INFORMATION TO SUBSCRIBERS.

The following cases only are admitted to the ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL : Rheumatic and kindred Diseases (Arthritis, Myalgia, Neuritis, &c.), Skin Diseases, Disorders of the Liver, Gout, and Lead Poisoning.

The following cases are NOT eligible for admission to EITHER Institution :—

- (1) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (2) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (3) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (4) Persons suffering from fits or of unsound mind.
- (5) Persons suffering from neurasthenia.
- (6) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.
- (7) Persons of such advanced age or in such impaired health as to be unfit to undergo the treatment provided.

Cases convalescent from an infectious disease are not admissible until the expiration of six weeks from the period of infection ceasing.



Patients are admitted in the order in which the Recommendations are received. As there is usually a long Waiting List early application is desirable.

Patients must not present themselves for admission until they have received an Admission Card from the Secretary.

The Hon. Physicians attend on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays at 2 p.m. to admit Patients. Punctual attendance is essential.

Any infringement of the rules or any misconduct will render the Patient liable to instant dismissal.

The Committee of Management have many Applications each year from Patients for admission, which they are reluctantly compelled to refuse. Subscribers, who may have no Patients to recommend, are earnestly requested to send their Recommendations to the Secretary, that they may be used by the Committee for such deserving cases.

Visiting Days :—Saturdays and Sundays, 2-0—4-30 p.m.

The Hospital is just under a mile from the Railway Station.


All Subscriptions are due annually on January 1st in each year and all Recommendations must be paid for in advance.

