## HARROGATE ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL

AND

## RAWSON CONVALESCENT HOME.

The following cases only are admitted to the ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL: Skin Diseases, Rheumatic and kindred Diseases (Arthritis, Myalgia, Neuritis, &c.), Disorders of the Liver, Gout, and Lead Poisoning.

The following cases are NOT eligible for admission to EITHER Institution:—

- (1) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (2) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (3) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (4) Persons suffering from fits or of unsound mind.
- (5) Persons suffering from neurasthenia.
- (6) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.
- (7) Persons of such advanced age or in such impaired health as to be unfit to undergo the treatment provided by the Institutions.

Cases convalescent from an infectious disease are not admissible until the expiration of six weeks from the period of infection ceasing.

No Patient can be admitted except on the Recommendation of a Subscriber.

Recommendations are issued on the following terms :-

- (1) To Annual Subscribers at the rate of One Recommendation for each Two Guineas subscribed.
- (2) To Life Governors at the rate of One Recommendation Annually for Life for each Donation of £40.
- (3) To every Clergyman, Minister of any Denomination, Hotel Proprietor, Lodging House Keeper, or any other Person, Society, or Public Body collecting and paying over a sum of £3 3s., at the rate of One Recommendation for each £3 3s. so paid.

Recommendations are in no case issued directly to Patients or their Relatives.

Any payment to the Subscriber by a Patient or his or her Relatives of the whole or any part of the cost of a Recommendation will render such Recommendation invalid and disqualify such Patient for admission.

Subscribers are requested to ascertain carefully the circumstances of each Patient before giving the Recommendation in order to prevent any abuse of the Charity.

One Recommendation entitles a Patient to Two Weeks' Medical Attendance and Treatment in the Hospital or Home. Should an extension of time be advised by the Hon. Physician, the Patient may remain upon the production of a further Recommendation for each additional Two weeks.

Recommendations for the Hospital are available for The Rawson Convalescent Home and vice versa, provided the cases are suitable.

## RAWSON CONVALESCENT HOME.

#### ADMISSIONS BY PAYMENT.

In certain cases approved by the Committee, Patients unable to afford private treatment in Harrogate may be admitted to the Home without Recommendation on their own payment in advance at the rate of three guineas for two weeks, including maintenance.

## General Information.

Patients of both sexes from all parts of the United Kingdom are eligible for admission.

No Out-patients are accepted for treatment.

The Hospital is open throughout the year and, now that the buildings are adequately heated, a larger number of patients can be admitted with least delay during the winter months.

Recommendations, with the Medical Certificate attached, must be properly filled up and signed by the Subscriber and by a registered Medical Practitioner respectively before being forwarded to the Secretary.

Patients are admitted strictly in the order in which the Recommendations are received. As there is usually a long Waiting List early application is desirable.

Patients must not present themselves for admission until they have received an Admission Card from the Secretary.

The Hon. Physicians attend on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays at 2 p.m. to admit Patients. Punctual attendance is essential.

Any infringement of the rules or misconduct will render the Patient liable to instant dismissal.

The Committee of Management have many Applications each year from Patients for admission, which they are reluctantly compelled to refuse. Subscribers, who may have no Patients to recommend, are earnestly requested to send their Recommendations to the Secretary, that they may be used by the Committee for such deserving cases.

Visiting Days :- Saturdays and Sundays, 2-0-4-30 p.m.

The Hospital is just under a mile from the Railway Station.

All Subscriptions are due annually on January 1st in each year and all Recommendations must be paid for in advance.



## ANNUAL MEETING,

Tuesday, 28th February, 1933.

The 107th Annual General Meeting of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home was held on Tuesday, 28th February, 1933.

The Rt. Hon. The Earl of Harewood, K.G., D.S.O., presided. Amongst those present were Matthew Stephenson, Esq., J.P. (Vice-President), Sir L. G. Dunbar, C. A. LORD HAREWOOD, in moving the adoption of the Reports and Accounts, expressed regret at the retirement of Mr. Herbert Frankling, who had been honorary surgeon to the Hospital for fourteen years, and appreciation of the help of the Corporation in repairing the wells rented from them by the Hospital. The fact that both the Hospital and Home had been able to show a small credit balance was really quite remarkable and reflected great credit on the Committee, which had so carefully organised the expenditure in accordance with its income as to enable them to show that most excellent result. They had effected this by many small economies. It was rarely possible in the running of a hospital that substantial economies could be made; it was rather in the accumulation of small economies that the difference between a debit and credit balance could be effected

Considerable advance had been made in the prospect of organising Research into Rheumatic Diseases. During the past year they had come to a working agreement with the Authorities of Leeds University. It was very likely that during the present year they would be able actually to launch a campaign for research into that most distressing and most expensive disease. He would not read the terms of the agreement as it was fairly long, but it would be submitted to the Senate of the University during the next few days. It appeared to him an admirable agreement. It included the appointment of a research worker who would have an official position at Leeds University, and whose title would be, Fellow in Rheumatism Research.

