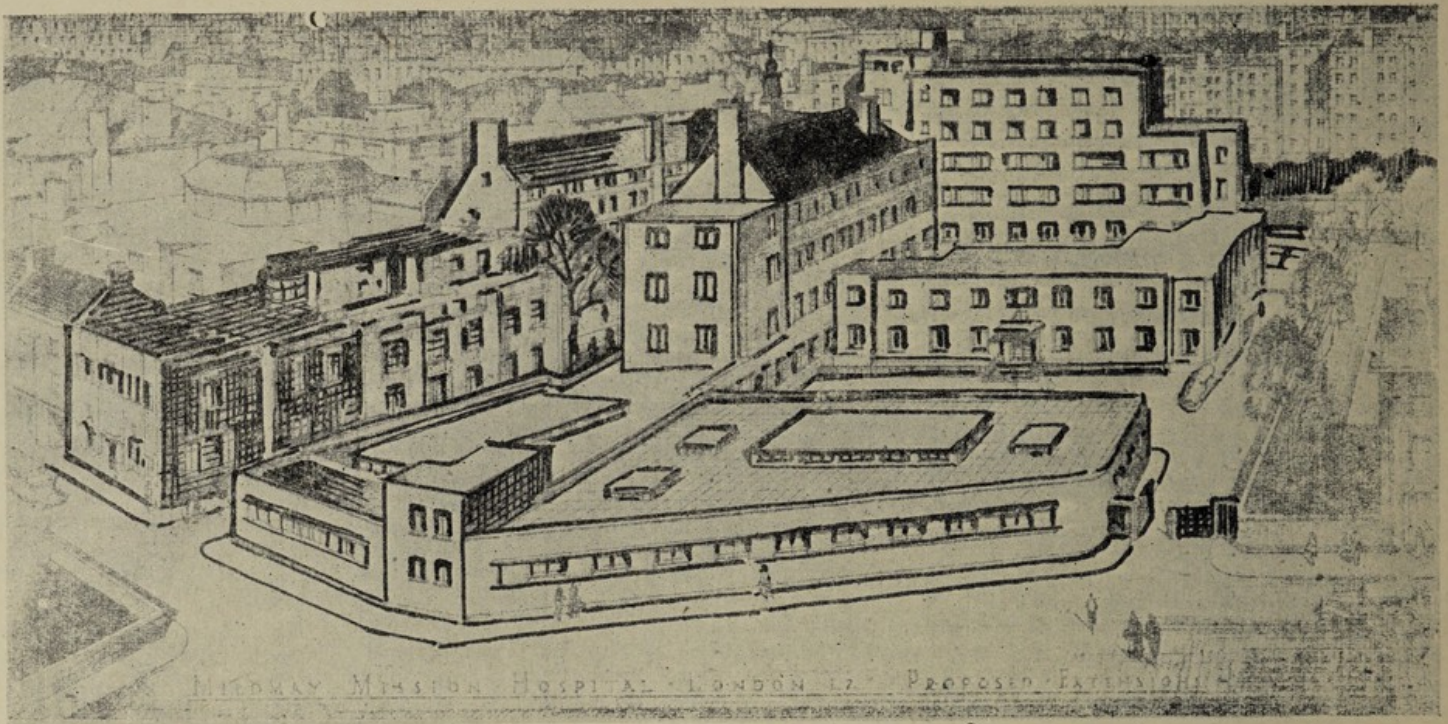

MILDMAY MISSION HOSPITAL AND ANNIE McCALL MATERNITY HOSPITAL

Report for the Year ended December, 31st, 1946.

"Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, to-day and forever"—Heb. 13: 8.

THE Council has pleasure in presenting this, the 69th Annual Report, for the year ended 31st December, 1946. The year has been a busy one for all departments of the Hospital, and details of the work will be found in the Departmental Reports which are appended.

