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

# ROYAL PATRONAGE

I T is a matter of considerable pride to those who are entrusted with the management of the Hospital and a source of constant inspiration to them, to remember that for a quarter of a century the Hospital has been honoured by the personal interest of members of the Royal Family.

#### HIS MAJESTY KING GEORGE V.

By gracious command of His Majesty King George V. the Hospital was opened in 1911 as The King Edward Memorial Hospital, the opening ceremony being performed by Her Royal Highness the **Princess Christian.** In 1927 His Majesty further graciously commanded that a new wing be named the "Queen Alexandra Wing" and a new ward the "Princess Mary Ward" and, in 1934, that a further new wing be named the "Prince George Wing" and a new ward the "Prince George Ward."

#### HIS MAJESTY THE KING.

In 1924 His Majesty the King, then Duke of York, opened an important extension providing for private, segregation and observation wards and other accommodation.

#### H.R.H. THE PRINCESS ROYAL, VISCOUNTESS LASCELLES.

In 1927, Her Royal Highness, The Princess Royal, then Princess Mary, cpened the "Queen Alexandra Wing" of 42 beds which included the "Princess Mary Ward."

#### H.R.H. THE DUKE OF KENT.

In 1929, His Royal Highness, the Duke of Kent, then the Prince George, generously accepted the Patronship of the Hospital. In 1932, His Royal Highness opened an important extension in connection with the Massage, Electrical Sunlight, Rheumatism, Dispensary, Pathological, X-ray and other departments. His Royal Highness has further shown his interest in the Hospital in many ways, including gifts of money placed at his disposal for charitable purposes and by his patronage of the Hospital Debutantes' Ball in 1934, 1935 and 1936, and his personal attendance in 1934.

The Hospital has been honoured also by further signal marks of Royal favour in the naming of the "Princess Elizabeth Ward" for children and the Prince Edward of Kent Ward" for children; by the erection of a picture in tiles in the former Ward of Their Royal Highnesses the Princess Elizabeth of York and Princess Margaret Rose and by the permission given to erect in the future a picture in tiles in the latter Ward of His Royal Highness the Prince Edward of Kent.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

For the Year ended 31st December, 1936.

 The Committee of Management beg to submit to the Subscribers of the Hospital their Sixty-sixth Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1936.

#### KING GEORGE THE SIXTH.

2. The Committee wish to record their loyalty to His Majesty King George VI. upon his accession to the Throne. His Majesty honoured the Hospital when, as Duke of York, he came and opened the Private Ward and other extensions on the 11th June, 1924.

#### ROYAL PATRONAGE.

3. His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent has continued the interest which he, as Patron, has shown in the Hospital. His Royal Highness gave for the third year in succession his patronage to the Debutantes' Ball. As recorded later in this report, "The Prince Edward of Kent" Ward and Sun Playroom has now been completed. The Committee record again their gratitude for the Royal permission for the naming of the Ward in this way and for the other marks of Royal favour.

#### OBITUARY.

4. With deep regret the Committee have to record the death of Mrs. F. Hall-Jones, for many years a member of the Committee of Management and an indefatigable worker for the Hospital. In addition to numerous other activities, she was one of the founders of the Hospital Ladies' Linen League. First acting as Honorary Secretary of the League, she became Chairman until ill-health forced her to resign in 1936, when she was elected deputy-President of the League. She leaves behind an inspiring record of social work which few have equalled.

They record also with deep regret the deaths of five other Hospital friends, the Rev. A. C. Buckell, a member of the General Committee, Miss A. M. Davidson, Mr. Herbert Dawson, Miss Eleanor Newman and the Rev. Wesley Woolmer.

In recording great appreciation of the help given by the above named deceased friends, the Committee express sincere sympathy with the relatives in the loss which they have sustained.

#### GENERAL ACTIVITIES.

5. Details of the year's work are given under the various headings which follow. The Committee wish first, however, to draw attention to the activities during the year under review, even greater than that of the previous year, and to the progress which has been made generally. Not only has the income been, by far, a record one, but a large number of important questions arising from the maintenance and extension of the rapidly growing Hospital have been before the Committee. It will be appreciated that now that the Hospital is committed to a great scheme of extension (as recorded in the previous report) the work and development of the Hospital is being arranged so far as possible in accordance with the requirements of the eventual plan.

