## GOVERNMENT OF THE HOSPITAL

(INCLUDING THE CANCER CHARITY).

---

A BOARD of Management, styled the Weekly Board, meets in the Board Room of the Hospital every Wednesday, at 11 a.m., for the transaction of the ordinary business.

A Court of Governors is held on the last Thursday in the months of February, May, and November for the confirmation of such acts of the Weekly Board as require the sanction of a Court, and the transaction of special business. A Special Meeting of this Court may be called at any time, either by order of the Court or of the Weekly Board, or upon the requisition of the Treasurers or of any five Governors.

The Patrons, President, and Vice-Presidents are *ex-officio* Members of the Court, of the Board, and of Committees of a Court or Board.



# THE MIDDLESEX HOSPITAL.

## REPORT FOR 1907.

*To the Governors of The Middlesex Hospital.*

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

In accordance with custom we beg to submit to your consideration our Annual Report upon the nature and extent of the work carried out by the Institution whose fortunes it is our duty to guide and protect.

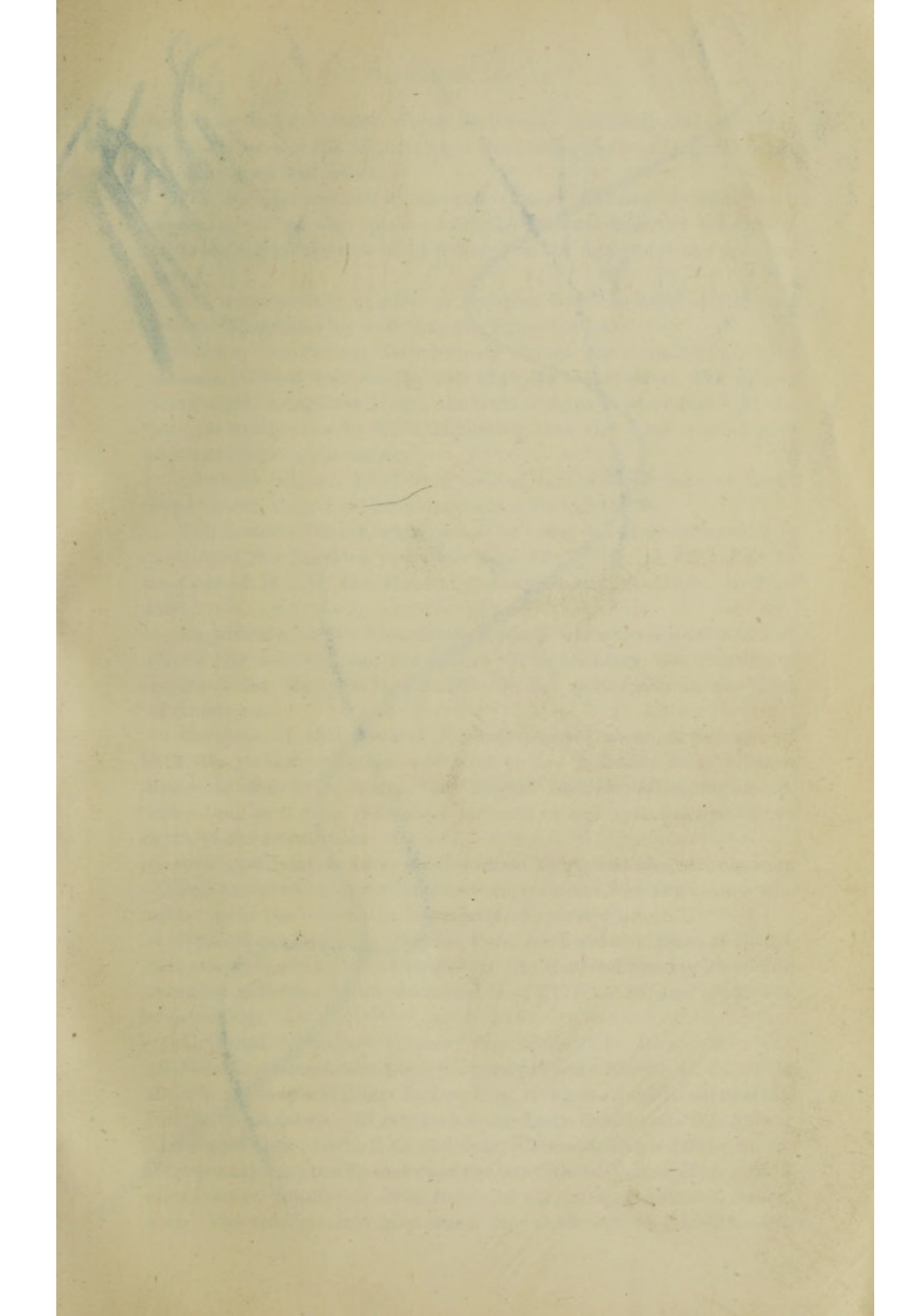
We approach the task with a confidence born of the knowledge that we are able to place before you abundant evidence of the maintenance, in the face of many difficulties, of a high standard of efficiency, resulting in a record of service judiciously and economically rendered to the suffering poor, which entitles the year under review to rank with credit amongst its predecessors in the history of the Hospital.

Before proceeding to analyse the statistics and accounts it is necessary briefly to refer to certain changes which have been made in the methods of statement employed.

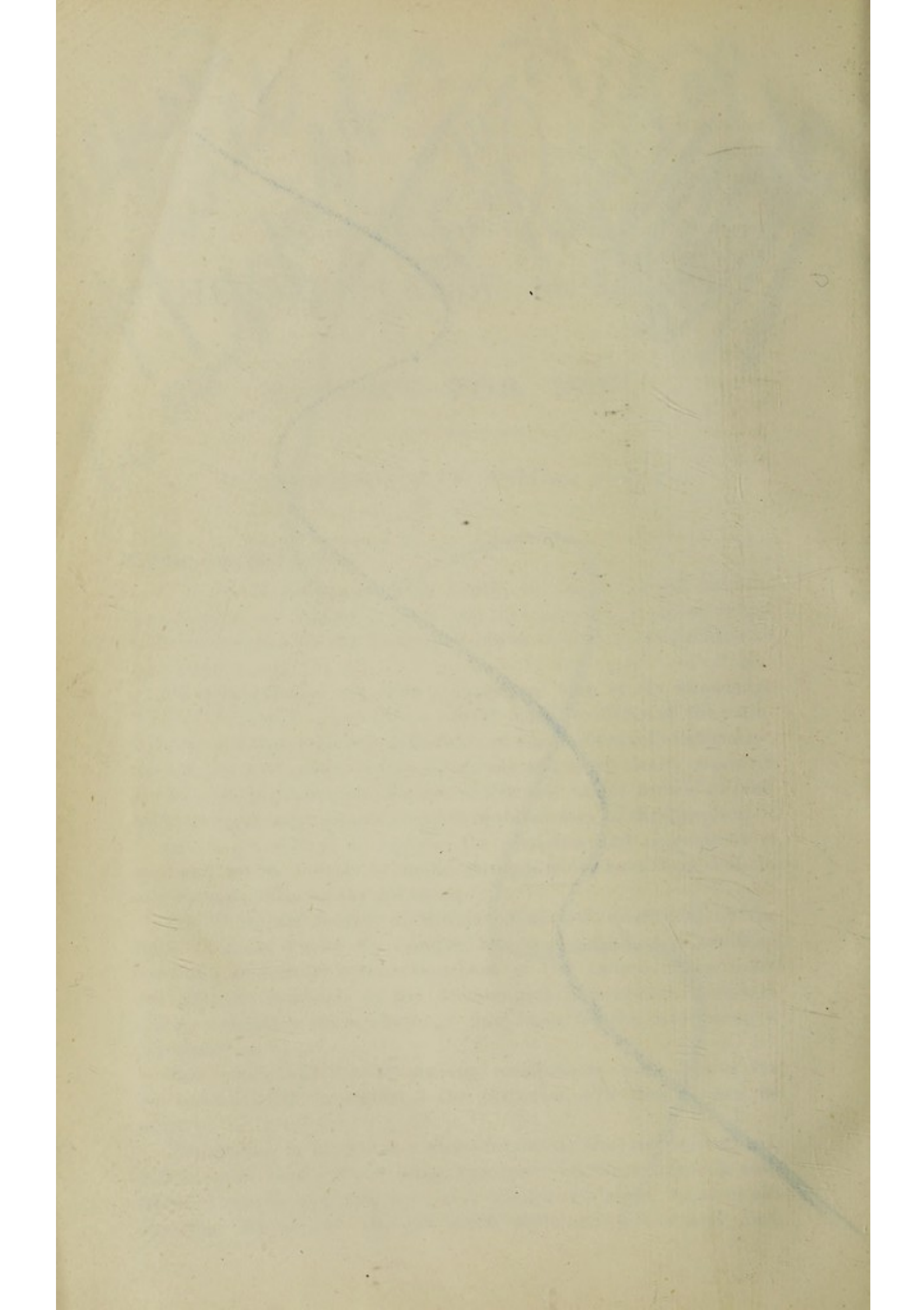
The "Uniform System of Hospital Accounts" instituted by the three Hospital Funds for London has been subjected to revision, involving an extensive re-arrangement of the various items under the different headings in the Income and Expenditure Accounts, and in a measure the adoption of new bases for the calculation of the statistics.

The impracticability of making comparisons with figures for the previous year, except in a few instances, will thus at once be seen.

The alterations are due to a desire further to elucidate the returns, and to make those of one institution more readily comparable with those of others; and although, as it was foreshadowed would be the case, the change has involved much additional labour and some









temporary inconvenience, a loyal endeavour has been made to carry out the wishes of the originators of the scheme in the anticipation that ultimate good will result.

In the General Hospital—the Cancer Charity is dealt with separately in another place—3,918 In-Patients received treatment, representing an increase of 59 patients on the figures for the previous year.

The average daily number of occupied beds throughout the year was 269.58, greater by 3.08 than the figure for 1906.

In the Out-Patient Department, though the actual number of patients relieved was less by 283 than the year before, the figures being 47,597 as against 47,880, the total number of attendances of the patients was greater by 5,705, indicating that the cases treated were of a more serious character.

Of these patients 1,342 were treated in the Electrical and Light Department, their total attendances numbering 14,636.

The Festival Dinner, which it will be remembered was unavoidably postponed the previous year, was successfully carried out under the auspices of H.R.H. The Duke of Connaught and Strathearn, in May last.

In addition to the contributions made when the appeal was first issued the Festival was the means of augmenting the "Ordinary Income" for the year by £4,266 10s. 6d., principally in the form of donations.

In spite of the Festival, "subscriptions" show a decrease of £73 14s., a circumstance which is to be deplored, as it is most desirable that this source of income should be strengthened, indicating, as it does, individual interest in and sympathy with the work of the Institution.

It is gratifying to note, on the other hand, that the receipts from Alms Boxes, representing contributions from the working classes who make use of the institution, have grown by over £100.

From King Edward's Hospital Fund for London a grant of £3,000 was received, whilst the awards from the Hospital Sunday Fund and Hospital Saturday Fund amounted to £2,757 1s. 8d. and £453 10s. respectively.

The total "Ordinary Income" was £21,680 1s. 1d.

Notable amongst the Legacies received were £2,027 4s. 2d. under the will of the late William Bykur, Esq., being one-twelfth share of the residue of his estate; £1,000 each from Lady Sandhurst, Sir Arthur Townley Watson, Bart., K.C., and John Thomson, Esq.; £971 18s. 7d. (on account) from the Executors of the late Charles Turner, Esq.; and a discretionary bequest of £900 from the executors of James Toleman, Esq. The total receipts from this source amounted to £9,532 6s. 9d.,



which, though greater than the sum for the previous year, was yet considerably below the average.

His Majesty the King graciously continues his annual subscription of £100, and has also observed his usual custom of sending presents of game and cast linen for the patients.

We are also indebted to Lord Howard de Walden for continuing his annual subscription of £300.

Of the Donations received the following, by reason of their liberal character, are particularly worthy of mention : £500 from the Right Hon. The Earl of Derby ; £505 from W. Hamilton Yatman, Esq. ; £500 from "R.W." ; from the Worshipful Company of Goldsmiths, and the Worshipful Company of Mercers, £250 and £210, respectively ; from T. F. Blackwell, Esq., £157 10s. ; £105 each from Messrs. Crosse and Blackwell, Messrs. W. and A. Gilbey, and the Worshipful Company of Fishmongers ; and several gifts of £100 each from generous benefactors, including The Princess Polignac, Sir Donald Currie, G.C.M.G., Major W. H. Mullens, Major R. L. Mullens, P. L. Argenti, Esq., and Mrs. M. A. Goodlake (Convalescent Home).

Our thanks are due to Mrs. Dundas Robertson, Mrs. Cecil Chichester and Miss Cottrell-Dormer, who have sent 200 flannel jackets for the use of the patients, in memory of their mother, the late Mrs. Cottrell Dormer, who for many years before her death was a Governor of the Hospital, and made a similar gift.

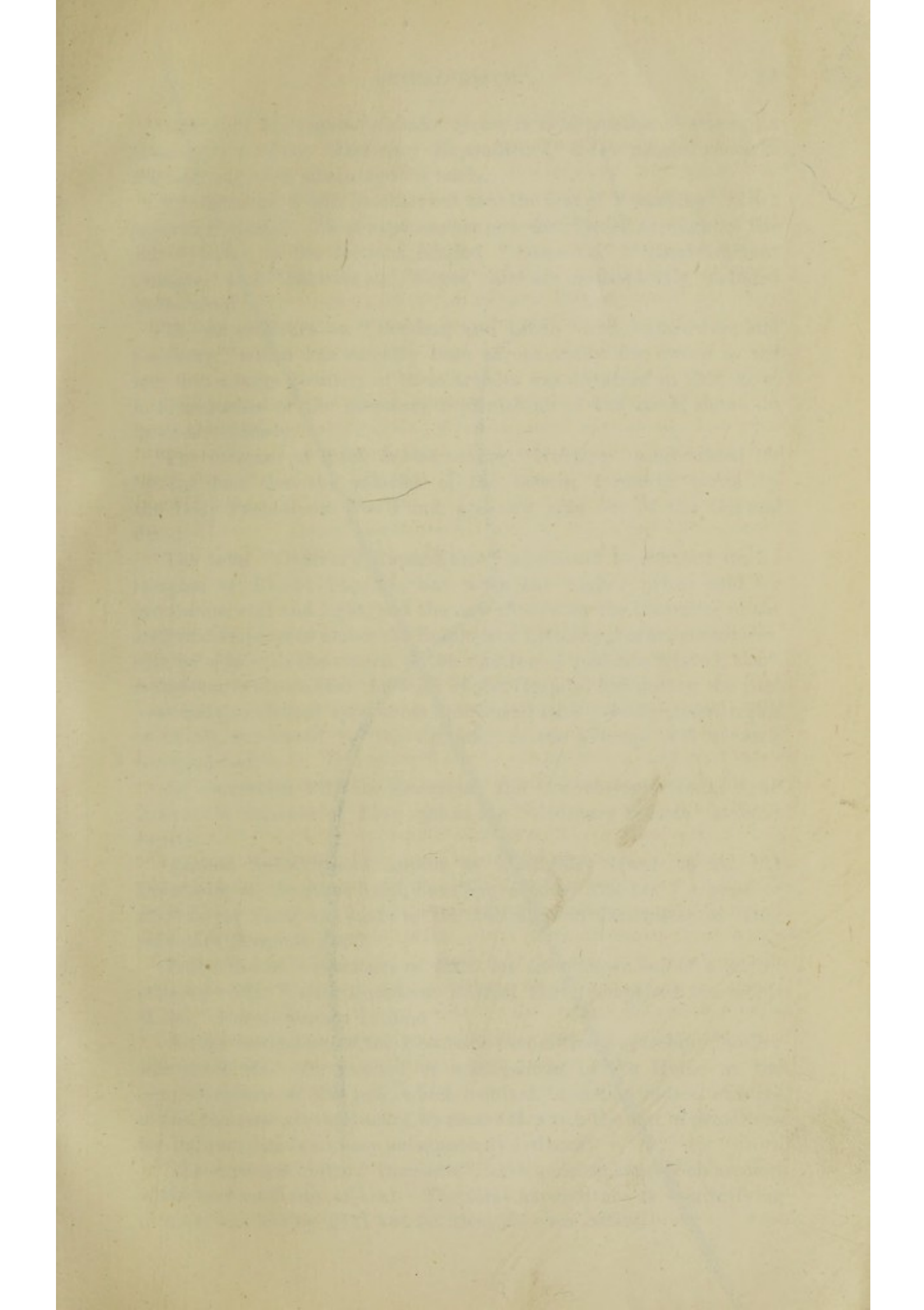

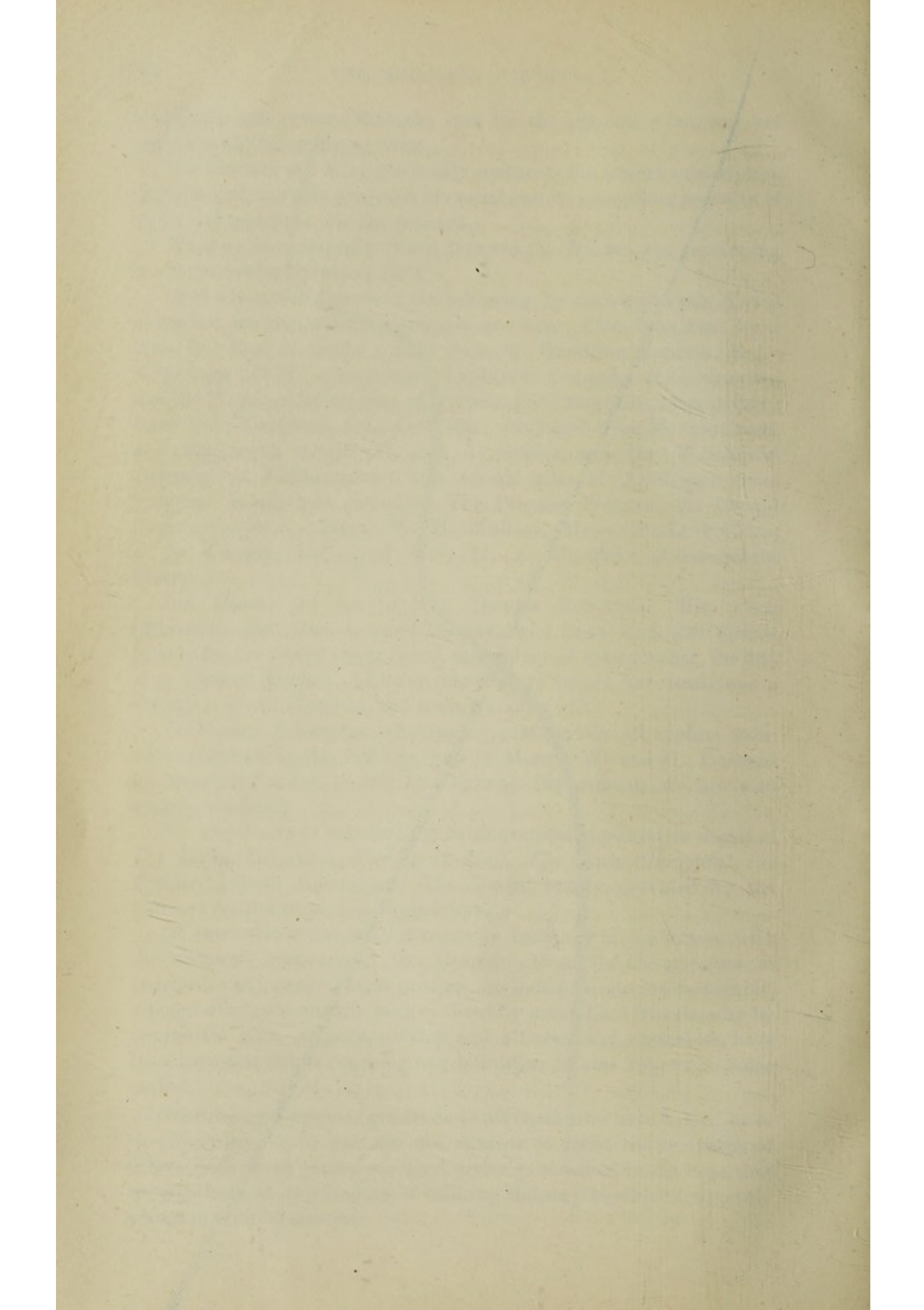
Of the various expenses necessarily incurred in connection with the domestic economy of the Hospital, those for the purchase of vegetables and general farm produce are by no means inconsiderable, a point which has already been realised by many kind friends, who by thoughtful gifts of game, poultry and all classes of vegetables, have been instrumental in reducing our liabilities in this respect to some extent.

Whilst expressing our gratitude to all those who have helped us in this direction in the past we are anxious to enlist the sympathy of others with large gardens or land under cultivation, in the hope that we may have an opportunity of utilising the surplus which frequently occurs in fruitful seasons.











Although, for reasons already given, it is impossible to attempt a close analysis of the "Ordinary Expenditure," a few general remarks thereon may with advantage be made.

For instance, it will be observed that the cost of "washing" is not separately stated. These expenses are now distributed throughout the sub-divisions of the sections headed "Domestic," "Establishment Charges," and "Salaries and Wages," and are consequently included in the total.

The expenditure on "Bedding and Linen" and "Hardware and Crockery," which has recently been exceptionally low, owing to the fact that a large quantity of these articles was obtained in 1901, now, in consequence of the necessary replenishing of the stock, shows an upward tendency.

The increase of £409 3s. 9d. under "Nursing" is accounted for by the fact that the salaries of the Sisters, formerly borne by the Lady Probationer Fee Fund, are now paid out of the General Fund.

The total "Ordinary Expenditure" amounted to £30,507 6s., an increase of £1,144 14s. 3d., but when the higher prices paid for provisions, coal and light, and the new charge for the insurance of the staff and employees under the Employers' Liability Act are considered, side by side with the return of the number of patients treated, there is distinct evidence that the work of the Hospital has during the past year been conducted upon more economical lines—an argument which is amply supported by the decrease in the average cost of each occupied bed.

In connection with the Samaritan and Convalescent Home Fund Account a decrease of £342 odd in the "Ordinary Income" amount occurs.

Annual Subscriptions appear at a slightly lower figure, but Donations, on the other hand, have improved by £84 14s. A grant of £200 to the Fund was made by the Distribution Committee of King Edward's Hospital Fund.

Lady Riddell's donation of £525 for the endowment of a bed in memory of Sir Walter Buchanan Riddell, Bart., comprised the whole of the "Extraordinary Income."

At the instigation of the Economic Committee a searching inquiry was made into the method of management of the Home at the commencement of the year, which resulted in certain radical changes in the domestic arrangements, by means of which the cost of provisions for the year has been very substantially reduced.

The expenses under "Domestic" have gone up, largely on account of the increased cost of coal. The total expenditure, it is gratifying to note, was less by £141 13s. 3d. than the year before.



The excess of Expenditure over Income amounted to £2,285 10s. 6d., which had, as usual, to be met by a contribution from the General Fund towards the maintenance of the Home.

During the year the Convalescent Home extended its benefits to 1,104 patients—a record which proves how valuable an adjunct to the Hospital it has become.

On the advice of the Nursing Committee the term of training of Nurses has been extended from three to four years, and will include in future a period spent at the Convalescent Home for the purpose of gaining some knowledge of the care and management of patients during their convalescence.

The Chaplain, in his report herewith submitted, deals comprehensively with the work of administering the Samaritan Fund, and also the distribution of doles from the Dresden Assistance Fund.

On October 1st a Memorial Window, placed in the Chapel to the memory of the late Resident Medical Officer, Mr. Edward Ashby Fardon, was unveiled by his sister, Mrs. Aston-Binns.

The Chapel has been further beautified by the erection of a handsome Marble Balustrade to the Organ Loft, the cost of which has been defrayed by private subscription.

On December 16th a Sale of Work was opened in the Board Room by the Countess Bathurst, and about £100 was realised towards the purchase of a new Organ, which it is the ambition of the Chaplain and all others interested in the Chapel to see erected at an early date.

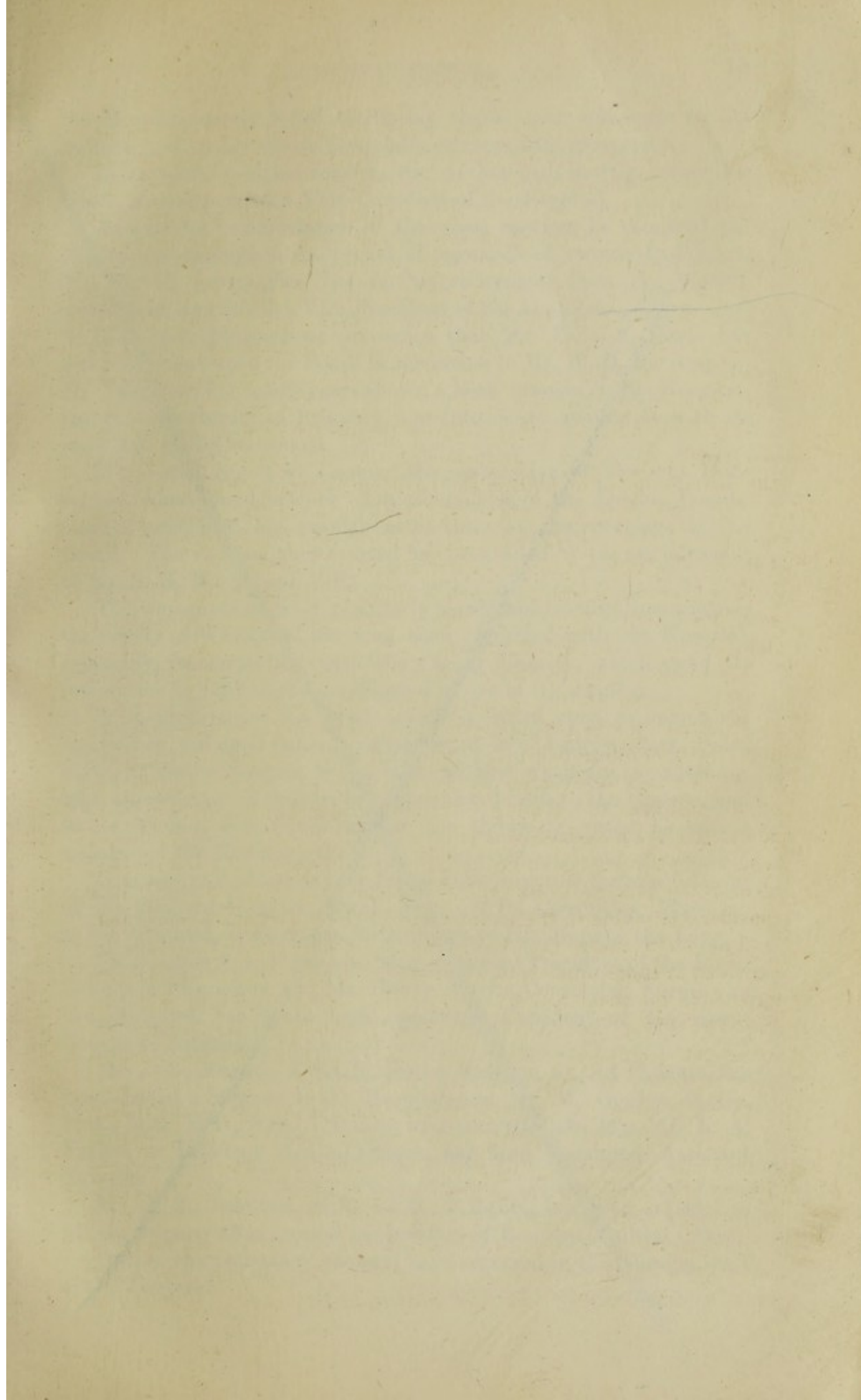
With a view to effecting further economies in the administration of the Hospital, the Kitchens of the Nursing Home and the Residential College have been amalgamated. The scheme, which involved some slight structural alterations in the basement and a re-arrangement of the domestic staffs, will, it is confidently expected, result in a considerable saving in the maintenance of the departments concerned.

In order to ensure that the benefits of the Hospital shall only be extended to those applicants whose pecuniary circumstances make it impossible for them to seek advice from private medical men, an Inquiry Officer has been appointed, whose duties consist of investigating any cases which give rise to grounds for doubt as to their eligibility for treatment.

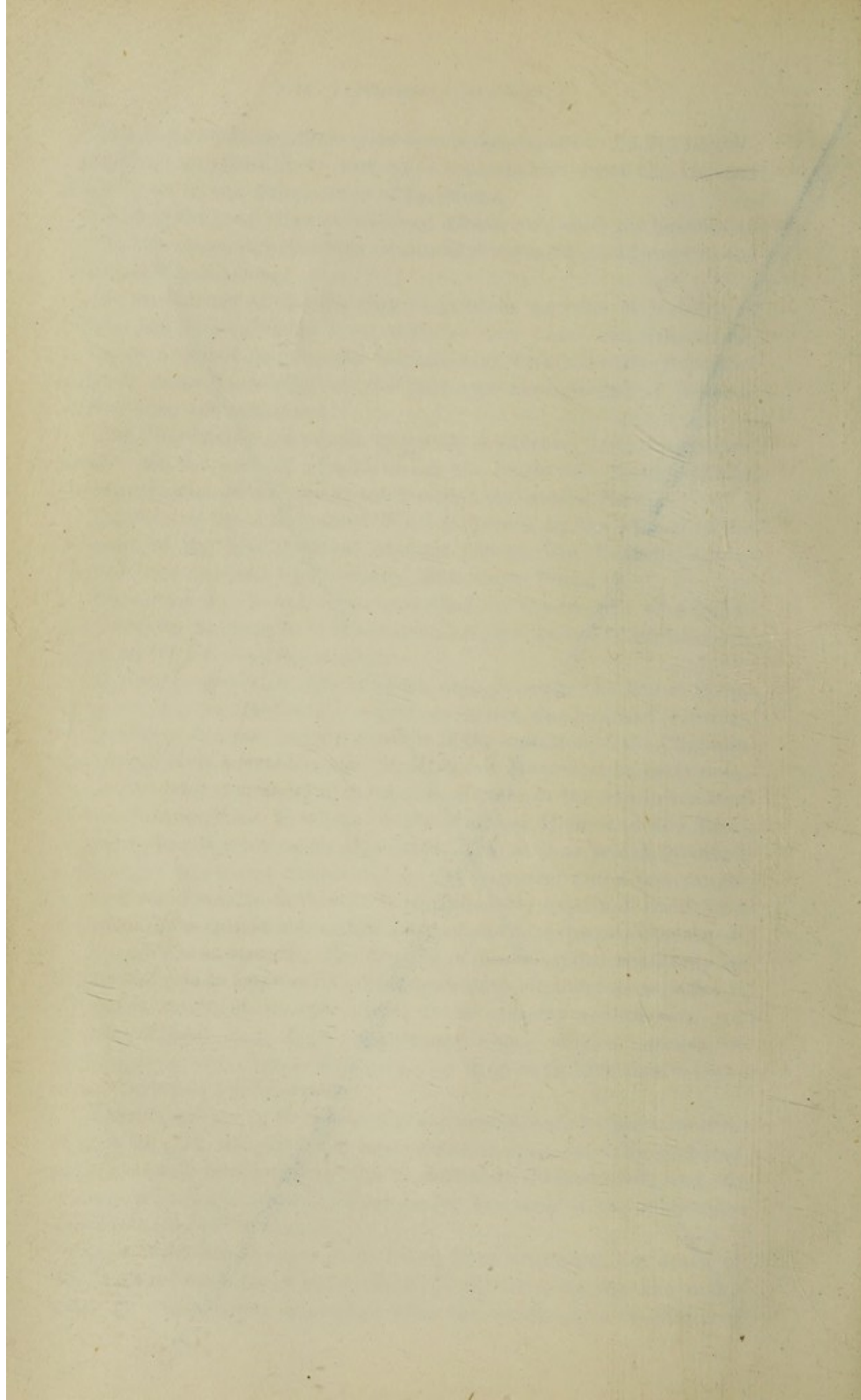
Your Board are at the present time considering the practicability of arranging for the supply of pasteurised or other specially prepared milk to children attending the Out-Patient Department, and to infants whose mothers have been under the care of the Maternity Department of the Hospital.

It is with deep regret your Board have to record the death of Sir Arthur Townley Watson, Bart., K.C., who, during the many years he was actively associated with the administrative affairs of











the Hospital, never failed to display the keenest solicitude for its welfare, and by his efforts materially advanced its prosperity.

In recognition of his services Sir Arthur had, shortly before his death, been appointed a Vice-President of the Hospital.

As a mark of appreciation of the great services he rendered the Institution throughout a period of upwards of twenty-two years, Mr. W. H. Burroughes, has, on his retirement from the Weekly Board been appointed a Vice-President of the Hospital.

It is with pleasure we announce that Mr. Felix A. Davis has accepted a seat upon the Board in succession to Mr. W. H. Burroughes. Mr. Davis has for many years shown a keen interest in the Hospital, and the opportunity of bringing him into closer association with its work was gladly welcomed.

It was with regret we accepted the resignation of Viscount Duncannon, whose engagements on a Committee of the London County Council precluded his regular attendance at the meetings of the Board. The vacancy thus created has been filled by the appointment of Mr. S. H. Whitbread, M.P.

This appointment is of peculiarly significant interest, inasmuch as the family of Whitbread has long been identified with the Hospital, especially in connection with the Cancer Charity, which owed its foundation in 1792 to the munificence of one of its members.

It is with regret we found ourselves called upon to accept the resignation, enforced through ill-health, of Mr. Andrew Clark, D.Sc., F.R.C.S., Senior Surgeon to the Hospital, and we desire to record our high appreciation of the services he rendered both to the Hospital and to its Medical School throughout the thirty-six years he was a member of the Honorary Staff.

It is with gratification your Board have learnt of the appointment of Sir Richard Douglas Powell, Bart., M.D., Consulting Physician to the Hospital, as Physician-in-Ordinary to His Majesty the King.

Sir Douglas Powell has also been re-elected President of the Royal College of Physicians, and Mr. Henry Morris, Consulting Surgeon to the Hospital, has again been appointed President of the Royal College of Surgeons.

Mr. John Murray, F.R.C.S., Senior Surgeon to Out-Patients, has been elected a Surgeon to the Hospital, and Mr. W. Gordon Taylor, M.A., M.S., M.B., B.Sc., F.R.C.S., who succeeded the late Mr. E. A. Fardon as Resident Medical Officer, has been appointed Assistant Surgeon.

Mr. A. E. Johnson, M.B., Ch.B., F.R.C.S., has been selected to fill the vacancy thus created in the office of Resident Medical Officer.

During the year many changes have occurred in the Nursing Staff of the Hospital.



Miss Victoria Daunt, Matron of the Great Northern Central Hospital, has been appointed Assistant Matron in succession to Miss Margaret Pepper, who, owing to ill-health, was compelled to resign.

