**REPORT****For Year Ending 31st December, 1933**

---

In presenting their 66th Report and Statement of Accounts for the year ended the 31st December last, the Council again desire to convey their best thanks to the Subscribers and Contributors, and generally to all those who have in various ways contributed to the welfare of the Hospital and its patients during the past year.

Dealing first with the work of the Hospital, it will be seen from the statistics compiled by the Hon. Registrar that during the year 1775 cases were admitted, the number of deaths having been 88, (5%); of these 18 died within 24 hours of admission. The number of Inpatient operations was 1157; the average number of beds occupied was 118, and the average number of days each patient remained in Hospital was 24. In the Out-patients' Department there were 4607 new cases, and 21,449 treatments. The total number of minor operations (Tonsils, etc.) was 939 and the average number of dressings daily, 59. Road accidents treated as In-patients numbered 33, the cost of maintenance of same being £214 15s. 0d. of which only £16 11s. 6d. was recovered either by payments from Insurance Companies under the Road Traffic Act or from the patients themselves.

The Honorary Dental Staff's services are greatly appreciated, they have extracted 49 teeth under 2 general and 13 infiltration anaesthetics, thereby helping patients to quick recovery.

As regards the X-Ray, Electrical and Massage Departments, there have been 1,521 patients examined, the number of films exposed being 3,869; number of patients treated by X-Ray Therapy 106, involving 1,313 treatments. There have been 6,397 Massage Treatments and 1,168 Electrical treatments.

On referring to the Matron's Report on the working of the Private Nursing Home it will be seen that during the year 210 cases were admitted, which with the 4 patients remaining in on the 1st January, 1933, made a total of 214 compared with 188 for the previous year, of this number 197 were discharged cured or relieved, 12 died (8 inoperable chronic cases and 1 within 24 hours of admission, and 5 remained in the Home on December 31st, 1933. Of the total number of cases dealt with 172 were surgical (including 1 maternity) and 42 Medical (including 6 X-Ray). The number of major operations was 107, and of minor operations 65. The average number of beds occupied daily was 6.5 and the average duration of each patient's stay was 11 days.

As regards Income and Expenditure it will be seen that the income for the year has been £11,467 18s. 4d. compared with £11,365 17s. 8d. for the previous year, and that the expenditure has been £11,373 16s. 2d. as against £12,093 12s. 11d., leaving a Credit Balance on the year's working of £94 2s. 2d. This has only been accomplished by rigid economy and postponing the painting of the outside of the Hospital, and decoration of the Surgical Wards and Out-patients' Department.

Grants and Special Donations were received during the year from The League of Mercy (£40), Iron Trades Employers Insurance Association Ltd. (£25), Mrs. Myers (£20), Mr. Duke (£20), British International Association (£10), Lancashire County Council (Public Assistance Department) (£6 14s. 0d.), Ribble Motor Services (equal to 25% of their employees contributions) (£4 19s. 2d.).

A sum of £378 19s. 2d. has been realised by local entertainments, The Barrow Amateur Operatic Society contributed £71 16s. 2d. as a result of their production of "The Geisha," the Light Opera Players from the production of "The Gondoliers" £29 8s. 0d., His Worship the Mayor (Ald. T. Morton)'s Charity Ball £65 1s. 4d., Cumberland and Westmorland Constabulary, per Supt. Melville, part proceeds of Dance £15 17s. 11d., Miss Parkinson's Children's Dancing Display £9 12s. 6d., Miss Crawford's Dancing Display £7 10s. 0d., A. J. Middleton's collections at Hairdressing Display £7 3s. 6d., Furness Hockey Club £5 3s. 6d., Loxhams Garages, Proceeds of Trade Film Display, £4 2s. 3d.

The Orpheans Ball Committee handed over the sum of £65 making their total amount towards the endowment of a bed, £840.

During the year it was found necessary to replace the inter-communication telephones by the "Strowgerphone" Automatic Telephones, and a Football Match between Marsh Hornets and Hindpool Hornets realised £10 7s. 10d. as a special effort towards the cost of same.

The Womens Hospital Committee raised by their Whist Drives and Annual Ball £57 7s. 4d. and have provided all new apparatus and renewals for the Operating Theatres to the value of £54 4s. 8d. during the year. The total amount raised by this Committee to date for the Operating Theatre Account is £689 4s. 2d.

The Ladies' Linen League, under the guidance of its original founders, again rendered valuable assistance. The number of articles contributed on View Day was 1,374, and the Matron purchased Mattresses, Blankets, etc., and 1,131 yards material from cash received, making a total number of articles 2,556, of an approximate value of £284 10s. 0d. All bedding and linen required

for the Hospital and Nurses Home, also Curtains for the latter, were provided by the League. The W. E. Prichard Memorial Ward was also equipped with new bedding and linen. The value of the Ladies' Linen League is emphasised by the General Account having been freed from any expenditure for bedding and linen renewals during the last two years. As an act of appreciation of the great work done by the League, a tablet is placed over a bed in the Women's Surgical Ward commemorating the raising of the first £1,000 by the League.

Congregational Collections amounted to £35 18s. 5d. as against £40 16s. 2d. in the previous year.

The Building Account is still overdrawn by £2,207 1s. 11d., this however is a reduction of £659 13s. 3d. on the previous year's figures. We are greatly indebted to Messrs. Vickers-Armstrongs Ltd. (through our good friend Commander Craven) for, in addition to the Special Donation of £250 given at the beginning of the year, they also gave £500 on the opening day of the "W. E. Prichard Memorial Ward," as a special incentive towards this incubus being cleared off. Alexandra Rose Day Celebration provided a further £141 18s. 11d., and a Sunday Concert by the Working Men's Club Choir realised £16 8s. 4d.