Obituary: Sir George Hume

It was with deep feelings of grief that the Council heard in September of the passing of its President and Chairman, Sir George Hopwood Hume. He will be greatly missed, not only because of the contribution he made to the affairs of the Hospital, a contribution in keeping with his ripe wisdom and experience, but for what he was, a true follower of Jesus Christ. Gentle and courteous to all, he won the respect and the affection of all the staff.

Dr. J. Howard Cook

The Council sustained another loss in the passing of Dr. John Howard Cook, F.R.C.S., who joined the Council 25 years ago. Two years ago he was made a Vice-President of the Hospital. He always maintained a great interest in the work here. He brought to the Council Chamber the results of his wide experience both in Africa and at home, which were found of the utmost help in dealing with difficult problems.

Mr. W. McAdam Eccles, M.S., F.R.C.S.

The Council also regrets to announce the death, during the year, of Mr. McAdam Eccles, formerly Honorary Surgeon and for many years Honorary Consulting Surgeon to the Hospital. He was President of the Medical Prayer Union and always took a very great interest in this Hospital.

Proposed Extensions

The Medical Superintendent, in his report, draws attention to the large number of in-patients who have to be refused admission. For many years the Council has realised the need for additional in-patient accommodation and as far back as 1936, plans were drawn up for additional wards. The difficulty then, was that of site. By purchasing land in the vicinity as it became available, the Council now possesses a rectangular site on the eastern border of the present Hospital, approximately equal in area to that on which the present Hospital stands.

Revised plans were prepared last year for a new surgical block, a new children's department and a separate block for missionaries. Five of the larger Missionary Societies wish to share in the latter project. The plan also provides for a new casualty department to ease the congestion of the present out-patient department. This will bring the in-patient accommodation up to 130 available beds, of which ten will be set aside for nursing the chronic sick. (Sketch of plan of Extensions on page 2.)

National Health Service

The outstanding event of the year has been the passing into Law of the National Health Service Act. It will undoubtedly have a far-reaching effect on the character of the Hospital service, and it is expected to be put into force in April, 1948. It is too early to know how the Mildmay Mission Hospital will be affected, but Section 61 of the Act is framed with the intention of preserving the character and atmosphere of hospitals with religious associations. The Act also gives considerable power to Committees of Management which will become legal entities. Section 59 provides that any gift made to a particular hospital may be retained by the receiving hospital for application in accordance with the wishes of the giver. The Council is alive to the importance of the issue for this Hospital and asks that all members and friends interested in the Hospital continue to pray that God will overrule for good all that is done.

Finance

Recent costs have made this year a very difficult one for voluntary hospitals. Several have had to draw on capital funds, and others have sought grants from the Ministry of Health. It is therefore with very grateful hearts that the Council again reports that in spite of the fact that the total expenditure for the two Hospitals amounting to £38,780 (which is £9,689 more than in 1945), we were able finally to meet this increase and to end the year with a surplus on Legacy Account of £1,518, which has been added to the General Fund.

Up to July there was a gradually mounting overdraft, then, two remarkable events occurred. The Governors of the B.B.C. quite unexpectedly offered the first Sunday in August in the "Week's Good Cause" for our two Hospitals. The appeal was

made by Mr. Hugh Redwood, to whom the Council owes a debt of gratitude, and brought in £1,400 when ready cash was most needed. The second event was the receipt in September of a number of unusually large legacies totalling over £6,000.

In addition, owing to the generosity of friends, a considerable sum was received as a result of the Sale of Work, and this, with the other donations and subscriptions, enabled the Hospital to end the year well on the right side.

Meetings

The Annual Business Meeting was held on 1st June, A. Jacob, Esq., F.C.A., presiding, in the absence of Sir George Hume, who was ill. The devotional meeting which followed was well attended, and an eloquent address was given by the Rev. G. C. Bartle, a Member of the Council.

Missionary Meeting

It was decided in the spring to hold a Missionary Meeting, which was held at the Tabernacle on 16th March. It proved a great success and was richly blessed. Former members of the staff, who were on furlough from the mission field, told of their work and the value which Mildmay training was to them. Candidates in training as missionaries also spoke, and an inspiring closing address was given by the Rev. Geoffrey King. It was an ideal opportunity to put before young people the great need of Missionary Societies to-day and the value for a missionary nurse and doctor to have some training at a hospital whose principal object is to heal the souls of the patients as well as their bodies.