In consequence of the resignation of Miss Colvin, Miss Eleanor Carlyle Crowe, late Sister and Night Superintendent at Worcester General Infirmary, has been appointed Night Superintendent.

The vacancy created by the retirement of Miss A. E. Boldero (Sister "Queen") has been filled by the appointment of Miss Mary Ward, formerly senior Sister at the South Devon and East Cornwall Hospital, Plymouth.

Miss Eliza Francis Uppleby has resigned her post of Sister of Seymour and Northumberland Wards, which have been placed in the charge of Miss Ada Peppler (Sister "Founder"), whilst Miss Anne Vance, of Guy's Hospital, has been entrusted with the care of "Founder" and "Bischoffsheim" Wards.

Miss Jessica Pullman, Senior Sister in the Operating Theatre, has also resigned.

Miss Annie Whitford and Miss Myra Jukes both retire on pensions, the former after twenty-six years, and the latter after twenty-three and a half years spent in the service of the Hospital.

The limited accommodation of the Out-Patient Department has for many years been a source of grave concern to your Board.

The difficulty has up to the present been insurmountable, because no additional space for the extension of the premises has been available, and the capacity of the department, although a much larger number of patients are now treated there, is the same to-day as it was twenty-two years ago.

Owing to the fact that certain ground abutting on the Hospital buildings in Union Street is now at our disposal, we realise that an opportunity long desired is before us to erect new buildings for the whole of the special departments, leaving the present Out-Patient Department free for the treatment of ordinary medical and surgical cases.

We have brought the matter before the Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London and the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund, with a view to obtaining from these bodies an expression of opinion as to the advisability of embarking upon such an undertaking.

Fully conscious though we are that the need for enlarging the premises allotted to this branch of the Hospital's work is most desirable, if not actually imperative, we would not feel justified in appealing for funds for the purpose unless undoubted evidence were forthcoming that the effort would meet with cordial approval and strong support, as the present condition of the Hospital's financial resources render any capital outlay impossible.

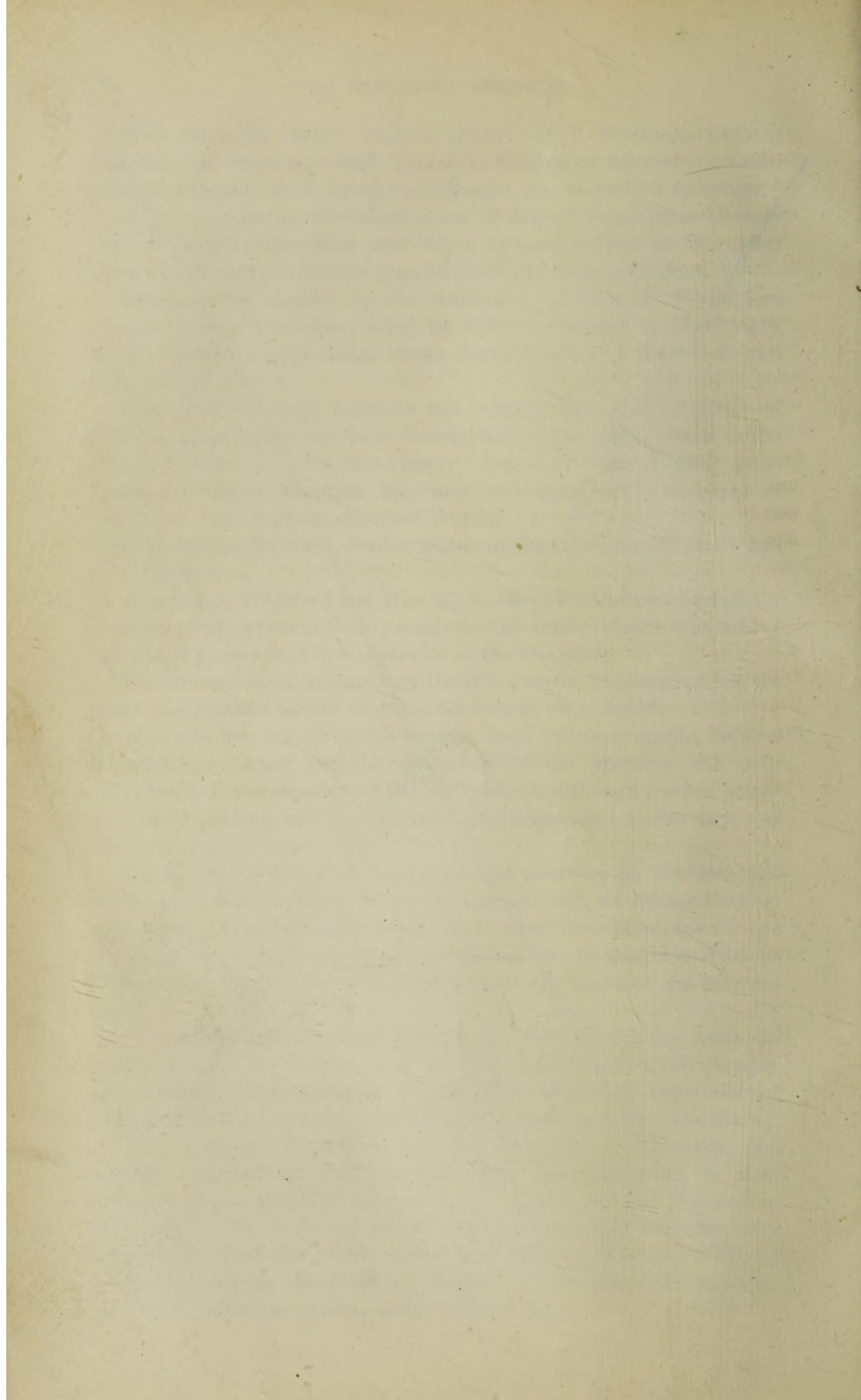

It is therefore with much gratification we give publicity to a generous offer, which has been made by one who thoroughly recognises how essential it is that the close connection between the Hospital and its School—guaranteeing, as it does, increased efficiency in the treatment of the patients—should be maintained and firmly cemented.

By his offer this "Friend" undertakes to contribute annually to the Medical School Endowment Fund, for a term of five years, the sum of £20, on condition that nineteen others come forward and assume a like responsibility. It is earnestly hoped that the conditions attached to this spirited offer will be fulfilled, and £2,000 thereby added to the Endowment Fund within the next five years.

The New Session of the Medical School was opened on October 1st by an Introductory Address by Mr. A. G. R. Foulerton. The prizes were distributed by Mr. Henry Morris, the President of the Royal College of Surgeons, and in the evening the customary banquet of Past and Present Students was held, at which Mr. Andrew Clark presided.

After six years' tenure of the office of Dean of the Medical School Mr. John Murray has resigned, his successor being Dr. Campbell Thomson.

Dr. William Pasteur has been appointed Bradshaw Lecturer at the Royal College of Physicians.

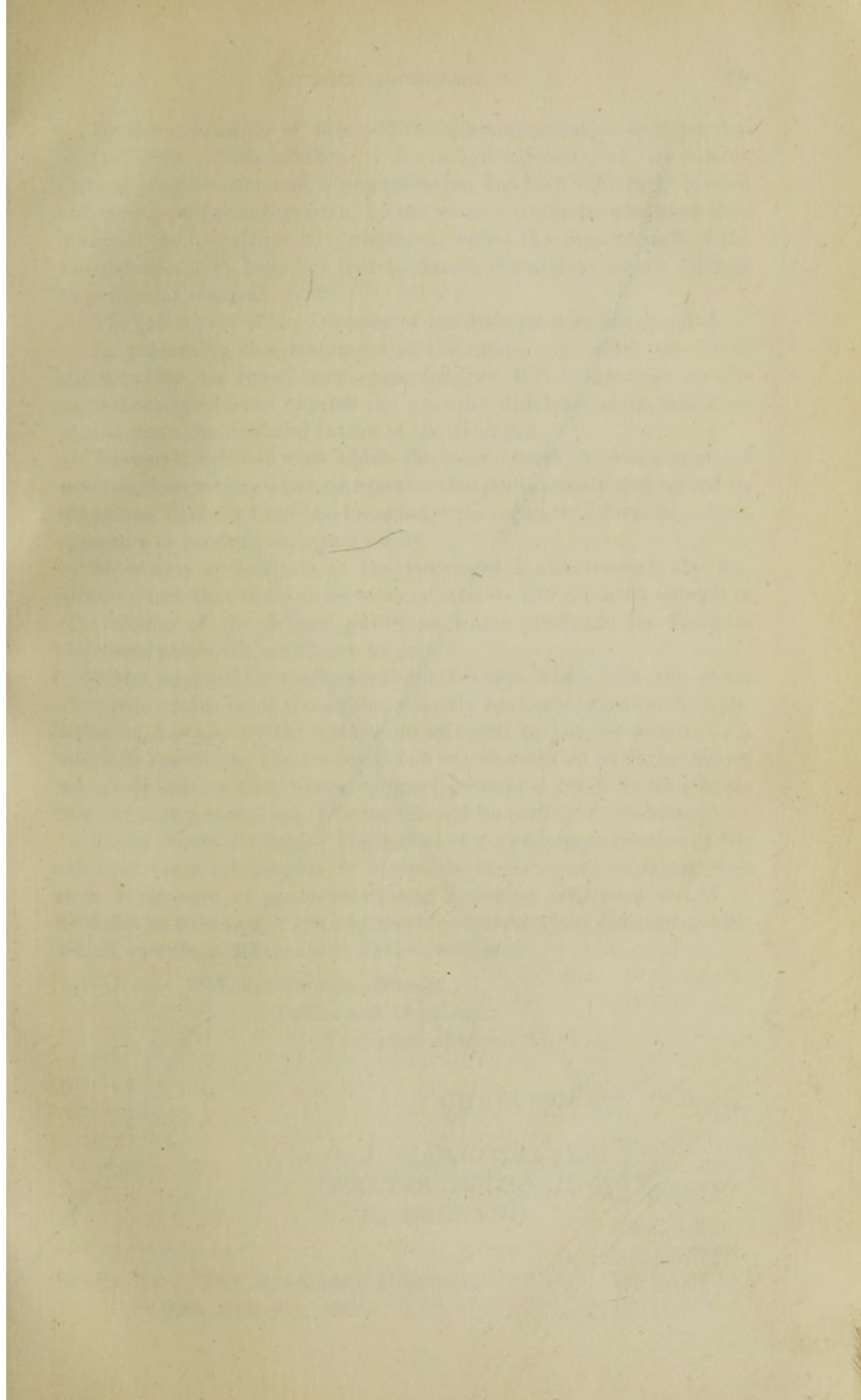

At the M.D. Examination held by the University of London, the Gold Medal in Medicine was awarded to Mr. F. G. Thomson, a student of the School.

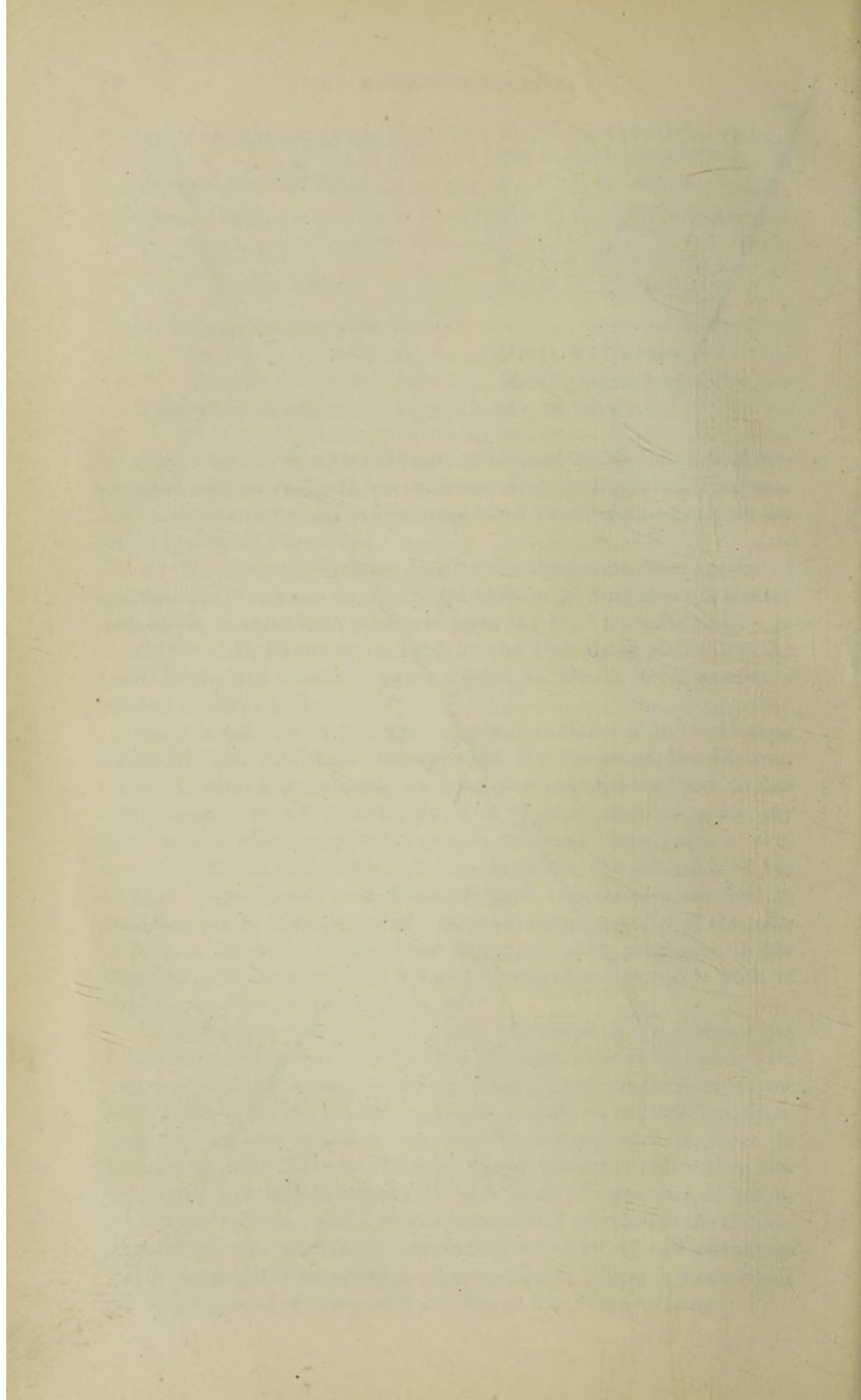
Early in the year, acting upon a recommendation from the Council of the Medical School and the advice of Mr. Foulerton, the Director of the Clinical Laboratories, we gave our sanction—subject to the establishment of a Guarantee Fund of at least £500 to cover any possible loss which may occur within the next three years in connection with the undertaking—to a scheme for the extension of the Clinical Investigation and Bacteriological Laboratories attached to the Hospital, in consequence of a most advantageous offer of the lease of certain premises in Mortimer Street, in close proximity to the Hospital, and already fitted up and equipped for research work of this nature, having been made to us.

In taking this step we were largely influenced by the evidence put before us showing that no adequate provision existed in London for qualified medical women to obtain teaching and preparation for the Examinations for the Diploma in Public Health—a requisite qualification for various appointments recently thrown open to them in connection with County Council Inspectorships under the new Midwives' Act, and in connection with medical inspection of public elementary schools; also that the present staff attached to the Clinical Laboratory was admittedly insufficient to allow of full advantage being taken of the exceptional opportunities for research work which the large amount of material derived from the Wards affords.











By the acquisition of this additional accommodation that portion of the work which consists of investigating material for outside general practitioners, and is remunerative, has been efficiently carried out, under proper supervision, by the women students, who have thus obtained the knowledge they required, whilst the regular staff of the Laboratories have been left free to devote themselves almost entirely to particular research work.

The full report of the Director of the Laboratories is appended.

In presenting this statement of the manner in which the funds entrusted to us have been expended, we feel it more than ever incumbent upon us to express the growing diffidence with which we contemplate the financial future of the Hospital.

Though the deficit with which the year's working was completed was less than we expected, satisfaction thereat is largely discounted by uneasiness derived from the knowledge that greater efforts have been necessary to produce even this result.

Moreover, an analysis of the sources of income reveals the disquieting fact that little or no success attends the repeated appeals to that section of the general public on whose gratitude the Hospital should be able with confidence to rely.

When we consider the incalculable benefits which this and other Hospitals confer upon the public, not only by services rendered to the indigent, but also by the protection afforded to the community as a whole in restricting the dissemination of disease in all its varied forms, we are of opinion that liberal support, prompted alike by charitable instinct and grateful appreciation, should be readily forthcoming.

Could the public but be brought to a fuller comprehension of the ethics of their relationship to Hospitals, then we are convinced that such a measure of spontaneous and generous assistance would be accorded as to lessen, if not entirely to remove, those difficulties with which we now, unfortunately, have to contend.

## APPENDIX A.

## THE CANCER CHARITY.

THERE has been a considerable increase in the number of patients treated in the Cancer Wards, the figures being 191 as against 159 for the previous year.

As, owing to the number of applications for admission, the Wards are kept constantly filled, it is obvious that an increase in the number of patients treated can only occur as the direct consequence of a decrease in the average stay of each.

That such is the case is amply proved in this instance, when the average length of stay of each patient was reduced from 103·3 to 75·8 days.

It is gratifying to note, therefore, that whilst the benefits of the Charity have been shared by a greater number of sufferers, the relief has been extended to them at a time when, by reason of the advanced stage of the disease, they stood most in need of it.

The number of Cancer Out-Patients was also greater, being 106 as against 87.

The "Ordinary Income" was £5,320 12s. 9d., showing an increase of £1,193 17s. 2d., mainly due to an improvement in Subscriptions and Donations, and the receipt of £400, the proceeds of a Bazaar held at Ealing in aid of the Fund.

The Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund's award to the Cancer Charity this year amounted to £292 10s., and that of the Hospital Saturday Fund to £103 18s.

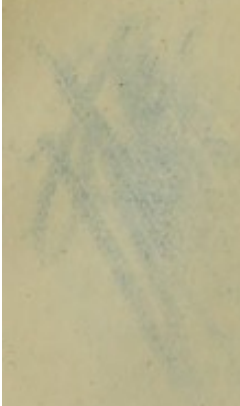
Donations conspicuous on account of their generous character comprise £500 from Lady Harben; £100 from Smith's (Kensington Estate) Charity, through H.S.H. Prince Francis of Teek; £100 from G. E. Mullens, Esq.; £100 from the Delmar Charitable Trust; from A. J. H. Carlill, Esq., £105 (Research); and £100 each from E. C. Marcus, Esq. (Research); Walter Emden, Esq. (Research Scholarship); and "Research."

The Students of the Medical School have again contributed the proceeds of their Annual Smoking Concert, amounting to £140, to the Cancer Fund.

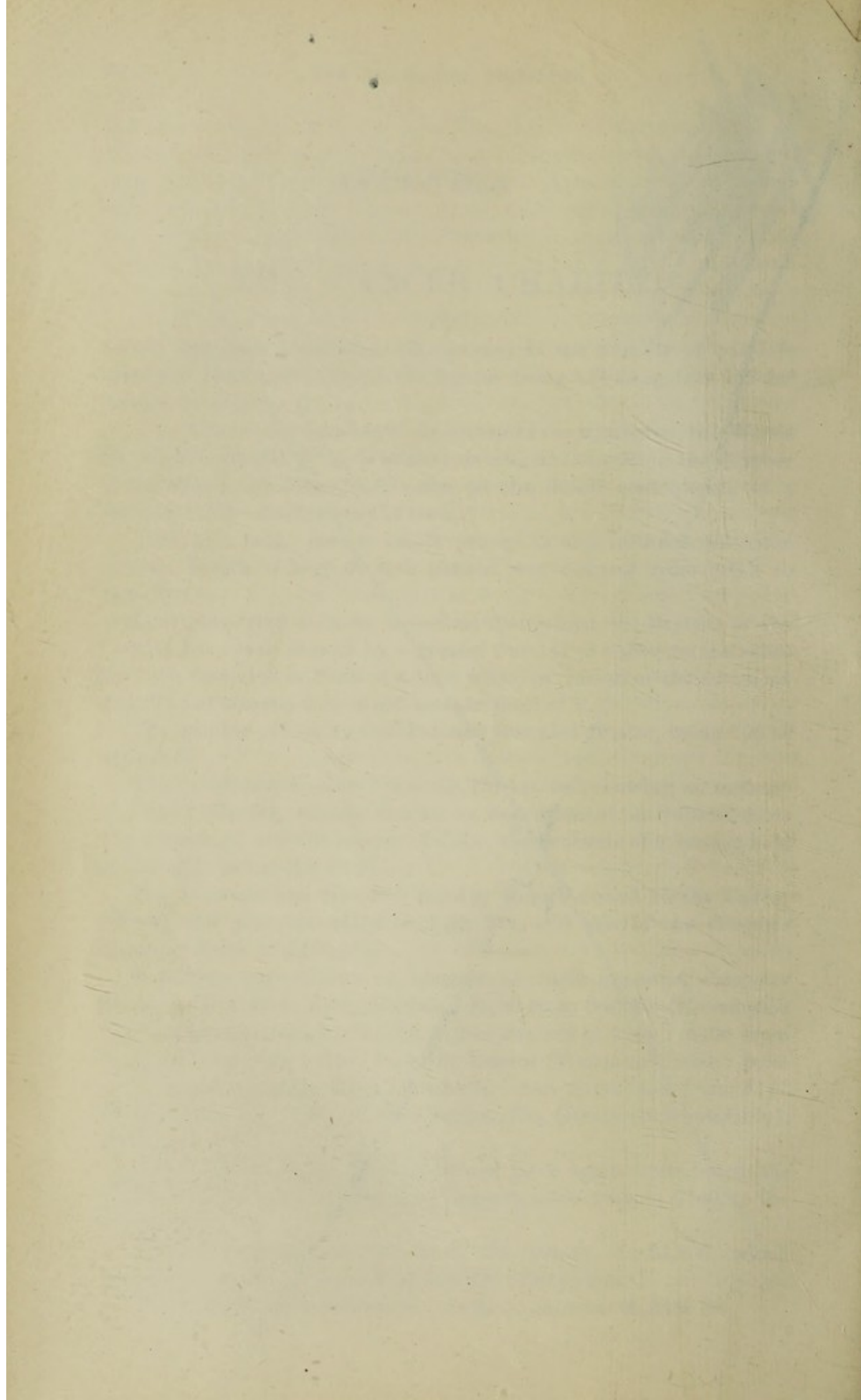
Through Legacies we benefit to the extent of £1,200, which includes a bequest of £900 from the late Miss Cohen.

The "Ordinary Expenditure" shows an increase of £359 8s.











Your Board have had to consider in what manner the wishes of the late Mrs. Lewis-Hill could best be carried out with regard to the endowment of a Cancer Ward in memory of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, for which purpose she bequeathed to the Hospital the sum of £5,000, part payment of which has already been made by the Executors.

A scheme was prepared for the conversion of a day-room on the second floor of the Cancer Wing into a Ward for the accommodation of two female patients, the details of which met with the entire approval of the Executors, one of whom, Mr. Henry Davies, generously undertook to defray the cost of the structural alterations involved and the necessary equipment of the Ward, as a tribute to the memory of his mother, the late Mrs. Sarah Davies.

No time was lost in carrying out this change, and the Ward is now completely fitted up and occupied.

In their anxiety for the proper and efficient discharge of their obligations to the Cancer Charity and its adjunct, the Cancer Research Department, your Board propose to convene a special Committee, composed of those whose sympathies with the aspirations of the founders of the Charity are pronounced and well established.

This Committee will devote the whole of its energies to an endeavour, firstly, to procure the complete endowment of the Cancer Wing, and, secondly, to ensure that the important work of investigation carried out by the Director of Cancer Research shall in nowise be impeded by pecuniary considerations.

Dr. W. S. Lazarus-Barlow has been re-appointed Director of the Research Laboratories.

The "Richard Hollins" Scholarship for Research work was awarded to Mr. L. Courtauld, M.A., B.C., and the "Walter Emden" Scholarship to Mr. W. Victor Bonney, M.S., M.D.

Dr. Archibald Leitch, the third Assistant in the Laboratories, has been appointed Investigator on Cancer at Dundee.

Some idea of the value of the work performed in the Research Department may be derived from the following reference made by *The Medical Magazine* in a three-page critique of the last volume of the Reports which are periodically issued from the Laboratories :—

"The investigations are not only of high intrinsic merit but proceed on somewhat new lines, indicating originality of conception and a grasp of those physical sciences which are becoming more closely related to pathology and pathological science."

## APPENDIX B.

### REPORT FROM THE CLINICAL AND BACTERIOLOGICAL LABORATORIES FOR THE YEAR 1907.

*To the Chairman of the Council of the Middlesex Hospital Medical School.*

THE amount of Hospital work done in the Laboratories increased somewhat during the year, chiefly in connection with the preparation of vaccines and the examination of the blood for the purposes of "Opsonic" treatment.

There has also been an increase in the amount of work done for medical practitioners outside the Hospital, but a good proportion of this work has been transferred to the new Women's Laboratory in order to relieve the Clinical Laboratory, and so facilitate the carrying out of the proper Hospital work.

Only one medical practitioner has taken out the Course of Instruction for the Diploma in Public Health during the year; and it has to be mentioned that the number of medical men presenting themselves for this examination has shown a marked tendency to diminish during the last few years, owing partly to an increased stringency of the examination and partly to alteration in the curriculum of work.

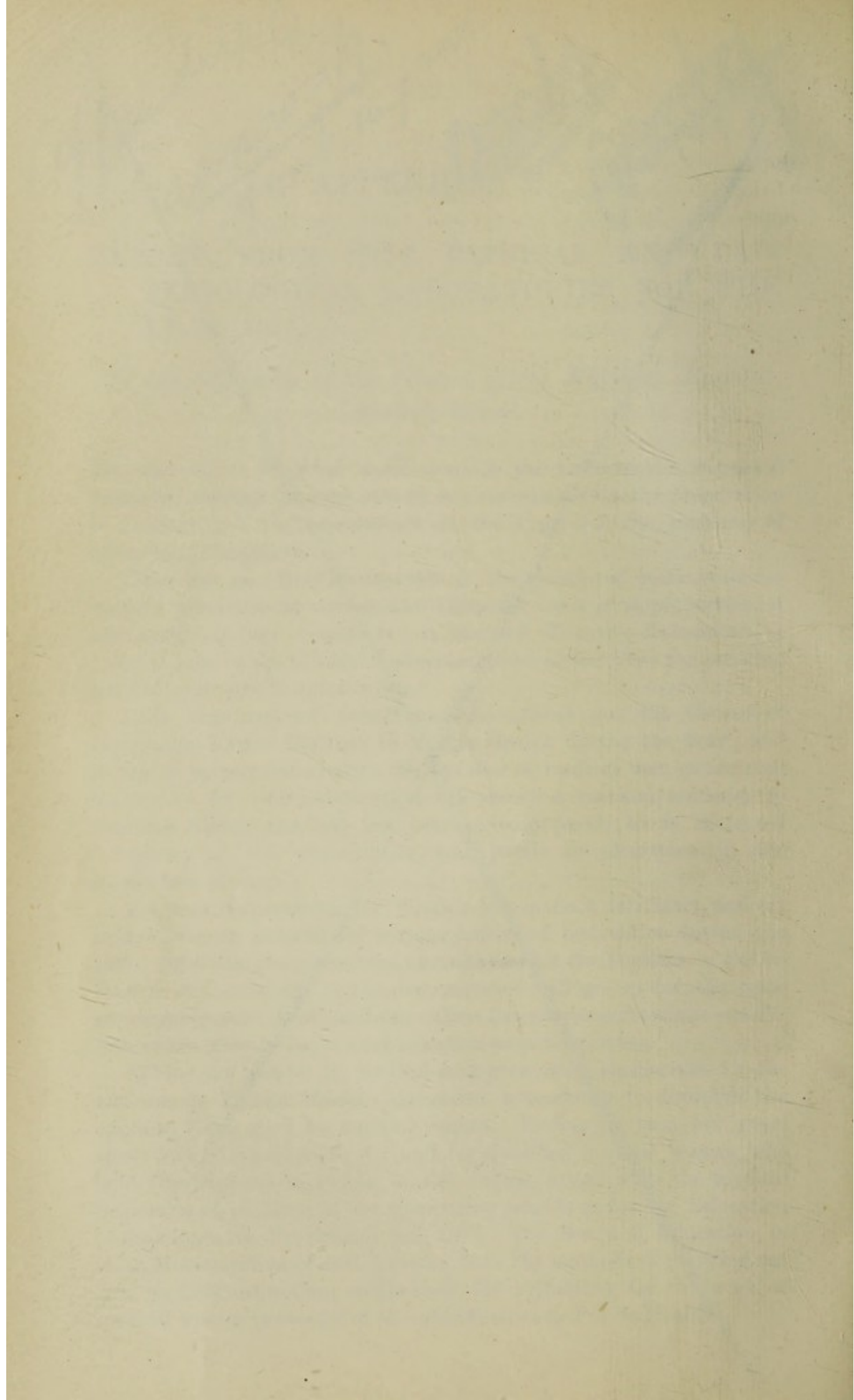
The new Department for Women has made a fair start, and six medical women entered for various courses of instruction during the year. Of these, one passed the examination for the Diploma in Public Health at Cambridge in October, another will go up for the same examination next April, and two others have arranged to take out the full course of work for the examination next September.

Whilst the number of medical men presenting themselves for the Diploma in Public Health has shown a tendency to diminish the opposite holds good for medical women. During the next few years there will be considerable demand for qualified medical women who hold the Diploma in Public Health in connection with the medical inspection of children in the elementary schools under the Education (Administrative Provisions) Act, 1907. The Board of Education, in their Memorandum of last Autumn as to the methods of carrying out this medical inspection, emphasised the suitability for the work of medical women possessed of the qualification in Public Health.

A considerable amount of research work has been in progress during the year, but very little of it has been published yet. Several of the researches conducted during 1907 are now either completed or approaching completion, and several papers recording the results will be published from the Department during the next few months. The principal work which has been in progress has comprised :—

- (i.) An investigation into the Bacteriology of Infantile Paralysis. A Paper dealing with the results has been written by Dr. Pasteur, Mr. MacCormac and myself, and is going through the press at the present time.
- (ii.) Mr. Hillier is carrying out an investigation into one of the Protozoal Infections.
- (iii.) Mr. MacCormac, in conjunction with Dr. Kellas, is carrying out an important investigation into certain chemical changes which occur in the tissues in the course of pneumonia.
- (iv.) Mr. MacCormac is collaborating with myself in an investigation concerned with the treatment of pneumonia by "Opsonic" methods, which has been suggested by and is being assisted by Sir Richard Douglas Powell, President of the Royal College of Physicians.
- (v.) Miss Whittingham and myself are carrying out an investigation into the causes of the excessive mortality from pneumonia and broncho-pneumonia amongst young children.
- (vi.) Miss Whittingham and myself are also engaged in an investigation into the occurrence of outbreaks of diphtheria amongst school children, and the method of dealing with them.

The above matters represent a considerable amount of work, which will require prolonged investigation, and I am glad to be able to say that good progress is being made in several directions.

With regard to the assistance in carrying on the work of the Department which I have received from my colleagues, Mr. Hillier and Mr. MacCormac, I can only repeat what I said last year as to the unselfish way in which they have both worked to promote the efficiency of the Department.

Miss Whittingham in the new Laboratory in Mortimer Street has also done her utmost to make that Department a success. She has managed the Laboratory in a thoroughly capable way, and has given every possible assistance in the teaching and research work which is being carried on there.

## REPORT FROM THE CLINICAL LABORATORIES FOR THE YEAR 1907.

ALTOGETHER 1,266 specimens and samples were received for examination during the year from the Wards and Out-Patient Departments. The number, however, represents only material for which formal request for examination was made ; it does not include many repeated examinations which were made at different times.

The work of the Department was materially increased during the year by the preparation of various bacterial vaccines required for the treatment of cases in the Wards, work of a kind which occupies much time and requires the greatest amount of care possible.