To all the foregoing the Council tender their sincere thanks for the help so willingly given.

The Mortgage on the Hospital property is reduced by £108 5s. 7d. to £2,626 3s. 6d.

Legacies have been received during the year from the Exors. of the late Mr. L. P. Chapman (Ulverston) £100; Mrs. Lydia Philips £100; R. T. Johnstone (Broughton) £100; F. Diss £25; J. Jenkinson (Dalton) £5; Miss S. A. Dixon has paid two instalments of £100 each towards the endowment of a Cot. The Endowments Account by these amounts is increased to £3,418 0s. 0d.

The "W. E. Prichard Memorial Ward" made possible by the generous legacy of the late Miss F. M. Blower, was completed and formally opened by Commander Craven on Saturday, November 11th in the presence of a large number of invited guests, and has already proved a great boon. It contains 16 beds and replacing the Wooden Army Hut is intended primarily for Accident Cases.

The income from the Church Street Nursing Home amounted to £1,356 0s. 5d. as compared with £1,261 12s. 11d. in 1932, and the expenditure £967 9s. 8d. as against £955 9s. 6d., leaving a balance, including £1,046 14s. 1d. brought forward from the previous year of £1,432 14s. 10d.

Dr. Allan, President of the Hospital and Senior Honorary Surgeon, decided during the year to retire from active work on



the Hospital's Honorary Staff, and the Council as a token of appreciation of and thanks for his long and valued services, asked him to accept a position of Hon. Consulting Surgeon, which they are pleased to report was accepted.

Dr. H. F. Blacklee who had been a member of the Honorary Out-patients Staff for nine years was unanimously elected to the vacancy on the Hon. In-patients Staff, and Dr. Edgar P. Waters, M.B., F.R.C.S., D.P.H. (Edin.), was appointed a member of the Honorary Out-patients Staff.

The Council also received during the year the resignations of the Rev. Father Alcock and Councillor Massicks (Subscriber's representatives for the Catholic Churches and Barrow Corporation respectively) and Workpeoples' representatives in Messrs. M. Batty (Vickers-Armstrongs Ltd., Engineering), J. Parnham (Vickers-Armstrongs Ltd., Shipbuilding), G. H. Ashton (L.M. & S. Railway Hospital Fund), as members of the Council, and the best thanks of the Council were accorded to them for their valuable services during their years of membership of the Council. The respective vacancies were filled by the appointment of the Rev. Father Sullivan, Alderman Mrs. Lee, Messrs. J. H. Sparkes, W. Yeo, and A. Quinn.

Subscriptions have been made to several outside Hospitals, and 27 contributors have this year received treatment in such Institutions. In some cases the patients have had prolonged treatment with beneficial results, which would not probably have been possible (owing to the cost) if they had not been contributors. It, therefore, behoves all members of families who are working to become contributors to the Hospital, in order that they may be able to obtain, if required, the many benefits offered to those who avail themselves of the contributory scheme. Contributors, genuinely unemployed, are entitled to the free benefits, on payment of the arrears of contributions from the date of last employment irrespective of time, but the Council strongly advise Contributors that they should not become in arrears, but, whilst unemployed should take advantage of the facilities provided at the Hospital for paying their contributions on Direct Contributors' Cards

