

## Report for the Year ended December 31st, 1944.

IN presenting this, the 67th Annual Report of the Mildmay Mission Hospital, and the 56th of the Annie McCall Maternity Hospital, the Council have much pleasure in announcing that Her Majesty Queen Mary has graciously consented to become Patron of the

Incorporated Hospital.

Her Majesty has visited the Mildmay Mission Hospital on three occasions, the first in 1886 when, as Princess May she accompanied her mother, the Duchess of Teck, and the last when she opened the 1938 Extension. It is a source of great satisfaction that she has thus confirmed the interest she has taken in the work for so many years.

The Reports cover the work of the year ending 31st December, 1944, a year which saw a renewal of violent enemy attacks upon London.


These began in the early months of the year and the Annie McCall Maternity Hospital had a narrow escape from oil and phosphorus bombs. Casualties from the first Flying Bomb to fall on London were treated at the Mildmay Mission Hospital, and in the months which followed both Hospitals sustained damage.

The Council decided to close the children's ward on the third floor and to admit a limited number of children to the other two wards. Otherwise the work of the Hospital went on throughout the very trying

period of the concentrated day and night bombing.

On one occasion, during August, the Hospital narrowly escaped destruction by blast. Patients had to be evacuated and the wards closed for a fortnight while doors and windows were repaired. The heavy plate glass windows of the main operating theatre were on this occasion completely shattered and had to be boarded up. The Council are thankful to record that by the mercy of God there was no loss of life either of patients or of staff, and only a few minor cases of injury. It was a privilege to be able to minister to the people of Bethnal Green, Shoreditch, and neighbourhood who were suffering so severely.

The year 1944 also saw the publication of the White Paper in which the Government Health proposals were set forth for discussion. In spite of the assurance of the Minister of Health that he desired the continuance of the Voluntary Hospitals in the post-war Scheme, voluntary hospitals as a body viewed the White Paper proposals with some misgiving. For this Hospital in particular, any measure which might lead ultimately to State Control and therefore to a curtailment of its evangelistic and missionary enterprise, cannot be regarded without anxiety. It is hoped that the past record and present services which the voluntary hospitals render to the community will not be lost sight of by the Government and that the proposals will be so modified as to safeguard their continuance unfettered.

#### ANNUAL MEETING.

The first Annual Meeting of Members of the Incorporated Body comprising the two hospitals was held in accordance with the Articles of Association at Mildmay Mission Hospital on June 10th.

The Report and Accounts of both Hospitals were adopted, and Council members re-elected. A new member of Council, Rev. Geoffrey

King, was elected.

#### THE YEAR'S WORK.

The year has been a busy one and the number of in-patients treated, 748, was the highest of the war years. Although Coventry Ward had, for reasons of safety, to remain closed for several months, the number of children treated was 261 as against 176 the previous year. As usual, surgical work predominated, and our Hon. Surgical Staff found in the Diathermy Apparatus a welcome addition to the available theatre instruments. There were over 300 major operations. The risks attending these become less and less with the years, as new drugs appear. Penicillin was responsible for turning the scale in favour of recovery in one patient suffering from peritonitis following a gangrenous appendix. Where operation alone can save life patients who require it can now be given blood transfusions before operation and the new sulphonamide drugs or penicillin afterwards and in this way cases formerly desperate do very well. There were 18 blood transfusions given in the wards in 1944.

On the medical side the new electrocardiographic apparatus has proved a useful diagnostic aid and the Hon. Physicians have appre-

ciated its use in the more serious forms of heart disease.

#### OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

Though the number of out-patients has been less than the previous year owing to the evacuation of many residents during the Flying Bomb period the department has been very busy. Air raid casualties were numerous, during August there were over 100, many of them of a serious nature. There were 530 minor operations under an anæsthetic; 1,700 teeth extractions, the majority under gas; 1,309 patients X-rayed, and 2,400 visits paid to the different consultant clinics.

