



# HISTORY OF THE NORTH STAFFORDSHIRE ROYAL INFIRMARY. 1802-1939.

July 28th, 1802.

The first meeting was called to discuss "the establishment of a Medical Dispensary and House of Recovery." Mr. Josiah Wedgwood sold a piece of land in Etruria Vale for this purpose.

- 1816. It was decided to build a new Infirmary in Etruria. The first stone was laid on July 3rd by Sir John Heathcote, as proxy for the Patron, The Marquis of Stafford.
- 1819. The new Infirmary was opened on May 5th to accommodate 40 patients and "if required, 70 patients."
- 1829. Fever Wards were opened on April 1st by which 100 patients might be accommodated.
- 1852. New Wards were erected for the reception of cases of burns and scalds.
- 1855. A new wing was added.
- 1860. "Signs of serious and increasing damage to buildings from workings of mines were very perceptable." Meetings were held and subscriptions were asked for, and the present site was bought. "Before giving instructions for the guidance of the Architects, Miss Florence Nightingale was consulted, and acting upon her advice, the new buildings were erected on the pavilion style; The North Staffordshire Infirmary being one of the first civil hospitals erected in the United Kingdom on this plan." A gift of £5,000 towards the cost was received from Mr. William Yates, of Chatterley Place, Shelton.
- 1866. The foundation stone of the present hospital was laid on June 25th by H.M. King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales. "In the cavity of the stone were deposited two bottles, which contained current coins of the realm, copies of local newspapers and a transcription on parchment as follows, viz.:—"The Foundation Stone of this building, intended as a hospital for the sick poor of the Northern portion of the county of Stafford, was laid by H.R.H. Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, K.G., G.C.B., on the 25th day of June, 1866, being the 30th year of the reign of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria."
- 1869. On December 16th, the present Infirmary was formally opened for the reception of patients by the Duchess of Sutherland. The number of beds in the Infirmary at this time was 184, and the number of "Officers, Nurses and Servants was 53."

- 1880. The Coffee Stall was established in the Out-patients' Department.
- 1889. The Victoria Wards were opened as Women's Wards, these are now used as the Children's Wards.
- 1890. The words "and Eye Hospital" were added to the title of Infirmary.
- 1901. The pines were planted by Mr. J. W. Phillipps.
- 1902. On October 24th, the foundation stone of the present Nurses' Home was laid with full Masonic Honours by Lord Dartmouth, Lord Lieutenant of the County, to commemorate the Coronation of King Edward VII.

"The stone having been laid, the Cornucopia containing the corn, and the ewers with wine and oil, were next handed to the Provincial Grand Master, who strewed their contents over the stone with the accustomed formalities. His Lordship said he scattered the corn upon the stone as an emblem of plenty and abundance; he poured wine upon it as an emblem of joy and gladness; and he sprinkled oil upon it as the emblem for peace and unanimity. Might prosperity, happiness, and good will ever prevail among those who would serve in the House to the glory of the Most High, and to the benefit of their sick and suffering neighbours until time should be no more."

- 1903. May 17th. King Edward VII. Home for Nurses formally opened by the Bishop of Shrewsbury.
- 1905. Electric light and internal telephone exchange installed.
- 1910. Extensive improvements and alterations to Out-patient Department, Laundry, Wards, &c.

Direct representation of the Establishment and Hospital Saturday Subscribers amongst the Governors and upon the Committee.

- 1911. July 7th. Four foundation stones were laid to the new Out-patient Department by The Marquis of Stafford, W. D. Spanton, Esq., F.R.C.S., Enoch Edwards, Esq., M.P., and the President, Colonel A. H. Heath.
- 1914. New Operation Theatre added.
- 1914-1919.

Hospital in full use for War casualties.

- 1917. F. J. Harrison Memorial Recreation Hut erected adjoining Out-patient Department.
- 1920. Main entrance Hall tiled by employees of Bullers Ltd., in memory of John Waugh Harris.
- 1922. Auxiliary Ward (Ward 8) opened February, 1923.

1927. New Medical Block comprising:-

X-Ray & Orthopaedic Departments (Twyford Memorial). Medical Ward for Males, 25 beds (Henry J. Johnson Ward). Medical Ward for Women, 25 beds (Matilda Burgess Ward). Nurses ' Home Extension.

Foundation Stone laid by Their Majesties King George V. and Queen Mary, opened October, 1927, by H.R.H. The Duke of Gloucester.

New Boiler House, Chimney Stack, Laundry and Workshops completed and opened April 30th, 1928.

- 1928. New Dining Rooms for Nursing Staff, Surface Water Tanks constructed, new Operating Theatre (No. 2) added.
- 1929. Original Ward 14 converted into Stores Department.
- 1930. New Boardroom and offices opened June 23rd, 1930.
- 1931. New Annexe for the Operating Theatres. Kitchen extended, new electric service lifts installed.
- 1932. New Surgery and Casualty Department (Alfred Chew Memorial) opened on 17th August, 1932.

Ward 17 reconstructed as a Memorial Ward to the late Miss Dora Twyford, opened December 2nd, 1932.

- 1933. Private Patients' Department (33 beds and Operating Theatre, &c.) opened October 5th, 1933. Main Entrance Hall Vestibule, Screen and outside Canopy provided by the sons and daughters of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry J. Johnson.
- 1935. Edmund Corn new Ophthalmic Wards opened on 15th May, 1935, as a thankoffering for the recovery of Mrs. Corn from a serious illness.