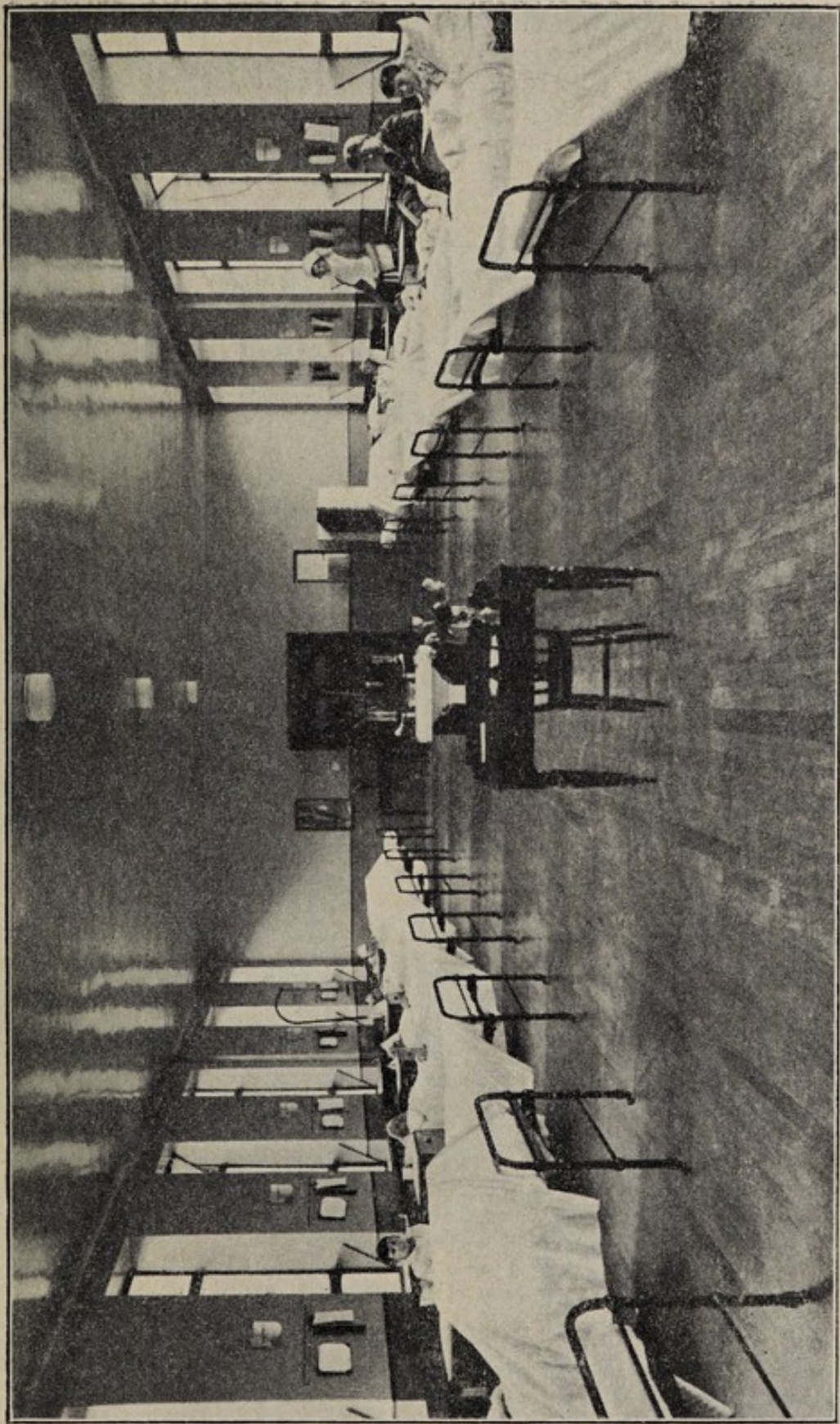

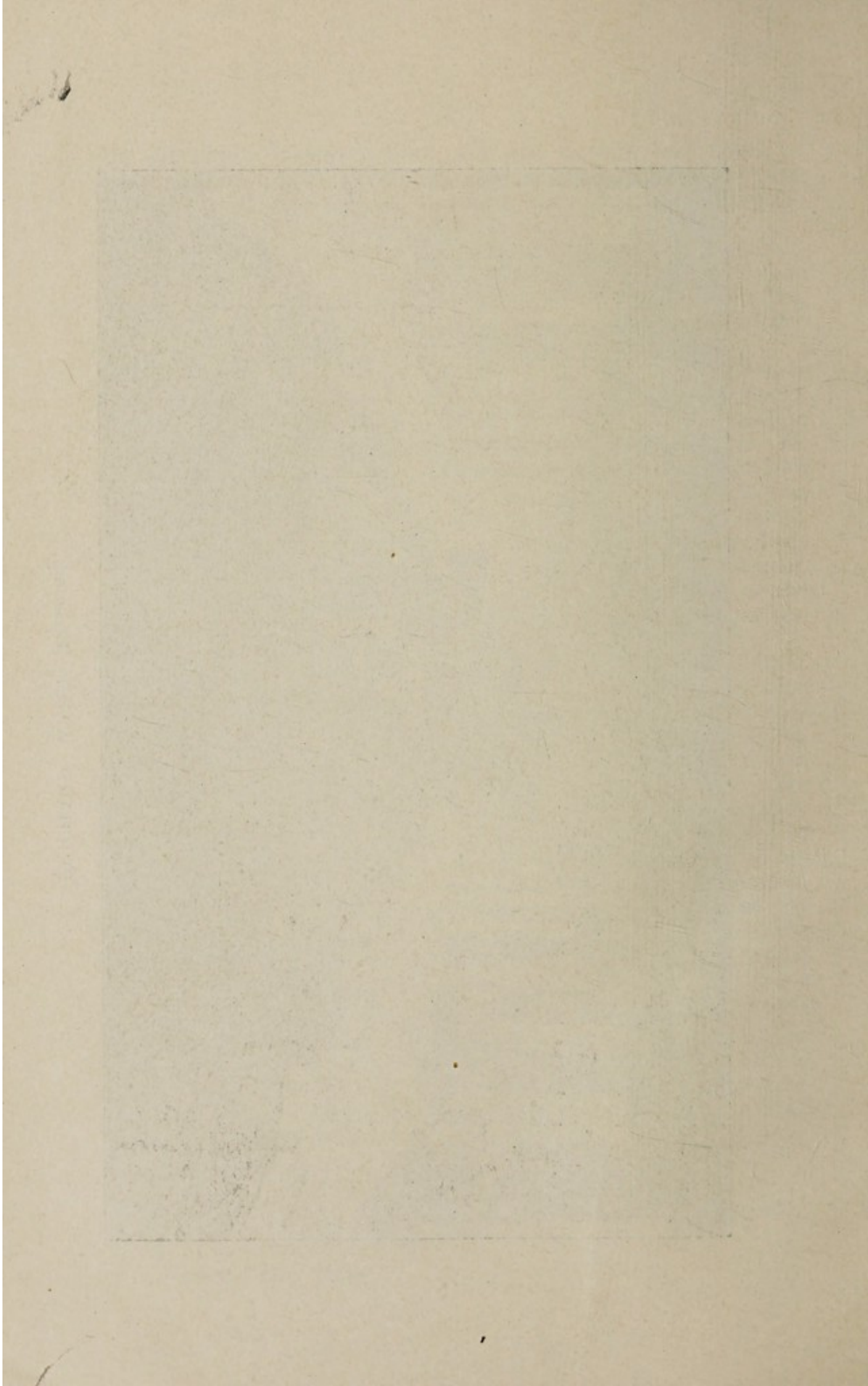

GENTLEMEN,

The Report for the year 1933 shows a total of 1775 patients admitted to the Hospital for treatment during the year, a decrease of 21 as compared with our previous report.