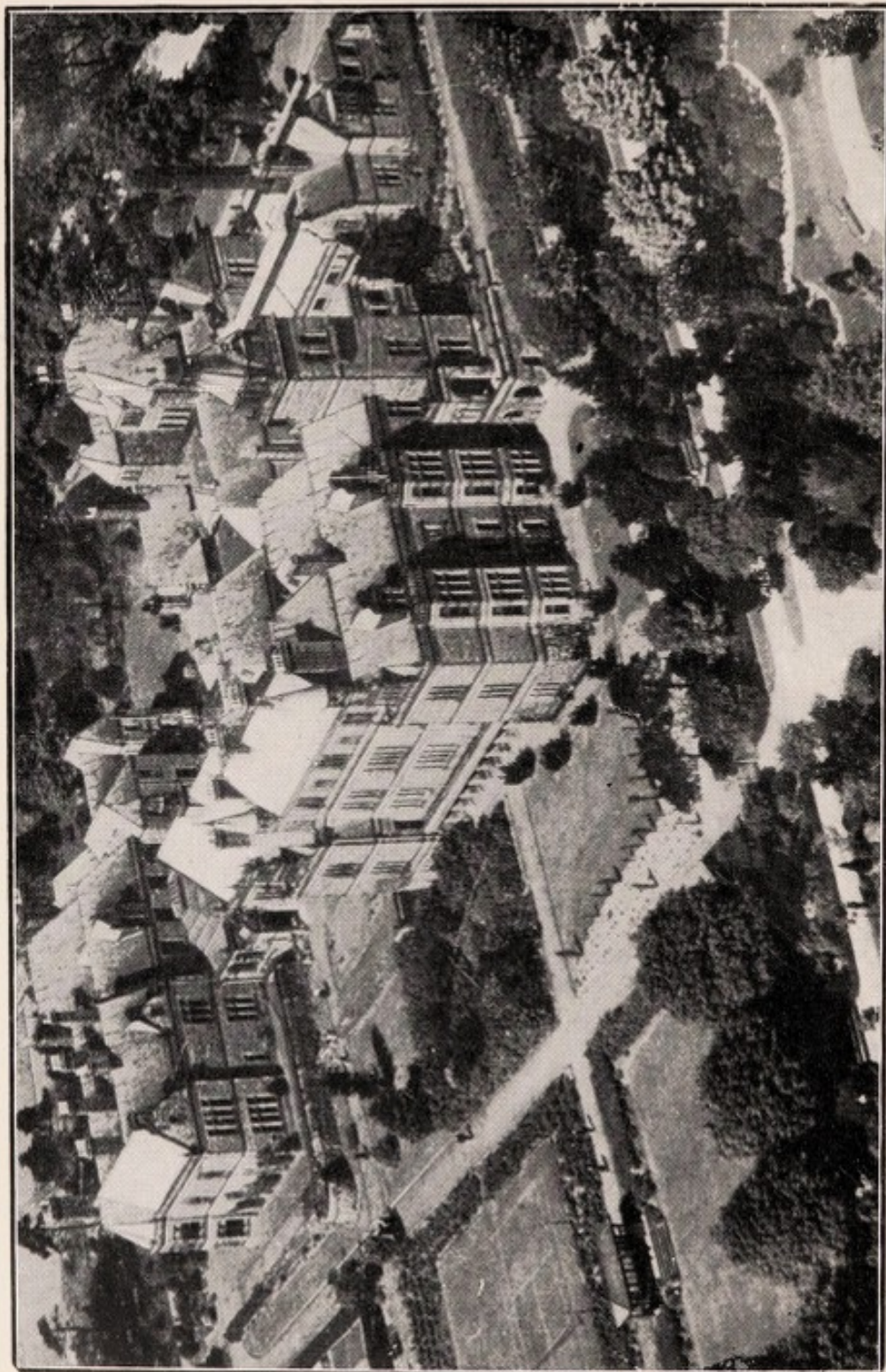

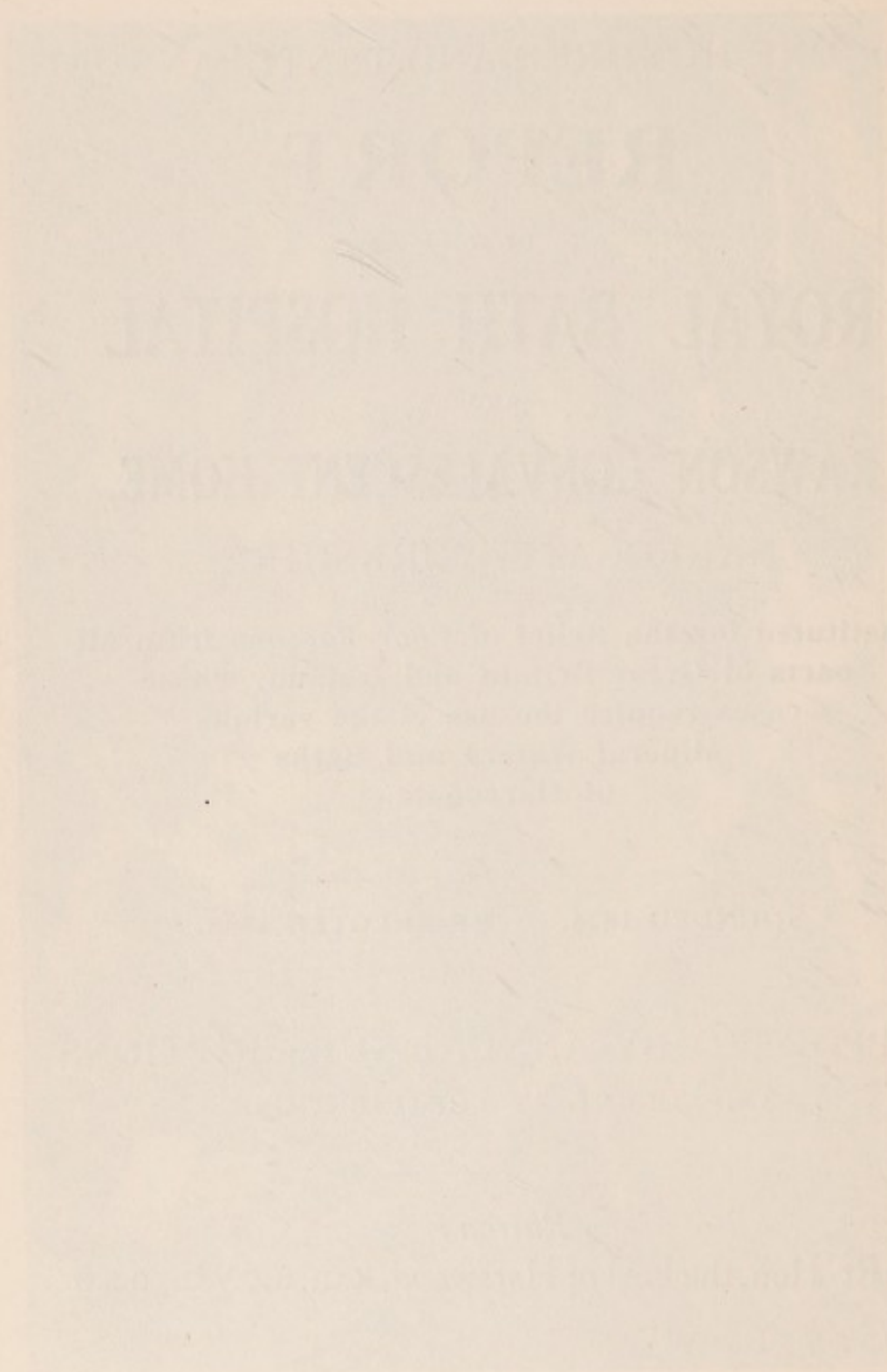

# ANNUAL MEETING,

Tuesday, 18th February, 1936.

The 110th Annual General Meeting of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home was held on Tuesday, 18th February, 1936.

The Right Hon. The Earl of Harewood, K.G., G.C.V.O., D.S.O., presided. Among those present were Matthew Stephenson, Esq., J.P. (Vice-President), The Mayor of Harrogate (Councillor S. LORD HAREWOOD, in moving the adoption of the Reports and Accounts, referred to a statement which had appeared in the Press that large extensions of the Hospital and Home were contemplated. This he described as a "misfortune," and added that he greatly regretted that the article had appeared exactly as it did. During the past year the Board of Management asked the Medical Staff to furnish a survey of possible future improvements. They had presented an exceedingly interesting but very drastic scheme. In order to carry out all their suggestions a very large sum of money would be required. He thought



that in so doing the Staff were looking for what he might call "perfection" and would not consider the suggested alterations as essential for the continuance of the Hospital, though they were doubtless most desirable and would enable the work to be carried on on a much larger scale than had hitherto been possible. These matters however had not yet been considered by the Board of Management and, whatever their intentions might be, they could not have their duties forestalled. A number of considerations must be taken into account before a decision could be arrived at. There was the large question of finance. This was entirely outside the province of the Medical Staff and though he did not suggest that their recommendations were in any way improper, he was personally not prepared to lend his name to a vast appeal to the general public until he was quite sure that, considered in all its aspects—and not from the medical aspect alone—the appeal was a wise one.

