

Annual Meeting.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE.

THE ANNUAL MEETING of Subscribers and Friends of the Monmouth Hospital was held on Saturday the 25th February 1928. The President, the
Rev. Canon Harding, presided, and there were also present: the Rev. S. W. E. and Mrs. Gilliat, Mrs. J. R. Harding,
Sir John Seale, Bt., Rev. W. C. Feetham, Rev. C F. Reeks,

The President said the financial position of the Hospital was not so good but the work of the Hospital was equal to what it had been for years.

Mr. A. Vizard read the following Report :---

1927.

TO THE SUBSCRIBERS AND FRIENDS OF MONMOUTH HOSPITAL.

"In the past year, more in-patients and out-patients were treated in the Hospital than in any former year.

The in-patients numbered 174, of whom 130 were adults (72 males, 58 females), and 44 were children (25 boys, 19 girls). The former highest total was 172 in 1921. In that year there were 37 children compared with 44 last year, and on each occasion a record in the number of in-patients was established by these children of nine years of age and under who make acquaintance with the Hospital wards at an early period in their lives. Our second record is a more striking one and indicates a sudden and ominous growth in the popularity of the out-patients' department coincident with the introduction of free dispensing for poor out-patients. No fewer than 1,177 cases, 452 more than in the previous year, came up for Hospital treatment. This number is without precedent, and for anything approaching it we have to go back twenty years to the 1,003 cases registered in the year 1907.

These figures show an expansion in the work of the Hospital, and some indication of this is seen by a comparison of the number of in-patients and out-patient for the past three years given in the following Table:

It has not been a normal year financially, and we would like to refer to some unusual features in the Account. The figure of £1,296 11s. 4d. set opposite "Total Income for the year" is the total revenue from all ORDINARY sources, exclusive of the legacy and benefactions, and of the transfer from reserve. It will be seen that the total of this Ordinary income is £150 below the average of the corresponding amount for the two previous years. The receipts from the ordinary VOLUNTARY sources are actually £191 less than in the preceding year. This fall in income has occurred in a year when the Committee have deemed it necessary to spend £313 in renewing the X-Ray plant. They determined that the provision of this vital factor in the equipment of the Hospital could not be deferred, and they are happy to report that a new X-Bay apparatus of the most modern type has been selected by the Medical Staff and installed.

This expensive item, and the cost of the outside painting of the Hospital, have raised the total expenditure to £1,765 17s 4d., and the deficiency that would have occurred in consequence of the special expenditure and of the diminution in ordinary income has been met by a transfer of £407 13s. 0.1. from reserve (produced by the sale of £397 12s. 10d. War Loan) and by two generous benefactions, viz., a gift of £100 from the President, Canon Harding, and £50 which Mrs. Armstrong Willis has given in memory of her Husband the late Rev. W. Armstrong Willis, formerly Rector of Hanwell near Banbury. By these ways and means the funds necessary for the maintenance of the Hospital have been raised to the level of its needs, and a balance of £86 16s. 8d. has been carried forward to next year's account. The legacy of £300 under the Will of Mrs. Newton Jackson has been invested in New South Wales Stock.

As to the ordinary expenses of Hospital maintenance, it is satisfactory to note that if we apply the test of cost per patient to the expenditure, after eliminating the cost of the X-Ray apparatus, it works out at £8 1s. 8d. per patient compared with £9 6s. 0d. in the previous year.

In last year's Report reference was made to the introduction of Dispensing for Poor Out-patients. The Committee have now been able to test the operation of this scheme over a full year, during which time it has been in an experimental stage and the cost has proved to be £59 1s. 6d. for the full year. The Committee are led to the conclusion that it may be necessary to revise the present administration of the scheme ; and the terms of its continuance will receive the attention of the Committee in conference with the Medical Staff.

