REPORT

For the Year ended 31st December, 1934.

The Council have much pleasure in presenting their Sixtyseventh Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the year ended the 31st December last, and in doing so, desire again to express their warmest thanks to the subscribers, donors and contributors generally, and also to all those who have in many ways so kindly contributed to the welfare of the Hospital and its inmates during the year under review.

The demand for the services of the Hospital has been more extensive than ever, and it will be seen from the detailed report compiled by the Hon. Registrar that 2,065 cases (290 more than in 1933) were admitted, of whom 1,567 were cured, 331 relieved, 59 unrelieved, and 108 died (23 within 24 hours of admission) whilst in addition 30 contributors or their dependents were granted recommends for treatment at outside institutions. Inpatient operations to the number of 1,297 were performed, as against 1,157 in 1933, incidentally this is a record for operations performed in any year. The total available beds (including Balcony beds) is 150. The average number of beds occupied daily was 121 (against 118 in the previous year) and the average stay of each patient in Hospital was 22 days. In the Out-patients Department there were 5,659 new cases, the number of treatments being 22,448. The total number of minor operations (Tonsils, etc.) was 721 and the average number of dressings daily, 61. Twenty-eight motor accident cases treated cost £247 10s. 0d. of which ± 37 12s. 0d. was recovered from Insurance Societies or the patients themselves.

During 1934 an arrangement was entered into between the Council and the Barrow Corporation, under the Local Government Act of 1929, by which it was agreed that the Corporation should have, providing there was room, the call upon 20 beds, to be used for acute Medical and Surgical patients, who were not contributors to the Hospital, or for whom the Public Assistance Committee were not responsible. Such cases to be recommended by their medical attendants to the Medical Officer of Health for the Borough, who would decide whether they were suitable for admission under the Scheme to the Hospital. The number of cases admitted from April 1st to December 31st, 1934 was 40, and their average stay 20 days. At the same time arrangements were made by which patients in Hospital requiring Convalescent Home treatment can be transferred direct from the Hospital to the Barrow War Memorial Convalescent Home (Infield); the cost of conveyance to be borne by the patient. (The mode of procedure in such cases is printed on page 48). The Council also agreed with the Ministry of Health (Dental Section) and the Lancashire Mental Hospitals Board, for the provision of a room for a "Dental" Clinic once monthly, and a "Nerve" Clinic twice monthly respectively.

The X-Ray Department's work consisted of the examination of 1,764 patients; the number of films exposed being 3,846, X-Ray Therapy, number of patients treated 89, number of treatments given being 1,320, and in the Massage and Electrical Departments there were 6,597 massage treatments and 1,081 electrical treatments. Ultra Violet Rays treatments were 11, and Carbon Dioxide Treatments 15.

The Honorary Dental Staff (whose number was increased to 6 by the addition of Mr. Thurston Ireland, L.D.S.) are always ready to place their services on the request of the Hon. Surgeons, at the disposal of patients whose recovery is being retarded by dental defects.

It will be noticed from the Matron's report on the working of the Nursing Home that 177 cases were admitted during the year, which with the 5 cases remaining in on the 1st January, 1934, make a total of 182, as against 214 for the previous year. Of this number 161 were discharged as cured or relieved, 16 died (8 inoperable chronic Cancer cases, and 4 within 6 hours of admission) and 5 remained in on the 31st December, 1934. Of the total number of cases dealt with 148 were Surgical (including 2 Maternity Cases) and 34 Medical and Examination (including 6 X-Ray); the number of major operations 102 and minor operations 46. The average number of beds occupied daily was 6 and the average duration of each patient's stay 12 days. The Structural condition of the Nursing Home is very unsatisfactory; but considering that when opened it was only intended as a temporary measure, to test the need for such accommodation, the results have been very satisfactory. Considerable thought has been given to the necessity for the provision of a New Nursing Home built on up-to-date lines and with accommodation for 18 beds, and in the near future it is hoped to submit proposals and plans for same.

