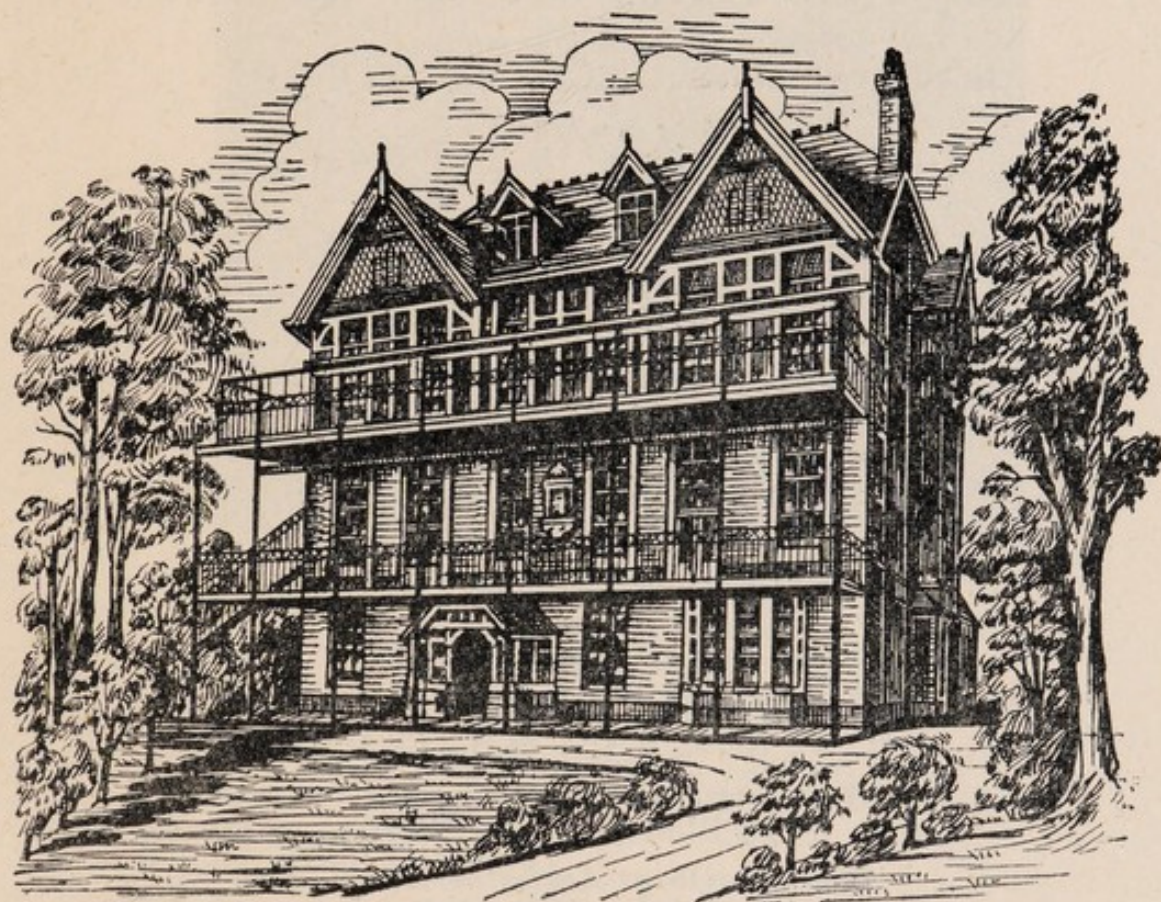

# REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

for the Year ended 31st December, 1944.

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It is with loving gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His wonderful care and protection in the midst of great danger, that the Council present their report of the work done during the past year.

In the Hospital itself, 374 patients were admitted, 114 of whom were private ward patients.

In the beginning of the year, owing to the continued ill-health of our beloved Medical Superintendent, Dr. C. G. Mack, it was found necessary that we should appoint an acting Medical Superintendent to relieve Dr. Mack of his duties in the Hospital, Dr. Mack becoming Medical Superintendent Emeritus. Dr. H. Gordon Thompson was appointed Medical Superintendent, and his kindness and skill in the wards, has already endeared him to both patients and staff alike.

**MATERNITY WARDS.** The number of patients admitted into the Maternity Wards was 287, not as many as in pre-war days, but the wards at the top of the building have not been in use, owing to danger from enemy action, and Matron Fifield has had to turn away between 40 and 50 cases a week.

**ARTIFICIAL SUNLIGHT CLINIC.** In the Artificial Sunlight Clinic, 5,738 treatments were given. Miss Hess, the Sister-in-Charge of the Clinic, found it was impossible to tackle single-handed the increased amount of work, so Miss K. E. Clutton was appointed as her Assistant, and we are glad to welcome her as a member of our Staff.

Our sincere thanks are due to Dr. Thomas Cochrane, who so kindly came forward in a time of difficulty, and offered his services temporarily, as Medical Officer to the Clinic.

**STAFF.** The Council wish to thank the members of the Honorary Staff, also the Medical Superintendent, Miss L. S. Radcliffe (Matron of the Hospital), Miss E. Fifield (Matron of the Maternity Wards), and the members of both the Nursing and Domestic Staffs for their devoted



service, and for the way in which they performed their duties during a very difficult period.