The extent to which the service given by the Hospital has been increased, together with the magnitude of immediate future developments, is not yet perhaps generally realised. As for the Appeal work, so successfully undertaken, there is probably no other similar Hospital with a record of so many activities.

With the total amount of detail handled the burden on the Committee and staff has

been a heavy one.

Many improvements have been carried out during the year, some at capital cost and others at increased maintenance cost, but the result is reflected in an improving service to the patients. Costs, however, still compare favourably with those of other similar hospitals.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT-

#### COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

6. It was with much regret that the Committee received the resignation of the Rev. E. Anstie Bompas, who was for many years a member of the Committee, and Chairman of the Building and Fabric Committee. His services to the Hospital have been invaluable and he did much in the preparation and launching of the new scheme of extension (Extension Scheme 4), the greatest in the

history of the Hospital.

It is also with much regret that the Committee record the resignation of Mr. A. S. Dornton, who had thrown himself whole-heartedly into the work of the Hospital. In addition to other generous support, he acted in 1936 as Chairman of the Fete Committee, the All England XI. Cricket Match and the "Midnight with the Stars" entertainment. The amount of influence and work which he personally put in was considerable. The Committee are much gratified, however, that Mr. Dornton's continued interest in the Hospital has been marked by further support, with that of Mrs. Dornton, since his resignation.

In place of the above two members, the Committee had pleasure in co-opting Mrs. Hugh Bateman, who is Honorary Secretary of the Ladies' Linen League, and also Mr.

A. S. Fuller.

Mrs. H. J. Stowell, who is Chairman of the Ladies' Linen League, has long been a member of the Committee of Management. The Committee have had much pleasure in again having her active help after her long and serious illness.

#### GENERAL COMMITTEE.

7. This Committee have continued their work as the representatives of the Subscribers and have received the reports from the Committee of Management upon the

work and the financial position.

The Committee much regret the resignation of Mr. W. L. Woodhams from the General Committee. Mr. Woodhams was previously a member for many years of the Committee of Management, and has given the Hospital much valued support.

#### MEDICAL AND SURGICAL STAFF.

8. There has been a number of changes in the Medical and Surgical Staff. In addition to those caused by resignations the staff has been increased by the appointment of another Consulting Physician, a Consultant for Children and a fourth Resident Medical Officer.

Mr. L. N. Ross, Senior Resident Medical Officer, resigned after a long period of valuable service. He was succeeded by Mr. J. C. Hislop, who left after completing the term of his appointment, and he in turn was succeeded by Mr. Clifford Evans, who remains the present Senior Resident Medical Officer.

#### HOUSE GOVERNOR AND SECRE-TARIAL STAFF.

9. This department covers the general administration and secretarial work, the building developments and the appeal work. The heavy duties can be slightly indicated by the fact that no fewer than twenty separate committees and sub-committees held over one hundred meetings and discussed over four hundred main (different) subjects. Over sixty-two thousand individual letters were despatched

and seventy-six thousand Christmas cards and other printed appeals were circulated and over ten thousand communications were received. Over fifty thousand telephone calls were made and received. The staff has been increased in number to deal mainly with the growing appeal work.

Arising also from the increased work and changing conditions Mr. R. A. Mickelwright, the Secretary-Superintendent, was, early in

1937, appointed House Governor.

#### NURSING.

The Committee record their appreciation and thanks to the Matron, Miss A. F. Sharp, and her Staff for their care of the patients and their constant aim to maintain

a high standard of efficiency.

Very appreciative thanks are also recorded for the splendid help given by the Matron and the Nursing Staff to the special extension fund appeal. In anticipation of the official launching in 1937 of the £100,000 Appeal they raised no less than £207 16s. during 1936 and early in 1937 brought the total to over £250. They are still continuing their enthusiastic efforts.

The visits for periods of Nurses from abroad have been continued as in previous years. The exchange of ideas and different methods of nursing procedure are extremely

valuable.

All the Nursing Administrative Staff and Sisters have now attended a course of lectures and practical instruction in first aid in chemical warfare and have passed the examination in this subject arranged by the British Red Cross Society.

Nurses' Examinations. During the year ten Nurses passed the final State Examination and nine Nurses the preliminary

examination.