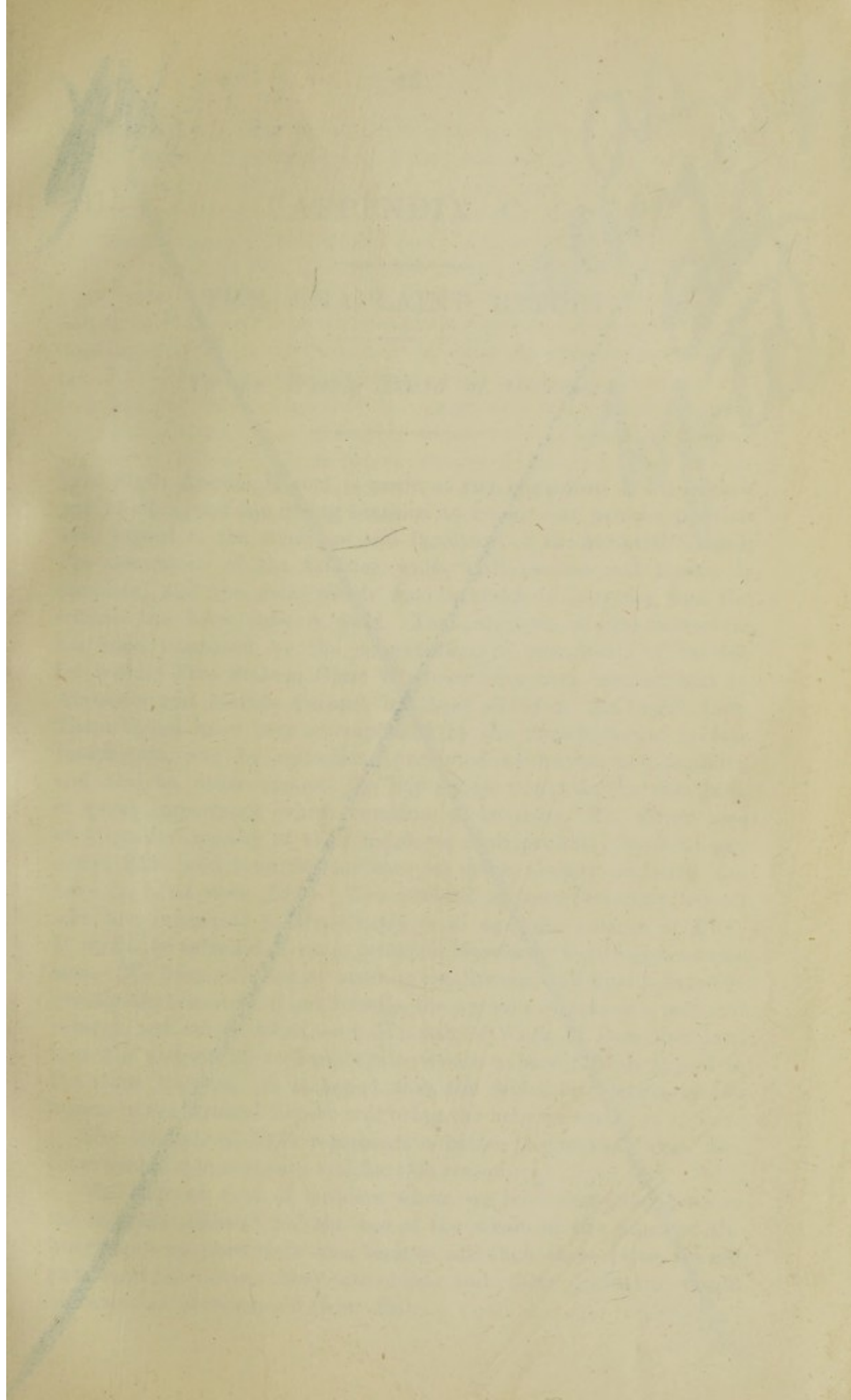

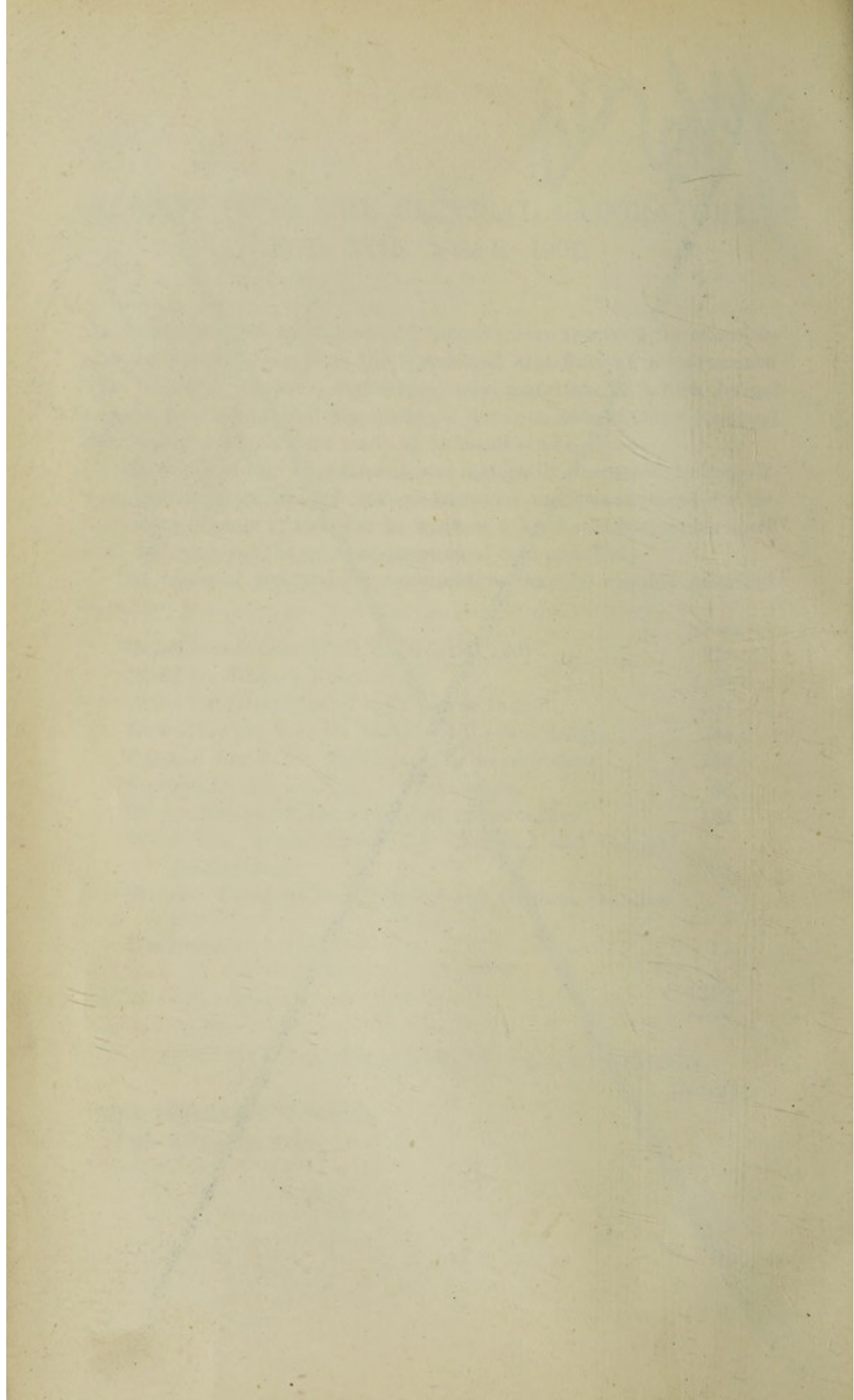

## APPENDIX C.

### THE CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

*To the Weekly Board of Governors.*

THIS Sixth Annual Report is made at the beginning of my eighth year of office, and is a fitting occasion to record our present position with regard to the structure and furniture of the Hospital Chapel. The decoration of the interior walls with marble and mosaic is complete, and the debt which was incurred in carrying out the scheme has been entirely paid. The furniture of the Sacarium has been improved by the substitution in one detail of marble for wood. Five Stained Glass Windows have been erected, and an Alabaster and Marble Parapet has been added to the Organ Loft. These things have been accomplished by the munificence of private benefactors, and by collections promoted by nurses and patients, and also by other means. To buy a new Organ is the one thing of great importance which remains to be done. To obtain one of a quality worthy of the Chapel we shall probably have to pay about £330, and towards this sum we have already collected and have in hand over £180. The present matter, therefore, for all who are interested in the Chapel is to seek the balance of £150. It would be splendid if some generous Benefactor would give us this sum. We have collected so much in small sums, and finally taxed so greatly the resources of our friends, the nurses and patients, past and present, and others, when we held a Sale of Work in December last, that it is undesirable to begin again at once to issue a fresh appeal to the same Helpers. It is hoped that the wider circulation of the appeal in the Annual Report will bring the help we need.

The estimate of £330 represents a better Organ than even that considerable sum suggests, and for this reason :—

The eminent firm of builders whom we have consulted have in the estimate allowed for the use of the whole of the pipes of the instrument at present in use, because although these pipes are old and need re-voicing they are good, and their inclusion would represent an advantage of about £40.



It is most important that the Organ should not obstruct more of the Organ Loft than is absolutely necessary, and therefore it is proposed that the front part of it overlooking the Nave should, as far as possible, be left free and available for the choristers, and this can be done by "elevating" the Organ and having a detached Console, a plan which, of course, adds to the cost of erection.

In last year's Report much emphasis was laid upon the importance of securing help in singing the musical parts of the Services in the Chapel, and certain difficulties were pointed out. These have been overcome, and now, under the most efficient direction of Mr. F. H. Stamper, the Organist, who succeeded Mr. Spanswick, who resigned the post in June last after very many years of strenuous service, we are now able to sing Evensong every Sunday, and to have the assistance of a choir on certain other occasions also. It is unnecessary to submit to the Board a further account of the Services held week by week in the Chapel and Wards of the Hospital. There has been no break in the continuity which has been established for some years.

There is one thing which may be recorded in this Report—that is, the starting of a Guild, named the "Guild of Perseverance," which is limited to men who have been In-patients of the Hospital, and who are over twenty years of age.

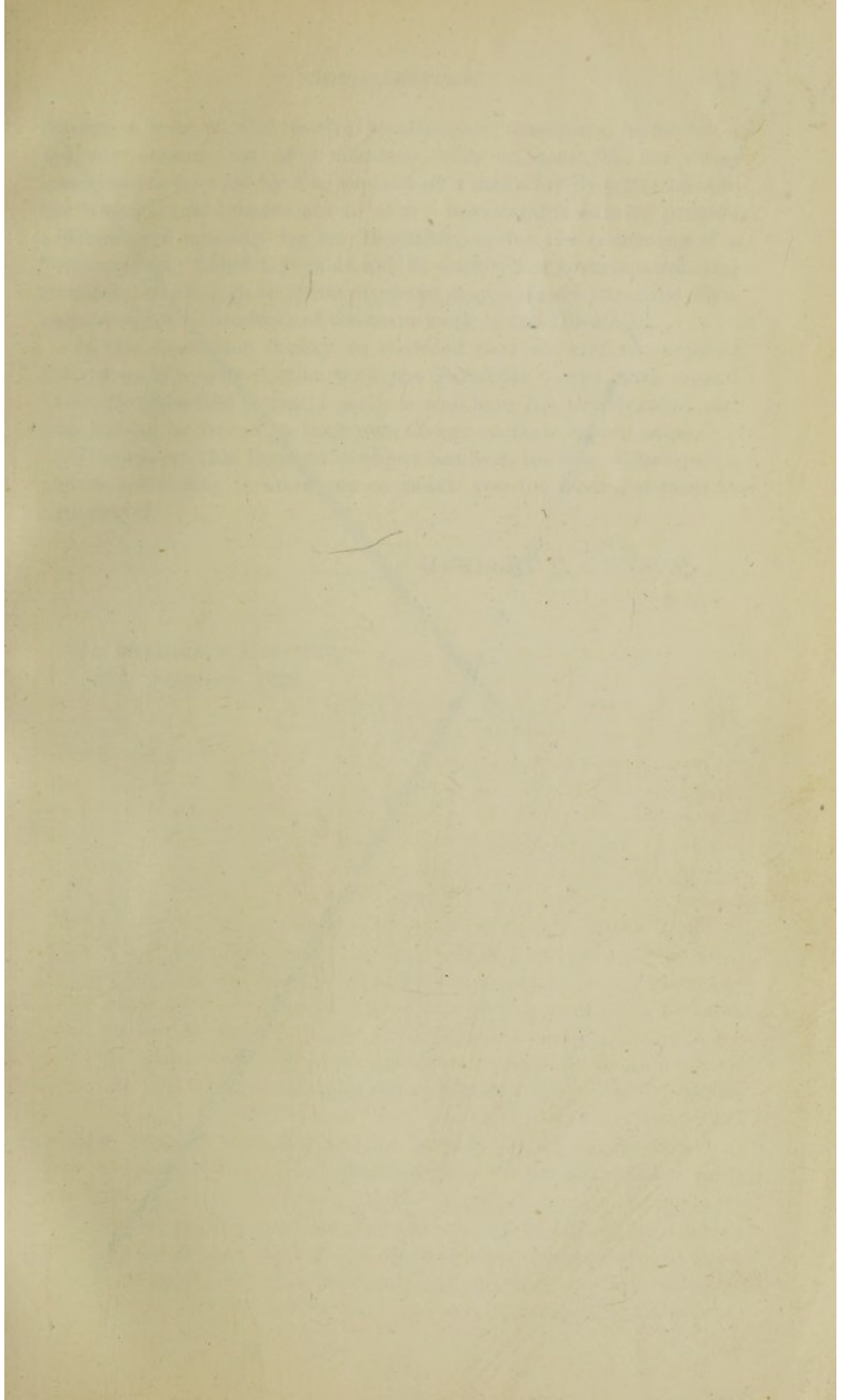
The Guild is only at the very beginning, but it appears to be working in the right direction.

Turning from these matters to the administration of the Samaritan Fund and the Dresden Assistance Fund, it is sufficient to say, with regard to the first, that the remarks made about it in the Report last year hold good, and need not be repeated here. It continues to fulfil its important function, and is the only Fund from which we can help deserving cases which cannot be dealt with by less elastic agencies.

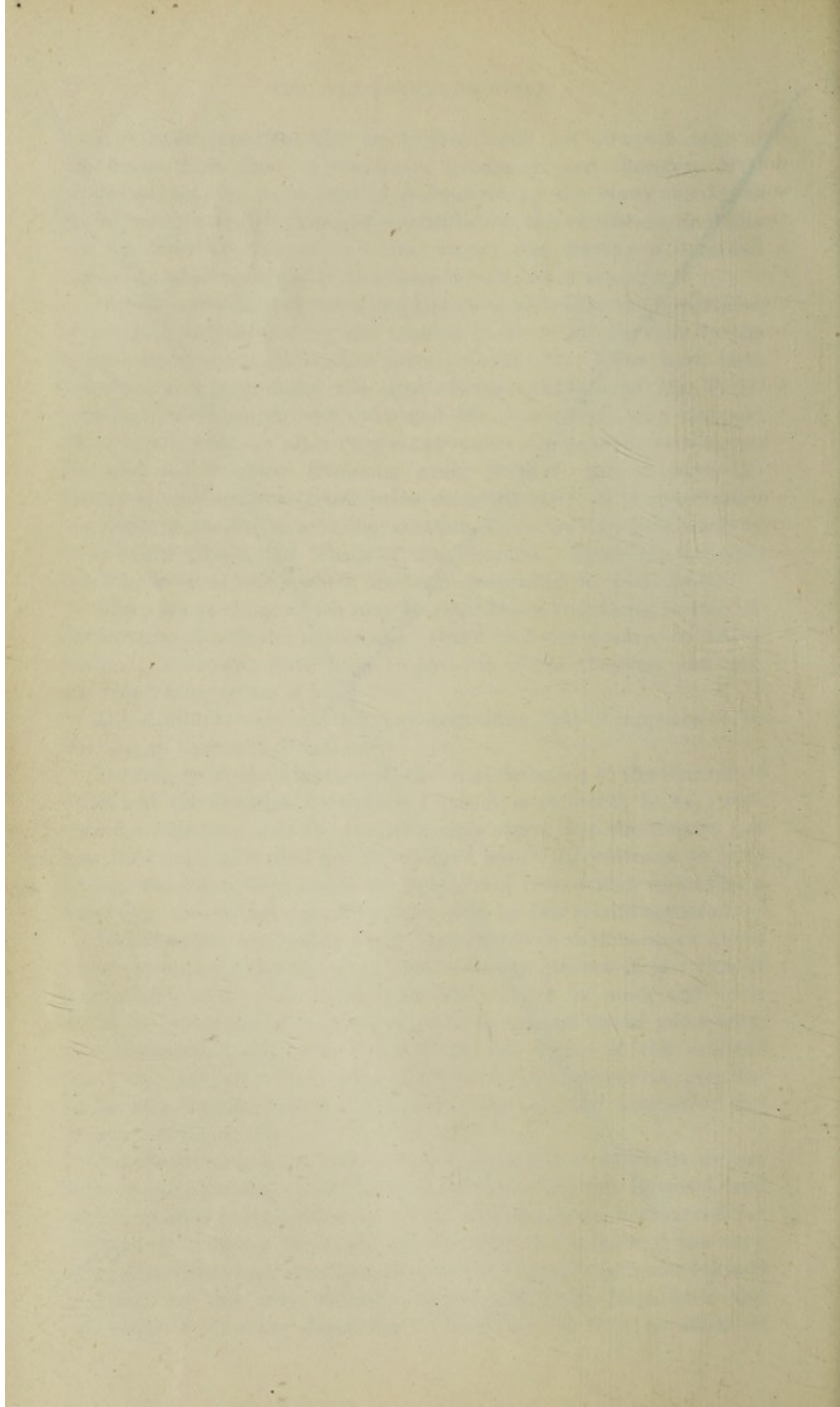
The Dresden Assistance Fund has assisted in various ways about 1,000 patients during the year 1907. In the Report of last year it was shown with some detail how this Fund is used, and it is sufficient now to say that it continues to be applied in the same way. An account is kept week by week of the names of the patients benefited, and all other particulars of its administration, and the books, etc., recording these things are at the constant disposal of the Trustees of the Fund.

No official records can exhaust all the directions in which we are able to help patients upon their discharge from the Hospital, and even long after their discharge. Help of many kinds is procured for patients by bringing them into contact with one or more of the very many Charitable and other Agencies which specialise the many kinds of help. In this way we are able to assist both In-patients and Out-patients who are deserving. Sometimes it is a question of









helping a man to find work ; sometimes a temporary home for a domestic servant out of a situation with no home of her own ; sometimes to provide for the support of a man's family while he is in the Hospital ; and sometimes to raise a considerable sum to provide a Home and nursing for an Incurable, or for the treatment of a Consumptive. These things do not fit themselves to tabulation and statistics, but they go on throughout the year, a steady stream of what may be called bi-products of the main work of the Hospital.

In this connection it may be recorded that we continue steadily the system of communication with the Parochial Clergy with regard to the Ecclesiastical status of patients who have left the Hospital, and who wish to be visited by their own Clergy on their return home.

Throughout this Report the object has been brevity of statement, and in concluding it allow me to thank you for your kindness in receiving it.

## GOVERNORS.

### THEIR QUALIFICATIONS, RIGHTS, AND PRIVILEGES.

1. Annual Subscribers of *Three Guineas or upwards*, either to the Cancer Charity, the Hospital's General Fund, or to its particular Establishments, viz.:—The "Cancer Investigation Fund," the "Samaritan and Convalescent Home Fund," or to the Medical School, are entitled to be Governors, so long as their Subscriptions are paid.

2. Donors of *Thirty Guineas or upwards*, at one time, are made Life Governors, and at once entitled to all the privileges of Governors. The Endowment of Beds and Cots (see *post*, p. 114) to the above amount qualifies for Life Governor.

3. Honorary Governors are appointed, and the propriety of making such appointments is first considered by the Weekly Board, and then submitted for the consideration and approval of a Court of Governors.

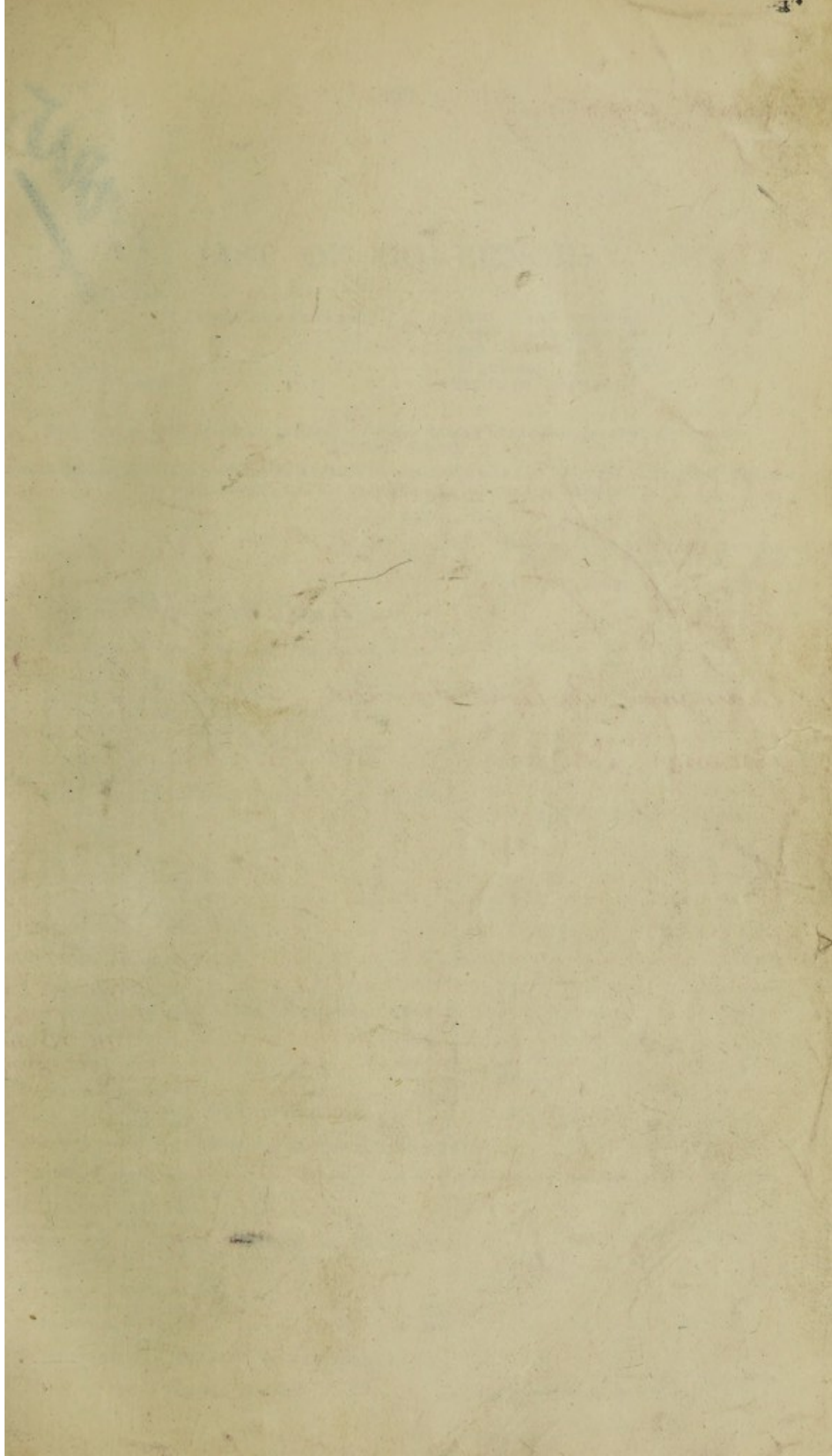
4. Honorary Governors have, from the day of their appointment, the same rights and privileges in all respects as Life Governors. In cases of Bequests of *Two Hundred Pounds and under Five Hundred Pounds*, one of the Executors under the will is eligible for appointment as an Honorary Governor.

5. All Governors have the right of attending the Courts of Governors, but Governors who are in arrear with their subscriptions are not entitled to speak or vote at any such Court or to serve on any Board or Committee appointed in accordance with the Laws of the Hospital, and Governors who are new Annual Subscribers or Donors are not entitled to speak or vote at any such Court or to serve on any such Board or Committee unless their subscriptions or donations have been paid at least three calendar months previously, and Governors being Salaried Officers or holding similar offices, or being Students or Servants of the Hospital, are not entitled to speak or vote at any such Court, or to serve on any such Committee, and are not entitled to speak, vote, or serve at or on any such Court, Board, or Committee for one year after they have ceased to be such Salaried Officers, to hold such similar Offices, or to be such Students or Servants, unless specially authorised so to do by the Weekly Board.

6. No Governor is entitled to speak or vote at any Court, Board, or Committee on any question or matter wherein he or she is personally interested.

7. Every Governor has the right of visiting the Wards and other departments of the Hospital or Cancer Wing in the presence of any one of the Physicians or Surgeons of the Hospital, the Resident Medical Officer or his substitute, the Chaplain, the Lady Superintendent, one of the Visiting Governors, or the Secretary-Superintendent.

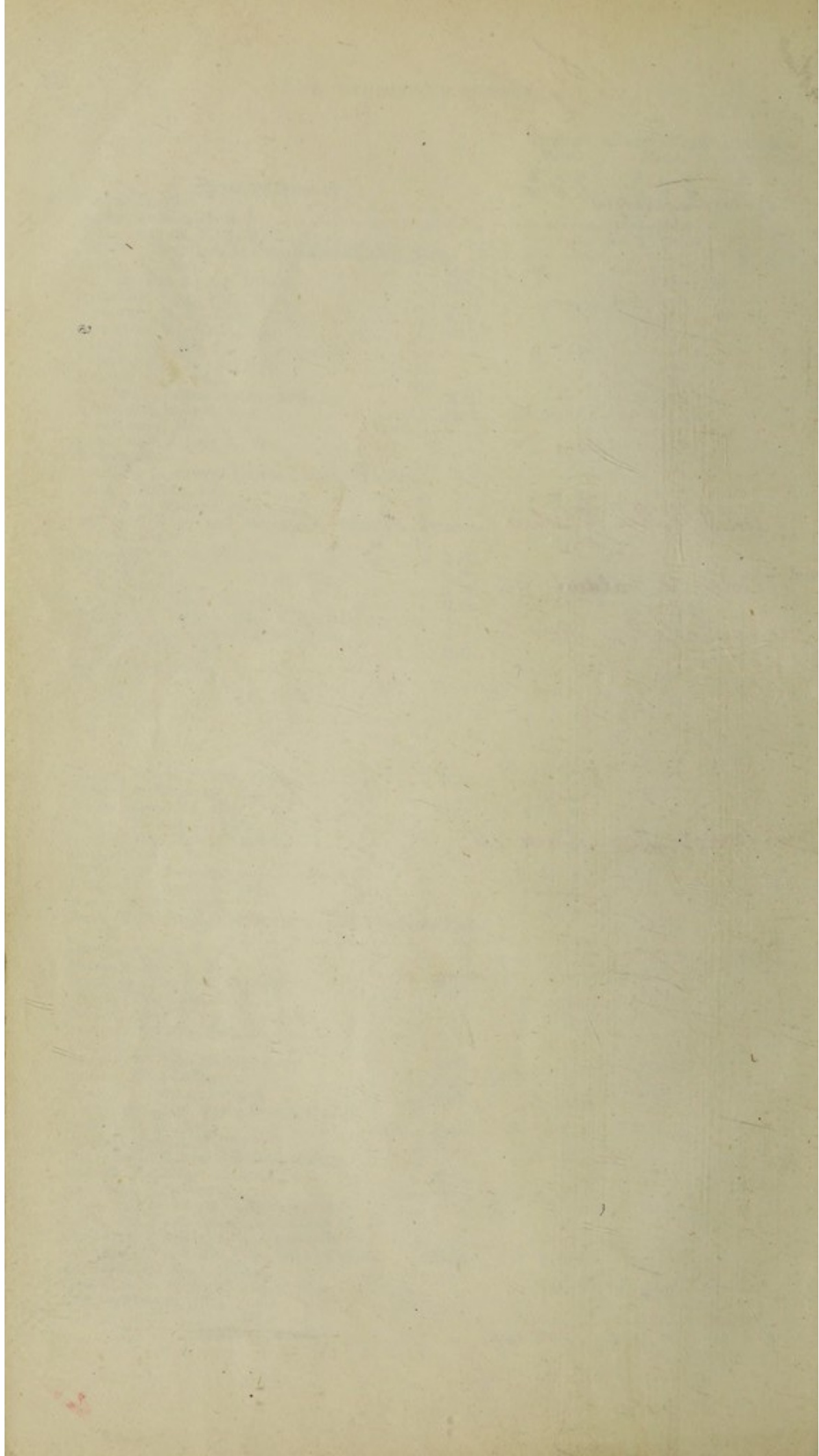

## ANNUAL SUBSCRIBERS, DONORS, AND CONTRIBUTORS.

### AND THEIR PRIVILEGES.

NOTE.—Annual Subscribers, Donors, and Contributors to the Cancer Charity or other Fund are entitled to the same privileges as those subscribing to the Hospital.

1. Every Annual Subscriber of *Two Guineas and less than Three Guineas*, and every Donor of *Twenty Guineas*, at one time (or of smaller sums that may together equal that amount in the course of the current year), is entitled to recommend four Patients yearly; and Donors of *less than Twenty Guineas* are entitled, at the discretion of the Weekly Board, to recommend four Patients yearly during a period of three years.

2. Every Annual Subscriber of *Three Guineas and less than Five Guineas*, and every Donor of *Thirty Guineas and less than Fifty Pounds*, at one time, is entitled to recommend nine Patients yearly.

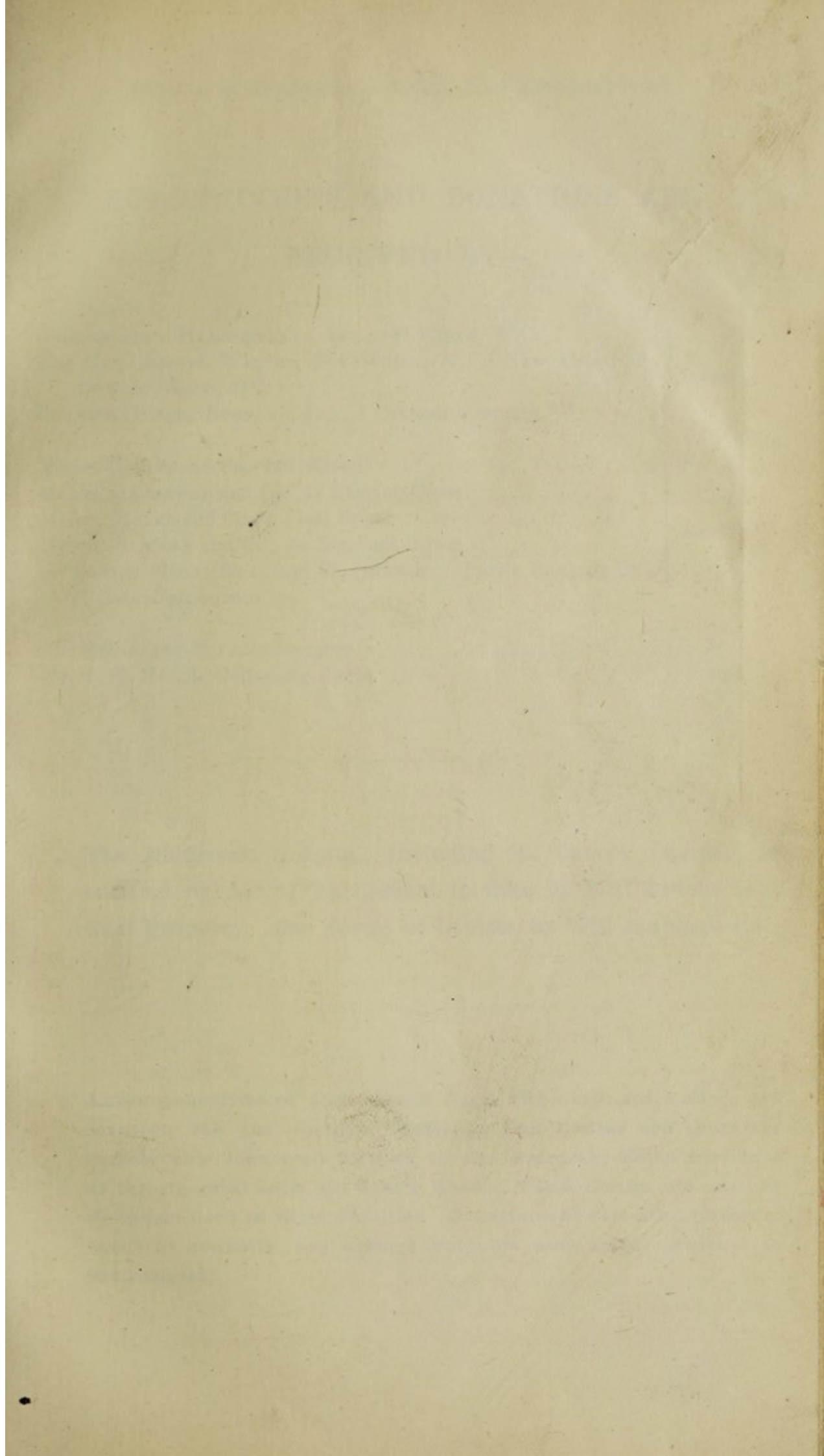
3. Every Annual Subscriber of *Five Guineas and less than Ten Guineas*, and every Donor of *Fifty Pounds and less than One Hundred Pounds*, at one time, is entitled to recommend fifteen Patients yearly.

4. Every Annual Subscriber of *Ten Guineas or upwards*, and every Donor of *One Hundred Pounds or upwards*, at one time, is entitled to recommend twenty-five Patients yearly.

5. Annual Subscriptions must be paid in advance for the current year, such year to be computed from the quarter-day next preceding the date of Subscription; and Subscribers are not entitled to any privilege until their Subscriptions are paid.

6. Every Incumbent or other Minister who permits a Collection to be made in his Church or Chapel, for the benefit of the Hospital, is entitled, for every £31 10s. so contributed, to the privilege of recommending nine Patients annually during five years; but in all cases where such Contribution is less than £31 10s. the Incumbent or Minister is entitled to recommend nine Patients during the first year after such contribution for the first sum of Six Guineas so contributed, a similar number during the second year for the second sum of Six Guineas, and so on. And every Clergyman (or other Minister, not being the Incumbent) who preaches for the benefit of the Hospital (provided the sum contributed is not less than £31 10s.) is entitled to the privilege, during the year ensuing the day on which the collection was made, of recommending five Patients.

Accidents and urgent cases are admitted at any time of the day or night ; but bearers of letters of recommendation should attend at the Hospital at TWELVE o'clock noon, on any week-day.

No letters of recommendation are required for the Out-Patient Department, which is free to all necessitous persons.

**Lying-in Patients** must attend on Wednesday and Saturday at 12 noon.

**Medical Cases** are seen by the Casualty Medical Officer every week-day at TEN o'clock, and attended:—On Monday and Thursday, at 1.30 p.m., by Dr. WETHERED; on Tuesday and Friday, at 1.30 p.m., by Dr. VOELCKER; on Wednesday and Saturday, at 1.30 p.m., by Dr. CAMPBELL THOMSON.

**Male Surgical Cases** are attended:—On Monday, at 1.30, by Mr. T. H. KELLOCK; on Friday, at 1.30, by Mr. GORDON TAYLOR; on Wednesday and Saturday, at 1.30 p.m., by Mr. HANDLEY.

**Female Surgical Cases** are attended:—On Thursday, at 1.30, by Mr. T. H. KELLOCK; on Tuesday, at 1.30, by Mr. GORDON TAYLOR; on Wednesday and Saturday, at 1.30 p.m., by Mr. HANDLEY.

**Diseases of Women** are attended by Dr. ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~, on Monday and Wednesday, at 9.45 a.m.

**Diseases of Children** under eight years of age are attended by Dr. R. A. Young, on Wednesday and Saturday, at 9 a.m.

**Diseases of the Eye** are attended by Mr. LANG, on Tuesday and Friday, at 9 a.m.

**Diseases of the Skin** are attended by Dr. J. J. PRINGLE, on Tuesday, at 4 p.m., and Thursday, at 9.30 a.m.

**Diseases of the Ear and Throat** are attended by Mr. STEPHEN PAGET, on Tuesday and Friday, at 9 a.m.

**Diseases of the Teeth** are attended by Mr. ~~Henry~~ on Wednesday, at 9 a.m., and Friday, at 9.30 a.m.; and Mr. ~~W. E. Newell~~, on Monday, at 9.30 a.m., and Wednesday, at 9 a.m.

**The Electrical and Light Department** is under the charge of Mr. C. R. C. Lyster, who attends every day, at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

In-Patients are expected to be provided with clean and decent clothing, and a change of linen. They also have to provide themselves with tea, sugar, and washing.

Any Officer, Sister, Nurse, Servant, or person employed in any Department of the Hospital accepting Money, or Presents of any kind, from a Patient, or relative or friend of any Patient, on any pretence whatever, is liable to dismissal.