Reviewing the General Income and Expenditure Account it will be seen that the Income for the year has been £12,654 0s. 9d. compared with £11,467 18s. 4d. for the previous year, and that the Expenditure has been £12,366 18s. 3d. as against £11,373 16s. 2d., leaving a Credit Balance on the year's working of £287 2s. 6d. Subscriptions show a further decrease of £60 3s. 6d. and Donations a decrease of £56 15s. 1d., but Workpeoples'





Contributions increase by $\pounds 1,336$ 15s. 5d. on the previous year (Contributions paid on the Contribution Cards issued at the Hospital amounted to $\pounds 1,431$ 13s. 5d.).

The sum of $\pounds 296$ 4s. 0d. was realised by local entertainments arranged for the benefit of the Hospital; this being a decrease of $\pounds 82$ 15s. 2d.

The Charity Ball and the Children's Ball so kindly organised by His Worship the Mayor (Alderman T. Morton) enabled him to make a grant of $f_{.67}$ 3s. 6d. to our funds.

A successful performance of "Katinka" by the Barrow Amateur Operatic Society enabled the Society to further increase their usual generous support to the sum of ± 80 3s. 5d.

The Walney Amateur Operatic Society gave £25 to the funds as a result of their production of "The Sunshine Girl" in the Walney Theatre.

Miss Edna Parkinson organised her usual Children's Dancing Display which realised $\pounds 8$ 9s. 6d., and on the day of the Royal Wedding, Capt. Nichols of the Royalty Theatre arranged for a "Broadcast " of the Ceremony; a collection taken by the Nursing Staff amounting to $\pounds 4$ 18s. 7d. $\pounds 22$ 19s. 3d. was received from the Officers and Crew of H.M.S. Severn, the proceeds of a "Farewell Dance." Collections by the Nursing Staff at the Motor Film Display in Messrs. Simpsons Ltd.'s Showrooms, and at the Hairdressing Exhibition promoted by Mr. A. J. Middleton realised $\pounds 3$ 6s. 9d. and $\pounds 2$ 16s. 0d. respectively. The sum of $\pounds 20$ 6s. 5d. was received from the Dalton Rose Festival, being half of the Street Collections on their Annual Rose Day Procession.

The League of Mercy, on the kind recommendation of Mrs. Myles Kennedy (Ulverston) made a grant of $\pounds 20$; a special donation of $\pounds 25$ was received from the Iron Trades Employers Insurance Association Ltd., and the Ribble Motor Services, Ltd., contributed $\pounds 4$ 16s. 10d. being an amount equal to 25% of the contributions paid by their employees.

The Courtyard (entrance from School Street) which had been badly cut up during carting operations for the Prichard Ward, was levelled and covered with tar macadam, by Messrs. Rainey Bros., Mr. Hugh Rainey very kindly bearing half the cost; and the Council greatly appreciate this generous gesture of Mr. Rainey, which reduced the account by f_{82} .

Owing to the activities of the Ladies' Linen League no expenditure for bedding and linen for the Hospital and Nurses Home has been charged against the General Maintenance Account, all requirements having been supplied by the League, in addition they have provided all curtain and loose covering materials for the Nurses' Home, an expenditure usually charged against "Furnishing." The articles given on View Day totalled 1,296 of an approximate cost of $\pounds 114$; the additional articles purchased by the Matron (blankets, sheets, etc.) numbering 1,385, brought the full year's total up to 2,681 articles of a value of $\pounds 288$ 5s. 0d.

The Hospitals Women's Committee have by Whist Drives and different efforts raised the sum of $\pounds 54$ 17s. 11d. for the Operating Theatre Account making their total to date $\pounds 744$ 2s. 1d. During the year a Glove Sterilizer and several other much needed articles for the Theatre have been purchased and the Theatre re-decorated, at a cost of $\pounds 63$ 6s. 5d.

No Football Matches have been arranged for the benefit of the Hospital, but the Council would welcome the renewal of the Annual Rugby and Association Football matches.

Congregational Collections during the year amounted to f_{32} 3s. 8d. compared with f_{35} 18s. 5d. for 1933.

