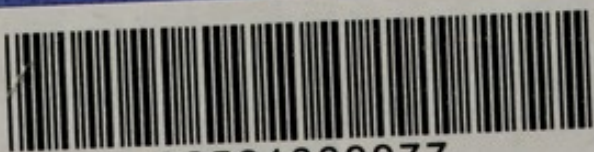



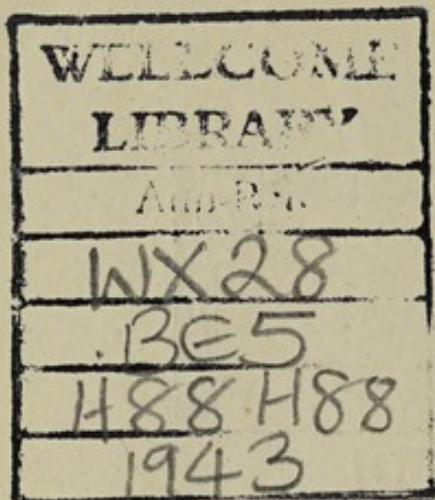

Report of the Board of Management 1943.

TO THE GOVERNORS,

The Board of Management has pleasure in submitting to the Governors the One Hundred and Twelfth Annual Report of the Infirmary.

The War had entered its fifth year at the close of 1943 during which the major proportion of your Board's time and activities was absorbed in the solution or diminution of the many working problems which have beset the Hospital. Matters involving major policy, particularly in connection with the extension of services, have once more had to be shelved, but two important principles have been accepted.

After long and careful consideration, the Committee set up by the Ministry of Health under the Chairmanship of Lord Rushcliffe on scales of salary and conditions of service of the nursing profession, produced its report and the recommendations contained therein were strongly supported by the British Hospitals Association for general acceptance. Your Board approved the recommendations in entirety and was happy to co-operate in the acceptance of a national scale, the production of which has been such a pressing need over a long period of years. The increases and adjustments were made retrospective to 1st April, 1943. Later in the year the recommendations of the Hetherington Committee were received which dealt with salaries and wages scales applicable to members of the resident and non-resident members of female domestic Staffs. These scales, too, were accepted by your Board and it is hoped will have beneficial effect in the recruitment of necessary personnel.

The Ministry of Health has agreed to the payment to Hospitals of grants towards the additional cost due to the increases in Nursing

salaries, but your Board will nevertheless be faced with a considerably increased annual expenditure.

The income and expenditure account again shows a surplus on the year's working in the face of increased costs. The Contributory Scheme allocation was higher, largely due to the increased support of Employers, and income from other sources was well maintained.

A Special General Meeting was held during the year for the purpose of making alterations to the Rules. Principally the alterations provide for an increase in the representation from the Executive Committee of the Contributory Scheme to the Board of Management from six to twelve members (incidentally four of the six new members are representatives of the Chamber of Commerce and the Chamber of Trade) and the increasing of the Honorary Medical Staff representation on the Board from four members to six members in addition to all the Consulting Officers.

The Huddersfield Law Society has again helped considerably in obtaining costs in connection with the treatment of patients for injuries resulting from motor accidents. Your Board is appreciative of these services so freely given.

Much comfort and joy is rendered to the patients by the visits of representatives of the Clergy and Ministers. Your Board records its grateful thanks for the organisation of Sunday Services in which the choirs play such a prominent and helpful part.

It is with deep regret that your Board records the death, within a few days of each other, of Mr. A. Moorhouse, Mr. A. S. Turner and his Wife. Prior to his retirement in 1939 Mr. Moorhouse had been Assistant Secretary for twenty-eight years and Mr. Turner had occupied the post of Turkish Baths Manager since 1905. Mrs. Turner had managed the Ladies' Section of the Baths for thirty three years. Their passing closes the chapter of an almost unique record of devoted service.

WORK OF THE YEAR.

The number of patients treated in all Departments of the Infirmary was 35,487, a decrease of 1,147 over the figure for 1942. In-patients totalled 4,933 and Out-patients 30,554. The number of beds equipped was 302 but of these an average of 290 was available owing to closing of Wards for infectious diseases, etc. The average number of beds occupied daily was 217.08. The average number of days each patient was resident was 16.06. Deaths occurring from all

causes during the year totalled 268 but of this number 88 took place within 48 hours of admission. The percentage of deaths to the total number of In-patients was 5.43 but deducting those deaths occurring within 48 hours of admission the percentage was reduced to 3.65. During the year, 445 patients were transferred under the arrangement to St. Luke's Emergency Hospital.

