



# Report of the Board of Management 1945.

To THE GOVERNORS,

The Board of Management has pleasure in submitting to the Governors the One hundred and Fourteenth Annual Report of the Infirmary.

The termination of the War on the Continent, to be followed soon by the capitulation of the Far Eastern Axis Partner, was welcomed with general gratitude. Earlier in the year the Minister of Health had signified that, after the 1st of April, it would no longer be necessary for the Hospital to reserve beds for the admission of Service Casualties, consequently your Board was able to plan, through the Honorary Medical Staff, to make inroads into the list of civilian patients awaiting admission. That this waiting list still remains at a high figure calls for concern, but the Medical Staff is constantly vigilant in ensuring that patients are admitted in accordance with medical or surgical need and that hardship and suffering be reduced to a minimum. For nine months of the year, therefore, payments from the Ministry of Health for the reservation of beds, ceased, and the reduction in income from this source is great.

The first full year's experience has been gained of the operation of the appointment system for Out-patients and your Board is pleased to report its success. Well over 90% of the patients referred to the Clinics come by appointment and the Board's thanks are recorded for the co-operation which has been given by all the members of the medical profession resulting in the success of the scheme.

It has long been evident that extended facilities for the treatment of patients suffering from skin disorders were needed and it was decided to inaugurate a Dermatological Clinic. This Clinic, under the charge of Doctor A. J. E. Barlow, M.D., commenced in October and a treatment unit is now in the course of construction. This extended service will play a most important part.

During the year Doctor Jane C. Miller announced her intention to retire and your Board has placed on record its appreciation of the great help which Doctor Miller has rendered since the early days of the War. Your Board extends to Doctor Miller good wishes for many years happy retirement.

The Huddersfield Law Society continues to give all help possible in obtaining costs in connection with the treatment of patients for injuries resulting from Motor Accidents. Many of the cases present difficulties and your Board is most grateful for the help and interest which is sustained. Sunday Services have been organised by the Clergy and Ministers and to them and the Choirs who help so greatly, the Board gives thanks.

Negotiations still continue between representatives of the British Hospitals Association and the Minister of Health on the all important question of the part to be played by the Voluntary Hospitals in the future National Health Service. The publication of the Minister's plans can be expected at an early date and it is hoped that the Voluntary Hospitals can take their full share in the Scheme and be given that freedom which experience has shewn has produced all that is best in the Hospital service.

#### WORK OF THE YEAR.

The number of patients treated in all Departments of the Infirmary was 34,706, an increase of 617 over the figure for 1944. In-patients totalled 4,435 and Out-patients 30,271. The number of beds equipped was 302, but of these an average of 294 was available owing to closing of Wards for infectious diseases, etc. The average number of beds occupied daily was 233.25 and the average number of days each patient was resident was 19.20. Deaths occurring from all causes during the year totalled 243, but of this number 60 took place within 48 hours of admission. The percentage of deaths to the total number of In-patients was 5.48, but deducting those deaths occurring within 48 hours of admission the percentage was reduced to 4.13.

The volumn of work done in the Physiotherapy Department again increased over the previous year. 91,889 treatments were given compared with 89,558 during the previous year. The number of patients totalled 3,715 and the attendances were 68,732. In the X-Ray Department 10,244 X-Ray examinations were made involving the use of 20,928 films and 1,516 barium investigations. In the Therapy Department 436 patients made 2,574 attendances and 4,456 treatments

were given. In the Pathological Department the total number of specimens examined was 13,992 and the Pathologist conducted 74 Post Mortem examinations. In addition he examined 3,191 specimens for the Dewsbury and District General Infirmary and 355 for the Batley General Hospital under the arrangement with those Hospitals.

Of the total receipts £417 was the amount received from Insurance Companies during the year.