The following Cases are not admitted into the Hospital:—

1. Those which are, upon due examination, deemed *Incurable*, as Advanced Consumption;—
2. Complaints so tedious of Cure as to preclude for a long time the admission of more urgent cases, as *Chronic Ulcers of the Legs*;—
3. Disorders, to the Cure of which other establishments are devoted, as *Persons of Unsound Mind, etc.*;—
4. Those which are more properly objects for Parochial Relief, as wanting Food and not Medicine;—

5. Those whose admission might endanger the other patients, as persons suffering from *Infectious Diseases*; and

6. Complaints likely to be aggravated rather than relieved by confinement within the walls of a Hospital, but such cases, if deemed proper objects, may receive advice and medicine as *Out-Patients*.

Prior to sending up Patients from the Country, the Secretary-Superintendent should be applied to, in order to learn whether there is room, and such application should be accompanied by a medical certificate setting out fully the nature of the case.

---

### ADMISSION OF PATIENTS, CANCER CHARITY.

1. Female Patients afflicted with Cancer are accommodated in a separate wing containing three Wards of twelve Beds each and one Ward of two Beds.

2. Male Patients afflicted with Cancer have nine Beds reserved for them.

3. Out-Patients afflicted with Cancer can be specially attended and relieved with advice and medicine on Wednesdays at ~~1.30~~ P.M.

4. No letters of recommendation are required.

5. Persons are admitted as In-Patients who are afflicted with Cancer or Cancerous disease *in such an advanced stage as to be deemed incurable*, and such cases may remain "UNTIL RELIEVED BY ART OR RELEASED BY DEATH," unless it be found necessary to discharge them for insubordination or mental derangement.

6. Patients to be admitted into these Wards should be decently clothed, have a change of raiment, and find security (if required) for a future supply, and for their removal if it be found necessary to discharge them.

7. In all cases Patients are admitted for a fortnight's observation to enable a complete diagnosis to be made previous to being permanently placed upon the Establishment.

8. No Pauper can be received from any Parish Institution without the special permission of the Weekly Board.

9. No Patient afflicted with Cancer and usually resident in the country can be admitted, unless previous application be made to know whether there be room.

10. The name of any Applicant declining to come into the Cancer Wards on receiving an intimation of a vacancy will be removed from the Application Register, and no application for re-entry will be entertained until after the expiration of three months.

11. Patients who have been once admitted and discharged are ineligible for re-admission except on special application to, and sanctioned by, the Weekly Board.

12. In conformity with the wishes of the original founder of this Department a book is provided wherein the Surgeons enter the names of their Patients, together with a general statement of their cases; and should any extraordinary circumstances occur in the progress of a case, or should any remedy be discovered, a record is made and published for the benefit of society.

## SAMARITAN AND CONVALESCENT HOME FUND.

Patients of the Hospital recommended by or through any Physician, Surgeon, Visiting Governor, the Resident Medical Officer, or the Chaplain, are the objects of the Samaritan portion of this Fund, the distribution of which is vested in the Weekly Board.

In such distribution the following purposes are kept in view, viz. :—

- (a) Forwarding poor patients to their homes.
- (b) Sending to and maintaining at the Convalescent Home at Clacton-on-Sea, or other similar institution, such In-Patients as the proper Medical Officer certifies to be suitable cases.
- (c) The purchase of clothing, flannel, linen, or such other necessities as the condition of the Patient may require, including the whole or a portion of the cost of surgical appliances.
- (d) The temporary assistance of poor convalescent Patients requiring further medical aid as Out-Patients on leaving the Hospital.

The Convalescent Home is devoted to the following purposes, viz. :—

- (a) The reception of such In-Patients of the Hospital as are, on the recommendation of the proper Medical Officer, deemed convalescent but requiring change of air, rest, and nutritious diet for complete recovery.
- (b) The similar reception of such officers, sisters, nurses, and servants on the establishment of the Hospital as the Weekly Board, on the recommendation of the proper Medical Officer, deem, from sickness or other cause, in need of rest and change of air.
- (c) The reception of such other Patients as the Weekly Board, with the approval of a Court of Governors, shall from time to time determine.



## THE SAMARITAN FUND.

### THE GEORGE STURGE TRUST.

In the year 1884 Mr. George Sturge, of Woodthorpe, Sydenham Hill Road, executed a Deed of Trust providing for the payment of certain sums of money to various Charitable and Philanthropic Institutions, and amongst others The Middlesex Hospital, to which he devoted the munificent sum of £884\* Railway Stock, representing one thousand pounds (£1,000), under the following conditions, viz. :—

“In giving the sum of £1,000 for a Samaritan Fund for the  
 “above Hospital, Mr. Sturge gives it on the conditions  
 “that this Fund shall be kept entirely separate from the  
 “general funds of the Hospital, and that the income shall  
 “be paid to or applied for such In-patients as may be  
 “necessitous, and within three months from their discharge  
 “from the Hospital, and for the purpose of their having  
 “necessary nourishment or change of air.

“Mr. Sturge hopes that this Fund may be made known,  
 “and that others may be induced to subscribe to it.”

## THE MEDICAL SCHOOL.

**T**WO Casualty Medical and Two Casualty Surgical Officers, Six Resident House Surgeons, Six Resident House Physicians, and Two Resident Obstetric House Physicians, are appointed annually from among the Students of the Hospital, besides a Medical Officer and Registrar to the Cancer Wing.

Three Open Entrance Scholarships of the value of £100, £50 and £25, and a Scholarship of £50 open to Students of Oxford and Cambridge who have completed their Anatomical and Physiological Studies, are awarded at the commencement of the Winter Session. An Exhibition of £10 10s. is awarded at the end of the second Winter Session for proficiency in Anatomy and Physiology. The Hetley Prize of £25, the Leopold Hudson Prize of £11 11s., and the Lyell Medal and Scholarship, value £55 5s., are awarded annually. Two Broderip Scholarships, of the value of £60 and £40 respectively, are awarded to fifth year's Students for proficiency in Clinical knowledge. The Freeman Scholarship, of about £30, is awarded annually to Senior Students for proficiency in Obstetric Medicine. The Murray Medal and Scholarship is awarded every third year. Class Prizes are also given.

The Tutors superintend and assist the Students in their studies without extra fee, and thus the necessity of obtaining private instruction away from the Medical School is obviated.

The General Fee for the curriculum required by the Royal Colleges of Physicians and Surgeons and the Society of Apothecaries is 135 Guineas, if paid by instalments 145 Guineas; by London University 145 Guineas, or 155 Guineas by instalments. For Students who have passed the Preliminary Scientific Examination 120 Guineas, or 130 Guineas by instalments. Fee for Dental Students 54 Guineas, if paid by instalments 60 Guineas.

For the subjects for the Entrance Scholarships and any additional information apply to the Dean at the Hospital.

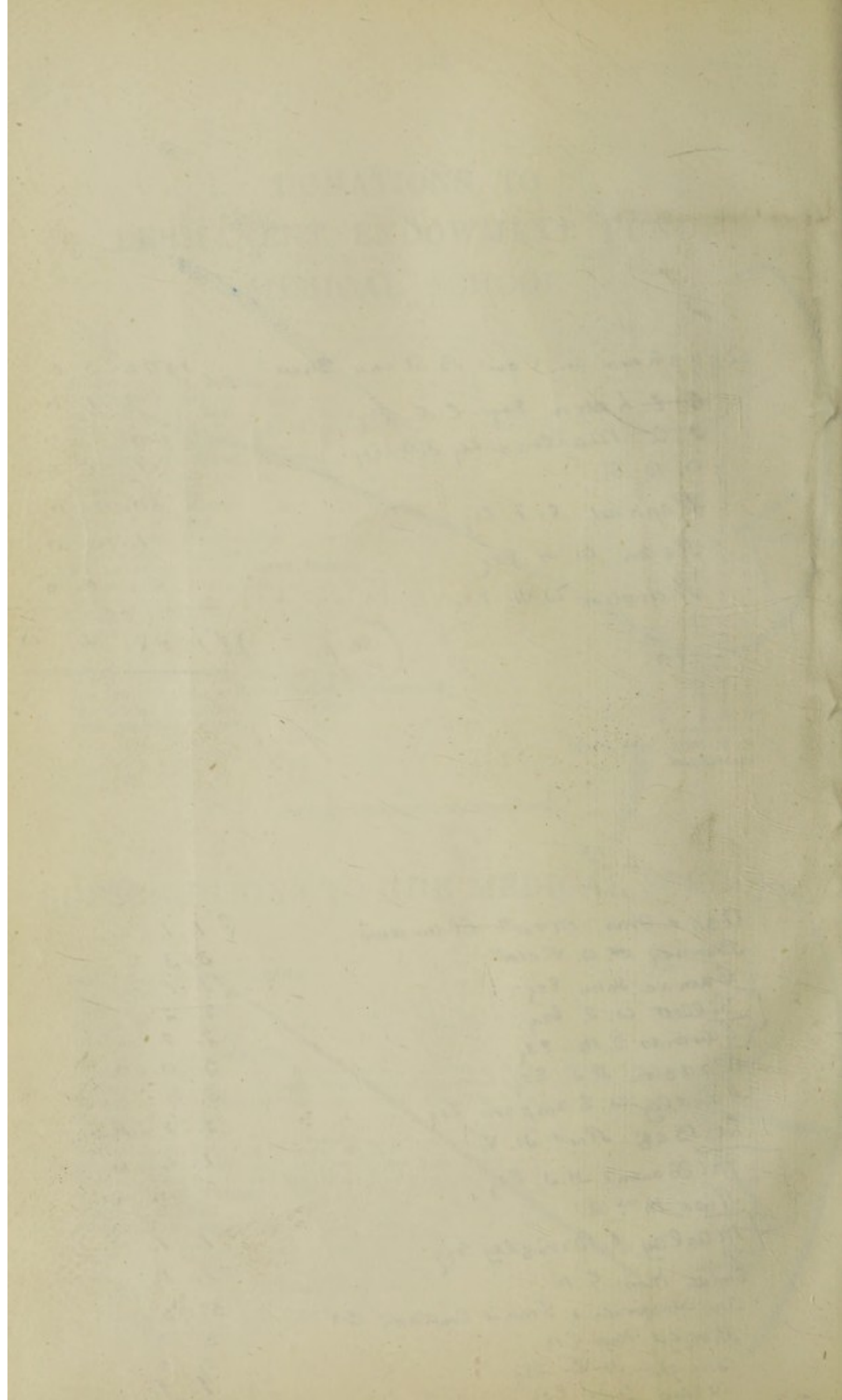

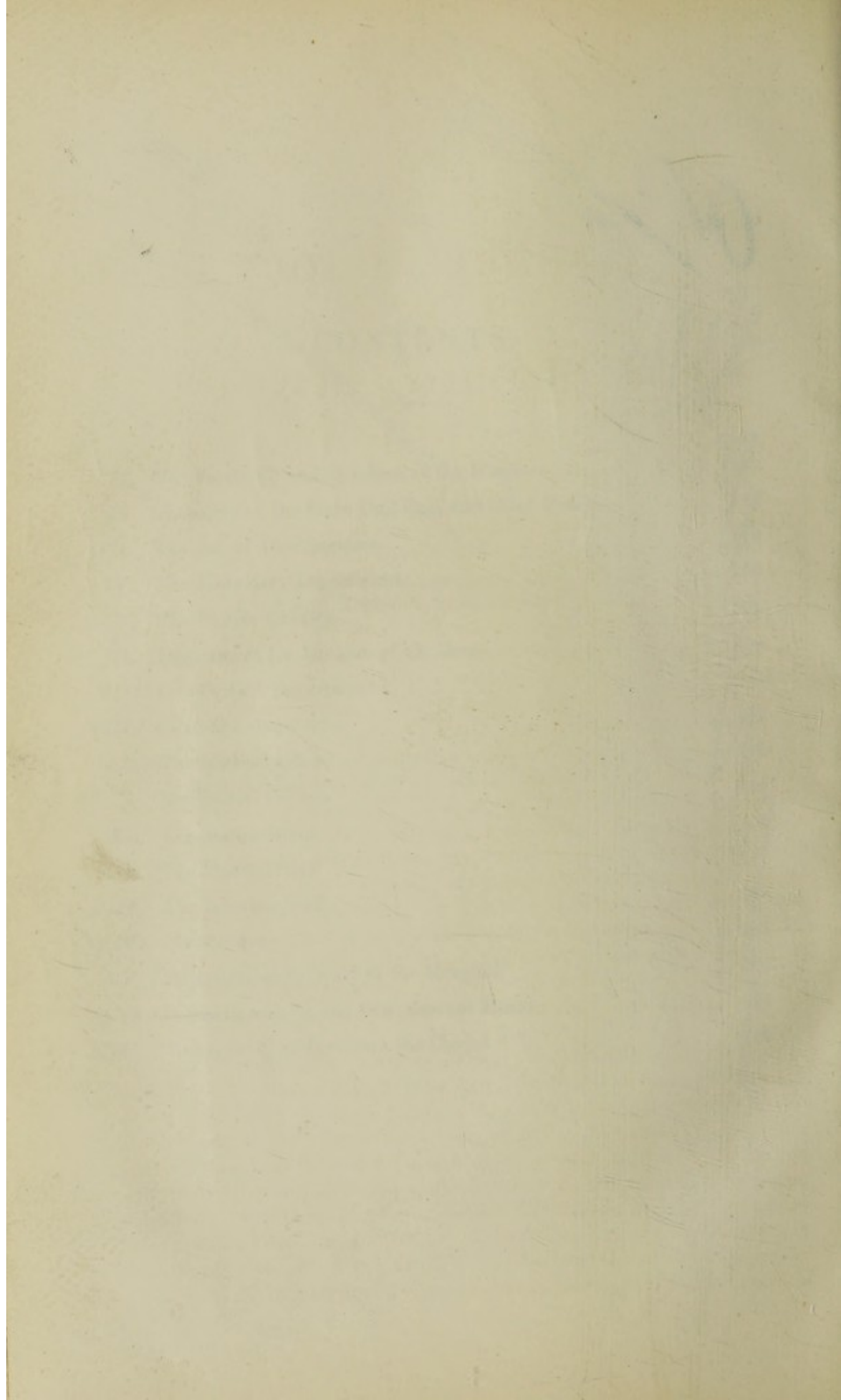

# A SHORT HISTORY

OF

## The Middlesex Hospital.

### I.

THE MIDDLESEX HOSPITAL was founded in the month of August, 1745, in order to provide for the needs of Sick and Lane Patients of the poor inhabitants of the then fairly populous districts of St. Giles and Soho. For ten years it consisted of two houses in Windmill Street, Tottenham Court Road, which had been acquired from Mr. Goodge at a rental of £30 a year, and during the first year of its existence it was styled "The Middlesex Infirmary." It formed one of several similar philanthropic institutions which, about this period, were established in London and maintained by voluntary contributions.

Founding of the Hospital, 1745.

Windmill Street.

It is interesting to note that with very little, if any, material change the constitution which was framed at its origin has been maintained for The Middlesex Hospital to the present day. Then, as now, every annual subscriber of three guineas was granted the privileges of a Governor, and Quarterly Courts were held for the purpose of electing annually the Weekly Board of Management, appointing the Honorary Staff, and receiving from the Board an account of its transactions during the previous quarter. In 1752 a by-law was enacted which forbade any medical officer or servant from acting as a Governor, a restriction which no longer obtains so far as the honorary officers are concerned. The first President was the second DUKE OF PORTLAND, whose tenure of office was not, however, destined to be of long duration.

Constitution and Management.

Its first President.

In 1747 it was resolved to appropriate one-third of the beds to Lying-in Married Women, and two Medical men were appointed to the charge of that Ward, it being stipulated that no "woman-midwife be permitted to act as midwife to this Hospital." The popularity of this extension of the original objects of the Institution proved to be nearly the cause of its downfall. For, owing to the demands on the resources of the new Department, a project was entertained to provide further accommodation for these cases by erecting a permanent building on a site to the east of Tottenham Court Road, a scheme which had to be abandoned from lack of funds. Nevertheless a determined attempt, energetically promoted by the then Physician, Dr. Cox, to convert

the Hospital into a Lying-in Institution, a proposal favoured by the President and other officials, was only frustrated by a compromise. It was resolved that 10 Beds should in future be assigned to the Sick and Lane, 10 to Lying-in Women, and 4 to Cases of Accident. The crisis led to numerous resignations, including that of the President, who was succeeded by HUGH, EARL (afterwards DUKE) OF NORTHUMBERLAND. It is gratifying to record that this office has from that time always been filled by the head of the Noble House of Percy, whose members have been amongst the most generous and zealous supporters of the Hospital.

Building  
Fund.

In 1750 the number of Beds was increased to 40, but the incommodious and inadequate character of the Windmill Street premises, particularly shown in the growing claims of the Maternity Department, caused the Governors to appeal for Subscriptions to a Building Fund. At length they were in a position to carry out the scheme which had been long in view. A convenient site in the locality was selected in the Marylebone Fields, and a lease of the same having been obtained from CHARLES BERNERS, Esq., for the term of 999 years at a Ground Rent of £15 per annum, the Building was commenced after the design of J. PAINE, Esq., Architect. The contract for its erection was £2,250. On the 15th of May, 1755, the first stone was laid by the EARL OF NORTHUMBERLAND, to whose unwearied exertions and personal influence the accomplishment of this great object is principally to be ascribed. The following contemporary account of the proceedings is taken from the monthly chronicle of events in the *Gentleman's Magazine* for June, 1755:—

Thursday, 15. The anniversary sermon of the *Middlesex* hospital was preached at *St. Anne's* church, *Westminster*, by the rev. Dr. *Nichols*, rector of the Temple. After divine service the right hon. the E. of *Northumberland*, president, Sir *Wm. Beauchamp Procter*, Bart., and Col. *Cornwallis*, vice-presidents, with the stewards and governors, walked from the church to the ground appointed for erecting the new building for the *Middlesex* hospital in *Marybon* field, where the president, assisted by the two vice-presidents, laid the first stone. They returned to the great concert room in *Dean-street*, where, at the chamber door, the collection amounted to 400*l.* Sir *Wm. Beauchamp Procter* gave 100*l.*

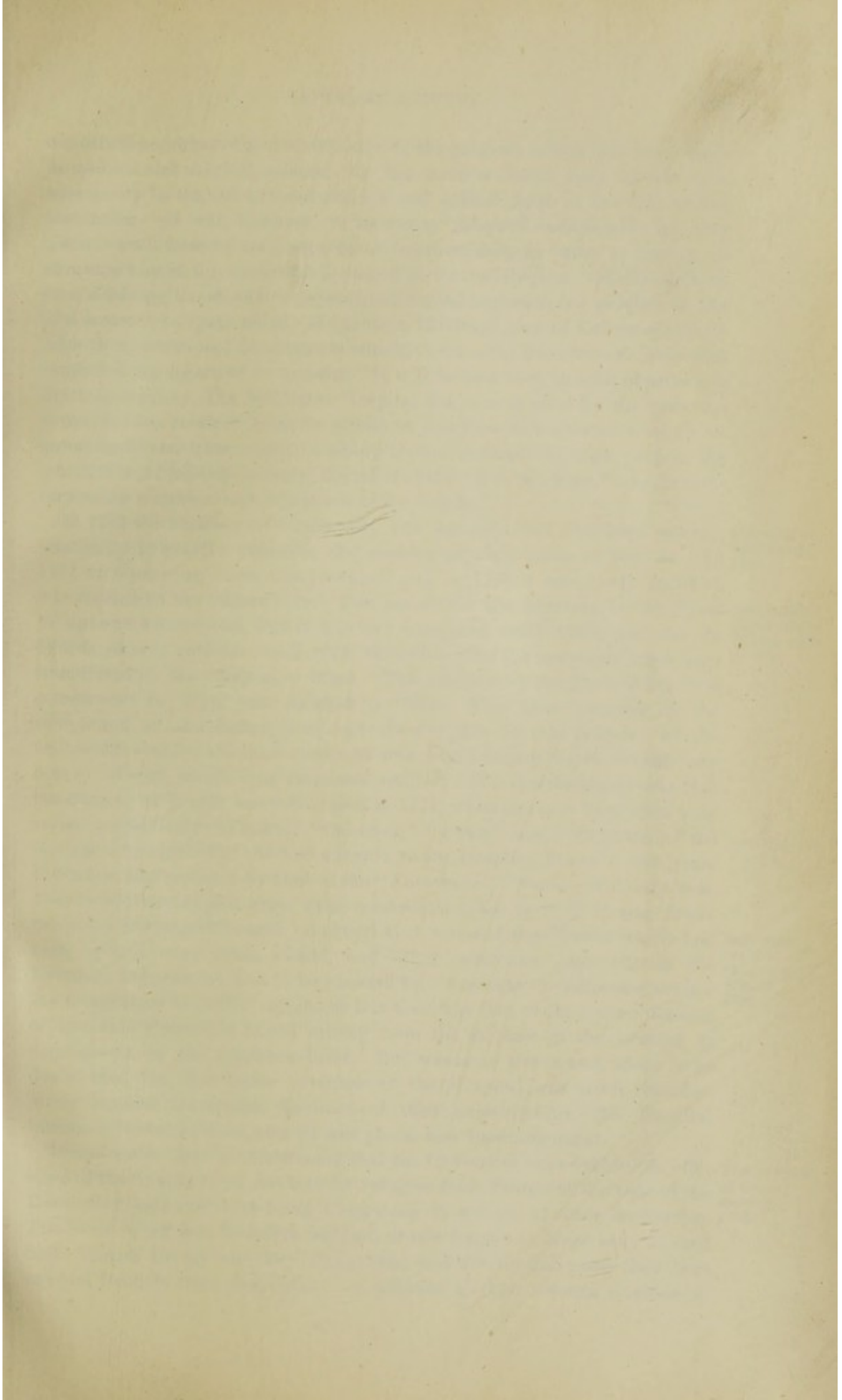
A picture by ROBERT EDGE PINE, representing the ceremony of laying the foundation-stone, was placed in the Board Room in 1768, where it still remains.

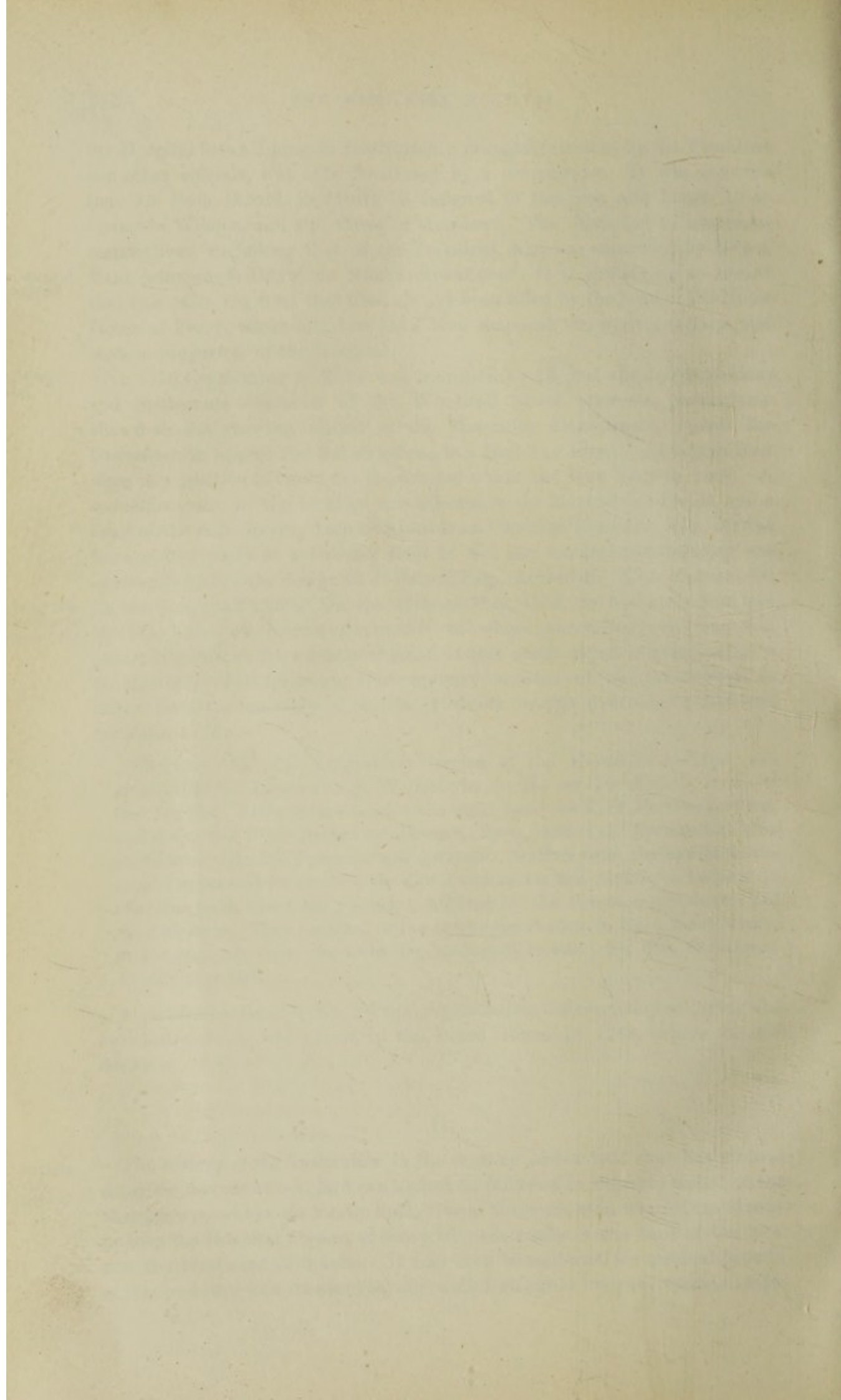
## II.

Chronicle  
of the  
building.

The history of the Institution in the century and a half that has elapsed since its first stone was laid can almost be followed in a simple recital of the changes wrought in its fabric, indicative as these are of unwearied endeavour to keep the Hospital abreast of every advance made in the care of the sick and the treatment of disease. It may even be said that the gradual growth of this building, and its eventual and well-nigh entire internal reconstruction,









constitute an outward and visible sign of the progress which has been made in medical and surgical science. In the main a sketch such as this must necessarily be limited to these obvious and salient facts in the life of any institution. It will, however, be necessary to speak occasionally of other matters than those of mere structural improvements in order to convey an adequate idea of the work that is carried on by the Hospital. Without, therefore, adhering too closely to strict chronological sequence, we propose in the first instance to speak chiefly of the main buildings, and to deal subsequently with those additional departments which, in course of time, have so materially expanded the sphere of its benefits. It will be seen how, in spite of periods of financial anxiety, The Middlesex Hospital has been enabled by the generous support it has received from the public to carry on its beneficent work in an enlightened and liberal spirit, keeping always in mind the high purpose for which it was founded—namely, the relief of the “sick and lame,” who, in ever-increasing numbers, seek admission to its charity.

In 1757 the building, of which only the central block had been erected, was ready to receive Patients, the number of beds being at first 64. In 1761 an Operating Room was provided, and in 1763 a temporary building was erected on the eastern side. Two years later the building of the West Wing was commenced, but it was not completed until 1768, nor did its Wards receive patients until 1770, in which year the maternity cases were transferred to the temporary block. The erection of the East Wing was commenced in 1775, and finished in 1780. This slow progress in the completion of the design was undoubtedly due to the exiguity of the exchequer, and for the same reason it was found impossible to furnish and occupy Wards, which long remained unfilled. It is interesting to note that the naming of Wards was introduced in 1774, when the four then open were styled respectively “PERCY,” “CLAYTON,” “PYKE,” and “VILLENEAU,” the last name being that of the first surgeon to the Hospital, but in a few years this name was replaced by that of the “FOUNDERS’” Ward. Not only were Wards left unoccupied after their construction, but in 1782 it was found necessary to retrench to such an extent that some of the Wards which had been opened were again closed, and other economies, especially in the Lying-in Department, had to be resorted to. Amongst the reasons given for the meagreness of public support at this time was that of the greater division of available charitable funds, arising from the increase in the number of dispensaries in the neighbourhood. But whatever the causes, there is no doubt that the favourable progress of the Hospital was much retarded. Many Annual Governors discontinued their subscriptions, the Hospital became involved in debt, and all was gloom and discouragement.

It was under these circumstances that the Governors were enabled to offer some of the Wards as an Asylum for refugees from France at the time of the Revolution, many of them being Clergymen in a state of utter destitution. The West Wing was therefore assigned at low terms to a large body of such Sick French Clergy and Lay Emigrants, and for several years they here enjoyed freedom from persecution. A glimpse of their sojourn is given in

the following passage, from a report made to the Governors in 1800 by the Resident Apothecary. It runs: "In June 1793 two Wards were opened for the reception of French Emigrants, of whom 301 Priests and 120 Laity have been admitted; of this number, 83 Clergy and 36 Laity have died, 311 discharged cured, excepting 21 now in the house, of whom only seven have Medical attendance, the rest being in the Hospital for support and maintenance only." When, in 1814, after a long period of exile, permission was at length given them to return to their own country, those who survived availed themselves of the privilege and took their departure, expressing great and lasting gratitude for the quietude and comforts they had enjoyed for twenty-one years.

It was some time before the Hospital surmounted the financial straits in which it found itself. During the first decade of the nineteenth century many appeals were made to the public, and the strictest economy had to be practised, for, owing to the war, the rise in price of bread and other necessaries could not but be felt. Indeed, the allowance of bread, as well as other articles of food, and even medicines, had to be severely curtailed.

The merit of having retrieved the Establishment from almost complete ruin is pre-eminently due to the late LORD ROBERT SEYMOUR, whose memory must always be dear to The Middlesex Hospital. With a most earnest desire to see it resume its former useful position, he interested himself in its behalf, and by his personal influence prevailed on a great number of the Nobility, Clergy, and Gentry to join in the good cause. He it was who obtained for the Hospital the Patronage of the PRINCE REGENT, afterwards KING GEORGE THE FOURTH, whose example was followed by KING WILLIAM THE FOURTH, and her late Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA. Our present gracious KING has likewise condescended to declare himself the PATRON of The Middlesex Hospital, and to assist it with his annual bounty.

These efforts, which included a Concert in the King's Theatre, realizing a large sum, and also a Public Meeting at the Argyll Rooms, resulted in a reopening of Wards, one of which was named "SEYMOUR," after the noble benefactor, and was assigned to cases of Accidents. In 1819 the "NORTHUMBERLAND" Ward was opened, by which time the total number of beds had reached 179. In 1820 "HERTFORD" Ward was opened, and four years later four other Wards, increasing the accommodation to 200 beds.

In the year 1834 the Governors decided to enlarge the building, two most extensive parishes, St. Marylebone and St. Pancras, having grown up about it. The accommodation for In-Patients had become quite disproportionate to the number of applicants, and much difficulty was often found in distributing them, particularly in cases requiring more complete seclusion than could be obtained in the General Wards. Trusting to the liberality which had hitherto supported the Institution, it was proposed to extend each Wing of the Hospital thirty feet towards the street. The alterations thus proposed were satisfactorily accomplished, and the appearance of the









Hospital thereby much improved, the whole being paid for by subscriptions raised for this specific object, without at all trenching upon the Funds of the Hospital. By this extension the number of beds was raised to 240.

In 1836, by the exertions of Mr. TOOKE, an Act of Incorporation was obtained for the Hospital, to which further reference will be made.

In 1845 the centenary of the Hospital was duly celebrated, and shortly afterwards further steps were taken to improve the building and increase its accommodation, for, notwithstanding the additions that had already been made, it was still too small to afford relief to all who applied, besides being deficient in many appliances which had been introduced into other hospitals for promoting the comfort and welfare of the Patients. Considering it their duty to remedy these deficiencies, the Governors in the year 1848 determined on effecting extensive and costly improvements.

The accommodation was increased by no less than fifty-five beds, one of the Wards thus newly opened being the "MURRAY" Ward, dedicated to the memory of SIR JOHN MURRAY under a provision in the will of his widow. A Ward was also opened for the reception of cases of Diseases Peculiar to Women, such for example as those which occasionally occur during or after confinement, and which, unless attended to with a care that can rarely be afforded in their own homes, reduce the sufferers to a state entirely unfitting them for the active duties of life, not infrequently bringing them to a premature grave. New rooms were provided for the superior nurses, the different offices rendered more commodious, and fireproof staircases introduced throughout the building. A laundry was established in the basement of the East Wing, whereby additional comfort was obtained and a saving of expenditure made.

Particular attention was paid to the ventilation of the Hospital, to defects in which had been ascribed in large measure the prevalence of erysipelas, pyæmia, and other septic diseases that were a cause of much mortality following surgical operations. It is perhaps not too much to say that the frequency in those days of such secondary septic infection after operations was almost regarded as one of the inevitable risks a hospital patient had to run, so that by a strange irony of circumstance the place he had entered to be rid of his disease might itself be the cause of his perishing. So strong was this belief that, led by SIR JAS. SIMPSON, an attack was made upon the hospital system itself, and the term "hospitalism" was invented to convey the impression of these risks. Happily there is no need in the present day to revive the controversy on this debateable question, for, thanks to more and more scrupulous attention to the principles of cleanliness and hygiene, such septic complications are now but rarely seen either within or outside institutions. The recognition of the true nature of these disorders and the means for preventing them followed upon the epoch-making researches of LORD LISTER. And as regards the effect of the improved ventilation adopted in the Hospital and its Wards, the diminution of the class of cases referred to was proof of the necessity as well as of the value of the change. Every subsequent improvement has in point of fact been directed to the same end,



with the result of showing that even an old building can be rendered as hygienically perfect as one newly planned on the most modern system.

In 1849 Cholera broke out in London, and 60 cases of the disease were admitted into the Wards which were set apart for the purpose. In doing so the authorities of the Hospital reversed the policy of their predecessors who, in the epidemic of 1834, declined to receive such cases. A much greater strain upon the resources of the Hospital was imposed by the memorable visitation of Cholera in 1854, one of the centres of the epidemic being the Golden Square district, owing, as was supposed, to the contamination of the water furnished by the notorious Broad Street pump. The Middlesex Hospital being in the vicinity received as many as 231 cases from July to November, no fewer than 152 seeking admission during the first two weeks of September. There were in addition 47 cases of Choleraic Diarrhoea. Of the Cholera patients 123 died, a fatality rate of 53·2 per cent., one of the victims being a Nurse of the Hospital, who together with another Nurse and a maid-servant were the only instances which arose within the building itself. A detailed account of the experience of the Hospital in respect to all the cases treated in it was drawn up by Mr. S. W. SIBLEY, the Registrar, and published by the authority of the Weekly Board.

In the year 1859 the Authorities acquired some premises in Charles Street, adjoining the East Wing, and were enabled thereby to extend the accommodation for Out-Patients, who were becoming very numerous.

Although reference will be specially made to the Nursing Department on another page, it may here be mentioned that during the sixties attention was directed to its improvement and organization. This culminated in the opening of the Nursing Home in Cleveland Street in 1869, which was further extended in 1878, when by a reconstruction of the buildings two special Wards were made connected with the East Wing. Each of these Wards were subdivided into two parts holding two beds each. The one was named "BENTINCK" after a munificent benefactress, Miss A. H. CAVENDISH-BENTINCK, the other "DE MORGAN" after the late Mr. CAMPBELL DE MORGAN, the Senior Surgeon to the Hospital, whose death in 1876 had been widely and deeply lamented. At the same time accommodation was provided for the Registrars on the ground floor of the extended Wing.