Wards I and 3 reconstructed as a Memorial Ward to the late Robert Lewis and Sarah Johnson, a gift from the family of the above, re-opened October 4th, 1935.

- 1936. Out-patients' Department renovated and painted, and additional dressing cubicles provided out of funds (£1,000) raised by the Newcastle Bachelors' Club. Re-opened October 9th, 1936, in grateful recognition of the valuable services rendered to the Infirmary for many years by Mr. W. L. Dixon, J.P., &c., &c.
- 1937. G. H. Downing Radiological Department opened by H.R.H. The Duke of Kent.

Electricity Sub-Station (built by Stoke Corporation). Edmund Corn Eye Wards for Private Patients (3).

1939. Building commenced on new Medical Wards (52 beds)—the gift of Mr. Enoch Haughton, and on the Extension of Nurses' Home (100 bedrooms) and New Pathological Block—Laboratories, Mortuary, &c.

### Report of the General Committee for the year 1938.

The Committee has pleasure in presenting the One Hundred and Twentythird Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1938.

### Obituary.

With feelings of deep regret the Committee records the great loss the Infirmary has sustained during the year by the death of three esteemed colleagues whose services have been of inestimable benefit to the hospital during their long association with it.

Mr. A. F. Coghill. Who was President for three years from 1900 and became a Trustee in 1903. In 1911 he was appointed Vice-President Honoris Causa in appreciation of his devoted and magnanimous service.

Mr. J. W. Skae. Who served as Honorary Dental Surgeon from 1913 to 1929, when he retired from the active staff and was appointed Honorary Consulting Dental Surgeon.

Mr. William Stevenson, our esteemed Secretary and House Governor, who served the hospital faithfully and well from his appointment in September, 1918, till his death in November last. For a period of twenty years he zealously directed the management of the hospital and no amount of personal attention was too much to devote to any matters relating to the welfare of the hospital, its patients, friends, and staff.

His magnetic personality and keen interest in all branches of the Infirmary's work drew to him friends of every class and creed throughout North Staffordshire.

The Committee laments the loss of a very dear friend and colleague and cherishes his memory for his highmindedness, loyalty and devotion. Though Mr. Stevenson had actually resigned his appointment for health reasons in September last, he had generously offered to continue in office until his successor took over.

The above figures show that the number of patients receiving treatment or advice was 43,197. When one considers that ten years ago this figure was 36,606, it will be realised that the Infirmary has made enormous strides and has gained the confidence of its large public; yet in spite of the many extensions and improvements of late years the resources of all departments are still severely taxed. A detailed list of work done appears later in the report.

### Committee.

In reporting the resignation of two of its members, Mr. D. Webster and

Mr. G. Glover, the Committee would place on record the valued services both have given to the Infirmary.

### Secretary and House Governor.

Mr. Thornburrow Gibson, M.A. (Cambridge University), was in November last appointed to succeed Mr. W. Stevenson as Secretary and House Governor. Mr. Gibson has exceptional qualifications and has had a wide experience of voluntary hospital administration at Preston, Sheffield and Liverpool.

In extending a hearty welcome to Mr. Gibson, the Committee has every confidence that he will maintain and increase the prestige of the Royal Infirmary and further develop its great work for North Staffordshire.

### Visitor's Contributions.

The Committee is specially indebted to the following ladies and gentlemen who have voluntarily undertaken collections from visitors on Thursdays and Sundays. Messrs. Barratt, Robotham, Warren, Barrow, Walker, Sanders, Fitzjohn and Councillor Williams; Mrs. Sneyd, Mrs. Boughey, Miss Concannon, Mrs. Rhodes, Miss Clements, Mrs. Fitzjohn and Mrs. Owen. Last year the splendid sum of £518 was realised, bringing the total amount collected to date from this source to £8.138.

### Hospital Saturday.

Collections under this heading amounted to £1,638 against £3,270 in the previous 14 months. While the decrease is inevitable owing to the Contributory Association, the Committee is most grateful to all the Hospital Saturday Committees for their great efforts during the year on behalf of the Infirmary. The Annual Carnivals and other efforts maintain the public interest and are a most valuable asset of the Hospital.

### Hospital Sunday.

The Committee extends its most grateful thanks to all Clergy, Ministers, and Church Officers who very kindly made collections for the Infirmary during the past year. The amount received was £391 against £649 for the previous fourteen months.

The Committee would remind all concerned that recommendations are still issued for these collections, but should not be given to persons able to join the Contributory Scheme.

Hospital Sunday Collections are a permanent source of income for the hospital and help considerably to provide means for the treatment of necessitous persons.

### Ladies' Linen League.

The sincere thanks of the Committee are again conveyed to all members of the Linen League, and in particular to their Executive Committee for another year of most useful assistance in providing linen and other articles for the Wards—all of which have been the means of reducing considerably the annual expenditure on these items.

It is particularly pleasing to record that the Countess of Shrewsbury has graciously consented to act as President of the League.

To the members of the Sewing Classes, the Plaster Bandage Class, Women's Institutes, Collectors, Organisers of efforts and Subscribers, the Committee is specially indebted.

