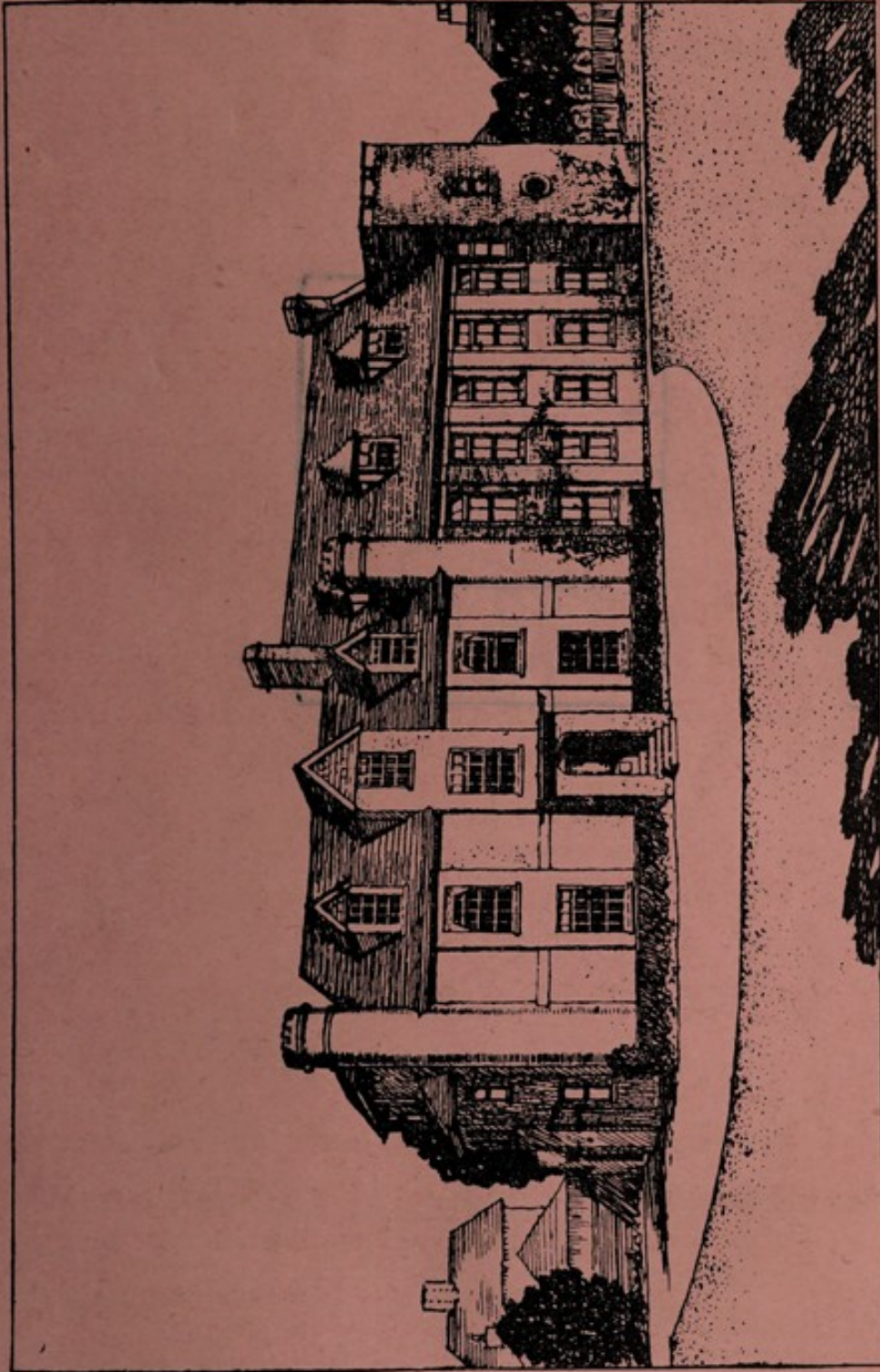
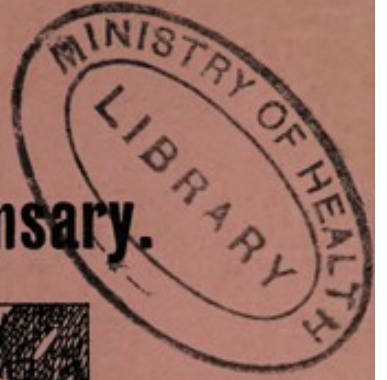

REPORT.

IN presenting the 37th Annual Report to the Governors, Subscribers and Donors, the Committee are glad to be able to record much valuable work done. The number of In-patients admitted and treated during the year was 201 and 130 operations have been performed. There have been 4,306 attendances as Out-patients at the Dispensary, being an average of 83 a week. There have been 38 minor operations on Out-patients and 183 dental cases.