In 1879 a Hydraulic Lift was constructed in the East Wing, giving access from the basement to each of the floors of the building, and greatly facilitating the conveyance of Patients to and from the Operating Theatre, besides being of great service to the general work of the Hospital.

By the substitution of teak for soft wood flooring in four of the Surgical Wards another advance was made in ward sanitation. This costly improvement, which took place in 1883, was made on the initiative of the late Mr. GEORGE LAWSON, Surgeon to the Hospital, into whose hands a large sum of money had been entrusted by the executors of the late JOHN BIZO, Esq. The alteration was found to be so eminently satisfactory that subsequently the Governors undertook the flooring of all the Wards with the same material, the heavy expense incurred being amply justified by the great

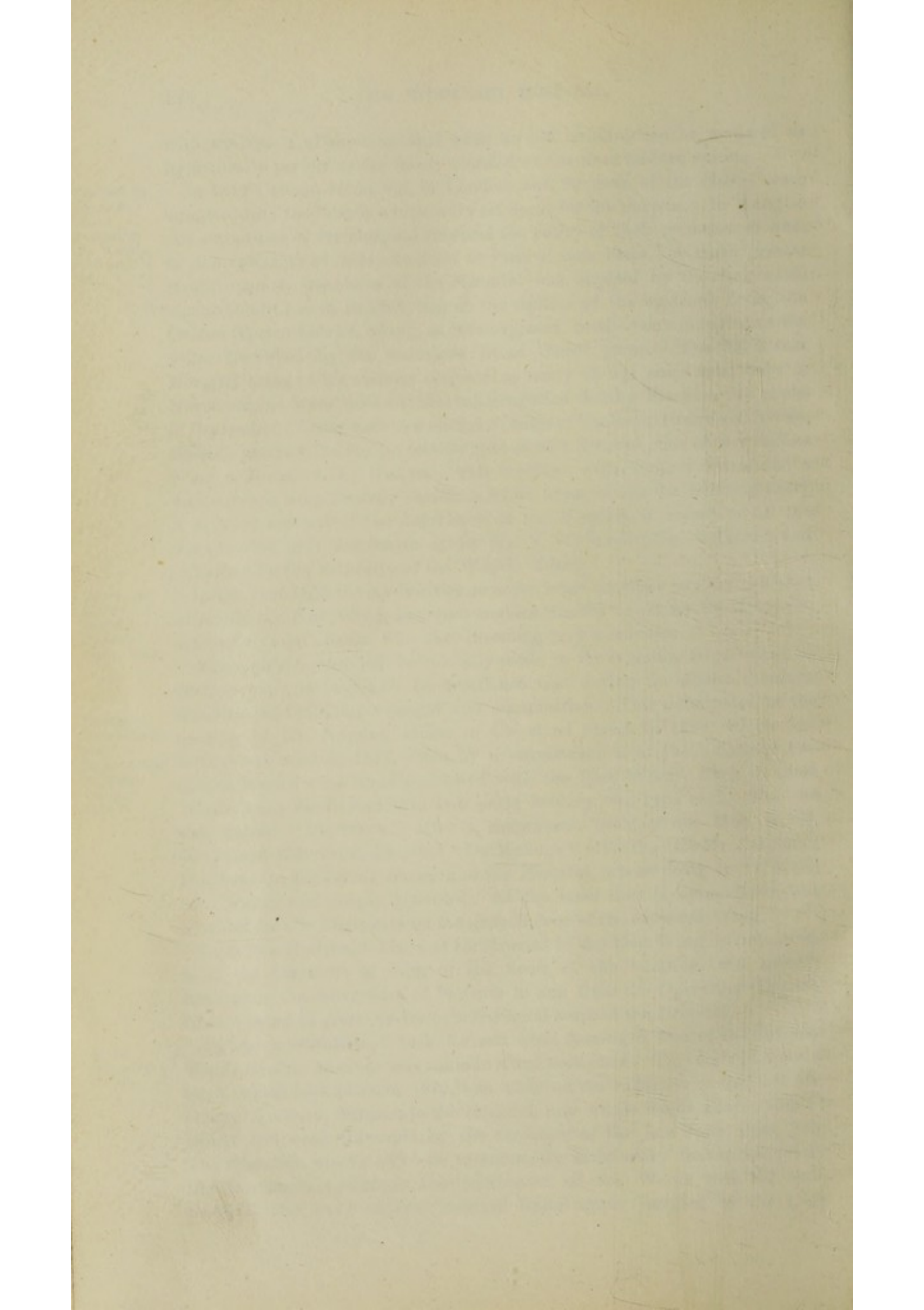

gain in cleanliness, non-absorbency, and endurance. Quite recently (1904) the like objects have been further advanced in the case of the large Surgical Ward ("BRODERIP") on the ground floor of the West Wing, of which the walls have been lined with "Crystopal." The cost of this latter alteration considerably exceeded Mr. BISCHOFFSHEIM's generous gift of £250 for the purpose, and amounted to over £1,000, including new furniture and fittings. After removal of the plaster serious defects were discovered in the walls, which had been standing over 150 years, and the necessary rebuilding was the main cause of the excess in the expenditure.

Notwithstanding the improvements in the OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT in 1859, the arrangements therein were for many years very cramped and inadequate to the needs of the large and increasing number of applicants for relief, especially as in addition to Casualties, Medical and Surgical Cases, it had been found necessary to add Departments for certain special affections. To meet this extension and subdivision of work very extensive alterations and improvements were undertaken in the East Wing in 1883-4, comprising the erection of a new Dispensary, of an enlarged Waiting Room for Patients with an exit into Cleveland Street, and the installation at the end of the corridor of a Refreshment Bar, where Out-Patients who were awaiting their turn could be served with non-alcoholic drinks and other light refreshments at a moderate charge. At the same time the Consultation Rooms were remodelled and re-arranged. These improvements were effected at a cost of £17,500. The Opening Ceremony took place on the 17th of December, 1884, when T.R.H. THE PRINCE AND PRINCESS CHRISTIAN, THE LORD LIEUTENANT OF THE COUNTY, THE LORD MAYOR OF LONDON, and many influential Governors were present on the occasion. Her Royal Highness made an inspection of the Hospital, and was graciously pleased to allow a Ward to be named "HELENA" in commemoration of her visit.

An important and very desirable step was the acquisition of all the houses in Cleveland Street which still remained on the east side of the Hospital Garden. In 1885 the seal was affixed to an agreement by which these houses were placed at the disposal of the Hospital on the expiration of the existing lease. It will be seen hereafter how the site thus acquired has been gradually covered by buildings connected with the Medical School and the Nursing Department of the Hospital, which obtained thereby much-needed accommodation without encroaching on the area of the Hospital Garden.

In connection with the main building the fulfilment of a long-cherished scheme for the erection of a Chapel, promoted by many warm friends of the Institution, enabled a great improvement to be undertaken in the removal of the Mortuary and Post-mortem Room from their position in contiguity to the Wards to a more convenient site on the western side of the Garden adjacent to the School Buildings. This change took place in 1889, and in the following year a Crematorium was constructed beneath the Mortuary for the destruction of dressings, etc., and has proved of the greatest service in the furtherance of sanitation and cleanliness.

In 1891 Electric Lighting was installed throughout the Hospital Building, entirely replacing gas for illuminating purposes, though the latter is still employed in the kitchen for cooking.

The conversion of rooms on the third floor, hitherto assigned to members of the Resident Staff, into a Children's Ward took place in 1892, and supplied what had come to be felt as a deficiency in the resources of the establishment.

The next improvement taken in hand was the entire reconstruction of the Operating Theatre, which, when the Medical School was established in 1835, had been removed from its original position on the upper floor of the West Wing to the ground floor adjacent to the Accident Ward (now the "BRODERIP" Ward). Here it remained unaltered until 1894, when it was demolished and a new and more spacious Theatre was erected on the most approved principles. This building comprises a large Theatre capable of seating about 130 students, a small Theatre for special operations, and rooms for the administration of anaesthetics and for the recovery of Patients, all being very effectively lit by Electric Light and ventilated by a special apparatus in the basement. An entirely new set of Instruments and Appliances was provided, and no effort was spared to render the Theatre one of the most convenient and best equipped of its kind. It was opened for use in 1895.

As evidence of the remarkable zeal with which the Governors were at this time imbued in their endeavours to do all that was possible to increase the usefulness of the Institution, it may be mentioned that in the following year the Convalescent Home at Clacton was opened, and in 1897 was laid the foundation-stone of the new Cancer Wing, to both of which important annexes we shall again refer.

Nor does this complete the tale of structural improvements which have been effected in the Hospital fabric itself. In 1901 it was decided to remove the Laundry from the position it had long occupied in the basement of the North-East Wing to a site which had been procured at Hendon. Here a Laundry, fully furnished with all modern appliances, was erected. It is maintained in daily connection with the Hospital by means of a steam motor waggon. The part of the Hospital building thus set free has been utilized for an extension of the boiler service, which is applied to the heating of the Hospital and School, and for the construction of disinfecting chambers, cold storage rooms, and other needful objects. At the same time this Wing was extended so as materially to enlarge the three Female Wards, "BIRD," "HELENA," and "SEYMOUR," whilst to the uppermost floor were transferred the kitchens and offices from the basement of the central block, displacing two Wards, "HAWKINS" and "PRUDHOE." Lastly, with the opening of the New Cancer Wing, two of the three Wards, which had for at least half a century been the home of Patients on that foundation, were assigned to the cases of Diseases of Women ("PRUDHOE" Ward), and in 1902 a Special Operating Theatre was constructed on the site of the third Ward for the sole use of that department.

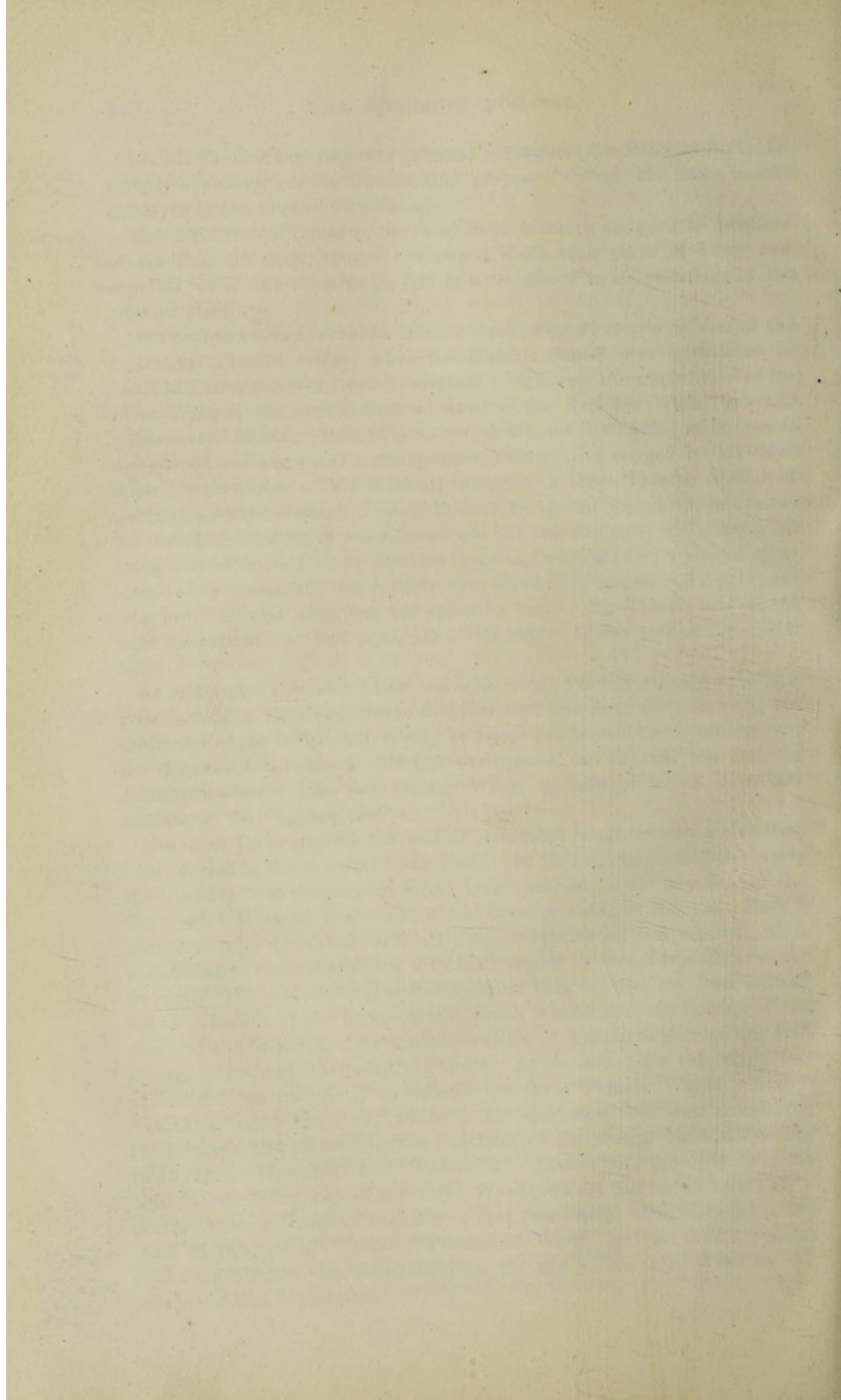

There are many minor improvements, both in respect to construction and rearrangement, which have from time to time been made, that need not be dwelt on here. Suffice it to say that during its 150 years of existence The Middlesex Hospital has demonstrated the practicability of an institution being modified and expanded in accordance with the demands of advancing knowledge and experience. It has thus undergone a process of evolution without any resort to the wholesale destruction so often deemed to be necessary in adapting old buildings to modern needs. It says something for the simplicity as well as for the stability of Mr. PAINE's design that the structure he planned should have been capable of the transformation it has experienced without interference with its external walls. To be sure there has been some expansion since the DUKE OF NORTHUMBERLAND's foundation in 1755 in order to meet the needs of an increasing population, for a building which originally stood on the outskirts of the town is now buried in the heart of a densely peopled community. But the Hospital buildings, which now form a compact rectangle, still enclose a fairly spacious and shady Garden, which affords both a pleasant outlook from the windows of the Wards and also a grateful retreat in summer, where Patients and Nurses can enjoy fresh air and change of scene without quitting the Hospital premises. It may be recalled that this "garden" was first laid out in 1769, when it was hoped that it would yield sufficient vegetable produce for the Hospital dietary. This hope not being fulfilled, it was later converted into a botanic garden and chiefly stocked with medicinal plants, grass plots being also laid down and poplars planted. This was in 1785, in which year the aeronaut Leonardi sought but failed to obtain permission to use it as a starting-place for his balloon. For many years a local flower show was held in it, whilst its suitability for evening *fêtes* has been proved on several occasions, the last being in connection with the celebration of the opening of the Convalescent Home in 1896.

### III.

The disadvantage of not possessing a CHARTER or ACT OF INCORPORATION had on several occasions been experienced, and it was therefore suggested that application should be made to Parliament to obviate this inconvenience. In the year 1836 facilities for obtaining this desirable character of legal perpetuity were afforded by the circumstance of Mr. WILLIAM TOOKE, the Honorary Solicitor of the Hospital, being then Member of Parliament for Truro, and he, with great readiness and liberality, undertook the task of conducting through Parliament an Act of Incorporation. His kind endeavours were successful; and, on the 30th of March 1836, "THE PRESIDENT, VICE-PRESIDENTS, TREASURERS, AND GOVERNORS OF THE MIDDLESEX HOSPITAL" were declared by Act of Parliament to be one body politic and corporate, and by that name to have perpetual succession and a common seal, with such other privileges as are usually granted under similar circumstances. *And they are enabled, without incurring the penalties or forfeitures of*

*the Statutes of Mortmain, to hold and retain the Hospital and Premises for the residue of a term of 999 years, created by a lease under which the Hospital premises are held; and, by will, gift, purchase, or otherwise, to obtain, acquire, hold and retain, as well the inheritance in fee-simple of the said Hospital and premises, as also any other lands either in fee or for terms for life or years, so as not to exceed (exclusive of the Hospital and money invested in mortgage) the clear YEARLY value of £10,000.*

*The Hospital is also authorized, by will, gift, purchase, or otherwise, to obtain, acquire, hold, and retain any monies and personal estate secured on mortgage or charged on land.*

The power to hold land has been of great service to this Institution, and in the year 1890 a bequest, which had been withheld by the Executors under the impression that the Hospital was debarred by Statute of Mortmain from receiving it, was fully recovered with the interest accrued thereon.

#### IV.

So far only leading events in the history of the Hospital, and changes that have taken place in the Main Building have been referred to, but these by no means exhaust all that must be mentioned in order to give an accurate idea of the work that has been and is being done there. In the first place attention may be directed to its special departments, which form such important features of its work.

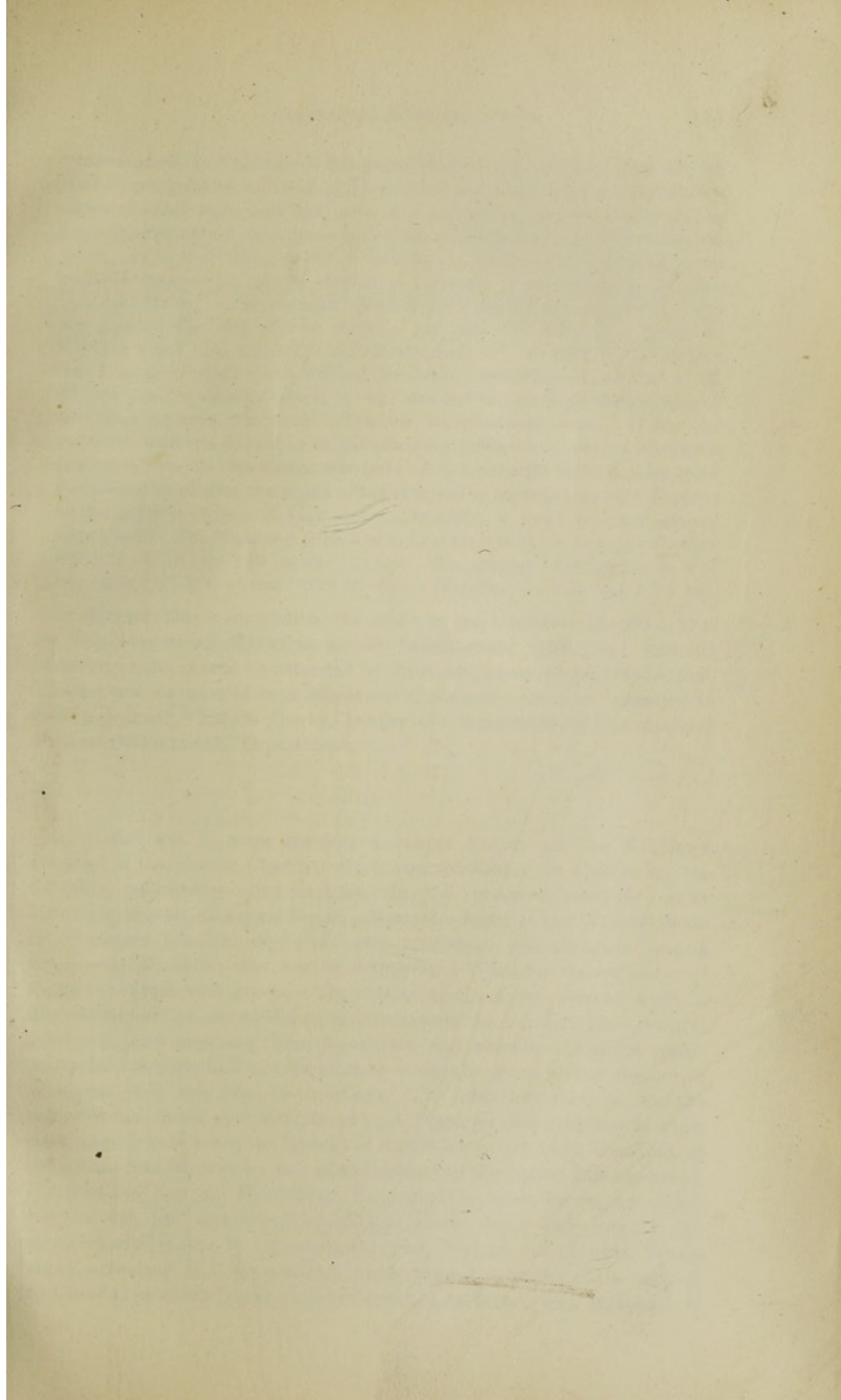

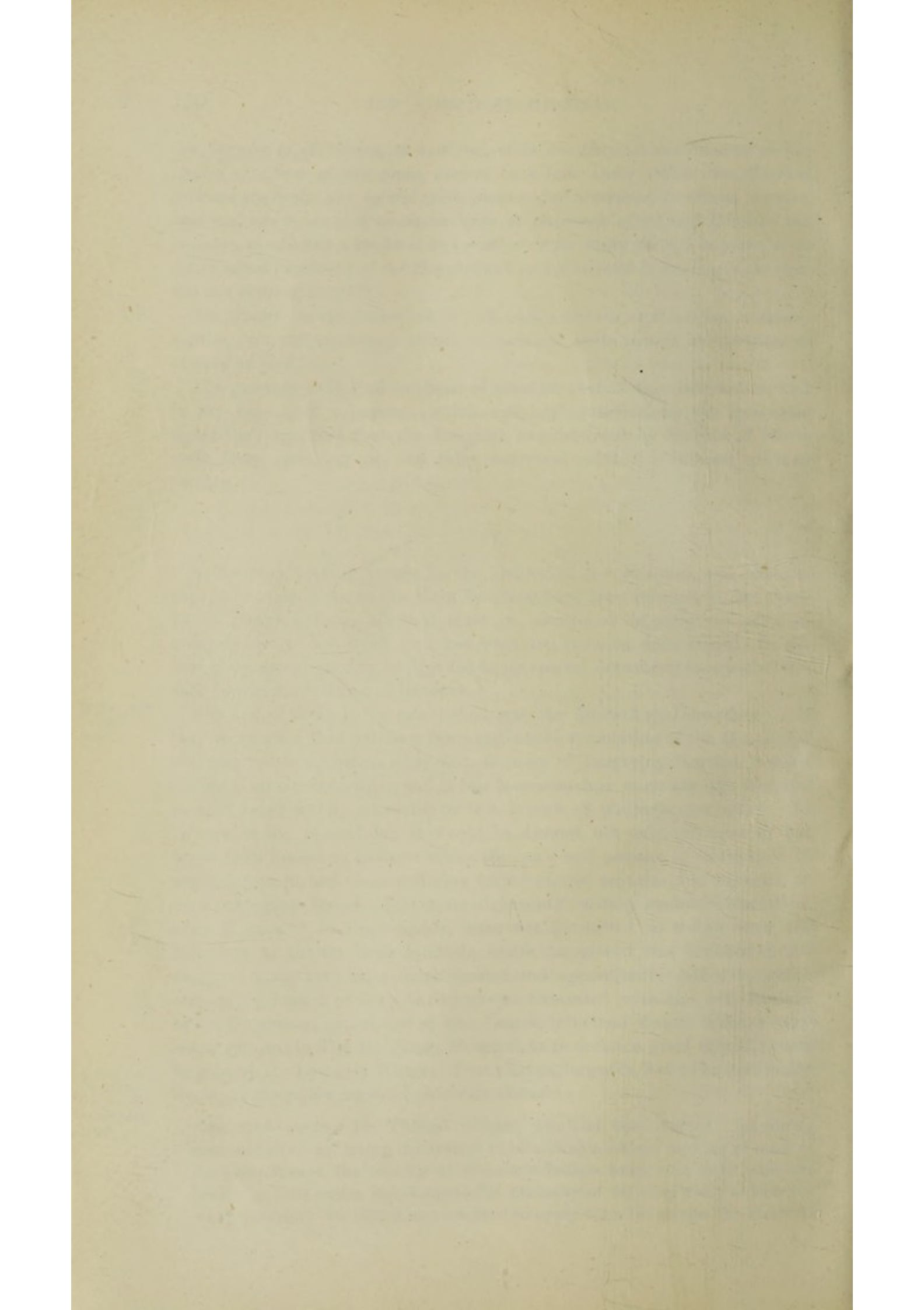
The first of these to be established was the Midwifery Department. It may be recalled that within a few years of the foundation of the Hospital it was resolved to apportion some beds to cases of Deserving Married Women during their confinements; and it has been seen how narrowly the Hospital escaped being wholly converted to this branch of philanthropic relief. To be sure, at the present day it would be deemed not only incongruous but worse than foolish to harbour under the same roof persons so susceptible to septic infection, and those suffering from Surgical injuries and diseases, or even contagious fevers. But in the eighteenth century such considerations, even if present to their minds, were not permitted to weigh with the Founders to thwart their laudable desire to extend the benefits of the Hospital where they were much needed and appreciated; added to which this special branch of the Charity was so consonant with the best feelings of the Governors, especially of the Ladies, who had always taken a very warm interest in The Middlesex Hospital, as to occasion great unwillingness to give up the Lying-in Wards. That change, however, had to be eventually made, as the following brief chronicle shows:—

In 1763 we find Dr. Thomas Cooper, who had been elected "physician man-midwife," initiating the system of attending a certain number of cases at their own homes, the number of recommendations being such as to cause the Board to "be under the disagreeable necessity of refusing many objects for want of room." In 1773 it was resolved to apply for a licence for the Hospital









"pursuant to the direction of the Act of Parliament," entitled "An Act for the better regulation of Lying-in Hospitals," an evidence of the estimation in which the Governors held this part of the Hospital's work. However, the impoverished state of finances compelled the authorities to reduce this establishment, and to limit the number of beds to six, whilst two years later it was resolved to appoint a certain number of midwives to attend cases "at their own habitations," under the supervision of the "physician man-midwife," who was granted the sum of five shillings per case "to defray the charge of midwife, coach hire, and other individual expenses." In 1786 it was thought that if no cases at all were admitted the expense would be reduced, but a trial of this proving unsatisfactory, it was decided to return to the practice of admitting patients, the number, however, being reduced to two. It was not until 1807 that the midwifery in-patients were finally done away with, and a few years later Dr. Merriman, who held office from 1809 to 1826, introduced the plan of employing the pupils of the Hospital to attend cases at the option of the patients, "who, if they prefer a midwife, a pupil is never pressed upon them." Dr. Merriman published annual reports of his department, from which it will be seen how rapidly it grew. The number of deliveries in 1814 was 64, in 1824 374.—From "The Middlesex Hospital Journal," vol. ii., p. 105.

In the year 1884 a suggestion was made by the Obstetric Physician that the employment of Midwives should be dispensed with, and that all Maternity cases should be attended by Students, under proper supervision. This scheme was carried into effect, and these cases are now entrusted to duly appointed "Extern Clerks," under the supervision of the qualified Medical Officers of the Department.

## V.

A special and in some respects a unique feature of The Middlesex Hospital is the Cancer Charity, which was established in 1792 under the following interesting circumstances. In the previous year Mr. JOHN HOWARD, surgeon, of Argyll Street, addressed a letter to the Weekly Board of Governors offering, on behalf of a gentleman who wished to remain anonymous, to defray the cost of fitting up a Ward for the admission of Patients afflicted with cancer. The objects of the donor were set forth in this communication as twofold in scope—namely, in the first place, to give relief to a most deserving class of sufferers, and secondly, to afford opportunity for the study and investigation of a disease which was as obscure in its origin as it was fatal in its effects. The offer was accepted, and the unknown benefactor undertook to fit up a Ward for the reception of these cases, as well as to settle the interest of £4,000 Three per Cent. Consolidated Bank Annuities for ever by way of endowment of the Cancer Establishment. The death of SAMUEL WHITBREAD, Esq., in 1796 made known the secret that he was the munificent benefactor whose name had been so far concealed, and it was by his expressed wish that his son (SAMUEL WHITBREAD, some time M.P. for Bedford) was appointed a trustee of the fund of the Charity, in which he throughout continued to take a keen interest. may be added that in 1797 Mr. HOWARD was requested to act as Surgeon to the Department, an office he held until his death in 1811, leaving behind him a record of his clinical experiences which was afterwards published. From that time the Wards have been mostly in the charge of the Surgeons of the Hospital.

Since then the Cancer Fund has been augmented by numerous other Donations and Bequests, notably by a Legacy bequeathed by Mrs. ALITHEA MARIA STAFFORD in 1815; and in 1854 by a bequest of SIR JOSEPH DE COURCY LAFFAN, BART., M.D. It is interesting that in her will Mrs. Stafford expressly states that she made her bequest in the hope of its aiding in "*curing persons afflicted with cancer and of investigating and promoting our general knowledge of treating that dreadful disorder*," objects practically identical with those that the Founder of the Charity had in mind.

These further endowments enabled the Governors to appropriate three Wards, namely, "WHITBREAD," "STAFFORD," and "LAFFAN," exclusively to females suffering from cancer, besides providing accommodation for men suffering from the same disease, a few beds being set apart in one of the Surgical Wards for this purpose. Here the victims of this almost hopeless malady find a permanent refuge, where everything that human skill and kindness can effect is provided for the cure of their disease, or at least for the alleviation of their sufferings.

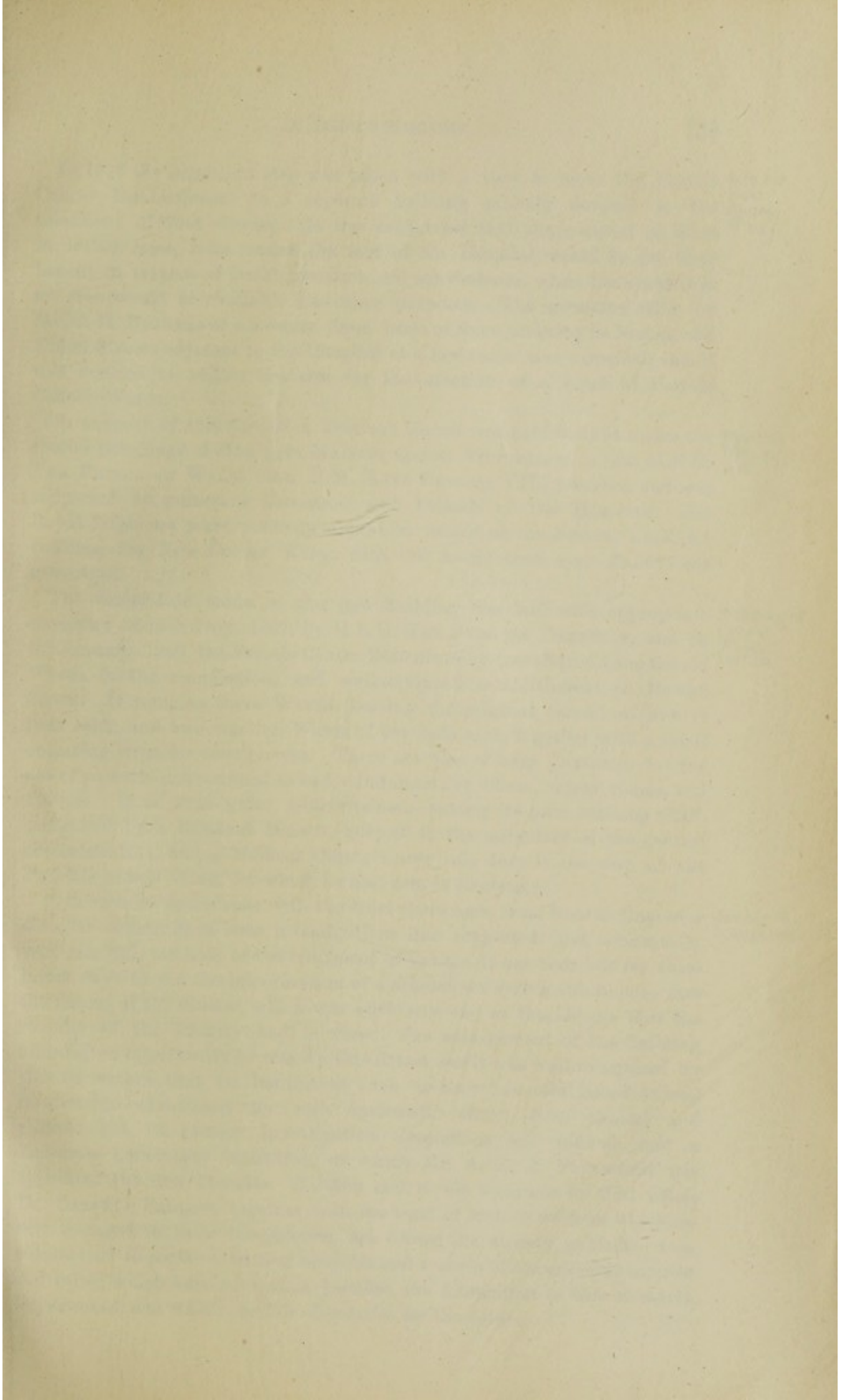
The Founders of the Cancer Establishment, actuated by a wise benevolence, determined that this refuge should be permanent, by directing that the Patients might remain until "relieved by art, or released by death." No one who has interested himself in the unhappy lot of the Patients in these Wards, being forty-five in number, can have failed to observe how greatly their mental suffering is mitigated by the knowledge that they have here offered to them, if they so desire it, a peaceful and permanent refuge for the remainder of their existence. In it they are exempted from the anxious cares of providing for the daily wants of life, as well as from the sad necessity of repeated solicitations for another and another refuge, as the term for which they can be received into other Hospitals from time to time approaches to its close.