### New Buildings and Extensions.

Considerable progress has been made during the year in planning the new buildings and extensions outlined in detail in the last Report, and work on the new Medical Wards, the extension of the Nurses' Home and the new Pathological Block has commenced.

To inaugurate the extensions, Mr. Enoch Haughton, on behalf of Mrs. Haughton and himself as donors of the New Medical Block, cut the first turf at a pleasant and informal ceremony.

It is hoped that the buildings will be complete in the summer of next year.

### Improvements.

The policy of effecting minor improvements to keep the hospital in the forefront of medical progress has been continued during the year, and the Committee is pleased to report that the hospital is to-day in a more efficient state than ever before in its history.

### Treatment of Colliery Fracture Cases.

The Committee has been asked by the North Staffordshire Collieries Organisation to undertake a centralised service for the treatment of fracture cases from the collieries with the provision of daily Out-patient clinics for the treatment of ambulatory colliery fractures, and the necessary In-patient accommodation following upon accidents.

Such a scheme entails the opening of a temporary Ward and the appointment of an Honorary Assistant Orthopaedic Surgeon, and is to commence in April next. While the work of the Orthopaedic Department will be severely taxed by this new influx, it is gratifying to report that adequate financial assistance is being provided, and it is pleasing to feel that the Infirmary is playing a great part in the alleviation of the agonising suffering associated with pit accidents and in the prevention of permanent disability of mine workers.

### National Emergency.

In the international crisis of September last, the hospital was prepared at short notice for any emergency, and has since taken steps necessary to provide adequate protection for patients and staff, and to deal immediately with any sudden influx of casualties.

### General Thanks.

The thanks of the Committee are accorded to the following for valued assistance during the year:—

To Mr. Edmund R. Corn, J.P., the Patron, for his splendid services and generosity in the supervision of the Infirmary Farm at Whitmore. The Committee values greatly Mr. Corn's keen interest and splendid work in connection with the Farm.

To the Whist Management Committee under the Presidency of Miss Harrison, O.B.E., J.P., and the Chairmanship of Councillor T. Davies, for their successful organisation of yet another most successful Whist Competition—the splendid sum of £1,607 was received.

To the Longton Lord Mayor's Charities Committee for the successful effort organised in June last on the occasion of the Selection of the Pottery Queen for 1938-39. The Committee is indebted to the Lady Mayoress (Mrs. G. J. Timmis), to the Adjudicators (Alderman J. A. Dale, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Cotton and Miss

Cotton) and to the Pottery Queen (Miss Becky Calder) and Princesses, and to the Sub-Committee for their excellent services in connection with this valuable annual effort.

To all members of the Infirmary Governors' Carnival of Queens Committee who successfully organised the Carnival of Queens at Hanley Park in August last. The splendid sum of £1,027 13s. 3d. was received and allocated to the General Fund and the Radium Appeal Fund. To the City Corporation for the free use of Hanley Park. To the Committee under the Presidency of Mrs. Enoch Haughton, and the Chairmanship of Councillor T. Davies. To the Infirmary Queen (Miss Mollie Bell of Stone) and her attendants, to Miss Mary Heath, to Mr. and Mrs. Cotton for a valuable donation, to the Ex-Queens of the various Carnivals, to all donors, friends and supporters, the best thanks of the Committee and staff are extended.

To the Organisers of the Infirmary Ball, the President's Supper Ball, the Newcastle Bachelors' Club Ball, and all who have by numerous efforts, entertainments and competitions, considerably augmented the General Funds of the Infirmary.

To all friends who have contributed gifts during the year as detailed later in this Report, and have subscribed to the Christmas Fund for the patients and staff, and especially to Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Corn for their continued generosity at this festive season.

To the Directors, Editor and Manager of the "Sentinel" for all their help and co-operation.

### In Conclusion.

The past year has seen the full inauguration in North Staffordshire of a Contributory Scheme that enables the wage-earner, by a small weekly contribution, to ensure for himself and his dependants in time of need the best hospital facilities available, and at the same time to assist in the restoration to health of his less fortunate fellow-men. The need for such a scheme embracing the City and the rural districts is undisputed and should prove of inestimable value to all who may need the facilities offered. With the introduction of this scheme, however, a large section of the community is barred by limits of income from participating with inevitable hardship. That there is need for a similar scheme to embrace the salaried classes is becoming daily apparent. The Committee now feels that it must provide within the next twelve months the necessary accommodation for the salaried officer and his dependants under a provident scheme.

With the completion of the Extension programme now being undertaken, the Royal Infirmary will become an up-to-date unit of the great Voluntary Hospital System, and will be able to continue in a less fettered manner the great work is has carried on in North Staffordshire for one hundred and twenty-three years. The extension of the work will, however, add considerably to the maintenance costs.

The need for additional income will be inevitable, and in the light of its record of service, and the esteem in which the hospital is held by its countless friends and supporters, the Committee has every confidence in appealing to everyone who

has at heart the great work of Voluntary Hospitals to give as generously as possible by subscription or donation—large or small—to help maintain the present services and to allow them to function with their customary efficiency and success.

### ANNUAL MEETING OF GOVERNORS March 16th, 1939.

(Reprinted from the Evening Sentinel).

The Annual General Meeting of Governors was held in the Boardroom at the Infirmary.

