

## RULES.

Every donor of £21 is a Governor of the Hospital for life.

Governors are empowered in each year to recommend ten out-patients to the Hospital, free of the entrance fee, provided that such recommendations are given *only to persons who are legitimate objects of medical charity.*

Annual Subscribers of two guineas and upwards are Annual Governors, and may, subject to the same limitation, recommend ten out-patients, and Subscribers of not less than one guinea may recommend five out-patients, free of the entrance fee, during each year of their subscription.

N.B.—*No further recommendation is needed to admit the Bearer of a Hospital Letter as an in-patient provided the nature of the case require that she be treated in the Hospital. Persons who are too ill to attend first as out-patients, or who live at a distance, should apply for admission by post, enclosing a medical certificate, to the SECRETARY at the HOSPITAL.*

The letter of recommendation for patient must be renewed every month, and no in-patient can remain in the house longer than two months, except by the sanction of the Managing Committee.

No infectious cases can be admitted as in-patients.

The Hospital is open for the relief of out-patients every day except Sundays, public holidays and certain other days, of which due notice is given beforehand. In-patients are admitted as vacancies occur.

All patients and their friends have the right to lay a complaint before the Managing Committee personally, by deputy, or in writing.

In-patients are required to contribute a small sum weekly towards the cost of their maintenance while in the Hospital. This sum is fixed by the Almoner with reference to the position in life, etc., of each patient, and ranges from 7s. 6d. upwards per week.

It is in the power of the Almoner to admit cases of serious illness without any payment, if, on enquiry, it appear desirable to do so.

There are six private partitioned wards. The terms of admission to these wards are £4 4s. per week.

## RULES FOR IN-PATIENTS.

Patients coming into the Hospital are required to bring a change of linen, soap, towel, comb and brush for their own use.

They are required to provide themselves with clean linen twice a week.

Every patient is required to pay a weekly sum according to her means, and to provide her own butter and tea. Payments are to be paid in advance on entrance, and on each succeeding Friday during her stay.

Visitors to patients are allowed on Wednesdays and Sundays from 2.30 to 3.30.

No wine or spirit allowed to be brought into the Hospital by patients or their friends.

## RULES FOR OUT-PATIENTS.

Patients are admitted by payment of a fee of 1s. per attendance, or by a subscriber's letter, which must be renewed once a month.

Patients insured under the National Insurance Act are only seen at the written request of their Panel Doctor.

Sixpence towards medicine is charged every week.

## FIFTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

*Opening Ceremony.*—In presenting their Fifty-Seventh Annual Report the Committee have the honour to announce that Her Majesty the Queen has graciously consented to open the New Wing of the Hospital when ready. Application was also made during the year to obtain Her Majesty's consent to the Committee's desire that this Wing should be named in her honour.

*Royal Charter.*—During the year it was considered to be desirable that the Hospital should have a definite Constitution, and that it could obtain this, with dignity and a certain prestige, by being incorporated by Royal Charter. It was, accordingly, resolved to present the customary Petition to His Majesty, the King, through the Privy Council. All the necessary requirements have been complied with, and an early intimation is anticipated that His Majesty the King, on the recommendation of the Privy Council, will accede to the Petition. Mr. Newson Littlewood Garrett kindly put his services at the disposal of the Committee in dealing with this matter, and all the expenses in connection therewith were undertaken by Mrs. Gordon Pollock. To both these generous friends the Committee offer their cordial thanks.

*Re-opening of Hospital.*—The Hospital closed down entirely on the first of August last year, in order that the redecoration as well as the complete new Engineering and Sanitary arrangements in the old buildings could be carried

out. It was hoped that this would be completed in time for the buildings to be re-opened in October, but the general repairs to the old buildings involved far more work than was anticipated and it became necessary to defer the re-opening until the completion of the new wards at the end of the year. The blessing of the wards by the Vicar of St. Pancras took place on the 31st of December.