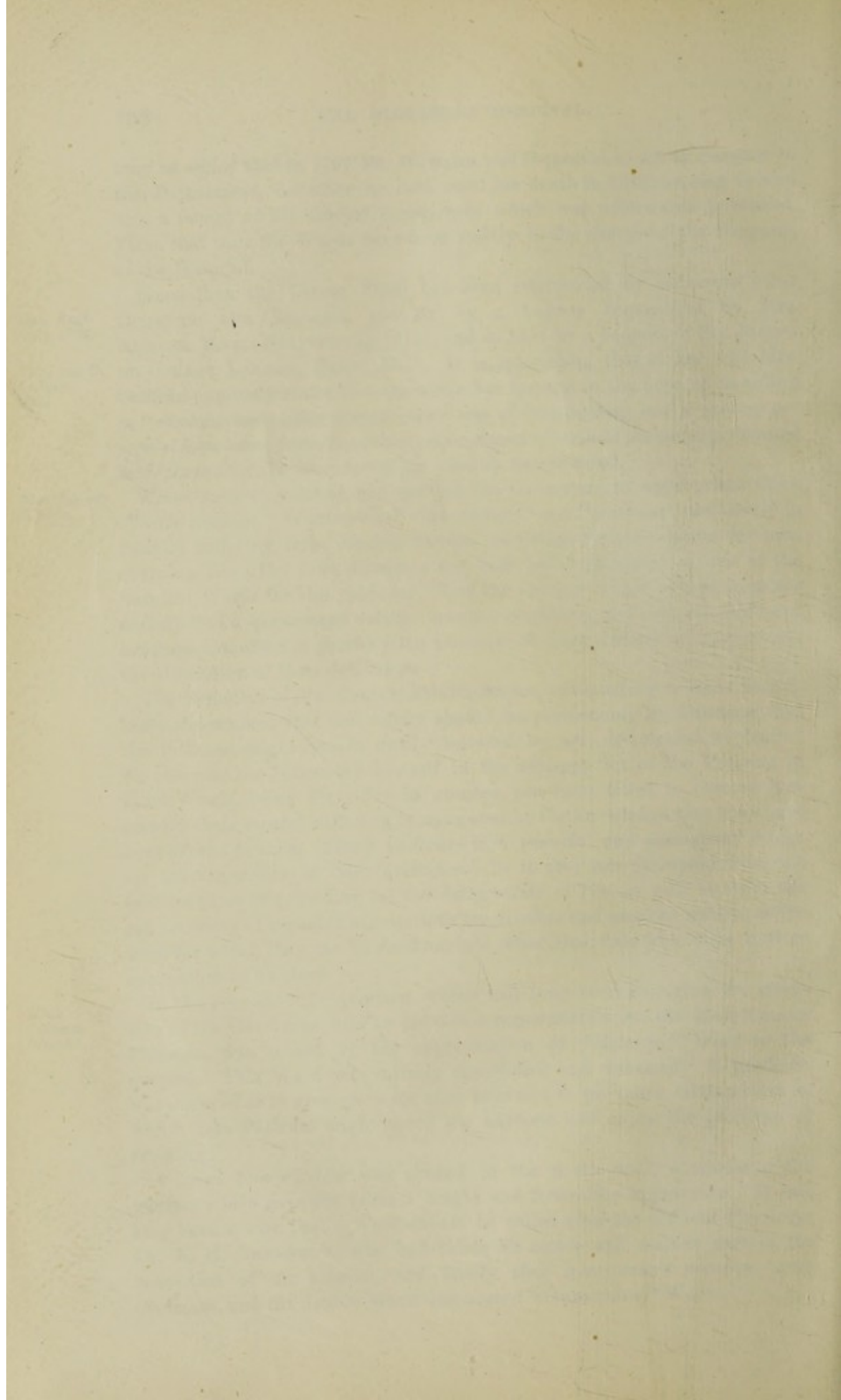

In the year 1886 the question, which had long been engaging the attention of the Governors, how to provide accommodation for the Male Cancer Patients, was solved by the appropriation of "HANDEL" Ward to the purpose. This Ward was entirely remodelled and renamed. A partition was made so as to give space for nine beds and to provide a sitting-room in which these Patients might spend the daytime and enjoy the privilege of smoking.

A large bow-window was opened in the north wall, overlooking the garden, which gave the room a bright and home-like appearance. It had long been a wish that a Ward should be called after the eminent Physician Dr. E. H. GREENHOW, who had taken an active and zealous part in the promotion of the scheme, and finally that gentleman's scruples were overcome, and the double Ward was named "GREENHOW" Ward.









In 1893 the important step was taken with a view to move the Female Cancer Establishment to a separate building entirely devoted to the treatment of that disease. It was considered that the removal of these incurable cases from under the roof of the Hospital would be for their benefit in respect of health, comfort, and convenience, while the space thus set free would be available for other purposes. The generous offer by Mr. C. H. BERNERS of a seventy years' lease of some property in Nassau and Union Streets adjacent to the Hospital at a low rental was accepted, and it was decided to utilize the site for the erection of a block of Female Cancer Wards.

In support of this project a Festival Dinner was held in 1894 under the special patronage of HER LATE MAJESTY QUEEN VICTORIA, at which H.R.H. THE PRINCE OF WALES (now H.M. KING EDWARD VII.) presided, and was supported by numerous Governors and Friends of the Hospital. His Royal Highness made a strong appeal on behalf of the Special Fund for building the New Cancer Wing, with the result that over £9,300 was subscribed.

The foundation stone of the new building was laid with appropriate ceremony on 15th July, 1897, by H.R.H. THE PRINCESS CHRISTIAN, and on 1st January, 1900, the Female Cancer Patients were transferred from the old Wards to the commodious and well-equipped establishment in Nassau Street. It contains three Wards (bearing the original names) of twelve beds each, and two smaller Wards of two beds each, together with a small operating room for emergencies. There are also a large day-room for the use of patients not confined to bed, administrative offices, nurses' rooms, and kitchen. It is thus quite self-contained, having its own Nursing Staff, controlled by a Resident Matron, subject to the authority of the central administration, and a Medical Officer whose sole duty is the care of the Patients in this Wing, for which he also acts as Registrar.

Although in accordance with the trust there have from time to time ever since its earliest days been investigations into suggested (and occasionally very fanciful) methods of the treatment of Cancer, it has been left for these latter days to see the inauguration of a scheme for systematic inquiry into the nature of the disease, which was obviously one of the objects that the founder of the Charity had in view. The enlargement of the building afforded an opportunity to remedy this defect, for it was well recognised by the Governors that an Institution such as they had established offered inestimable advantages for such systematic study, both clinical and pathological. A Cancer Investigation Committee was formed, and a Research Laboratory instituted, of which Mr. A. G. R. FOULERTON was appointed the first Director. To him and to his successor in that office, Dr. LAZARUS BARLOW, together with the band of zealous workers who have been engaged in these laboratories, are owing the already published four volumes of Reports containing memoirs and records of considerable interest and value, which have more than justified the foundation of this Research Department, and which are full of promise for the future.

Cases of DISEASES IN CHILDREN had, until the year 1888, been under the care of the Assistant Obstetric Physician, but the growth of the work in the Obstetric Department caused his time to be fully taken up in attending Women Patients, the consequence being that the children were relegated to the care of the Obstetric House Physician. It seemed undesirable that this state of things should continue, both for the sake of the Patients, and also in the interests of the Students, who were thus deprived of tuition in a most important branch of medical practice. A special department was therefore formed, and placed under the charge of a fourth Assistant Physician, who was added to the Staff for the purpose. In the year 1904, 2,512 cases were treated in this Department.

In the year 1891 an "Old Student" was instrumental in obtaining the sum of 1,000 guineas towards the cost of such alterations as would allow of a special Ward being opened for Children; and it was decided to transfer certain of the Resident Officers to the Residential College which had recently been erected, and to utilize the space thereby obtained for a Children's Ward. In the following year the Ward was opened, and was subsequently, by permission of H.R.H. THE DUCHESS OF YORK (now PRINCESS OF WALES), named "PRINCESS MAY" Ward. It contains eight Medical and five Surgical Cots for the treatment of Infants of both sexes.

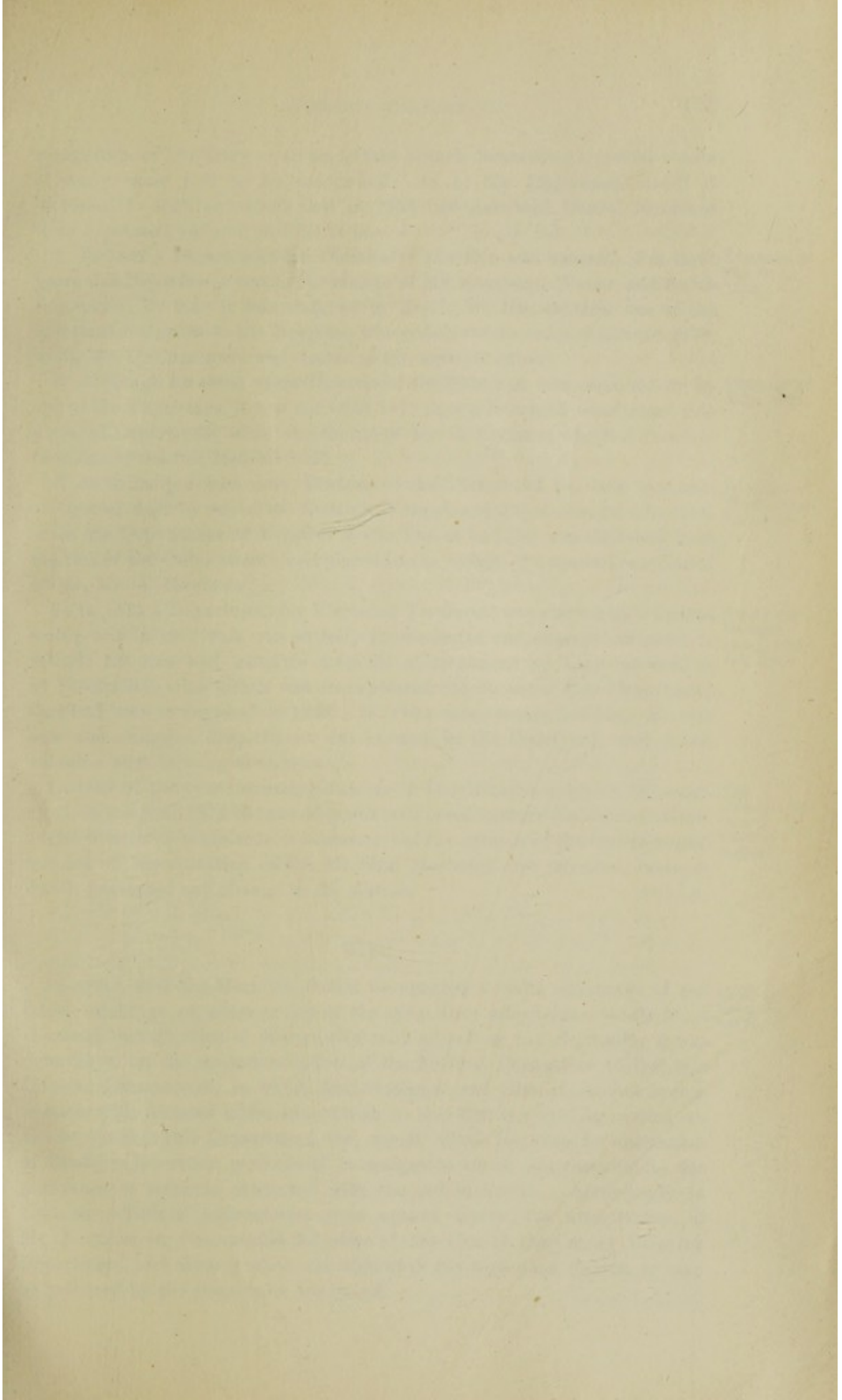

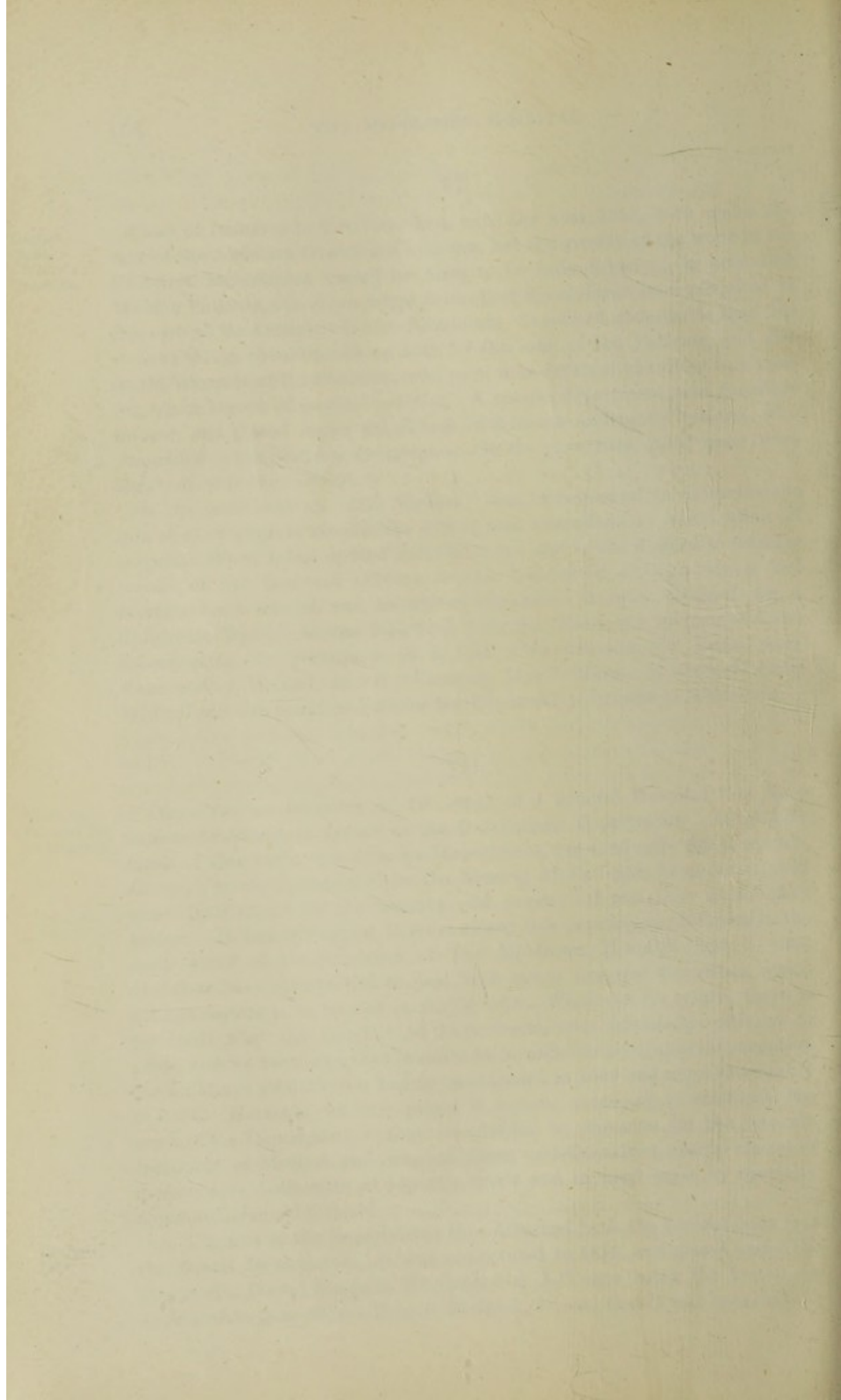
There are no branches of the work of a general Hospital that have increased so much in favour as the Out-Patient Departments. Originally much of this work was done by Dispensaries, but gradually the Hospitals, although primarily intended for the housing of Patients, have outstripped these Institutions in the amount and variety of Out-Door Relief they bestow. It does not appear to what extent this practice was followed in the early years of the existence of The Middlesex Hospital; but it must doubtless have always had to deal with minor Surgical Casualties, which did not require to be treated in the Wards. Whatever its origin, there is no doubt that the Out-Patient Department, once initiated, continued to grow, and we have seen that in order to furnish the needful accommodation the buildings allotted to it had to be extended in 1859 and more thoroughly in 1883. Moreover, as time passed it became necessary to subdivide the work of the Department, so that, in addition to provision for the separate treatment of Medical and Surgical Cases and Casualties, special classes of disease were dealt with at separate hours and in most cases by specially appointed Medical Officers.

1. The first of the Departments thus detached from the general body was the *Dental* Department. It was constituted in 1843, and placed under the charge of a Dental Surgeon, Mr. (later Sir) J. TOMES being the first to be appointed to that office. It may, we think, be said that it was here that the









recognition of Dentistry as an important branch demanding a special course of study came first to be recognised. As to the Department itself it increased to such an extent that in 1864 two Assistant Dental Surgeons were appointed, reduced in 1866 to one.

2. In 1862 a Department for Diseases of the Eye was opened. For three years this Department was in the charge of Mr. SOELBERG WELLS, and on his resignation in 1865 it was assigned to Mr. J. W. HULKE, then one of the Assistant Surgeons to the Hospital, who continued to conduct it until 1876, when Mr. G. CRITCHETT was elected to the separate office.

3. Although for some years Diseases of the Skin had been seen chiefly by one of the Physicians, it was not until 1879 that this branch was formed into a special Department under the charge of Dr. R. LIVING, who had recently been one of the full Medical Staff.

4. As in the previous cases, Diseases of the Throat and Ear had been seen on special days by one of the Assistant Surgeons or Physicians prior to 1880, when the Department of Diseases of the Throat and Ear was detached from the rest of the Out-Patients, and placed in the charge of a specially appointed officer, Mr. A. HENSMAN.

5. In 1885 a Department for Electrical Treatment was started on a limited scale; and in 1901 this was entirely reconstituted and enlarged in order to include the new and valuable methods of treatment by Light as well as by Electricity, with which was incorporated the Rontgen Ray Department that had been in vogue since 1896. In 1903 a temporary building for this new and enlarged Department was erected in the Courtyard, and much valuable work is being done there.

In view of the ever-increasing number of Out-Patients applying for treatment, in the year 1873 the question was considered how far these Out-Patients ought to receive gratuitous treatment; but the opinion of the Solicitors that the Act of Incorporation of the Hospital precluded any payment, however small, prevented any change in the system.

## VIII.

In order that the Hospital should be enabled to take advantage of the latest teachings of science, and at the same time afford opportunity for a thorough investigation of disease clinically as well as pathologically, it was determined on the recommendation of the Medical Committee to institute Clinical Laboratories, in which bacteriological and other researches in connection with diseases under observation in the Wards might be carried on. It was felt that this Department, too, would afford facilities for instruction of Students in certain methods of investigation which are essential to the pursuance of subjects connected with the public health. Accordingly in 1903 the Clinical Laboratories were opened under the directorship of Mr. FOULERTON, who vacated the office of Director of the Cancer Research Department, and already much valuable work has been done therein, as may be gathered by the Reports he has issued.

## IX.

Origin of  
the Medical  
School.

The part taken by a Hospital such as this in Medical Education has now to be considered, whereby it confers a special boon on Society, and in order to clearly describe the evolution of the Medical School of The Middlesex Hospital it will be necessary to glance back at its early history.

For almost from the very first it would appear that the Physician or Surgeon was entitled to introduce pupils to follow his practice in the Wards. Such pupils selected the "clinique" they wished to attend for six months or a year, the fees going to the Physician or Surgeon concerned. There were also "apprentices" and "dressers."

In 1774 the Students of the Hospital formed themselves into a Medical Society, and were permitted the use of the "Physicians' room to meet on two nights a week on condition that they should pay to the treasurer three guineas per quarter for the benefit of the charity," to which proposal the Quarterly Court agreed, with the proviso "That the Society would be at the expense of their own candles." It may be added that the Society, which still flourishes, celebrated its centenary in 1874, Mr. ANDREW CLARK, being then its President.

The Students, besides going round the Wards at other times, received instruction from the Apothecary and attended the operations and clinical lectures. These latter were instituted when the new building was opened in 1757 by Dr. HUGH SMITH, one of the Physicians, whose application was met by the Quarterly Court resolving "That the Physicians and Surgeons of this Hospital have liberty to read lectures on physic and surgery at this Hospital." The instruction was not entirely limited to clinical subjects, for we find that in 1796 a Chemical Laboratory was fitted up, and lectures on Chemistry delivered, whilst there seems to be no doubt that systematic instruction in Midwifery was given long before the Medical School was founded.

Up to the year 1835 there was no deficiency of pupils at The Middlesex Hospital. For a series of years the main supply was drawn from a celebrated school of medicine in Windmill Street, where the preliminary scientific subjects of the curriculum were taught. Upon the establishment in 1828 of the London University (now University College) the school in Windmill Street was broken up, and the Students of the London University sought their practical instruction in The Middlesex Hospital, but in 1834 the London University built a hospital of their own, and their Students no longer appeared in any numbers in the Wards of The Middlesex Hospital.

It was under these circumstances that in the summer of 1835, the Governors, encouraged by the success that had attended their efforts to enlarge and improve the Hospital, entertained the question of the establishment of a MEDICAL SCHOOL in connection with the Hospital. The Hospital requires a succession of Pupils, who should be educated and trained under the observation of the Physicians and Surgeons of the Institution; and Medical Attendants who have thus acquired a practical knowledge of their

profession are undoubtedly the most competent to take charge of individuals and large communities. It was therefore resolved, at a Quarterly Court in May, 1835, that a School should be erected by Subscription. By July the amount was such as to encourage the Governors to commence the buildings, which, under the superintendence of GEORGE BASEVI, Esq., the Architect, were completed by the 1st of October, when the Medical Session began.

It would occupy too much space to relate here the varying fortunes of the Medical School. There were years of great anxiety, when the entries of new Students fell to so low a number as not even to suffice to fill the few posts of resident officers to the Hospital, which form one of the main advantages of the connection between the two institutions. There were also years of prosperity, culminating in the eighties, when in point of numbers The Middlesex Hospital Medical School took a high position among the London Medical Schools. But throughout adversity and prosperity the institution, which was managed by a Committee formed of the Lecturing Staff, maintained a reputation for sound and thorough education, attracting to its service as teachers in subjects not dealt with by members of the Hospital Staff, men of eminence in their departments, and sending out every year well-trained medical men, whose subsequent careers have testified to the value of the training they had received.

It was not to be supposed that the buildings consisting of a Lecture Theatre, Laboratory, Dissecting Room, Library, and Museum, which were adequate for medical education in 1835, would always suffice. Yet apart from enlargement of the Museum in 1848 and again in 1860, but little addition was made to the original block until 1875, when another floor was added, and in 1880 when a new Lecture Theatre and Dissecting Room were built. The funds needed for these essential improvements were supplied by the Governors by way of loan, it being recognized that it was to the advantage of the Hospital that its School should be properly maintained.

On the Hospital acquiring the Lease of the Houses in Cleveland Street in 1885, the opportunity was seized for extending the Medical School. The Medical Authorities had long been of opinion that, if the School was to keep pace with the progress of similar institutions, more accommodation should be provided for the prosecution of the various studies. The Board of Governors, looking upon the interests of the School as intimately bound up with those of the Hospital, concurred in this view, and advanced a further loan to enable the School to erect a new Lecture Theatre, Library, Laboratory, and other Offices.

Until the year 1895 the School, which had been under the Management of the Medical Staff, was self-supporting, but in that year it became evident that it could not be carried on any longer in a satisfactory manner apart from financial assistance. Without this the necessary additions and improvements to the School Buildings and their equipment could not be made, and the salaries of the lecturers, who were required for giving instruction in the preliminary scientific part of the curriculum, could not be provided. The position was a critical one. On the one hand, the Hospital authorities were

convinced that the loss of the School would damage the Hospital, and on the other hand they doubted whether, having regard to the quasi-independent relation of the School to the Hospital, they would be justified in recommending the Governors to provide the moneys required to keep the School in existence. Accordingly, after prolonged conference between the Hospital and School Authorities, in which a leading part was taken by LORD SANDHURST and SIR RALPH THOMPSON, as Chairmen of the Weekly Board, it was decided that the time had come when a complete fusion should be effected. A Scheme of Amalgamation was prepared and approved by the Quarterly Court in August, 1896, whereby the Hospital took over all the property of the School and its liabilities, would receive the income, and after defraying the necessary expenses would provide a fixed annual sum for the remuneration of the Teaching Staff. The plan was to be subject to revision at the end of three years. The administration of the School was vested in a Council, on which the Weekly Board of Governors, the Medical Officers, and the Lecturers were represented.

The new body lost no time in setting the School in order, and the necessary additions and improvements to the School Buildings and their equipment were completed early in the year 1898. The new scheme of government has been found to work very satisfactorily, and according to the proposal some financial rearrangement was effected in 1902. It seems likely that in the near future the preliminary scientific subjects of the curriculum, of which the maintenance forms no inconsiderable item of the Annual Expenditure, will cease to be taught in any of the Medical Schools of London, and be transferred to central institutions. In that case it is hoped that the School may again become self-supporting.

The Anatomical and Pathological Museum, which, as seen, formed part of the original block of buildings, was founded on the collections of the late Dr. SWEATMAN, Mr. LANGSTAFF and others, and has been continually enriched by additions to the specimens. In 1884 its valuable contents were catalogued by Dr. FOWLER and Mr. BLAND-SUTTON at a total cost of £250, towards which, the Museum being the property of the Hospital, the Governors made a grant of £100.

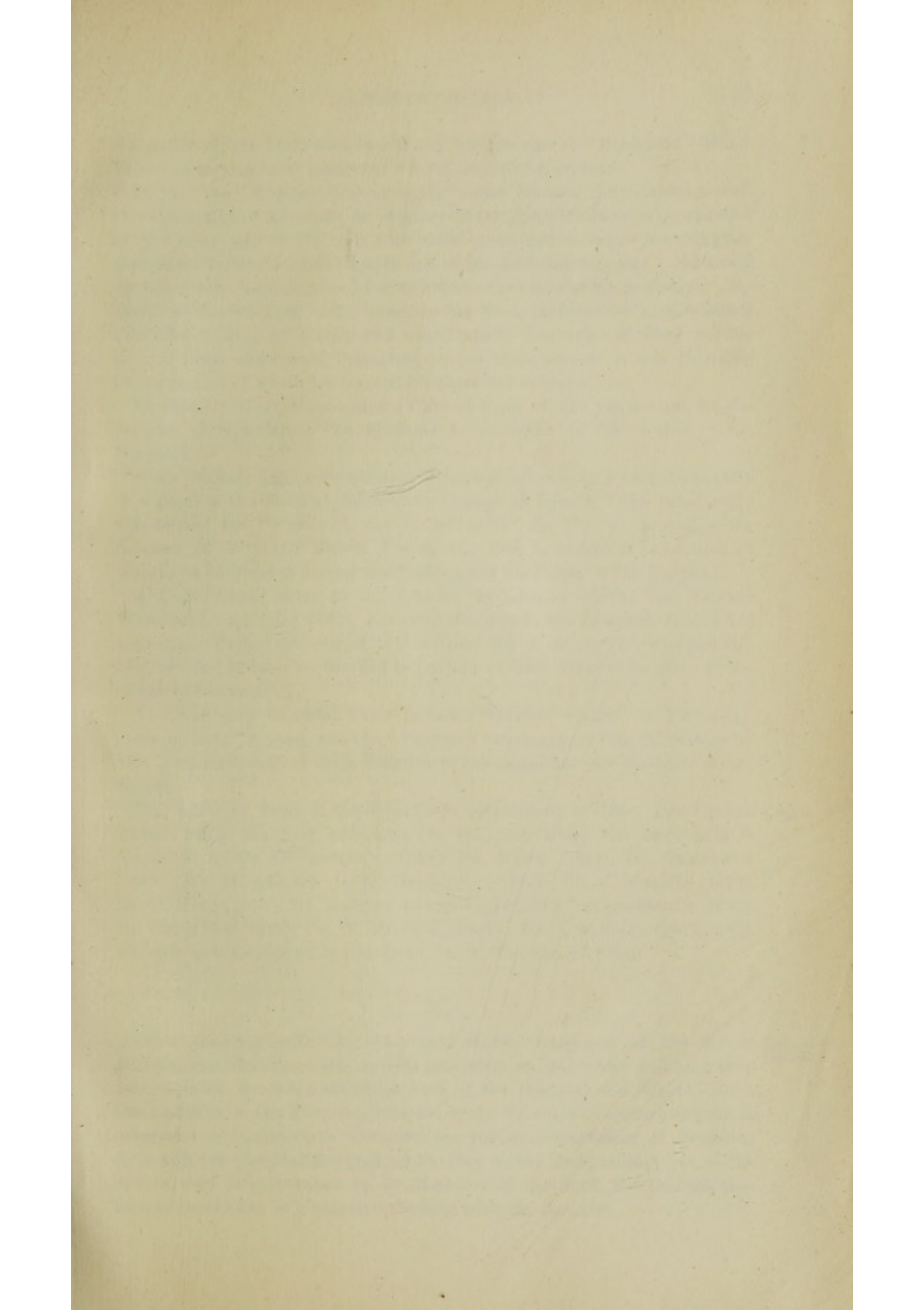
In 1896 the first Number of "The Middlesex Hospital Journal" was published, the need of such a periodical being felt by the Students, with whom it originated. The most active promoter of its publication was Mr. LEOPOLD HUDSON, whose early death, which occurred before the second issue, was deeply felt.

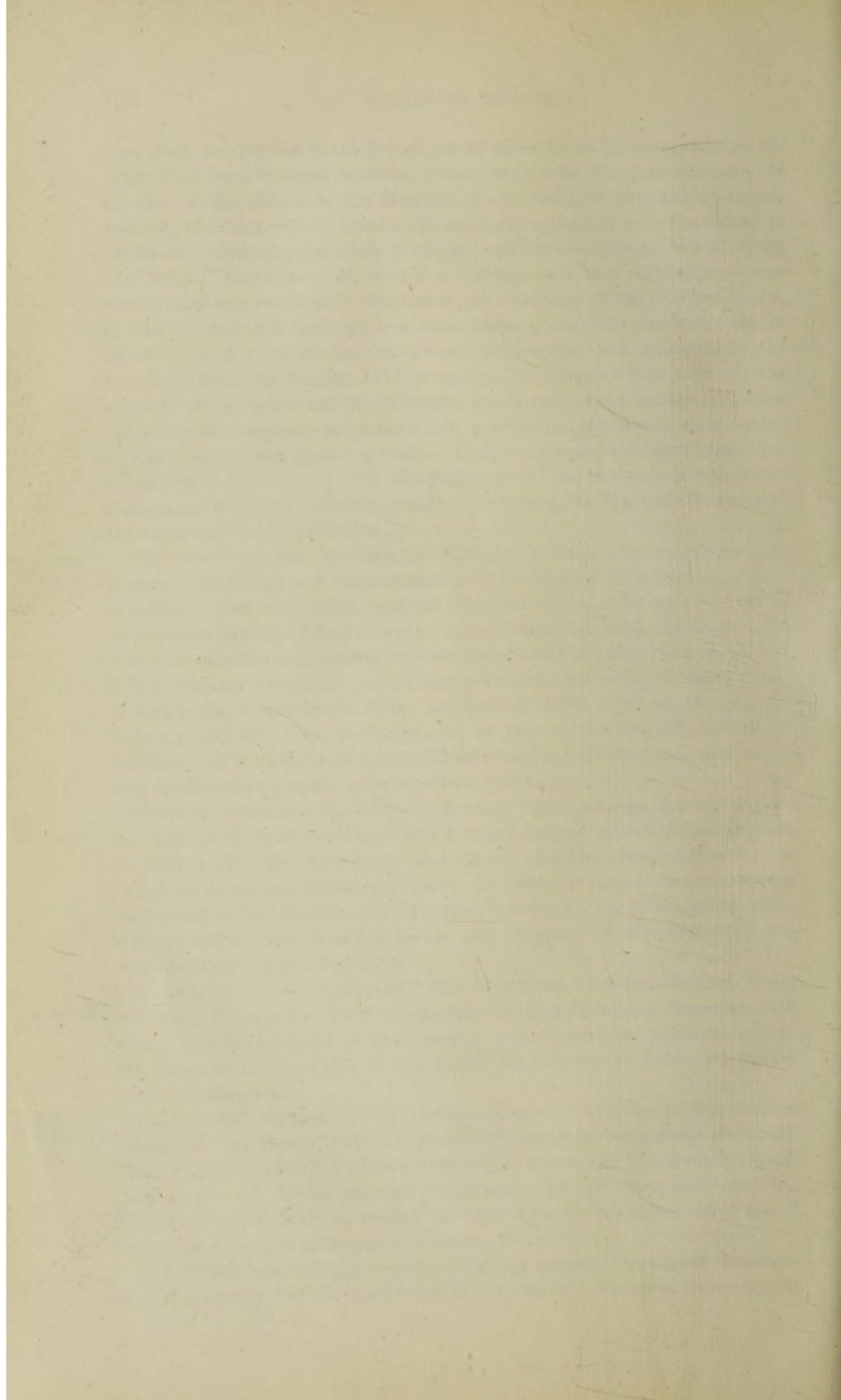

The interest evinced by the Governors in the fortunes of the Medical School has been shown in the foundation of awards to meritorious Students. Thus we find in 1850 Mr. MICHAEL SMITH, a member of the Weekly Board, gave a prize of £5 for general proficiency. In 1851 was instituted the "TREASURERS' PRIZE," succeeded in 1859 by the "GOVERNORS' PRIZE," which has ever since been annually awarded.

In 1872 two scholarships were founded and named "BRODERIP SCHOLARSHIPS," in memory of the munificent Benefactor Mr. FRANCIS BRODERIP, in









whose honour the Male Accident Ward was also named "BRODERIP" Ward. In the same year were instituted "ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS."

In 1873 the "MURRAY SCHOLARSHIPS" were founded (in connection with the University of Aberdeen) in memory of Dr. JOHN MURRAY, who had died at the early age of 29. All who were privileged to know Dr. MURRAY recognized in him a man of genius and of the most untiring zeal. He would doubtless have become one of the brightest ornaments of his profession. By means of the Scholarship his memory has been perpetuated as an abiding incentive to diligent labour and conscientious discharge of duty on the part of those who should thereafter pursue their studies at this Hospital, to the service of which he devoted his short but valuable life.

In 1884 Dr. HETLEY presented a Clinical Prize of £25 per annum, for the purpose of stimulating the Students to efficiency in the Wards of the Hospital.

Since the year 1885 a Foundation Scholarship has been awarded annually to a pupil of the Medical Benevolent College at Epsom. The Scholarship was named the "FREER LUCAS SCHOLARSHIP" in 1893 to perpetuate the memory of WILLIAM FREER LUCAS, the first to obtain it, who died of diphtheria contracted during the discharge of his duties in the Hospital.

A Gold Medal, value £5 5s., founded in memory of the late ROBERT WISHART LYELL (died 1882), Assistant Surgeon to the Hospital, is awarded annually. Under the will of his brother, Mr. J. W. LYELL, who recently died, a sum has been bequeathed to provide a money prize to be given to the holder of the medal.

To these may be added the "LEOPOLD HUDSON PRIZE" in Pathology, given by Mrs. HUDSON, and the "FREEMAN SCHOLARSHIP" in Midwifery by Mrs. FREEMAN, each of them founded to commemorate past Students of the School.

The office of Dean of the School was established in 1856, Dr. TEMPLE Deans, FRERE being the first nominated to the post, which has been held in succession by Dr. GOODFELLOW (1858), Mr. NUNN (1859), Dr. GREENHOW (1868), Mr. H. ARNOTT (1870), Dr. CAYLEY (1871), Dr. J. MURRAY (1873), Dr. R. KING (1874), Mr. ANDREW CLARK (1876), Mr. PEARCE GOULD (1886), Dr. COUPLAND (1892), Dr. W. PASTEUR (1896), Mr. J. MURRAY (1902), with whom is now associated as Sub-Dean, Dr. P. THOMPSON (1904).