#### FINANCE.

As was anticipated, the year's expenditure, £16,392, was heavier than ever before, the full effect of the Rushcliffe Scale of salaries being felt for the first time. To meet this, special efforts were made and these resulted in a record total of voluntary gifts, £6,455 as compared with an average of £4,000 over a number of years. Legacies amounted to £445 only, a big decrease from the average of nearly £2,000 per annum during the past five years. It is gratifying that despite this drop occurring at such a critical time the income reached £15,539, and your Council can report a deficit of only £853. This is met from the legacy surplus of 1942, a record year for legacies. This has been God's provision for two successive years but is now almost exhausted.

In addition, the sum of £942 was given for the Jubilee Fund, though the appeal has not yet been launched. During the year the architects prepared a sketch plan (shown facing page 4) of the proposed extension,

In addition to their grant the sum of £500 has been put aside, to be claimed during 1945 when the Hospital has succeeded in raising £1,000 in "new money." Supporters of the Hospital are urged to make every effort to obtain NEW subscribers and donors to the funds. New support is greatly needed, and this special offer should be an added incentive.

Gifts in kind included weekly supplies of fresh vegetables from the nurseries of the late Mr. F. M. Clark, of Loughton Grange. These gifts, of considerable monetary value, were helpful in enabling us to include a plentiful amount of fresh vegetables in the diet of patients and staff throughout the year.

## COVENANT SCHEME. The send of t

Attention is drawn to the Covenant Scheme, whereby through a rebate of Income Tax subscribers may double their subscriptions at no further cost to themselves. There are at present 63 covenanted subscribers, and by this means an additional £462 was brought in during 1944. Particulars of this scheme may be obtained from the Appeals Secretary.

## MEETINGS AND SALES.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The year's outstanding events include the Annual General Meeting, held following the Subscribers' Meeting of which mention has already been made. The Council are indebted to Dr. C. C. Chesterman, of the Baptist Missionary Society, and Rev. D. R. Davies, well known for his books, including "Unto Orthodoxy," for the very helpful addresses which so largely contributed to the success of the meeting. Gifts on this occasion amounted to £207.

EVANGELISTIC WORK.

GIFT DAY AND SALE.

Perhaps even more memorable was the revival of the Sale of Work combined with the Gift Day which has been a war-time feature of the Hospital year. The Meeting, which was attended by the Mayor of Bethnal Green and Sir Percy Harris, M.P. for this constituency, was a most inspiring one, and the speaker was Mr. Fred Mitchell, Home Director of the China Inland Mission.

The combined Gift Day and Sale brought in the record total of £1,319—£1,289 for the General Fund and £30 for the Jubilee Fund.

The Council's thanks are due to all who worked so hard to realise this successful achievement, as also to those whose meetings and sales on behalf of the hospital brought in the following results:—

#### HOSPITALS DAY.

In spite of increasing difficulties the amount received from the London Hospitals Street Collections in respect of the two flag days increases every year, £319 being received in 1944.

#### LEAGUE OF HELP.

The League members surpassed themselves by a contribution of £139 to the Gift Day and Sale, being proceeds of their stall and donations. At their Annual Meeting subscriptions were allocated toward the purchase of linen bins and waste paper baskets for staff bedrooms.

The Council express their appreciation of the services of the Honorary Visiting Staff given so regularly despite the exigencies of the time.

They also thank the Medical Superintendent, the Matron and the whole staff for loyal co-operation, and particularly for their exemplary behaviour on the occasion of the blast damage already mentioned.

They welcome Miss S. A. F. Maxted, C.S.P., M.S.R., who has

taken charge of the Massage and X-ray Departments.

They offer their congratulations to the Senior Hon. Surgeon, Mr. Sidney Boyd, F.R.C.S., on his election for the seventh year in succes-

sion as Mayor of Hampstead.

During the year Dr. J. A. T. West left for Africa, where he is now in charge of the C.M.S. Hospital at Lui; Nurse Dorothy Daniel went out under the Baptist Missionary Society to the Belgian Congo, and Nurse Evelyn Jordan to the Egypt General Mission.