The Building Account which at the end of 1933 showed a balance due to the Bank of $\pounds 2,207$ 1s. 11d. has been further reduced to a Debit Balance of $\pounds 2,132$ 1s. 10d.

The Fifth Celebration of Alexandra Rose Day realized a profit of $\pounds 168$ 4s. 0d., the Honorary Staff's Annual Dance at the Furness Abbey Hotel provided the sum of $\pounds 22$. The Ladies' Social Committee of the Barrow Master Butcher's Association gave two donations amounting in all to $\pounds 25$. $\pounds 26$ 5s. 0d. was given by the "Help Yourself Society" on the recommendation of the Local Branch of N.A.L.G.O. (National Association of Local Government Officers), and a special effort by the Pattern Shop of Messrs. Vickers-Armstrongs Ltd., contributed the sum of $\pounds 22$.

On the suggestion of a deputation from "The Orpheans," the Council approached His Worship the Mayor (Alderman T. Morton) with a view to the resuscitation of the Hospital Saturday Demonstration. The Mayor agreed to the suggestion, and at a Meeting held in the Town Hall it was decided to revive the Demonstration, and a representative Executive Committee was formed. The Town took to the project enthusiastically, and despite inclement weather it was a huge success. After leaving a balance for working expenses, the Executive Committee were enabled to pay off the sum of $\pm 1,250$ on the Mortgage Account, which is now reduced from $\pounds 2,626$ 3s. 6d. in 1933 to $\pounds 1,266$ 13s. 0d. By arrangements with the Building Society the rate of repayment was reduced from $\pounds 245$ per annum to $\pounds 157$ 10s. 0d. per annum, and as these repayments had to be provided by special efforts, Alexandra Rose Day, etc., the saving of ± 87 10s. 0d. per annum is a considerable advantage.

Since the closing of the accounts in December, our good friend, Commander Sir Charles Craven, has launched his promised appeal with a view to the clearing off of all liabilities on the Building Account, and as a result of the first fruits of this special appeal the Building Account on the 21st March, 1935 had been further reduced to f_{567} 5s. 2d.

The Council desire specially to state how gratefully they appreciate the help so willingly given towards the reduction of the liabilities and the increased help given towards the General Account which has made the position so much easier.

The Endowments Account is now shown as £3,618 0s. 0d. One Legacy of £100 was received from the Executors of the late Mr. Thomas Postlethwaite (Kirkby) and Miss S. A. Dixon has paid a further instalment (third) of £100 towards the endowment of her "Cot."

The Income of the Nursing Home in Church Street amounted to $\pounds 1,259$ 8s. 6d. as compared with $\pounds 1,356$ 0s. 5d. in 1933, and the Expenditure $\pounds 1,020$ 14s. 9d. as against $\pounds 967$ 9s. 8d., leaving a balance in Bank, including $\pounds 1,432$ 14s. 10d. brought forward from the previous year, of $\pounds 1,671$ 8s. 7d.

Just after the close of the year under review, the Council heard with very great regret, of the death of Dr. Geo. Alexander, M.B., F.R.C.S. Dr. Alexander was appointed a member of the Hon. Staff in 1910 and took over, in addition to his position of Hon. Opthalmic Surgeon, the charge of the X-Ray, Electrical and Massage Departments from their beginning. He saw the X-Ray Department rise from a small department to a department comparable with any Hospital of its size in the Country. He only retired in the middle of November, 1934, on account of his continued ill-health, from which unfortunately he never recovered. The Council wish to place on record their great appreciation of Dr. Alexander's services as Radiologist and Hon. Opthalmic Surgeon, and his services as a member of the Council for over 24 years.

Dr. Richard Fawcitt of Ulverston, who agreed to take over Dr. Alexander's duties temporarily, has now been appointed Medical Officer in charge of the X-Ray and Electrical Departments.

Dr. G. E. Plowright the Assistant Hon. Opthalmic Surgeon has been appointed Hon. Opthalmic Surgeon, and Dr. Reed has agreed to take over the charge of the Massage Department.