The British Red Cross Society had encouraged them with a promise of help on the financial side, and they would also co-operate, from their own point of view, with the research work.

The financial arrangements were not yet complete, but they were so well advanced that he hoped very much that it would not be many weeks before the whole amount required would be available—without of course entrenching upon the funds of the Hospital, the Convalescent Home, or Leeds University.

The scheme was only a small one but it might form the nucleus of something which at a later stage would take on a much larger scope.

Experts had impressed upon him that research work was a very slow business; even the most important discoveries took years before they actually led to relief from the complaint on which they had a bearing. They must therefore not feel impatient if definite results did not accrue at once. They must look upon it with hope and patience, rather than with the expectation of immediate results.

MR. STANLEY BARNES (Hon. Treasurer), seconding the adoption of the Reports and Accounts, said that they had a surplus of just over £400 but out of that they had taken a large sum for the installation of an independent heating system for the Convalescent Home. There were welcome increases in subscriptions (£150) and in the amounts received from the patients themselves (£200) but they had received very much less from the Approved Societies (£231)—a decrease this year of

£230 and of £570 compared with three years ago. Their investments had brought in £300 less than in the year before and, owing to the conversion of the Five Per Cent. War Loan, there would be a still further decrease of about £145 a year.

The Committee had decided to instal an X-Ray Department. This should really have been done some years ago; now it could no longer be delayed in view of the proposed Research Scheme. They were asking for a minimum sum of £2,000. If they did not receive it, the balance required would have to be taken from the funds of the Hospital. The annual outlay involved would be between £350 and £400, which would mean a heavy charge on their income. They were grateful to their Radiologists for their work during the past year as well as to the Medical Staff for all that they had done but he would ask them to be as moderate in their demands in the future as possible.

The Reports and Accounts were then adopted.

LORD HAREWOOD moved a vote of thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Committee of Management, and proposed the re-election of the following members, due to retire by rotation, Sir L. G. Dunbar, Messrs. W. L. Kirby and R. E. Jones, with the additions of Mr. R. A. Breare and Mr. W. Townend, vice Mr. F. Mudd and Mr. J. E. Hurtley, resigned, and that the nominees of the Hon. Medical Staff—Dr. G. Holmes, Dr. A. C. Sharp, Dr. W. Yeoman, and Dr. J. A. Thomson—be and are hereby appointed.

Mr. M. Stephenson, J.P., seconded, and the motion was carried.

Mr. C. A. Rhodes, J.P. (Chairman of the Committee), replying, said they were a working and not merely an ornamental Committee. Nothing startling had happened during the past year, but they had treated more patients than previously, and had received many letters of thanks and appreciation from them. All expenses in connection with the upkeep of buildings had been met out of income, and considerable sums of money had been spent.

They quite understood the position in which the Approved Societies found themselves to-day, but they hoped that there would be an increase in their contributions in the future. The installation of X-Ray apparatus would be an expensive undertaking but they must face it. Of the £2,000 required they already had donations of £200 from Lord Harewood, £100 from Mr. S. P. Richardson, and £50 from Mr. W. L. Kirby. He thought they would have to make an appeal to their subscribers for further help.

Mr. C. E. Carter, J.P., moved "That the best thanks of the Meeting be given to the members of the Hon. Medical Staff for their services during the past year, and that they be reappointed for the ensuing year, with the additions of Mr. C. D'Oyly Grange, F.R.C.S., and Mr. T. Vibert Pearce, F.R.C.S., vice Mr. H. Frankling, resigned."

They appreciated very fully, he said, the splendid work that was being done by their honorary medical staff, and he welcomed the two new members.

Of the three great scourges, Cancer, Tuberculosis, and Rheumatism, Rheumatism had probably been least the subject of scientific research, probably because it was not so directly fatal as the other two. They were informed that "According to the latest estimate £20,000,000 is lost to this Country every year through its workers being incapacitated by rheumatism in its various forms, and that rheumatism accounted for nearly one-sixth of the benefits paid under the National Insurance Act," to which must be added the vast volume of unrecorded suffering. Surely, therefore, Lord Harewood was right when he told them two years ago that with their opportunities there should be some definite systematic research carried on at the Royal Bath Hospital.

They took up the challenge and sought the co-operation of the Universities of Sheffield and Leeds. A joint committee was founded but unfortunately it was just when the Country was in the throes of a great financial crisis, and it was not considered opportune to make a public appeal. That committee was, however, still in existence, and it was hoped that as soon as circumstances permitted its work would be resumed.