The extension of the time for the completion of the New Buildings became necessary owing to the large amount of additional work which has been carried out, partly due to the re-arrangement of the original plans in order to make larger and better provision for the Maternity and Children's Departments, and also to the additional work necessary in carrying out the revised internal finishing of the building and its equipment, which includes a complete new X-Ray Department.

*Annual Meeting.*—The Annual Meeting of the Governors was held on the 16th of March. Miss Strudwick, M.A., High Mistress of St. Paul's Girls' School, took the Chair, Sir William Plender and Dr. Brock of the Mary Datchelor School, Camberwell, were the principal speakers. The Committee are indebted to Miss Strudwick, Sir William Plender and Dr. Brock for their interesting and encouraging speeches on this occasion.

*Changes on the Medical Staff.*—It is with great regret that the Committee have to announce the resignation by Miss Mann, F.R.C.S., of her appointment on the Medical Staff. It will be remembered that last year Miss Mann was appointed to the post of Ophthalmic Surgeon at the Royal London Ophthalmic Hospital (Moorfields) and upon her appointment to the staff of the Royal Free Hospital last July, she was obliged, by pressure of work, to resign her post at this Hospital. The Committee cordially thank Miss Mann for her six years' distinguished service and confidently predict

for her a brilliant career in her new sphere of work. They are happy to report that Miss Mann has accepted their cordial invitation to her to serve on the Consulting Staff. During the year the Committee, who gladly acknowledge the valuable services of Miss Martland, M.B., B.S., Bio-chemist, decided to recognise the post as a Staff one and thus Miss Martland became a member of the Medical Staff.

*Changes on the Administrative Staff.*—The Committee were sorry to lose the services of Miss Alexie Crosthwaite, Assistant Secretary, who resigned in March. Her place was taken by Miss Mona Guild. Miss Audrey Fox was appointed as Assistant Almoner in May, it being understood that she would carry out the clerical work of the Department until normal conditions were restored.

*Numbers of Patients.*—Owing to the fact that the Hospital was closed for the last five months it is not possible, this year, to make any useful comparison between the numbers of patients treated with the numbers recorded in former years. Nevertheless, judging from the proportion dealt with, the Hospital, which has kept in touch with all the cases on both the In- and Out-Patient waiting lists, can expect as large attendances as ever when it is once more in full working order.

Of the 621 In-Patients admitted from January to the end of July, 450 were surgical, 114 medical, 28 maternity and 29 infants. Of these 342 were sent to the Rosa Morison House of Recovery, which was also used by the Physicians for the direct admission of medical cases during the October-December quarter.

The new Out-Patients treated this year numbered 2,205 and of these 81 were patients attending the Skin Department, 164 the Throat, Nose and Ear Department, 63 the Children's Department and 363 were patients attending the Ante-natal

Clinics. The total Out-Patient attendances numbered 26,000, including the radium, cancer and other pressing cases on the Hospital registers treated during the last quarter of the year in the old temporary surgical Out-Patient Department at 134 and 132, Euston Road. 3,600 visits paid to maternity cases in their own homes are also included.

*Maternity Department.*—Although the Maternity Department did not close down for District work the knowledge that the Hospital was closed slightly affected the numbers attending the Ante-natal Clinics; 363 new patients attended of whom 63 were consultation cases. There were 490 patients attended on the district and 28 admitted to Hospital; 277 patients attended the post-natal Clinic. Seven pupil midwives sat for the examination of the Central Midwives Board, five of whom passed.

*Almoner's Department.*—The year's record of the work in the Almoner's Department was naturally broken by the closing of the Hospital at the end of July. The first seven months, however, showed a definite increase in the demand for after-care. Practically the same number of patients were sent to Convalescent Homes as during 1927 and there is an increase in the number of patients from the Dental Department who were provided with artificial teeth throughout the year. After July, as much was done for patients in their own homes as was possible, when the social workers were no longer in direct and constant touch with the Medical Staff. Home visiting among patients suffering from malignant disease was continued, and occasionally, after consultation with private doctors, it was possible to move them to Homes for the Dying, or similar institutions. After-care in the Maternity Department was also continued throughout this period and very close and satisfactory relations have now been established with the local Welfare Centres and Schools for Mothers.