The Hospital, in conjunction with Leeds University, had lent its name to a scheme for rheumatic research, which was at present on a comparatively small scale. He hoped that some day this scheme would develop into a very much larger one and that, at the end of the seven years over which the scheme had been launched, they would have gained a great deal of knowledge of rheumatic diseases and would be able to look back upon their present knowledge as being, comparatively speaking, ignorance. Until these matters had been considered in all their aspects he thought it would be a great misfortune if they were to embark on a big scheme of alterations, which five or six years hence might be found to be based on very imperfect knowledge of what was really required. In any case he was sure the Medical Staff would agree that the Board of Management must have time to consider the whole position before making any appeal on a large scale to the public.

Their finances and present scale of working did not oblige them to make an appeal on a very large scale. When they had decided what they needed, then they could launch their appeal and he hoped they would press home at once to attain what they were aiming at. They must not appeal to the public in a vague way for a large sum of money, when they had not yet determined how the money ought to be spent. He had no doubt that the Report of the Medical Staff, which was most valuable, would be dealt with in a manner, which, from the medical and financial points of view, was deemed most desirable.



MR. STANLEY BARNES (Hon. Treasurer), seconding the motion, thanked the Annual Subscribers for the satisfactory condition of the Hospital finances. They had saved £504 on establishment repairs as compared with the previous year—a satisfactory position which was largely due to their being the owners of a remarkably well built and well equipped establishment.

For many years past the Income of the Hospital had slightly exceeded the Expenditure. Expenditure must, year by year, show a tendency to increase; whether the Income would keep pace with that increase, as it had done up to now, remained to be seen. He hoped the time would never come when the balance was on the other side.

