REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1946.

Being the Eighty-Third Annual Report of the Liverpool Hospital for Consumption and Diseases of the Chest, which includes the Liverpool Sanatorium, Delamere Forest, Frodsham, and the Torpenhow Open Air School for Children, Frankby, West Kirby, Wirral.

The Board of Management has pleasure in presenting to the Subscribers, Donors and Friends of these Institutions, the Eighty-Third Annual Report, being that for the year ended 31st December, 1946.

It is probably the penultimate Report of the Institutions under the Voluntary system, one that has served the public so well in the past, and is now to be superseded by the new Government Scheme which comes into operation on 5th July, 1948, the appointed day named by the Minister of Health. During the interim period it is the firm resolve of the Board to provide the same high standard of service that has been rendered in the past. The names of the Hospital Regional Board which is to be responsible for the Health Services in this area have now been announced.

The accompanying tables give some indication of the work for which the Board is responsible.

The Liverpool Hospital. It has not been possible to provide the beds, so urgently needed by the Honorary Medical Staff, although there seems to be every indication that at least some portion of the Hospital will be available in the near future so that wards can be re-opened for the admission of patients. The release of the Hospital premises by the Liverpool Corporation has been delayed, because of the difficulties experienced in preparing accommodation in the building to which the Corporation Departments now housed in the Hospital are to be transferred.

The Out-Patients' Department continues to play an important part in the diagnosis of chest diseases, as a review

of the number of patients attending and receiving treatment will reveal, but its usefulness will be considerably increased when beds can be made available for patients seen in the Clinic and found to be too ill to be sent home.

Mr. R. S. Marker. Reference was made in last year's Report to the great loss sustained by the Board of Management in the demise of Mr. R. S. Harker, Honorary Treasurer of the Hospital since April, 1929. His wise direction of the Hospital funds has contributed a great deal towards placing the Institutions on a sound financial basis. Mr. A. S. Cross assisted by Mr. E. Otho Glover has kindly consented to fill the vacancy thus created.

Alderman Major W. Denton, J.P. The Board has suffered further grievous loss in the death of Alderman Major W. Denton, who, as a member of the Board for over eight years and a member of the Torpenhow School Committee for twenty years rendered very valuable services to the Institutions. His high sense of duty, integrity of purpose and courteous manner endeared him to all who had the privilege of knowing him. He will be greatly missed not only by these Institutions in particular, but by the City of Liverpool in general.

Mrs. N. G. Demetriadi. Mrs. N. G. Demetriadi, who recently joined the Sanatorium Ladies' Committee, has left the district to live in the South of England, and in consequence has resigned.

The Viscountess Leverhulme. The Board is very pleased to report that the Viscountess Leverhulme will continue to serve on the Torpenhow School Committee. Previously Lady Leverhulme was the representative of the Cheshire County Council, from which she resigned, so in order to retain her services the Board unanimously requested her Ladyship to represent it on the School Committee.

Honorary Radiologist The Board regret to report the resignation of Dr. J. H. Mather for health reasons, as Honorary Radiologist to the Hospital, a position he has held since the inception of the post in 1921. He has filled this important office with great distinction, and the Board in paying tribute to his valuable services, express the hope that his health will improve to enable him to enjoy a well-earned retirement. The position

has been filled temporarily by Dr. Norah Walker, M.B., Ch.B., D.M.R.E., who for many years acted as Deputy to Dr. Mather.

Merseyside Hospitals Council. Agreement has now been reached with the Merseyside Hospitals Council, whereby contributing members will receive free treatment in the Out-Patients' Clinic on production of Vouchers. This, of course, will only apply to Non-Tubercular patients, for free treatment is already available to Tuberculous patients under the existing Government Scheme.

New Education Act, 1944. The New Education Act stipulates that Local Authorities are to be responsible for the medical treatment of all children attending schools under their jurisdiction. Negotiations are in progress with the local Authorities concerned for the treatment of children in the Out-Patients' Clinic.

Sanatorium Extensions.

In reply to the Board's application for a permit to extend the Nurses' Home, the Ministry of Health have asked to be furnished with details of the scheme, including a sketch plan and approximate estimate of the cost of the work, in order that further consideration may be given to the proposals. A Sub-Committee was delegated to meet the Architect, who, after a discussion following a complete survey of the site and existing Nurses' Home, has recommended the erection of a three-storied building. This he considers essential in providing adequate accommodation for the nursing staff in accordance with modern requirements as laid down by the Ministry. He also proposes to alter the present building, at the end of which a flat will be built connected by a bridge: the flat will be for the use of the junior medical staff. In view of the additional domestic staff that will be needed, for which accommodation must be provided, it was considered opportune to request the Architect to prepare plans for a new Maids' Home. Following the approval of these plans by the Board, the scheme in toto with estimates of costs will be submitted to the Ministry of Health.

Improvements. The modernisation of the kitchens has taken much longer than anticipated, for part of the equipment still remains to be installed. There is, however, a great deal of work to be done if the scheme of modernisation which the Board consider necessary is to be carried through. Nursing

During the year the order directing Nurses was rescinded, causing a serious depletion in the ranks of Nursing Staff at the Sanatorium. It eventually became so grave, that at one time the drastic step of closing more beds had to be considered, but it is hoped that this will be avoided. Negotiations are still taking place with the General Nursing Council regarding affiliation, which when completed should assist in the recruitment of nurses. Furthermore, it may then be possible for nurses from Teaching Hospitals to do part of their training at the Sanatorium. Certain recommendations of the Council such as the purchase of new equipment will take some considerable time to put into effect in these days of shortages.

