

Report for the year ended 31st December, 1947.

"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto Me"-Matt. 25: 40.

THE Council presents this, the Seventieth Annual Report, for the year ended 31st December, 1947, and has pleasure in submitting for your information details of the work of the various departments during the year.

Obituary

The Council records with deep regret the loss it has sustained by the passing of three faithful friends.

Miss F. M. Cattell

Miss Cattell, whose death was announced on the 25th June, had been Matron of the hospital from 1896 to 1920, a period of twentyfour years. Her devotion to the Lord and her relations with both staff and patients set a splendid example for all.

Dr. T. Jays

Dr. Jays was appointed a member of the Council in 1943. He will be warmly remembered for his interest in the welfare of the hospital.

Dr. J. C. Mack

Dr. Mack, who was Superintendent of the Mildmay Memorial Hospital, had also been associated with the Council of the Mildmay Mission Hospital. He was made a Vice-President in 1943.

Alteration of Articles of the Association

The Council, as the representative body of the members, put forward the suggestion that the Articles of the Association should be altered to allow the positions of President and Chairman of the

hospital to be separate, if thought desirable, and to inaugurate a position of Vice-Chairman. A special resolution, giving effect to this proposal, was submitted to the members, and at the June Annual Meeting the resolution was passed. At a later meeting of the Council Mr. A. Jacob, in accepting the invitation to be the Chairman, said, "I can assure you that as I serve in this capacity I shall endeavour to do all I can, with the help of God, for the furtherance of the work of the hospital and the welfare of the patients". Major W. Mainwaring Burton was elected to the position of Vice-Chairman.

National Health Act

Since the passing of the Health Service Act the Council has considered carefully the developments of the National Scheme. Notification was received that the hospital would be taken over by the Ministry and would be placed in the North East Metropolitan Region. The Chairman and the Medical Superintendent waited on the Secretary of the Regional Board and placed before him the Memorandum and Articles of Association and explained the nature of the Hospital Trusts and how the daily work functioned. They asked him about its position in the future and how Clause 61 of the Act would be implemented. The Clause reads, "Where the character and associations of any voluntary hospital transferred to the Minister . . are such as to link it with a particular religious denomination, regard shall be had in the general administration of the hospital and in the making of appointments to the Hospital Management Committee to the preservation of the character and associations of the hospital". The Secretary of the Regional Board stated that the terms of the Clause would be carried out and that when the Regional Board appointed the Hospital Management Committee, one, or possibly



two seats would be available for the Mildmay Mission Hospital on the Committee. Later the Chairman was requested to put in writing the exact way in which the hospital functioned and that was done accordingly. It was understood that the present Council would probably serve as a House Committee.

The Annie McCall Maternity Hospital will come under the South West Metropolitan Regional Board. Arrangements for its management have not yet been made.

Members of the Council

It was with regret that the resignations of the Rev. G. C. Bartle and the Rev. Geoffrey R. King were accepted and grateful thanks were tendered to them for their services on behalf of the hospital. A warm welcome was given to the new members, F. Mitchell, Esq, Dr. R. C. Parry, the Rev. T. C. Ralph, Hugh Redwood, Esq., Dr. Gordon Roberts.

Finance

It is with great pleasure that the Council reports that the Income for 1947, of $\pm 30,298$, was a record. Expenses, however, rose at an even greater rate and amounted to $\pm 34,921$, which left a deficit of $\pm 4,776$ for Mildmay and a credit balance of ± 153 for the Annie McCall Maternity Hospital. This deficit at Mildmay and the cost of capital equipment, which amounted to $\pm 1,654$, is being met out of the General Fund, which leaves a balance of $\pm 1,465$ in that Account.

It will be seen, therefore, that although the year 1947 did not pay for itself the hospital has, in fact, paid its way to the end of last year, all expenditure having been met out of monies received partly from credit balances of former years.

Legacies to an amount of £5,857 were received, almost as much as last year, which was itself a record. There were also many generous donations received from friends of the hospital. The Council is deeply appreciative of all the financial help which has been given.

Meetings:

Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting held in June was a time of valued fellowship and blessing. The Chairman and Medical Superintendent spoke of the work of the hospital during the past twelve months. Mr. Percy Holman, the Member of Parliment, spoke with deep feeling about the work of this hospital and assured the Council and friends of his help in whatever way it was needed. Dr. Martyn Lloyd-Jones gave an inspiring address, appealing to all followers of the Lord Jesus Christ to be one hundred per cent. in their work as well as their worship and witness.