The number of treatments given in the Massage Department shews an increase. During the year a total of 95,586 treatments was given compared with 93,153 during the previous year. The number of patients totalled 3,811 and the attendances were 71,071. The total number of specimens examined in the Pathological Department was 13,522 and the Pathologist conducted 101 Post Mortem examinations. In addition the Pathologist examined 1,952 specimens for the Dewsbury and District General Infirmary under the arrangement with that Hospital. In the X-Ray Department a total number of 10,420 patients underwent examination involving the use of 22,310 films and 1,373 barium investigations. In the Therapy Department 381 patients made 1,749 attendances and 3,496 treatments were given.

Of the total receipts £242 was the amount received from Insurance Companies during the year.

FINANCIAL.

Income.

The total income was £66,604 17s. 4d. which exceeded the expenditure of £64,302 18s. 2d. by £2,301 19s. 2d. Voluntary gifts maintained a high level and mention must be made of the proceeds of the Rose Day Collections amounting to £920 19s. 11d. This figure constitutes a record for all time and reflects great credit on the work of the organisers and helpers. The total allocation from the Huddersfield and District Hospitals Contributory Scheme was £30,183 being an increase of £1,008 over the previous year's figure. To the Management Committee your Board registers its gratitude. The grants from the Ministry of Health under the Emergency Hospital Scheme amounted to £7,594 17s. 0d., a substantial reduction on the figure for 1942. This is explained by the fact that the number of beds required to be reserved has been substantially decreased with consequent loss

of maintenance grants. Once again your Board thanks the Proprietors of the Huddersfield "Examiner" and the Committee of the "Examiner" Inter-Club Tennis Tournament for the donation of £87 3s. 5d. which was received as a result of their efforts.

The total expenditure of £64,302 18s. 2d. was very slightly in excess of the 1942 figure of £64,066 0s. 7d. Increased maintenance costs continued as did the payment for the maintenance of patients transferred to St. Luke's Emergency Hospital.

Building and Extension Fund.

The debt to the General Purposes Fund has been reduced during the year by £2,688 13s. 8d., leaving £13,153 1s. 8d. outstanding.

THE LADIES' COMMITTEE.

The help given by the Ladies is greatly appreciated and it is desired that the gratitude of your Board be recorded. The resources of the Library, which is organised by the Committee, are much in demand by those patients able to enjoy reading.

THE NURSING STAFF.

In the Preliminary State Examination for 1943, 26 Nurses entered and all passed. 24 Nurses entered for the Final State Examination and 19 passed. Medals for general efficiency following the Final Hospital Examination were awarded as follows :—

During the year 43 Pupils were admitted to the Preliminary Training School of whom 31 passed forward to take up their duties in the Wards.

The Nurses have again obtained a full measure of enjoyment from participating in the Handicraft Classes and an exhibition of the work which they have produced reflected the keenness which had been displayed. Leatherwork proved to be a popular innovation and many examples were shewn.

Very sincere thanks are extended to all those persons who have entertained the Nurses or who have otherwise contributed to their enjoyment.

ALMONER'S REPORT, 1943.

The Almoner's Department is chiefly concerned in giving help and advice to patients to enable them to benefit to the full from the medical treatment given to them at the Infirmary. Those who are in need of Convalescent treatment before returning to a normal life are sent to Convalescent Homes at Silloth, Ilkley, West Kirby and Southport and the Contributory Scheme has been most helpful in paying for recommends for its contributors.

Our thanks are also due to the Contributory Scheme Samaritan Fund for giving grants towards the cost of extra nourishment for our patients who have been ordered special diets. The Contributory Scheme has also given assistance with the payment of 'bus fares to enable people to attend regularly for treatment, and grants towards the cost of expensive surgical appliances. These payments are made through the Almoner's Department.

The British Legion has given very valuable help in allowing temporary financial assistance to the wives and families of ex-service men who have had to be admitted to Hospital and who lose their wages during the time they are not able to work.

The Almoner has managed to arrange for children to be admitted into the Children's Home at Field Head, Lindley, when the mother has to come into the Infirmary and where no suitable arrangements can be made for them to be cared for by relatives.

