Report for the Year ended December 31st, 1943.

"And let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us; and establish thou the work of our hands upon us; yea, the work of our hands establish thou it."—PSALM XC, v. 17.

THE Council of the Hospital present this, the 66th Annual Report, which covers the year ending 31st December, 1943, with a feeling of gratitude to Almighty God. Two years ago, about the height of the air attacks on London, when the future seemed uncertain, it was decided to take steps to have the Hospital incorporated. This incorporation became a fact on 17th June, 1943, when the Council of Mildmay Mission Hospital Incorporated became the governing body of both the Mildmay Mission Hospital and the Annie McCall Maternity Hospital.

It has been done for a purpose, that this "work of our hands" be established the more securely. Membership of the incorporated Hospital is now open to all who wish to share in the work of healing of both soul and body. At the Annual Meeting, to be held on Saturday, 10th June, 1944, one-third of the Members of the Council will be re-elected. Voting is restricted by the Articles of Incorporation to Members only, and it is hoped that many friends of the Hospital will fill in the Membership Form enclosed with this Report. Many important issues face the Council in the near future. It will strengthen their hands if they know that behind them are the prayers and the help of a large body of Members.

MILDMAY MISSION HOSPITAL.

THE YEAR'S WORK.

This has been the busiest year since 1938. In-patients numbered 680, an increase of about 25 per cent. on the previous year. As usual, surgical cases predominated, and 326 major operations were performed.

Coventry Ward, on the third floor, which had for reasons of safety remained closed since the outbreak of war, was re-opened during the year. As it was not felt wise to have too many children so high up it was decided to have some of them in the men's ward on the first floor, and as a temporary wartime measure to admit women medical patients as well as children to Coventry Ward. This was done in October and met a real need. Altogether 176 children were admitted during the year, as against 94 the previous year.

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

For a Hospital of its size, this has an exceptionally busy casualty and out-patient department. Patients numbered over 10,224 and the total attendance reached 42,198.

One-third of these were for surgical dressings and the treatment of minor injuries, especially of the hand. There were 532 minor operations and nearly 2,000 teeth extractions.

Rehabilitation, of which much is heard at present, goes on in the Massage department, where there were 4,500 treatments given.

In view of the Ministry of Health appeal, the greatest economy was exercised in the use of X-ray films and they were taken only when it was essential. The number of patients X-rayed was 1,271.

Patients seen by the Hon. Specialist Staff numbered 1,300, and the attendances at their clinics were almost 3,000.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS.

The Council acknowledge with gratitude the following grants :----King Edward Hospital Fund, $\pounds750$ maintenance grant and $\pounds150$ capital grant; Hospital Sunday Fund, $\pounds330$. They wish to thank Major M. Chance, Dorking, for a special donation of $\pounds215$ to purchase a Cambridge Electrocardiograph.

Owing to wartime restrictions a full list of donations and subscriptions is not published. This may be seen at the Hospital.

JUBILEE FUND FOR POST-WAR EXTENSION.

Total receipts to date amount to $\pm 1,367$. During the year the site mentioned in last year's report was purchased at a cost of ± 878 . This leaves a balance in the Fund of ± 489 .

STAFF.

The Council wish to thank the Members of the Hon. Visiting Staff for their professional help during the year and offer their congratulations to Mr. Sidney Boyd, M.S., F.R.C.S., on his election for the sixth successive year as Mayor of Hampstead.

There has been only one change in the consulting staff. Mr. Ian Jackson, F.R.C.S., has joined the Forces and his place as Hon. Emergency Surgeon has been taken by Mr. J. T. Fathi, M.S., F.R.C.S.

Both of these surgeons are thanked for their services, rendered often during the night at no little trouble to themselves.

The Council thank the Medical Superintendent and also the Matron and Nursing Staff for their devoted labours during the year. There are 27 nurses in training. Three left the Hospital having completed their training. One sailed for Rhodesia for missionary work with the Salvation Army.

The Council welcome Miss Ruth Springett, A.I.H.A., as Hospital Almoner, in place of Miss E. E. Hetherington who had accepted the post of secretary in another hospital. Sister Florence Williams, who also retired during the year, had

Sister Florence Williams, who also retired during the year, had given 28 years of skilful and devoted service to the Hospital, in the latter years as X-ray Sister.

The Council wish to thank these ladies for all they have done for the Hospital.

EVANGELISTIC WORK.