Accounts of meetings at Highbury, Bromley and other places, as well as that held in connection with the Sale of Work, will be found in Miss Stockton's Report, which is appended.

The Annie McCall Maternity Hospital

The Council is disappointed that it has not yet been possible to regain possession of the Hospital. The matter was taken up with the Ministry of Health, and plans were approved for repairing and renovating equipment so that 32 beds would be available for maternity patients. The Ministry of Health then instructed the Lambeth authorities to find fresh accommodation for the Day Nursery. The latter expected to move out in November, but unforeseen difficulties have delayed the work on the new Nursery premises.

The work on the district shows an increase on the previous year, 192 mothers were delivered and in the small four-bed in-patient block there were 81 deliveries, making a total of 273.

The Council wishes to thank the staff for their splendid work carried on under great difficulties. There is such a grave shortage of maternity beds in London that it is hoped that there will not be further delay in this requisitioned building being restored to its proper use.

Staff

The Council wishes to express sincere thanks to Members of the Honorary Visiting Staff, especially to Miss Gladys H. Dodds, M.D., F.R.C.S., F.R.C.O.G., for the excellent work that she has done and for the great interest which she has shown in all that concerns the Hospital. The Council also welcomes Dr. Ursula James, M.R.C.P., as Pædiatrician to the Hospital and extends grateful thanks to Dr. Dorothy Burton for her valuable help in carrying on the child welfare clinic during the war years.

Mr. Wilson has also shown great skill in the organisation of the Laboratory and he has been most co-operative and helpful in every way.

In presenting the Reports of the Matron, the Almoner and the Appeals Secretary, the Council is glad to take this opportunity of acknowledging their faithful service and also those of the medical, nursing and administrative staffs. The Council is grateful to the cook, the resident maids, and to the daily workers, both men and women, whose cordial co-operation has added to the smooth running of the Hospital.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

"He sent His Word to heal them and preserve their life."—

Ps. 107: 20 (Moffatt).

The year 1946 was one of steady progress in repairing some of the war scars, roof, windows, ceilings and the like and also of bringing equipment up to date. Reference has been made to improvements in the kitchen, and this and the introduction of heated food conveyors has meant that patients get their meals piping hot and the more appetising. A considerable sum was spent in completely overhauling the Laboratory, the new apparatus is of the electrical type which minimises dust. Opened in June, it soon proved its usefulness and by the end of the year just over 1,000 clinical tests had been reported on. The members of the Honorary Staff have found it a great convenience to receive reports so promptly, enabling them to institute treatment with the minimum delay.

In-patient Department

The demand for admission, especially in the two adult wards, far exceeded our available bed accommodation. We had regretfully to refuse admission to more than 500 patients, including 300 from the Emergency Bed Service. Whenever possible, where an urgent operation was indicated, extra beds were put up, but this is a practice far from ideal.

The need for the new surgical block planned some years ago is a most urgent one if the Hospital is to maintain its position and deal adequately with the calls made upon it. There were 592 operations in the main theatre. The heavy plate glass window which had been shattered the previous year by the blast from a

nearby V1 bomb was reglazed and the entire theatre spray-painted a pleasing shade of pale green.

A recent advance in anaesthetics has been the use of tubocurarine, contained in the arrow poison of natives of South America. It acts by relaxing the muscles so that less anaesthetic is required. Moreover, it makes the operation safer and the patients who had it stood their operation very well.

Public attention has recently been directed to the needs of the chronic sick. When the new surgical block is added, it is proposed to set apart 10 beds in the present wards specially for this needy class of patient.

At the present time, when so many patients are being refused, it is only possible to admit a limited number.

During 1946 the average stay of all patients was 17.9 days, but a study of the records shows that 47 patients were in for periods of 50 to 100 days (they averaged 70 days).

