Included in these figures are a considerable number of attendances of Service patients.

### FINANCE.

Ordinary Income £42564 16s. 3d., exceeded Ordinary Expenditure £41385 12s. 6d., by £1179 3s. 9d., therby reducing the accumulated deficit on the Income and Expenditure Account, which now stands at £8894 14s. 2d.

Income under all headings was maintained and expenditure was well controlled, although higher costs had to be faced under most headings. A state grant was received towards the additional expense caused by an increase in nursing salaries.

Many friends again made generous donations. The large sum received from the Contributory Scheme provided 28% of all income, and is particularly appreciated.

Gifts in kind have been many and varied. These have been acknowledged

with warm thanks.

The Hospital has continued to co-operate with the Ministry of Health in the provision of Emergency Hospital Services. The grants received are subject to adjustment.

As the result of the treatment of more In-Patients at very little additional expense, the average cost of each In-Patient has been reduced to £3 8s. 7d., a very good figure indeed. The cost of Out-Patients shows slight reduction.

During the year a final payment was made to the builder in respect of the New Hospital. The balance of Architect's fees has not been finally agreed. The New Hospital Building Fund is overdrawn to the extent of £50,901 3s. 7d.

The value of new plant provided in conjunction with the Ministry of Health and by donors has been added to Land, Buildings and Equipment.

JOHN McMASTER BENEFACTION.

Following the death of a residuary legatee the funds of this bequest have been considerably increased.

### LONGBOTHAM TRUST.

The Hospital is fortunate in receiving the residuary estate of the late Miss

A. J. Longboth m under the following terms of her Will: -

"For endowment of a single bed in a single private ward, which I desire to be called 'William Longbotham Ward' in memory of my father, such Ward to be used for the benefit of gentlefolk whose circumstances in life might not otherwise enable them to have the extra comforts of a private ward . . ."

A scheme is being formulated to put into effect the wishes of this generous benefactress.

### WAR DAMAGE.

The Hospital has been fortunate in sustaining only minor structural damage as a result of enemy action, but Winchelsea House, Longport, a former Nurses' Home and latterly the office of the Contributory Scheme, was completely destroyed in the June blitz.

### PATRON.

The Board is pleased to be able to announce that His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury (Dr. William Temple) has consented to become Patron of the Hospital.

### BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

Meetings were held regularly throughout the year and active support has been given to all efforts to co-ordinate and improve health services, particularly those provided by Voluntary Hospitals. A fracture clinic was established and is meeting a very real need. The out-patient appointment scheme has been most successful and many other Hospitals have sought advice (even one in New Zealand), and some have adopted similar schemes.

### OBITUARY.

The Board records with regret the passing of many friends, including Miss M. Plummer, for many years a very active worker for the Hospital, and Mrs. W. H. Bradford, a member of the Board of Management.

### HOSPITAL STAFF.

The Board is proud of the way in which all members of the staff have served the Hospital during the year. Duties have been performed without regard to personal safety and work done under great difficulties.

Members of the Honorary Medical Staff loyally answered the heavy calls

Members of the Honorary Medical Staff loyally answered the heavy calls upon their skill and time and the Board records deep sense of appreciation and indebtedness for their untiring service.

Congratulations were conveyed to Miss A. F. Purchas, Matron, upon being made a Member of the British Empire in recognition of her services to the nursing profession.

Miss D. de M. Warren was appointed Assistant Matron and commenced her duties in July last.

### THE LINEN LEAGUE AND THE SAMARITAN FUND.

The patients have again received great help through the activities of these two organisations, and the Board acknowledges with thanks the supplementary service rendered.

### APPRECIATION.

Sincere thanks are expressed to all voluntary helpers for their excellent service during a year fraught with difficulties, particularly in the City. Following the air raids, many Honorary Representatives and Stewards were rendered homeless for long periods and yet they continued their good work. Sympathy is expressed to those who lost relatives or who suffered personal and material loss.

To all new Representatives, Stewards and Contributors the Board extends a welcome.