Missionary Meeting

The Second Annual Missionary Meeting was held in March and the attendance was such that for some there was standing room only. About 500 were present to hear missionaries on furlough tell of their experiences, candidates for the foreign field give their testimonies, and the closing address by the Rev. Prebendary Colin C. Kerr, who spoke on "Wholetimers for the Lord".

Grateful thanks are due to all who came to the meetings and gave the messages, and our prayer is that, as a result, all may live more devoted lives and that others will hear the Lord's call for missionary service.

Annie McCall Maternity Hospital

The main building of the hospital remained for most of the year in the possession of the Lambeth Borough Council. They evacuated it, however, on 12th November, but though the Ministry of Health approved plans for the renovation of the hospital the Ministry of Works have not yet issued a licence, except for the top floor. Work has, therefore, been restricted to the district, the four beds in 39, Jeffreys Road and to Out-Patient Ante-Natal, Post-Natal and Infant Welfare Clinics. The total number of deliveries was 262, of which 185 were on the district. Sincere thanks are due again to members of the Honorary Visiting Staff, Miss G. Dodds, M.D., F.R.C.S., F.R.C.O.G., Miss J. Barnes D.M., F.R.C.S., M.R.C.P., Dr. J. K. M. C. Wilson, M.B., B.S., and Miss U. James, M.B., B.S., M.R.C.P. (Paediatrician), who have, during another year, carried out their work for the patients most faithfully.

The Council also wishes to record its grateful thanks to the midwives and other members of the staff who have worked efficiently and cheerfully under many difficulties.

Mildmay Mission Hospital: Staff

It is with very sincere appreciation that the Council records its thanks to the Honorary Staff for their excellent work for the patients during the year, ungrudgingly given at any time of the day or night. It was with regret that the resignation of Dr. Ursula James, M.R.C.P., as Physician to the Children's Department, was received. The Council is glad that she is able to continue as Paediatrician at the Council is glad that she is able to continue as Paediatrician at the Annie McCall Maternity Hospital. A warm welcome has been extended to the following new members of the Honorary Staff: Sir Philip N. Panton, M.A., M.B., Ch.B., as Consulting Pathologist; P. J. W. Mills, M.R.C.P.(Lond.), as Physician; Roy Parkinson, M.B., B.S.(Lond.), F.R.C.S.(Lond.), as Emergency Surgeon; L. Woodhouse Price, M.A., M.D.(Cantab), M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., as Pathologist; and also to Zina E. Moncrieff, M.A., M.D., M.R.C.S., D.C.H., who is Acting Physician to the Children's Department.

The members of the Council desire to express their appreciation of Dr. A. J. Watson's work as Medical Superintendent, into which he has put untiring efforts for the benefit of the hospital, and in presenting the Reports of the Matron, the Almoner and the Appeals Secretary they wish to thank them and also the nursing staff, the administrative staff, the posterative scale the methods. administrative staff, the porters, cook, the resident maids and the daily workers for the willing and efficient service they have rendered during a busy year.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

"The memory of Thy great goodness".- Psa. 145: 7.

The year 1947, which has just closed, marks the end of a chapter for the Voluntary Hospitals, which in 1948 come under State control, and as it was the 70th year since the commencement of the work of this hospital it is perhaps fitting to review some of the main events and changes during this period.

Seven Decades: Then and Now

An Out-patient Medical Mission had been in existence for over ten years when the need to provide beds led to the acquisition of a quandam factory in Turville Street, Shoreditch. This was a three-storey building and it was opened on 5th October, 1877, as a hospital for men, women and children. It is significant that 1877 was the year in which Lister came to London to revolutionise surgical treatment. The Medical Superintendents' Reports for those early years make sombre reading. The list of diseases treated included cancrum oris, typhus, typhoid and tuberculosis, both of the lungs and of joints. The district was at that time an unsavoury one, bounded as it was by Petricoat Lane on the west and Brick Lane to and of joints. The district was at that time an unsavoury one, bounded as it was by Petticoat Lane on the west and Brick Lane to the east, and there were many alcoholics treated and an occasional opium addict.

