Being the Report for the Year 1940.

The Board of Management has pleasure in presenting to the Subscribers, Donors and friends of these Institutions, the SEVENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT, being that for the year ended 31st December, 1940.

General,

The accompanying medical reports, submitted herewith give some indication of the varied character of the work for which the Board is responsible. This work has been carried on despite the dangers associated with this new type of warfare, where hospitals appear to have been singled out for special attention by the enemy.

Tuberculosis and Diseases of the Chest account for the majority of patients admitted to the Hospital and Sanatorium, and whenever possible a transfer of patients is arranged, assuring to them the benefits of both Institutions. Torpenhow Open Air School continues to play a very important part and the Board of Management is most anxious that full advantage should be taken by the local Education Authorities of the splendid facilities available there. Experience has shown very definitely that the children derive great benefits from a stay in the pure air and favourable conditions in which they are placed. Air Raid Shelters have been provided at all the Institutions and every precaution is being taken to cope with the dangers ensuing from enemy action, so that even at the Hospital, the staff may get their sleep in comparative safety.

Obituary.

The Board has suffered grievous loss to its personnel during the year, by the death of Mrs. Harker, a member of the Sanatorium Ladies' Committee for many years; Mr. Hugh R. Rathbone, formerly a Trustee and a member of a family highly respected not only in Liverpool, but throughout the country; Mr. T. Fisher Caldwell, a member of the Board of Management, who by his administrative and financial ability was of invaluable help; also Dr. Thomas Clarke, who was associated with the Hospital first as a Stipendiary, later as an Honorary and finally as a Consulting Physician.

Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting, held at the Hospital, was honoured by the presence of the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor of Liverpool, Alderman Sir C. Sydney Jones, who after presiding at the meeting found time to visit the other two Institutions. The Lord Mayor expressed great satisfaction at what he had seen, being particularly pleased to be with the children at Torpenhow.

Dr. Coope.

The Board is pleased to record the honour conferred upon Dr. Coope, the Chairman of the Hospital Medical Board, by his election to the Royal College of Physicians of London.

Miss Roberts.

The Board has lost yet another tried and trusty servant in the person of Miss Roberts, who retired on pension after more than forty years' faithful service as Matron of the Sanatorium. During her period of office, she has seen the Institution grow from 40 to 175 beds, for Miss Roberts was at the Sanatorium on its inception. The best wishes of all go out to her in her well earned retirement.

Miss Fieldhouse. At this stage, it would also be appropriate to refer to the retirement of Miss Fieldhouse after eighteen years as Matron of the Liverpool Hospital. Miss Fieldhouse has served the Hospital well, but ill-health during the year 1940 has in no small measure been responsible for the decision. The Board hope that her health will now improve so that she may enjoy many years of leisure and happiness.

Torpenhow.

Owing to the war, it was decided to postpone the Sports and Reunion Day at Torpenhow. This step was not taken without careful consideration as it affords the Committee the only opportunity of meeting old scholars and ascertaining if the improvement in their physique is maintained.

Last year, the Committee in response to the Government's appeal, approved of the ploughing of a further acre of land

for the cultivation of potatoes, thus making Torpenhow more self-supporting.

atorium.

It has not been possible to carry out new extensions, although it was hoped to have a water-softening plant in operation at the Sanatorium.

scriptions.

Annual Subscriptions continue to show a steady decline. This is due mainly to the death of old Annual Subscribers, and also to the fact that supporters who have left the district find other claims upon them in their new surroundings. The Committee hope that despite increased calls, Annual Subscribers and Donors, to whose support they look forward with every confidence, will endeavour to interest new friends in the work of the Institutions.

During the year ended 31st December, 1940, there were 152 patients under treatment in the Hospital Wards, of whom 76 were females and 76 males, a decrease of 1 patient on 1939.

There were 132 discharged during the year, leaving 20 patients in residence on 31st December, 1940.

The total number of In-Patient days was 10,442, an increase of 1,735 days on the previous year.

Of the 132 patients discharged, 65 were males and 67 females, and these included 33 deaths.

The Sanatorium, Delamere Forest

ANNUAL REPORT of the MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT, 1940.

On January 1st, 1940, there were 132 patients in residence, and a further 295 were admitted during the year, making the total treated 427. Of these, 297 were discharged, leaving 130 in residence. Of the discharged patients, 168 were males and 129 females.

The average duration of residence during the year was 142 days, and the average daily number of beds occupied was 143, of which 79 were by males and 64 by females.

The total number of patient-days was 51,987, as against the maximum of 59,065 in 1931, males accounting for 28,636, and females 23,351; male patient-days showed a decrease of 1,103 and there was an increase of 670 in females on the previous year.

Bed Cases, defined by the Ministry of Health as requiring two meals in bed per day, averaged 78, as compared with 96 in 1939.