The Out-Patient Department rendered 21,449 treatments, an increase on the figures of 1932.

The number of In-Patients Operations is 1157 ,an increase on the previous year.

The Out-Patients Operations numbered 939, an increase of 104 on last year's figures.

An analysis of the work accomplished in the various Departments of the Hospital has been prepared, and we hope that this will be of interest in showing the wide range of treatment given.

We have to record steady work in all the Departments, including the Laboratory, and the Dental Branch of treatment for the needs of In-Patients.

In the X-Ray, Massage, and Ophthalmic Departments, we have to report an increase in the number of patients treated during the past year, for details see following page.

We desire to acknowledge, with cordial thanks, the loyal co-operation and willing services of the Resident Medical and Surgical Staff, Matron and Nursing Staff.

## NORTH LONSDALE HOSPITAL

FREE TREATMENT is given not only to all workmen and employees resident in Barrow, North Lonsdale or Millom who are or become contributors to the above Institution but also to their wives, children or other direct dependents.

Shop Assistants, Domestic Servants and others who are in employment do not, however, come within the definition of "dependents."

### HOW TO BECOME A CONTRIBUTOR

Any workman or employee who pays TWOPENCE (or ONE PENNY if not married and under 21 years of age) per week, becomes a Contributor. This amount must be paid through the employers or funds of the works or trade at which the Contributor is employed. If this is not possible, then it may be sent by post to the Secretary, or paid direct to the Dispenser at the Hospital between the hours of 8-30 a.m. and 1 p.m., and 2 p.m. and 5 p.m.; also 6-30 p.m. and 7-30 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and 8-30 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Saturdays.

### THE BENEFITS TO WHICH A CONTRIBUTOR AND HIS DIRECT DEPENDENTS ARE ENTITLED

Admission to the Hospital as an In-Patient or to treatment in the Out-Patients' Department, treatment of the EYES, and X-RAY TREATMENT, FREE OF ANY FURTHER CHARGE. Arrangements have been made for the efficient treatment of diseases of and accidents to the eyes and two small wards have been set aside for the indoor treatment of these cases. The Council have a large EYE MAGNET for extracting metal or similar foreign matter from the eye, and also modern X-Ray and Electrical Apparatus. The Council, as far as possible, have also made provision for outside institutional treatment, the patients merely paying their railway fares. Application for Recommends for outside Institutional treatment should be made to the Secretary. Recommends for outside Institutions, subject to the approval of the Hon. Staff, are issued for one month only in the first place, and application should be made for their renewal if longer treatment is required. All Recommends are issued subject to the Regulations governing this Hospital.

The Hospital has the advantage of the services of a large staff of Surgeons, who number no less than 14.

The Council hope that all workmen and employees will become Contributors to the Hospital, and so be able to obtain, if required, the benefits set out above.



Further particulars may be obtained on application to the Secretary at the Hospital.

### TREATMENT OF PATIENTS

Accidents and urgent operations are attended to at any hour (day or night).

Out-Patients are attended to daily (Sunday excepted) at 9 a.m.

It is required of all patients admitted into the Hospital that their relatives or friends provide them with a change of linen, and a comb, towel, soap and tooth brush.

### NOTICE TO VISITORS

Considerable inconvenience having arisen in consequence of the abuse of the privilege allowed to relatives and friends to visit patients in the Hospital, attention is called to the following Rules regarding the admission of visitors. The Nurses and other Officers of the Institution have received instructions to see that the same are strictly adhered to.

1.—No visitor who has been in contact with any infectious case is allowed to visit the Hospital.

2.—Relations and friends may visit patients on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6-30 to 7-30 p.m., and on Sundays from 2 to 3-30 p.m.

3.—No visitor shall be admitted on any other day without the special leave of the House Surgeon or (in his absence) the Matron.

4.—No more than four persons can be allowed to visit a patient on the same day (two at a time).

5.—Children under 14 years of age shall not be allowed in the Children's Ward on Visiting days except under special circumstances, and then only by permission of the House Surgeon or Matron.

6.—Visitors are requested not to remain long with a patient, nor to sit on the patient's bed; and they are strictly prohibited from entering other Wards.

7.—VISITORS BRINGING TO THE PATIENTS, WITHOUT PERMISSION, SWEETMEATS, FRUIT, LIQUIDS, OR Eatables OF ANY KIND OR DESCRIPTION, WILL BE REFUSED THE PRIVILEGE OF AGAIN VISITING THE PATIENT.

8.—Visitors are requested to come clean and tidy in their person and dress.

9.—All or any of the Wards may be closed to Visitors at the discretion of the Matron, or Sister in charge of a Ward.

