





Report of the Board of Management 1946.

To THE GOVERNORS,

The Board of Management has pleasure in submitting to the Governors the One hundred and Fifteenth Annual Report of the Infirmary.

With the return to full duty of all Honorary Officers from Service with the Forces and the relaxing of restrictions on the number of Resident Medical Officers which could be employed, it was hoped that the past year would have presented a picture of your Hospital re-settling to a more normal state of affairs. The Board's enthusiasm to achieve a rehabilitation of service has, however, found frustration in the continuation and even extension of the many War-time restrictions. The acute shortage of Nurses, so evident all over the country, is presenting an obstacle which, despite major efforts on all sides, has proved unsurmountable. Domestic Staff has shewn little improvement, but it is hoped that the importing of Foreign labour may alleviate, to some extent, the position.

The growing waiting list has been and still is a matter for concern, but the Governors may be assured that the Board will relax no effort in its endeavour to prevent undue hardship.

The Specialist services of the Out-patient Department have been extended during the year by the establishment of a clinic for the medical diseases of children. This very necessary addition to the service is under the charge of Doctor J. W. Hirst and Doctor A. M. Affleck.

Mr. A. Latimer Walker, who had been so closely associated with the Hospital since 1919 retired in August and your Board has placed on record its grateful thanks for Mr. Walker's staunch help over so long a period. Resignations have been received from Mr. E. S. Bolton, Honorary Assistant Surgeon, who has left the district, Doctor G. S. Broadbent, Honorary Anaesthetist and Doctor J. F. Smyth, Temporary Honorary Anaesthetist, and the Board has also placed on record its appreciation of the services these gentlemen have rendered. Doctor G. Crompton and Doctor G. H. A. Graetz, have been appointed Honorary Anaesthetists.

The temporary appointments held by Doctor A. J. E. Barlow and Mr. M. L. Kennedy in the Offices of Honorary Dermatologist and Honorary Urologist, respectively, have been made permanent posts by the Elective Committee.

The Board wishes to place on record its thanks to the Huddersfield Law Society for the help given in dealing with difficult cases under the Road Traffic Act and to the Clergy, Ministers and Choirs, who have continued to organise the Sunday services in the Wards.

The Board records with regret the loss, through death, of Mr. F. I. Butterworth, who had been associated with the work of the Infirmary for so many years.

WORK OF THE YEAR.

The number of patients treated in all Departments of the Infirmary was 38,749, an increase of 4,043 over the figure for 1945. In-patients totalled 4,677 and Out-patients 34,072. The number of beds equipped was 302, but of these an average of 292 was available owing to closing of Wards for infectious diseases, etc. The average number of beds occupied daily was 225.81 and the average number of days each patient was resident was 17.62. Deaths occurring from all causes during the year totalled 241, but of this number, 71 took place within 48 hours of admission. The percentage of deaths to the total number of In-patients was 5.15, but deducting those deaths occurring within 48 hours, the percentage was reduced to 3.63.

Work in the Physiotherapy Department shewed a marked increase. 113,209 treatments were given compared with 91,889 during the previous year. The number of patients totalled 3,868 and the attendances were 85,683. In the X-Ray Department 11,957 X-Ray examinations were made involving the use of 29,880 films and 2,152 barium and other special investigations. In the Therapy Department 708 patients made 3,293 attendances and 7,254 treatments were given. In the Pathological Department the total number of specimens examined was 20,106 and the Pathologist conducted 85 Post Mortem examinations. In addition he examined 3,494 specimens for the Dewsbury and

District General Infirmary and 1,091 for the Batley General Hospital under the arrangement with these Hospitals.

Of the total receipts £215 was the amount received from Insurance Companies during the year.

FINANCIAL.

Income.

The total income was £64,043 7s. 7d. as compared with £69,296 4s. 4d. for the previous year. The reduction is very largely due to the expected decrease in the amount received from the Ministry of Health under the Government Emergency Hospital Service scheme. Income from voluntary sources shews marked steadiness and your Board is gratified that such support continues during what must be the penultimate year prior to Nationalisation. The total of £25,920 received from the Management Committee of the Contributory Scheme during the year is £20 more than for the previous year, but includes £1,000 which was formerly paid direct to the Hospital. A net reduction of £980 from the Scheme is thus shewn. The Management Committee of the Scheme is to be congratulated on its work during this difficult transitional period.

Expenditure.

The total expenditure for the year amounting to £95,458 18s. 11d. exceeded the 1945 figure of £71,557 4s. 6d. by £23,901 14s. 5d. and exceeded the total income by £31,415 11s. 4d. It was anticipated that higher expenditure would be incurred under most headings and particularly in salaries and wages where the putting into effect of National scales has resulted in £11,181 8s. 4d. greater expenditure, but against this increase must be off-set the State Grant amounting to £2,122. Extraordinary expenditure includes £1,045 7s. 8d. for the installation of Automatic Stokers and £4,255 1s. 0d. allocation to the Honorary Staff Fund. This allocation follows the Board's decision in the early part of the year to make transfers to such a Fund.

Building and Extension Fund.

The debt to the General Purposes Fund has been reduced during the year by £2,037 12s. 1d. leaving £6,385 13s. 4d. outstanding.

THE LADIES' COMMITTEE.

THE NURSING STAFF.

In the Preliminary State Examination for 1946, 21 Nurses entered and 20 passed. 36 Nurses entered the Final State Examination and 32 passed. In the Senior Hospital examination 28 entered and all passed and in the Junior examination the same high standard existed when 20 entered with success.

During the year 32 Pupils were admitted to the Preliminary Training School of whom 19 passed forward to take up their duties in the Wards.

