfer all surgical work to the main Hospital and to use the Annexe exclusively as a Recovery and Convalescent Home until early in 1946, when the tenancy of Coombe Woodhouse will be terminated.

CONVALESCENT HOME.

Opportunity has been taken to dispose of the Hospital's premises at 36 Enys Road, Eastbourne, which were requisitioned and occupied by the military during the war, to the Princess Alice Memorial Hospital, whose offer of £4,000 to purchase has been accepted. With this sum and other available funds a more suitable and commodious freehold house known as Withdean Hall, situated in Preston Park, Brighton, has been acquired for the sum of £5,000, subject to the approval and consent of the Charity Commissioners. Although it is in use by the military as a Camp Reception Station at present, it is hoped to obtain possession some time during the summer of 1946, when it will be equipped and used as a Recovery and Convalescent Home for approximately 35 patients, in place of Coombe Woodhouse.

MAINTENANCE.

The steady increase in maintenance costs coupled with increased work has again resulted in a deficit on the year's working of £10,777.

This takes into account a reservation of £1,373 for establishment renewals and repairs which, together with a similar annual amount allocated in previous years and now totalling £6,018, is set aside for necessary renovations when practicable.

It has also placed on the Hospital the liability for an overdraft at the Bank amounting to £13,916 at December 31st, 1945, which has involved the Hospital in a payment of £495 for Bank charges.

At the same time the high cost of all essential commodities and the necessity for replacing much worn-out equipment and effecting long overdue improvements emphasizes the Hospital's urgent need for increased support if it is adequately to maintain its important services as the principal Homœopathic Hospital in this country. Whilst a measure of Government aid may be anticipated under the proposed National Health Service, it is most important that homœopaths everywhere should rally to the support of their Hospital to ensure that some provision is made for homœopathic treatment in such a service. Should this support not be forthcoming in sufficient measure, then there would be a real danger that these special facilities would become gradually submerged in the more comprehensive State scheme for the provision of orthodox treatment.

The Board acknowledge with grateful thanks a welcome increase in the grant from the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund from £630 in 1944 to £670 in 1945.

A satisfactory increase is also recorded in the amount received from the Hospital Saving Association which totalled £8,340 compared with £8,082 in 1944.

The amount of income tax recovered from the Inland Revenue in respect of covenanted subscriptions was £460.

The Hospital has also received a sum of £445 net realized by the sale of No. 3 Yardley Street, Brighton, a small house formerly occupied by the Dispenser to the Sussex County Homœopathic Dispensary, which reverted to the Hospital on the death of the surviving tenant.

KING EDWARD'S HOSPITAL FUND.

The Hospital was visited by the representatives of King Edward's Hospital Fund, Dr. A. Hope Gosse and Mr. E. T. Nethercoat, C.B.E., J.P., on June 19th, when they made some reference to the Hospital's urgent need for improved lighting in the wards.

The grant of £1,500 compared with £2,000 received the previous year is acknowledged with thanks. The Board are indebted to the King's Fund for their very helpful memoranda issued during the year dealing with "Some Aspects of Post-War Hospital Problems".

PRIVATE WARDS.

Full use has been made of the private wards on the fourth floor since they were re-opened, and good facilities are provided for those desiring the amenities of a nursing home at moderate fees. The need for additional improvements and the installation of telephones is recognized, and these will be effected as soon as possible. Enquiries for accommodation will be welcomed by the Sister in Charge (Terminus 3208).

LADIES GUILD.

The Hospital has again received substantial help from the Ladies Guild, who were successful in raising a total sum of £376, largely through the effective appeals to the members by their Chairman, Mrs. Sivell. This has enabled them to grant £200 for the renewal of linen, £25 for crockery, and £40 for the purchase of wireless headphones for the use of patients, besides making their customary donations for the Christmas entertainment of patients and staff. For all this help the Board are most grateful and they desire to congratulate Mrs. Sivell and the Council of the Guild on their continued successful efforts on behalf of the Hospital. (For detailed account, see p. 45.)

CHILDREN'S HOMŒOPATHIC DISPENSARY.

The Children's Dispensary at Shepherd's Bush continues to render good service and, as already reported, 1,448 children were treated last year. Special donations of £32 and £25, being (a) proceeds of a dance held at the Melrose Club on September 17th and (b) a concert organized by Mrs. Fairman on March 22nd, are acknowledged with gratitude by the Board, who wish to record their appreciation of the kind efforts of Mrs. Gunn, Sister in Charge, Mrs. Fairman and the Secretary and Members of the Melrose Club and others who contributed to these excellent results.