Better premises were, however, needed, and in 1892 the present building was opened. It had been specially designed and it was stipulated that only the finest materials were to be used in its construction, which possibly accounts for the way this fifty-year-old building stood up to the blast of a one ton bomb which fell less than fifty yards away.

There have been additions to the hospital to modernise it, notably in 1926, when a new Operating Theatre was added and a new Nurses' Home built. The work continued to grow and the need for more beds became pressing so that in 1936, with the encouragement of King Edward's Fund, plans were prepared to add three new wards and to improve the existing Out-patient Department. The first stage of this extension scheme was completed in 1938, when Her Majesty Queen Mary opened the new Out-patient Block, but the outbreak of war in the following year prevented any further development. Indirectly, however, the war has made available a very large site for further extension through the widespread destruction of adjacent buildings by enemy bombing. This area is on the east border of the hospital.

The very great changes which have taken place in the hospital world, especially during the past ten years, have been reflected in the history of the staffing of this hospital. In the early days physicians and surgeons made the diagnosis themselves by drawing upon experience; there were no important extraneous aids and an Honorary Staff of about three or four sufficed. In the late nineties an X-Ray Department was added and later a Laboratory became necessary.

The Staff To-day

There are to-day, as in all modern hospitals, a number of auxiliary workers, laboratory technician, radiographer, physiotherapists and others. These assist the Medical Staff in making an accurate diagnosis and in carrying out treatment. The Honorary Staff itself now numbers 16.

As the old order is about to change it is fitting that reference should be made to the great debt owed by the hospital and its patients to the Voluntary Staff. The Mildmay Mission Hospital has no private wards, yet throughout its long history it has always had the unstinted service of specialists of the highest professional standing. There are records of over 42,000 in-patients who have been under their care and of 16,000 major operations performed without fee. This has involved much night work, and the figures for this one hospital may serve to indicate how vast an amount of disinterested service has been given in our voluntary hospitals up and down the land.

The Honorary Staff has always had the assistance of Resident Medical Officers, whose lives have been dedicated to service in the Mission field. These doctors spend six months in the Out-patient and Casualty Departments, then six months in the wards. In last year's Report it was mentioned that 114 had already gone, or were about to go, abroad. The present Residents, Dr. Peter Williams (St. Mary's) and Dr. Kenneth Blaikie (Edinburgh), will be going as medical missionaries to Africa on completion of training. The Visiting Staff have, more than once, commented upon their high standard of work. They have also frequently spoken of the high "The Mildmay nurses appear to have a real sense of vocation, both as nurses and as missionaries".

Work in the Wards

There were just over 1,000 admissions during the year, though 700 other patients were regretfully refused admission owing to lack of beds. Each of the wards was fully extended and there were just over 600 operations in the main theatre. In the Children's Ward the use of Penicillin in middle ear infections has resulted in far fewer mastoid operations being necessary. Cases of Sonne dysentery and of Polio-myelitis were met with during the year, and as a precaution no tonsil operations were performed during the height of the latter epidemic.

It may be of interest to refer to the various services carried out for patients during the year:

505 had a radiological examination.

811 had laboratory tests (a total of 1,970 tests). 117 had some special form of physiotherapy. Short wave, exercises in the Guthrie Smith apparatus, etc.

Almost all patients had routine breathing and muscle exercises. A few patients had electrograph tracings. All patients who wished it were shown some form of handcraft by

All patients who wished it were shown some form formaticate by an occupational therapist, who paid regular visits. The majority of patients belonged to London, but 180 (18 per cent.) came from the Home Counties and from other areas. Many of the latter came for thyroid operations, of which over 100 have been performed in recent years. The average stay of in-patients was 18.31 days but 110 were in bosynical for a month or unwards days, but 119 were in hospital for a month or upwards.

Work in the Out-patient Department

The work in this department dates from 1866. It is unusually large in proportion to the number of beds, and the total attendances from the beginning has reached the impressive number of 21 millions.

Within recent years there has been a gradual change in the character of the Out-patient Departments of most hospitals. In order to minimise waiting, patients come, as far as possible, by appointment. The most important change is, however, the increasing tendency to use the Out-patient Department as a diagnostic service. It is possible in this way to save beds, patients attending for X-ray or Laboratory investigation as out-patients instead of being admitted. At the present time, when the number of beds available in London is present time, when the number of beds available in London is inadequate, this aspect of out-patient work may be expected to increase. The famous Mayo Clinic in America is, by some, regarded as a model in this respect.