The Reports and Balance Sheet were then adopted.

LORD HAREWOOD moved that Viscount Mountgarret be asked to accept office as President in succession to Major J. W. Dent, who had sent a letter of resignation but said he would continue to take an interest in the welfare of the Hospital. They very much regretted Major Dent's resignation after so many years' association with the Institution. Lord Mountgarret had been interested in the Hospital for many years and they hoped his connection with it would become closer as time went on.

DR. G. L. KERR PRINGLE seconded the resolution, which was unanimously carried, with thanks to Major Dent for his past services.

MR. C. E. CARTER (Chairman of the Board of Management) proposed that Dr. L. J. Hobson and Mr. C. A. Rhodes be elected Vice-Presidents in recognition of their services to the Hospital. Mr. Carter said that Dr. Hobson had faithfully served the Hospital on the Medical Staff and as a Member of the Committee for more than fifty years, and that Mr. Rhodes had been Chairman of the Committee for fifteen years.

SIR L. G. DUNBAR seconded the resolution, which was unanimously carried.

LORD HAREWOOD moved a vote of thanks to the Chairman and Committee of Management and proposed the re-election of the following members due to retire by rotation: Messrs. Stanley Barnes, R. A. Breare, and J. A. Eddison, and that Dr. Hinsley Walker, J.P., and Dr. G. L. Kerr Pringle, M.C., be



elected to fill the vacancies caused by the elevation of Mr. Rhodes and the death of Lt.-Col. A. Kirk, J.P. Also that the nominees of the Hon. Medical Staff, Dr. Geoffrey Holmes, Dr. Wm. Yeoman, Dr. J. L. Wesley-Smith, and Dr. Sinclair Miller be and are hereby appointed.

In moving the resolution Lord Harewood said the Hospital was exceptionally fortunate in its Committee of Management. He was sure the additions of Dr. Walker and Dr. Pringle would be a great asset. The Medical nominees had taken their share in the Management of the Institution in a most satisfactory manner.

MR. MATTHEW STEPHENSON seconded, and the motion was carried.

MR. C. E. CARTER, replying on behalf of his colleagues, referred appreciatively to the help of the Medical Staff and said their suggestions would receive most careful consideration. Welcoming the Mayor of Harrogate he said "We are indebted to that much maligned body, the Harrogate Corporation, for many favours for which we are grateful." He thought he could safely say that the initiation by their Patron of a Scheme for Rheumatism Research had done as much as any single thing which had been done by even the Corporation to keep Harrogate as a Spa in the eye of the Medical world during recent years. He felt sure that the Corporation and the Hospital could be helpful to each other.

MR. W. ARTHUR TAYLOR, moving a vote of thanks to Mr. Stanley Barnes for his services as Hon. Treasurer and his re-appointment for the ensuing year, paid tribute to Mr. Barnes' work on behalf of the Hospital.

MR. W. TOWNEND seconded and the motion was carried, and MR. BARNES suitably replied.

MR. R. A. BREARE, who moved a vote of thanks to the members of the Hon. Medical Staff and their re-appointment for the ensuing year, with the addition of Dr. T. Glen Reah as Assistant Hon. Physician, said that it was of vital importance that they should have an excellent Medical Staff and in this respect they were singularly fortunate. Apart from the medical work, which showed notable results, he could, speaking from personal experience, pay tribute to their sense of responsibility in regard to finance. They had been most helpful and had



never unduly pressed a point when it had been suggested that there was any serious objection from the financial or any other point of view.

MR. H. CHAPMAN, seconding, said that in his frequent visits round the gardens he came into contact with many patients whose gratitude towards the Medical Staff was the greatest tribute they could receive.

The resolution was carried unanimously.

DR. SINCLAIR MILLER, in replying, regretted the premature publication of the article referred to by Lord Harewood. He thought this had been a case of unfortunate leakage; the members of the Staff were not responsible. The year had been one of steady progress and consolidation. He hoped that help given over many years by Lord Harewood's family to the Hospital would continue for a long time to come. The present research scheme would never have reached maturity but for Lord Harewood's help.

MR. H. NEWTON (of Newcastle) proposed, and DR. GEOFFREY HOLMES seconded the re-election of the Auditors, Messrs. Lowrey, Weston and Whalley (Leeds and Harrogate).