#### FINANCIAL.

#### Income.

The total income was £69,296 4s. 4d. as compared with £71,870 3s. 4d. for the previous year. The maintenance of income at a high level from voluntary sources is worthy of comment and the receipts from Rose Day again proved the value of this event which resulted in a total of £771 8s. 0d. The Huddersfield and District Hospitals Contributory Scheme allocated throughout the year a total of £25,900—a decrease of £2,575 16s. 6d. on the previous year's figure. £1,398 6s. 6d. was credited from the Scheme in respect of payments from other Contributory Schemes. Your Board is very grateful to the Management Committee for the great help which is maintained. As has been referred to previously in the Report, receipts from the Ministry of Health in respect of the reservation of beds shewed a sharp decline from £11,727 5s. 0d. in 1944 to £7,154 2s. 0d. for the year under review. Payments from the Ministry are now only made in respect of patients requiring treatment for whom the Ministry undertakes responsibility.

The Tournament organised by the "Examiner Inter-Club Tennis Tournament" Committee realised £38 ls. 11d. and the thanks of the Board are given to the Proprietors of the Huddersfield Examiner and the Committee of the Tournament for this help during difficult times.

#### Expenditure.

The total expenditure for the year amounting to £71,557 4s. 6d. exceeded the 1944 figure of £68,569 15s. 0d. by £2,987 9s. 6d. and exceeded the total income by £2,261 0s. 2d. The main increases are due to further revisions in salary scales and expenditure incurred in interior decoration. Against the additional expenditure on Nursing salaries must be set the State Grant received during the year amounting to £2,501.

#### Building and Extensions Fund.

The debt to the General Purposes Fund has been reduced during the year by £2,234 2s. 3d. leaving £8,423 5s. 5d. outstanding.

#### THE LADIES' COMMITTEE.

Your Board is very appreciative of the hard work which, year by year is done by the Ladies of this Committee and desires to record its thanks. During this last year they made 696 garments for the patients in the Wards and again took over the complete organisation of that most important scheme the library service. The patients are very grateful for the facilities afforded.

#### THE NURSING STAFF.

In the Preliminary State Examination for 1945, 20 Nurses entered and all passed in Anatomy and Physiology, one only failing in Nursing. 29 Nurses entered for the Final State Examination and 27 passed. In the Senior Hospital Examination 20 Nurses entered and all passed. In the Junior Examination 25 entered with equal success. Medals for general efficiency following the Final Hospital Examination were awarded as follows:—

During the year 32 Pupils were admitted to the Preliminary Training School of whom 23 passed forward to take up their duties in the Wards.

Congratulations are accorded to Sister R. H. Parker and Sister B. M. Baines upon their success in obtaining the London University Diploma in Nursing.

During their spare time the Nurses have participated in many and varied activities. Handicrafts still maintains its attraction and once more a Study Day was organised in connection with the local branch of the Royal College of Nursing at which lectures were given by the Honorary Medical Staff and Doctor Mary Burbury, of Manchester. Miss E. J. Merry, Education Officer for the Queen's Nurses came from London to speak about her work which proved of great interest. The programme included practical demonstrations by the Nursing Staff of various important forms of treatment.

The annual trip to the Bluebell Woods was thoroughly enjoyed and we thank the Archdeacon and Mrs. Baines for the party which they gave the Nurses at Thorpe Grange.

The Students gave two performances of their Nativity Play at Christmas and attracted appreciative audiences.

#### ALMONER'S REPORT, 1945.

During the year, the Almoner has continued to see all the patients referred to her by the Medical Staff for Convalescent treatment, Surgical appliances, Home Nursing, help with special diets or fares, and those who require a change of employment if, after an illness or accident, their old work spells disaster to health.

One hundred and fifteen have been sent away to Convalescent Homes at Ilkley, Scarborough, Southport, Grange-over-Sands and West Kirby. One delicate little boy who required prolonged convalescence was sent to a Children's Convalescent Home at West Kirby, and the whole of the cost of his treatment was kindly paid by the Contributory Scheme Convalescent Fund.

Eighty-three appliances have been supplied at a total cost of £183 11s. 10d. Of this, the patients have paid £60 3s. 11d. themselves and the rest of the cost has been given by the Education Authorities, the Contributory Scheme After Care Fund, Insurance Societies, the Huddersfield Cripples' Guild, and the various Societies for helping ex-service men.

The Public Health Department has supplied Home Helps for patients of ours who needed assistance in their own home, and in other cases, the patients themselves have found women who will do their housework for them and their wages have been paid by the Contributory Scheme After Care Fund or the Soldiers', Sailors' and Airmen's Families' Association.

