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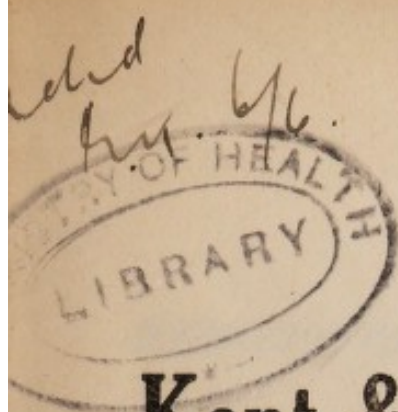

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# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE YEAR 1927.

The Board of Management have the pleasure to submit their Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1927.

## WORK OF THE HOSPITAL.

During the year under review the Hospital has treated a larger number of patients than in any year of its history. The number of In-Patients admitted was 1,839, an increase of 251 over the figure for 1926.

The increase in the emergency cases is partly accounted for by the increase in the number of motor accident cases admitted.

During the year 1927 the average daily number of occupied beds was 93.8, the highest yet recorded, and in addition the number of beds occupied daily at the Whitstable and Tankerton Cottage and Convalescent Hospital by patients sent from this Hospital averaged 8, so that the daily number of In-Patients under treatment averaged 101.8. It is interesting to note that although the number of cases admitted from Whitstable has decreased by 78 as compared with 1926, the total number of in-patients admitted during the year has increased by 251.

In the Out-Patient Department the figures show an increase of 1,789 over the previous year, a total of 6,735 patients, involving 29,188 attendances. It was found that at times panel patients used the Hospital without having first consulted their own doctors, and after consultation with the Honorary Medical Staff, a rule was brought into force in October last that persons insured under the National Health Insurance Act, must bring with them a letter from a doctor when applying for out-patient treatment, or explain why they have not a letter.

\*The large difference in the figures for 1926 and 1927 of new X-Ray cases is largely accounted for by the fact that in previous years skiagraph cases were not included.

In the X-Ray Department 433 In-Patients were dealt with in addition to 791 Out-Patients. The number of films exposed during the year totalled 2,645.

The Board are pleased to report that an Artificial Sunlight Department has recently been started. Mr. Charles Hardy generously presented a Mercury Vapour Lamp, and it is felt that this department, under the supervision of Dr. Harold Wachter, will be a valuable acquisition to the Hospital and result in a considerable economy.

Full use has again been made of the services of the Private Nursing Staff and the District Nurses. The number of visits paid by the two District Nurses was 7,764.

#### CHANGES IN THE BOARD AND HONORARY STAFF.

The Board received in July with much regret the resignation of the Reverend Canon T. G. Gardiner, after nine years' service on the Board of Management, and in recognition of his valuable services to the Hospital have pleasure in recommending the Governors to appoint him a Vice-President.

Mr. F. French, of Aylesham, has been elected to fill the vacancy on the Board caused by Canon Gardiner's resignation.

To fill the vacancy on the Honorary Staff caused by the resignation of Mr. R. S. N. Faro, mentioned in the last Report, Mr. C. V. T. Colling-Baugh, L.D.S., R.C.S. (Eng.), has been appointed Honorary Dental Surgeon.

Last year the Board reported that they had appointed Mr. J. L. Cassidi as Honorary Surgeon for a period of twelve months. They have now confirmed his appointment as Honorary Surgeon as from the 5th March, 1926.



## HOSPITAL BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT.

It was found necessary during the year to spend a considerable sum upon the fabric and equipment of the Hospital. The principal items are as follows:—

A long felt want has been supplied by the installation of an internal telephone system connecting up all wards and departments. This cost £212, and has added to the efficient working of the Hospital.

The old Dressings Steriliser became worn out and was replaced by a modern and larger machine at a cost of £210.

In the kitchen the Steam Cooking Apparatus, which had been in use for many years, also became worn out and was replaced by the latest type of Steam Cookers at a cost of £230, and it is hoped that this will lead to an economy in fuel consumption. The Board are grateful to Mr. F. Clough, Chief Engineer of the Chartham Mental Hospital, for the valuable advice which he gave in carrying out this improvement.