THE MAYOR OF HARROGATE, who moved a vote of thanks to Lord Harewood for presiding, referred to Mr. Carter's appreciation of the Corporation's interest in the Hospital. They hoped seriously that the Research would be productive of great good. If they could find out the cause of Rheumatism and allay or remove it, it would be a tremendous help to the town and be of great benefit to the world. He did not know of a Hospital which had a better reputation for the treatment it meted out to those who came to it.

MR. CARTER seconding, said Lord Harewood was always willing to help the Hospital in every way he could and his wise counsel had been of great value on several occasions.

LORD HAREWOOD replying, said it was a great pleasure to him to keep up the connection which his family had had in the Hospital over so many years; he hoped it would continue for many years to come. He wished the Medical Staff to understand that he in no way blamed them for the appearance in the Press of the article to which he had referred in his opening remarks.



## Report of the Committee of Management.

To The Right Honourable The Earl of Harewood, K.G., G.C.V.O.,  
D.S.O., and Subscribers of the Royal Bath Hospital  
and Rawson Convalescent Home, Harrogate.

The Committee of Management has pleasure in submitting its 110th Annual Report and Statements of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1935.

The figures relating to the admission and re-admissions of patients are shown below, together with those for 1934 :—

These figures show little variation between the two years excepting for a decrease in the re-admissions of men, both in the Hospital and Home. It is not unreasonable to assume that the improved conditions of the labour market are largely responsible for this phenomenon. When men have jobs to go back to or posts are being kept open for them, they are naturally anxious not to run the risk of losing them. The total



number of persons admitted has decreased by nine, but against this are to be placed the facts that the average length of stay has increased by 7 days, the total number of "Hospital Days" has increased from 43,502 to 44,553 and the daily average of occupied beds from 125.9 to 128.4.

### OBITUARY.

Your Committee records with deep and sincere regret the deaths during the past year of Lt.-Col. A. Kirk, V.D., J.P., Mr. Frank Boyce and Dr. L. C. E. Calthrop.

Lt.-Col. Kirk joined the Board of Management in 1916, so that his length of service had been exceeded by few of the present members of the Board. His attendance at the weekly meetings was most regular and, on Mr. Stanley Barnes being appointed Hon. Treasurer in 1931 in place of the late Mr. Walter Freeman, Lt.-Col. Kirk succeeded to the Chairmanship of the House Committee, vacated by Mr. Barnes. He proved himself most careful and conscientious in the discharge of his duties and seldom allowed a week to pass without paying two or three visits to the Hospital to keep himself in close touch with its internal affairs. Furthermore, he devoted much thought and time to the oversight of the garden and grounds.

Mr. Boyce served on the Committee for seven years, until ill-health necessitated his resignation in 1931. He has perpetuated his association with the Hospital by a legacy of £250.

Dr. Calthrop was appointed a member of the Hon. Medical Staff in 1922 and, on his removing to Hertfordshire in 1930 his devoted work for the Hospital was recognised by the Board of Management appointing him Hon. Consulting Physician. His wide experience of balneology was unstintingly given to the patients under his care. His interest in their welfare went far beyond the merely professional demands of his relations with them: at the same time his unvarying courtesy and consideration towards all with whom he came in contact gained him the esteem and affection of patients and staff without exception.

### PERSONAL.

During the past twelve months several changes have taken place. Mr. Rhodes, after occupying the post of Chairman of the Board of Management for fifteen years, decided not to stand for re-election, feeling that it would be in the best interests of the Hospital if a fresh mind were brought to the consideration



of its problems. Mr. Rhodes joined the Board in 1917 and was appointed Chairman in 1920, so that to him fell the task of piloting the Hospital successfully through the difficult post-war years, when the buildings reverted to civil purposes after the military occupation. During the period immediately following many alterations, developments and improvements were initiated and successfully completed. Your Committee is glad to take this opportunity of placing on record its appreciation of the services Mr. Rhodes has rendered to the Hospital and it is happy in the knowledge that it will continue to enjoy the benefit of his experience and advice in the capacity of a "private member."

