THE FIFTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

NUNEATON AND DISTRICT GENERAL HOSPITAL

FOR THE YEAR 1946

Although 1946 brought many difficulties, the Hospital was able to show a number of outstanding achievements by the end of the year.

PATIENTS. In spite of the necessity of closing a Ward for six and a half months as a result of staff shortage, the number of patients treated showed an increase of $11\cdot3\%$. The closing of the Ward, however, greatly enlarged the Waiting List, the effect being particularly marked in regard to the children referred to the Hospital for attention to Tonsils and Adenoids. However, with the prospect of reopening the Ward in January 1947, a promise was given to the Warwickshire County Council that 20 beds would be reserved for these cases. Out-patients increased to the remarkable extent of 48%. A large part of this increase was in regard to the number of patients attending for redressings, a feature of Hospital work which had had to be neglected before the engagement of the Casualty Officer. Attendance at Consultative Clinics also showed an increase, but once again, the Board has to record its regret that services are so much handicapped by the restricted space available in the Department.

MATERNITY DEPARTMENT. At the beginning of the year the Board was concerned to note that the number of confinements booked in the Department was declining. Fees were, therefore, reduced to a level barely sufficient to cover the cost of treatment. Whether as a result of this or not the number of patients has steadily increased and from very small beginnings, the year closed showing a total number of 289 patients, 15 more than the previous year. It is evident, too, from the attendances that there has been general approval of the services provided in the Ante-Natal and Post-Natal Clinics.

CATERING DEPARTMENT. Early in January, on the advice of the Nuffield Provincial Hospitals Trust whose representatives paid a visit to the Hospital, the Board decided to rearrange the catering of the Hospital by appointing a trained Catering Officer. Miss V. H. Mason took up her duties in February and in collaboration with the Diet Sub-Committee (now re-established as the Catering Committee) undertook complete reorganisation of the Kitchen. A large number of items of equipment for the preparation and cooking of food were purchased and a second refrigerator was installed. The staff was strengthened by the engagement of three Domestic Science trained cooks and attention is being given to the possibility of providing a comprehensive scheme of training for junior cooks to fit them for posts of responsibility in Kitchen management. Foodstuffs have been bought in an ever-widening market to ensure that patients and staff enjoy the maximum available. Although it has been the policy of this Hospital for some years to provide an adequate diet for the patients, there was still room for improvement. Now, three cooked meals are provided every day, with a light but tasty tea in addition. Staff meals, too, are balanced with care to ensure that everyone has as great a quantity and variety of food as present restrictions will permit. Many expressions of appreciation have been received, not the least being a Report from the Ministry of Health, whose expert advisers visited the Hospital in November.

WELFARE DEPARTMENT. The Board thought that the time had come for the appointment of a Welfare Officer to give greater attention to the many needs of patients which do not fall within the duties of the Medical or Nursing staff. Accordingly, Mrs. D. M. Haynes was appointed in September. Amongst other duties, she has undertaken the complete overhaul of the Patients' Library with the assistance of Mrs. E. Jarvis Garner, who succeeded Mr. A. Horne as Honorary Librarian. The Board acknowledges its thanks to the British Red Cross Society and to a large number of private residents, who have sent gifts of books and magazines. Attention is now being given to the possibility of developing handicrafts in the Wards for the diversion of bed-patients. This will be a step towards the establishment of a complete Rehabilitation Department.

REHABILITATION DEPARTMENT. After a long delay, during which negotiations were carried on with the Ministry of Health, sanction to proceed with the construction of a prefabricated hut has been received and the Ministry has promised to provide the framework. The preparation of the plans has been entrusted to Mr. H. N. Jepson, F.R.I.B.A., and construction will commence as soon as the formalities connected with Building Licences have been completed.