Mr. Eric E. Young (President) presided at the meeting, supported by Mr. W. L. Dixon (Vice-President) and Mr. Thornburrow Gibson (Secretary and House Governor).

In his address on the work of the Infirmary during the year, Mr. Young said he must place on record their deep appreciation of the remarkable and faithful services for 20 years of the late Mr. W. Stevenson, Secretary and House Governor. He would always be remembered with affection and respect.

Mr. Young also referred with regret to the passing of Mrs. Enoch Haughton, remarking that it had been their intention to put forward her name as a Vice-President for the ensuing year.

He extended a very cordial welcome to the new Secretary and House Governor. Mr. Young continued:—

From the financial aspect, we have experienced a difficult year in the co-ordination and organising of our financial position so that we could, with reasonable confidence and foresight, proceed with our vast new building scheme—Medical Block, Pathological Block, and Nurses' Home. We felt we were able and justly so, to make a practical start, but it was necessary for us to adopt a very cautious attitude and not to load ourselves with an enormous deficit in our Annual Balance Sheet.

As you already know, building operations have commenced, and we are hoping that all the new buildings will be in occupation in the summer of 1940. I should like to point out that during the necessary alterations in the erection of the enlarged Nurses' Home, and to provide accommodation for the additional staff of nurses which the Medical Block will entail, we have had to provide a temporary building for our nurses, and this, we hope, will be complete and in use in about five weeks time.

You will note that the Hospital Saturday collections are less by some £2,800 than they were in the preceding year. This should occasion no undue surprise, for now that the Contributory Scheme is in full working order, we cannot expect our helpers and contributors to be ever subscribing to this and that Appeal, to Flag days and House-to-House collections. Yet it is most essential to bear in mind always that our efforts must be sustained, and particularly the efforts of our many District Committees for such an immense institution as ours cannot possibly be financed by the Contributory Scheme only. In this connection I appeal in all courtesy and hopefulness to the generosity of employers to supplement the contributions of their employees by sending us, as a gift from themselves, a percentage of the sums collected on their works by their employees.

### FIRST YEAR'S WORKING.

### " Every Reason to be Proud of Results."

He continued:-

We have every reason to be proud of the results of the first year's working of the Contributory Scheme, and all contributors should note with satisfaction that for a small weekly subscription, both they and their dependents are assured of the very best treatment in the days of distress and illness. I am hopeful that we shall see a substantial increase in the income from this source during the ensuing twelve months. As Chairman of the Executive Committee I would wish to put on record my thanks and appreciation to the help, courtesy and loyalty extended to me by every member of that committee. We have missed our Vice-Chairman, Sir Fred Hayward, and trust that his health will allow him to give us of his wide and practical experience for many years to come. I am happy to say that the relations between the four local voluntary hospitals could not possibly be more cordial.

Mr. Young drew attenton to the beds and cots endowed and dedicated during the year, and announced that recently, they had received a gift of £1,000 from Miss Mary Knight, of Eccleshall, in memory of her parents, Colonel and Mrs. John Knight. The gift would be used for the dedication of a bed in Ward 17.

He referred to the fact that Mr. T. H. Richmond would cease to be an active member of the honorary medical staff early next month. They thanked him for his many years' service to the Infirmary, and recalled the services he rendered to his country during the Great War. Doubtless, in due time, he would join the Honorary Consulting Staff. Mr. Young congratulated Mr. Duthie on his appointment as full surgeon, and expressed thanks to Sir Harold Gilles, Mr. McIndoe and Mr. Harvey Jackson for their continued interest and services.

The President went on to refer to the growth of work in the Radium and Radiological Department, of which they could rightly be proud. Excellent results in the treatment of cancer could be seen. They recently had a very pleasing report from the Radium Commissioners of their last visit, and this was a great testimonial to the Infirmary and to the officers and staff of the department. In addition, the Commissioners were granting the Infirmary the use of a further quantity of radium, as the present quantity was taxed to the utmost. The Infirmary had been asked to appoint an Assistant Radium Officer, and also to provide a "Radium bomb," by which means the Radium Officer thought he might obtain still better results in certain forms of cancer.

There again, it was a question of money, and a large annual expenditure would be entailed. The General Committee, on the recommendation of the Radium Sub-Committee, had postponed consideration of those matters for a least six months.

The installation of a "Radium bomb" was emphasised as highly desirable by the Radium Commissioners in their report. But there was not a penny in the Infirmary exchequer for the project at the present, however desirable it might be.

Mr. Young then referred to the decision to establish a "fracture clinic" at the Infirmary for injured colliers. This was one of the most useful and helpful

decisions of the year, and the scheme would come into being on April 3rd. A better service would be provided, particularly in the after-care problem. He went on:—

A daily out-patient clinic will be held and an effectual follow-up system adopted. For the purpose we have reconditioned and redecorated Ward 8, the 20 beds in which will be used exclusively for such patients. These beds will be in addition to the 10 beds already available in the "Robert Lewis and Sarah Johnson" Ward. This will entail extra expenditure each year, and also some additions to the Nursing and Electro-therapeutic Staffs, and towards this extra sum needed the colliery owners are giving us a yearly grant, in addition to paying for new apparatus for the department to the value of £350. You will agree with me, I feel sure, that this is a step in the right direction.

We would like to express our deep appreciation and to record our sincere thanks to our Patron for the work he has done at the Infirmary Farm. No man could have worked harder or have given so much of his spare time as has Mr. Corn.