Table "A," based on the Ministry of Health classification, contains an analysis of the condition of all patients discharged. Significant amongst the alterations from last year's figures is the rise in B (i) cases, this corresponding to the increased admissions during the year of early cases suitable for pneumothorax therapy.

A modified Lowenstein medium is being used for the culture of tubercle bacilli, this procedure being employed as a routine after 3 sputum tests have proved negative on direct examination. A certain number of ear swabs are found to contain t.b., hence all ear discharges are examined by direct smear or indirect culture for the organism.

Sputum Disposal. The construction of the new sputum disposal plant has been completed during the year and it is now working satisfactorily, both sputum and sputum cups being sterilised by boiling in half per cent. caustic soda.

The proportion of pneumothoraces induced and maintained in the institution is therefore in the neighbourhood of 12 per cent. This high figure is the result of a policy of considering every new case as a candidate for pneumothorax therapy. That it is not higher is mainly attributable to the tardy diagnosis which prevails in this country. Earlier diagnosis would increase the number of cases suitable for this form of therapy, the value of which has been well proved.

The facilities for operation have been diminished by the war, and this is to be regretted.

Chemotherapy.

Gold and Cadmium therapy are now rarely used as the indications are considered to be entirely psychological. A useful but limited place has been found for the new sulphonamide group of drugs in the treatment of secondary infections of the lung and pleura, and the results of treatment in one particular group have been published in the medical press.

X-Ray Department 912 radiographs were taken, and 361 screen examinations were made. This latter examination is now restricted to pneumothorax and phrenic cases.

Bronchography has been performed on 14 patients to demonstrate obstruction and dilatation of the bronchi, and several cases have been proved non-tuberculous by this diagnostic method.

The War.

There has been evident during the year a reversal of the policy of using sanatorium beds for casualties, and as far as the Liverpool Sanatorium is concerned an attempt has been made to utilise the beds as fully as possible for the treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis, but staff shortage has seriously hampered the effort. Employment of a proportion of ex-patients on the staff has eased the position considerably and contributed in a minor degree to the solution of the major problem of rehabilitation.

Towards the end of the year the sanatorium received patients evacuated from another sanatorium which had been damaged by enemy action. It is expected that this redistribution of patients amongst hospitals will become increasingly necessary as the war continues.

Torpenhow Open-Air School

There were 39 children in residence on 1st January, 1940, and 135 were admitted during the year—79 children from Liverpool, 56 from Cheshire, making the total number in residence during the year 174.

The total number of days in residence was 20,952, a decrease of 629 days on the previous year.

MEDICAL REPORT FOR YEAR 1940.

As the war has progressed so we have found it expedient to adjust ourselves to ensure increased safety for the children.

Hence we, after consultation with and on the advice of the Committee, cancelled our usual Annual Re-union and Sports, it being felt dangerous to have so large a concourse gathered together in the event of possible enemy air-raiding.

We have also thought it expedient to sleep the children downstairs on the ground floor that they may have better protection from above and from the "blast-walls" with which this floor is in part surrounded.

This, from one angle, may seem a retrograde step in that the youngsters are denied the use of their former airy bed-rooms but it avoids their being wakened during a raid and having to be brought downstairs as was our former practice.

We find that the children sleep undisturbed through the alarms and that there seems to be no deterioration in their physical or nervous condition.

The average gain in weight of the girls has actually increased slightly. That of the boys has remained as before.

We have been fortunate in having been able to maintain our dietary as before the war.

There has been a noticeable increase in the admission of what I can only call the "nervy" type, especially from areas that have suffered most from air-raiding, particularly amongst the boys; this would seem to support the efforts made by our Education Authorities to evacuate children from the danger areas.

These children quickly improve, as a rule, no doubt due to their undisturbed rest and the charm of their surroundings.

In June, Sir Sydney Jones, the Lord Mayor of Liverpool, gave much pleasure to the children and ourselves by his visit.

I feel at this time I owe an especial debt to the Matron and the Staff, Nursing, Teaching and Domestic, who though shorthanded, due no doubt to the bribe of more lucrative war-time posts, have stuck to their posts and carried on cheerfully and with much self-denial and little time for relaxation.

TORPENHOW DENTAL REPORT.

The usual weekly reservations have been made for Torpenhow, but unfortunately I have not always been able to get transport owing to the increased number of evacuees from bombed areas now living here, and travelling back to Birkenhead and Liverpool.

I regret to state that the amount of treatment to the children has been much less than in previous years. This, I presume, is due to the lack of "service" for Matron, and difficulty of transport for me, and the infectious outbreaks at Torpenhow.

I must reiterate that I am pleased to see the continued increase in the number of teeth in good condition.

Once more I must express my thanks to Matron and her Staff for their kind attention and assistance under these very trying circumstances.