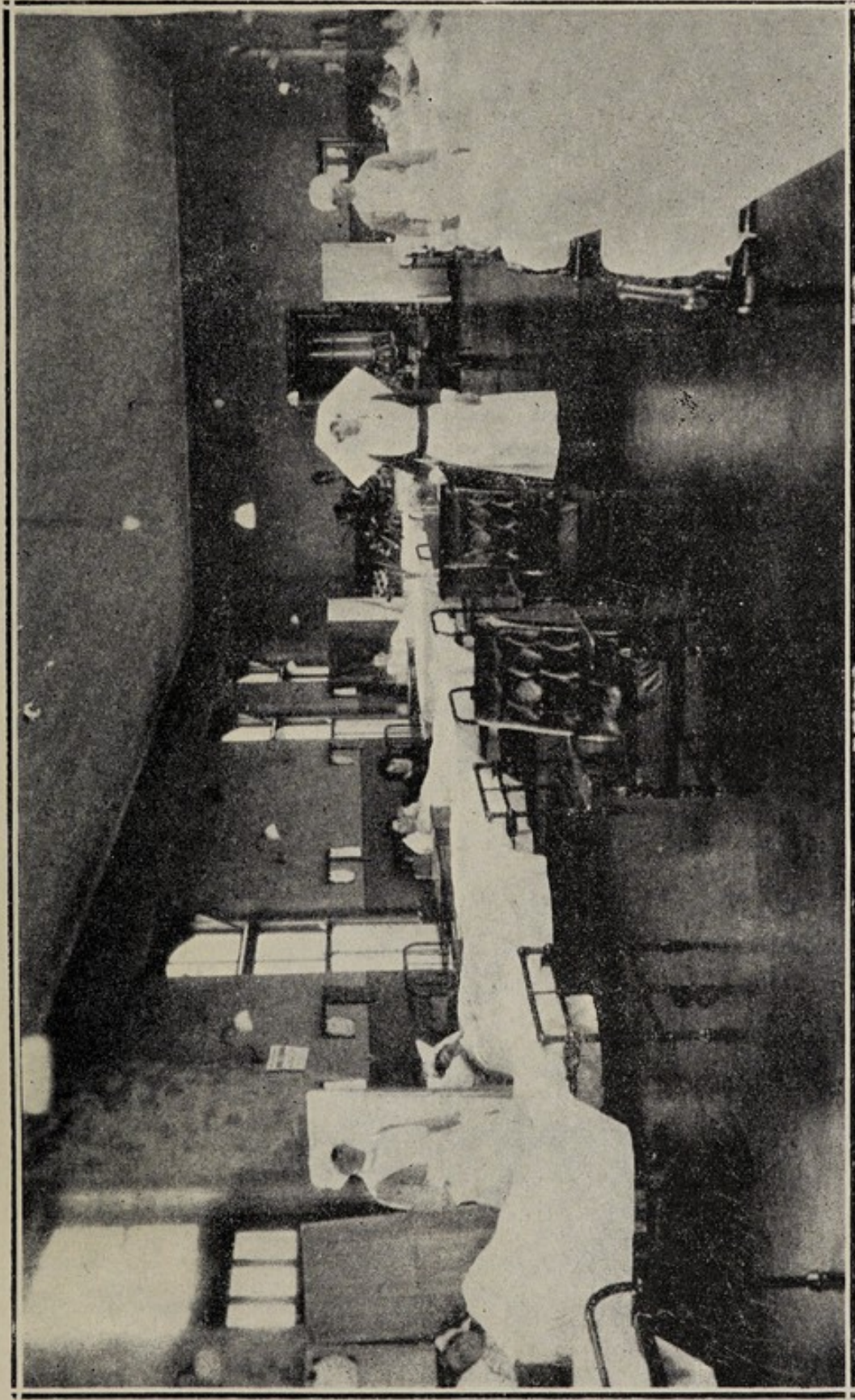
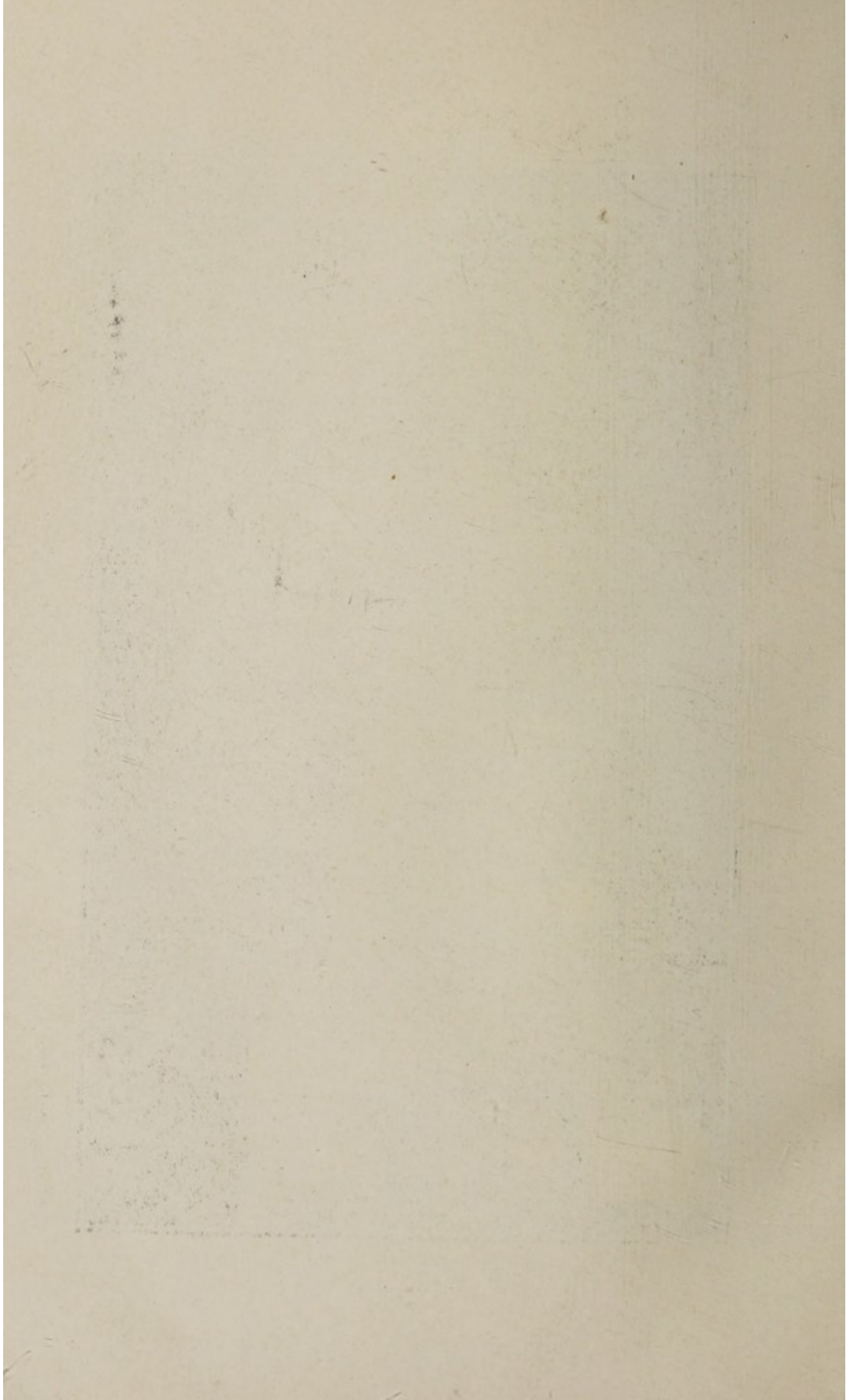