Dr. W. Rutherford Bayne resigned the position of Hon. Registrar and Dr. A. Ronald was appointed as his successor.

The Council received with regret the resignation of Dr. Allan from the position of President, and under the new constitution, Mr. Alderman Dockeray was appointed Chairman and Mr. G. C. Minhinnick Vice-Chairman. Resignations from the Council during 1934 were received from The Rev. R. H. Hawkins (Representative of the Church of England) Messrs. T. D. Mason (Subscriber's Representative of the L.M. & S. Railway Co.), W. Yeo (Vickers-Armstrongs Ltd., Shipbuilding Side Delegate), W. H. Routledge (Contributor's Representative L.M. & S. Railway Co.) and the respective vacancies were filled by the appointment of the Rev. F. M. Beddow, Messrs. F. K. Rogers, W. Cotter, and R. Harper, whilst Mr. H. Garland was appointed as a Subscriber's representative vice Dr. Alexander.

Mr. H. W. Milner resigned his position as Hon. Treasurer; Mr. W. H. Heaton being elected as his successor, and Mr. J. Pickavance, at the unanimous wish of the Council accepted the appointment of Hon. Solicitor, rendered vacant by the tragic death of Mr. S. E. Major.

The best thanks of the Council were accorded to the retiring members of the Council and to Mr. Milner, for their valuable services to the Hospital during their years of office.

The Annual Subscriptions to Institutions in Manchester, Liverpool, etc., have been renewed, and several persons have been granted treatment in these Institutions with beneficial results, and at no cost to themselves beyond their travelling expenses.

The privilege of this treatment is amongst the many benefits obtained by contributors, and it therefore behoves all who are in employment to become contributors without delay, so that if required they may take advantage of the free treatment offered not only at this Hospital, but if necessary and with the approval of the Honorary Staff, in Institutions to which Subscriptions are made.

The Council, in concluding their Report, desire again to express their warmest thanks to the Honorary Surgical, Medical, and Dental Staffs, the Resident Medical and Surgical Staff, the Honorary Treasurer, the Honorary Auditors, the Matron, and the Staff generally, for the continued valuable and appreciated services rendered by them.

The Report for the year 1934 shows a total of 2,065 patients admitted to the Hospital for treatment during the year, an increase of 290 as compared with our previous report.

The Out-patient Department rendered 22,448 treatments, an increase of 999 on the figures of 1933.

The number of In-patients Operations is 1,297, an increase of 140 on the previous year.

The Out-patients Operations numbered 721, a decrease of 218 on last year's figures.

An analysis of the work accomplished in the various Departments of the Hospital has been prepared, and we hope that this will be of interest in showing the wide range of treatment given.

We have to record steady work in all the Departments, including the Laboratory, and the Dental Branch of treatment for the needs of the Inpatients.

It would be difficult to suggest a better or more fitting memorial than a Named Bed or Cot.

In this way the memory of a relative or friend and the generous act of the benefactor are brought into permanent association with a great work of healing.

Each year approximately eighteen patients occupy each Bed or Cot so named.

A Bed may be named by a Donation or Legacy of $\pm 1,000$, and a Cot by a Donation or Legacy of ± 500 .

Benefactions for this purpose are invested and the income applied towards the maintenance of the Bed or Cot.

A Tablet, appropriately worded, is affixed to each Named Bed and Cot.

NORTH LONSDALE HOSPITAL

FREE TREATMENT is given not only to all workmen and employees under Scale of Income Limits, resident in Barrow, North Lonsdale or Millom who are or become contributors to the above Institution but also to their wives, children or other direct dependents.

Shop Assistants, Domestic Servants and others who are in employment do not, however, come within the definition of "dependents."