The Committee wish to offer the Honorary Medical, Surgical and Dental Staff their very best and warmest thanks for their most valuable services, which are always so generously placed at the disposal of patients. The Committee wish also to gratefully acknowledge Dr. Walker Wood's kind help at various times as a specialist surgeon in serious ear, nose and throat troubles. They now recommend his formal appointment as Honorary Consulting Surgeon to the Hospital in connection with the important specialist work for which his name is so well-known.

The Matron and Nursing Staff have continued their unwearied efforts to alleviate suffering by their able and sympathetic attention to the patients. The Committee recognise how much they owe to them and offer them a warm expression of their most grateful thanks.

The Hospital has suffered during 1927 an irreparable loss through the death of Dr. Edith Neild, who had been one of our Honorary Physicians for 27 years. The Committee and friends of the Hospital know how great a work she did among the poor of this town, and they feel that they have lost not only a valuable member of the Honorary Medical Staff but also a lady who was a friend to them in the great work in which they are united. The Committee will always remember Dr. Edith's labours with gratitude and a deep sense of indebtedness. The Committee are glad to recall that, in May, 1927, Dr. Edith accepted the office of Vice-President of the Hospital, and that on her retirement from practice, she, in June, 1927, accepted the post of Hon. Consulting Physician to the Hospital, both appointments being in succession to Dr. Neild, her late father. At Dr. Edith's funeral the Committee and Subscribers were largely represented, and the Chairman of the Hospital Committee in a speech at the graveside said :—

“ We are all here to-day to mark our deep sense of regret at the death of our friend, the late Dr. Edith Neild ; also to express our sincere condolence with the Neild family in their sad bereavement. But some of us are here in an additional capacity, viz., as representatives of the Homœopathic Hospital of this town, in connection with which institution for the relief of suffering, Dr. Edith Neild was an Honorary Physician for about 27 years. It was only quite recently that, owing to failing health, she announced her determination to retire from practice, and our Committee unanimously asked her to accept the appointment on our medical staff as an Honorary Consulting Physician, which post she accepted in the hope that she might still be able to serve the Hospital occasionally. Alas, her hopes have not been realised, and she has been called hence to her reward much sooner than we expected.

This event is all the more sad and regrettable because it is only a few months ago since we were here to lay to rest all that was mortal of that great and good servant of the people, the late Dr. Frederic Neild, who was the father of the lady just deceased.

Dr. Edith Neild was an honoured and much valued member of the Honorary Staff of our little Hospital for the years named, and her able professional help in our work will be sorely missed.

But Dr. Edith Neild will be mourned sincerely by a large number of the poor of our town and neighbourhood, who have not only benefited by her professional skill and advice, but have found in her a sympathetic friend in their suffering, extending often, as some of us have long known, to generous charity, as well as to gratuitous professional attention. This, I know, can truly be said of other professional practitioners, and it is one of the great privileges of those who live as close to hospital work as I do to know how truly great and Christian a profession that of a medical man or woman is. Dr. Edith Neild was one of the best examples of the profession, and her name will always be remembered in a spirit of great respect and gratitude for the noble, unselfish and useful life she lived.”

The Rev. A. D. Ferrier-Rowe said (also at the graveside) that he was quite sure Dr. Edith Neild was the last one who would wish for her praises to be sung, but he also felt sure that all of them had seen something of her work during the last 39 years, and they could only express gratitude for her beneficial ministry. For

the last 30 years he had been privileged to know Miss Neild and to see what wonderful work she had done. There was no doubt that Dr. Neild would live chiefly in the hearts and homes of the poor, and they thanked God for her life, which abounded in kindness and charity.

At the first Committee Meeting, after Dr. Edith Neild's death, a resolution in the sense of the Chairman's speech at the graveside was passed, and a message of sympathy sent to the bereaved family.

Steps have been taken by a representative Committee of ladies to raise a Memorial Fund to perpetuate the memory of Dr. Edith Neild by allocating a Ward in the contemplated new buildings for serious Maternity and Child cases to be called the "Dr. Edith Neild Ward." Mr. J. Scrace, J.P., has kindly consented to act as Hon. Treasurer to this Fund, and thanks to his active work and the support of a number of friends the amount raised at the end of 1927 was £400.

On the recommendation of the late Dr. Edith Neild, the Committee have nominated Dr. Lilian Croskery as an Hon. Physician to the Hospital in succession to the late Dr. Edith, and they ask the Governors to confirm this recommendation. The Committee warmly welcome Dr. Lilian Croskery as an honorary member of the Medical Staff, and hope she will have a long and useful career amongst us.

Mr. Price Evans, who has served the Hospital many years as Honorary Dental Surgeon, having sold his practice and retired, the Committee have unanimously appointed Dr. Ernest H. Bryant to the vacant post. They wish to place on record an expression of their very grateful thanks to Mr. Price Evans for his long and valuable services and wish him every happiness in his retirement. They are also very obliged to Dr. Bryant for so willingly offering his services under the circumstances.

The stores of the Hospital were considerably replenished by the Pound Days, kindly organised by the Matron and the Ladies' Committee, and helped by many generous donors. There were received in goods 1,676 lbs. 2 oz. weight and in cash gifts, £21 12s. 6d.

