

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

The Committee of Management have the pleasure to present their Report on the work of the Hospital and Sanatorium for the past year.

Owing to enemy activity the admission of in-patients was Patients restricted for several months, but despite this the number treated shows a slight increase over the previous year. During those months, however, there was a marked reduction in the number of patients attending the Out-patient Department, but for the remainder of the year the high level of attendances so noticeable in the previous year has been maintained.

A large number of patients are awaiting treatment in the Hospital, and steps are being taken to re-open the remaining beds which it was considered expedient to close during heavy air raids, as soon as the necessary staff is available.

The Committee are pleased to report that at their Vice-Presidents invitation His Grace The Lord Archbishop of Westminster and Committee of has expressed his willingness to become a Vice-President of Management the Hospital, and that Colonel The Hon. G. K. M. Mason, D.S.O., has joined the Committee.

It is with extreme regret that the Committee have to Death of record the death of Sir Ernest Bird. He was a member of Sir Ernest the Committee of Management for nearly twenty-three years, and although his many interests prevented his regular attendance at the meetings, he nevertheless took a keen interest in the affairs of the Hospital.

Death of Sir James Dundas-Grant and Dr. R. L. Rawlinson The Committee have also to express their profound sorrow at the death of Sir James Dundas-Grant, Consulting Laryngologist, and of Dr. R. L. Rawlinson, Director of the Radiological Department.

Sir James Dundas-Grant joined the Staff of the Hospital as Surgeon to the Throat and Ear Department in 1906, and after serving in that capacity for twenty-six years was appointed Consulting Laryngologist. He was also a member of the Committee of Management for the past twelve years.

Dr. Rawlinson was appointed to the Staff of the Radiological Department in 1920, became Assistant Director of the Department in 1930 and Director in 1934.

Appointments to Medical Staff The vacancy in the office of Director of the Radiological Department has been filled temporarily during the war by the appointment of Dr. Leslie G. Blair, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., D.M.R.E., and Dr. J. W. Clegg, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P. D.C.P., has been appointed Temporary Pathologist to fill a vacancy which occurred in July.

National Health Service

The Government's proposals for the establishment of a National Health Service have now been submitted to Parliament and approved in principle, and the Committee have expressed their desire to play their part in providing the comprehensive Hospital service envisaged.

It has been the avowed intention of successive Ministers of Health to bring the new service about by a partnership between Local Authorities and the Voluntary Hospitals, and reference is made in the White Paper to the value of the services of the Voluntary Hospitals and to the necessity for their retention.

The administration suggested in the White Paper, however, does not constitute that partnership which the Voluntary Hospitals were led to expect, nor are the financial proposals considered satisfactory.

The Minister of Health has stated further that the Government want the Voluntary Hospitals to retain their traditional voluntary status by still giving the public a service which rests in some measure on voluntary resources, and the Committee feel confident that with the Hospital's great record of achievement behind it generous support will not fail it.

Consultations between the Minister of Health and various Bodies representing the Voluntary Hospitals are, however, taking place, from which it is hoped that a satisfactory solution will be found to the many problems inevitable in a scheme of such magnitude.

The need for the continuance of a Special Hospital of Report of Interthis nature is emphasized in the Report of the Inter-departmental Departmental Committee on Medical Schools.

Medical Schools

The Report states:—

"In the case of most of the special branches of medicine and surgery it will be essential, as in the past, for the greater part of a trainee's period of service to be in one or more of the leading Special Hospitals concerned with the branch of medicine for which he is preparing."

The value of the work of this Hospital in the training of the Specialist is evidenced by the large number of medical men, not only in this country but from all parts of the world, who come to the Hospital for special instruction in the treatment of chest diseases.

The Committee have given careful consideration to Supervision Memoranda issued by King Edward's Hospital Fund on the of Nurses' Supervision of Nurses' Health, and Hospital Diet. The Hospital Diet recommendations in these Memoranda covered the practice which has been in force at the Hospital for many years, but certain modifications have been made which will be to the advantage of the patients and staff.