It was further a cause for much gratification to them when Mr. C. E. Carter acceded to their unanimous request that he should fill the vacancy. Circumstances have militated against Mr. Carter giving as full service to the Hospital as he would otherwise have been able to. Even so, his wide experience, balanced judgment and prudent foresight have already proved assets of great value during a period, not free from difficulty.

Mr. Laurence, who joined the Board in 1934 was chosen to succeed Lt.-Col. Kirk as Chairman of the House Committee. He has shown a keen and comprehensive grasp of the duties of the position, but ill-health has of late unfortunately necessitated a time of inactivity. It is the sincere wish of your Committee that Mr. Laurence will soon enjoy improved health, which will enable him once more to preside at the weekly meetings of his Committee.

Miss M. H. Roberts, the Matron, resigned her position after a stay of about two years. She had shown herself an economical manager and zealous for efficiency in all departments. Your Committee was fortunate in obtaining as her successor, Miss A. Mossman, who had given valuable help on several occasions in the past and has an intimate knowledge of the work of the Hospital.

In January, Dr. L. J. Hobson completed an association of 50 years with the life of the Hospital. He has always taken a close interest in the welfare of the Hospital, but his work for it during the years of the War merits special mention and gratitude. It is the hope of your Committee that Dr. Hobson may continue to attend the Meetings of the Board for many years to come.



A special word of thanks is due to Mr. Chapman for the time and interest he has given to the garden since the death of Lt.-Col. Kirk. His practical knowledge has proved of great value already and the alterations he is striving to effect should show good results in the near future.

Apart from the changes detailed above, the year under review presents no features of outstanding interest or importance. The work—apart from the ups and downs necessarily incidental to the employment of a large number of people—has gone steadily forward without serious interruption. The following are among the chief "landmarks."

12th April: Mr. Joe Davis, English Billiards Champion and Mr. George Nelson very kindly visited the Hospital and gave an exhibition game of 500, after which Mr. Davis gave further proof of his amazing skill. Those fortunate enough to be present will not soon forget the experience.

4th—8th June: The Royal Institute of Public Health held a congress. Sectional Meetings on "Rheumatism and Allied Diseases" were held at the Hospital at which several members of the Hon. Medical Staff either read papers or took part in the subsequent discussions.

29th June: The Maternity and Child Welfare Section of the Medical Officers of Health Congress visited the Hospital under the guidance of Dr. Muriel Keyes.

18th—21st Sept.: A Congress of members of the Chartered Society of Massage and Medical Gymnastics was held in Harrogate. Parties of those attending visited the Hospital during these days, but the number of those availing themselves of the opportunity was disappointingly small.

No great structural alterations have taken place, but the Men's Cloak Room in the Hospital has been enlarged—an improvement which has been much appreciated. A Service Lift from the larders to the Kitchen has been installed. The Nurses' Sitting Room has been re-decorated and practically re-furnished throughout and other equipment has been modernised with a view to increasing their comfort.

The number of treatments given in the Electrical Department shows a marked increase, chiefly under the heading



“ Diathermy ” and as was expected the work in the X-Ray Department has grown considerably and will probably continue to do so. The figures for the Baths show no marked variation on the whole. In this connection your Committee desires to record its grateful thanks to the Baths and Wells Department of the Harrogate Corporation for the use, at a nominal rental, of three of its wells, supplies of Montpellier, Kissingen and other waters together with generous supplies of Harrogate Mud, all of which play a prominent, and indeed indispensable, part in the treatments, given throughout the year. The value of these concessions it is impossible to over-estimate.

### FINANCE.

That both the Hospital and Convalescent Home show a profit for the year under review must, in the first place, be attributed to the constancy and loyalty of the annual subscribers and to these your Committee desires to convey its grateful thanks for the support which has enabled it to finish the year free from anxiety and hopeful for the future.