The Ladies' Linen League has been actively at work during the year, and as a result 84 new articles have been added to the Matron's linen cupboard, in addition to a large amount of mending done by members of the League. New Members will be very cordially welcomed to these meetings, which are held in the Board Room of the Hospital at 3 o'clock on the

first Friday in each month, under the Presidency of Mrs. Barlee.

The arrangements for serving tea to the large number of women and children Out-patients on Thursday afternoons, at cost price, have been undertaken by various ladies in turn, and, judging by the appreciation expressed, have evidently met a very real need.

Miss Lloyd continues her kind help by superintending the collecting box department.

To all these ladies who have devoted so much time and service to promoting the welfare of the Institution, most grateful thanks are tendered.

During the present year the Hospital Committee received the most valuable gift of a Wireless Installation through the generous kindness of the local Wireless Society. The formal presentation was made by His Worship the Mayor, Mr. Alderman Westbrook, J.P., and the Chairman received the gift on behalf of the Committee, expressing their sincere thanks to the Society and their friends and supporters for this much-appreciated presentation. It need hardly be said that the patients have much enjoyed the advantages and pleasures which the gift affords. In addition to the Wireless Installation fitted to the public wards, the Society extended it to the private sitting-rooms of the Matron and Nurses, which consideration for their Nursing Staff the Committee warmly appreciate.

The Committee have received many tokens of interest and generosity from various organisations and Committees in the town and neighbourhood. Their sincere thanks are offered to the various Friendly Societies for their continued assistance from the usual Sunday and Saturday Parade Funds.

The Committee gratefully acknowledge a contribution of £10 from the League of Mercy on the recommendation of the Marquis Camden, whose interest we much appreciate.

The Committee also wish to acknowledge the generous assistance they have received from the Hospital Saturday Pay Day Fund, which is now permanently established for the benefit of the local hospitals, the sum allocated this year being £240. We are glad to recognise the Pay Day Fund as now a regular and substantial support to our work.

During the year Mr. Billenness, the Secretary of the Pay Day Fund, was appointed an additional representative of his

Committee on the Hospital Committee, and the members of the Hospital Committee are glad to obtain this welcome help.

The Extension Fund, established in 1923, has again received several substantial gifts. Mr. Thompsett once more kindly organised another Flower Day, which resulted in a handsome donation to the Extension Fund amounting to £79 15s. od. net.

The Committee have received with great pleasure an intimation from the solicitors to the executrices of the late Dr. Edith Neild that she has left the Hospital a legacy of £10 free of duty.

Mr. G. C. Burland, a member of the Hospital Committee, has very kindly superintended the fuel purchases and heating arrangements of the Hospital and the Committee wish cordially to thank him for the great help he has rendered in this connection.

The Committee are glad to announce that the "Two Friends" who promised a contribution of £1,000 to the Extension Fund if £2,000 more could be raised within a time specified, have paid their final instalment, the conditions of the challenge having been met. The Committee tender their most grateful thanks to the "Two Friends" for this generous support to the Extension Fund. The whole of the proceeds have been invested to the credit of the Fund in 5 per cent. War Loan.

The Committee now hope that friends and supporters will contribute a further £4,000 which will be necessary to meet the estimated cost of the new buildings. When a further £1,000 has been received the Committee will be in a position to ask for definite estimates and proceed with their plans.

The proposed extension of the Hospital is in some respects very urgently needed. The Out-patients' Department is often overcrowded and our Honorary Surgeons greatly desire that the Operating Theatre should be enlarged and improved. It is also important that the proposed Children's Ward should be provided, because at present they have to share the Men's Ward, which is often inconvenient. In fact one of the private wards has recently been set apart for men patients, because the men's wards is needed for children.

The Committee very earnestly ask their Subscribers and friends to help them complete the Extension Fund this year. Any information desired in regard to the scheme will be gladly furnished on application.

For the information of intending donors to the Extension Fund, the Committee would point out that the Hospital Buildings, Endowment Fund and all other property are settled upon Trustees, and must be for ever devoted to hospital work. Thus contributions form a perpetual benefit to the sick and suffering, and cannot be alienated to any other purpose.

The Committee are deeply indebted to the Clergy and Ministers of the town for their spiritual ministrations, and for the financial support from their congregations in the matter of collections for the Maintenance Fund.

In conclusion the Committee greatly regret to report that for the first time for many years there is a large deficit of over £300 on the Maintenance Fund. The present income from subscriptions is only half generous enough, and the Committee would be in difficulties but for the income from the Endowment Fund and special contributions by legacies and otherwise. They hope that their supporters will help them increase the subscription list this year, and special contributions towards the deficit will be warmly welcomed. Mrs. Groves, the Official Collector, will be glad to have the name and address of any lady or gentleman who might become a Subscriber if waited upon. Such names may be addressed to Mrs. Groves at the Hospital.

The cordial thanks of the Committee are offered to the Honorary Treasurer, the Honorary Secretary and the Honorary Accountant.