Their enthusiasm was kindled again last October by a letter from the Chairman of the British Red Cross Society, addressed to Lord Harewood. In this letter Sir Arthur Stanley said "The British Red Cross Society has been advised that an opportunity for a beginning on a small and modest scale, offers in connection with the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital. It would appear that the Hospital includes a small but quite adequate laboratory, while the 150 beds in the Hospital itself afford admirable material for research work. In these circumstances, the British Red Cross Society, believing that even a modest beginning now would be productive of valuable results, is willing to offer a sum of £200 annually for a period of five years (since increased to seven) towards the establishment of systematic research into the causes of chronic rheumatism, on certain conditions."

They saw their way to comply with those conditions, said Mr. Carter, and Lord Harewood was good enough to lead a deputation to the Vice-Chancellor of Leeds University, to discuss the matter. As a result, a scheme, which would be worked under the ægis of the University, was formulated. That Scheme now awaited the endorsement of the Senate of the University, and he expected it would be given at the following day's meeting of the Senate.

To finance the Scheme, provision must be made for seven years' work, and the minimum cost was estimated to be £1,000 a year. They had promises and funds in hand amounting to about £750 a year. Whilst they had put the annual requirements at that modest figure, they were only able to do it by reason of the facilities offered by the Hospital. The University were badly in need of funds, and they did not wish to presume too much on their hospitality. They were aiming to get £1,500. Lord Harewood, Sir James Baillie and Sir Arthur Stanley had promised to act as Trustees for the Fund, which would be quite distinct from that of the Hospital.

#### MR. W. H. FERRAND seconded.

In reply, Dr. Yeoman thanked Lord Harewood for his interest in the Hospital. It was a happy decision to ask Mr. Carter to propose the resolution, he said, for they felt that his able leadership and tenacity had enabled a dream which the Medical Staff had pursued for some considerable time, to become a practical proposition. The Hospital was designated a National Hospital for Rheumatic Diseases, and it was the sincere wish of the Medical Staff that it should live up to its name.

To do that it was necessary that the treatments given should be of the highest standard, and should conform to the

most modern ideas. New treatments must be tried and their true value assessed, for only in that way could they fight Rheumatism, and continue to command the confidence of the doctors who referred cases to them, and of the patients who came there.

That, they were aware, often entailed added charges to the expenditure, and while realising all that the committee did in the management of the Hospital, they felt that they might concern themselves in exploring ways of combating the reduction of income. Such an Institution must either advance or go back. It could not stand still, and it was the earnest wish of the Medical Staff that it should advance.

Mr. J. A. Eddison moved, and Sir L. G. Dunbar seconded, "That the best thanks of the Meeting be given to Mr. Stanley Barnes for his services as Hon. Treasurer during the past year, and that he be re-appointed."

Mr. Newton (Newcastle) proposed, and Dr. Crawford Watson seconded, the re-election of the Auditors, Messrs. Lowrey, Weston and Whalley.

The Mayor of Harrogate (Alderman J. A. Whiteoak), moving a vote of thanks to Lord Harewood, thanked him for his reference to the Harrogate Corporation. He said he was sure that they on the Corporation would do their utmost to help forward the scheme of research. It was to the advantage of Harrogate as well as of the people they were going to treat, and their interests were with the Royal Bath Hospital.

Mr. C. A. Rhodes seconded, and the proposition was carried.

LORD HAREWOOD briefly replied.



## Report of the Committee of Management.

To The Right Honourable The Earl of Harewood, K.G., D.S.O., and Subscribers of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home, Harrogate.

In presenting their 107th Annual Report for the year 1932 your Committee beg to state that the total number of patients admitted to the Hospital was 1350 (Men, 612; Women, 738), an increase of 30 Women but a decrease of 20 Men as compared with the figures for 1931, or a net total increase of 10. Of these 464 Men and 553 Women stayed for a period exceeding two weeks, a total of 1017 compared with 962 in 1931, an increase of 55.

To the Rawson Convalescent Home 456 cases were admitted (Men, 250; Women, 206), an increase of 23 over the total for 1931. Of these 340 (Men, 185; Women, 155), stayed for a second term compared with 330 in 1931.

The average stay of each patient was 22.9 days, which is almost identical with the figure for the previous year (22.8).

#### PERSONAL.

The departure of Mr. J. H. Barker from Harrogate has deprived your Committee of a keen and energetic colleague. Mr. Barker only joined the Committee in 1930, but he lost no time in acquainting himself with every department of its activities and his practical business experience was of great value and will be greatly missed.