### ORGANISER.

The financial success of the scheme during the past year testifies to the ability and energy of Miss M. Dreghorn, the Organiser. In spite of difficulties created by the war and added responsibilities through the extension of the Scheme, her work has been characterised by cheerfulness and enthusiasm.

The loss of all records and equipment when the offices were burnt out as the result of enemy action in June last caused more hard work and the Board realises how fortunate the Scheme is in having the services of such a capable official. Invaluable help was given by Honorary Representatives and Stewards to the Organiser in compiling fresh records.

### FINANCE.

The total collection of £12,483 18s. 6d. is a record and the attached income and expenditure account shows that the Scheme has provided £11,951 3s. 0d. for the maintenance of the Hospital.

This splendid result of the efforts of all concerned is appreciated by the Board, which realises the great part played by the Contributory Scheme in the successful running of the Hospital. In acknowledging the financial help, thanks are also expressed for the goodwill and interest spread by the Scheme's voluntary helpers.

The donations generously and spontaneously made by Employers and the special donation made by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Tritton call for mention and thanks.

Collections throughout the area have been well maintained. At the present time it is not possible to give a detailed analysis of the income because of the destruction of records for the period 1st January

to 31st May, 1942.

The income from contributors in Folkestone and district is noted with satisfaction. The members of the public, the press, the representatives of the Royal Victoria Hospital, Folkestone, and the Hospital Savings Association, have been most helpful in assisting with the extension of the Contributory Scheme in that area.

It will be noted that the income does not include annual subscriptions, ordinary donations, special box collections and pound day gifts. Members of the Contributory Scheme were very actively associated with many such efforts, which resulted in the Hospital's

General Fund being augmented substantially.

### EXPENDITURE.

Expenses are still very low, representing only 5% of the total income.

### WAR DAMAGE.

The expense of £134 3s. 9d. incurred in the replacement of necessary office furniture and equipment will be included on the General Account of the Hospital, to which account will be credited the payment of the claim amounting to £507 16s. 1d., which has been accepted by the Board of Trade.

The Scheme is now accommodated at 14 Dane John, which has

been rented for a period of three years.

### SERVICES RENDERED.

Contributors received treatment, free of cost to themselves, in the Kent and Canterbury Hospital as under: —

> 1576 In-patients ... ... New out-patients 4022 ....

Grants to other hospitals and institutions amounting to £906 10s. 1d. were made as follows: —

£605 16s. 4d. in respect of 84 contributors treated in 30 Voluntary Hospitals.

£195 1s. 4d. in respect of 80 contributors treated in 9

Municipal Hospitals.

£76 10s. 0d. in respect of 51 contributors treated in 16 Hospitals under the provisions of the Emergency Medical Scheme.

£29 2s. 5d. in respect of 102 out-patients treated at 30 Hospitals.

Convalescent treatment was provided for 22 contributors and the cost, £138 4s. 3d., was met from funds made available by the John McMaster Bequest.

PROGRESS.

The hope expressed in the 1942 Report regarding a unified Area Scheme has not so far materialised. This is disappointing, as the overlapping of boundaries is the cause of difficulties which will only be overcome when one scheme emerges from the amalgamation of the

several schemes now operating.

The Board has entered into reciprocal arrangements with many schemes and hospitals in the country to ensure free treatment without any questioning, at rates of payment varying from 6/- to 7/- a day for in-patients for a period of thirteen weeks, and 5/- to 6/- flat rate for out-patients. Agreements with the Kent County Council and the Canterbury City Council in respect of the treatment of contributors were being revised at the close of 1942.

### THE BEVERIDGE REPORT AND FUTURE POLICY.

The Minister of Health, Mr. Ernest Brown, said on the 16th

December, 1942:—

"The Beveridge Report recognised that the question of patients' contributions and of contributory schemes could be decided only in relation to the whole problem of the organisation of hospital services, and would depend on the general policy found best for providing those services. While it was too early yet for him to determine the shape of that policy (he was now conducting all the preliminary spade-work and would later be consulting the interests most concerned), no one could be more alive than he was to the value of the practical work done in the past, and being done now by the various contributory schemes; and also to their potentialities for the future—particularly if they could converge a little more on to more uniform paths, for example, in matters of their rates of payment to hospitals and in their readiness to extend those payments equally to any hospital, wherever situated, to which the medical needs of a patient made it desirable to send him."