It deserves to be emphasised that every one of these "chronic sick" patients is in need of nursing skill of a high order in addition to expert medical care. On the medical side they included patients with coronary disease of the heart and other types of heart failure, severe asthma and bronchitis, ulcerative colitis; on the surgical, prostatectomy in the elderly, various forms of cancer where colostomy or other palliative measures are indicated and chronic ulcers.

It is now realised that it is a mistake to segregate these patients in special institutions, as has happened in the past, but rather to admit a proportion of them to ordinary medical and surgical wards. This tends to assist the morale of the (usually elderly) patient and aid recovery; it also enables the nurse to gain valuable experience.

Rehabilitation

Convalescence is no longer the dull affair it used to be. The wards are now visited regularly by a Physiotherapist, who gives general breathing and other exercises to patients for operation and graded exercises to convalescing (hernia and the like) surgical patients, which aim at restoring and maintaining muscle tone, thus shortening the total period of incapacity.

Twice weekly, a visiting occupational therapist initiates all patients who desire it and are well enough into the mysteries of leather work, raffia and other simple handcrafts. Patients are, as a rule, soon interested and time, instead of dragging, is often too short for all there is to do.

A feature of the work in the Children's Ward has been the increasing use of Penicillin. Two infants suffering from the pneumococcal form of meningitis, which often used to be fatal, had Penicillin. It was, however, only when they received it into the spinal canal that they responded. Both made a complete recovery. Infants and young children with middle ear and mastoid infection were all given Penicillin. Many of them required Myringotomy and 17 operations for mastoid were performed. Tonsil cases numbered 99.

Out-patient Department

This department is ten years older than the in-patient block. It is just 80 years since a small number of Mildmay Deaconesses in 1866 began the work which was to develop into the present Hospital.

Outwardly, the slums in which they laboured have disappeared, but, as Miss Springett's report shows, there is still much hardship and suffering in this area of East London.

Many of these local patients come for chronic ailments such as

asthma, bronchitis, angina pectoris, diabetes (especially among the large Jewish section of our patients), myxoedema, and osteoarthritis or other forms of rheumatism. Of the 4,882 treatments given in the Physiotherapy Department, the majority were for these latter sufferers.

There are many small factories in the neighbourhood and finger injuries caused by circular saw or spindle call for expert treatment. Approximately 600 such cases were seen, 545 of them being X-rayed. Those with very severe injuries were admitted to the wards, while the others attended out-patients. The use of Penicillin, both locally and by injection, reduced the amount of secondary infection so that the wounds healed more rapidly, enabling the patients, usually cabinet makers, to return earlier to work than formerly.

The number of minor operations (usually with gas and oxygen) was 924, and 1,639 patients were X-rayed. Just over 1,300 patients received dental treatment, chiefly extractions, Mr. Cyril Tomes' clinic being always one of the busiest of the week.

On Tuesday mornings, when out-patient numbers are invariably large, a dietician attends and advises patients as to special diets and gives practical demonstrations.

Many missionaries attended for routine medical examination after return from the tropics and the Far East. Some of these were admitted to the wards for further investigation or for operation.

The X-ray and Laboratory facilities of the Hospital are being increasingly used by several of the larger Missionary Societies.

Dr. Greta Thompson sailed for China under the C.M.S., and a former R.M.O., Dr. Rodney Todman, has gone to India under the L.M.S. Dr. Gerald Oxborrow is now in India with the R.A.M.C. Dr. Sam. Thomson completed his term as senior

R.M.O. in August and is preparing to go to China under the C.I.M. Dr. R. S. Smylie expects to go to Africa under the C.M.S. and Dr. James Burton is an accepted candidate of the Unevangelised Fields Mission for work in the Belgian Congo.

When these doctors reach the Mission Field the total number of Mildmay residents who have gone there will be 114.

Evangelistic Work

The Hospital exists for the dual purpose of "Healing the sick and diffusing simple Gospel truth." The staff desire to give patients on the one hand the highest possible professional standard of medical attention and on the other they seek "so to present Christ Jesus that patients may come to accept Him as Saviour and King."