## NORTH LONSDALE HOSPITAL

---

### OBJECTS AND CONSTITUTION

---

The North Lonsdale Hospital, which, with its appurtenances, is held by trustees, has been erected and is maintained by subscriptions and voluntary contributions to meet the requirements of the District of Barrow-in-Furness, North Lonsdale, and Millom, in respect of the following objects :

(a) The reception, medical, acute medical and surgical treatment, and nursing of persons suffering from accidents and diseases necessitating medical and surgical skill and efficient nursing.

(b) The surgical treatment of persons as Out-Patients.

The Hospital is under the management of a Council consisting of the President, the Trustees, two of the Honorary Surgeons nominated by the Honorary Staff, the Hon. Treasurer, and 26 members elected annually, of whom 12 shall be elected by the Subscribers, and 14 shall be elected by Employees who contribute under the regulations in that behalf.

The allocation and mode of election of the 14 members of the Council by contributing employees shall be such as shall from time to time be agreed by such contributors ; and if any vacancy among these members shall occur during any year, such vacancy shall be filled by a member elected by the contributors whose representative has ceased to be a member.

If any vacancy shall occur during any year among the members elected by the subscribers, the same shall be filled by a member to be elected by the other members of the Council elected by the subscribers.

Members of the Council elected during any year shall only hold office until the next annual election of the Council.

The Council are authorised to elect out of their members such committees for general or special purposes as they may think fit, and such committees are authorised to appoint sub-committees for special purposes, or to deal with matters of urgent necessity.

Every annual subscriber of 5s. and upwards is entitled to one vote at all general meetings, and every member of the Council elected by the contributing employees is entitled to attend all general meetings of the subscribers, and to one vote thereat in respect of all matters, except the election of the subscribers' representatives on the Council.



Every Subscriber shall be entitled at his option to one 6s. In-patients' recommendation for each Guinea subscribed or to two 1s. Out-patients recommendations for a subscription of 10s. 6d., which will be credited for value towards the charges for maintenance or treatment of the patients for whose benefit such recommendations have been applied by the subscriber in accordance with the Regulations.

Subscriptions are due on the 1st January in each year.

A Statement of the Receipts and Expenditure will be submitted annually to a General Meeting and a copy furnished to each subscriber and contributors' representative.

Donations and subscriptions will be thankfully received, as well as gifts of fruit, vegetables, bedding, old linen for dressings, etc.

### GENERAL REGULATIONS

1.—All cases of In-Patients and Out-Patients at the Hospital are treated by the Hospital Staff only, and every requisite, except personal clothing, combs, towels and soap, is provided in the Hospital.

2.—The charge for In-Patients at the Hospital shall be at the rate of 6s. per day in the general wards except that in the case of patients sent by any Society or Association which pays the Hospital per case treated, the charge shall be 7s. per day. Provided that the foregoing charges shall not apply to cases sent in by a Government Department, Local Authority or Public Body with whom special financial arrangements have been made for the maintenance of such cases.

The charge for treatment in the Out-Patients' Department shall be at the rate of sixpence for each attendance after the first, which shall be free.

3.—The above charges shall be satisfied wholly or in part by the recommendations of subscribers, which are of the value of 6s. each for In-Patients and 1s. for Out-Patients.

4.—The Committee may, in any case they think fit, remit the whole or any part of the above charges, but such remission shall only be made upon such information being supplied to them as to the Patient's means and circumstances as they may require.