The Council rejoice in the fact that all Members of the staff co-operate gladly in bringing the message of the Gospel to the patients. Patients have often expressed their gratitude for and their appreciation of the quiet "messages" given at ward prayers by the doctors and nurses. Among the out-patients also, the challenge of the Gospel and the message of its Saving Power has been often the means of bringing new life to some of the patients. The monthly meeting for former patients of Mathieson Ward has lived up to its name as a Fellowship. An average attendance of over 30 men was maintained during the year. The Council are grateful to Mr. Cyril Tomes, our Hon. Dental Surgeon, for his interest and help in this Fellowship.

Another Fellowship, that for young people, has met regularly on Tuesday evenings. It is a missionary venture to the young people of the district and has been richly blessed.

The other regular meetings have been well attended.

ELECTION OF NEW OFFICERS.

OBITUARY.

The Council record with regret the death of Mr. R. Hart-Dyke, Chairman of the Directors of the Mildmay Trust and for many years a Member of the Council of the Hospital.

FINANCE.

The year has been rather a difficult one financially. Expenditure totalled $\pounds 14,691$, which was $\pounds 2,213$ more than 1942.

The increase was due chiefly to increases in salaries following the adoption of the Rushcliffe nurses' scale.

The re-opening of Coventry Ward, which had been closed since 1939, necessitated a certain amount of expense as well as additional nursing staff.

As a result the Hospital is in full working once more, though it took effect only as from the latter months of the year. Additional items of expense were due to a breakdown in the main

Additional items of expense were due to a breakdown in the main dressings steriliser and one of the domestic boilers. The new steriliser cost ± 337 , of which ± 227 was specially subscribed.

Receipts totalled $\pm 13,993$, leaving a deficit of ± 698 , which, in view of the special expenses, was not unsatisfactory. Fortunately there was a substantial balance from last year which has made up the deficit. Voluntary gifts amounted to $\pm 4,550$, which is a slight increase on previous years.

This increase, gratifying as it is in wartime, is insufficient to meet the needs of the work.

For some time past it has been necessary to use receipts from free Legacies in order to balance accounts. This year these amounted to just over $\pounds 2,000$, otherwise the deficit would have been grave. New subscribers are urgently needed for maintainance so that legacies may be applied to the Jubilee Extension Fund.

There are now 38 covenanted subscribers on whose subscriptions the Hospital may expect to receive from the Commissioners of Inland Revenue the sum of f_{321} during the current year. The signing of the covenant has meant that with Income Tax at the present rate each subscription has been doubled. The Council commend this in the hope that many other friends of the Hospital will join the Covenant Scheme. Further particulars may be obtained from the Appeals Secretary.

POUND DAY.

At the meeting held on 5th June, the speakers were Miss F. B. Wilks, S.R.N., a former Mildmay nurse recently repatriated from Japan, and Mr. A. Donald Miller, of the Mission to Lepers. Donations in connection with this meeting amounted to ± 267 .

GIFT DAY.

The Gift Day meeting held on November 6th raised £680 for the Hospital. Interesting addresses were given by Dr. H. G. Anderson, C.M.S., and Rev. J. Chalmers Lyon.

OTHER MEETINGS AND SALES.

Sales in aid of the Hospital were again held at Bromley, Dorking, and Highbury. The Council are indebted to Mrs. H. White for f_{100} received from Bromley; to Miss Blakeney for f_{45} from Dorking, in addition to the subscriptions for the Dorking Beds; to Miss E. M. Jacob for f_{200} from Highbury; and to Miss A. E. Macklin for f_{16} 5s. from a stall at a sale at Christ Church, Bournemouth.

Meetings in support of the Hospital have also been held at various other places. It is hoped to extend these, and anyone who might be able to arrange any meeting or sale on behalf of the Hospital is asked to communicate with the Appeals Secretary.

HOSPITALS DAY.

£250 was received from the London Hospitals Street Collections in respect of collections made in both May and October. The Council are most grateful to all who helped to achieve this result.

LEAGUE OF HELP.

It is increasingly difficult for League Members to supply gifts of linen for sale, but sales and donations together enabled the sum of $\pounds 85$ to be given toward Gift Day, and $\pounds 70$ in hand from members' subscriptions was at the League Annual Meeting allocated toward the cost of the new steriliser.

ANNIE MCCALL MATERNITY HOSPITAL.