HOW TO BECOME A CONTRIBUTOR

Any workman or employee who pays TWOPENCE (or ONE PENNY if not married and under 21 years of age) per week, becomes a Contributor. This amount must be paid through the employers or funds of the works or trade at which the Contributor is employed. If this is not possible, then it may be sent by post to the Secretary, or paid direct to the Dispenser at the Hospital between the hours of 8-30 a.m. and 1 p.m., and 2 p.m. and 5 p.m.; also 6-30 p.m. and 7-30 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and 8-30 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Saturdays.

THE BENEFITS TO WHICH A CONTRIBUTOR AND HIS DIRECT DEPENDENTS ARE ENTITLED

Admission to the Hospital as an In-Patient or to treatment in the Out-Patients' Department, treatment of the EYES, and X-RAY TREATMENT if under Income Limits FREE OF ANY FURTHER CHARGE. Contributors over Income Limits are required to pay for their Surgical or Medical Treatment only a sum to be agreed upon between the member of the Hon. Staff in charge of the case and the patient. Maintenance is free. Arrangements have been made for the efficient treatment of diseases of and accidents to the eves and two small wards have been set aside for the indoor treatment of these cases. The Council have a large EYE MAGNET for extracting metal or similar foreign matter from the eye, and also modern X-Ray and Electrical Apparatus. The Council, as far as possible, have also made provision for outside institutional treatment, the patients merely paying their railway fares. Application for Recommends for outside Institutional treatment should be made to the Secretary. Recommends for outside Institutions, subject to the approval of the Hon. Staff, are issued for one month only in the first place, and application should be made for their renewal if longer treatment is required. All Recommends are issued subject to the Regulations governing this Hospital.

The Hospital has the advantage of the services of a large staff of Surgeons, who number no less than 14.

The Council hope that all workmen and employees will become Contributors to the Hospital, and so be able to obtain, if required, the benefits set out above.

Further particulars may be obtained on application to the Secretary at the Hospital.

TREATMENT OF PATIENTS

Accidents and urgent operations are attended to at any hour (day or night).

Out-Patients are attended to daily (Sunday excepted) at 9 a.m.

It is required of all patients admitted into the Hospital that their relatives or friends provide them with a change of linen, and a comb, towel, soap and tooth brush.

NOTICE TO VISITORS

Considerable inconvenience having arisen in consequence of the abuse of the privilege allowed to relatives and friends to visit patients in the Hospital, attention is called to the following Rules regarding the admission of visitors. The Nurses and other Officers of the Institution have received instructions to see that the same are strictly adhered to.

1.—No visitor who has been in contact with any infectious case is allowed to visit the Hospital.

2.—Relations and friends may visit patients on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6-30 to 7-30 p.m., and on Sundays from 2 to 3-30 p.m.

3.—No visitor shall be admitted on any other day without the special leave of the House Surgeon or (in his absence) the Matron.

4.—No more than four persons can be allowed to visit a patient on the same day (two at a time).

5.—Children under 14 years of age shall not be allowed in the Children's Ward on Visiting days except under special circumstances, and then only by permission of the House Surgeon or Matron.

6.—Visitors are requested not to remain long with a patient, nor to sit on the patient's bed; and they are strictly prohibited from entering other Wards.

7.—Visitors bringing to the Patients, without permission, sweetmeats, fruit, liquids, or eatables of any kind or description, will be refused the privilege of again visiting the patient.

8.—Visitors are requested to come clean and tidy in their person and dress.

9.—All or any of the Wards may be closed to Visitors at the discretion of the Matron, or Sister in charge of a Ward.

NURSING HOME, 12 and 14, CHURCH STREET

On January 1st, 1934 there were 5 patients in the Home. During the year 177 cases were admitted, making a total of 182, as against 214 in the previous year. Of these 161 were discharged cured or relieved, 16 died (8 inoperable chronic Cancer cases, and 4 within 6 hours of admission) and 5 remained in the Home on January 1st, 1935.

NORTH LONSDALE HOSPITAL

OBJECTS AND CONSTITUTION

(a) The North Lonsdale Hospital, which, with its appurtenances, is held by trustees, has been erected and is maintained by subscriptions and voluntary contributions to meet the requirements of the District of Barrow-in-Furness, North Lonsdale, and Millom, in respect of the following objects :

- (i) The reception and treatment of medical and surgical cases, the nursing of persons suffering from accidents and diseases necessitating medical and surgical skill and efficient nursing, except as provided by the General Regulations hereinafter mentioned.
- (ii) The surgical treatment of persons as Out-patients.