Although expenditure under the first four main heads shows an increase (Provisions, £81 ; Surgery and Dispensary, £111 ; Domestic, £247 ; and Salaries, £347) a considerable drop in the Establishment charges—£504—goes a long way to counterbalance these, so that the net increase in expenditure for the year amounts to only £350. The variation in details can be easily seen by looking at the comparative figures for 1934 and 1935 on the Revenue Account, see pp. 32-33. On the receipts side there is a gratifying increase of £85 in subscriptions, which is, however, more than discounted by a fall of £170 in the subscriptions to the Convalescent Home. The main increase, £790 is in the group designated “ Receipts on Account of Services Rendered.” Hospital Sunday Collections show a decline and the increase in Donations—always a regrettably small item—is entirely due to a cheque from Lord Harewood for £50. The diminished loss on the Laboratory, £26 is so small as to be negligible, and can only be regarded as temporary. The Endowment has received one gift of ten guineas from Miss L. E. Watson, but, apart from this, remains torpid.

### LEGACIES, Etc.

During the year the following amounts have been received : Exors of Miss E. Alcock, deceased, £250 : Mrs. A. E. Richardson, deceased (6th distribution), £450 ; Miss S. B. Rayner, £50. These sums are awaiting investment as other amounts will shortly be added to them. A first instalment of £600 has been received from the Executors of the late Mr. Thomas Naylor for the Rawson Home Endowment and this sum has been invested.



Your Committee desires also to thank Lord Harewood for a donation of £50, representing part of the proceeds from opening Harewood House to the public.

## Report of the Hon. Medical Staff.

---

The work of the past year has been chiefly of a routine character, and full use has been made of the improvements and additions which the Board of Management has effected in the last few years. The additional Douche Massage Table installed has amply justified itself.

The Staff considered that the appointment of an Assistant Physician would be a great help in the working of the Hospital, and Dr. Glen Reah has been appointed. We extend to him a warm welcome.

The work of the Hospital is steadily increasing, and it is worthy of note that more cases in the early stages of Rheumatism are coming for treatment. There is still, however, a tendency in the busy time of the year for beds to be filled by chronic cases which could be more effectively dealt with in the early months of the year. The Staff have worked in close co-operation with the Research Fellow, and in addition to frequent discussions of individual cases, monthly meetings have been held at which the general lines of investigations have been thoroughly discussed.

At the request of the Board of Management the Staff have been considering what alterations are necessary if the Hospital is to keep its position in the front rank of the National fight against Rheumatism and its allied diseases. After prolonged discussion and careful thought, the Staff have unanimously agreed to recommend alterations on a large scale which they consider should be carried out.

## Research Department.

Investigations carried on in the Research Department during the past year have been directed mainly towards the elucidation of the nature and causes of the rheumatic diseases. The department proves admirably suited for this work, for the Research Fellow is able to conduct his enquiries in the wards as well as in the Laboratory. The Research Fellow is grateful for the helpful interest which the Medical Staff continue to show in his work.

The subjects upon which work was started at the opening of the department, eighteen months ago, were described in the Annual Report of the Advisory Committee of October, 1935. Some of these have been brought to fruition and others, not yet complete, are being continued. Rheumatoid arthritis is now the principal subject of study. This, the most crippling of the rheumatic diseases, attacks adolescents and persons in early middle life. The pathogeny of this disease has not yet been adequately explained, and no specific therapy is known for it. Spa treatment affords alleviation in many cases, but too often the condition advances to irreparable anatomical deformities. Research into this disease and its treatment would be facilitated if more cases were sent into hospital while in the early stages.

During 1935 a questionnaire was circulated to practitioners who had sent colliery workers to the Hospital. To the 390 enquiries issued only 150 replies were received. The results, however, are of general interest and were published in "The Journal of State Medicine," Oct., 1935, page 609, from which the following is quoted.—"The results of this 'follow-up' are sufficiently consistent to give a small but concrete example of the benefits which industrial workers may derive from treatment in a spa hospital. In considering these figures, two points must be especially emphasised. Firstly, 76 per cent. of the patients under consideration are employed at the coal-face, where they are engaged on one of the most physically strenuous tasks to which industrial workers are subjected and under atmospheric conditions particularly conducive to 'rheumatism.' Secondly, admission to the spa hospitals usually implies that other lines of home-treatment have failed, and therefore the cases here considered represent those forms of rheumatic diseases which are the more lasting, the more disabling and the less amenable to treatment.



"The accompanying figures show the present condition of these patients, analysed according to the period which has elapsed since their discharge from the hospital, and also the net result of treatment in the four main types of chronic rheumatic disease.