Col. A. T. Walker, Mr. J. E. Hurtley, and Mr. F. Mudd have resigned from the Committee owing to ill-health. Your Committee regret alike their loss and the cause to which it was due.

At the end of the year your Committee received with sincere regret the resignation of Mr. Herbert Frankling, C.B.E., M.R.C.S., on his retirement. Mr. Frankling was elected Honorary Surgeon to the Hospital in 1919 and during the 14 years of his connection with the Institution he has invariably and ungrudgingly given of his time and skill to such cases as were brought to his notice. Your Committee take this opportunity of expressing their deep sense of the value of his services to the Hospital and their hope that he will be spared to enjoy many years of well-earned retirement.

#### GENERAL.

Although the year under review has not been marked by any outstanding events, the necessity for development and improvement has necessitated the careful consideration of many questions of varying urgency and importance.

Under the energetic chairmanship of Mr. C. E. Carter the Special Sub-Committee appointed in connection with the project for research into the causes of Rheumatoid Arthritis has held several meetings and has made encouraging progress in its efforts to promote a scheme in conjunction with the authorities of Leeds University. The fact that Lord Harewood has personally and closely identified himself with these efforts has given great gratification and your Committee desire to place on record their sincere appreciation of his practical interest and assistance throughout the year.

On July 8th the Members of the Hull Medical Society paid an Official visit to the Hospital, and on July 17th a party of Canadian doctors were shown round the Hospital and Home.

Early in the year the Harrogate Corporation undertook the carrying out of repairs to the Wells rented by the Hospital in the Valley Gardens as recommended by Mr. Woodmansey. This work has resulted in marked improvement in the quality of the waters obtained from these sources.

The buildings have been maintained throughout in a good state of repair and various internal improvements have been made, notably the installation of a Cold Storage Room (£200) and of new and additional lavatory facilities (£350). A separate heating installation, with independent boiler, has been provided for the Rawson Convalescent Home at a cost of £331, an expenditure which has been amply justified by results. The lighting in many places has been improved. On the treatment side, a third bath has been fitted for giving "undercurrents," an Ultra Violet Ray plant has been placed in the Electrical Room and additional apparatus has been obtained for Remedial Exercises.

Helped by donations by members of the Committee and contributions from patients themselves, the Matron has raised the funds necessary for providing a Wireless installation with loud speakers in all the day rooms. This amenity, it need hardly be said, has been highly appreciated by the patients and has done much to relieve the tedium of the long winter evenings.

The experiment last year of appointing a House Physician may now be said to have justified itself beyond all question. It has not lessened the amount of work done by the Honorary Medical Staff but it has freed them from much routine work and enabled them to devote more time and attention to the actual effects of the treatments given. During the year the House Physician (Dr. J. B. L. McKendrick) has been carrying out certain investigations into the effects of Sulphur Water Baths on the blood. The results obtained have been very suggestive—not to say startling—and may well prove to be of the highest importance in the future. They were brought to the notice of the members of the Harrogate Medical Society at a Meeting held at the Hospital on October 20th and aroused keen interest.

Reference is made on page 00 to the initiation of an X-Ray Equipment Account. Your Committee are of opinion that the time has now come when the present arrangements should give place to a properly organised department within the Hospital itself. The Honorary Radiologists (Dr. Hitchcock and Dr. Thomson) have, for many years, acquiesced in the present arrangements with great forbearance and at considerable inconvenience. With the object of terminating this state of affairs your Committee have decided to appeal for help in raising a capital sum of £2,000. The additional annual cost of maintaining such a department is not likely to be less than £400 and this must necessarily be a charge upon the annual income. It will therefore be seen that it is of vital importance that the receipts from annual subscriptions and other sources shall, at least, be maintained at their present figure if the Hospital is to continue to pay its way, and your Committee earnestly ask that the support which has been so generously forthcoming in the past from both private subscribers and others be maintained in order to meet these additional annual charges.

#### FINANCE.

That the financial conditions prevailing in the latter half of 1931 would be still further accentuated in 1932 seemed to be inevitable and the outlook at the beginning of the year gave cause for considerable anxiety. Your Committee has therefore exercised the utmost economy so far as is compatible with efficiency. Such negative steps alone, however, could not effect very much to counteract the probability of a seriously depleted income.

These fears have happily to a great extent been falsified and your Committee desire to express their cordial appreciation of the loyalty and generosity of their supporters, to whom is chiefly due the tact that, at the end of the year, both the Hospital and Convalescent Home have been enabled to show a small credit balance. The actual figures show that the total expenditure has been reduced by nearly £200. Many of the items show extraordinarily little change from the previous year, e.g. House-keeping, Gas and Water, Electricity, Insurance, Postages and Stationery, and X-Ray expenses. The chief increase of £200 for Salaries and Wages is accounted for by the House Physician's salary, for a longer period than in 1931, extra help in the Treatment Departments, the fee of a Dietetic Specialist, and one or two small additions to the wages of the permanent Staff.