The purchase of Winchelsea House, Longport, for use as a Nurses' Home, released a portion of the main building for carrying out the improvements and re-arrangement of the ground floor mentioned in the last report. These alterations, together with the necessary re-decoration of the corridor, involved an expenditure of £260.

Another heavy expenditure which had not been anticipated, had to be incurred. Defects in the roof of the main building necessitated the re-slating of more than half of the roof, besides other repairs, at a cost of £300.

A further £92 had to be spent in connection with the flue from the Steam Boiler. The old flue proved inadequate for the increased work which the boiler had to do, and as there was a danger of fire the flue was replaced by an external steel shaft.

## PROPOSED NEW HOSPITAL BUILDINGS.

In their Annual Report for 1926, the Board stated that before giving their final approval to the scheme of reconstruction suggested by Mr. Walford, they felt they must be able to satisfy the Governors that it would meet the present-day requirements of the Hospital, and they accordingly referred the matter back to the Development Advisory Committee, which was first appointed early in 1926, for further investigation and report.

This Committee was re-appointed in March, 1927, and four Sub-Committees were appointed from amongst its members, each Sub-Committee to deal with a certain aspect of the question and to report.

In view of the nature of these reports, the Development Advisory Committee felt unable to make any recommendations until a definite future policy of either remaining on the present



site, or moving to a fresh site had been decided by the Board of Management, and they therefore asked the Board of Management for a declaration of policy.

A special meeting of the Board of Management, which was attended by 30 members, was therefore held to consider the matter, and it was agreed that, owing to the age and inconvenience of the present building, the building of a new Hospital to meet present day requirements was essential. It was also agreed, with only one dissentient, that the South Canterbury site, which was purchased in 1925 be utilized.

In view of this decision, the Development Advisory Committee made the following recommendations which were adopted by the Board of Management, and placed before the Governors at a Special General Meeting held on Wednesday, 25th January, 1928:—

1. (a) That a new Hospital of 120 beds be built on the South Canterbury site, with an Administrative Block of such size and accommodation as would be suitable for a 200 bed Hospital, should at any time a Hospital of this size be required.
- (b) That in addition to the aforementioned 120 beds, 20 beds be provided for paying patients.
- (c) That a Nurses' Home be built, of sufficient size to accommodate the entire Nursing Staff.
- (d) That a Laundry be erected and equipped.
- (e) That allowance be made in the plans for the erection of a Miners' Emergency Ward, provided such Emergency Ward be paid for by the Mining Industry.
- (f) That an Out-Patient Department be built of such size that it may conveniently deal with the same number of Out-Patients as are dealt with at present.

N.B.—It is estimated that the cost of the new Hospital will be approximately £100,000.

2. That a campaign be organised by the Hospital Board Board of Management to raise funds towards the building of a new Hospital, and that an effort be made during the next two years to raise a capital sum based on a 5s. per head assessment of the population served by the Hospital. It is estimated that on this basis, the sum of about £50,000 would be raised.

The Honorary Medical Staff unanimously agreed to support the action which the Board of Management recommended.

The Special Meeting of Governors was largely attended and keen interest evoked in the proposals of the Board of Management. After a full discussion the first recommendation was



adopted with only five dissentients, and the second recommendation relating to the raising of funds carried nem con.

With regard to the financial side of the undertaking it is thought that the cost of a new Hospital may be met in the following way:—

In view of the decision of the Governors it is now the bounden duty of the Board of Management to see that every care is exercised in keeping expenditure on the present hospital buildings to the barest minimum.

#### FINANCE OF THE HOSPITAL.

The excess of Expenditure over Income for the year 1927 was £3,307/5/6, whilst the books show an overdraft at the 31st December of £6,822/19/3.

The financial position of the Hospital causes the Board much anxiety and they regret it is necessary to ask the Governors for sanction to reduce the Overdraft by approximately £4,000. Of this sum there is in hand £468/16/4, being the unexpended balance of the amount realised early in 1927 for the purchase and equipment of Winchelsea House. Instead of reinvesting this balance, the Board recommend that it be transferred to the General Account in order to reduce the overdraft. This leaves a further £3,500 to be realised and the Board therefore ask the sanction of the Governors to sell sufficient securities to meet this amount.