In this connection the following statistics for 1947 are of interest: X-ray examinations—1,470 out of a total of 1,975 patients were out-patients; Laboratory investigations—856 out of a total of 1,667 patients were out-patients. In the latter group were included such tests as blood sugar, blood urea, sedimentation rates, and cultures for diagnosis, etc.

The use of Penicillin-the cost of which in 1947 for the whole hospital was £600-has enabled patients, especially those with hand injuries, who in some cases would have required admission, to complete their treatment as out-patients. Its use, too, has markedly reduced the period of incapacity, an economic result of some importance at the present time. In addition to regular sessions for Penicillin injections a number of children with mild bronchitis have attended for oxygen Penicillin spray. In some instances this has saved the necessity of a child being admitted.

More than one thousand patients attended Specialist Clinics and

301 missionaries, mostly from overseas, attended Specialist Clinics and automatical examination, which included laboratory tests. Although Mildmay Mission Hospital has only 54 beds this very extensive work in the Out-patient Department is a fact to be remembered in any appraisal of the service of the hospital to the community.

Evangelistic Work

The evangelistic work of the hospital is carried on, not by an appointed Chaplain but by all the members of the staff, whose daily witness by life gives reality to the short ward services in which they take part.

During the first year of the war some patients who had been in Mathieson Ward said how much they missed the fellowship experienced in the ward. Arising out of this a monthly meeting, which was called the "Mathieson Fellowship", was inaugurated. It has continued to grow, and in 1947 the average attendance was 62. Guest speakers are invariably impressed at the sight of so many men interested in spiritual matters.

A letter which has come to hand whilst the Report is being written

contains the following passage: "The real purport of this note is to thank you, not only for what you did but the way in which it was done—for my sister, whilst she was in your care for an appendicectomy. She has made a very good recovery and is once more nearly her old self again, spiritually

mentally, physically. It is a great testimony to the work that is being done at Mildmay!"

Spiritual, mental, physical healing! There could, perhaps, be no better description of what the Mildmay Mission Hospital is seeking to do for its patients.

MATRON'S REPORT

"I am the Lord, I change not"-Mal. 3: 6.

"From everlasting to everlasting Thou art God"-Psa. 90: 2.

Another very happy year of service and fellowship has passed into the annals of history, during which we have again proved the all sufficient grace and strength of our God, Who changeth not.

The wards were fuller and busier than ever before and the daily average occupation of beds (50.06) is the highest on record. Many and varied were the cases admitted, affording excellent experience for our nurses in training. We also rejoice to know that several of our patients became really interested in spiritual things through the daily Gospel messages given each morning and evening.

Staff Matters

In the summer Sister Mollie Mowll asked to be released temporarily from her post as Sister Tutor and Home Sister on account of her father's serious illness. In November Sister Dorothy Faulkner resigned to be married, and her place as Sister of the Children's Ward was taken by Sister Jane Gray, who had served the hospital faithfully for just over a year as Staff-Nurse-in-charge on night duty. Miss Edith Brown, one of our nurses who had worked for fifteen years as a C.M.S. missionary in Palestine, came in the spring to take the Housekeeping Course, and since August she has rendered most useful service as Housekeeping Sister.

During 1947 fourteen nurses joined the staff for training, four

discontinued for various reasons and eight left on completion of training, having passed all examinations. Eight nurses also went to the Central Preliminary Training School and enjoyed lectures and opportunities for study under the leadership of Miss Penny (Sister-incharge). We are very grateful for all the help she has given to our student nurses.

Three recruits have gone abroad for missionary service. Nurse Dorothea Batley went to Nigeria under the Sudan United Mission. Her Valedictory Meeting was held in our Mission Hall when a goodly number of friends gathered to wish her God-speed. Nurse Doris Brown went to Tangier under the North Africa Mission and Nurse Edith Free to China with the Brethren.

General Nursing Council

During the year information was received from the General Nursing Council that our status as a complete Training School would be withdrawn as we were unable to maintain the required daily average occupation of 100 beds, and we were advised to make application for approval as an Affiliated Training School till such time as we could meet the requirements of the Council. In view of this negotiations were opened with the authorities of the London Hospital, who have been most helpful. Though we are very sorry to give up the status we have held since 1921, when hospitals began to be approved as Training Schools, yet under the Affiliation Scheme our nurses will have the advantage of a wider experience and seeing other methods of work. We are grateful to the authorities of the London Hospital for their co-operation in this matter.