PREMISES. Taking advantage of the closing of a Ward, the Building Committee carried out a scheme of internal repainting of all the Wards in rotation, a job long overdue, but one which had been impracticable during the war. As part of the dilapidations were attributable to war damage, the War Damage Commission is accepting responsibility for a proportion of the cost. At the end of the year the Wards had been completed and a start was about to be made on the Nurses' Homes. At a later stage the corridors will receive attention and finally the outside of the buildings will be repainted. There have also been several other important improvements during the year. The front drive has been resurfaced, all the trees in the grounds cut back and the flower beds and shrubberies have been replanted. Kitchen accommodation has been extended by the provision of a vegetable store, a shed to contain empty packing materials and by fitting an extra sink for vegetable preparation. The side Wards attached to the Maternity Department have been considerably improved by the installation of wash basins and a scheme for a better lay-out of the Labour Ward and resurfacing of the floor has been drawn up. A marked improvement in the heating of Welfare Ward, which has been a problem for quite a long time, has been gained by the electrical heating of the Balcony and by regulation of the flow from the central heating plant. The accommodation for Resident Medical staff, which for some years has been situated in the annexe of the South Nurses' Home, has now been transferred to a suite of rooms in the Hospital itself, thus providing for the convenience of the Doctors when it is necessary for them to be called at night. The rooms in the annexe which were thus vacated have been utilised for the trained Catering staff. As the services of the Hospital continue to expand, it is necessary to find still more accommodation for the requisite staff and the Board is now considering what steps can be taken to obtain suitable property within easy reach of the Hospital.

NURSES' HOMES. As the supply of materials began to increase, the Nursing Committee turned its attention to the furnishing of the accommodation for resident Nursing and Domestic staffs. Much of the furniture in the old Home and the Maids' rooms was oldfashioned and in a poor state of repair, so it was decided to buy a number of new suites of bedroom furniture and to provide an easy chair in the bedroom of every member of the staff. Beds, bedding, carpets and curtains are also receiving attention, renewals being effected as they become available. The repainting is being carried out in an imaginative way to provide a pleasant variety of colour schemes, a monotonous uniformity of treatment being steadfastly avoided.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT. The Board is now going forward with the preparation of detailed plans for the new Out-patient Department, which has been in mind for several years. Further space has become even more urgent than it was before, as the increased figures of attendance on page 13 demonstrate and the Board is very anxious to establish additional Clinics for the greater convenience of patients who are now travelling to Coventry or Birmingham. It has also become necessary for consideration to be given to the construction of another Ward. The General Nursing Council now insists that a General Training School for Nurses must maintain an average of 100 occupied beds, but with the present bed complement of 110 this could only be achieved with the greatest difficulty. An extra Ward would provide the necessary additional clinical material for the Nurses' training and help to keep the Waiting List under control. In the preparation of these plans, the Architect will also be asked to consider the provision of a Dispensary, Pathological Laboratory, X-Ray Department and Boiler House, all of which are too cramped to be really efficient in the present buildings. All the plans for development will not be brought to maturity before the Hospital is taken over under the National Health Service Act, but it is the Board's desire that as much as possible should be done to lay a good foundation for the years immediately ahead; moreover, the Board believes there is every prospect of a ready support from the Ministry of Health for constructive proposals.

FINANCE. On the financial side the position is not a happy one. At the beginning of the year there was a deficiency on the General Fund and the overdraft at the Bank steadily mounted until by the end of June, when it stood at £7,633, steps had to be taken to realise part of the holding of 3% Savings Bonds which had been earmarked for the Endowment and Building Accounts. Happily the sale showed a profit of £346 which, together with the capital sum, £6,800, was transferred to the General Fund. The necessity of raising wage levels in accordance with national recommendations and the steady rise in the price of all commodities, soon created a further overdraft and by the end of the year it stood at £7,262, the total deficiency on the year including the amount covered by the sale of Savings Bonds, being £13,206. The Board records, with gratitude, that the majority of those who have been in the habit of making Annual Subscriptions have continued to do so, in fact, due to the generosity of some in increasing their contributions, the total for the year exceeded that cf the previous year by £76. Donations also have come up to expectations, but the total income falls far short of present-day requirements. The Board has been in touch with the Ministry of Health, who at the end of the year received a deputation with courtesy and consideration, but regretted that they could not grant any assistance during the current financial year, suggesting instead that use should be made of the balance of the Mayor of Nuneaton's Hospital Jubilee Appeal. In addition to the personal subscribers and donors, whose benevolence is acknowledged in the appendix to this Report, the Board especially thanks the members of the Bedworth Hospitals Committee, who have contributed £335 during the year and the Nuneaton Hospitals Contributory Association who, in addition to a gift of £500 from their War Dependents' Reserve Fund, organised the Rose Day collections, in the face of discouraging circumstances and raised a total of £210. The Board has also been very pleased to receive the following legacies :