It is a pleasure to record our thanks and appreciation to our Matron, her Assistants, the Sisters and the Nursing Staff as a whole. Matron has experienced great difficulties in obtaining new Probationers, but I believe the difficulty is not so acute as it was 12 months ago. In her difficulties, Matron was obliged to obtain the help of Male Orderlies, and we have found their services most helpful. Maybe, one day, we shall become a Training School for Male Nurses.

We proffer our thanks to Mr. Victor Harrison for the very practical help he has accorded Matron in conducting classes for the pupils in the Training School. Valuable and helpful work has again been effected by the members of the Linen League.

### CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

Mr. Young thanked all who had befriended the Infirmary, and been associated with efforts. He was sensible of the debt he owed personally to the Chairmen of the Standing Committees, Mr. Reginald Alcock, Mr. Arthur Gaunt and Mr. Adolph Wenger.

Mr. Young continued:—Before I close, permit me to say a few words with regard to the inauguration of a Contributory or Insurance Scheme for those whose salaries are above the limit of those eligible for the existing Contributory Scheme—the "Black Coated Workers" as they are popularly called. Some may think that this is long over-due—as you know I have always favoured such a scheme—but the difficulty has been, as usual, one of finance, but now we do think we see "daylight" and that there is a great possibility of bringing the scheme into actual being, and it is my hope—and not just a pious hope, may I say—that when we next meet we shall have such a scheme in working order, and as soon as possible I am asking the General Committee to appoint a small sub-committee to work out the details and to submit a practical and financially sound scheme for approval and, we will hope, adoption.

Mr. Young moved the adoption of the statement of accounts and the reports of the General Committee and the Auditor. This was carried.

Mr. Edmund R. Corn was re-elected Patron of the Infirmary on the proposition of Mr. Young, who said they hoped that some day they would receive Mr. Corn back at their meetings. When he did return no man would ever receive a greater welcome.

### NEW OBLIGATIONS.

### Sir Ernest Johnson and the Infirmary Finances.

The re-election of Mr. Young as President was proposed by Sir Ernest Johnson, who said that each year it seemed that the needs of the hospital increased. They were fortunate to have been able to establish a contributory scheme, but this brought more obligations, in that the Infirmary had to make room to cope with all demands as far as possible. Even with the scheme, the Infirmary's income was £3,000 short, but he considered that at the end of 1939 they ought to have a credit balance of anything from £6,000 to £10,000. It would need sound economy to create that credit balance.

This year, time and capital would be spent on developing the Pathological Department, the new medical block and the extended nurses' home, he said. Unless there was a credit balance by the end of the year they would be short in 1940 when the extra maintenance costs would begin. This would be the testing time for the Infirmary finances. At the same time, he thought he "saw daylight" when he considered the finances.

He added an expression of gratitude to Mr. Young, and said they were fortunate to have a man of such experience at their head.

Mr. W. L. Dixon, seconding, thanked Mr. Young for his kindness and courtesy to Mr. J. E. Lovatt and to himself during their year as Vice-Presidents. He also thanked the President for his continued interest in the Newcastle Bachelors' Club.

Mr. Young said he was proud of the fact that they had shown confidence in him by electing him President for the third year in succession.

Mr. Bernard Robertson and Mr. Victor Harrison were re-elected Hon. Auditors.

#### Vice-Presidents.

On the proposition of Mr. Adolph H. C. Wenger, seconded by Mr. S. W. Goodwin, Mr. C. J. Noke and Mr. H. W. Latham were elected Vice-Presidents for the year. Mr. Wenger said that Mr. Noke had been with the Infirmary for ten years and had acted as Chairman of the Fire Committee. Mr. Latham had given 18 years' service, and had done very good work in connection with the boilers and engineering section.

Mr. Latham, returning thanks, remarked that he first went to the Infirmary as a baby 60 years ago to be treated, and had been a patient several times since. That was why he worked for the Infirmary. Mr. Noke said that anything he or Mr. Lahtam were asked to do, would be done with the best spirit and a big heart.

The following retiring Private Governors were re-elected: Mr. Reginald Alcock, Colonel H. Johnson, Mr. W. C. Allardice, Mr. L. H. Jones, Mr. G. Bloor, Mrs. E. W. Montford, Mr. Adolph H. C. Wenger and Mr. J. W. Rowley, for two years; and Mr. W. L. Dixon for one year. In addition, Mr. Shepard Johnson was elected for one year.

The Secretary and House Governor read the names of the Governors appointed to serve on the General Committee as follows:—

Hospital Saturday and Stoke-on-Trent Lord Mayor's Charities Committee— Mr. L. Bridgett for two years, Mr. S. Barratt for one year.

Establishment Governors appointed by the North Staffordshire Voluntary Hospitals Contributory Association—Mr. C. Akers, Mr. S. Boughey, Mr. V. Bradshaw, Mr. W. Kelly, Mr. H. W. Latham, Mr. A. E. Mills and Mr. E. E. Paul for two years, also, Mr. F. Fradley for one year.

District Committee Governors appointed by the North Staffordshire Voluntary Hospitals Contributory Association—Mr. J. Henshaw, Mr. W. H. Hook, Mr. W. Wagstaff, Rev. W. Thompson and Mrs. Sneyd for two years.