On the income side it is particularly gratifying to be able to record an increase in the Annual Subscriptions of £150 but this is more than counterbalanced by a drop of £75 in the Subscriptions to the Rawson Convalescent Home and of £200 in the receipts from Approved Societies. These latter have now reached the low figure of £231 and, as compared with 1930, the Income from this source has shrunk by no less than £542. A welcome offset to this is an increase in the contributions by patients of just over £200 and, were it not for this, the expenditure and income would have almost balanced. The conversion of the War Loan holdings of both the Hospital and Convalescent Home will result in a decrease of income from this source during 1933 of £145.

The work of the Hospital continues to develop and fresh demands are constantly being made upon its resources with a view to increasing its efficiency. Your Committee hope therefore that their appeal for continued and, where possible, increased support will meet with a ready response.

#### LEGACIES, &c.

The only Legacy received during the year was a further instalment (the fourth) of £67 10s. from the Executors of the late Mrs. E. A. Richardson, which has been placed to the credit of the Hospital Endowment Account. Your Committee records with special gratitude the receipt of a cheque for £200 from Lord Harewood and another of £100 from S. P. Richardson, Esq. These sums, with the consent and approval of the donors, have been allocated to an X-Ray Equipment Fund. To this Mr. W. L. Kirby, a member of your Committee, has promised £50 and your Committee desire to convey their grateful thanks to Mr. Kirby for this further instance of his generous help.

## Report of the Hon. Medical Staff.

During the past year there have been no outstanding matters requiring comment in this Report. The year has been largely taken up in preparing the ground for schemes, which, it is hoped, will come to fruition in 1933.

Foremost among these schemes is that of Research. The sub-committee formed to consider this matter has been in active co-operation with members of the Board of Management, and, as a result, there seems to be much more hope than there was a year ago that a Research Centre will be established at this Hospital. A generous gesture on the part of the British Red Cross enabled Lord Harewood to lead a deputation to the Vice-Chancellor of Leeds University, and lay before him a concrete scheme.

It is suggested that an advisory committee shall be responsible for administering the funds necessary to establish this Centre, and, at the moment, a fund is being formed to enable this work to be carried on for seven years. It is estimated that at least £1,000 a year will be required to cover this work. The funds will be raised and administered quite separately from those of the Hospital.

The Medical Staff very much appreciate the time and thought that Lord Harewood has given to this scheme, and hope that 1933 will see it in full working order.

The Medical Staff are very pleased that the Board of Management are taking active measures to instal an X-Ray outfit, and hope to see the department established at an early date.

Full advantage has been taken of the facilities offered by the Laboratory for the investigation of cases, and the routine work for the past year has exceeded that of previous years. Research on the use of Proteose in Rheumatoid Arthritis is still being investigated. Research work has continued during the year, including some valuable work by the present House Physician, Dr. McKendrick, on the action of Natural Sulphur Baths. It is hoped later to publish the results in the Medical Press.

The Honorary Gynæcologist reports that during the year 46 new cases were referred, and of these (and of old cases returning) 66 complete pelvic examinations were made. Swabs for bacteriological report were taken in 40 cases, and 63 consultations were held in addition to attendances for examination or treatment.

On the advice of the Medical Staff, a Dietitian came to the Hospital for a month, and reported on the general Hospital diets, and also drew up some suitable diets, in consultation with the Medical Staff, for the treatment of various types of cases in the Hospital. It is hoped that the recommendations outlined by the expert Dietitian will be carried out at an early date.

The Honorary Medical Staff record with much regret the resignation of Mr. Frankling, who has been Honorary Surgeon to the Hospital for 14 years. His advice and clinical knowledge have been of great help and his colleagues greatly appreciate his willing co-operation which has been readily available at all times.



### RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE HARROGATE ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL.

Revised February, 1931.

### Title and Purposes of the Hospital.

1. The Hospital having been built with a view to affording to deserving persons, free of expense, the benefits of the Harrogate waters and treatment, shall be denominated "The Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital." No patients shall be admitted except such as in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and the Committee of Management are suitable cases for such treatment.