#### ALMONERS' DEPARTMENT.

11. Following the growth of the work of the Hospital generally, there has been a steady increase in this department. The Almoners' work in general has been extended by the addition to the Out-patient department of a Diabetic Clinic, a Children's Clinic and a Voluntary Hospitals Ophthalmic Clinic. This latter clinic is the result of the Hospital's co-operation with a scheme in force at many London hospitals. It means that certain patients can obtain the advice

of a consultant upon payment of a fee of 10s. 6d., and a feature of the scheme is that patients are seen only by appointment.

The Almoners arranged convalescence for 93 patients at 26 different Homes and special appliances were supplied for 203 patients. The total cost exceeded £600.

During 1936 the contributions received from or on behalf of patients amounted to £12,920 9s. 10d., an increase over the previous year of £1,545 9s. 9d. This very satisfactory result was mainly due to the growth of the Contributory Schemes with which this Hospital is associated. There was, however, a marked decrease in grants from Insurance Societies.

The co-operation of the local charitable organisations has been greatly appreciated and very sincere thanks are extended to all who have assisted in the social service. Special thanks are due to Miss Watson who so kindly sent a donation and also to those who kindly conveyed patients by private car.

In November the Hospital was recognised by the Institute of Hospital Almoners for the training of Almoner Students in their practical work which follows the University course of social science. The first student who came was from Leeds and has studied at the Hospital for two months. It is anticipated that other students will attend during 1937.

#### VOLUNTARY WORKERS.

The Committee wish to express their gratitude to the hundreds of voluntary workers who have, during the year, assisted the Hospital both directly and indirectly. It is impossible to record here the names of these friends who have done so much, but they would like them to feel that their services are recognised and deeply appreciated. With the special appeal which has been made, together with the big entertainments and other events organised by the Hospital, it would be quite impossible to carry on without the sympathetic and willing cooperation which has been so readily forthcoming from these generous helpers.

#### STATISTICS AND SERVICE.

13. Financial Statistics are given on pages 30 and 31.

The number of In-patients treated was 1,985 compared with 2,069 in 1935. While REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT-

the total number of In-patients treated showed a slight decrease, the average number of beds occupied showed an increase. Patients, therefore, averaged a longer stay in Hospital. Out-patients numbered 13,489 and Out-patient attendances were 58,052, compared with 14,363 and 55,781 in 1935 respectively. There were 1,072 major and minor operations; 45,288 medicines, lotions, etc., were dispensed, 7,766 radiograms taken, and 1,700 pathological examinations made. Most departments showed greatly increased work.

#### EXTENSIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

15. Many detailed improvements have been carried out during the year, but the most important item has been the commencement of building in connection with Extension Scheme 4. This scheme, it will be remembered, was reported in detail in the last annual report of the Committee and was approved by the subscribers on the 12th December, 1935. This extension is being dealt with section by section. Section 1 provides for the purchase of certain properties necessary for extension, and the Committee are happy to report that they have, during the year, purchased a number of adjacent houses, the total cost being £5,278 13s. 1d. The Hospital now has sufficient land likely to be required for many years to come for the addition of beds. provides for the enlargement of the Administration Block and Nurses' Home and the Committee are happy to report that sufficient money having been received or promised substantially to cover the cost of this extension, building operations were commenced and the work is now nearing completion. Sections 3 and 4 provide for the enlargement of the kitchens, dining-rooms and boiler plant, a General Ward Block of about forty beds, a Private Ward Block of about thirtyeight beds and two new operating theatres. Subject to the approval of the Charity Commissioners and the King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, it is proposed to put this work in hand at an early date.

No. 3a, Culmington Road is one of the houses adjoining the Hospital property. This is one of the properties recently purchased and it is proposed to link this with the Hospital with a temporary corridor and to use the house as another Hospital Ward containing about twelve beds.

Ward and Sun Playroom. Details of this extension (included in Extension Scheme 4) were published in the Committee's report for 1935, and it only remains to add that the work was satisfactorily completed during the year, and the Hospital now has a Children's Block which, in its general attractiveness, is probably unique in the country. The Committee would like to emphasise that the pictures, which have been paid for so generously by special donations, are a source of constant joy to the little patients.

#### AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS.

17. The Committee have given considerable attention to the question of air-raid precautions and have had the benefit of advice from the Home Office Air Raid Precautions Department and, so far as may be practicable, advantage will be taken to incorporate air-raid precautions in new buildings. Certain details of value in this connection have been incorporated in the new building now in course of construction.

