

REPORT

For the year ending 31st December, 1937.

Committee of Management.

The Committee of Management beg to submit the Fifty-Seventh Annual Report.

Hon. Consulting Surgeons.

The Committee regret to have to record the death on the 12th May, 1937, of Dr. Arthur Scott-Turner who had served the Hospital for a period of thirty years as a member of the Honorary Medical Staff and whose appointment as an Honorary Consulting Surgeon to the Hospital was announced in the Annual Report for last year.

Matron.

Miss E. M. Daniels resigned her position as Matron on the 1st December last and, has been succeeded by Miss Phyllis Rogers.

Inspection of Hospital.

The annual inspection on behalf of King Edwards' Hospital Fund took place on the 2nd July, 1937, the visitors being Sir Lancelot Barrington-Ward, K.C.V.O., F.R.C.S., and Major-General Sir Richard Howard-Vyse, K.C.M.G.

Hospital Flag Day.

The Flag Day collection for all Hospitals in the Metropolitan Police area which are outside the London County Council area was held on May 8th, 1937. The collection for the Norwood area was organised by Mrs. Stanley Morter and resulted in the sum of £53. 7. 3 being contributed to the General Fund, of which £42. 6. 0 was allocated to this Hospital.

Coronation Day

The Coronation of their Majesties King George V. and Queen Elizabeth on the 12th May, 1937, was celebrated in various ways. The interior and exterior of the Hospital were suitably decorated and the patients and their friends were entertained at tea. The building was flood-lit at night throughout the week, free of expense, and a gift of two modern pianos, which were much needed, was made for the men's and women's wards.

Honorary Treasurership

The Committee record with great regret the death on the 19th August last of Mr. Hugh J. Tweedy, who for nineteen years had devoted himself to the work and welfare of the Hospital in the capacity of Honorary Treasurer. The Committee take this opportunity of expressing their appreciation of the invaluable services rendered to the Hospital by Mr. Tweedy during that period and of the assistance afforded to him by Miss Tweedy in his work.

The Committee have much pleasure in announcing that the appointment of Honorary Treasurer has been accepted by Mr. W. W. Garnham of No. 9 Upper Beulah Hill. Mr. Garnham is specially qualified for the work, inasmuch as for the ten years 1908—1918 he acted as Honorary Secretary to the Hospital and from that time has been a member of the Committee of Management.

The Committee are much indebted to Mr. F. M. Swain, the Assistant Honorary Secretary, who most ably filled the position of Acting Honorary Treasurer during the period from the 19th August, 1937, to the 31st January, 1938.

Income and Expenditure,

It will be seen from the Statement of Accounts (pages 14 to 19) that the Income and Expenditure account for the year 1937 results in a heavy deficit, the balance "excess of Total Expenditure over Total Income for the year" being £726. 8. 11. This is due to the fact that

only £50 was received under the head of Legacies, making the Total Income £4,276. 4. 5, while the Ordinary Expenditure amounted to £5,002. 13. 4. This deficit, together with the Capital expenditure referred to in the following paragraph, has necessitated the sale of £1500 of War Loan 3½ per cent stock, which entails a reduction of £52/10/- per year in the Hospital's Income. Whilst every effort is being made to reduce expenditure, an increase of Income is also needed, in the form of Subscriptions and Donations, and the Committee wish to call attention especially to the need and advantage of gifts in the form of Legacies upon which the Hospital has been largely dependant in the past.

Legacies.

The Committee acknowledge with thanks the receipt of a Legacy of £50 from the Estate of the late Mr. Stenton Covington who for many years was a member of the General Committee of the Hospital.

Land, Buildings, and Equipment of Hospital.

The scheme for needed improvements in the Hospital described in the last Annual Report, has been carried out. The expenditure on Buildings and equipment for the year amounted to £750. 16. 7. The principal items are a Patients Anaesthetic Room and additional Bathroom adjoining, Building and fitting out of a new Dispensary, consequent conversion and re-fitting as a Ladies Sewing room of the former Dispensary, re-fitting of Linen room with Storage cupboards, partitioning of Kitchen and installation of Nurses' Bathroom, installation of Modern Fire Extinguishing Equipment, Electric Fire Alarm system, and additional Fire Escape Ladder from North Wing Staff Bedroom. These additions have added appreciably to the efficient working of the Hospital.

Establishment.

Renewals and Repairs to Buildings and Plant amounted to £263. 5. 3.

Beds Occupied

The average daily number of beds occupied during the year 1937 was 22.41 compared with 21.03 for the year 1936. The number of patients admitted was 484 compared with 471 for the preceding year.

Electro-Medical Department.

The number of X Ray Examinations was 489 in 1937, compared with 415 in 1936, and the number of Physiotherapy patients was 340 in 1937 compared with 304 in 1936.

Blood Transfusion.

The cordial thanks of the Committee are again due to Mr. P. I. Oliver, O.B.E., Honorary Secretary of the British Red Cross Blood Transusion Service and to their members who have so promptly and generously responded to the calls upon them.

Donations.

The Committee tender their thanks for the following grants which form part of the Income of the year:—
to King Edward's Hospital Fund £100; to the Alexandra Day Fund £100. A List of Donations is given on pages 25 and 26.

Ladies' Linen League.

The Committee express their thanks to the Members of the League for their valuable work during the year.

Subscriptions 1936—37 amounted to £70. 5. 3. and 189 articles in kind. The money includes £17. 10. from the Stock Exchange Dramatic and Operatic "Help Yourself" Society as one Share of their Christmas Charity Fund; £1. 12. 3 for sale of Silver Paper, collected and disposed of by Mrs. M. O. Lewis; and "Button-Cards"—for collection of small sums—brought in £2 17. 6.

The hospital was provided with: 12 night-gowns; 6 blankets; 36 washing ditto; 6 bedspreads; 12 marcella quilts; 6 cot sheets; 4 large table-cloths; 44 table-cloths (various); 2 bed-jackets; 78 pillow-slips; 32 under pillow-slips; 12 pillow-ticks; 171 huck-a-back, 38 roller and 26 lavatory towels; 60 staff and 72 locker serviettes; 49 tray-cloths; 88 tea, 36 medicine, 24 oven and 3 dish-cloths; 12 toilet covers; 12 operation masks; 36 urinal covers; 5 hot-water bottle covers; 62 operation cloths; 42 triangular, 21 "many-tail," and 32 "T" bandages; 2 wringers; 52 dusters; 7 rubbers; 26 swabs; 2 pot cleaners, and 2 gross Cash's names.

There was a balance of £4 14. 9. Mrs. Brückmann once more supplied our special night-gowns; and Miss Mitting, her friends, pupils, and members of the Girls' Life Brigade, sent in 100 articles and made many bandages. Members of the League now sew weekly at the Hospital, with best attendances from Mrs. Douglas, Mrs. L. H. Jones, Mrs. Reith, Miss Turner and Mrs. Woods. It will be noted that the sum from the "Help Yourself" Society was sadly down again in 1936, but we only shared the fate of all other participants—however, we won four prizes.

Many new subscribers are wanted, and more "Button-Card" collectors would be especially welcome. The subscription is 2/6 (minimum), or, at least, two articles in kind.