Many of the nurses and resident medical officers are accepted candidates for the Mission Field. They have registerable qualifications on the professional side and, if asked for their qualification to "diffuse simple Gospel truth," might answer in the words of St. Paul: "For we preach not ourselves, but Christ Jesus the Lord; and ourselves your servants for Jesus' sake. For God who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ" (II Cor. v. 5 and 6).

"Ourselves your servants for Christ's sake." It is in this spirit that the nurse attends to her patients, the doctor his ward rounds and both take the short morning and evening Bible readings and give their witness to what God has done for them.

Patients coming to the hospital are sometimes surprised to see texts upon the walls, one of them, a professional footballer, wrote: "I must confess that, when I saw the texts upon the walls all round, I thought I must have come into a mental asylum, but this

attitude was changed as I heard the Gospel preached and saw it administrated in the lives of the doctors and nurses and Sister——.”

Another patient, cable-jointer by trade was admitted with very severe electrical burns involving face and hands, and for some time had his face swathed in bandages. Fortunately the corneae were not damaged and he was able to look through the folds of his bandage. He was struck by one of the texts, “I am the door of the sheep” (John 10 : 7), and later asked a fellow patient, who happened to be a returned missionary, what it meant. This led to further talks and, as a result, when he was discharged with his face remarkably healed, his parting words were: “I am leaving the Hospital a changed man.”

The Mathieson Fellowship

Former patients of this ward meet on the last Friday of each month and resume old friendships over a cup of tea. The meetings are looked forward to, and they have been addressed by a number of gifted speakers, to whom we are very grateful.

During 1946, the average attendance was 60. The Fellowship has been the means of much blessing.

MATRON'S REPORT

“*With God nothing shall be impossible.*”—Luke 1 : 37.

The past year has brought many difficult problems to solve, changes to face and needs to be supplied, but as we look back we thank our Heavenly Father for all the way that He hath led us, and for His unfailing grace and help.

Staff Matters

In January the administrative side of the work was re-organised, Sister Violet Skipper becoming Housekeeping Sister and Sister Mollie Mowll being appointed to the combined post of Sister Tutor and Home Sister. From the beginning of this year the house-keeping records have been kept according to the requirements of King Edward's Hospital Fund. This has entailed a great deal of extra book-keeping, which has been bravely tackled by Sister Violet, and all is now working smoothly. A new course of training in administrative work and housekeeping has been started, lasting for four months. This seems to be much appreciated. Sister Irene Stephens, of the Landour Community Hospital, India, previously for a short time Sister of the men's ward, wished for a nursing post while on furlough, and joined our Staff in March as Sister of the Out-patient Department, where she has rendered valuable service. Sister Keay resigned her post in charge of the Children's Ward at the end of the year, as for family reasons she wished to be nearer home. This vacancy has been filled by Sister Dorothy Faulkner from Eire. During the year twelve new student nurses joined our Staff, of whom four have left ; two on health grounds, one for family reasons, and one was unable to meet our nursing requirements. Five nurses left on completion of training having all passed their examinations. Eight nurses went to the Central Preliminary Training School and all passed out successfully. Miss Penny, the Sister Tutor, continues to give valuable help to the nurses while under her care.

It has been a pleasure to welcome several of our nurses home on furlough, including representatives from Africa, India, Iran and South America. The following have gone to the mission field, Nurse Elsie Singleton to the Belgian Congo in connection with The Brethren, Nurse Doris Goodacre to Tangier under the

North Africa Mission, and Mrs. Giffard (née Maton) who has been re-appointed for work overseas under the Egypt General Mission.

Our thanks are due to Miss H. McCall who for several years has given regular and most valuable help with hospitals' ration books and returns for the Food Office.

General Nursing Council

Nine nurses entered for the Preliminary State Examination, and all passed. Eight entered for the Final State Examination, and six were successful.