VE CELEBRATIONS.

In commemoration of the victory of the Allied Forces in Europe, the Mayor and Mayoress of Holborn, Alderman Wilfred Mullen and Mrs. Mullen, accompanied by Aldermen, Councillors, and the Town Clerk with members of the Hospital Committee in attendance, visited the Hospital on July 20th and entertained all the patients to tea. The Mayor's cheerful bedside manner and encouraging words and the gifts of cigarettes and flowers distributed by the Mayoress were much appreciated by all.

A large consignment of sweets from the Lord Mayor of Melbourne, received through the Lord Mayor of London, also proved to be a most acceptable gift.

LIBRARY.

Patients and Staff have continued to enjoy the benefits of the Hospital Library throughout the year, through the kindness of the Honorary Librarian, Mrs. Fox, who has attended regularly each week to distribute books, with the assistance of Mrs. Kinder. Gifts of books for the Library would be welcome, especially works of travel and fiction for which there is a demand.

CHRISTMAS 1945.

The Board record with grateful thanks a Christmas gift of £10 from His Majesty the King, Patron of the Hospital. An attractive programme was arranged for the entertainment of patients and staff during the Christmas holiday. This included

a rendering of carols by the Messenger Boys' Band of Messrs. Cables & Wireless Ltd., and a concert given by the nurses under the direction of their tutor, Sister M. Barnes, who received well merited applause from a large and appreciative audience.

POST-GRADUATE LECTURES.

With the aid of financial assistance from the Trustees of the estate of the late Mrs. Honyman Gillespie, the Hospital has been enabled to continue the courses of lectures on Homœopathy which were given during the winter session by Dr. C. E. Wheeler and Dr. A. D. C. MacGowan and during the summer session by Dr. J. D. Kenyon and Dr. W. L. Templeton.

The latter in addition conduct an out-patient clinic on Monday and Thursday afternoons for practical instruction.

By means of an increased grant from the Honyman Gillespie Trustees in recent years, lectures on Homœopathy are also given at the Glasgow Homœopathic Hospital.

The Board are grateful to the Trustees for the opportunity to provide these facilities for medical practitioners who are desirous of obtaining the Diploma of Membership of the Faculty of Homœopathy.

Sir John Weir, G.C.V.O., again delivered the Compton Burnett Lectures under the auspices of the British Homœopathic Association, and Dr. A. Moncrieff gave a course of lectures on the Repertory sponsored by the Tyler Scholarship Committee.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

Application has been made to the Ministry of Health for the necessary approval for certain structural alterations to the X-Ray Department in order to provide dressing rooms preparatory to the installation of the new X-Ray plant which is now urgently needed. This will involve a total expenditure of £5,160, and this amount must be found and the work put in hand as soon as official sanction is received in order that the radiological work of the Hospital, already seriously handicapped, is not to be brought to a standstill. Special donations towards this important object will therefore be very gratefully received.

PHYSIO-THERAPY DEPARTMENT.

The registration of 18,561 attendances for massage and 17,168 for electrical treatment during the past year again demonstrates very forcibly the demand for treatment in this Department and the urgent need for its early expansion.

THE MISSIONARY SCHOOL OF MEDICINE.

Facilities for attending the practice of the Hospital have again been granted to the students of the School, who find this instruction of much practical value in the mission field, where homœopathic medicines and treatment have proved to be particularly suitable and effective.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

The Board of Management has been strengthened during the year by the election of Mr. A. E. Bridges Webb and Mr. A. N. Dove, J.P.

Mr. M. A. Honywood has been re-elected to the Board as the Representative of the British Homœopathic Association.

The following members of the Board retire under By-Law 18 and are deemed to be nominated for re-election: Sir Henry J. F. Badeley, K.C.B., C.B.E., Dr. P. Hall-Smith, Dr. A. Benjamin, Sir John Weir, G.C.V.O.

The two medical members of the Board retired in the ordinary course, and the Board have, on the nomination of the Medical Committee, re-elected Dr. A. D. C. MacGowan and Dr. W. L. Templeton to seats on the Board. These appointments the Governors, Donors and Subscribers are invited to confirm.

HONORARY VICE-TREASURER.

On the resignation of Mr. Christopher Bower from the office of Honorary Vice-Treasurer, the Board have appointed Mr. John Gedge, who kindly offered to fill the vacancy.

MEDICAL STAFF.