**ANNUAL MEETING AND POUND DAY.** On June 3rd was held the Annual Meeting and Pound Day. The attendance was rather disappointing, but those present enjoyed the address given by Dr. H. Gordon Thompson, our Medical Superintendent, and gifts in coin amounted to £57 8s. 3d.

**ANNUAL SALE OF WORK.** Because of the continuous downpour of rain, the Garden Sale of Work, which was held on September 2nd, had to be held in the Lecture Hall (kindly lent at the last moment by the Movement for World Evangelization) instead of in the garden. Despite the weather, many of our friends came, and we were indeed fortunate in having Mrs. Donald Miller, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., as our Opener. It was a great honour to have on the platform Bishop Tsu of the Yun Kwei Diocese, China, familiarly known as the Bishop of the Burma Road. The Bishop was prevailed upon to say a few words, which were warmly appreciated. He said how pleased he was to meet his "ancestors," Dr. Bradley and Dr. Gordon Thompson, who together had founded and built up the magnificent well-equipped Hospital in Kun Ming (Yunnan-Fu), the city in which he himself resides.

**OBITUARY.** It is with deep regret that we announce the death of Miss Hay, daughter of the late Lady Hay, who built this Hospital, and entirely maintained it for some years. Miss Hay was a valuable friend and supporter of long standing, and will be greatly missed.

**HOSPITALS DAY.** The London Hospitals Day Street Collection held in May and October, brought in £252. The Council deeply appreciate the hard work, done under difficult conditions, by our faithful helpers.

The following amounts are most gratefully acknowledged:—King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, £220. Metropolitan Hospital-Sunday Fund, £30. Richard Cloudesley's Charity, £50 and Smith's Charity (Kensington Estate), £25. From various local Churches we have also received generous support, for which we thank them sincerely.



## A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE HOSPITAL.

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1866

" My Presence shall go with  
thee."  
—Exodus xxxiii. 14.

In the year 1864, the Rev. William Pennefather became Vicar of St. Jude's Church, Mildmay Park, N.1. Mr. Pennefather was a man of great faith, much prayer and action.

Under his guidance, Christian women were being trained to work in various parishes around ; later, these workers adopted the name of " Mildmay Deaconesses."

In 1868, just four years after the coming of Mr. Pennefather, we read in his " Life and Letters " that the Church was too small, and the Iron Room (a temporary building) was also too small for the needs of all who came ; thus there was an imperative call for more accommodation. After various suggestions had been considered, the Church was enlarged, and there being some land for sale in Mildmay Park, a piece of ground was bought and a hall built, which was known as the Conference Hall, and is so to this day.

### **The Building of the Cottage Hospital.**

Let us return to the work of the Mildmay Deaconesses, for it is to their work that we owe the origin of the Cottage Hospital.

In the year 1866, it became apparent that some building must be secured where the Deaconesses could bring their sick poor to be cared for, and 122, Mildmay Road, was obtained, and equipped as a Cottage Hospital, with 10 beds. Very useful work was done for from twelve to fourteen years. Later, it became too small and inconvenient for the ever-growing needs of the parishes in which the Deaconesses worked: thus, some earnest souls turned their longing for larger and more suitable accommodation into Prayer, and realised to the full that "more things are wrought by Prayer than this world dreams of."

The story is told how a friend of Mrs. Pennefather's, by name, Sarah Lady Hay, heard of this great need, bought some land adjoining the Conference Hall, and in 1880 the building of a new Hospital was started, and in September, 1883, the Memorial Cottage Hospital was ready and generously equipped for 29 patients.



**For What Purpose? To the Glory of God.**

In the Hall of the Hospital is a tablet with these words :—

“ Memorial Cottage Hospital  
Built  
To the Glory of God  
In Memory of  
WILLIAM PENNEFATHER  
in his work for God among  
the Rich and Poor,

and in Memory of  
DUNCAN HAY  
My beloved Son  
taken suddenly from me.  
S. HAY.”

To the Glory of God.—This aspect of the work has been recognised and maintained throughout the years—those in its service have ever taken this for their motto.

From 1883-1893, the hospital was financed by Lady Hay, who then retired to encourage it to become self-reliant.

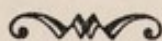
Up to the year 1909, the Memorial Cottage Hospital had been intended primarily for cases from the parishes in which the Deaconesses were working, but from now it was to become a small general Hospital, the name Cottage to be dropped, and in the future it was to be known as the Memorial Hospital, Mildmay Park.

On February 1st, 1910, Lady Hay was “called Home,” and in 1912 the Nurses’ Home was built to her memory, and is known as the Hay Memorial.

Years passed, and the work steadily increased, until 1924, when Tudor House, Newington Green, was turned into a Maternity Nursing Home. Then in 1925, a new Operating Theatre was built, and an electric Lift was installed. The Lift was the gift of the Trustees of the late Edward Riley, and has a small brass plate inscribed “In grateful memory of Edward Riley—8th October, 1925.”

On November 13th, 1926, another new department was opened, that of the “Artificial Sunlight Clinic.” This Clinic was held in the lower rooms of the Hay Memorial. The adjoining house to the Maternity Home has since been added for their work, and new premises have been built for the Artificial Sunlight Clinic.

Consequently, as the years have passed, so we hope has our usefulness increased. . . . “To the Glory of God.”