Representatives from the General Nursing Council have visited the hospital four times during the year and several recommendations were made, including new sanitary fittings and the installation of frigidaires for the wards ; also the introduction of a forty-eight-hour week for the night staff involving the appointment of another State Registered Nurse and two nights off duty weekly for each member of the night staff. All these recommendations have been carried out and are proving a real benefit to the work.

Domestic Staff

Following the recommendations of the National Joint Council concerning conditions of employment for domestic hospital workers, a forty-eight-hour week was introduced and wages were raised according to the national scale. This has resulted in a great increase of work for those who are responsible for the domestic arrangements and, up to the end of the year, little improvement in the supply of workers. Difficulties in meeting this side of the work of the Hospital have been very great, but we should like to thank those members of the male and female domestic staffs who have rendered such faithful service for many years.

Mission Work

Daily prayers continue to be taken in the wards and Out-patient Department by different members of the staff and many testimonies of blessing received through this simple witness have come to our knowledge. The Sunday Evening Mission Service and Thursday Bible Class for women have, on the whole, been well attended and many patients who are able, like to join us in the former.

Annie McCall Maternity Hospital

Work has gone on steadily during the year and the staff continue to surmount the difficulties with a cheerful spirit. Sister Bush resigned in April and was followed by Sister Ida Pearce. Several nurses from the Mildmay Mission Hospital, after taking midwifery training, have given valuable service there, for longer or shorter periods, before going on to Bible Training Colleges.

The work has increased considerably, specially in cases attended on the district and in the number attending the various clinics.

We still wait for the time when other accommodation may be found for the Day Nursery, thus clearing the way to prepare the Hospital for maternity work, and we hope that the time may not be far distant when we shall be able to offer training to midwifery pupils once again.

We are very grateful to those ladies who have continued to give voluntary service at the clinics and to the many friends who support us by their prayers and gifts.

Critical days lie ahead for both Hospitals. Please continue to pray that wisdom may be given in planning for the future, also that God may graciously bless the daily work and witness to the salvation of precious souls.

ALMONER'S REPORT

1946—the year that may be remembered nationally as the year of the Victory Parade, the Nuremberg Trials, of shortages and bread rationing, the year of squatters and Rent Tribunals, the year of the Britain Can Make It Exhibition, of the U.N.O. Conference in London and U.N.E.S.C.O. in Paris, the year with a wet summer and wetter autumn. . . .

How has 1946 affected the lives of those who have received treatment at the Mildmay Mission Hospital? The difficulties of the housewife, the appalling housing conditions and the hopelessness of obtaining better or more suitable accommodation, these trials have been very real. In so many cases the year has come and gone and still the families live in overcrowded or damp conditions and still the patient with asthma or a weak heart has the same number of flights of dark stairs to negotiate every time he or she goes out.

The great shortage of beds for the chronic sick has been a very real difficulty. We are constantly hearing of elderly or very dependent people who are not having adequate care at home, or of those who are worn out with such strenuous home nursing and ask for the patient to be admitted to Hospital while they themselves are recuperating. It is distressing to have to refuse such cases, but with the few beds we have at present it is often impossible for us to help. The Old People's Welfare Committee has helped

several to obtain a nursing home vacancy, but many relatives find it hard to understand why we as a Christian Hospital cannot help in such cases of real need.

Here in the Almoner's room we have to thank God for a continued supply of means to use for the benefit of patients: gift letters for convalescent homes, surgical aid letters for appliances, coal tickets, jam from Australia for the people of Bethnal Green, parcels of second-hand clothing, and £ s.d. for our convalescence and appliance funds.

During the year 44 patients were helped to obtain appliances of varying kinds; 104 patients went away for a period of convalescence or holiday (as compared with 59 in 1944 and 85 in 1945). Every effort is made to send each man, woman or child to the most suitable place, where he or she will fit in happily and be well looked after and during last year adult vacancies were obtained in 22 different homes. Mr., Mrs. and Miss Brown at Barley continued to show great kindness to those who stayed with them, and this has been very much appreciated.