This year, the Barometer of Voluntary Income has been set at low, compared with last year. We trust that the depression is only temporary, but it has been felt both in the receipts from Donations, Entertainments, etc. (notably in the Alexandra Day Collection), and in the total Collections in Places of Worship. On the other hand, there was a rise in the proceeds of the Hospital Cup Final —which only became "final" after two re-plays ! We thank Mr. and the Hon. Mrs. Beavan of Hilston, for providing the medals for the members of the competing teams. But despite the fluctuations and uncertainties of voluntary effort we still have very much to thank the friends of the Hospital for, and we trust that this resumé of the work in which they have co-operated will be of interest to them.

We have had to take leave of one friend who displayed unflagging effort in the cause of the Hospital. The Rev. Joshua Stansfield, lately Vicar of Llandenny, retired from the Committee last year on leaving the neighbourhood, and to the cessation of his activities may be attributed in some degree the diminished receipts from Collections referred to above. He will be remembered for the large collections for our funds which he raised year by year in his small country parish, and we take this opportunity of paying tribute to his enthusiastic work. Captain L. Twiston Davies has very generously presented to the Hospital a new Operating Table at a cost of £119. This gift will be very much appreciated by the Medical Staff, and our special thanks are due to him for this valuable addition to the surgical equipment of the Hospital.

A vacancy has occurred in the Medical Staff by the departure of Dr. Green. The successor to his practice, Dr. Vintner, has filled the vacancy provisionally, pending his election at this Annual General Meeting.

Of the services of the Medical Staff we desire to speak with praise and gratitude How onerous has been their year's work among the record number of in- and out-patients is manifest from this Report, and we offer them our hearty thanks.

We are glad to record that the work in the Hospital and Domestic departments continues to be carried on satisfactorily under the control of the Matron, Miss Hull."

Mr. F. Hobbs proposed the adoption of the Report. At the same time, he said, he was sure the Meeting would wish him to express thanks to Mr. Vizard for the very exhaustive and full Report he bad kindly prepared and read to them. "Increased expenditure is not to be deplored." added Mr. Hobbs, "for it shows the increased usefulness of the work the Hospital is able to do." They were grateful to Mr. Vizard for bringing forward such a splendid Report.

Alderman A. T. Blake said it was to him a great pleasure to propose the re-election of the Rev. Canon Harding as President. As one of the members of the committee, he thought that during the past year their President had not missed a meeting. They thanked him for his very useful donation of £100 to the Hospital. (Applause). They also wished the President many happy returns of the day, for his birthday was the previous day and he was 93 years of age. (Applause). They all hoped their President would be spared to be with them for many years. (Applause).

Captain Twiston Davies seconded the resolution, which was unanimously carried,

The Rev. Canon Harding replied that he thanked them very much. It was always a great pleasure to him to be there. He thought the Monmouth Hospital was the most interesting in the county and could bear comparison with any Hospital. He rejoiced to see so many present at that meeting. "So long as I am spared and have the use of my intellect to serve you, I shall be glad to do anything in my power," remarked the veteran President, amidst applause.

The Rev. C. F. Reeks proposed the re-appointment of Mr. A. Vizard as hon. Treasurer. They all felt, he said, that no one could fill this position as Mr. Vizard had done. (Applause).

Mr. W. Hughes seconded.

The President said he did not know how to say enough for what Mr. Vizard had done. What they owed to Mr. Vizard was great. It was remarkable what he had done for the Hospital.

The resolution was unanimously carried.

Sir John Seale, Bt., proposed the re-election of the hon. Auditors, Mr. A. L. Barry and Mr. F. J. Griffin. He said he was sure it was their wish to thank the retiring Auditors for their work. He was sorry Mr. Griffin was indisposed and not able to be present. He hoped Mr. Griffin would shortly fully recover from a recent accident.

Dr. S. Bargrave-Wyborn seconded, and the resolution was unanimously carried.

The Rev. A. E. Monahan proposed the re-election of the hon. Secretary, the Rev. C. W. Griffin. He said the other officers, of course, all did valuable work, but he did not think any one of them had to do the same amount of work as the Secretary had to do. The honorary Secretary did an enormous amount of work, week in and week out. The Hospital was fortunate in having a Secretary who so willingly gave such efficient service. (Applause).