### GREAT WORK OF STAFF.

### Need for a Dietetical Department.

Mr. Victor Harrison moved that the sincere thanks of the Governors be accorded to the members of the honorary medical and surgical staffs, the honorary clinical assistants, the Matron and nursing staff, and the administrative staff, for their services during the past year. He said that the real reputation of the Infirmary rested with those who had the care and treatment of patients in their hands. The Infirmary was fortunate in having an honorary medical and surgical staff that was second to none in the Kingdom. They spared no effort. Their devotion to duty was really remarkable, and some of them, in addition, found time to help on the administrative side. It was a tribute to their ability and tact that the lay and the medical members of the General Committee worked so harmoniously together. In the Matron they had a very able administrator, and he paid tribute to the way in which the Matron exercised care and control from the moment a potential nurse made application to the Infirmary. She was very careful in her choice of nurses, and there was no hospital in the country where there were nurses so ladylike in behaviour, and so sympathetic in treatment, both of patients and friends.

In his thanks to the administrative side, Mr. Harrison especially mentioned the name of Mr. G. Mottershead, the Assistant Secretary, for the very valuable work he did between the time of Mr. Stevenson's death and the arrival of Mr. Gibson.

Mr. Harrison added that he had never come across any place where such wonderful team work was displayed.

Mr. Latham, seconding, said that everyone would join in that sincere expression of thanks.

Dr. Bruce Maclean, Chairman of the Medical Board, replied, and congratulated Mr. Young on his re-election as President. Mr. Young, he said, was one of the best friends the Infirmary had ever had, or was ever likely to have. Special thanks were

due to Mr. Enoch Haughton and the late Mrs. Haughton for the splendid gift that enabled the Infirmary to launch the new medical block scheme. When one realised the extent of suffering and loss of life entailed by inadequate hospital accommodation, one felt that the gift was, indeed, a godsend.

There were some things, continued Dr. Maclean, that were not quite in order in that house of theirs. He referred firstly, to the crying need of a dietetical department. Secondly, he had for a long time been thinking about the Out-patient Department. He pointed out that some 300 people had to go through the department, through the registration department, the social services, undergo medical or surgical examinations, in the space of two and a half to three hours on some days of the week. The best results could not be achieved until there was adequate accommodation.

It means (said Dr. Maclean) that we require a floor space of double the present size, and a building preferably joined up with the main hospital. This hospital serves approximately a million people, and the time must come when we must have a medical and surgical clinic almost every day of the week.


One bright spot, he continued, was the introduction by Mr. Gibson of a fresh registration scheme, which was very much appreciated by the medical staff. Another pleasing feature was the agreement reached between the Infirmary and the North Staffordshire Colliery Owners' Association. The medical staff looked forward to this development, for they felt it to be a great step towards unification of treatment and avoiding disability wherever possible.

Referring to changes in staff, Dr. Maclean mentioned particularly the loss from the active staff of Mr. T. H. Richmond, who had given such devoted service. The Medical Board felt that there had always been a kindred spirit of co-operation between the General Committee and the medical staff. He also replied on behalf of the other staffs referred to, and remarked that the profession of nursing was the most noble in the world.

The President said it was quite true there was no money in the exchequer, but the requirements in connection with the Out-patient Department were recognised. He was pleased that Dr. Maclean could inform his colleagues that that very matter had been before the Buildings Committee during the afternoon. A sub-committee had been appointed and they would see what could be done to alleviate, in some measure, the inadequacy of the rooms in that department.

Mr. F. W. Carder was re-elected professional auditor, on the proposition of Mr. W. E. Gifford.

Governors are requested to note that the next Annual General Meeting will be held on the third Tuesday in March—March 21st, 1940, and that, in accordance with the Rules, the Meeting will only be called by notice in the Press.

### MATRON'S REPORT ON NURSING DEPARTMENT.

During the year 1938, 30 nurses entered the Infirmary for training and nine left as unsuitable, or for domestic reasons. Three nurses were accepted as second year probationers, having already passed the Final State Examination for the Children's Register.

Thirty-eight nurses completed their training and passed the Final State Examination, and twenty-five nurses passed the Preliminary State Examination of the General Nursing Council.

### Appointments.

Miss Ingham—Night Sister; Miss Blanchard—Assistant Housekeeper; and the Misses A. Taylor, F. M. Taylor—Ward Sisters.

During the past year three Dutch nurses have been accepted for post certificate experience, for a period of six months each.

The Student Nurses' Association (the Junior Branch of the College of Nursing) has held Meetings and Socials, and is gradually increasing its membership. Nurses Huskisson and Ede were chosen to join the Study Tour to Brussels, arranged by the College of Nursing in July, their expenses being paid by several members of the Board to whom we owe our grateful thanks. Two other nurses were chosen by ballot to attend the Student Nurses' Annual Meeting in London later in the year, and the expenses were paid out of Unit Funds.

The 1st Annual Reunion of the Nurses' League took place in the early Spring, and a good number of older members came back to visit their Training School. We had the great pleasure of welcoming to her old home Miss Mac Master, R.R.C., the League's President, who delivered a most inspiring address. Her visit, which lasted a few days, gave much pleasure to all concerned.

During 1938, the Silver Challenge Cup for Tennis was competed for, and several tournaments were held, but the weather was not favourable for much play.