Transport has continued to be a problem, both for patients who have a journey on leaving the wards, and for O.P.D. attendances, as well as for in-patients who are referred to other hospitals for consultant advice.

Several Jumble Sales have been held and these have been fairly well attended. We are grateful for help on these occasions from League of Help members and others who are on the Staff.

We should like to acknowledge the help given to patients by many others who are doing social work in the locality. The I.C.A.A. has sent away most of the 21 children who required convalescence and some of these remained away from London for many weeks. The Family Welfare Association and the Old People's Welfare have helped with a number of problems, and

several patients have been referred to the Marriage Guidance Council for advice. The Invalid Kitchen has sent meals to patients who were ill at home, or provided them at their kitchen for those who were able to get there. The Hospital Car Service in several localities has provided transport. The District Nurses have attended a number of referred patients in their own homes. The Food Demonstrator has advised diabetics about their diet, as well as giving weekly cooking demonstrations to out-patients as they wait in the out-patient hall.

About 32 families or single people were given some Christmas cheer, and a number of these were visited in their own homes. We felt that this special effort was appreciated, as several patients called afterwards to say thank you. We should like to pass on these thanks to several who sent gifts in money and kind at Christmas-time, and to Miss Doughty who helped with the visiting.

The Ante-natal Clinics at the Annie McCall Hospital have continued to be busy throughout the year. The Almoner's room here is often a sorting house for problems and patients are referred to other workers in the locality who can advise or help them in their particular difficulty.

In November Mrs. Webb left us, as she was being married again—she is now Mrs. Lane. She has our very best wishes for her new life, as well as our gratitude for her help during the past two years. A number of students have worked in the Department for periods varying from one day to four months, and we appreciate their help and interest in the work.

Will you please pray that God's blessing may rest continually upon this side of the work of the Mildmay Mission Hospital and that it may be to His glory.

APPEALS SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Appeals Department has received much encouragement during the year under review, for there has been the continued faithful support of many old friends and new ones have constantly been acquired. It is certain that there are very many who, through their prayers, their gifts in money and kind and their help by some form of service, have assisted in no small way to put the hospital in the happy position it is in to-day—out of debt and working with a high standard of efficiency. To all, known and unknown, the Hospital Council owes much gratitude and its members are very conscious of the tremendous part which voluntary support plays in the life of the Hospital.

Broadcast Appeal

The outstanding event of the year was the Broadcast Appeal. Many people heard Mr. Hugh Redwood appeal for the Hospital on 4th August and a copy of the text appeared in the December issue of the Magazine. As a result some 1,416 people responded and £1,406 16s. 6d. was realised. We are not permitted to publish a list of the donors, but we would like to record, here, our grateful thanks to the B.B.C. for giving us this opportunity, to Mr. Hugh Redwood for making the appeal, to all who helped in the office with the incoming mail and to every individual person who contributed to this magnificent sum. We feel we have made new friends through this venture, for many are continuing to support us in other ways.

Arrangements for a patient to go to a Rest Home seemed to be fitting in very well—and it was suggested that it really was a case of "all things working together for good to them that love God." The little old lady sat bolt upright in bed and stated emphatically: "They always do—for me!"

Results

The amount raised by voluntary gifts is again most gratifying.

New Supporters

During the year £889 10s. 7d. has been received from donors who have not hitherto contributed to our Funds (excluding the Broadcast Appeal), and this doubtless shows that the knowledge of the twofold ministry of Mildmay is spreading to new sources.

Covenant Scheme

The Covenant Scheme continues and those who pay through this help the Hospital a great deal, for under the present rate of tax, the subscription almost doubles its value. There are 73 members, 8 of whom were new during 1946. We regret that 4 members died and 2 have lapsed in their subscriptions.

Membership

On payment of £1 per annum a subscriber may become a Member of the Association. A special form of application must be completed and the member is then entitled to vote at the Annual General Meeting, thus taking an active part in the government of the Hospital. The total membership has numbered 229

and donors are warmly invited to become Members if they so desire.