### Constitution.

- 2. The Officers shall consist of a Patron, President, Vice-Presidents, Twelve Trustees, Honorary Consulting Physicians, Honorary Physicians and the Honorary Treasurer.
- 3. All the real estate belonging to the Hospital shall be vested in the names of six Trustees, and the personal estate in the names of six Trustees, but subject to the control of the Subscribers as to any appropriation for the benefit of the Hospital, which may be agreed upon by them at any annual general meeting, or special meeting called for the purpose.
- 4. Whenever the number of Trustees, either of the real or personal trust estate, shall be reduced to three by all or any of the following means, viz., death, resignation, refusal, incapacity to act, or permanent residence out of England, the Committee of Management (as specified in Rule 29) shall by any writing under their hand fill up the vacancies by appointing three new Trustees, and upon every such appointment the surviving or continuing Trustees shall transfer such real or personal trust estate respectively vested in them so as to vest it respectively jointly in the surviving or continuing Trustees and such new Trustees.

### Admission of Patients to the Hospital.

- 5. Recommendations for the admission of Patients are issued on the following terms:—
  - (a) Annual subscribers of two guineas and upwards shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for each two guineas so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued:

PROVIDED ALWAYS that Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards whose names appear in the Subscription List for 1924 shall, so long as they continue to subscribe annually, retain the privilege of recommending one patient for each guinea so subscribed, the number of recommendations to be issued at this rate to such old subscribers to be limited and determined by the amount of the first subscription sent in any one year, but in no case shall exceed Five. Old Subscribers entitled to this privilege who require to recommend additional patients beyond the number to which they may be entitled by their first subscription in any year may do so on payment of Two Guineas for each additional recommendation.

(b) Every donor of £40 to the Endowment Fund shall be a Life Subscriber, and shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for every full sum of £40 so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued.

- (c) Executors of persons bequeathing sums of money to the Endowment Fund of the Hospital shall be entitled to one recommendation for every £25 paid to the Treasurer, but to not more than four, whatever the amount of the legacy bequeathed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which the Legacy is paid, or in the following year.
- (d) Every Clergyman, or minister of any Denomination, who shall transmit a congregational collection to the Treasurer, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. so contributed during the year.
- (e) Every Hotel, Boarding-house, or Lodging-house Keeper or other person, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. collected and paid to the Treasurer during the year.

These recommendations (d) and (e) shall be available within 12 calendar months from the date of issue.

- 6. In no case shall any part of the cost of a recommendation be paid by the patient or any member of his or her family. Any such payment shall disqualify for admission.
- 7 Recommendations for the Hospital will be available for the Rawson Convalescent Home should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.
- 8. The following cases only are admitted to the Hospital: Skin Diseases, Rheumatism and kindred diseases (Arthritis, Myalgia and Neuritis), Disorders of the Liver, Gout and Lead Poisoning.

The following cases are not eligible for admission:

- (1) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (2) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (3) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (4) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (5) Persons suffering from fits or of unsound mind.
- (6) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.
- 9. Cases convalescent from an infectious disease shall be inadmissible until a term of six weeks has elapsed from the period of infection ceasing.
- 10. The Committee of Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Hospital, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.



### RAWSON CONVALESCENT HOME.

Revised February, 1931.

### Title and Purposes of the Home.

- 11. The Rawson Convalescent Home, having been erected in connection with the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital on land the property of the said Hospital, shall be conducted under the Officers and Committee of Management of the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital, with the addition of the three Trustees hereinafter referred to.
- 12. The Institution shall be used solely as a Convalescent Home. Only such patients shall be admitted as obtain a recommendation from a Subscriber of the Home or Hospital, and are, in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and Committee of Management, suitable. It is contrary to the design of the Home to relieve persons whose circumstances enable them to pay the full cost of a visit to Harrogate.

### Constitution.

- 13. The Property belonging to this Institution shall be vested in three Trustees. Any vacancy in their number to be filled up by the remaining Trustee or Trustees.
- 14. The Convalescent Home shall be charged for all expenses of the Hospital and Home in proportion to the number of patients admitted. Donations from Hotels, Lodging-houses, Hospital Sunday, and other sources of revenue (excepting legacies or donations to the endowment funds, which shall be kept separate) shall be apportioned on the same principle. This apportionment of receipts and expenses shall commence January 1st, 1898, and shall not be altered without the approval of a Committee consisting of the Patron, the Chairman of the Committee of Management, the Honorary Treasurer, and the Home Trustees for the time being.

### Admission of Patients to the Convalescent Home.

- 15. Recommendations for admission of Patients are issued on the following terms:—
  - (a) Annual subscribers of Two guineas and upwards shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for each Two guineas so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued:

PROVIDED ALWAYS that Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards whose names appear in the Subscription List for 1924 shall, so long as they continue to subscribe annually, retain the privilege of recommending one patient for each guinea so subscribed, the number of recommendations to be issued at this rate to such old subscribers to be limited and determined by the amount of the first subscription sent in any one year, but in no case shall exceed Five. Old Subscribers entitled to this privilege who require to recommend additional patients beyond the number to which they may be entitled by their first subscription in any year may do so on payment of Two Guineas for each additional recommendation.