The Soldiers', Sailors' and Airmen's Families Association are always willing to give any assistance possible to help the wives and children of serving men and the Almoner has appealed to them for help on many occasions. They have helped with travelling expenses, layettes for babies and given grants for surgical appliances.

The National Society for Cancer Relief has given very welcome help to those of our patients who are suffering from incurable disease and has enabled them to spend their last weeks and months free from the worry of being short of money.

Our thanks are due to all these Societies and to the Victoria Nurses, the Cripples' Guild, the Public Health and Social Welfare Departments and to the firms of Solicitors in the town who have given so much help and advice to our patients.

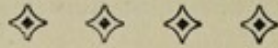

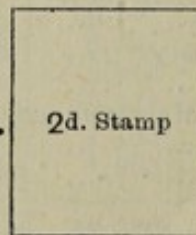

CONDITIONS.

IN-PATIENTS. Persons requiring treatment must attend the Out-patient Department, if able to do so, and consult a Member of the Honorary Medical Staff, who will, if necessary, make arrangements for admission. Those who are too ill or physically unable to carry out the foregoing arrangement should get their own Medical Adviser to communicate with the Resident Surgical Officer, who will arrange for admission if necessary.

On no account should patients arrive at the Hospital (except in the case of accident) without having been notified to do so.

OUT-PATIENTS. Out-patients must attend the Physician or Surgeon who first received them under his care, on the day of his attendance at the Hospital. Bottles or containers for the medicines or lotions are supplied by the Hospital at a small charge.

ENQUIRIES. Enquiries by telephone respecting In-patients should be made between 10 and 12 a.m. Not more than one enquiry should be made on any day, unless the Patient is notified as being in a critical condition. Telephone No. 2866.

VISITORS. Visiting days are:—Tuesday, 2-30 to 3-30 p.m. Saturday 2-30 to 3-30 p.m., Sunday 2-30 to 3-30 p.m. Only two friends are permitted at the bed-side at one time, and not more than four visitors on one visiting day. Visiting Cards are granted to relatives and must be produced when visiting.

SPECIAL NOTICE. The Hospital is entirely dependent on voluntary support, and the Board of Management strongly urges and invites Patients to contribute towards their maintenance and attention, such sums as they feel able to give. Such contributions, large or small, from those who can give assistance, are the means of helping others less fortunately situated to recover their health and strength. The right to refuse admission on financial grounds is reserved to the Board of Management.

MASSAGE TREATMENT OR X-RAY EXAMINATIONS. Treatment in these cases is provided on the recommendation of the Honorary Medical Staff, or in case of persons not being Hospital Patients, on payment of the small fees arranged. Information relating to these fees may be obtained from the Secretary or in the case of massage at the Orthopædic Clinic.

PRIVILEGES OF SUBSCRIBERS AND DONORS.

AN Annual Subscription of two guineas or more shall qualify the subscriber to be a Governor during the period for which the subscription is paid.

The Clergyman or representative of any place of worship wherein a collection of not less than four guineas is taken for the Infirmary shall be a Governor for one year following payment.

A Corporate Body, Society, or other Collective Body subscribing not less than five guineas annually shall be entitled to nominate in writing a representative as a Governor during the period for which the subscription is paid.

A donor of forty guineas or more at one time shall be a Governor for life.

A Testator who shall bequeath a sum of at least one hundred pounds to the Infirmary may by his Will nominate some person to be a Governor for life from the date of payment of the legacy. In the absence of any such nomination the Executor or Executors may, with the approval of the Board of Management, nominate some person to be a Governor for life.

A Corporate Body, Society, or other Collective Body making a donation of one hundred pounds or more at one time shall be entitled to nominate in writing a representative to be a Governor and to change such nomination from time to time by notice in writing provided that no such Corporate Body, Society, or other Collective Body shall have more than one such representative at any time.

All donors making a personal gift of five hundred pounds and upwards shall be Honorary Vice-Presidents for life.

A donor of one thousand pounds to the Infirmary's Endowment Fund shall have the right to affix a name to one of the beds for adults in perpetuity, and a donor of five hundred pounds to the same Fund shall have the right similarly to name a cot in the Children's Ward.

All the annual subscriptions are considered as becoming due on the first of January in each year at which time the current year commences.
