



THIRTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL + REPORT.

THE Committee have pleasure in presenting their Thirty-Eighth Annual Report of the working of the Hospital, 724 patients were treated in the wards during the year, 138 more than last year. The average number of days in Hospital was 24. This is very high owing to several very long cases The average number of beds occupied was 48, a large increase over last year but still rather disappointing to the Committee, as the Hospital now contains 75 beds. The largest number of beds occupied at one time was 64.

The Medical Report shows that many cases of illness and many cases urgently needing operations have been treated, and both the Medical and Nursing Staffs have been called upon to do a great deal of work. There have been an unusual number of serious accidents from the collieries, many needing prolonged treatment. Many patients have been admitted as the result of motor accidents. The Committee feel very disappointed that so little is received from those whose treatment is becoming a severe drain on the Hospital charities.

The new Nurses' Home and extension of the wards were formally opened on November 10th and celebrated by a "pound day." There followed a great increase in the number of beds occupied. We appealed to the Miners' Welfare Fund to help us towards this further extension, and received another £500.

The extensions include a Maternity Ward and several private Wards, which it is hoped will, eventually, be a source of considerable revenue. The expenditure for this work came to a great deal more than was expected, as a new bath-room had to be added. Steps have also been taken entirely to re-organize the hot water supply and heating, and this has been a very costly affair, but has now been completed.

In November last year it was decided to appoint a Steward, Mr. Gardner, who assists the Matron and also attends to all the radio work under Dr. Tulloch.

The accounts for the year, considering the number of beds, requiring a very large increase of staff, are satisfactory. The income shows a considerable advance and there are a good many new subscribers. Many of our regular subscribers have doubled their subscriptions, and the employees' contributions constitute a record. Next year we hope to get additional support from the collieries.

On the expenditure side there is naturally, a large increase, due to the increased number of beds, amounting to about £520 in salaries and wages, and an increase of £370 under the head of household expenses. Another large increase is that of drugs and bandages, as we had to get an increased stock. Gas and electricity also come to a good deal more, due chiefly to the opening of the Nurses' Home.

The result was a loss in working for the year of £415, but this was only to be expected with such a large increase of work accomplished.

In last year's report it was stated that £1,000 a year more would be required at least, and our income has actually increased by £800, although we have got £200 less from the Friendly Societies.

One great feature in the year was the purchase of Manor Park House at a cost of £2,500 plus expenses and fencing. This has been let at a satisfactory rent, the Hospital retaining one large piece, which includes the orchard. This purchase has necessitated the sale of our remaining War Bonds, so that our capital and sendowment account sadly needs replenishing.

No legacies have been received during the year, but Mr. Melly contributed £500 towards the purchase of the house.

Further expenditure is shown in the Capital Account in completing and furnishing the new ward and maternity ward and new heating installation, amounting to nearly £2,500.

Rose Day was very much better than usual. [We have also received considerable sums from concerts which were organized by Mr. Daniel (chief clerk to Mr. F. S. Clay) to whom our best thanks are due.

The Committee are pleased that the sum received from Grateful Patients shows a good increase, but they still think that this figure is small considering the number of people who receive benefits, who ought to make it a point of honour to give what they can afford when leaving the Hospital.

In July of this year our Matron, Miss Lewis expressed her wish to retire after 25 years' service. The Committee decided that in view of the splendid work she had done for us she was entitled to a small pension. The Committee were extremely pleased in addition, to be able to make a presentation to Miss Lewis in the shape of a purse, contributed by her many friends.

Miss B. M. Partington, who has been sister at St. George's Hospital, London, was appointed to the post.

The Staff Fund has provided for some major operations, but this represents only a small proportion of the work, and the best thanks of the Committee are due to the Medical Staff for the ungrudging services they have again given gratuitously throughout the year. The success of the institution depends so much on their efforts which cannot be too much appreciated.

The Committee are pleased to testify again to the excellent services rendered by the Matron and Nursing Staff. They also wish to thank the Honorary Auditors Messrs Clay, Russell & Co., for kindly auditing the accounts year by year.
