

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

The Committee have the pleasure to report that the work of the Hospital has continued throughout the past year without interruption.

The number of in-patients treated shows a further small Patients increase over the previous year, whilst the number of out-patients attending the Hospital is the highest recorded for over 30 years.

The death of Mr. D. H. McDonald, who served the Death of Hospital as Dental Surgeon for over 23 years, is recorded Mr. D. H.

with deep regret.

The Committee decided that the vacancy thus created be filled temporarily during the War, and Mr. A. T. Partridge, L.D.S., R.C.S. (Eng.), D.D.S. (Penn.), has been appointed.

They are pleased to report that at their invitation Committee of Lord Doverdale has joined the Committee of Management. Management

In common with most of the Voluntary Hospitals Nursing and throughout the country, the Committee have adopted the Domestic Salaries recommendations of the Rushcliffe Committee on Nurses' Salaries and conditions of employment, and the Report of the Hetherington Committee on Wages and Conditions of Employment for Domestic Workers in Hospitals.

The Committee are sure that their action will meet with the approval of the Governors and Subscribers. It will,

however, entail a considerable increase in expenditure.

Film on "Surgery in Chest Disease" A series of Medical Films, intended primarily for overseas medical audiences, is being made for the British Council. The first of the series entitled "Surgery in Chest Disease" is intended to indicate the scope and progress of chest surgery and collateral services in this country.

Most of the film was taken at the Hospital and has been acclaimed in the medical press as one of the best instructional films of any kind that has ever been seen, and the hope is expressed that it will be widely distributed abroad to enhance the already high reputation of all those concerned in its making.

The Committee express their gratitude to Miss Ruth Montgomery who organised an appeal for funds to endow a "Montgomery" bed in the Hospital as a tribute to General Sir Bernard Montgomery and the Officers, Noncommissioned Officers and Men of the Eighth Army. The rising figures of those admitted "not on exercise" is interesting. It is partly attributable to war conditions and shortage of hospital beds, but also reflects a definite change in the conceptions of the correct treatment of the disease.

Of the 365 patients admitted, 46, or 12.6 per cent. failed to respond to treatment and either died or became worse. This figure is practically the same as that for 1942. These 46 cases were all

admitted in the " not on exercise " class.

Of the 319 who responded to treatment, 250, or 78.3 per cent., reached the full grade of exercise. As the Table shows, this figure rises year by year. It argues efficient choice of case for treatment at Frimley and also that better and earlier cases are being sent for treatment. This is probably due to the increasingly efficient use of radiology.