A scheme of co-operation with the Royal Cancer Hospital Co-operation with Royal in the treatment of malignant diseases of the chest has been Cancer approved by the Committee.

Hospital

A weekly clinic is held at the Hospital to which cases are referred by members of the Medical and Surgical Staff of either the Brompton or the Royal Cancer Hospital. At this clinic a physician and a surgeon of this Hospital and the Director of the X-ray-therapy Department of the Royal Cancer Hospital co-operate in the examination of patients and in deciding the course of treatment to be followed in each case. If surgical treatment is deemed necessary the patient is taken into Brompton Hospital, but if X-ray therapeutic treatment is indicated the patient is admitted to the Royal Cancer Hospital. Any member of the Honorary Medical or Surgical Staff of either Hospital referring a patient to the clinic may take part in the consultation.

Arrangements have also been made with the Chelsea Co-operation Hospital for Women under which the surgeons from that with Chelsea Hospital for Hospital operate at Brompton Hospital on in-patients Women requiring certain special operations, and the physicians of this Hospital attend when required at the Chelsea Hospital for Women for consultations on in-patients of that Hospital for whom a Chest Specialist's opinion is desired.

Naming of Bernhard Baron Ward and Bed

The Committee are pleased to report that they have perpetuated the memory of the late Mr. Bernhard Baron, from whom generous support was received during his lifetime and since his death from the Trustees of the Charitable Fund which bears his name, by naming after him a ward in the Hospital and a bed at the Sanatorium.

Donations

The grateful thanks of the Committee are extended to the South African Voluntary Service for a donation of £1,050 to the Endowment Fund (£,525 for the endowment of a "Transvaal, South Africa, Schoolchildren's" cot, and £525 for investment and the income used towards the cost of sending to the country debilitated children of parents suffering from tuberculosis) and for a special Christmas donation of £200; and to Mrs. Gertrude Ravenscroft for a further generous gift of £400, in appreciation of whose continued support they have been pleased to name a bed in the Hospital in memory of her son.

Nursing and other Staff.

The Committee have received with regret the resignations Retirements, &c. of Miss B. F. Blyth, Assistant Matron, after twenty-five years in the service of the Hospital; Miss J. Ledbury, the Senior Home Sister, after thirty years' service; and of Miss J. Whyte, Sister of York Gallery, after sixteen years' service. Pensions have been granted in each case in recognition of their services.

> The resignation of Miss M. Robertson, Food Supervisor, was also received with regret in July.

> The Engineer, T. H. Bell, has retired after over thirty-six years' service to the Hospital, and the Committee have also granted him a pension.

> The death is recorded with regret of Miss A. L. Pizzie, a former Assistant Matron and Housekeeper, who retired in 1925 after serving the Hospital devotedly for over forty years. Miss Pizzie bequeathed to the Hospital investments valued at £,800.

The high proportion of patients admitted not on exercise is maintained, making great demands on the nursing and domestic staff, who are accepting the increased work with the cheerfulness and efficiency which has characterised their work in former years.

Of the 309 patients admitted, 33, or 10.7 per cent. failed to respond to treatment and either died or became worse. This figure is an improvement on that for 1943. These 33 cases were all

admitted in the "not on exercise" class.

Of the 276 who responded to treatment, 192, or 69.5 per cent., reached the full grade of exercise.

The male and female domestic staff are still below strength, but have, as in former years, worked loyally and hard, so that all our beds have been continuously filled and the interests of the patients have

not suffered in any way.

We have been very grateful to Mr. Parkins for supplying and projecting films during the winter, as in former years. These have been all the more welcome as they have been practically the only form of entertainment from outside sources available to the patients. They have been encouraged to supply their own entertainment as far as possible, and several enjoyable programmes have been put on.

The Staff War Savings Group is maintaining its activity, and the sum of £5,724 has been contributed during the five years of its

existence.

The Lady Almoner's visits have been continued, and have proved as valuable as ever.