Grateful thanks are due to the members of the Medical Staff for their help in the way of lectures and examinations during the year, also for the care and attention bestowed upon those members of the Nursing Staff who have been ill. Also, to the members of the Nursing Committee and General Committee thanks are due for all the willing help and co-operation in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the Nursing Staff. Mr. V. Harrison has given generously of his time and experience to those probationer nurses who have needed help in their scholastic studies before entry to the Test Educational Examination, and for this important piece of work we tender our sincere gratitude.

Grateful acknowledgment is made of the services of the V.A.D. Nurses who attend regularly in the Wards.

### SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the year ended 31st December, 1938.

The Hospital Social Worker acts as a link between the patient's home life and the medical and nursing staff. It is her duty to see that the patients are able to benefit by the treatment, and to carry out the instructions they receive, and she must be in close touch with all outside agencies able to provide help necessary to assist or complete a cure. Briefly, the keynote of her work is co-operation with every department inside the hospital and with every social agency outside.

There are four Social Workers on the staff of the Almoner's Department at the North Staffordshire Royal Infirmary, and during 1938, 30,264 patients passed through the office, and 9,947 letters were written in connection with arrangements made for them. 1,720 special visits were made to patients in the wards, and 1,107 patients were seen the day they were admitted to the Infirmary.

### Convalescent Homes.

The Medical Staff referred 674 patients (520 adults and 154 children) to the Department for convalescent treatment to be arranged. For various reasons, 76 recommendations were cancelled, 6 postponed, 4 patients died, 13 were found to be able to make satisfactory arrangements for themselves, and 21 patients are still waiting for vacancies at various homes.

554 patients were sent to Convalescent Homes as follows:-

159 to the Southport Convalescent Hospital.

132 to the Lady Forester Home, Llandudno.

33 to the Devonshire Royal Hospital, Buxton.

50 to the Harewood Convalescent Home, Prestatyn.

43 to the Royal Alexandra Hospital, Rhyl.

5 to the Bradstock Locket Hospital, Southport.

7 to the Heath Memorial Home, Llanfairfechan.

15 to the West Hill Convalescent Home, Southport.

28 to the Hermitage Convalescent Home, Uttoxeter.

63 patients went to the Miners' Convalescent Home at Rudyard.

Two patients who were recommended Convalescent treatment were found to be more suitable for Sanatorium treatment, and this was arranged through the Tuberculosis Officer for the area.

Patients were also sent to the following hospitals and homes:-

The Lear Home of Recovery, West Kirby; The Stratford-on-Avon Convalescent Home; The St. John's Brine Bath Hospital, Droitwich; Chalfont Epileptic Colony, Bucks.; and to special homes at Bournemouth, Weston-

super-Mare, Dawlish, St. Annes-on-Sea, Littleport, Men's Home at Rhyl, Windermere, Woolton, Sutton-on-Tern, Langland Bay, and Stoke-on-Trent Children's Home, Rhyl.

Of the 554 patients for whom convalescence was arranged, 33 were able to pay full cost, and 19 paid £1 each for three weeks at the Southport Convalescent Hospital.

Free Vacancies were obtained at the Lady Forester Home, Llandudno for 73 patients, at the Hermitage Convalescent Home, Uttoxeter, for 28 patients, and I at the Southport Convalescent Hospital.

Seventeen patients were paid for entirely by the Samaritan Fund, and grants were made from this fund in 60 other cases. The Public Assistance Committee paid the full cost in 22 cases, and part cost in 8 cases. The United Services Fund paid the full cost in 29 cases and part cost in 11 cases. The Sir Smith Child Convalescent Fund paid the full cost in 32 cases, and part cost in 31 cases. The London, Midland and Scottish Railway Hospital Fund paid the full cost in 5 cases.

### Almoner's Annual Report.

Contributory Schemes paid the full cost in 18 cases, Approved Societies helped in 123 cases. Firms Welfare Departments helped in 79 cases (63 of these went to the Miners' Home at Rudyard).

We were also able to obtain help from Nations Fund for Nurses, Edith Cavell Fund for Nurses, British Red Cross, Co-operative Wholesale Society, Education Committee, T.B. Care Committee, Soldiers', Sailors' and Airmen's Families Association, Lichfield Diocesan Association for Rescue and Preventative Works, Fenton Workingmen's Club, Shelton Church, and several Trade Unions.

### Hermitage Home, Uttoxeter.

Through the generosity of Mrs. Charles Bamford, we have again been able to send patients to this charming little home free of all cost. It is an ideal place for patients who need rest and good food, and who are not well enough to stand the strain of a long railway journey.

### Extra Nourishment.

279 patients were referred to the Department for help to obtain extra nourishment and special diets. Here again the co-operation of the United Services Fund, the Public Assistance Committee, and the Unemployment Assistance Board, was enlisted. Grants amounting to £5 13s. 5d. were made from the Almoner's Samaritan Fund.

### Help with Fares.

1,057 grants, amounting to £63 9s. 3d. were made from the Samaritan Fund for bus fares to enable patients to attend regularly for treatment. Help with fares was also arranged through the Unemployment Assistance Board, the Public Assistance Committee, and Insurance Companies.

### Meals at the Coffee Stall.

Meals at the Coffee Stall were given to patients who had come long distances, or who had unexpectedly to stay all day at the Infirmary, and who were without money to buy food.