The retirement of Dr. D. M. Borland under Medical Staff Rules took effect on March 21st, 1945, and in consideration of his valuable services to the Hospital since he joined the Staff in 1913 the Board have appointed him an Honorary Consulting Physician to the Hospital.

Dr. W. W. Rorke, who has held the post of Medical Tutor to the Hospital since 1925, also retired in February 1945.

The services of both Dr. Borland and Dr. Rorke, which were rendered with great punctiliousness, have been much appreciated and they will be missed by many grateful patients.

Dr. John W. Bell, Physician for Diseases of Women since 1924, has now been appointed Consulting Gynæcologist following his retirement from the active Staff.

The resignation of Surgeon Captain W. B. D. Miller, D.S.C., R.N.V.R., Assistant Surgeon for Diseases of the Throat, Nose and Ear since 1931, is announced with regret.

A cordial welcome is extended to the following members of the Honorary Staff who have returned from H.M. Forces and resumed regular attendance at the Hospital:

To all members of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff the Board extend their sincere thanks for their services during the past year. The Staff have done much to enhance the reputation of the Institution and to assist its development as a general hospital, and it is due to their unremitting care and attention that the Hospital is so deservedly popular.

OBITUARY.

The Board announce with regret the death of Mr. Harry Collison who had been a member of the Board since 1932, and Mr. H. J. Sayer, J.P., whose untimely death deprives the Hospital of the services of an ardent homœopath. Their loss will be keenly felt.

HONORARY CONSULTING ARCHITECT.

The Board acknowledge with thanks the services during the past year of Mr. J. Murray Easton, F.R.I.B.A., Honorary Consulting Architect, and his staff whose advice and practical co-operation in the repair and maintenance of the Hospital buildings, including war damage repairs, have proved most helpful.

HONORARY SOLICITORS.

The thanks of the Board are also extended to the Honorary Solicitors, Messrs. Gedge, Fiske & Co., for services rendered during the year.

The advice of Mr. John Gedge himself, as a member of the Board, has been freely sought and has proved invaluable on the several occasions when a legal opinion has been required, and his personal interest in the running of the Hospital has been greatly appreciated.

CHAPLAIN.

Patients and Staff have derived much help and comfort from the ministrations of the Chaplain, the Rev. H. B. Brewer, and his assistant, the Rev. S. B. Brown, who have regularly held services throughout the year, both at the Hospital and the Annexe. The Board acknowledges with gratitude the time thus devoted to the spiritual needs and welfare of both patients and staff.

NURSING.

At the request of the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital several of their student nurses have been admitted to the Hospital's Preliminary Training School for regular instruction by the Sister Tutor in preparation for the Preliminary State Examinations. It is anticipated that the lecture room facilities will be fully restored in the Nurses' Home very shortly and that the results from this inter-Hospital arrangement will prove to be of mutual benefit.

The standard of training has been well maintained and the Sister Tutor, Sister M. Barnes, is to be congratulated on the successes achieved by the Nurses in the recent State Examinations.

With the reopening of more beds it has been necessary to suspend the holding of State Examinations in the Hospital for the General Nursing Council until the lecture rooms become available.

Miss Greenaway, the Assistant Matron, who returned in November last on her demobilization from the Q.A.I.M.N.S., left the Hospital on her subsequent marriage, and Miss Sims of the Kent and Canterbury Hospital has been appointed to fill the vacancy.

The death on February 22nd, 1945, of Sister Mary Edgar, who retired in 1933 after completing 38 years in the service of the Hospital, is announced with regret.

Owing to the acute shortage of nurses in certain special fields of nursing, the Ministry of Labour and National Service is continuing its control and direction of all nurses on qualifying in the State Final Examinations subject to the special needs of individual hospitals. While this restricts the number of State Registered Nurses in the employ of a hospital, it is hoped by this means to ensure a fair distribution of the qualified personnel available.

The task of the Matron in making provision for the nursing and domestic needs of the Hospital is still an anxious one, and her helpful co-operation together with that of her Staff is much appreciated by the Board.

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF.

The absence of the Assistant Secretary, who has been on active service since 1941, has thrown a burden on the Secretary, Mr. L. J. Knowles, which in the opinion of the Board cannot be allowed to continue indefinitely. They recognize that Mr. Knowles, backed by his small but efficient staff, has shouldered the responsibility and the extra work with unfailing courage, and they are glad to take this opportunity of expressing their gratitude.

CONCLUSION.

In view of pending legislation which aims at the control of the Voluntary Hospitals and the complete reorganization of the health services of the country, it is even more imperative to-day for homœopaths everywhere to demand that adequate facilities should be provided for homœopathic treatment.