The Board welcomes this statement because it refers to aims which have been part of its policy since the inception of the Contributory

Scheme five years ago.

The British Hospitals Contributory Schemes Association has suggested the income limit should be equal to that of the National Health Insurance, namely £420 per annum, and that the minimum rate of weekly contributions should be 4d. There is no doubt that in the immediate future consideration will have to be given to the question of raising the income limits and the weekly rates of contribution.

### CONCLUSION.

Representatives, Stewards and Contributors may be assured that their interests are being closely watched by the Board of Management in the many discussions, both National and Local, which are ensuing regarding the future of Health Services.

THE President and Committee of the Kent and Canterbury Hospital Linen League beg to present their 30th Annual Report.

Once again the Report deals with work under war-time conditions, and again appears in its curtailed form.

In January the Hon. Secretary was nominated by the Committee as the representative of the Linen League to serve on the Hospital Board of Management for 1942-43.

The necessary renewal of Linen for Bell Ward and the Private Wards was chosen and bought on behalf of the Bell Trustees and the Hospital Board of Management respectively.

The Committee have adhered to their policy of buying no more than essential linen for immediate use, though this practice has involved drawing heavily on reserve supplies, given or purchased during the early years of the war. It has been thought wiser to increase the Linen League's holding in the Post Office Savings Bank where safety from war damage is assured, while leaving the League free to undertake emergency replacements should occasion arise.

The Committee regret that the proceedings of 1942 were somewhat unorthodox, but trust that the General Meeting in 1943 will approve their action and confirm their decisions. In accordance with the rules of the League a meeting of all members should be held each year in June when accounts are presented and new members elected to the Committee. The meeting for 1942 was duly called for June 11th and the following ladies agreed to allow their names to go forward for election: Lady Broome, Mrs. Lucas and Mrs. Spencer Mount. But June 1st brought the first severe raid on Canterbury and it was felt that when possible all meetings should be cancelled. The Committee agreed therefore to ask the new members to fill the vacancies on the Committee pending the confirmation of their election at the next General Meeting.

The Committe wish to record their grateful thanks to Mrs. Robert Tritton for her most helpful gift of £10, on which the League were able to reclaim £10 income tax.

Members will be interested to hear that Ash has beaten its own record in the collection of Victorian pennies. £6 has been received through Mrs. Beer, Linen League Companion in Ash during 1942, this amount being over and above members annual subscriptions. Other villages might consider taking up the challenge in an endeavour to collect more than Ash.

The Committee wish to emphasize how impressed they have been by the way all members have kept up their subscriptions and gifts of linen during these difficult days. They wish to thank all concerned most sincerely for their generous help. It is hoped that members will not relax their interest and efforts on behalf of the Hospital, as the call on the League's resources is likely to increase rather than to diminish.

THE COMMITTEE WISH TO DRAW ATTENTION TO THE FOLLOWING PARAGRAPH.

They fully realize the increasing difficulty of buying linen, etc., and that coupons are often needed for this purpose; they therefore suggest that Companions and Associates may prefer to add the amount they usually spend on their gifts of linen to their annual subscription, as in most cases the League is able to buy the linen required in larger quantities under special permit through the Hospital.

- 5. ASSOCIATES subscribe 1/- a year and give two articles of linen.
- 6. HON. MEMBERS subscribe, but do not contribute linen.
- Associates and Hon. Members to send their subscriptions and linen to their Companions not later than April 10th.
- 8. Companions to send their linen and that of their Associates to the Matron of the Hospital, and all subscriptions, with the names of subscribers and a list of the linen that each one has given, to the Hon. Secretary by May 1st.
- 11. Patterns can be obtained on application to the Matron.