The Red Cross has given us useful help by supplying visitors to call and see patients in their homes after discharge from the Infirmary, to see if they are in need of any help in the way of sick room requisites or extra nourishment, etc.

The British Legion has been unfailing in its response to our requests for help for the wives and families of ex-service men, for financial assistance to tide them over a difficult time, if sickness benefit or compensation is a long time in coming through.

We have also been successful in obtaining grants from the National Society for Cancer Relief for our patients suffering from malignant disease needing dressings and help with fares to attend for treatment, special diets or grants to eke out their income.

We should like to thank these Societies and also the Victoria Nurses, the Cripples' Guild, the Public Health Social Welfare Departments, the Disablement Rehabilitation Officer and the Solicitors in the town who have given so much help and advice to our patients.



## CONDITIONS.

IN-PATIENTS. Persons requiring treatment must attend the Out-patient Department, if able to do so, and consult a Member of the Honorary Medical Staff, who will, if necessary, make arrangements for admission. Those who are too ill or physically unable to carry out the foregoing arrangement should get their own Medical Adviser to communicate with the Resident Surgical Officer, who will arrange for admission if necessary.

On no account should patients arrive at the Hospital (except in the case of accident) without having been notified to do so.

OUT-PATIENTS. Out-patients must attend the Physician or Surgeon who first received them under his care, on the day of his attendance at the Hospital. Bottles or containers for the medicines or lotions are supplied by the Hospital at a small charge.

**ENQUIRIES.** Enquiries by telephone respecting In-patients should be made between 10 and 12 a.m. Not more than one enquiry should be made on any day, unless the Patient is notified as being in a critical condition. Telephone No. 2866.

VISITORS. Visiting days are:—Tuesday, 2-30 to 3-30 p.m. Saturday 2-30 to 3-30 p.m., Sunday 2-30 to 3-30 p.m. Only two friends are permitted at the bed-side at one time, and not more than four visitors on one visiting day. Visiting Cards are granted to relatives and must be produced when visiting.

**SPECIAL NOTICE.** The Hospital is entirely dependent on voluntary support, and the Board of Management strongly urges and invites Patients to contribute towards their maintenance and attention, such sums as they feel able to give. Such contributions, large or small, from those who can give assistance, are the means of helping others less fortunately situated to recover their health and strength. The right to refuse admission on financial grounds is reserved to the Board of Management.

MASSAGE TREATMENT OR X-RAY EXAMINATIONS. Treatment in these cases is provided on the recommendation of the Honorary Medical Staff, or in case of persons not being Hospital Patients, on payment of the small fees arranged. Information relating to these fees may be obtained from the Secretary or in the case of massage at the Orthopædic Clinic.

# PRIVILEGES OF SUBSCRIBERS AND DONORS.

A<sup>N</sup> Annual Subscription of two guineas or more shall qualify the subscriber to be a Governor during the period for which the subscription is paid.

The Clergyman or representative of any place of worship wherein a collection of not less than four guineas is taken for the Infirmary shall be a Governor for one year following payment.

A Corporate Body, Society, or other Collective Body subscribing not less than five guineas annually shall be entitled to nominate in writing a representative as a Governor during the period for which the subscription is paid.

A donor of forty guineas or more at one time shall be a Governor for life.

A Testator who shall bequeath a sum of at least one hundred pounds to the Infirmary may by his Will nominate some person to be a Governor for life from the date of payment of the legacy. In the absence of any such nomination the Executor or Executors may, with the approval of the Board of Management, nominate some person to be a Governor for life.

A Corporate Body, Society, or other Collective Body making a donation of one hundred pounds or more at one time shall be entitled to nominate in writing a representative to be a Governor and to change such nomination from time to time by notice in writing provided that no such Corporate Body, Society, or other Collective Body shall have more than one such representative at any time.

All donors making a personal gift of five hundred pounds and upwards shall be Honorary Vice-Presidents for life.

A donor of one thousand pounds to the Infirmary's Endowment Fund shall have the right to affix a name to one of the beds for adults in perpetuity, and a donor of five hundred pounds to the same Fund shall have the right similarly to name a cot in the Children's Ward.

All the annual subscriptions are considered as becoming due on the first of January in each year at which time the current year commences.