*Helping Hand Association.*—The Helping Hand Committee has met regularly and the money they have been able to provide for special cases has been of the greatest help. An anonymous donation of £100 to this Fund was a welcome windfall, and yet remains intact, having been put on Deposit Account at the Bank.

*Accounts.*—It will be remembered that last year the Committee reported that they had been obliged to incur a Bank Loan of £2,500, which, however, they were able to pay off before the 31st December; they regret to report that this year an overdraft of £4,814 was incurred, which was still outstanding at the end of the year. This debt to the Bank causes the Committee the gravest anxiety and they earnestly hope that the generosity of the Hospital's many friends, and the increased income which will accrue from the full number of patients—meaning a corresponding increase in grants from various public bodies—will during 1929 restore the Hospital to its normal financial condition.

*Subscriptions.*—The Subscriptions for 1928 amounted to £1,771 4s., as against £1,758 5s. 1d. last year. Donations—always a variable figure—were £573 8s. 7d., as against £857 2s. 9d. the year before.

*Legacies.*—Legacies for the year, though numerous, were very moderate and amounted in all to £432 10s.

The King's Fund made a further grant of £1,250 to the Building Fund, inclusive of £500 from the Wells' Legacies Fund, but exclusive of the £1,000 allotted from the Fund to be paid on the completion of the Extension Scheme.

*Extension of the Hospital.*—The new wing provides for the first time a Children's Ward and an admirably arranged Maternity Department with two labour, a seven-bed, three single-bed wards and a night nursery. These two additions to the accommodation of the Hospital, which has been improved and extended in other directions, are specially to be noted.

*Purchase of New Freehold.*—The full extent of the land available will have to be utilised to carry out the extension plans, and in view of this fact the Committee were obliged to buy the freehold of No. 130 Euston Road, the site of which was essential to the scheme of building a new Nurses' Home and paying wards. The purchase of the adjoining property, No. 128 Euston Road, is also of great importance, if a satisfactory price can be arranged and the sum raised; for although not necessary for the completion of the Extension Scheme, it would prevent the erection of buildings on that side which might interfere with the Hospital's light and air.

*Required Nursing Staff.*—It was obvious that with an enlarged Hospital which will be in full working order before the site for the Nurses' Home can be used, some extra accommodation for the additional Nursing Staff required must be provided, and the Committee are glad to report that they have been able to rent in the near neighbourhood, a house, which will accommodate ten nurses, the property of the Ambassadors' Hotel in Upper Woburn Place, with whom also an arrangement was made which provides sleeping accommodation for

eight other nurses in an annexe of the Hotel entirely reserved for them.

*Extension Appeal.*—The activities of the Extension Appeal Committee have been unremitting. To them and to the Public who have so cordially supported them the Hospital is deeply indebted. A full account of all the work accomplished by this Committee will be published when the Appeal is over, but in the meantime it is desired to draw attention to one or two of the striking features of the year's campaign.

*Purses' Scheme.*—When it became known that the Queen would open the new wing an appeal was issued to all groups of women urging them to contribute towards purses to be presented to Her Majesty on the occasion of her visit. The idea was Lady Hall's and is a development of her famous Endowment Appeal to Schools, many of which are again taking part in this work. A Committee under the able chairmanship of Lady Hall has been formed to organise the campaign.

*Jewel Scheme.*—Lady Hall was also responsible for the inauguration of the appeal to women to send a jewel or jewels for a casket to be presented to Her Majesty at the opening ceremony, and afterwards sold for the benefit of the Extension Fund. In expressing their thanks to Lady Hall, the Committee would very cordially include Lady Hudson, G.B.E., through whose help and kindness a very valuable press campaign was made possible, and who has devoted her time and great influence to furthering this project in every way.