5.—The contribution by any workman or employee of two-pence per week, or one penny per week if unmarried and under 21 years of age, paid through his or her employers, or otherwise, or whose employers contribute that sum for him or her, shall entitle such workman or employee and his wife or her husband, and children, or other direct dependents, to admission to the Hospital as In-Patients (provided there is room) or to treatment

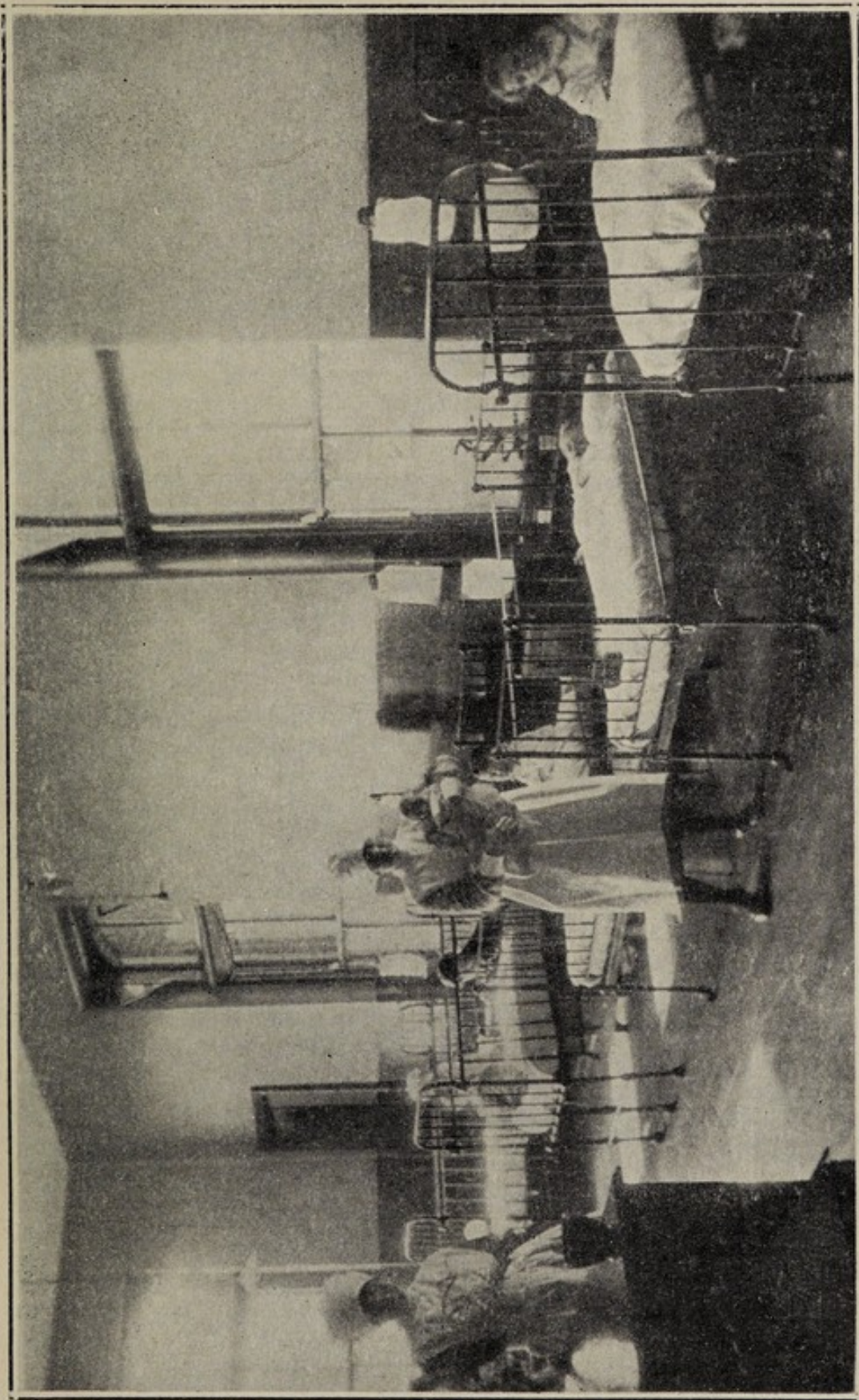
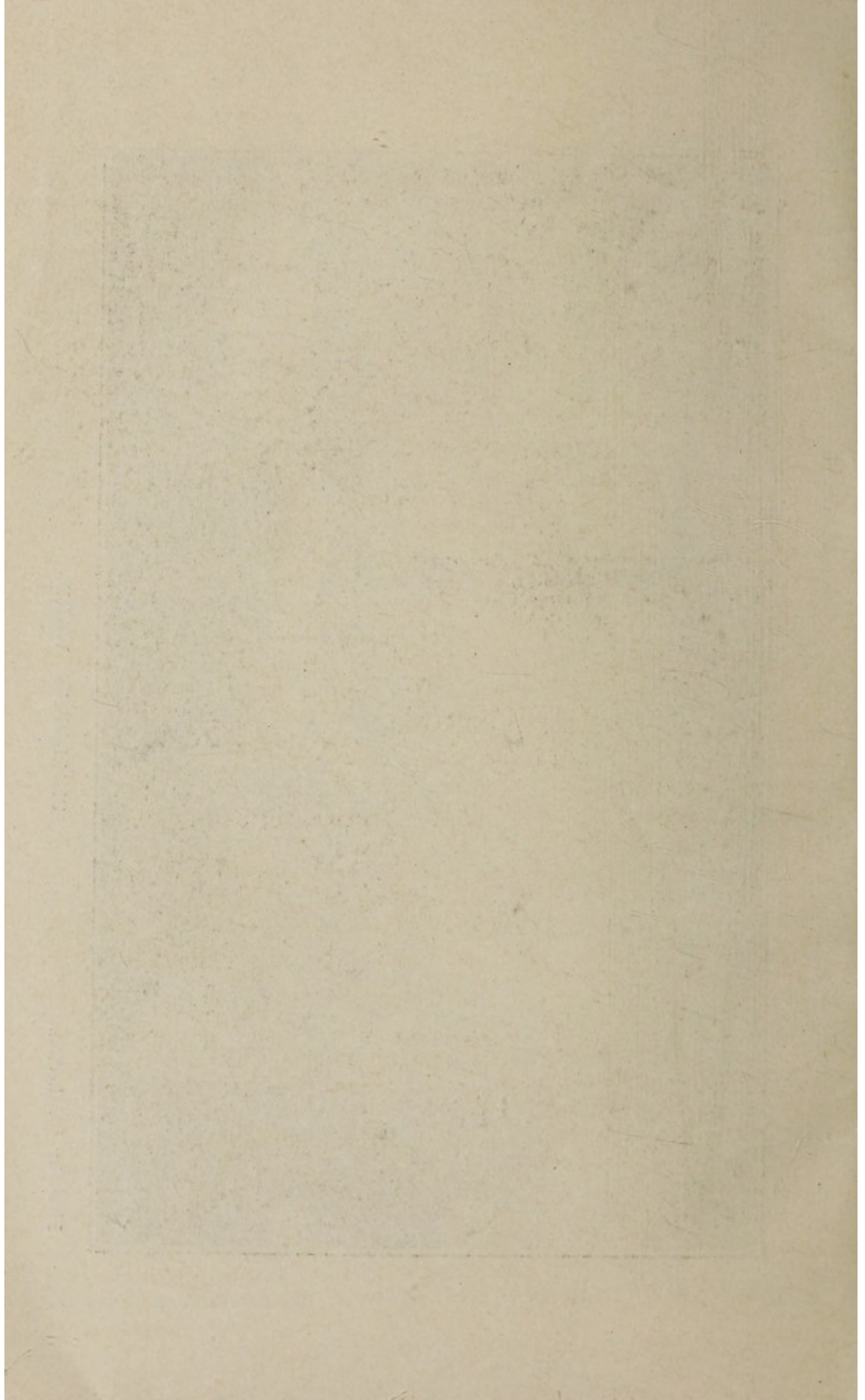