Domestle

It is very gratifying to report that there has been an improvement in the number of domestics employed at all Institutions, particularly at the Sanatorium. This may be attributable to the adoption of the recommendations of the National Joint Council providing for greatly increased rates of pay and improved conditions of service. The cost to the Institutions is considerable and is responsible in part for the deficit incurred this year. The satisfactory service given by a number of "displaced persons" has also been helpful on the domestic side by relieving the nursing staff, who have carried a heavy burden during the last few years.

Torpenhow Open Air School. Torpenhow School enjoyed another successful year, the average number of children in residence being even higher than in 1945. The manner in which Matron and her staff have carried out their duties is worthy of the highest praise and the Board of Management take this opportunity of expressing its sincere appreciation of their work.

Messrs. E. Denton & Son. The Board of Management also cordially thank Messrs. E. Denton & Son for their kindness in continuing to allow the Board and School Committee to hold the monthly meetings in their rooms.

Subscriptions Subscriptions again show a reduction during the year, but the Board takes this opportunity of thanking all Subscribers and Donors for their support in the past, and appeal to them to continue to give all the assistance they can in the difficult transitional period through which the Institutions are now passing. THE SANATORIUM, DELAMERE FOREST.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT, 1940.

On January 1st, 1946, there were 109 patients in residence, and a further 261 were admitted during the year, making the total treated 370. Of these, 281 were discharged, leaving 89 in residence. Of the discharged patients, 149 were males and 132 females.

The average duration of residence during the year was 102 days, and the average daily number of beds occupied was 104, of which 51 were by males and 53 by females.

The total number of patient days was 37,828, as against the maximum of 59,065 in 1931, males accounting for 18,832 and females 18,996.

Bed cases, defined by the Ministry of Health as requiring two meals in bed per day, averaged 45, compared with 68 in 1945.

TORPENHOW REPORT.

Since my last report we have passed through the World War in spite of which Torpenhow has been able to "carry on" its beneficent work.

I have thought it fitting to give a short resumé of the happenings during that period, rather than to confine myself merely to the year 1946.

Firstly because it will, I trust, add continuity to the records, and secondly, the year 1946 passed so uneventfully that there is little to report.

The Resignation of Miss Anson, who had been Matron since our inception closed a long chapter of success.

In October 1942, after a short period of flux, Miss Shaw Williams came to us as Matron to be joined by Miss Hudson as Sister.

These two ladies quickly proved themselves to be a good team and during the first month of their appointment we had the pleasure of entertaining the Liverpool Health Visitors and took every means to show and explain to them our work at Torpenhow.

In 1943 Miss Shaw Williams left us to take a post in Trinidad and Miss Hudson became Matron. Though she has "changed her name" I am very happy to say, she still remains with us well supported by Sister Downey.

During these stern war years the children at Torpenhow have indeed been fortunate.

They have suffered little from the austerities of diet and comforts borne by the great majority elsewhere and our health record has been magnificently maintained.

We have been singularly free from infectious illness apart from mild minor epidemics of chicken-pox and other illnesses and accidents have been few or trivial.

Early in 1944 we had four cases of Scarlet Fever. Two were trainee Nurses. Two were children. It is likely that the infection was brought in by the former.

We had one case of Diphtheria. As all the children are now isolated for the first week after admission and this case developed during such a period and was at once removed to Clatterbridge Fever Hospital we had no further trouble. She was discharged from there fully recovered.

One boy developed acute Osteomyelitis of the tibia and was satisfactorily dealt with at the County Hospital, Clatterbridge.

Another boy, following an X-ray after admission, was found to have a safety pin in his left lower bronchus. He was transferred to the Liverpool Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital for treatment, returned to us and later was discharged in the usual manner.

In July, 1945, we were visited by Dr. Henderson from the Board of Education.

We have missed the visits we used to have from the Lord Mayor of Liverpool and also regret that owing to the present food and other restrictions we have been unable to resume our annual reunions.

As to the future, we can only hope with all the promises of Educational progress and Health Service improvement that we may receive our share of the good things and continue our work, making further advancement.

TORPENHOW OPEN-AIR SCHOOL

There were 77 children in residence on 1st January, 1946, and 163 were admitted during the year—78 children from Liverpool, 85 from Cheshire, making the total number in residence during the year 240.

The total number of days in residence was 28,263, an increase of 268 days on the previous year.

Average duration of stay was 173 days; maximum stay 232 days, and minimum duration of stay, I day.

TORPENHOW DENTAL REPORT

Arrangements have been made for the dental inspection and treatment to be carried out each month, and all children from Liverpool and Cheshire areas were thus seen on admission, and again on leaving Torpenhow Open-Air School.

In my work, I have been most fortunate in having the support and co-operation of Matron Forbes; and the clean-liness and satisfactory oral hygiene of the children is due to her untiring efforts in carrying out my suggestions.

I am pleased with the results and progress of the treatment given, and satisfied that the children, on leaving Torpenhow do so with a healthy dental condition. The war-time diet has not had the feared bad effects on the teeth tissues, and although occasionally I found an erupting permanent tooth poorer in standard of hardness, the teeth and mouths of the children were found to be cleaner and healthier.

The infectious outbreaks at Torpenhow have not been many, but when they did occur, I had to reluctantly postpone my visits.

During the past year I inspected 235 children (boys and girls) from Liverpool and Cheshire, and I gave treatment to 113 children. I found 122 did not require any treatment. The following is an analysis of the year's work:—