#### SUNDRY OTHER IMPROVEMENTS.

18. Some apparatus has been purchased for some of the special departments, and the Committee record with gratitude the gift from the Chairman of two electric blankets and six special cushions.

Enquiry is being made into the Out-patients arrangements including the question of reconstruction or enlargement of the department. Meanwhile, one of the items of detail has been the replacing of all forms in that department by chairs, and this has been very much appreciated by the patients.

Some difficulty having been experienced with regard to the bed tablets in the Cleghorn and the Charlotte de Rothschild Wards, new tablets constructed in tiles were obtained and erected in an effective manner over each Ward fireplace. The tablet in this way becomes a permanent fixture in the building.

#### FINANCIAL.

19. The financial position of the Hospital is summarised in the statement on page. From this it will be seen that, although there is a substantial overdraft on the Building and Equipment Funds, there are certain invested sums. That the position is sound may be judged by an examination of the

summary on page together with the table of income and expenditure on pages and

. It is worthy of note that during the last ten years over £65,000 has been spent on building and equipment, the debt remaining on the 31st December being £11,588. In addition, all the money has been found to maintain the Hospital in spite of the fact that the ever-growing work has meant a steadily increasing maintenance expenditure. It will be noted that the total income for the year was a record. Although a large sum was received from legacies, the Committee would like to emphasise the fact that large sums were also raised from special appeal efforts and the satisfactory income as a whole is undoubtedly due to the unceasing efforts made.

#### ENDOWMENT FUND.

23. Mr. T. H. Bull gave a donation of £500 for the endowment of a cot. Mr. Alexander Hay is also endowing a cot and a further gift of £250 was received from Mrs. E. E. Hogg in memory of her husband, Dr. A. J. Hogg. Mrs. Hogg's total contributions now reach £5,250. The Committee record their deep gratitude and appreciation to these generous friends for their wonderful help. The Endowment Fund has now reached a total of £20,674 6s. 5d., having been only £5,111 17s. 3d. ten years ago.

#### DANCERS' COT FUND.

24. As mentioned in the last report, the dancing teachers of Ealing under the organisation of Miss Grace Bosustow, completed early in 1936 the £500 which they set out some years ago to raise for the permanent endowment of the Dancers' Cot in the Princess Elizabeth Ward for Children. Committee are, of course, very happy that the Teachers of Dancing have achieved their object and, in recording their deep gratitude to all concerned, they trust that other organisations will follow the excellent example which has been set. The Committee understand that at least one other organisation is raising money with a similar purpose in mind.

Frank Sanderson, President of the Hospital, £100 from Mr. Walter Davies (Vice-President) and £50 from Mr. William Smerdon. These were recorded in the last report as promises and were received during 1936. The Chairman of the Hospital, Mr. Robert Wilson, had already given £100 to this Fund. The Committee are further happy to report the receipt of £200 from Mr. T. J. Moullin, £200 from Mrs. T. J. Moullin, £200 from Miss E. R. Moullin, also £250 from the School Children of Ealing (per Cty. Clr. Mrs. Brooks) for the tiling of the Prince Edward of Kent Children's Ward. The Committee are happy that such a splendid lead has been given to the special appeal for £100,000.

27. The expenditure on buildings and equipment was £7,336 6s. 9d. compared with £2,954 16s. 7d. in 1935. In addition a sum of £3,275 12s. 11d. was invested in property, at present producing an income but required eventually for purposes of extension.

#### GENERAL FUND (MAINTENANCE).

28. The Maintenance Income amounted to £27,790 18s. 2d. showing a surplus over expenditure of £3,816 11s. 11d. Of this surplus the sum of £3,750 has been transferred to the Buildings and Equipment Funds where money is so urgently required. The maintenance income from the various sources was as follows:—

29. Annual Subscriptions amounted to £998 10s. 3d., an increase on 1935 of £30 1s. 1d. (Annual Subscriptions towards the Building Fund were also received amounting to £104 14s.) Bearing in mind that several subscribers died during the year and that others had to reduce the amount of their subscriptions, the Committee feel gratified that the total figure of subscriptions has been so much increased, especially at a time when much money has been given to the Hospital in other ways. This increase is largely due to the special appeal for new subscribers which was made by the Chairman. (paragraph 54).