- (b) Every donor of £40 or upwards to the Endowment Fund shall be a Life Subscriber, and be entitled to recommend one patient annually for every full sum of £40 so subscribed. These Recommendations are only available in the year in which they are issued.
- (c) Executors of persons bequeathing sums of money to the Endowment Fund of the Home shall be entitled to one recommendation for every £25 paid to the Treasurer, but to not more than FOUR, whatever the amount of the legacy bequeathed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which the Legacy is paid, or in the following year.
- (d) Every Clergyman or Minister of any Denomination who shall transmit a congregational collection to the Treasurer shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. contributed during that year.
- (e) Every Hotel Proprietor, Boarding-house, Lodging-house keeper or other person, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. collected and paid to the Treasurer during the year.

These recommendations (d) and (e) shall be available within 12 calendar months of the date of issue.

### Admission by Payment.

- 16. In certain cases approved by the Committee patients may be admitted to the Home without recommendation on their own payment in advance at the rate of one and a half guineas for each week.
- 17. Recommendations for the Home will be available for the Royal Bath Hospital should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.
- 18. Convalescent cases, or cases of debility, are eligible for admission to the Home.

The following cases are not eligible :-

- (1) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (2) Persons in advanced stages of consumption.
- (3) Persons suffering from any skin disease.
- (4) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (5) Persons suffering from intectious or contagious disease.
- (6) Persons subject to fits or of unsound mind.
- (7) Persons incapable of attending to themselves
- 19. Cases convalescent from an infectious disease are not admissible until the expiration of six weeks from the period of the infection ceasing.
- 20. The Committee of Management reserve the right to refuse admission or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Convalescent Home, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.

### By-Laws and Regulations for Patients.

21. Every applicant for admission must procure a recommendation from a Subscriber, accompanied by the Certificate, properly filled up by a qualified Medical Practitioner, as to the suitability of the case. Each patient, when so admitted, shall pay a sum not exceeding 10/6 for each week of his or her stay towards the cost of his or her board, unless it be proved to the satisfaction of the Committee that such patient is entirely unable to meet such charge, in which case the Committee may, in their absolute discretion, remit such charge, either wholly or in part.

Each patient may be admitted for a period not exceeding two weeks on production of a Subscriber's recommendation, and shall be entitled to board, lodging, baths, medical attendance, &c. When further treatment is deemed desirable by the Hon. Physicians an extension of time may be granted, with the sanction of the Committee of Management, on production of a further recommendation for each two weeks of such extension.

- 22. No patient can be re-admitted until the expiration of three calendar months from the date when he or she was last discharged from the Hospital, except under special circumstances, and by special leave of the Committee of Management.
- 23. It shall be in the power of the Committee instantly to dismiss any patient who in their judgment conducts himself or herself in an improper manner, or who does not conform to the Rules, Regulations, and By-laws of the Institution.
- 24. Each patient is required to bring a proper change of clean bodylinen, and to pay for the washing of it outside the Hospital.
- 25. It shall be in the power of the Committee instantly to dismiss any patient who, in their judgment, conducts himself or herself in an improper manner, or who does not conform to the Rules, Regulations and By-laws of the Institution.
- 26. Each patient is required to bring a proper change of clean bodylinen, and to pay for the washing of the same outside the Institutions.



### RULES RELATING TO BOTH

### The Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital and The Rawson Convalescent Home.

- 27. The Hospital shall be open throughout the year. The Home shall be opened in March each year and closed for the admission of patients on the second Thursday in November, or at such other times and such other periods in each year as the Committee of Management may decide to be necessary.
- 28. No Subscriber shall have power to recommend a patient or do any other special act until his or her subscription has been paid.

Annual Subscriptions shall be deemed due on the 1st January in each year.

When any subscription shall be in arrear for 2 years the subscriber' name shall be omitted from the published list.

- 29. The Government of the Royal Bath Hospital and of the Rawson Convalescent Home shall be vested in a Committee of Management consisting of the Patron, the President, the Vice-Presidents, the Trustees of both Institutions, the Honorary Consulting Physicians appointed before 31st December, 1930, (who shall be ex-officio members of the Committee until the Annual General Meeting of 1936), the Honorary Treasurer, four members of the Honorary Medical Staff (three at least of whom shall be Honorary Physicians), and sixteen other members, all of whom shall be elected by the subscribers at the Annual General Meeting. Of the sixteen other members four shall retire annually and shall be eligible for re-election. Three members of the Committee shall form a quorum.
- 30. The Committee shall have power to engage and dismiss all paid officials, to fix the amount of salaries, and make such orders, according to the spirit of these Rules, as they shall think expedient for the management of the Hospital and the Home.