Domestic Staffs

The supply of helpers for this side of the work has been variable, and often we have been obliged to make our needs known in the columns of the local press. Good helpers have come to us from Germany, Norway and France. Our thanks are due to our porters and the resident and daily domestic workers for their valued help, some of whom have served us faithfully for many years.

The Sunday Evening Gospel Services continued through the year, messages usually being given by members of the staff. On Thursdays happy evenings were spent with the women who attended the Bible Class, some of whom have been members for twenty years and more Our nurses have often been invited to speak at Young People's Fellowship gatherings to tell of the work going on here. In this way fresh interest and support have been awakened.

Annie McCall Maternity Hospital

The work here still calls for much patience and courage to carry on in the face of difficulties. We thank the staff for the services they have rendered both in the hospital and in the homes on the district. All our patients seem to appreciate very much what is done for them. As we commit the work of both hospitals into the Hand of our

ALMONER'S REPORT

"... seedtime and harvest and cold and heat and summer and winter and day and night shall not cease"—Gen. 8: 22.

1947 was a year of extremes of cold and heat and summer and winter. The long, cold winter was very trying for many who were treated in this hospital. They had frozen pipes and little or no fuel at home; even frail, elderly folk might be seen carrying pails of water from a standpipe in the street. More than one visitor or out-patient lingered in the hospital, enjoying the unaccustomed warmth, and many a relative wanted help to get coal delivered, or a medical certificate for additional fuel, when a patient was being discharged from the ward and there was no fire at home. One cardiac patient had to remain over eleven weeks at a convalescent home before the weather was fit for her to be moved!

When the hot, sunny days came they brought a spate of folk anxious to get out of the East End for convalescence or a holiday, as an escape from their stuffy little rooms. It was possible to arrange for 84 people to go away and a further 45 were referred to other agencies, such as the Invalid Children's Aid Association, the Jewish Board of Guardians and the Family Welfare Association; many other patients, of course, were able to make their own plans for a rest and change. Of the 84 mentioned above 17 were helped with grants from the Hospital's "Ossulston" Fund and 4 others were given free "Letters" for convalescent homes.

It is not always easy to find suitable accommodation; two patients, a man and a woman, both having severe heart trouble, were unfortunately refused by a number of homes on account of their condition; they were both very disappointed to have to remain in London all the summer. There is a real need for homes willing to accept the responsibility of such folk.

Mr., Mrs. and Miss Brown have continued to take guests at their house at Barley. All our patients who went there returned with glowing tales of the kindness they received. Other friends of the hospital, both living near the Essex coast, have been most kind in offering to give a child a holiday. The first little girl who was welcomed like this returned to London not only better in health and much happier but with beautifully re-made clothes and a Post Office Savings Account. She now stays with these kind ladies during each school holiday and keeps up a regular correspondence with them during term time. The other friend took first a small boy and later his older sister after she had had an operation. Their parents were most appreciative of this opportunity for such a holiday for their children, which they themselves could not have given them. It is a pleasure to be able to act as a link between such generous friends and those who so need—and appreciate—their help.

and those who so need—and appreciate—their help. Forty-eight appliances of various types were ordered during the year. A number of Royal Surgical Aid Society Letters were given to us and 79 were passed on to suitable applicants.

One of our special friends, aged about 85, has gone to the Heavenly Home during the year. He had been so anxious that his affairs should be in good order and that the hospital should benefit by his worldly goods, after allowing sufficient to "bury him decent" and a little for the relatives with whom he lived. To this end he made numerous visits, at considerable effort, to the Poor Man's Lawyer. He also wished to die in Mildmay, but unfortunately he was taken ill at a time when there was great pressure on our beds, and he was admitted to another hospital where he passed away. We miss his visits—he used to come in whenever he wanted advice or help—and we appreciate his generosity in leaving £20 13s. 8d. to this hospital.