### Road Accidents.

The Almoner is responsible for the collection of payments made in accordance with the provisions of the Road and Rail Traffic Act, and during 1938, £1,207 7s. 4d. was collected from this source.

### Surgical Appliances.

Payments towards the cost of Surgical Appliances are also collected from Approved Societies, from Firms, and from patients, etc. The sum of £902 8s. 9d. was collected in this way.

The thanks of the Social Worker are due to the Members of the Medical and Nursing Staffs, to all the outside agencies who have co-operated with the Department and without whose help most of the work could never have been accomplished.







# The North Wing of the original Building was made possible by a donation of £5,000 from Mr. William Yates, of Hanley, 1860.

#### The Smith Hill Child Building.

Dedicated in 1867 by Sir Smith Child, Bart., in memory of his eldest son.

#### The Eliza Hinds Ward (formerly Ward 15).

Dedicated under the Will of the late Mrs. Eliza Hinds, of Newcastle-under-Lyme, in 1899.

#### The F. J. Harrison Memorial Recreation Hut.

Given in memory of the late Mr. F. J. Harrison by Mrs. and the Misses Harrison, of Maer Hall, in 1917 as a Recreation Hut for Wounded Soldiers and used since the end of the war as an Orthopaedic Department.

#### Main Entrance Hall.

The tiling of this Hall was given in memory of John Waugh Harris, by the Employees of Bullers Ltd., 1920.

#### Auxiliary Ward (Ward 8).

Given by the late Mrs. Harrison, O.B.E., J.P., of Maer Hall, and opened in February, 1923. The Ward was equipped by the late Miss Dora Twyford and her friends at Whitmore.

#### The Henry J. Johnson Ward (Ward 18).



Free treatment will be given to old age pensioners and those who are too poor to make any payment. A person presenting one of the above recommendations will be interviewed by the Almoner and free treatment will NOT be given if the patient or the person on whom the patient is dependent is found to be in a position to join the Contributory Association and has not done so.

Rule 55.—No Recommendation (whether for an In-Patient or an Out-Patient), shall be available for more than two calendar months without renewal.

Rule 23 (8).—The Secretary and House Governor will issue to Subscribers, Contributors, and Donors, the forms of recommendation to which they are respectively entitled under these Rules; it is a particular obligation on anyone giving a Recommendation to satisfy himself as far as possible that the patient is not disqualified under these Rules from receiving treatment at the Infirmary.

No person shall be eligible for admission as an In-Patient or for treatment as an Out-Patient whose circumstances, in the opinion of the House Committee, enable him to pay for such suitable medical treatment as his condition requires.

In-Patients are admitted every week-day at noon by arrangement with the House Surgeon or House Physician.

Any person admitted as a patient will be required to produce a voucher showing that he is a member of the North Staffordshire Voluntary Hospitals Contributory Association, or a recommendation from a Subscriber or Donor, except in the case of accident or emergency or other circumstances which, in the opinion of the House Committee, are exceptional. Any member of the North Staffordshire Voluntary Hospitals Contributory Association admitted without a voucher will be required to obtain one within 48 hours, Sundays and Bank Holidays excluded.

All other persons admitted as patients will be required to make payment for the cost of maintenance in the Infirmary at the rate ruling for the time being, and a recommendation from a Subscriber or Donor will be accepted as payment to the extent of three guineas.

#### ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO.

#### THE FIRST CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME!!!

(Extract from the report of the year 1815.)

An address to the working classes of Newcastle, the Potteries, and neighbourhood, dated November 18th, 1814.

"We look chiefly to you for such a fixed and important addition to the Annual Income as may enable the Institution to meet the great increase of expense which must necessarily be incurred: and this may be obtained by means of a small payment, in every working week only, on the following plan.

That:—

Each person who earns upwards of eighteen shillings per week, contribute not less than one penny weekly;

Each person who earns upwards of seven shillings per week, and not more than eighteen shillings per week, contribute not less than one half-penny weekly; and

Each person who earns not more than seven shillings per week, contribute not less than one farthing weekly.

The manner in which these easy contributions will be collected should be settled with you by your respective Masters. It may, without difficulty, be done by means of a separate column in the pay-list, and a regular stoppage on the pay-day. The pay-list itself would show the proper sum to be paid by each individual; and it would only be necessary to add up what might be called the Infirmary Column, in order to ascertain the sum subscribed by your particular establishment. We only suggest this plan, however. Let another be adopted, if another appears more eligible. The whole amount, together with any sum which the Master may think fit to add, should be paid quarterly to the Treasurer of the Infirmary, as the joint subscription of the manufactory or other establishment, and should entitle that establishment to the same privilege, as to the number of patients to be recommended which the same subscription confers on individual subscribers. The number of those recommendations must of course be proportioned to the sum subscribed; the accurate calculations of the average expense of In-Patients will be necessary before the scale is fixed. It must not therefore be settled hastily; it must be settled and made public before the opening of the Infirmary. It is further necessary that no patient be recommended, in virtue of these Establishment Subscriptions, who is not a regular contributor to the same according to the proposed system. As to the regulation of the power of recommending patients, it is left to each establishment to settle its own plan; only we expect that it be constantly adhered to, in order that the Infirmary Committee may know when the recommendations are properly given."