Magazine

The number of quarterly magazines issued has increased since 1945, and we are grateful to all those who subscribe to its cost. The printing costs have again increased, but the annual subscription will still remain at 1s. 6d.

Meetings

All through the year various members of the staff have been invited to attend meetings to speak on the work of the Hospital. In every case the visitors have been warmly welcomed and they have undoubtedly roused keen interest in the work, for as a result collections have been made for our funds and articles have been made for the Sale of Work.

Grateful Patients' Band

This is a new form of appeal which was inaugurated during 1946. It arose because from time to time patients have sent donations and have expressed their gratitude to the Hospital for that which has been done for them physically and, in a number of cases, for the help they have received spiritually, too. Patients may join the Band and pay a donation or else they may have a Thrift League Collecting Box in which they collect nickel threepenny pieces—which are themselves a symbol of thrift. The amount which has been received during the year from grateful patients is £105 5s. 9d., and from the Thrift League Collecting Boxes £48 14s. 8d., making a splendid total of £154 0s. 5d. Each member receives a quarterly Newsheet.

Sales of Work

Our appreciation and thanks are due again to those friends who have organised Sales during the year.

Dr. and Mrs. Hy. White held their Sales at Bromley and, as a result, £106 12s. 6d. was given to the Gift Day and Sale Fund.

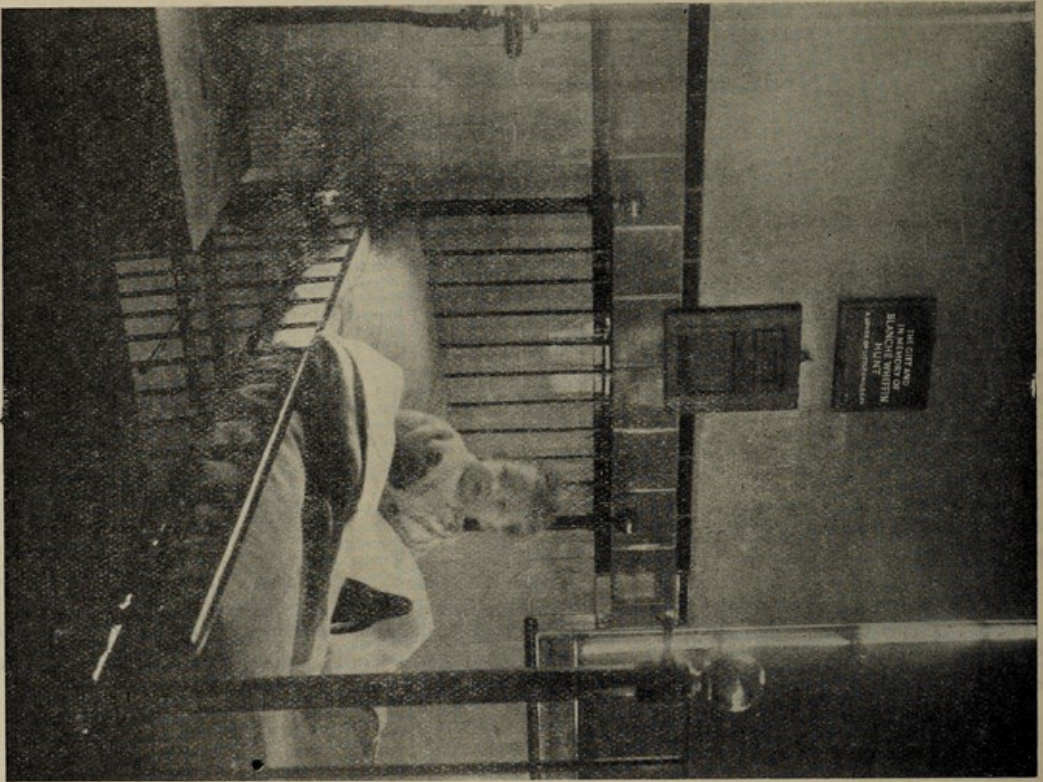