The whole history of the Annie McCall Maternity Hospital has been one of achievement in the face of difficulties, and the year 1943 has been no exception to this rule.

Founded in 1889 by Annie McCall, M.D., the Hospital testifies to a successful struggle for the right of women to the place in the Medical Profession which is to-day accorded them, to a fight against the then widespread use of alcoholic stimulants in medicine, and to a victorious warfare against the high mortality rate in maternity prevalent at that time. The Hospital figure of 56,473 confinements, with a mortality of 1.6 per thousand as against the national figure of 4.51, is striking evidence of its success.

To-day those battles have been won; but the struggle is carried into other spheres. The damage to the Hospital by enemy action, the consequent evacuation of its patients, and the requisitioning of the better part of its premises as a Borough Day Nursery, formed a chain of disasters which brought the work to a standstill.

But not for long. Feeling that the time had come for her to retire, and wanting to ensure the continuance of its Christian tradition, Dr. McCall had handed the Hospital over to the Council of the Mildmay Mission Hospital, and when the transfer was complete a new beginning had to be made. Everything, it seemed, was against it; the Nurses' Home was damaged beyond repair, and most of the wards were lost to it. But an ante-natal clinic was started, and gradually grew. At that time it was the policy of the Government to discourage mothers from having their babies in the London area, and most of the antenatal patients were evacuated for their confinements under the Government Scheme.

As air-raids diminished in number and intensity, there was manifested a growing reluctance on the part of mothers to leave their homes, and district midwifery was started. By this time the shortage of maternity beds had increased to the dimensions of a national need.

THE YEAR'S WORK.

In 1943 the newly begun district work showed a steady increase. There were 16 deliveries in the first quarter, 20 in the second, 22 in the third, and 28 in the fourth, and by the end of the year bookings showed that numbers were likely to increase even more rapidly in 1944. This enabled us during the last quarter to start taking pupils for the requisite experience of district work in addition to our two midwives.

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

There has been a steady increase in the number of patients attending the ante-natal clinics. 152 expectant mothers were registered and made a total of 771 attendances.

The latter includes a number of post-natal clinic mothers.

The child welfare clinic has grown also. More than 100 babies were registered and the total visits paid was 767.

It is customary to include the total visits paid by the staff of midwives in the out-patient figures.

During the year more than 1,700 visits were made. 208 of these were Home Visits, and the remainder, 1,549, were Lying-in Visits.

PLANS FOR RE-OPENING.

With this increase, and the growing numbers attending the clinics, it has become imperative to re-open some beds.

Difficulties which once seemed insuperable are now being overcome, and it is hoped that in the near future there will be beds in use again at the Annie McCall Maternity Hospital. We have found, indeed, that "tribulation worketh patience; and patience, experience; and experience hope; and hope maketh not ashamed."

The re-opening of beds at the present time, hedged about as we are with so many restrictions, brings to light many problems both great and small. But to re-open is not only to perform a national service in the provision of beds when they are most needed; it has also many practical advantages which will make it easier to expand the work when the war is over. Not least among its advantages is the training of pupil midwives—urgently needed for the future.

FINANCE.

The general fund shows an excess of income over expenditure of \pounds 418, and there is a balance of \pounds 255 in the Building and Equipment Account, in addition to two special gifts of \pounds 100 each from Dr. Annie McCall and Mrs. Hickman, which have been invested on behalf of the Building and Equipment Fund. These sums will help toward the expenses of re-opening, though the Council hopes for further gifts to meet this special outlay.

The sum of ± 121 was received from the London Hospitals Street Collections. The Council are very grateful to all whose efforts resulted in this total from the two collections.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

The gift of a Walton-Minnitt anæsthetic apparatus from the National Birthday Trust is gratefully acknowledged.

The Council express their thanks to the Chairman and members of the Annie McCall Maternity Hospital Sub-Committee for the hard work which all of them have given in so many ways; to Miss G. H. Dodds, M.D., F.R.C.S., F.R.C.O.G., for her devoted labours in connection with the clinics; and to Miss C. P. Mitcheson for her work as secretary of the Linen League.

In concluding this Report the Council recall that the Founders of the two Hospitals were men and women of prayer, and that these Hospitals were their response to the needs of their day, which they saw were spiritual as well as physical.

There will be more need than ever in the difficult days which are ahead for a Hospital like the Mildmay Mission Hospital to bring healing of soul and body to those whom the war has wounded.

The Council therefore commend the work to your prayers.