30. General Fund Donations amounted to £3,976 13s. 10d. This was a decrease of £639 10s. 8d., which was due to the diversion of many donations to the Building Fund. If, however, the total of donations for the two funds is taken it will be seen that there was a substantial increase.

The continued growth of the Hospital Contributory Associations has seriously tended during recent years to reduce the receipts from Box Collections. It is particularly gratifying, therefore, that the box collections for the year under review have increased so substantially. The Yellow Box Committee, in particular, are to be congratulated upon the special effort they are making to increase the collections. The Committee wish to make

special reference to the splendid work done by Mrs. Frost, who attends the Hospital regularly on Visiting Days to make a collection at the entrance hall. The Wooden Box receipts, including Mrs. Frost's collection, amounted to £262 14s. 10d., and the Yellow Box receipts to £445 16s. 6d.

- 34. Red Cross Day. Miss A. F. Sharp, the Matron, again co-operated with the British Red Cross Society Flag Day and achieved a successful result. The Society gave a donation of £18 to the General Fund.
- 35. Hospital Lawn Tennis Association. The Annual Tennis Tournament, organised by the King Edward Hospital Lawn Tennis Association (Ealing and District), was again successfully held, although Finals Day would have achieved a better financial result if the weather had been fine. Nevertheless, the work of the Association's enthusiastic Committee produced through the Tournament itself and a Tennis Dance the sum of £34 13s. and also made many new friends for the Hospital.
- Tennis Association. This Association, which has done so much for the Hospital over a long period, again sent a donation. The amount was £20, which was the result of the Association's Annual Hospital Tournament organised by Mr. and Mrs. Glynn Chandler. The Committee trust that other organisations will be inspired to follow this excellent lead.

- 37. Gifts in kind were valued at £613 12s. 11d., an increase of £129 5s. 2d. on 1935. A large variety of gifts were received, including the linen, etc., given by the Ladies' Linen League (paragraph 60) and the gifts received on Pound Day. Special mention should be made of the generous gift of coal from Mr. A. E. Bailey valued at £24 18s. 9d.
- 38. Contributions on account of patients amounted to £12,920 9s. 10d., an increase of £1,545 9s. 11d. These receipts represent 53.59 per cent. (compared with 50.89 per cent, in 1935) of the total maintenance expenditure and are the highest yet recorded. The amounts (included in the above figure) received from the Hospital Contributory Associations have again increased substantially. Whilst the Committee are very appreciative of the splendid help received in this way, they hope that members of these Associations will not lose sight of the fact that the sums paid do not cover the full cost to the Hospital of members' treatment. Some members already help to make up the difference through their Yellow Boxes or in other ways and the Committee trust that still more will endeavour, so far as they may be able, to give that little extra towards the full cost of treatment.
- 39. Interest on Investments brought in £943 9s. 8d., a decrease of £48 8s. 8d., due, of course, to the reduction in the rates of interest now generally paid on trustee securities.
- 40. Legacies for general purposes were received amounting to £6,022 19s. 1d. A full list is given on page and the Committee record their gratitude for these gifts. A list of all legacies received since the foundation of the Hospital is given on page 67.
- 41. The Maintenance Expenditure amounted to £23,974 6s. 3d., an increase of £1,622 15s. 2d. The position is briefly summarised as follows:—

The increase is more than accounted for by the increased work of all departments. There was, for example, an average of 5.38 more patients resident each day and the Outpatients attendances were substantially increased. There were more pathological examinations made and more drugs prescribed. It may be noted also that the sum of £1,023 17s. 11d. was spent on appeals which returned this sum many times over.

The additions from time to time of expensive medical appliances and the treatment of a higher percentage of serious cases also increase costs.

The Committee have carefully watched the spending of money with a view to economy coupled with efficiency and an improving service to the patients.

- 42. Contributions to other Institutions. A grant of £63 was made to the Greater Ealing Nursing Association in recognition of services rendered to the sick, some of whom otherwise might become patients of the Hospital.
- 43. Audit. As in previous years, the accounts have been audited by Mr. G. G. Stickland, who has expressed his satisfaction at the way in which they have been kept and prepared. The accounting work is heavy, particularly because so much of the income is received in small sums; many departmental records have to be kept and appeal efforts generally are numerous. In addition to the monthly audit by the Hospital's Auditor, all accounts are inspected monthly by the Finance and Stores Committee and all payments are approved by that Committee and confirmed by the Committee of Management.