in the Out-Patients' Department, free of charge. Also to outside Institutional treatment, subject to the Regulations from time to time governing this Hospital, the patients merely paying their railway fares.

The term "children" in this Regulation shall be deemed to include and be confined to all children living with and dependent upon the contributor, and who are not liable to contribution on their own behalf under these Regulations.

In every case coming under this regulation a certificate in the prescribed form signed by one of the officers of the Fund through which free treatment is claimed, must be presented before admission to the Hospital, or before treatment, or in case of accident or urgency, as soon as possible after the admission of the patient.

The Council shall be empowered to make special financial arrangements in respect of any Company, or other persons not permanently carrying on business in the town, but who may be employing workmen for any considerable period in the town.

6.—Notwithstanding any of the provisions in the 5th General Regulation as to the free treatment to which any contributor is entitled by reason of his or her contribution, or as to the rate of charge in any other Regulation as to other patients' treatment, the Council shall be empowered to arrange with and obtain payment from any Government Department, Local Authority, or Public Body, for the treatment of any patient at the Hospital, and such payment shall be in addition to any charge or contribution mentioned in the General Regulations.

7.—Cases of accident, or requiring urgent medical or surgical treatment are received into the Hospital, or attended to in the Out-Patients' Department, as the case may be, at any hour, and the required payment may be made or recommendations or certificates sent afterwards.

8.—Other cases can only be received into the Hospital or attended to in the Out-Patients' Department upon the requisite recommendations of a subscriber or certificate of a contributor being furnished, or satisfactory arrangements being made for payment of the prescribed charges.

9.—If at any time all the applicants cannot be received into the Hospital for want of room, the selection of patients will be regulated by a regard to the relative urgency or severity of their ailments.

10.—Only those patients can be admitted into the Hospital whose cases appear to the Medical Staff to require Hospital treatment, and to be likely to benefit within a reasonable period.

11.—Maternity, infectious, incurable, chronic, or consumptive cases are not eligible for admission to the Hospital, except for the purpose of operation, or where special arrangements have been made with a Government Department, Local Authority, or Public Body for their admission.

12.—Except as mentioned in Clause 7, medical or chronic cases cannot be treated in the Out-Patients' Department.

13.—Persons requiring treatment in the Out-Patients' Department will be treated at the specified hours only, except in cases of urgency.

14.—All recommendations or certificates both for In- and Out-Patients shall be upon the prescribed forms, which must be strictly complied with. Excepting emergencies, no patient will be admitted to the Hospital unless the Recommendation or Certificate be signed by a Medical man and a provisional diagnosis given.

15.—Patients who are not contributors and who are in receipt of, or are entitled to, parochial relief can only be admitted or treated on payment by the Public Assistance Committees of the District to which they belong of the Hospital charges applicable to the cases.

16.—Patients requiring Doctor's Certificates can receive one free per week, and any others that may be required will be supplied at a charge of 2d. each, the fee to go to the funds of the Hospital.

17.—Patients may be visited by the Ministers of the religious denominations to which they belong.

Relations and friends may visit patients on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6-30 to 7-30 p.m., and on Sundays from 2-0 to 3-30 p.m., subject to the health of the patients not being endangered thereby, but not more than four persons can be allowed to visit the same patient on the same day (only two at a time).

Provided, nevertheless, that all or any of the Wards may be closed to Ministers of Religion and visitors at the discretion of the Matron, or Sister-in-Charge of a Ward.

18.—The Council reserve to themselves the right to require and insist upon the removal from the Hospital of any patient whose presence may be detrimental to, or undesirable in, the interests of other patients, or who may have been admitted contrary to Regulations.

19.—All patients admitted to, or receiving treatment at, the Hospital shall be bound by these Regulations and all the Rules for the government of the Hospital for the time being in force.

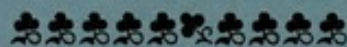