The support given by Contributory Schemes appears in the Financia¹ Statement at a slightly lower figure than in the previous year, but the 1945 total included a small amount of arrears brought forward from the previous year; in fact, their contributions were, therefore, more substantial than ever before. The Board particularly acknowledges its gratitude to the L.M.S. Hospital Fund for an increase in their grant of £350.

NURSING STAFF. The Hospital has shared the common lot of many of the smaller Hospitals in finding the recruitment of staff a continuous problem. Happily a decision to experiment in the engagement of Male Nurses has proved very successful and was further strengthened by the approval granted by the General Nursing Council for the acceptance of two in each year for general training. At the year end, in addition to the two Students, six other Male Assistant Nurses were on the staff, some resident, others living in their own homes. There have been a number of changes in the Senior Nursing Staff. Miss D. M. Evans resigned in July and has taken up an appointment in Stafford. She was succeeded as Matron by Miss H. L. G. Saunders, who had been Assistant Matron and Sister-Tutor at Noble's Isle of Man Hospital, Douglas. Miss S. Williams resigned her post as First Assistant Matron and Sister-Tutor in March and the Board had great difficulty in finding a successor, as the demand for Sister Tutors is far greater than the supply. However, by the end of the year the tutoring had again been put upon a firm basis by the appointment of Miss R. Whittaker. Miss G. I. Davies was succeeded as Home Sister by Miss E. Balfe, who acted as Matron in very capable fashion during the interim period before the arrival of Miss Saunders, but unfortunately, very shortly afterwards her health broke down and she has since had to give up active nursing. Miss O. V. Webb relinquished her post as Sister of Welfare Ward in July to take up private nursing. She was not immediately replaced, due to a Ward having been closed : at the end of the year Miss F. Lord was appointed. Miss M. Stubbs, who had been Junior Night Sister, left in April to take up a day duty post and was succeeded by Mrs. E. Carrier. Four of the Student Nurses were successful in the Final Examination of the General Nursing Council and thirteen passed the Preliminary Examination. During the year the Committee has given a great deal of consideration to the welfare of the Nursing staff. In addition

to the repainting and refurnishing of the Nurses' Homes, which has already been mentioned in this Report, the Committee has made a number of modifications to previous practice. For example, periods of duty have been reduced to closer conformity with Rushcliffe recommendations and careful note is now being kept of any period of overtime, so that the Committee may know whether the Hospital is seriously under-staffed at any time. The previous Rule regarding late leave has been relaxed and it is now permissible for the staff to obtain admittance to the Homes late in the evening by simply making application for the key. The Nurses' Representative Council, established two years ago, had fullen into disuse, but the Committee has encouraged its revival and has now agreed that elected representatives of the Council shall attend each Meeting of the Nursing Committee to act as a liaison between the Management and the Nursing staff. The Committee recognises that the Nurses wish to spend their leisure with a maximum of ease and comfort and has arranged through Matron for their breakfast to be served in their rooms on off-duty days. By the engagement of a night maid, it has been possible to arrange for a cooked meal to be served for the night staff at midnight without their being required to prepare it themselves.