#### APPEAL-SPECIAL EFFORTS.

- 44. A number of special appeal efforts were made preparatory to the official launching of the £100,000 Appeal in March, 1937. On the whole, 1936 was a very successful appeal year. "Hospital Week" included Flag Day, Fete, Swimmnig Gala, Masonic Service, "Midnight with the Stars," Beauty Ball, Cricket Match, Motor Treasure Hunt and Thanksgiving Service. Details of these efforts, and others, are recorded as follows:—
- 45. The Hospital Fete on Saturday, 4th July, was again held in the Walpole Park by kind permission of the Ealing Town Council. As in previous years the Fete was organised by an anonymous Committee and raised the magnificent sum of £713 3s. 9d. About 25,000 people attended and there were over 500 voluntary workers. This event, in addition to raising a large sum, makes each year many new friends for the Hospital and it is also remarkable for the large number of local organisations that it brings in to help.
- 46. The Motor Treasure Hunt brought in £12 3s 9d., an increase over 1935. It is one of the established annual events, and since its inception has been organised by the West Middlesex Amateur Motor Cycle Club, who have always worked so hard and enthusiastically to make the event a success in every way.
- 47. Flag Day was organised by Mrs. H. J. Stowell and her Committee, with Mrs. Hugh Bateman as Honorary Secretary. It was very successful and produced the sum of £297 6s. 7d. compared with £273 18s. 5d. in 1935. The great amount of work involved in the organisation of this event will be appreciated. Following action by the Commissioner of Police, the 77 Hospital Flag Days in London will be combined in 1937. This Hospital is co-operating in the Outlying Hospitals Group and while there are initial difficulties to overcome in this great co-operative effort, it is hoped that it will be to the ultimate benefit of Hospitals generally.

It is earnestly hoped that the public will respond generously as they are saved from being asked to contribute to 77 separate Flag Days.

48 "Midnight with the Stars." This event, the first of its kind in Ealing, realised £266 17s. 9d. for the Building Fund.

Organised by the Hospital at rather short notice it attracted considerable public attention and its success was only made possible by the wonderful help given by many friends. The Rotary Club of Ealing have already undertaken to organise another similar event during 1937 and it is hoped that a new annual source of income has in this way been found.

- 49. The All England XI. Cricket Match realised the sum of £190 15s. 3d. for the Building Fund. The idea was originated by Mr. A. S. Dornton, who acted as Chairman of the organising Committee of the Ealing Cricket Club, who not only lent their ground for the match, but, with Mr. Dornton, organised the whole event and put in a tremendous amount of work. Mr. Jack Durston induced other leading professionals to assist him in providing the All England Team which played an Ealing XV. The Committee trust that it will be possible for a similar event to be repeated from year to year.
- 50. A Beauty Ball was organised by the Ealing Round Table, who again achieved success by realising no less than £55. The Ball has now become a looked-for event among many of the Hospital's friends.
- 51. **Swimming Gala.** This annual event was again organised by the Swimming Clubs of Ealing. It attracted much attention and produced the sum of £11 13s. 4d.
- The Debutantes' Ball produced £293 10s. Sd., a welcome sum, but considerably less than from the previous year. While it was at first contemplated to abandon the Ball in view of the death of King George V., it was decided to continue, following the expressed wish of King Edward that Charity Balls should not be cancelled. H.R.H. The Duke of Kent generously gave his patronage to the Ball, which was held at Grosvenor House, and Lady Warrender acted as Chair-The Patrons and Honorary Officers also included the Lord Ebbisham (President), the Lady George Cholmondeley (Vice-President), the Viscountess Monsell of Evesham, the Countess Stomm (Deputy Chairmen), the Lady Veronica Hornby, Mrs. Charles Sweeney, Mrs. Alfred Bossom (Vice-Chairmen) and Sir William Jarrett (Honorary Treasurer).
- 53. A Thanksgiving Service was held for the fifth year in succession. Although