It will be recognized, of course, that an integral part of these facilities will be a flourishing and progressive hospital service, and to ensure this there is urgent need of a much greater measure of support from those who value and believe in Homœopathy.

As the chief centre in this country for the practice of and instruction in Homœopathy, the London Homœopathic Hospital holds a prominent position which has endured for the past 95 years. It can boast a record of proud achievements and ever-expanding work which has received Royal recognition and, in latter years, the patronage of His Majesty the King. It is important, therefore, that this position should be fully maintained in the new era which now confronts us and which will shortly see the centenary of the Hospital's foundation.

The Board would therefore renew their appeal to all friends and supporters of the Hospital for the additional financial help that is necessary to maintain this important work.

Held in the Board Room of the Hospital
 on Thursday, May 9th, 1946.

SIR CLARENCE T. A. SADD, C.B.E., J.P., D.L., Hon. Treasurer of
 the Hospital, presided.

THE proceedings were opened by prayer by the **Rev. H. B. Brewer**,
 Chaplain to the Hospital.

The Secretary (**Mr. Leonard J. Knowles, F.C.C.S.**) read the notice
 convening the meeting.

The following message from **Sir Godfrey Thomas** on behalf of the
President, H.R.H. The Duke of Gloucester, K.G., was then read by the
 Secretary :

“ I have forwarded to the Duke of Gloucester in Australia
 an advance copy of the Annual Report of The London Homœo-
 pathic Hospital.

I know that His Royal Highness, as President, will be inter-
 ested to receive this, and would wish me, in his absence to convey
 once again to the Board of Management his good wishes to the
 Hospital in all its activities, and his hope that it may be able
 successfully to maintain, in these difficult post-war days, the
 high standard of care and treatment for which it has long been
 well known.

(Signed) **GODFREY THOMAS.**”

This was followed by expressions of regret at non-attendance
 from many friends and supporters.

In accordance with the usual practice, the Minutes of the last
 Annual General Meeting and Special General Meeting which were held
 on Thursday, June 7th, 1945, were taken as read and with the approval
 of the meeting were signed by the Chairman.

Sir Clarence Sadd then rose to propose the adoption of the Ninety-
 sixth report of the Board of Management and signed audited accounts
 of the Hospital for the year ending December 31st, 1945.

He expressed his pleasure and appreciation of the honour conferred on him by his appointment of Honorary Treasurer of the Hospital and referred with satisfaction to the repair of part of the bomb damage to the Nurses' Home, which will restore more than 40 bedrooms for the use of the Nurses before the end of the month. Coombe Woodhouse, the Hospital's War-time Annexe would soon be closed and he congratulated the Hospital on acquiring Withdean Hall, a commodious house at Preston Park, Brighton, for use as a Convalescent Home in place of the Home at Eastbourne, which had been sold to the local Hospital.

Expenditure was necessarily high due to increases in salaries and wages and commodities generally beyond the Hospital's control, but he was happy in his capacity as Treasurer to have raised a sum towards this which he hoped would not be considered entirely unsatisfactory. Sir Clarence acknowledged with gratitude the help of the Hospital's many friends and supporters and the legacies received during the past year, including one from the former Chairman, the late Mr. Edward Clifton-Brown, whose loss he referred to with regret.

Post-Graduate lectures in Homœopathy had been continued and were an important feature of the Hospital's activities. The Hospital was urgently needing a new X-Ray plant and he trusted that some wealthy sympathizer would make a special contribution to get this vitally important department fully equipped.

Sir Clarence Sadd welcomed all members of the Medical and Nursing Staff who had returned from the Forces and expressed his appreciation of the services of Mr. Gedge, who had recently been appointed Vice-Treasurer, the Honorary Architect, Mr. J. Murray Easton and the Chaplain and Assistant Chaplain.

Sir Clarence paid a warm tribute to the Nursing Staff whose welfare and training he regarded of outstanding importance and in conclusion he said "The more I speak to the medical profession and the more I see of Hospitals, the more I am convinced that it is the Nursing Staff that makes the Hospital a real success, and I must pay my personal tribute to your Matron, Miss Andros. When I first visited the Hospital, the welcome I received from the Secretary, Mr. Knowles, was quite outstanding, but it was the charming kindness and warm reception of the Matron which made me feel at home at once as your Honorary Treasurer."