MEDICAL STAFF. Mrs. B. M. Willmott Dobbie, F.R.C.S., established a Gynaecological Clinic which was held once per month, but after a short period she was so satisfied with its working that she decided to increase it to a fortnightly session. Mr. W. Ogilvy Reid, F.R.C.S.Ed., has also been able to increase the number of his visits for Ear. Nose and Throat work and has undertaken an Outpatient Clinic at fortnightly intervals. At the end of the year Dr. A. I. Wilson, F.R.C.P.Ed. expected to be able to resume weekly visits to the Hospital early in 1947. Mr. R. H. Hucknall, F.R.C.S.Ed. Honorary Ophthalmologist, decided, on his discharge from the Services, not to return to work in this area and the Board received his resignation with very great regret. Mrs. C. E. Clark, M.B.Ch.B., D.O.M.S., who has acted in his absence has agreed to continue in that capacity until permanent arrangements can be made. Mr. L. E. Jones, M.S., F.R.C.S., Honorary Consulting Orthopaedic Surgeon, resigned on joining the R.A.F. An appointment of a successor has not yet been made, but Mr. J. B. Leather, F.R.C.S.Ed., has kindly undertaken to act in this capacity, when necessary, in the meantime. The Board of Management, in conjunction with the Medical Board, has been giving careful consideration to the possibility of extending Consultative Services and informal conversations have been proceeding with neighbouring Hospitals and local Authorities. In addition to the appointment of Ophthalmologist and Orthopaedic Surgeon, the possibility of making new appointments of Psychiatrist and Dermatologist is being explored. There have been two changes in the Resident staff : Mr. W. P. Hirsch succeeded

Mr. F. E. V. Cant as Resident Surgical Officer and Dr. K. Burn-Murdoch became Casualty Officer in place of Dr. K. Keane. Dr. E. S. M. Merry remains Resident Medical Officer.

TECHNICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF. Miss C. M. Hammond succeeded Miss M. A. Barton as Radiographer, on her resignation to take up a post in the south of England after five years' service and Miss M. Hunt entered in August as Junior Physiotherapist, an appointment which had been vacant for some months, thus making possible the expansion of the work of the Physiotherapy Department. Mr. F. L. Cusworth, formerly on the staff of the Victoria Hospital, Worksop, entered as Chief Clerk in September.

CO-OPERATION WITH THE WARWICKSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL. Arising out of conversations which had taken place with the Warwickshire County Council, it has been arranged that the X-Ray plant at the Nuneaton Emergency Hospital shall be made available to patients of this Hospital for certain examinations which cannot be performed adequately on our existing plant. The Warwickshire County Council have also undertaken to examine Pathological specimens in their Central Laboratory and this arrangement has been found very beneficial to the Medical staff, as they are able to make closer contact with the Pathologist than was possible under the old arrangement with Birmingham University. It is hoped that at a later date it will be possible to establish a Branch Pathological Laboratory in Nuneaton, which would be part of a comprehensive County service.

X-RAY PLANT. After careful consideration of estimates from several manufacturers of X-Ray plant, the Board of Management decided to utilise a part of the money provided by the Mayor of Nuneaton's Hospital Jubilee Appeal in the provision of new equipment for the X-Ray Department, costing approximately £3,000. This will be of the very latest type and will be powerful enough to permit of all the examinations which could be required in the Hospital, including screening. The present portable plant will be retained for use in the Wards of the Hospital as occasion arises.