During the year seven nurses sat for the Final State Examination

and all passed.

This year, at the suggestion of the King's Fund, a joint preliminary training school for nurses was established by a group of seven hospitals, of which Mildmay Mission Hospital was one. Student nurses spend about three months at the school and receive training which is invaluable. The Council note with pleasure that at the end of the first session a Mildmay nurse was first in the final pass list.

#### EVANGELISTIC WORK.

The difficulties of the year have kept some away from the meetings and the Mildmay Fellowship has had to be discontinued since it was held in premises which must be kept in readiness for the treatment of casualties. The Mathieson Fellowship has been an exception to this rule, and past patients from the men's ward have continued to

meet for helpful discussion and prayer.

Daily prayers, taken each morning in the out-patient department, and morning and evening in the wards have been maintained throughout the year, and this ministry shared by all the staff combined with the kindly attitude and individual attention which patients expect to find at Mildmay, have resulted in spiritual help and comfort to many. One old lady, admitted after a family quarrel in which she incurred a broken thigh, was at first far from happy. Unable to contribute toward the cost of her treatment, which was estimated to cost the Hospital about £80, she seemed to be always finding fault with it, and when not so engaged she would be railing at the son-in-law who had caused the injury. Time and the influence of Mildmay softened her, however, and on the last day of the year it was a very different person who heard and answered the call, "Come unto Me all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." She entered the new year with a new life and no bitterness in her heart toward anyone. It is for such as she that the Mildmay Mission Hospital exists, and this aspect that the Council will, with your prayers, strive to keep ever in the forefront of the work.

## THE YEAR'S WORK ON THE DISTRICT.

There has been steady progress in the face of many dangers and difficulties.

129 mothers were delivered on the District as against 86 the previous year. The number would have reached 200 but the continuous air raids made it imperative for expectant mothers to get out of this heavily bombed district.

Sister Easty and her staff paid 2,635 visits to the homes of maternity patients. They have gone out at all hours night and day and have shown courage and devotion in keeping with the highest traditions of their profession. The one hundredth baby born on the District was

delivered in an Anderson Shelter during an air raid.

To add to their difficulties their own residence was repeatedly bombed. The worst incident was on the night of 28th July. The frontage of Jeffreys Road suffered most and three of the houses lost roofs, windows and doors. Earlier in the year, toward the end of March the Hospital premises had a narrow escape when a phosphorus bomb exploded in the grounds while an oil bomb destroyed a house two doors away.

#### OUT-PATIENT CLINICS.

These have continued to grow in spite of the difficulties of the year. The total attendance at all clinics was nearly 5,000, being an increase of 50 per cent. on last year's total. In addition to the ante-natal and post-natal clinics held at Clapham a branch ante-natal clinic was begun in the premises of the Battersea Central Mission, by kind permission of the Rev. J. A. Thompson. The Infant Welfare Clinic was attended by 118 babies with their mothers, an average of ten visits each.

#### MEETINGS.

The Annual Meeting of friends of the Hospital was held on 12th October, with Lady Kimber in the Chair. There was a good attendance, including the Mayor and Mayoress of Lambeth. A very fine address was given by the Lady Helen Graham. At Christmas a children's party was held. It seemed as though every child on the books was there, the hall being packed. It was a particularly happy function. FINANCE.

The General Fund shows a small credit balance and the Building and Equipment Fund has been augmented during the year by slightly over £1,000, making a total of £1,488. This is satisfactory, but the damage by enemy action is very great and a minimum of £10,000 will be needed to modernise the Hospital. The Council wish to thank Miss Stuart-Bunning, Miss S. Watson and the gallant band of ladies whose ungrudging labours made possible the Sale of Work on 2nd December. This produced the handsome total of £172 for the Building and Equipment Fund.

#### FUTURE PLANS.

The continued occupation of the Hospital wards by the Lambeth Borough Council as a war-time Day Nursery has retarded our plans for reopening. It is hoped, however, early in the New Year to open the four private wards in No. 39, Jeffreys Road.