- arrangements had been made to hold it in Walpole Park as in previous years, the inclement weather necessitated going to St. John's Church. The church was filled and the Rev. E. Anstie Bompas gave an inspiring address. The Mayor and Mayoress of Ealing (Alderman J. J. and Mrs. Lynch), members of the Ealing Town Council and other persons of note were present. As in previous years the service was not intended in any way as a money-raising effort, but as a thanksgiving for the many blessings received by the Hospital.
- 54. Chairman's Appeal for Annual Subscriptions. Reference in paragraph 29 has been made to the satisfactory increase in annual subscriptions, which was due to the special appeal sent out in the Chairman's name. Ten thousand appeals were despatched and were subsequently followed up by a second letter. The result was most satisfactory, producing a total of nearly £1,000 in subscriptions and donations. The Committee record their great appreciation of the action of the Chairman, Mr. Robert Wilson, in bearing the cost of postage.
- 55. Christmas Collection. This annual effort was again carried out in Ealing, Hanwell, Perivale, Greenford and Northolt. The amount received was £438 17s. 8d. compared with £450 1s. in 1935. Although the general arrangements made beforehand were rather more satisfactory than usual, the work was, in fact, carried out under difficulties owing to the inclement weather and to the considerable amount of illness among the many voluntary workers.
- 56. An Appeal to Traders using the highways of the Borough for business purposes was made for the Buildings and Equipment Fund. It produced £302 19s. 6d. This satisfactory result was, undoubtedly, due to the way in which the appeal was made and tribute is due to the Chairman of the Appeal Committee, Mr. F. H. Baker, not only for this idea but for many others which he has successfully inaugurated.
- 57. Appeal to Patients residing outside the Borough. This was yet another fresh effort and it brought in £34 4s. 4d. from grateful patients with whom touch would otherwise have been lost.
- 58. Yellow Box League. As recorded in paragraph 32, the total amount received from

Yellow Boxes was £445 16s. 6d. compared with £400 16s. 3d. in 1935. This satisfactory result was due to a special effort made to increase the receipts from this source. During the year a Yellow Box League was formed under a regular constitution. Mr. F. H. Baker was elected the first President and Chairman and Mr. W. T. van Someren an Honorary Vice-President. Those who collect twenty-five or more Yellow Boxes become eligible for election as Vice-Presidents, of whom a number have already been appointed. The League is making splendid progress, notably in connection with a houseto-house canvass for new boxes. There is every reason to expect, therefore, that the box collections will grow from strength to strength, including the wooden boxes which have been taken over by the League.

59. "Help Yourself" Society. The Hospital had the privilege again of co-operating in this scheme. The results, however, were very disappointing, particularly in view of the increased work put in by the voluntary workers and the secretarial staff. 2,641 copies of the "Help Yourself" Annual were sold compared with 4,376 in 1935, and the Hospital received £150 compared with £321 10s. in 1935. The "Help Yourself" Scheme had to be substantially altered and as it stood in 1936 was not, from our results, so attractive to the public as hitherto.

#### LADIES' LINEN LEAGUE.

60. The League has had yet another year of successful work. Full details are given in the separate report published by the League. Mention has already been made of the death of Mrs. Hall-Jones, who was Chairman of the League since 1925 until her resignation in April, 1936. Mrs. Stowell, who has done so much for the League and for the Hospital, was elected Chairman in place of Mrs. Hall-Jones and Mrs. K. M. J. Mackenzie took over the office of Honorary Treasurer from Mrs. Stowell.

The total income of the League for the year was no less than £645 12s. 7d., from which the Hospital was supplied with all the linen, blankets, quilts, towels, etc., required as well as the Nursing and Domestic Staff uniforms.

In addition, £40 was added to the special fund, started in 1935, towards the cost of equipment of the new Hospital extensions now in hand.

61. **Pound Day** was again organised by the Ladies' Linen League in conjunction with the Matron. The gifts in kind weighed 10,074 lbs.—a record—and £44 9s. 6d. was received in money.

65. Founded in 1869, the Provident Dispensary was the forerunner of the old Cottage Hospital. It still continues to do good work for a section of the public. The work done by the Voluntary helpers, Miss Watson, Mrs. Rowe and Mrs. Hoskins in taking and recording members' payments is very valuable. The account is given on page

The many items detailed in this report indicate intense activity and progress. With the plans ahead for extensive enlargement, the Committee conclude by asking for full support in carrying out the heavy task which they have undertaken, and they stress the necessity for every possible effort. They will do their utmost to make the Hospital efficient and adequate for the needs of the district. As it grows to a large institution so will they keep before them the welfare of the patients and staff in all ways possible.