(b) The Hospital shall be under the management of a Council consisting of, the Trustees, three of the Honorary Surgeons nominated by the Honorary Staff, the Hon. Treasurer, and twenty-six members elected annually, of whom twelve shall be elected by the Subscribers, and fourteen shall be elected by Employees who contribute under the regulations in that behalf.

The allocation and mode of election of the fourteen members of the Council by contributing employees shall be such as shall from time to time be agreed by such contributors, and if any vacancy among these members shall occur during any year, such vacancy shall be filled by a member elected by the contributors whose representative has ceased to be a member.

If any vacancy shall occur during any year among the members elected by the subscribers, such vacancy shall be filled at a Special Meeting of all Subscribers, called for that purpose.

Members of the Council elected during any year shall only hold office until the next annual election of the Council.

Not less than eight members shall form a quorum of the Council.

The Council are authorised to elect out of their members such committees for general or special purposes as they may think fit, and such committees are authorised to appoint subcommittees for special purposes, or to deal with matters of urgent necessity. Three members shall form a quorum of a committee and two of a sub-committee.

The Chairman of the Council and of each committee and sub-committee shall have in case of equality of votes, a second or casting vote on any matter under discussion.

(c) There shall be an Annual Meeting of Subscribers and Contributors' Representatives at which there may be elected as Honorary Presidents or Honorary Vice-Presidents persons who have distinguished themselves by their contributions or service to the Hospital. The Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Council for the ensuing year shall be elected at the first meeting of the Council following the Annual Meeting.

The Chairman of the Council shall be ex-officio a member of all committees and sub-committees, the Chairman of the House Committee ex-officio a member of the Finance Committee, and the Chairman of the Finance Committee ex-officio a member of the House Committee. The three members of the Honorary Staff on the Council, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Subscribers and General Meetings.

(d) The Council shall meet once in each month and the agenda shall be sent to all members together with the notice of the meeting. Matters not set forth on this agenda shall not be discussed at this meeting, unless in the opinion of the Chairman they are of sufficient urgency to require immediate attention. Special meetings of the Council shall be called to deal with any urgent matter upon the instructions of the Chairman, or upon the requisition of five members, not less than three days' notice being required. No business except that for which the meeting is called may be discussed. Sub-committees shall meet as often as required.

Every annual subscriber of 10s. 6d. and upwards is entitled to one vote at all general meetings, and every member of the Council elected by the contributing employees is entitled to attend all general meetings, and to one vote thereat in respect of all matters, except the election of the subscribers' representatives on the Council.

An annual subscriber only shall be entitled at his option to one 6s. In-patient's recommendation for each Guinea subscribed, or to two 1s. Out-patient's recommendations for a subscription of 10s. 6d. which will be credited for value towards the charges for maintenance or treatment of the patients for whose benefit such recommendations have been applied by the subscriber in accordance with the Regulations.

SUBSCRIPTIONS ARE DUE ON THE 1ST JANUARY IN EACH YEAR.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

1. All cases of In-patients and Out-patients at the Hospital are treated by the Hospital Staff only, and every requisite, except personal clothing, combs, towels, soap and toothbrush, is provided in the Hospital.

2. Subject to the provisions of Clause 3 the charge for In-patients at the Hospital shall be at the rate of 6s. per day in the general wards, except that in the case of patients sent by any Society or Association which pays the Hospital per case treated, the charge shall be 7s. per day. Provided that the foregoing charges shall not apply to cases sent in by a Government Department, Local Authority, or Public Body, with whom special financial arrangements have been made for the maintenance of such cases. The charge for treatment in the Out-patients' Department shall be at the rate of sixpence for each attendance after the first, which shall be free.