The present financial position is mainly attributable to two causes, viz.:—(1) the large sums it has been found necessary to spend on the fabric and equipment of the Hospital, and (2) the increase in cost due to the additional demands made upon all branches of the Hospital's resources.

It is interesting to note that during the past three years nearly £3,000 has been expended on the Buildings and the renewal of expensive apparatus, in addition to a capital expenditure of £2,850 for Nurses' Homes.

Whilst the work of the Hospital has increased it is regretted that the measure of support has not increased proportionately, and the Board feel that for the area served by the Hospital the number of Annual Subscribers is far too small.


The amount received from the Propaganda Committee during the year was £7,500. The thanks of the Board for this helpful sum are expressed in another part of the report.

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Among other contributors the Board tender sincere thanks to the Brotherhood of the Cheerful Sparrows, Herne Bay, for their contribution of £100, and also to our anonymous donor who has again forwarded the sum of £100.

The increase in expenditure for 1927 is largely due to the sums expended on the fabric and equipment of the Hospital, the principal items of which have already been mentioned under the heading of "Hospital Buildings and Equipment."

Another reason for the increase in expenditure is due to the fact that the maintenance of patients sent from this Hospital to the Whitstable and Tankerton Cottage and Convalescent Hospital cost £1,100 which figure represents an additional cost over any previous year.

Last Spring an Egg Appeal was inaugurated and was the means of saving the sum of £50. The Board are grateful to those who organised districts and in other ways brought about the success of the appeal.

## NURSING AND ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF.

The following are the results of the State Examinations for Nurses:—Final Examination, 7 entered, 7 passed; Preliminary Examination, 11 entered, 10 passed.

The number of applicants for training has been maintained and 16 Probationers have commenced their training during the year.

It is interesting to record that, owing to the number of applications received, it has been found necessary to have a waiting list of Probationers from which appointments are made as vacancies occur.

The Board received with regret the resignation of The Reverend A. H. Partridge, who had been Chaplain of the Hospital since 1916, and whose resignation took effect from the end of September. Since then the duties of Chaplain have been carried out by the Rev. C. F. Tonks.

## SERVICES TO THE HOSPITAL.

The thanks of the Board are given to the members of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff for their care and attention to the patients and for their valuable services to the Hospital. The number of letters received expressing gratitude for treatment testify to the excellent work performed by the Honorary Staff.

In connection with the finances of the Hospital the Board again acknowledge the excellent work of the Propaganda Committee by whose efforts the sum of £7,500 has been received



during the year. Thanks are tendered to all the workers who have assisted in raising this very important sum, the largest yet received.

Mr. A. J. Waters has continued his work as Honorary Secretary of the "Hospital Saturday Fund," but he felt that the time had arrived when it would be better for the raising of this fund to become a part of the work of the Propaganda Committee, and they have agreed to take over the work from the 1st January, 1928. The Board take this opportunity of expressing their great appreciation and of offering their sincere thanks for the splendid work done by Mr. Waters during the many years he was Honorary Secretary of the "Hospital Saturday Fund."

The thanks of the Board are also due to Mr. C. E. Kingsford, Honorary Solicitor, Mr. H. M. Biggleston, Honorary Consulting Engineer, Mr. S. W. Bligh, Honorary Radio Engineer, and Mr. W. S. Willan, Honorary Architect, for the kind help they have rendered during the year.

Thanks are also due to the Members of the Linen League for their continued valuable work. The Board are specially grateful to them for supplying this year not only the linen for a new two-bedded maternity ward, but also for providing the furniture for this ward.

The Board further desire to thank the Committee of the Samaritan Fund and the Lady Visitors for their good offices during the year.

The ex-Mayor and Mayoress, Alderman and Mrs. Pope, continued to show their kind interest in the Hospital, and with the assistance of Miss Pope kindly organized two Flag Days. The Board are grateful to them and tender their sincere thanks.