Mr. Barry seconded, and coupled with the resolution a vote of thanks to the Rev, C. W. Griffin for services in the past for so many years. The President said that as President of the Hospital he was in close touch with the Secretary, and knew of his great work. He could only say the services of Mr. Griffin were invaluable, and that what he was doing deserved their grateful thanks. (Applause).

The resolution was unanimously carried.

The President said he thought the mainstay of the Hospital—and what they had to look to most of all—were the ordinary subscriptions. The subscriptions list was a test of the hospital. He was glad to hear of the rumour of a general canvass being made of the streets of Monmouth to call upon the inhabitants and put before them the cause of the Hospital. This would considerably enlarge the list of subscribers. He had also heard that many of the farmers did not sub-cribe because of not being asked. That was a poor excuse. This ought to be attended to. They might be able to make out a list of farmers to whom the Report could be sent, with an intimation they would be glad of a small subscription.

On the proposition of Mr Elcock, seconded by Capt. Twiston Davies, Mr. E. H. Jones was re-appointed Collector.

The Rev. S W. E. Gilliat proposed the re-election of the Committee. He knew the Committee worked splendidly together. A good committee, he said, working well together, was the mainstay of any institution.

Dr. S. B. Wyborn, in seconding, said he could speak favourably of the Committee. All of them worked successfully.

Mrs. O. L. Jones proposed that Mr. A. W. Smith should be elected to fill a vacancy on the Committee. She thought Mr. Smith's election to the Committee would spread the interest of the Hospital.

The Rev. A. E. Monahan seconded, and the resolution was unanimously carried.

The President referred to the departure of Dr. J.G. Green. He said he could not say too much of what they owed to their Medical Officers, who always worked so harmoniously together. He proposed the election of Dr. N. S. B. Vintner as one of the Medical Officers. Mrs.Gilliat seconded, and the resolution was unanimously carried.

Proceeding, the President proposed the vote of thanks to the Medical Staff, and the Nursing Staff. He added, "I don't know what more to say ; I feel how deeply we are indebted to them for their very excellent work."

Mrs. J. Reginald Harding seconded the resolution, which was carried enthusiastically.

The President explained they had to consider the new Dispensing arrangements. It had, he said, been rendered necessary, because of the increased expense, to make a charge of 6d. to each out-patient. They were obliged to revert to the old system again.

The Rev. A. E. Monaban formally moved that the charge mentioned should come into force on March 1st, and this was agreed to.

A further charge of 6d. will be made for every bottle of medicine.

The Rev. C. F. Reeks asked that the Meeting should put on record their gratitude to Mr. Horace Bailey for publishing in *The Beacon*, matters relating to the Hospital, month by month, without any charge. He proposed this as a resolution.

The President said they should also thank Mr. Bailey for giving them full reports of their Annual Meetings. These reports, he said, went into their minute book. They knew Mr. Bailey as an old supporter of the Hospital. Mr. Bailey could not be present that day, and he had a note from him, addressed to the hon. Secretary, from London, stating: "I regret that I shall be unable to be present at the Hospital Meeting to-morrow. Perhaps you will kindly convey my apology for absence to the Chairman, who, I hope, may be, as usual, Canon Harding." (Applause).

The Rev. A. E. Monahan said he proposed a vote of thanks to the President. One of the great interests of that Annual Meeting, he said, was to see their President in the Chair. (Applause). It was not often they saw in the Chair, at meetings of institutions, one who had such a striking personality as Canon Harding—one who was so fair, just, and courteous, to anyone serving under him. No President could ever fulfil his duty more nobly and efficiently, and with greater courtesy and with greater success for the Hospital. A great deal depended upon the head of such an Institution as that. (Applause).

The President : I thank you all. It is interesting to me, and a pleasure, to attend the Monmouth Hospital Meetings. I have been happy at this meeting, because it has been so harmonicus. I think thanks are due to you all for the way you help me to carry out my duties. (Applause).