The above charges shall be satisfied wholly or in part by the recommendations of subscribers, which are of the value of 6s. each for In-patients and 1s. for Out-patients.

The Committee, may, in any case they thing fit, remit the whole, or any part of the above charges, but such remission shall only be made upon such information being supplied to them as to the patient's means and circumstances as they may require.

3. A patient in receipt of an income above the Scale for the time being of the British Medical Association as set out below in Paragraph 4, shall be required to pay, in addition to the charge mentioned in Paragraph 2, for his or her treatment only, a sum to be agreed upon between the Hon. Surgeon in charge of the case, and the patient. Not more than six beds shall be allocated for these purposes. Any subscribers' recommendations accepted to be used to satisfy the Hospital maintenance charges only. 4. Income Limits.—All persons, insured under the National Health Insurance Act, and their dependents, also other persons whose income from all sources does not exceed the following:

CLASS I. $\pounds 5$ per week or $\pounds 250$ per annum.

- (a) Single persons over 16 years of age.
- (b) Widow or widower without children under 16 years of age or any other person over 16 who is entirely dependent.
- (c) Married Couples without children under 16 years of age or any other person over 16 who is entirely dependent.

CLASS II. £6 per week or £300 per annum.

- (a) Married Couples with a child or children under 16 years of age or any other person over 16 who is entirely dependent.
- (b) Persons with one or more dependents under 16 years of age or any other person over 16 who is entirely dependent.

5. The primary consideration in the admission of a patient to Hospital shall be the suitability of the case on medical grounds as may be determined by the Honorary Medical Staff, subject to there being room in the Hospital. Except in cases of emergency, contributors must bring with them a certificate on the prescribed form signed by one of the officers of the fund through which free treatment is claimed, with a provisional diagnosis endorsed thereon by his doctor, upon admission to the Hospital. Direct Contributors must produce their contribution cards along with a doctor's certificate. In cases of accident or urgency these certificates must be produced as soon as possible after admission, signed only by the officer of the fund. A Contributor is entitled, subject to paragraph 4, to the following privileges.

Relief from :

- (a) Inquiry at the Hospital as to means.
- (b) Any payment as an in-patient in the ordinary wards of the Hospital.
- (c) Any payment as an out-patient.

The contribution by any workman or employee of 2d. per week or 1d. per week if unmarried and under 21 years of age, paid through his or her employers or otherwise, or whose employers contribute that sum for him or her shall entitle such workman or employee and his wife or her husband and children or other direct dependents to the benefits mentioned in paragraph (a) of the Objects and Constitution (i and ii) free of charge. He or she is also entitled to outside Institutional treatment subject to the approval of the Honorary Staff and to the Regulations, from time to time, governing this Hospital, the patients merely paying their Railway Fares.

The term "children" in this regulation shall be deemed to include and be confined to all children under 16 years of age who are not working and are living with and dependent upon the contributor, and who are not liable to contribution on their own behalf under these regulations.

The Council shall be empowered to make special financial arrangements in respect of any Company, or other persons not permanently carrying on business in the town, but who may be employing workmen for any considerable period in the town.

6. Notwithstanding any of the provisions in the 5th general regulation as to the free treatment to which any contributor is entitled by reason of his or her contribution, or as to the rate of charge in any other regulation as to other patients' treatment, the Council shall be empowered to arrange with and obtain payment from any Government Department, Local Authority, or Public Body, for the treatment of any patient at the Hospital, and such payment shall be in addition to any charge or contribution mentioned in the General Regulations.

7. Cases of accident, or requiring urgent medical or surgical treatment are received into the Hospital, or attended to in the Out-patient's Department, as the case may be, at any hour, and the required payment may be made or recommendations or certificates sent afterwards.

8. Other cases can only be received into the Hospital or attended to in the Out-patients' Department upon the requisite recommendations of a subscriber or certificate of a contributor being furnished endorsed as required by regulations 5, or satisfactory arrangements being made for payment of the prescribed charges.