## X.

Simultaneously with the Cleveland Street Extension of the School Buildings in 1885 there was carried into effect an idea which had long been contemplated by the Authorities both of the Hospital and School. On a site rented from the Hospital, adjacent to the School, was erected by private enterprise a RESIDENTIAL COLLEGE for the accommodation of Students. Although the Hospital accepted no liability in the undertaking, yet, as the Shares were largely taken up by Members of the Staff, the College may fitly be mentioned in a narrative dealing with the Hospital.

The College itself is an imposing red-brick Building overlooking the Garden, with accommodation for thirty Students, and was designed by Mr. K. D. YOUNG, Architect to the Hospital. When the Resident Officers were deprived of their quarters in the Hospital, to make way for the new Children's Ward, they were transferred to rooms in the College, which were connected with the main Building by a system of electric bells, and subsequently by telephone, so that the Officers could be summoned as readily as if they were residing in the Hospital. Accommodation is also provided in the College for the Extern Clerks attending Maternity cases at the Patients' homes.

## XI.

Adminis-  
tration.

The affairs of the Hospital are administered by a Board of Governors, appointed at the February Court in each year. The Board meets every week for the transaction of business, and elects its own Chairman and Deputy-Chairman. It has been fortunate in having been presided over by Chairmen of great practical sagacity, who have taken the keenest interest in the Institution, and spared neither time nor pains to promote its welfare. The gentlemen who have held this office during the past fifty years have been Mr. MICHAEL SMITH (1851 to 1866), Major A. H. ROSS, M.P. (1867 to 1888), LORD SANDHURST (1888 to 1894, and 1902 to 1904), SIR RALPH THOMPSON, K.C.B. (1895 to 1902), and LORD CHEYLESMORE (1904).

The Weekly Board, in respect to all questions involving the treatment of the Patients, is in harmonious accord with the Medical Committee, to whom such matters are referred, and by whom recommendations and nominations are made.

The Chief Executive Officer is the Secretary-Superintendent, the Medical management being entrusted to the Resident Medical Officer, and that of the Nursing Department to the Lady Superintendent of Nursing, on office which about thirty-five years ago was substituted for that of Matron.

Formerly elections to the Honorary Staff were made by the votes of the whole body of Governors, a cumbrous method not invariably calculated to result in the appointment of the best qualified candidate. In 1879 this plan was, by a resolution of the Quarterly Court replaced by one which is both more equitable and more rational. An Election Committee was constituted, consisting of twelve representatives of the Governors nominated by the Court, six by the Weekly Board, and six by the Medical Committee, the nominations being made annually in May.

In 1902 the Laws of the Hospital were remodelled and moulded in their present form by a Committee consisting of SIR ARTHUR WATSON, Bart., K.C., Mr. W. E. GILLET, and Lt.-Col. T. LAMBERT MEARS, M.A., LL.D.

As regards the control over the Expenditure and the keeping of the Accounts, the Board of Governors have always exercised a rigorous supervision. From time to time the Management has been the subject of favourable criticism from outside persons. In the year 1874 SIR SYDNEY WATERLOW, at a Meeting of the Council of the Metropolitan Hospital





and the people of the United States have been the subject of much discussion and debate. Sunday Fund (whose timely aid has often enabled the Hospital to meet the yearly expenditure without trenching on capital), mentioned this Institution as one of the best managed in London.

In the year 1892 the office of Steward was abolished, the duties previously discharged by that functionary being committed into the direct charge of the Secretary-Superintendent, whose staff was reinforced by the additional appointment of another Clerk.

In the year 1892 a change was made in the system of keeping the Accounts, in accordance with a form drawn up by the Committee of Hospital Secretaries with a view to introduce a uniformity of system in all Hospitals. Another change was made in the abolition of the office of Collector, and the appointment of a Collecting Clerk under the direct supervision of the Secretary-Superintendent.

An important question in regard to the diet of Patients was raised by Mr. GEORGE STURGE in the year 1885. That gentleman, whose name will ever be remembered in connection with this Institution for his generous benefactions, as well as for the genuine interest which in other ways he evinced in its welfare, drew attention to the success which had attended the efforts of other charities in the reduction of expenditure on wines, spirits, and beer; at the same time expressing his regret that similar results had not been obtained at other Hospitals, including The Middlesex. The Board at once instituted an investigation into the question of consumption of alcoholic liquors, and were able to give Mr. STURGE a far from unsatisfactory answer, showing a steady decrease in the expenditure under this head in the previous ten years. The cost per Patient (exclusive of the Cancer Patients) was found to be 1s. 10d., a figure which compared very favourably with the results for other large Hospitals. Wines and spirits are regarded as articles of medicine, and are issued as such by the Dispenser, only upon written order of the Medical Authority, a record being kept of such issues and returned weekly both to the Board of Governors and to the Medical Committee.

## XII.

The growth of a Hospital is represented by the additions that are found to be necessary to the Staff of Medical Men as the number of Patients increases and special Departments are opened up; and The Middlesex Hospital, which in its first decade was fully equipped with a Staff of three Physicians, three Surgeons, a Physician Man-Midwife, a Resident Apothecary, and a "House-Pupil," has now come to employ a Staff (including Resident Officers) of no less than 40 members of the Medical Profession, the majority of whom give their services "without fee or reward." No better proof could be given of the amount of work required for the efficient administration of the Institution and of the wide expansion of its benefits.

The Medical Staff.

The records show that although the Honorary Staff normally comprised three full Physicians, three Surgeons, and a Physician-Accoucheur, yet from

time to time and for varying periods there have been four Physicians or four Surgeons. In all, since its foundation there have been fifty-five Physicians and thirty-three Surgeons in office, the latter having served on an average for longer terms than the former, one indeed, Mr. SAMUEL HOWARD, holding office for the space of fifty-one years, from 1759 to 1810. It may be well to record the names of a few who have added lustre to the Hospital by their personal character and scientific attainments. Amongst the *Physicians* may be named RICHARD WARREN (1756 to 1758), LUCAS PEPYS (1769 to 1775), H. R. REYNOLDS (1773 to 1777), JOHN LATHAM (1789 to 1793), HENRY VAUGHAN (1793 to 1800), PETER M. LATHAM (1815 to 1824), H. H. SOUTHEY (1815 to 1827), F. HAWKINS (1824 to 1858), THOS. WATSON (1827 to 1843), A. P. STEWART (1855 to 1866), S. J. GOODFELLOW (1858 to 1871), H. THOMPSON (1859 to 1879), C. MURCHISON (1866 to 1870), E. H. GREENHOW (1871 to 1879), J. MURRAY, Assistant Physician (1871 to 1873). Amongst the *Surgeons* are the names of CHAS. BELL (1814 to 1836), JOHN SHAW (1825 to 1827), H. MAYO (1827 to 1842), JAS. M. ARNOTT (1833 to 1848), ALEX. SHAW (1842 to 1869), C. DE MORGAN (1848 to 1876), C. H. MOORE (1849 to 1870), J. W. HULKE (1870 to 1895), G. LAWSON (1873 to 1895); and amongst Assistant Surgeons W. H. FLOWER (1858 to 1862), R. W. LYELL (1879 to 1882), and C. L. HUDSON (1895 to 1897). The list of *Physician-Accoucheurs* includes the names of THOS. DENMAN (1769 to 1783), S. MERRIMAN (1809 to 1826), who subsequently became Treasurer to the Hospital, CHAS. WEST (1847 to 1850), TEMPLE FRERE (1850 to 1861), W. PRIESTLEY (1861 to 1863), J. HALL DAVIS (1863 to 1883), and A. W. EDIS (1883 to 1889).

The office of *Assistant Physician* was first established in 1840, when Dr. MERVYN CRAWFORD was appointed. There continued to be one Assistant Physician until 1853, when a second was appointed. In 1863 the number was increased to three and in 1889 to four. There was an *Assistant Surgeon* in 1746 and again in 1806, but the office was not permanently created until 1831, Mr. J. M. ARNOTT being the first holder. In 1858 the number was increased to two, and in 1894 to three. The office of *Assistant Obstetric Physician* was created in 1874, there having been previously only one Physician to this Department.

Reference has already been made to the special Departments, most of which are of comparatively recent origin, and the formation of which has considerably increased the Staff of Honorary Officers.

## Anæsthetist

The first appointment of an *Anæsthetist* was made in 1874, the number of such officers being increased to two in 1885, and to three in 1895.

## Registrars.

The first incumbent of the office of *Registrar* was Mr. S. W. SIBLEY in 1853, and he continued to act in this capacity until 1861. The records show that there was also at intervals a Surgical Registrar, of whom the first to hold office was Mr. D. B. BALDING in 1855, but it was not until 1867 that the permanent introduction of a Medical and a Surgical Registrar was made. To these have now been recently added an Obstetric Registrar. The duty of performing the post-mortem examinations devolved upon the Registrars

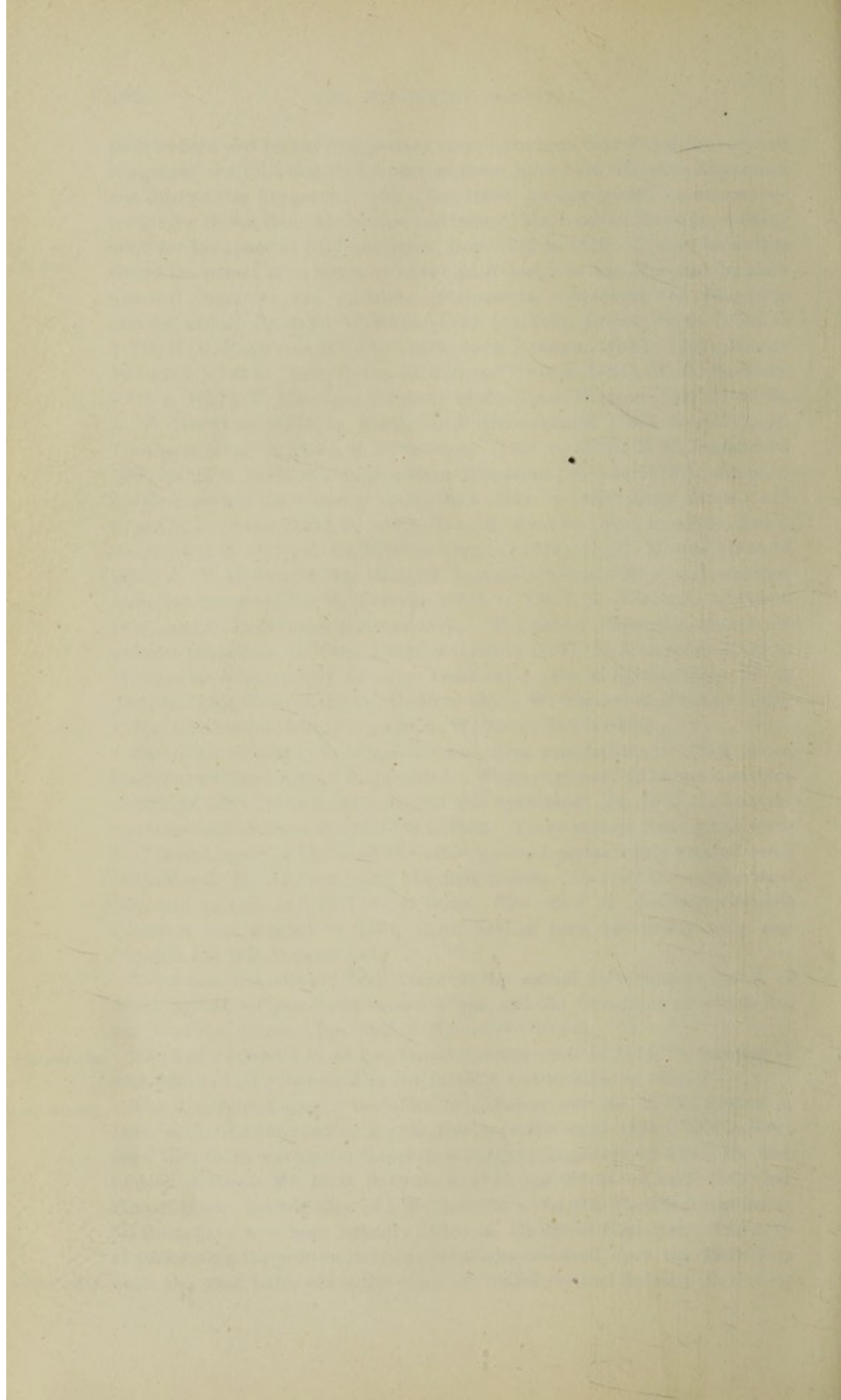

*Curator of the Museum.* It must not be omitted to mention that from 1867 to the present time one part of the duty of the Registrars has been to publish annual reports. With the commencement (in 1903) of the publication of the "Archives of the Middlesex Hospital" these reports are now embodied in that production, of which some four volumes are issued yearly, including the Reports of the Cancer Research Department, and contributions on clinical and pathological subjects by members of the Staff.

Lastly, reference may be made to the Resident Officers. From the beginning there has been a *Resident Medical Officer*, until 1886 styled "apothecary." In 1890 the offices of *Casualty Medical* and *Surgical Officers* were created, owing to the great increase of the numbers attending these departments. Of the Junior Resident Appointments that of *House Surgeon* dates back the farthest, for in 1757, when the Hospital acquired its building, the post was created under the title of "House Pupil." Its tenure was for about a year, the appointment being made to each Surgeon in turn. From the year 1823 two House Surgeons were appointed annually, at an interval between each of six months, and this arrangement of Senior and Junior House Surgeon lasted for more than fifty years, when the change was made to the present plan of a House Surgeon to each of the Surgeons, and holding office for six months. It was not until 1859 that the office of *House Physician* (then termed "Resident Medical Assistant") was created, the duties now discharged by the holders having been performed by the Resident Apothecary. There are three such officers, one to each Physician, and also an *Obstetric House Physician*. The recent creation of the office of House Surgeon and Registrar to the Cancer Wing completes the tale of such Appointments.

### XIII.

The question of the Nursing Department came under consideration during the first year of the late Major Ross's long tenure of office as Chairman of the Weekly Board, with the result that it was reorganized and placed on a better basis under the control of a Lady Superintendent, an office to which the first appointment was made in May, 1867. As already mentioned, the Nurses' Home was opened in 1869 by H.R.H. THE PRINCESS MARY OF CAMBRIDGE. In 1870 there was instituted the system of addition to the Regular Nursing Staff of a certain number of Lady Probationers, who on payment of a fee, were employed in the service of the Hospital for a definite period, and were thus enabled to gain experience in sick-nursing as well as to afford material assistance in the work of the Wards.

About the year 1872 considerable difficulty was experienced in procuring NURSES, and in retaining their services when trained. The general Public were awaking to the immense importance of skilful nursing, as well as of medical treatment; and consequently there was much inducement for those who had passed a few years at a Hospital to leave it, and join some association for providing private persons with Nurses, and thereby emancipate

themselves from the restraint and discipline which are essential to the well-being of a large Institution. With a view to improve the position of the Nurses, and to offer more inducement to them to give the Hospital the benefit of their mature experience, it was decided to devote the fees paid by the Lady Probationers to the formation of a Fund from which pensions and gratuities should be granted to such of the Nursing Staff as should have completed certain fixed terms of satisfactory service. Later on considerable improvements were made in the Nurses' quarters, and in the year 1878 the new buildings in Cleveland Street were opened, containing six additional bedrooms for Lady Probationers and eight for Nurses, and also a new day room, tastefully furnished at the expense of Miss CAVENDISH BENTINCK, a well-known Benefactress of the Hospital.

Another use made of the Lady Probationer Fee Fund was the institution of Lectures to the Nurses by Members of the Medical Staff, which have continued with signal success to the present day, Certificates being granted to such Nurses as have attended the Course of Lectures.

In 1886 a new departure was taken, which has been thoroughly justified by its results. The tendency on the part of Nurses to attach themselves to Nursing Institutions, rather than continue in the service of the Hospital, led the Governors to consider whether such an Institution could not be founded in direct communication with this Hospital. A building was accordingly erected adjoining the Nurses' Home, and was opened in the following year as an Institution for supplying Nurses, who should have been thoroughly trained in the Hospital, to the general Public. From that time forward the Institute has been a signal success, amply repaying the expenses incurred on its behalf; providing as it does for the requirements of sick persons of more or less affluent circumstances, by whom the Nurses' services are greatly appreciated, and affording to the Nurses (after five, or in some cases three years' training) a comfortable home and remunerative occupation for their years of activity, and an assured pension in old age.

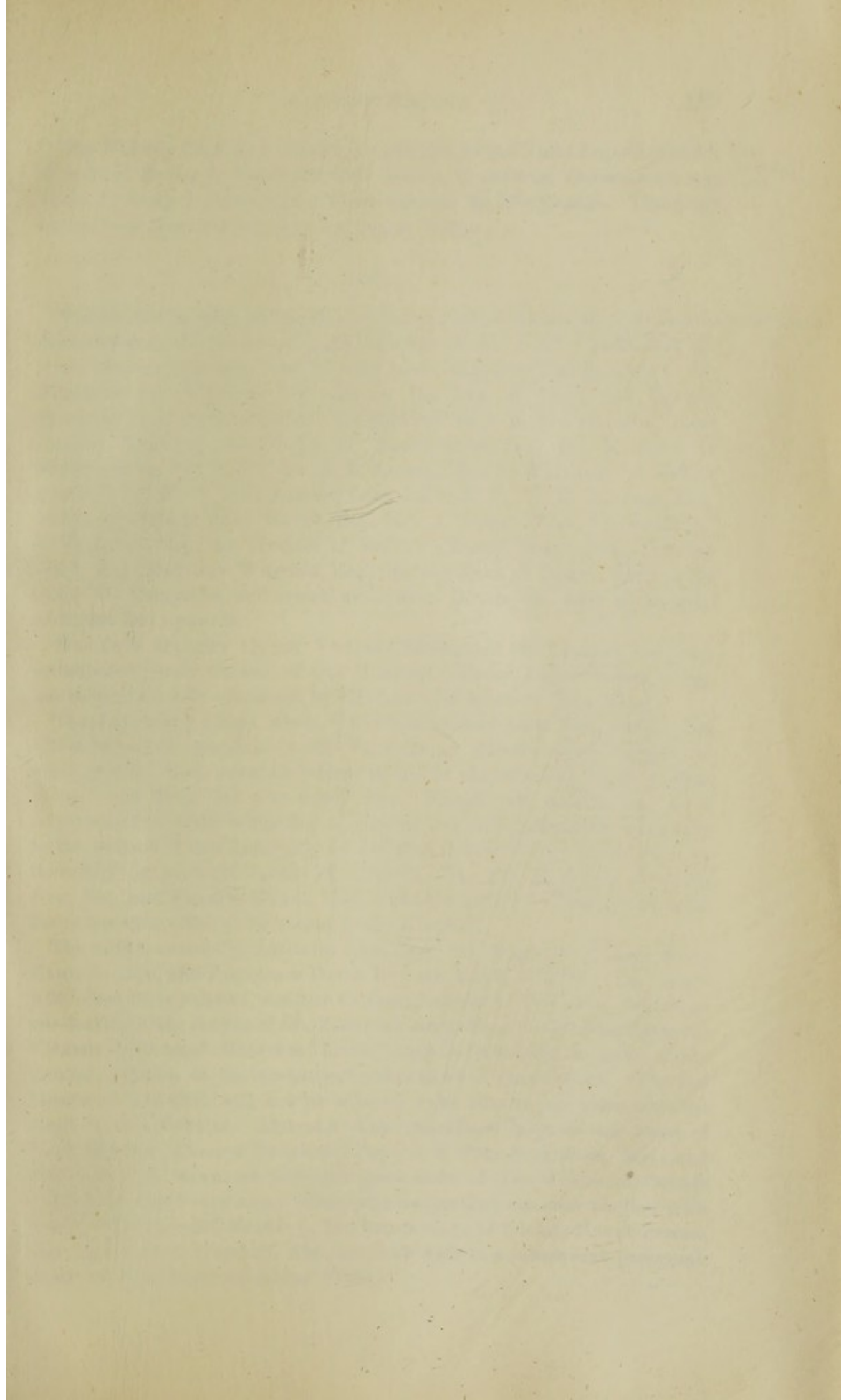
The Management and Finances of the Trained Nurses' Institute are entirely under the control of the Governors, and a table of Income and Expenditure is published annually with the Hospital Accounts.

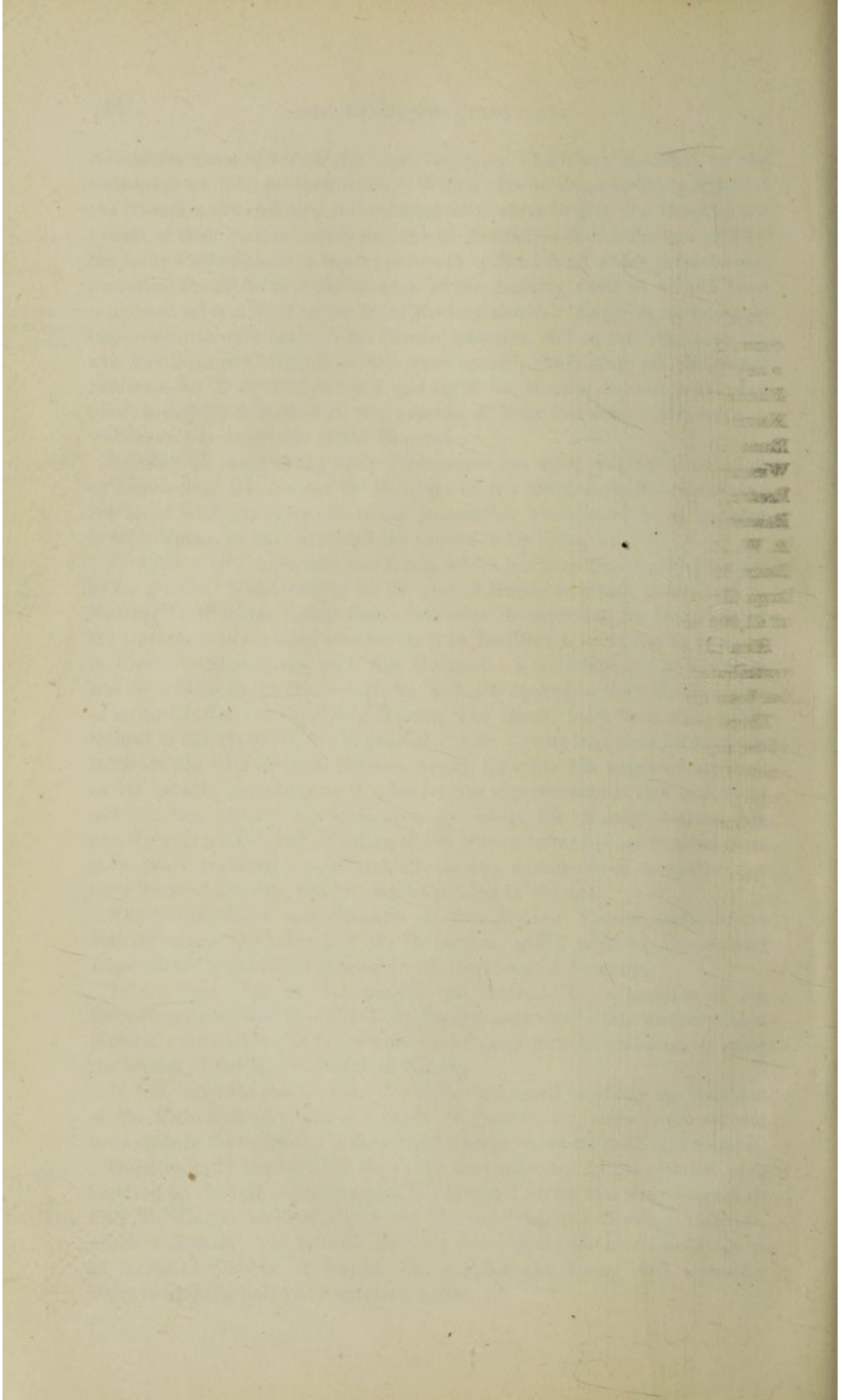
In the year 1892 an arrangement was made, at the suggestion of the Lady-Superintendent, by which Lady Probationers who had shown exceptional promise were enabled, at the completion of their term of training, to enter the service of the Hospital as Staff Nurses.

In the year 1893 the Nursing Committee examined carefully the question of the Nurses' dietary, and as a result of their report, some improvements were made in the meals and in the refreshment provided for the Night Nurses.

Quite recently the Nursing Home has been extended by the erection of a building on the last remaining plot in Cleveland Street that was unoccupied. This building is architecturally in keeping with the Nursing Institute, which it adjoins. The addition not only provides for the accommodation of an increased number of Nurses, but supplies the Home with a greatly improved dining hall and recreation rooms.









The Nursing Staff now consists, in addition to the Night Superintendent, <sup>The Nursing Staff,</sup> of 9 Head Nurses or Sisters, 62 Staff Nurses, 37 ordinary Probationers, and 16 to 20 Lady Probationers. There are also 10 Wardmaids. These are exclusive of those employed in the Cancer Wing.

## XIV.

Besides the several Philanthropic persons whose names occur in various <sup>Benefactors</sup> connections in the foregoing pages, mention should not be omitted of the many Donors, who from time to time have contributed large sums to the Funds of the Hospital. Of such are the Rev. F. JACOX and LUDWIG NEUMANN, Esq., both of whom have endowed Beds in the Hospital, LORD ROBERT SEYMOUR, the DUKE OF NORTHUMBERLAND, the MARQUIS OF WESTMINSTER, "D. T. S." Rev. E. R. JODRELL, SIR R. WALLACE, "A Suffolk Rector," "T. W. R.," SIR ELLIOTT LEES, Bart., M.P., W. H. JOHNSON, Esq., BARON DE HIRSCH, JOHN MAPLE, Esq., Mrs. A. TOWRY HALL, "CAMBRIDGE," A. W. DAVIS, Esq., the Trustees of Smith's Charity, Kensington, TIMOTHY BEAN, Esq., MATTHEW WHITING, Esq., the 16th EARL OF DERBY, many of the large City Companies, and several anonymous Donors who have given sums of £1,000 and upwards.

HER LATE MAJESTY QUEEN VICTORIA throughout the whole of her reign contributed yearly the sum of One Hundred Guineas, a contribution which has been graciously continued by HIS GRACIOUS MAJESTY THE KING.

There are many others whose contributions may have been smaller, but whose names are recorded in the REGISTER OF BENEFACTIONS, though, for want of space, their generous actions cannot be chronicled at length in these pages; and there are also many who, though not making any great contribution directly to the Funds, have no less contributed most materially to the welfare of this Institution by exerting themselves in various ways on its behalf: of such are JOSEPH W. THRUPP, Esq., SIR E. SCOTT, RUTHVEN PYM, Esq., and FRANCIS HOARE, Esq., who successively for long periods filled the responsible office of Treasurer to the Hospital.

The most noteworthy LEGACIES have been the Bequests of Miss MARY EASON in 1890, and PROFESSOR DAVID HUGHES, F.R.S., in 1900. The former will, when fully realized, amount to nearly £90,000; the latter consists of one-fourth of the residue of the Testator's large estate, which constitutes the "DAVID E. HUGHES' HOSPITAL TRUST," and is intended to make a substantial addition to the permanent endowment of the Hospital. The full benefit of this Gift will not be enjoyed until twenty-one years after the death of the Testator. Amongst other munificent bequests are those of LADY MURRAY, FRANCIS BRODERIP, Esq., J. F. PIKE SCRIVENER, Esq., and Mrs. ISABELLA CHANDLESS, who each gave sums of Ten Thousand Pounds and upwards, and very many others who bequeathed amounts varying from Ten to Ten Thousand Pounds. The benefactions of the late HENRY SPICER, Esq., and EDMOND DRESDEN, Esq., are dealt with in a subsequent paragraph under the Heading of Samaritan Fund.



A glance at the yearly Accounts will show how important a part these and other pious Bequests have had in the maintenance of the revenues of the Hospital; in fact, but for them the scale of its operations must have been much reduced.

## XV.

Entertain-  
ments in  
aid of the  
Hospital.

To assist in defraying the expenses occasioned by the enlargement and improvements of the Hospital, CONCERTS and other ENTERTAINMENTS have from time to time been given in Aid of the Funds of the Charity, which have been supported by distinguished patronage and by marked liberality. In 1757 we find a record of Mr. DAVID GARRICK having given the Hospital the proceeds of an Entertainment at his Theatre, and in 1791 a contribution of £1,000 was made by the Directors of the Sacred Concerts in Westminster Abbey. To LORD ROBERT SEYMOUR the Hospital is greatly indebted for the success of the Concert at the King's Theatre, in the year 1808, which produced, after all expenses were paid, the sum of £2,498, and thus enabled the Hospital to get rid of a large accumulation of debt. In the year 1854 a performance of Mendelssohn's "Elijah," at Exeter Hall, produced the sum of £1,517; and in 1858 the St. James's Hall was opened by Concerts in aid of this Charity, under the patronage of HER MAJESTY and the PRINCE CONSORT, which produced a clear profit of £1,185. Since that time the Hospital has continually received substantial aid from Musical and Dramatical Societies, which have generously devoted the proceeds of their Entertainments to the funds of the Hospital. In 1887 a most successful Concert was held at the Albert Hall, under the direction of SIR ARTHUR SULLIVAN, at which the CROWN PRINCE OF GERMANY and a large number of the Nobility and Gentry were present, and which realized over £500.

It is gratifying also to record that for some years the Hospital has been benefited by the proceeds of a Smoking Concert annually organised by the Students, which has proved in every respect very successful.

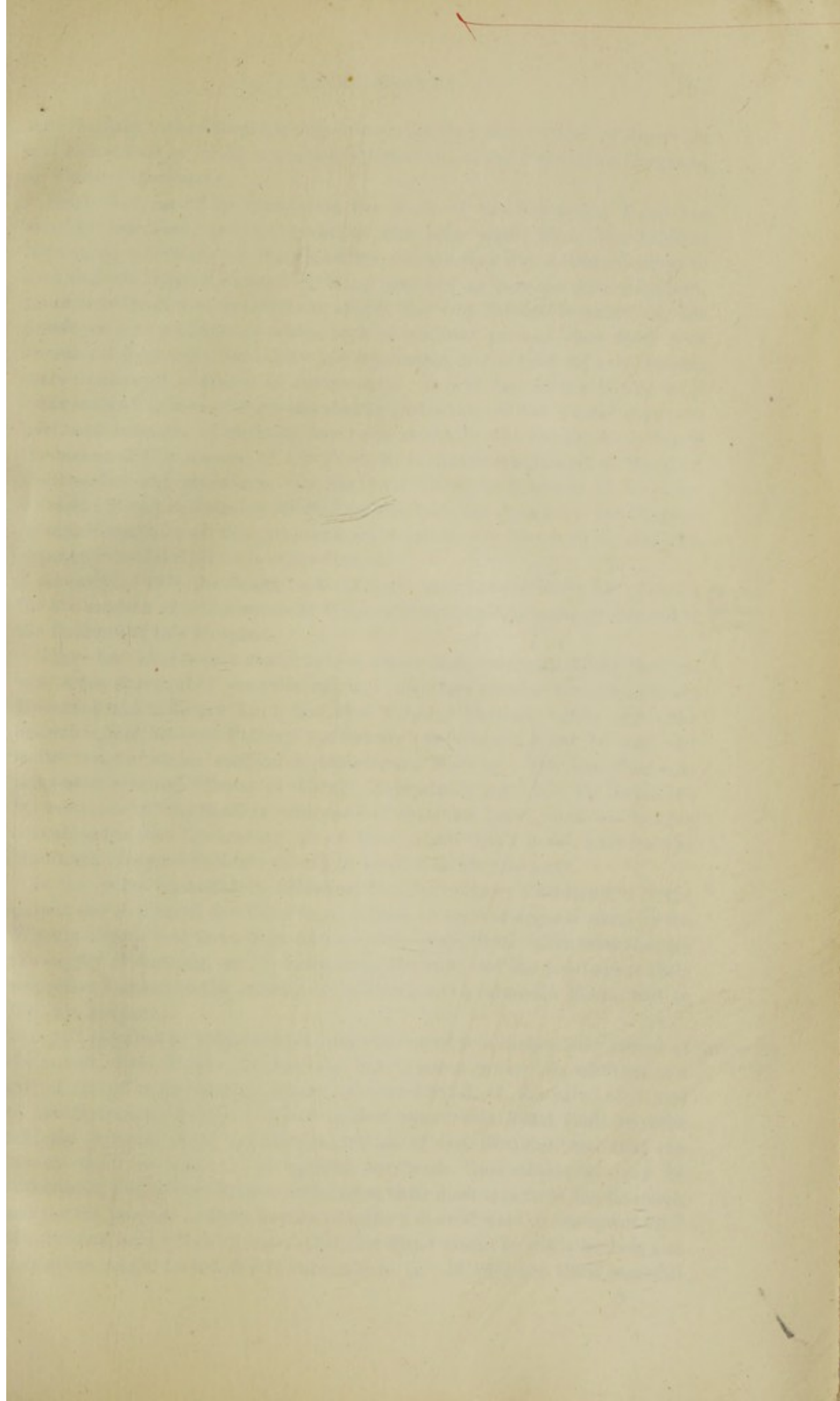
## XVI.