*Memorial Endowment Fund.*—The Committee offer their hearty congratulations and warm thanks to Miss Burgess, M.A., Head Mistress of, and the Staff and Girls of, Burlington School, who, during the year, completed the necessary £1,000 for the endowment of their Bed. Queen Anne's School,

Caversham, is also working hard and have, to date, raised £602 towards the Fund for naming their Bed. The Committee are deeply sensible of all that has been done by these and all the schools who responded to this appeal and were instrumental in raising a sum for endowment which secures to the Hospital a yearly income of over £2,500.

*The Guilds.*—The Annual Pound Day and Sale organised by the Guild of the Hospital was held, by the courtesy and kindness of the Rev. Prebendary Metcalfe, at St. Pancras Vicarage. It realised £97 5s., and collected 833lbs. of various kinds of goods for Matron's store cupboard. The Guild's yearly grant of £70 for the upkeep of the Cot was once more forthcoming, together with other grants amounting to £100, which included £50 towards maintenance.

In spite of atrocious weather the Guild of Rosa Morison House held their Annual Garden Fête in June. The usual arrangements for erecting the Stalls on the lawn were upset by a deluge of rain which lasted all day. It says a great deal for the industry and devotion of members of the Guild—of whom Mrs. Carruthers, Hon. Secretary, and Mrs. Snow, Hon. Treasurer, are specially to be congratulated—and the numerous Stall-holders and entertainers that the Fête was a great success despite the weather. Lady Strafford, President of the Guild, conducted the opening ceremony and ultimately £138 was raised, out of which the usual grants will be forthcoming, leaving a margin for investment.

*The Patients' League: Death of Miss K. O. Macdonald.*—It is with the greatest regret that the Committee have to report the death of Miss K. O. Macdonald, President and Founder of the Patients' League. It would be impossible to over-estimate the benefits bestowed upon the Hospital or the atmosphere of loving service which distinguishes all the dealings

of the League since it was started by Miss Macdonald in 1910, and it is to its late revered President that the League owes its astonishing success in the service of the Hospital, and the admirable spirit in which it is carried on. In recording their loving and grateful recognition of her great achievement the Committee are glad to report that the 4th Patients' League Bed is to bear her name. They are glad to welcome Miss Louisa Macdonald, M.A., the new President and wish her success and happiness in the office she has so kindly undertaken.

This year the League held its Annual Sale at Dr. Macdonald's house. It was well attended and very enjoyable and successful.

*Christmas.*—The Hospital was not open for Christmas so that the usual festivities were not held. It was a matter of the greatest regret that Miss Dorothea Webb's annual concert, once more generously offered, could not take place. At Barnet the patients enjoyed an entertainment provided and arranged by members of the Rosa Morison House Guild.

*Acknowledgments.*—The Committee gladly take this opportunity to tender their sincere thanks to the many friends whose activities on behalf of the Hospital they have recorded, the members of the Schools' and Jewel Committees and all the generous and hardworking supporters of the Extension Appeal: the officers and members of the Hospital Guilds and the Patients' League and the following honorary workers—Miss Flemming and Miss Ross (Librarians), Miss Ethel Dunn and Mrs. Marshall Smith (Book-keepers), Miss Hall, Miss Ethel Ingpen, Miss MacAdam, Miss Hamilton, Mrs. Gadsdon, Mrs. Quill, Mrs. Lawson (Clerical Assistants), Miss Lathom (Masseuse) and Mrs. Jacobs, Mrs. E. R. Jacobs and Mrs. Hilliard for the loans of their private cars for use of patients. The Committee also desire to tender their hearty thanks to the

Vicar of St. Pancras and his curate the Rev. R. Owen, the Rev. Father Barton and the other clergy who minister to our patients, to Bishop Lander, Vicar of New Barnet, for his care of our patients at Rosa Morison House ; to Messrs. Deloitte Plender, Griffiths & Co., the Honorary Auditors, to whom the Committee are deeply grateful, to Miss Tarrant, the representative of this distinguished Firm who audits the Hospital Accounts yearly with such skill and patience, to the Committee of the Hearts of Oak Benefit Society for their courtesy in lending their Boardroom for meetings during the time that the old building was being reconditioned and to the many friends whose kindness and generosity are recorded in the following pages of this Report.