9. All cases shall, except in cases of emergency, be admitted strictly in order of application. If at any time, however, all the applicants cannot be received into the Hospital for want of room, the selection of patients will be regulated by a regard to the relative urgency or severity of their ailments. 10. Only those patients can be admitted into the Hospital whose cases appear to the Medical Staff to require Hospital treatment, and to be likely to benefit within a reasonable period.

11. MATERNITY, INFECTIOUS, INCURABLE, CHRONIC, OR TUBERCULAR CASES are not eligible for examination, treatment, or for admission to the Hospital, except for the purpose of operation, or where special arrangements have been made with a Government Department, Local Authority, or Public Body for their admission.

12. Except as mentioned in Clause 7, medical or chronic cases cannot be treated in the Out-patients' Department.

13. Persons requiring treatment in the Out-patients' Department will be treated at the specified hours only, except in cases of urgency.

14. All recommendations or certificates both for In- and Out-patients shall be upon the prescribed forms, which must be strictly complied with. Excepting emergencies, no patient will be admitted to the Hospital unless the recommendation or certificate be signed by a Medical man and a provisional diagnosis given.

15. Patients who are not contributors and who are in receipt of, or entitled to, poor relief can only be admitted or treated on payment of the Hospital charges applicable to the cases by the Public Assistance Committee of the District to which they belong.

16. Patients requiring Doctor's Certificates can receive one free per week, and any others that may be required will be supplied at a charge of 2d. each, the fee to go to the funds of the Hospital.

17. Patients may be visited by the Ministers of the religious denominations to which they belong.

Relations and friends may visit patients on Tuesday and Thursday evening from 6-30 to 7-30, and on Sundays from 2-0 to 3-30 p.m., subject to the health of the patients not being endangered thereby, but not more than four persons can be allowed to visit the same patient on the same day and not more than two at the same time.

Provided, nevertheless, that all or any of the Wards may be closed to Ministers of Religion (except in cases of extreme urgency) and visitors at the discretion of the Resident Medical and Surgical Staff, the Matron, or Sister-in-Charge of a Ward. 18. The Council reserve to themselves the right to require and insist upon the removal from the Hospital of any patient whose presence may be undesirable, or detrimental to the interests of the Hospital or of other patients, or who may have been admitted contrary to Regulations.

19. Patients leaving the Hospital without the leave of the Hon. Staff, Resident Medical and Surgical Staff or the Matron or Sister-in-Charge will be required to sign an undertaking absolving the Hospital Council from all responsibility.

20. All patients admitted to, or receiving treatment at, the Hospital shall be bound by these Regulations and all the Rules for the government of the Hospital for the time being in force.

No alteration or addition to, or revocation of, any of the foregoing Objects, Constitution, or General Regulations shall be made except at a General Meeting or Extraordinary General Meeting of Subscribers and Representatives of contributors of which not less than seven days' notice shall have been given of any proposed change. Any such change must be carried by not less than two-thirds majority of the Members present and voting at such meeting and such change shall not become operative before the day after the day of the holding of such meeting.

A Statement of the Receipts and Expenditure shall be submitted to the Annual General Meeting, and a copy furnished to each subscriber and contributors' representative.

DONATIONS and SUBSCRIPTIONS will be thankfully received, as well as gifts of eggs, fruit, vegetables, bedding, old linen for dressings, silver paper, etc.

Transfer of Patients to Infield Convalescent Home.

The Secretary is in a position to arrange for the Transfer of Contributors (or their dependents) direct from Hospital to Infield, on 3 day's notice being given through the resident staff.

In the case of non-Contributors, admission to Infield is obtainable either by payment or Subscribers' Recommendations.

In the Case of Patients (in Hospital) unable to Pay,

the Secretary will endeavour to obtain Recommendations to cover their stay—but one week's notice must be given to him—

All Patients

must arrange for their own Conveyance from Hospital to the Convalescent Home.

N.B.—It would be a great advantage to the Secretary if Delegates and Employers, when issuing Certificates to Contributors or their Dependents for Hospital treatment, would signify thereon if they are also Contributors to "Infield."