Many of the opportunities of helping patients which come to the medical social worker are not spectacular, and cannot be reduced to statistics. There are families to whom from time to time, as emergencies arise, one acts as a "prop"; in-patients have an endless variety of anxieties and perplexities, which tend to grow burdensome to them, but which can probably be solved quite simply. Sometimes illness necessitates the reorganisation of a patient's way of life, and long term plans have to be discussed with them and with their relatives. Or it may even be a matter of education! There was a boy of six who could not read and he was being teased by the other children who could; far more important, he had received the Lord Jesus as his Saviour and so needed to be able to read his Bible for himself. A start was made with a short daily lesson, and then a student kindly carried on until he was transferred elsewhere for further treatment.

During each university vacation a course is run from a settlement in Bethnal Green for students who are reading for a degree in any subject who wish to gain an insight into East End life. A number of such students have worked with us here for a day or two. Almoner students have also come for several months' training. Some of these were Christians who had asked the Institute of Almoners if they might come to Mildmay for part of their training; their help and fellowship have been very much appreciated. Sincere thanks are due to members of the League of Help who have come along to Jumble Sales and to the nurses from the Out-patient Department who helped so enthusiastically with Christmas visiting.

We need much prayer support that in this department, as in the rest of the hospital, there may be spiritual seedtime and harvest. "Pray ye, therefore, the Lord of the harvest". Thank you for your help in this way.

Covenant Scheme

At the end of the year the number of subscribers to Mildmay through the Seven Yearly Covenant Scheme was 57, and the number to the Annie McCall Maternity Hospital was 10. This extra financial help, which amounted to approximately £312 for Mildmay and £30 for the Annie McCall, was very much appreciated. It is understood that this scheme will continue when the hospitals are under State control and the monies used for the benefit of the hospital concerned.

Membership

To become a member of the Association it is only necessary to pay £1 per annum and sign an application form. This enables members to vote at the Annual General Meeting and to take an important and active part in the management and work of the hospital. Unfortunately during the year 13 subscriptions ceased, but 15 new members were enrolled; the total membership is now 204.

Magazine

Keen interest in our work continued and about 2,250 copies of the magazine were sent out each quarter. The subscription for the magazine is still only 1s. 6d. per annum.

Meetings

Members of the staff continued to attend various meetings on behalf of the hospital, and much interest was thereby obtained. The results were undoubtedly seen, not only by the extra prayer support promised but by the gifts of money and also articles for the Sale of Work. There was a crowded hall at Chadwell Heath Baptist Church Work. There was a crowded nan at Chadwen Heath Baptist Church one afternoon in the summer when, under the chairmanship of the Rev. Howard Kensit, Mrs. Charles Haynes held her annual meeting for Mildmay, with many excellent results. In June a four day deputation visit to Leicester and one day to Nottingham were much blessed, and new interest in these areas gained. Appreciation and there are represent to all who welcomed and gave hospitality to the thanks are expressed to all who welcomed and gave hospitality to the members of the deputation team.

Grateful Patients' Band

When patients are discharged from hospital they are invited to join the Grateful Patients' Band, either by sending an annual donation or by having a Thrift League Collecting Box.

Since its inception in 1946 the band has grown considerably and there are now 250 members.

The total amount of donations during the year was £120 4s. 6d., and the Thrift League Collecting Boxes realised £108 9s. 7d., truly a splendid result, and one which gives great encouragement to the workers in the hospital.

Sales of Work

Our many friends in Dorking, under the secretaryship of Miss L. Blakeney, have once more been very generous and by gifts and the proceeds of a sale she was able to send £110 13s. 8d. to our funds. We would record here our sincere thanks for this continued devoted support.

A very informal afternoon sale was held in December at the Annie McCall Maternity Hospital, amongst the mothers visiting the clinics. Miss Stuart Bunning gave her willing and untiring help again and the

Under the chairmanship of Mrs. Carnegie and the secretaryship of Miss F. E. Arbuthnot, the members of the League of Help have given, once more, that help which received at the time it was most needed seemed to be doubly blessed, and deep appreciation and thanks are due to them. Besides the result of their stall at the sale, which realised £190 19s. 6d., representing much time and work, £40 was subscribed for furniture, and arrangements were made for the nursing staff to be supplied with daily newspapers and periodicals during the year. Much benefit was gained by the hospital as a result of the fortnightly working parties and also Miss McCall's continued loyal service with the ration books. The League helps, too, at the Annie McCall Maternity Hospital, represented by Mrs. Carnegie and Miss McCall, who give assistance at the various clinics.