BED-TABLES. It will be recalled that in 1944 the Nuneaton Hospital Carnival Committee made its objective the provision of bed-tables for the whole of the Hospital, but at that time the manufacture of a suitable model had been entirely suspended and it was not until well on in 1946 that one which found general acceptance could be obtained. The Committee placed an order with Messrs. Kingfisher Ltd. for 100 tables, but subsequently, still further delay arose because the Ministry of Health refused to grant a licence for the timber. It is hoped, however, that it will be possible to obtain delivery of at least part of the order during 1947. Arrangements will be made for each table to bear a plate acknowledging the gift. **GIFTS.** In addition to the many other gifts recorded in the appendix, it has been very encouraging to receive so many items of produce, mainly from the Harvest Festivals of the district Churches. The year was also memorable for the magnificent donations of food-stuffs from the Dominions, which were received through the Ministry of Food. The distribution of this "manna" could not have been more appropriately timed—it helped the Hospital to meet the shortages of rationed goods, which most of us were feeling acutely. It is grand to know that our kinsfolk overseas have such a care for us. It is appropriate here to mention the splendid gifts from the British Red Cross and St. John Organisation in the distribution of war surplus. The Hospital received a generous allocation of bedding and surgical dressings, which went a long way to meet some of our shortages.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT. The Board followed the course of the Bill through Parliament with very great interest and was gratified to notice that modifications were introduced which ensure that there will be a reasonable measure of local control in the future service through Management Committees. The Bill became an Act on the 6th November and shortly afterwards, the Minister of Health issued his plan for the division of the Country into regions. Nuneaton finds itself within the West Midlands Region, which has its centre in Birmingham and as this area is one of the most compact, although it is also one of the largest, it would appear that there is every reason to believe that an excellent scheme can be developed. The Minister of Health is now proceeding to establish the Regional Boards, which will plan the details of the service within the region and the Board is eagerly awaiting information which will reveal the future organisation for Nuncaton and district in general, and for this Hospital in particular.

NUNEATON HOSPITALS CONTRIBUTORY ASSOCIATION

The National Health Service will provide free hospital treatment for all, the cost being covered by contributions made under the National Insurance Act. It will be a good service because it will be adequately financed, but the "Appointed Day" for its establishment will not be reached until 1948. In the meantime, the Hospitals—and in particular Nuneaton General—are carrying on with a scanty purse.

You can help to fill it by supporting the Nuneaton Hospitals Contributory Association.

CONTRIBUTIONS. If you are a wage earner (earning under £420 per annum) your contribution will be 4d. per week : Juveniles (under 16) pay 3d. per week if they are working : Pensioners, dependent upon pension only, 2d. per week.

BENEFITS. Members obtain free treatment in any Hospital and auxiliary benefits such as Convalescence, Home Nursing and Brine Baths treatment. Dependents are covered also under one contribution.

White, Secretary, Nuneaton Hospitals Contributory Association, 109 Abbey Street, Nuneaton. **VISITING.** Patients in the General Wards may be visited on Wednesdays and Sundays from 2.15 p.m. to 3.45 p.m. and on Thursdays from 6.30 p.m. to 7.0 p.m. Two visitors are admitted at a time and on Wednesdays and Sundays a change of visitors is permitted at 2.45 p.m. and at 3.15 p.m.

Seriously ill patients can be visited at any time at the discretion of the Ward Sister.

No visiting is permitted in the Children's Ward except in the case of serious illness.

Maternity Ward visiting times are 7.0 p.m. to 8.0 p.m. daily.

Visitors must not bring in intoxicating liquors, nor give any food to the patients without permission from the Ward Sister.

MATERNITY PATIENTS are admitted from the area served by the Hospital. Three Private Wards are available. Beds should be booked well in advance of the date of confinement. A booking fee of 10s. is payable, but this amount is deducted from the account, which is due on the day of discharge. The Sister of the Ward will always be pleased to answer enquiries.

BLOOD DONORS. The need for blood continues to expand. Operations which were considered to be impossible a few years ago can now be undertaken with safety, through the ingenuity of modern science, supported by the generosity of blood donors. The panel formerly held by the Hospital has now been handed over to the newly-established Blood Transfusion Service of the Ministry of Health, who have a highly trained team to operate transfusion sessions, which are arranged at regular intervals at convenient centres. The operation is painless and normally gives the donor no inconvenience or ill effect whatever. Additional names will be gratefully received by the House Governor.