The Nurses have continued to pursue their spare-time activities of which handicrafts have formed a major attraction. In connection with the local branch of the College of Nursing, a Study Day was organised and a most successful event resulted. Members of the Honorary Medical Staff were kind enough to give lectures on interesting technical matters which included Doctor A. J. E. Barlow's address on Skin Conditions and a paper on Anaesthesia by Doctor E. J. Pye-Smith.

A series of picnics at Whitley Beaumont were greatly enjoyed despite uncertain weather conditions.

The Ward and Departmental Sisters' Conference held in London in connection with the Royal College of Nursing, was attended by three Sisters and two Student Nurses from the Hospital. A special feature of the conference was the celebration of the coming of age of the Student Nurses' Group.

ALMONER'S REPORT, 1946.

During 1946 the Almoner's Office has once again acted as liaison between the medical staff and patients. It is now an accepted fact that the Almoner is the third member of the medical team and that the skill and care of the doctor and nurse, the other two members, are of little use if the patient cannot carry out the treatment. It is the Almoner's task to help the patient to follow the doctor's recommendations and to help to straighten out the difficulties, financial or otherwise, which stand in the way.

It is not always easy to assess the amount of help which the Almoner gives, but an unsentimental viewpoint on a problem can often put it in its correct perspective, and difficulties which seem unsurmountable can shrink considerably if one is made to look at them carefully and calmly. The mere fact that there is someone to explain the intricacies of hospital routine and the complications of medical terminology often help to bring that peace of mind so necessary for successful treatment.

The all-important problem of suitable work is now beginning to receive the consideration due to it. It is not always possible for a patient to return to the work for which he is qualified as it may be too heavy or in some other way unsuitable for his condition, and here the Almoner helps by contacting the Employment Exchange, who will do their best to find work or training for the disabled person. It is of importance that all disabled persons are on the Register from which employers are bound to take their quota.

The provision of surgical appliances is another important section of the work. 113 surgical appliances were supplied during 1946 at a cost of £409 approximately. Of this only £195 was paid by the patients and the rest came from statutory and voluntary bodies of all kinds.

82 patients were sent away for convalescence at a total cost of approximately £257, of which sum the major portion was paid by the Contributory Scheme.

The work has also included the arrangement of transport to and from hospital, help with extra nourishment and grants for various needs, transfers to other hospitals, etc.

None of this assistance could be given however, without the generous and willing support we receive from outside bodies, and to them, both statutory and voluntary, I would extend our warmest thanks for all their help.

CONDITIONS.

IN-PATIENTS. Persons requiring treatment must attend the Out-patient Department, if able to do so, and consult a Member of the Honorary Medical Staff, who will, if necessary, make arrangements for admission. Those who are too ill or physically unable to carry out the foregoing arrangement should get their own Medical Adviser to communicate with the Resident Surgical Officer, who will arrange for admission if necessary.

On no account should patients arrive at the Hospital (except in the case of accident) without having been notified to do so.

OUT-PATIENTS. Out-patients must attend the Physician or Surgeon who first received them under his care, on the day of his attendance at the Hospital. Bottles or containers for the medicines or lotions are supplied by the Hospital at a small charge.

ENQUIRIES. Enquiries by telephone respecting In-patients should be made between 10 and 12 a.m. Not more than one enquiry should be made on any day, unless the Patient is notified as being in a critical condition. Telephone No. 2866.

VISITORS. Visiting days are:—Tuesday, 2-30 to 3-30 p.m. Saturday 2-30 to 3-30 p.m., Sunday 2-30 to 3-30 p.m. Only two friends are permitted at the bed-side at one time, and not more than four visitors on one visiting day. Visiting Cards are granted to relatives and must be produced when visiting.

SPECIAL NOTICE. The Hospital is entirely dependent on voluntary support, and the Board of Management strongly urges and invites Patients to contribute towards their maintenance and attention, such sums as they feel able to give. Such contributions, large or small, from those who can give assistance, are the means of helping others less fortunately situated to recover their health and strength. The right to refuse admission on financial grounds is reserved to the Board of Management.

MASSAGE TREATMENT OR X-RAY EXAMINATIONS. Treatment in these cases is provided on the recommendation of the Honorary Medical Staff, or in case of persons not being Hospital Patients, on payment of the small fees arranged. Information relating to these fees may be obtained from the Secretary or in the case of massage at the Orthopædic Clinic.

PRIVILEGES OF SUBSCRIBERS AND DONORS.

A N Annual Subscription of two guineas or more shall qualify the subscriber to be a Governor during the period for which the subscription is paid.

The Clergyman or representative of any place of worship wherein a collection of not less than four guineas is taken for the Infirmary shall be a Governor for one year following payment.

A Corporate Body, Society, or other Collective Body subscribing not less than five guineas annually shall be entitled to nominate in writing a representative as a Governor during the period for which the subscription is paid.

A donor of forty guineas or more at one time shall be a Governor for life.

A Testator who shall bequeath a sum of at least one hundred pounds to the Infirmary may by his Will nominate some person to be a Governor for life from the date of payment of the legacy. In the absence of any such nomination the Executor or Executors may, with the approval of the Board of Management, nominate some person to be a Governor for life.

A Corporate Body, Society, or other Collective Body making a donation of one hundred pounds or more at one time shall be entitled to nominate in writing a representative to be a Governor and to change such nomination from time to time by notice in writing provided that no such Corporate Body, Society, or other Collective Body shall have more than one such representative at any time.

All donors making a personal gift of five hundred pounds and upwards shall be Honorary Vice-Presidents for life.

A donor of one thousand pounds to the Infirmary's Endowment Fund shall have the right to affix a name to one of the beds for adults in perpetuity, and a donor of five hundred pounds to the same Fund shall have the right similarly to name a cot in the Children's Ward.

All the annual subscriptions are considered as becoming due on the first of January in each year at which time the current year commences.