The adoption of the report was seconded by **Mr. Rupert Colomb** who spoke of the Hospital's good fortune in securing the services of Sir Clarence Sadd, whose appeal for the Hospital had met with such excellent results. The Appeals Committee had made plans for a large scale appeal and had in fact arranged for a National Broadcast Appeal, but this had been postponed following the publication of the National Health Service Bill. He referred to the Hospital's urgent need for redecoration and the somewhat depressing conditions prevailing in the Massage Department, whose need for better facilities and more space might, he thought, be provided in Hahnemann Ward when repaired, even at the sacrifice of 16 beds. With the return of Mr. Robinson, the Assistant Secretary from the Forces, Mr. Colomb trusted that the Secretary would be enabled to take a well-earned holiday after his exacting duties and responsibilities during the war years.

On being put to the meeting the report was thereupon unanimously adopted.

On the proposition of **Sir John Weir**, which was seconded by **Mr. Slatter**, the re-election of the President, **H.R.H. The Duke of Gloucester**, **K.G., K.T., K.P.**, etc. and the re-election of the Vice-Presidents, **The Lord Ebury**, **Lord McGowan of Ardeer**, **The Earl of Morley**, **The Hon. Sir Arthur Stanley**, and the election of **Lord Methuen** as a Vice-President and **Sir Clarence T. A. Sadd** as Honorary Treasurer was carried unanimously.

The **Rev. H. B. Brewer** then proposed a cordial vote of thanks to the Board of Management, House Committee, Nursing Committee, Vice-Treasurer and Ladies Guild of the Hospital. This was seconded by **Miss Dethridge**, carried with applause, and received an appropriate response from **Mrs. Clifton-Brown**, who spoke on behalf of the Ladies Guild.

The Re-election of the Retiring Members of the Board of Management, **Sir Henry J. F. Badeley**, **Dr. A. Benjamin**, **Dr. P. Hall-Smith**, **Sir John Weir**, **Dr. A. D. C. MacGowan** and **Dr. W. L. Templeton**, and the election of **A. N. Dove, Esq., J.P.** and **Frederick Montague, Esq., M.P.** to seats on the Board was proposed by **Dr. W. R. McCrae**, seconded by **Mr. Stubbs** and carried unanimously. **Mr. Dove**, who responded on behalf of his colleagues, affirmed his belief in Homœopathy and his eagerness to further the best interests of the Hospital.

A warm tribute to the services of the Honorary Medical Staff was then expressed by **Mr. M. A. Honywood**, who proposed the re-election of the Honorary Medical Staff and confirmation of the appointments of **Dr. J. Douglas Kenyon**, **Dr. W. Ritchie McCrae**, Physicians, **Dr. Donald M. Foubister**, Assistant Physician and **Mr. H. Alexander Cowan**, **F.R.C.S.**, Assistant Surgeon for Diseases of Throat, Nose and Ear. **Mr. Honywood** referred to the Government's proposals for a National Health Service in which he hoped the practice of Homœopathy would receive some official recognition. This had not been accorded in the past and he was convinced that this beneficent form of treatment, if further encouraged and extended, would save the country many thousands of pounds annually. This was seconded by **Sir Colville Barclay**, carried with acclamation and received an appropriate reply from **Dr. MacGowan** on behalf of himself and his colleagues on the Honorary Staff.

On the motion of **Mr. John Gedge**, which was seconded by **Mrs. Swinburne**, the Auditors, **Messrs. Prideaux, Frere, Brown & Co.** were re-elected for the ensuing year.

In reply to a question from **Mrs. Swinburne** with reference to the organization and effective representation of the lay public who desired Homœopathic treatment in the new Health Service, **Dr. Benjamin** said that at a special Conference of the British Homœopathic Association held last Saturday it had been proposed that branches of the Association should be established throughout the country and he hoped that this would soon be carried into being and thus provide an effective medium of approach.

On the proposition of **Sir Clarence Sadd** it was decided to recommend to the Board of Management of the Hospital that all Homœopathic Hospitals should unite with the object of making representations to the Minister of Health to ensure that their services as Homœopathic Hospitals would continue in the National Health Service.

On the conclusion of the ordinary business the Chairman, Sir Clarence Sadd then presented prizes of books to the following members of the Nursing Staff who had been successful in the Hospital Final Examination for 1945 and certificates of training to those nurses who had completed their training :—

Practical instruction is given daily, in the Wards and the Out-Patient Department and by Post-Graduate Lectures. The instruction at this Hospital is specially intended for :—

(1) Medical men who are already qualified and who desire to obtain a knowledge of Homœopathy in addition to their other acquirements.