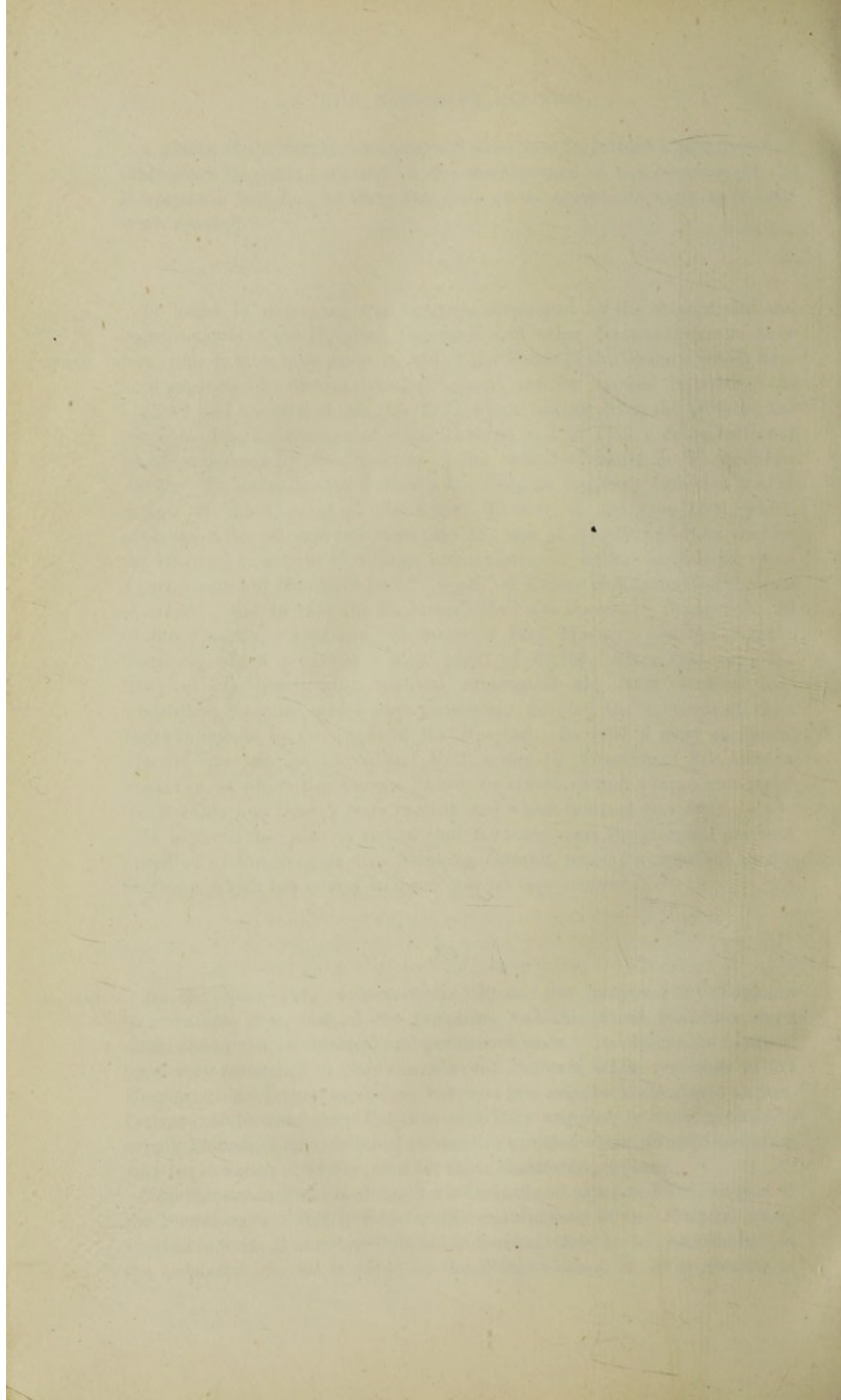
Samaritan  
Fund.

In the year 1812 a SAMARITAN FUND was proposed by RICHARD CARTWRIGHT, Esq., one of the Surgeons, and this Fund has since been established upon an enlarged and permanent basis. Its objects are to afford temporary assistance to poor convalescent Patients, whose residence in the Hospital is no longer necessary, but who still require Medical Aid as Out-Patients; to forward poor Patients, especially cripples, to their homes; to supply Flannel, Linen, or other necessities to those whose diseased condition may require such comforts; and for other charitable purposes.

The Samaritan Fund is altogether a distinct and separate Fund, no part of the Donations or Subscriptions for the maintenance of the Hospital being applicable to it; it is not distributed indiscriminately to all applicants, but the assistance granted is voted by the Weekly Board, on the application of









the Chaplain, either from his own knowledge that the Patient is deserving and necessitous, or on the recommendation of one of the Physicians, Surgeons, or Visiting Governors.

Since the year of its foundation the work of the Samaritan Fund has steadily increased, and no deviation has been made from the original benevolent intentions of the Founders, except that the assistance given to convalescent Patients, instead of being confined to mere pecuniary support, granted to those who were able to attend the Out-Patient Department, has developed into a system of taking such necessitous persons from their own homes, too frequently unhealthy and depressing, to the fresh air and pleasant surroundings of a Home in the country. It is in fact chiefly to this truly "Samaritan" branch of the work that special attention has of late years been paid, and a number of Patients has been annually distributed, according to the means at the disposal of the Fund, to Convalescent Homes at Margate, Eastbourne, and elsewhere. In the year 1893 the Trustees of the Convalescent Home at Swanley allotted twenty beds for the use of the Patients of this Hospital, and this generous act relieved the Fund of considerable expense for subscriptions to other Homes.

As early as 1877 the Board took the first steps toward securing premises for the erection of a Convalescent Home which should be entirely devoted to the Patients of this Hospital. Conva-  
lescent  
Home.

There had long been a desire to have such a Home, where not only Patients who were thoroughly convalescent, and therefore suitable for Convalescent Homes of the ordinary kind, but also Surgical Patients before and after operation, and Medical Patients not strictly convalescent could be sent and could remain under medical treatment and nursing. The site then contemplated was one offered at Hemel Hempstead, but after an inspection by members of the Staff it was decided that the great need for London convalescents was the bracing air of the sea, and that a home built for The Middlesex Hospital Patients should be located on the sea-coast.

In the years immediately following the preliminary consideration of the project the receipts of the Fund were so poor, in spite of appeals made by the Weekly Board, that there were no means for expenditure other than that for the supply of clothing, etc., to necessitous Patients, and the journeys to their respective homes; so the scheme of building a Convalescent Home had to fall into abeyance.

A gift received in 1884 formed a pleasing relief in a melancholy period of the annals of the Fund. In that year MR. GEORGE STURGE, in addition to a gift of £3,000 to the General Funds, presented Stock of the value of £1,000 to the Samaritan Fund on the condition that "this Fund shall be kept entirely separate from the General Funds of the Hospital, and that the income shall be paid to, or applied for, such In-Patients as may be necessitous, and within three months from their discharge from the Hospital, and for the purpose of their having necessary nourishment or change of air." MR. STURGE added that he hoped that this Fund might be made known, and that others might be induced to subscribe to it. In 1892 the Fund was still Gift by Mr.

in a languishing condition, and it was then ordered that the proceeds of the Alms Boxes within the Hospital should be applied to its support.

"Dresden Assistance Fund."

The work of the Samaritan Fund has recently been considerably enhanced. By his will the late MR. EDMOND DRESDEN bequeathed £5,000 to the general purposes of the Hospital, and a substantial sum of money to be vested in the names of specially appointed Trustees, the income to be applied exclusively for assisting poor and needy In-Patients on their discharge from the Hospital. The Trustees are the Almoners of "THE DRESDEN ASSISTANCE FUND," who are empowered to make grants to such persons on the advice of responsible officers, not exceeding the sum of £10 in each individual case. The greater part of this legacy has already been received, Trustees appointed, and a working scheme for the administration of the Fund formed. To mark the Governors' appreciation of this benefaction a ward in the Convalescent Home has been named the "EDMOND DRESDEN" Ward.

Selection of site at Clacton.

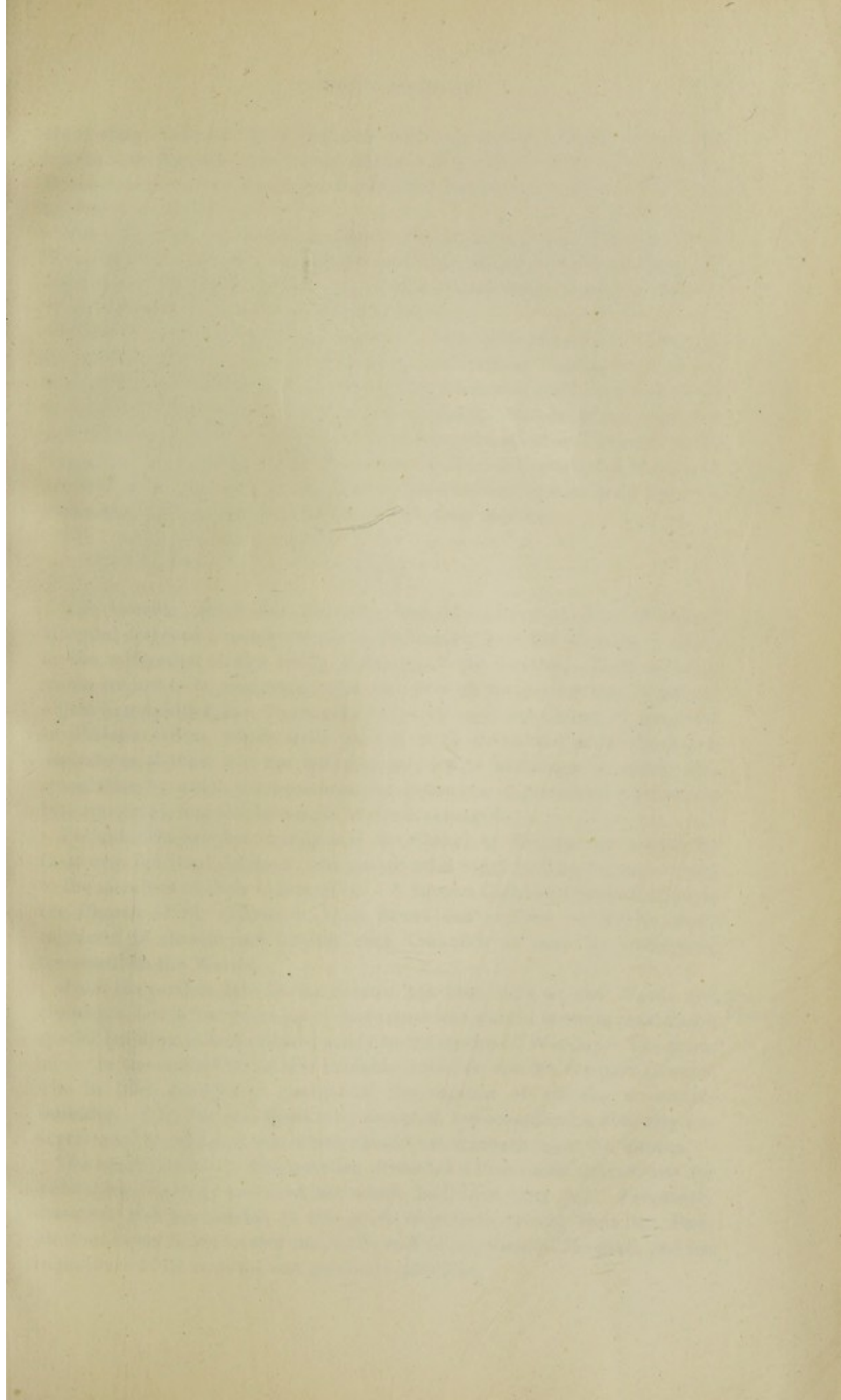
In the year 1891 Mr. W. DEBENHAM, a member of the Weekly Board, generously offered the sum of £500 towards the erection of a Convalescent Home, whereupon a Committee was appointed to reconsider the project, which was now destined to be carried into effect. The Committee inspected various sites in different parts of the country, but it was not till 1893 that their choice was made in favour of Clacton-on-Sea, a popular resort on the Essex coast. This flourishing watering-place seemed to possess all the qualifications needed for the building of a Home and the laying out of a suitable garden. Accordingly a freehold site of five acres was purchased in December, 1893, for £1,500. Before the completion of the purchase was announced the Hospital became the recipient of a munificent bequest, which put at rest any doubts that may have been entertained as to the wisdom of incurring the increased expenditure which would be entailed by the erection and maintenance of a Convalescent Home, without an assurance that the Funds would be forthcoming to meet it. On the 4th of March, 1895, the will was proved of the late HENRY SPICER, Esq., who devised one-sixth of his residuary estate in trust for the benefit of the Samaritan Fund, "to be applied for the relief and comfort of poor and needy Patients, but not for the General purposes of the Hospital, and in no case to be expended in religious teaching or religious observances." The sum received from this Legacy amounts to £22,157 0s. 8d., and is vested in Trustees appointed by the Weekly Board of the Hospital.

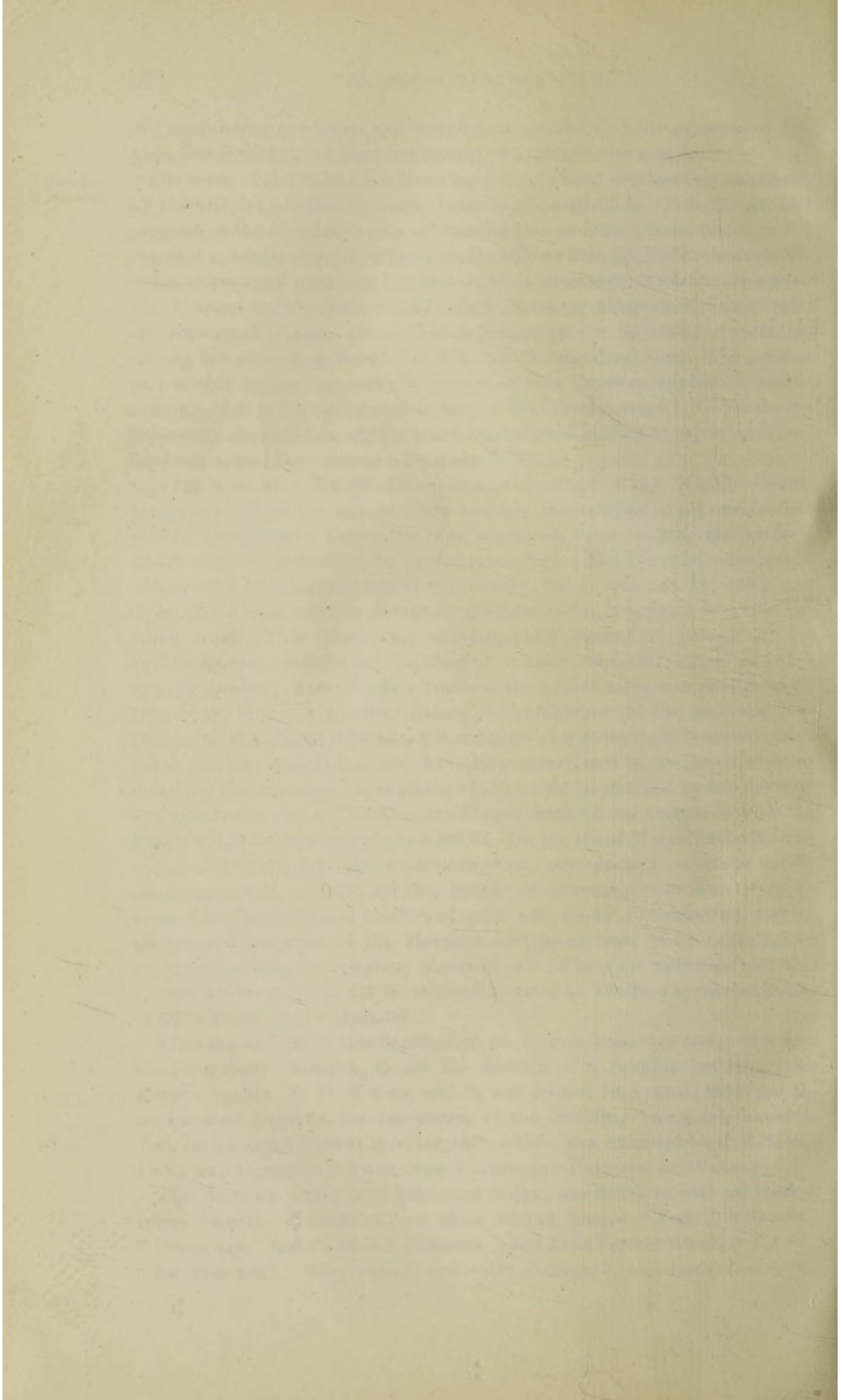
Opening of the Convalescent Home.

After the receipt of this benefaction no further time was lost, and a contract was shortly entered into for the erection of a suitable building from designs by Mr. K. D. YOUNG, and it was opened in August, 1896, for the reception of Patients, the completion of the Building being celebrated in July by a Garden Fête at the Hospital, which was attended by T.R.H. THE DUKE AND DUCHESS OF YORK (now PRINCE AND PRINCESS OF WALES).

The Building, which is of handsome design, was fitted up with all modern improvements. It contains four Male Wards (named "YORK," "SPICER," "DEBENHAM," and "EDMOND DRESDEN") and Four Female Wards ("EASON," "BREADALBANE," "PORTMAN," and "DE HIRSCH"), and can accommodate









about sixty Patients. It is furnished with a complete Electric Plant, and has its own Laundry and other offices. The staff consists of a Matron, Home-sister, and five Nurses, and a Medical Man in the locality is appointed to visit it regularly.

The entire cost, including purchase of Freehold, Building, Electric Plant, Water-supply, Laundry, Furniture, and the laying out of the Grounds, amounted to £34,559 11s. 9d. It should be noted that the Spicer Fund is devoted towards the expenses of maintenance.

The Convalescent Home has proved of inestimable value to the Hospital, enabling many Patients, especially from the Surgical Wards, to leave the Hospital at a much earlier date than they otherwise could, and resort to a purer air where their convalescence is consolidated. Its advantages have been still further extended by the erection in the grounds of a Pavilion for the "open-air" treatment of phthisis. This Pavilion was completed in 1902, at a cost of £809 11s. 3d. It provides accommodation for four Male Patients, who are allowed to stay there for a period of six months.

## XVII.

The benefits which the Founders and Supporters of The Middlesex Hospital designed to confer would be incomplete were the Charity confined to the mitigation of the bodily suffering of the inmates. Their spiritual wants are not to be neglected; and the duty of furthering this important object is committed to a CHAPLAIN, a Clergyman of the Church of England, in Priest's orders, whose daily care it is to direct and assist the devout aspirations of those who are convalescent, and to administer to others that consolation by which the weariness and depression of protracted sickness are best supported, and the bitterness of death assuaged.

Patients who are not members of the Church of England are visited by their own Spiritual Advisers, who are afforded every facility for ministering to the members of their Communion. A Roman Catholic Priest attached to the Church of St. Charles in Ogle Street and a Sister of Mercy attend regularly to console and instruct such Catholics as may be undergoing treatment in the Wards.

From the earliest date Divine Service has been held in the Wards and elsewhere, but a few years ago a movement was started towards providing a special building to be dedicated solely to the service of Worship. The prime mover in the realization of this laudable intention was Mr. GEORGE LAWSON, who in 1882 generously guaranteed the expense of erecting a suitable Building. His offer was thankfully accepted, but considerable difficulty was experienced in finding a site which should not encroach upon the Garden.

Chapel.

The consideration of this question presented a favourable opportunity for instituting a reform, the need for which had been long felt. Frequently attention had been called to the grave objections arising from the Post-Mortem Room being located under the roof of the General Hospital, and the importance of its removal was generally admitted.



The plan which suggested itself was to build a joint Post-Mortem Room and Mortuary on the site of the old Mortuary, and to utilize the space thus set free for the erection of the Chapel.

Such a course would involve considerable outlay above that required for the building of the Chapel itself, and while the Board were deliberating whether they would be justified in embarking on such a costly scheme, a most opportune and unlooked-for gift removed the financial difficulty. Miss LEICESTER, a Governor, announced her intention of presenting the munificent sum of £1,500 for the erection of a Chapel.

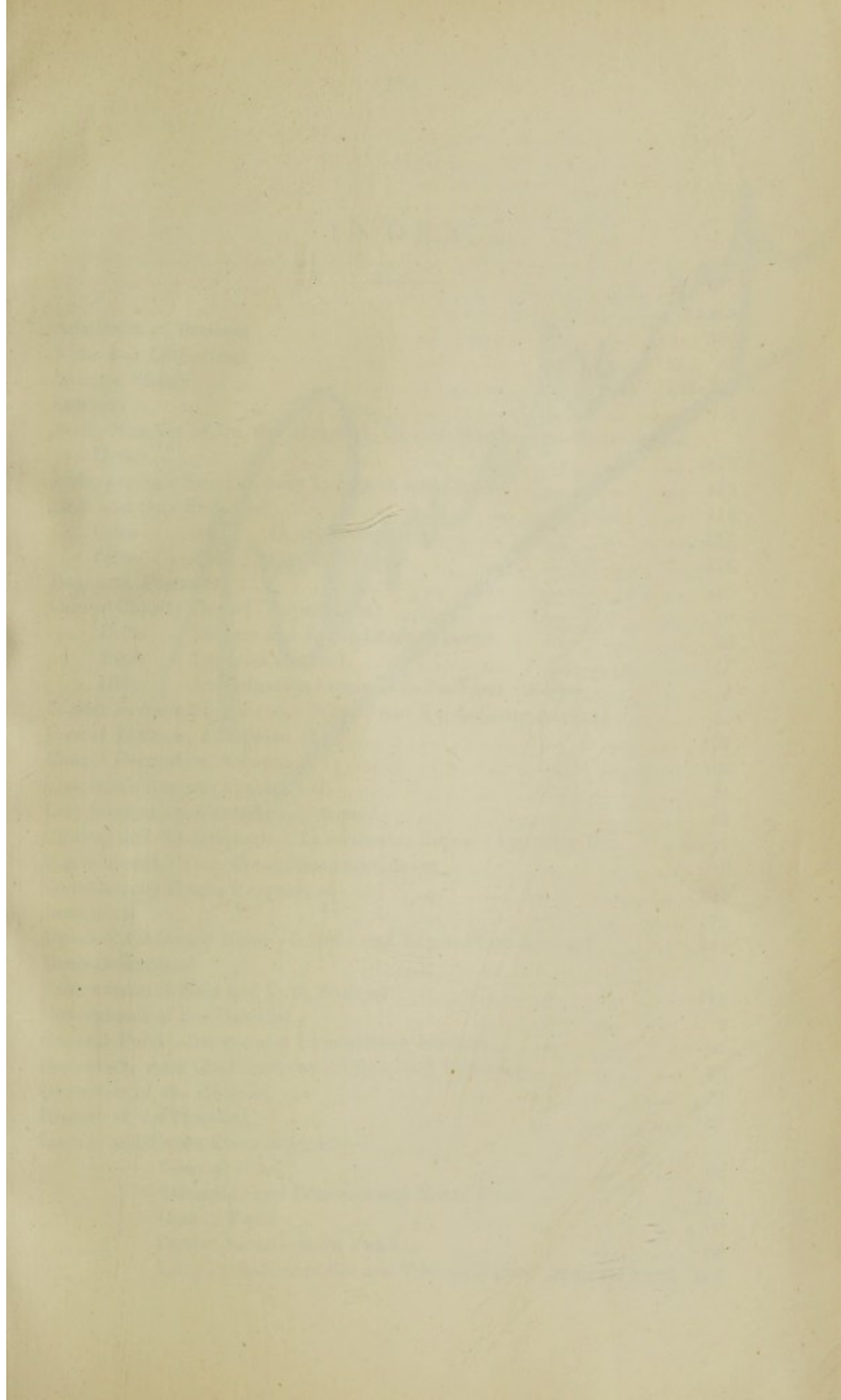
The sum previously subscribed was therefore, with the consent of the Donors, utilized for the preparation of the site and the building of the new Post-Mortem Room and Mortuary in memory of the late Chairman, MAJOR ROSS. This was completed in November, 1889 (at a total cost of £3,000), under the supervision of Mr. K. D. YOUNG, the Architect, who made a gift of his professional services as a tribute to the memory of MAJOR ROSS.

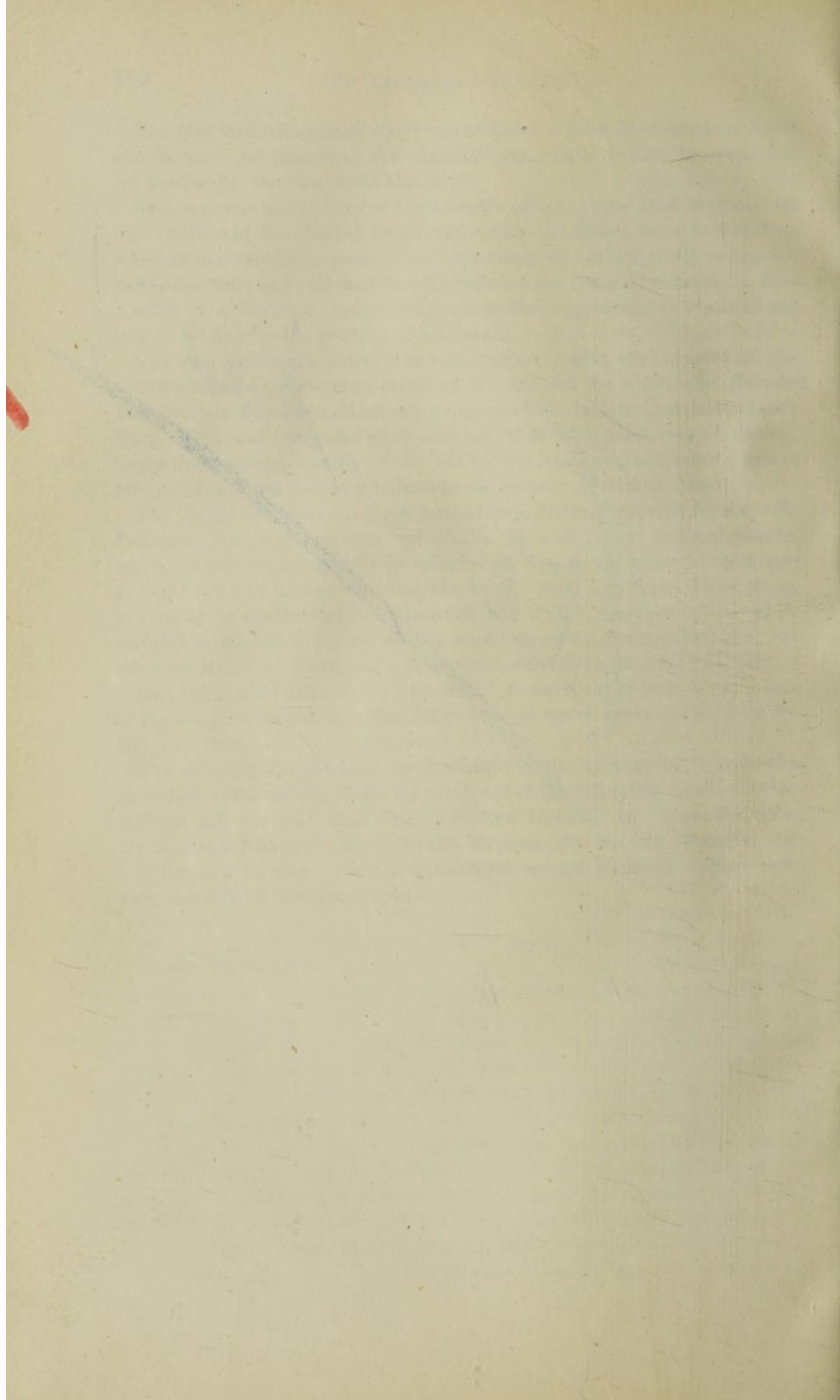
The Chapel itself was completed in 1891 from designs prepared by Mr. J. L. PEARSON, R.A., and has been universally admired for its internal beauty, while the outside, being entirely veiled from view by the adjacent buildings, is of red brick of an unpretending character. Miss LEICESTER added to her generosity by contributing an Altar-rail and Pulpit, designed by the same eminent artist, while the cost of the mural decorations was defrayed out of the Ross Memorial Fund, and a tablet commemorating the life of that Officer adorns the marble dado on the west wall. A marble altar is now in course of erection, the cost of which is being defrayed out of funds collected by the late Mrs. Ross.

The stained-glass windows are dedicated to the memory of Nurses who have died in the service of the Hospital, and of the following members of the Medical and Surgical Staff: Mr. BERNARD LAWSON, Dr. TEMPLE FRERE, Mr. ARTHUR HENSMAN, Mr. LEOPOLD HUDSON, Mr. STORER BENNETT, and Mr. GEORGE LAWSON. In the ante-chapel several memorial tablets have been placed with the same object.

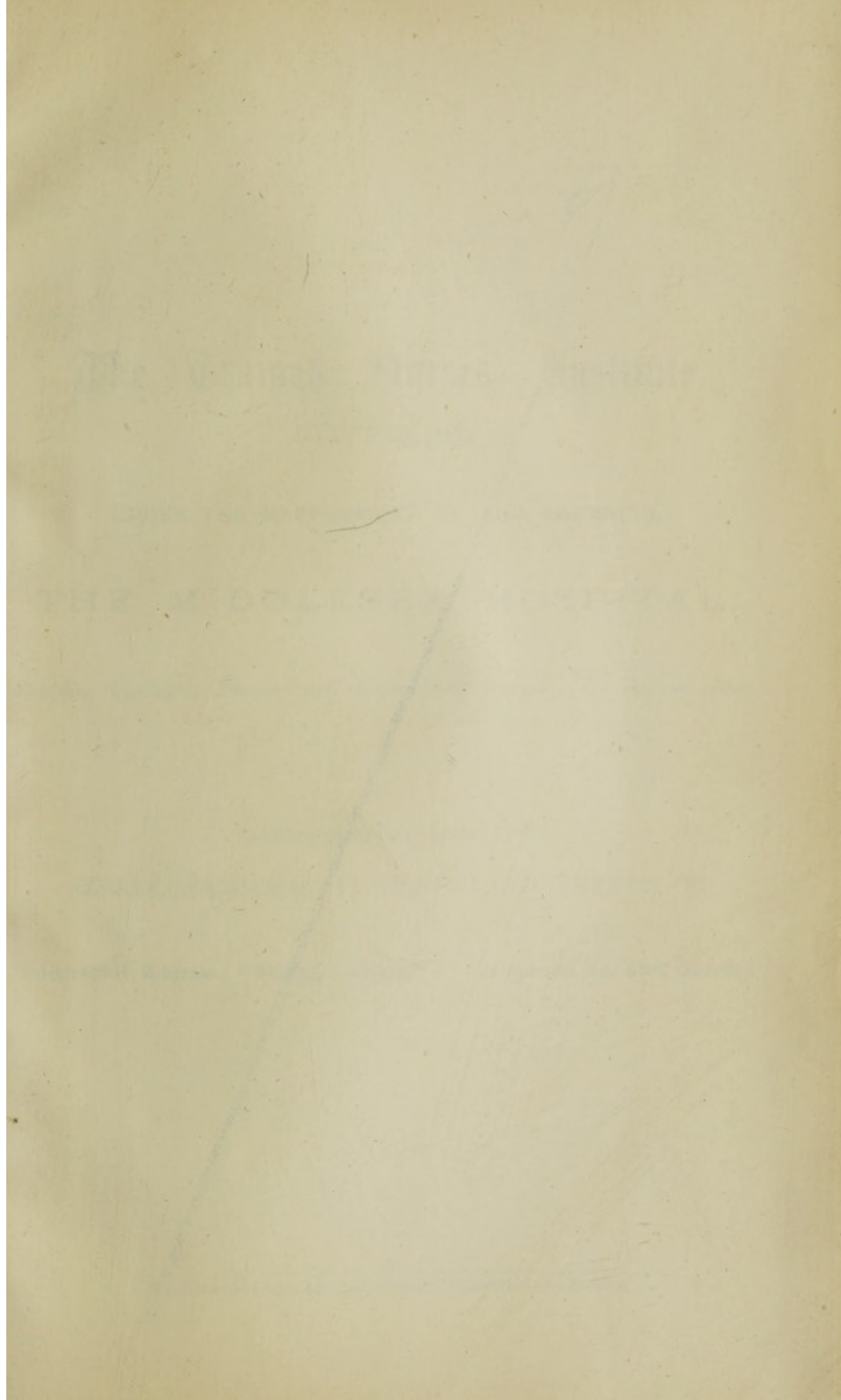

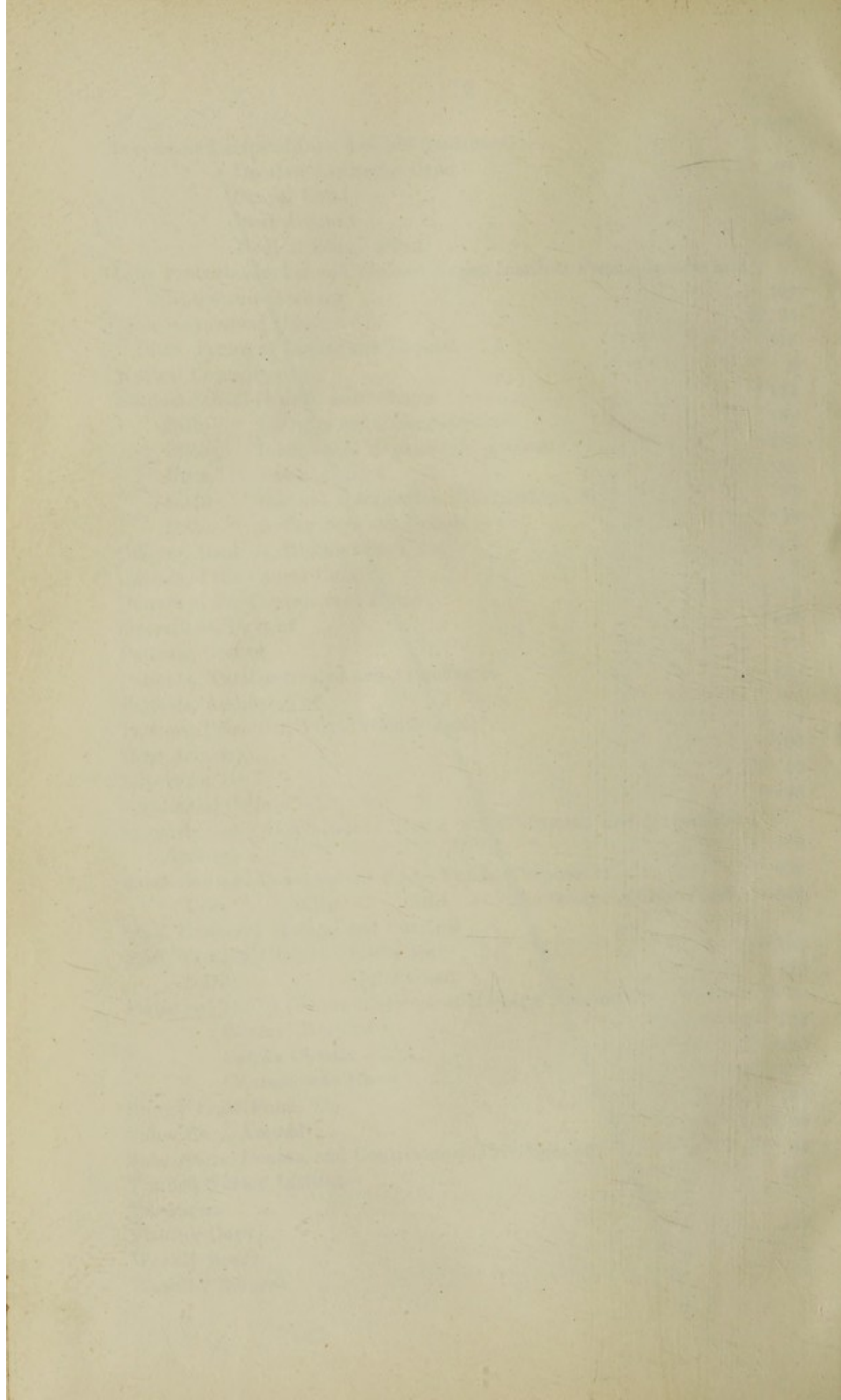