## GENERAL INFORMATION.

Management. The Hospital is controlled by the Subscribers, who annually contribute 10s. 6d. or upwards to the general funds of the Hospital. They appoint the Committee of Management, which is the executive body. The Subscribers also appoint a General Committee, who watch the Management on their behalf, and to whom the Committee of Management report quarterly.

Medical There are seventeen Consultants who attend to give specialist advice, three Staff. Honorary Dental Surgeons, four Consulting Medical Officers, six Honorary Anaethetists, four Resident Medical Officers, and nine Provident Dispensary Medical Officers.

Classes of Patients Admitted.

This is a General Hospital admitting most patients for which it has accom-Patients suffering from consumption, mental disorder, infectious or incurable diseases, unlikely to benefit by treatment, or normal obstetric cases, are not admitted.

What to do to obtain Treatment.

Patients can only be treated, except in the case of emergency, upon the recommendation of a general medical practitioner. This means that patients must first see their own medical adviser, who will refer them to the Hospital for treatment should he or she consider this advisable.

Economical Administration.

An examination of the statistics issued by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London shows that the cost of maintenance compares very favourably with that of similar hospitals.

State Support.

This is a Voluntary Hospital, relying upon voluntary gifts to cover the cost of maintenance. No support is received from the State or Municipalities, except comparatively small grants from the Ealing Town Council and the Southall-Norwood Council in recognition of work done.

Visiting The visiting days are: - Wednesdays and Sundays, 2.30 p.m. to 4 p.m. for Adult Wards. Wednesdays and Sundays, 2.30 p.m. to 3.30 p.m. for Children's Wards. Near relatives, who, on account of their employment, are un-Patients. able to visit on Wednesday afternoon, may do so between 7 p.m. and 7.45 p.m. on that day.




Exterior—showing entrance from garden.

#### PRIVILEGE OF SUBSCRIBERS.

Every Annual Subscriber of half-a-guine a or upwards shall be entitled to have, in respect of his or her subscription, one vote at every Annual or General Meeting of Subscribers held during the same year.

Donors of twenty-five guineas or upwards in one sum shall be Life Subscribers

entitled to vote at such meetings.

### HISTORICAL—continued.

- 1933 Work commenced on a further extension consisting of an enlargement of the Children's Ward, and the building of a new Gynaecological Ward above.
- The extension commenced in 1933 was completed, and by the King's command the new Wing was named the "Prince George Wing," and the new Ward the "Prince George Ward." By permission of the Duke and Duchess of York the Children's Ward was named the "Princess Elizabeth Ward."

A house, No. 4, Culmington Road, already the property of the Hospital, was re-constructed and linked with the adjoining one, No. 6, Culmington Road, thus providing accommodation for Night Nurses, recreation room, lecture room, etc., etc.

Work was commenced on the re-construction of the Caley and the Thomas Munday Wards to form a second Children's Ward. This with the new wing brought the total number of beds to 133.

The second Children's Ward was completed and work commenced on a sun annexe to link the new ward with the main Children's Ward. This extension also includes reconstruction of the Children's Ward, Kitchen, etc. A house, No. 3, Churchfield Road, was purchased and adapted for the use of the Greater Ealing Nursing Association in accordance with a scheme of co-operation entered into during the year between the Hospital and that body.

A new scheme of extension (Extension Scheme 4) was approved by the Subscribers and will be commenced in 1936. The scheme provides for about 78 additional beds and enlargement of nearly all the subsidiary departments, at an estimated cost of £100,000.

In spite of the continual enlargement of the Hospital the Committee found that the accommodation was inadequate to meet the needs of the rapidly growing district. Careful enquiry was, therefore, made with the result that a scheme for further substantial enlargement of the Hospital was prepared. This was designed so far as possible to meet the needs of the immediate future and included the provision of 40 General Ward beds, 38 Private Ward beds, new Operating Theatres, Kitchens, Dining rooms, Staff Quarters and other departments. The scheme, known as Extension Scheme 4, and estimated to cost £100,000, was approved by the subscribers.

Building operations in connection with Extension Scheme 4 were commenced, the first contract providing for enlargement of the Administrative and Nurses' Home Block. This will be completed in 1937. Several adjoining properties necessary for future extensions were purchased, including No. 3a, Culmington Road to be adapted in 1937 for use as a General Ward.
