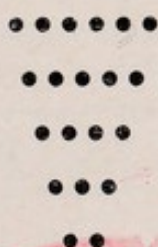
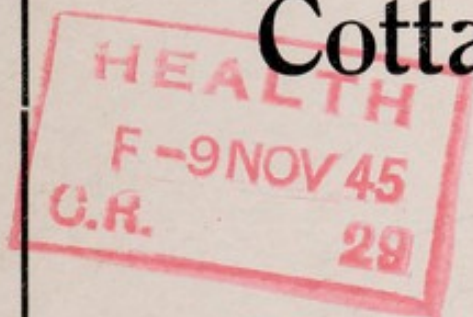

REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1944

The Committee of Management beg to submit the sixty-fourth Annual Report.

The year 1944 saw us within reach of victory. It might have been hoped that our good fortune in escaping damage from bombs might have continued, but in the summer a new menace was streaking over the skies of South London—the Flying Bomb. One of these fell close to the Hospital at 7.50 a.m. on the 29th June, severely blasting the building. The patients were immediately evacuated to Horton Hospital, Epsom, and work to clear up the debris and restore order from chaos began. It is a great credit to all concerned that by the 22nd of August all the wards were open again. Miss Phyllis Rogers, the Matron of the Hospital, and her Staff, who carried straight on with their job—their patients—and after they had been evacuated, the tidying up, deserve special praise.

During the year, the Hospital continued to play its part in the treatment of service casualties and civilian wounded, under the Government E.M.S. Scheme, except during the short time the wards had to be closed for repair. The Hospital was not out of action completely, however, for it was still in operation as a First Aid Post.

The year was one of many changes in the personnel carrying on the management and medical work. It is with deep regret that we have to record the death of Mr. E. C. Stuart Baker, C.I.E., O.B.E., who had served on the Committee of Management for many years, and Mr. L. F. Fouraker, L.D.S., our Hon. Dental Surgeon. Mr. W. F. Turner, appointed President of the Hospital in 1918, resigned after 25 years of faithful service, during which time he became a part of the Hospital and the Hospital a part of him. It can be said of him, that he spared neither his energies nor his purse in the cause to which he was devoted. We are happy to announce that the Lord Luke has accepted the Presidency of the Hospital, situated as it is in the district wherein his family had resided for many years, thus bringing to the Hospital the twin benefits of many years' experience in hospital matters and a local interest. Mr. W. Matthews Hill, a Vice-President of

the Hospital, has resigned, but has kindly offered to give his expert advice and help when necessary, as he has done so often in the past. The Rev. Canon C. E. Wilson, M.A., B.D., resigned from the Committee of Management on removal from the district, and was appointed a Vice-President. Mr. A. E. Ellis, C.B., Mr. J. G. Saxton, J.P., the Rev. E. C. Bailey and Dr. S. W. Carruthers were appointed to the Committee of Management during the year.

Another well-known figure has left the Medical Staff—Dr. John Howard, who has resigned on retirement from practice after many years' loyal service as Senior Surgeon of the Hospital.

Our thanks are due to the Medical Staff, who have continued their work at the Hospital despite the many calls upon their services. In addition they have had extra work to cope with as a result of the flying bomb attacks. It is to be hoped that it will not be long before the other members of the Medical Staff are back with us again, but in the meantime we are glad to report that Dr. Edith Newling has temporarily joined the Medical Staff. As in the last war, some of them are serving in the Forces. Drs. Kingsbury and Malone, of the Hon. Medical Staff, are in the services, while Dr. Mann has a special war-time appointment. Of the Hon. Anæsthetists, all are in the services except Drs. Gandy, Starforth and Carruthers. Dr. Starforth has taken up a municipal appointment in Durham, but Drs. Gandy and Carruthers are still with us. Dr. Carruthers returned from retirement to rejoin the staff as Hon. Anæsthetist in 1942, stepping into the breach as it were. It is interesting to recall that he joined the staff in 1914 when his services were also most needed. The year 1914 also found Dr. Gandy on the staff as Anæsthetist, but at the outbreak of war he became Lieutenant-Commander in the Royal Navy and King's Messenger.

The Committee of Management is also appreciative of the hard work of Matron, Nursing and other Staff, willingly and unselfishly carried out.

We must again thank our donors and subscribers for continuing to supply the funds without which the work of the Hospital could not go on, and also to the public who have contributed by way of Box Collections, Congregational Collections, or through other media. We are glad to note the formation of a Ladies' Committee for the Nurses' Fund, which now amounts to £74, a figure which includes monies raised as a result of entertainments in association with Mr. Melbourn Davis, as well as donations from grateful patients. The constitution of this Committee will be found on page 25. We also give our thanks to

the Dulwich Wood Avenue Allotment Society, the Upper Norwood Poultry and Rabbit Club for special efforts, and the Ladies' Linen League. Details of their activities are mentioned elsewhere in this Report.

Four special beds for abdominal cases have been purchased for the Hospital as a result of a special donation from Mr. J. R. Peers, in memory of his son, Lieut. L. H. Peers, who died of wounds in North Africa.

Further particulars of the Hospital's work during the year is summarised below :

Inspection of Hospital.

The annual inspection of the Hospital on behalf of King Edward's Hospital Fund took place on June 6th, 1944, the visitors being W. McAdam Eccles, Esq., M.S., F.R.C.S. and Rowland B. Jackson, Esq.

Hospital Flag Day.

The London Hospitals Street Collection was held on May 2nd, 1944. The collection for the Norwood area was organised by Mrs. Garnham, and resulted in the sum of £52 6s. 4d. being contributed to the General Fund, of which £48 7s. 4d. was allocated to this Hospital, together with a sum of £12 7s. 6d. from previous year's balance.

Income and Expenditure.

The Income and Expenditure Account for the year shows an excess of expenditure over income of £529 3s. 11d., as against an excess of income over expenditure of £71 14s. 0d. in the preceding year.

The Hon. Secretary reports:

"During the year the Linen League officials were not idle and members' subscriptions were collected as usual.

"Owing to the difficulty in obtaining Board of Trade Permits, it was not found possible to make the usual purchases of linen, etc., and a combined report covering the two years, 1943-1945 will be distributed later."