Three or more of the Committee shall attend at the Hospital every Thursday afternoon to transact general business. In the event of a special meeting of the Committee being requisite, the same shall be called by the Secretary, when directed to do so by the chairman of the Committee or three of its members.

31. A House Committee shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, and shall meet at the Hospital as often as may be necessary, at such an hour as they may appoint. They shall examine the books of admission and discharge, and all other books kept by the officers, including the register of the attendance of the Honorary Physicians and Chaplain, and the "Visitors' Book." They shall investigate any complaint of neglect or misconduct of anyone connected with the Institution. They shall examine and sign all such accounts as may require to be laid before the next monthly meeting of the Committee of Management for payment. They shall procure and submit once a year to the Committee of Management for approval, all contracts for drugs, provisions, coals, &c., required for the use of the Hospital and Home. They shall examine, from time to time, the inventories of household goods, furniture, linen, &c., belonging to the Institutions. They shall replace and renew, from time to time, as circumstances

may require, all such internal fittings and furniture of the Hospital and Home as may urgently require renewal, and shall superintend all alterations and improvements sanctioned by the Committee of Management, and shall be generally responsible for keeping the grounds and buildings in order.

- 32. Whenever a vacancy or vacancies shall occur in the Honorary Medical Staff, the Secretary shall, when requested by the Committee of Management, give notice thereof by advertisement in the Medical and Local Press. Applicants, who shall be fully qualified and registered, shall forward their diplomas and testimonials, if required, to the Committee of Management, who may thereupon proceed to election, or they may in their discretion defer the appointment to the next Annual General Meeting.
- 33. The Honorary Physicians or a sufficient number of them, shall attend at the Hospital on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, to examine applicants for admission; and shall visit the Hospital three times per week, or as often as they may think necessary.
- 34. The Committee shall have power on the recommendation of the Hon. Medical Staff to appoint such specialists in an honorary capacity as may conduce to the better treatment of the patients.
- 35. The Honorary Treasurer shall pay all monies which he shall receive to the credit of the Hospital and Home at its Bankers, and all payments due from the Hospital and Home shall be made by cheques, signed by himself and two of the Committee. He shall invest, on securities approved by the Committee, when requested by them, all monies available for investment.
- 36. The Auditor shall examine the accounts, and return the same properly audited, to the Secretary, within 14 days after they have been received, and shall receive such a fee as the Committee of Management may think proper.
- 37. The Secretary shall collect and forthwith pay over to the Treasurer all subscriptions; attend and act as Clerk at all meetings of the Subscribers and Committees; make out the annual accounts for the auditor, and perform such other duties as the Committee of Management may direct.
- 38. The Matron shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, subject to three months' notice on either side; she shall devote the whole of her time to her duties, and shall see that the affairs of the Hospital and Home are conducted with the greatest possible attention to regularity, cleanliness, and economy, and shall conform to such By-Laws and instructions as the Committee of Management may from time to time decide upon.
- 39. The Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers shall be held at the Hospital on the Third Thursday in January in each year, or within 28 days thereof (of which seven days' notice shall be given by circular), for the purpose of receiving the reports of the Committee and Auditor, determining if any and what substantial alterations of or additions to buildings, shall be undertaken, and for electing the members of the Committee of Management and an Auditor. Nominations for election to the Committee of Management, signed by two subscribers as proposer and seconder, must reach the Secretary at least fourteen days before the Annual General Meeting.

- 40. The Chairman of the Committee of Management shall, within ten days after receiving a requisition in writing, signed by five Subscribers, convene by circular a special meeting of Subscribers for considering the purpose stated in such requisition only.
- 41. The Committee of Management shall have power to make such By-Laws (not inconsistent with these rules and regulations) as they may think necessary for the internal management of the Hospital and Home, and alter and annul the same as occasion may require; such new By-Laws to be in force until confirmed or otherwise at the next Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers, and printed copies of such By-Laws shall be affixed in conspicuous parts of the Hospital and Home, for the guidance of the Officers and the observance of the patients.
- 42. No general rule or regulation shall be altered, except by the Subscribers at the Annual General Meeting, or at a meeting specially called for the purpose; in all cases 14 days' notice shall be given to the Secretary of the proposed new rule; and seven days' notice shall be given by the Secretary to all Subscribers (together with the names of the Subscribers proposing the same), prior to the holding of the meeting at which such alteration is proposed to be made.
- 43. At all meetings, whether of the Subscribers or of the Committee of Management, all questions shall be decided by the vote of the majority of those present. In the event of the voting being equal the presiding Chairman of the meeting shall be entitled to give a second or casting vote. In no case is it permissible to vote by proxy.

# THE RAWSON CONVALESCENT HOME, HARROGATE.