"It is to be noted that both the age of the patients (average age = 54.8 years) and the duration of the disease before seeking hospital treatment (average duration = 4.6 years) militate against success in dealing with the cases of osteo-arthritis."

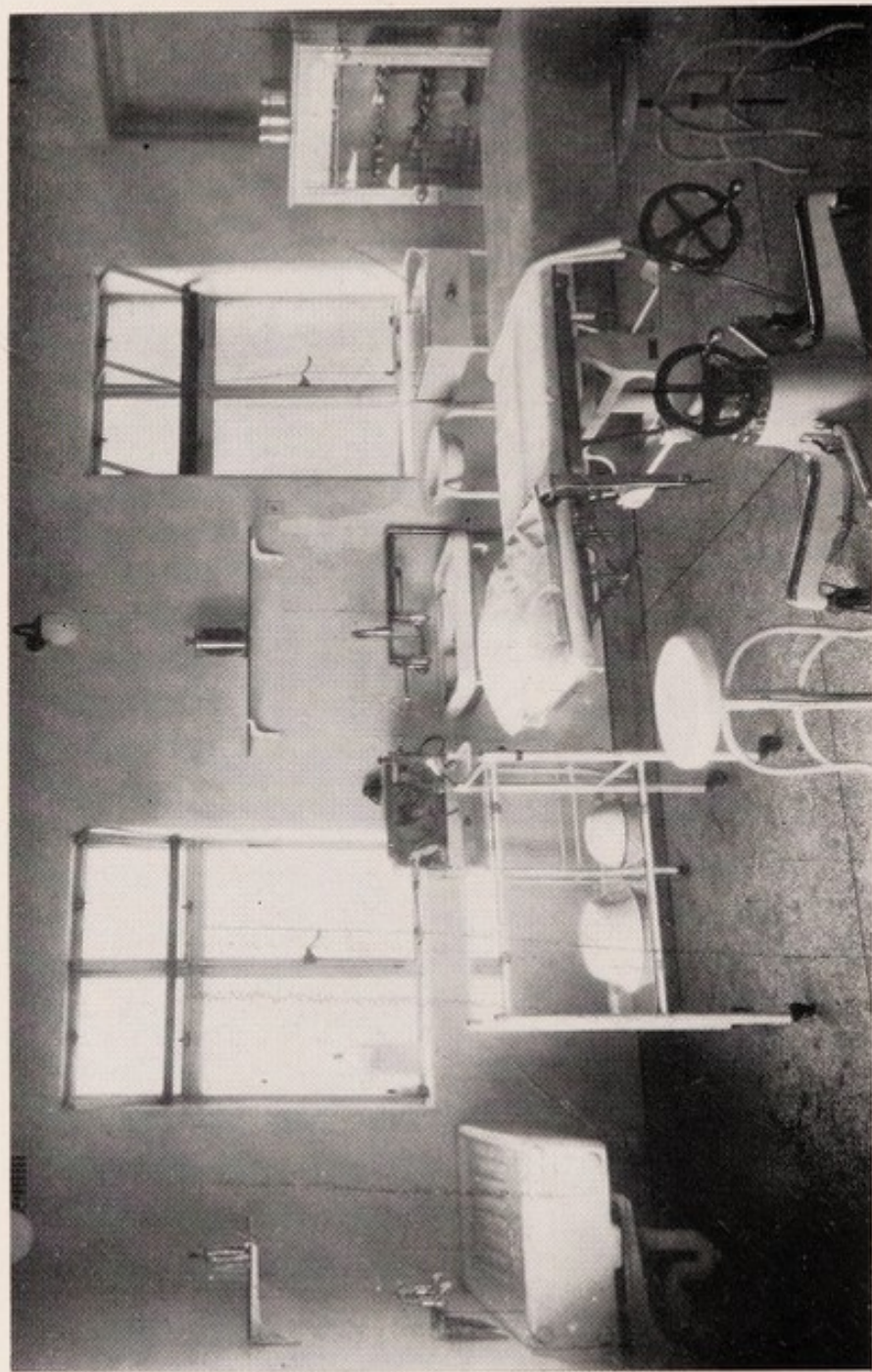

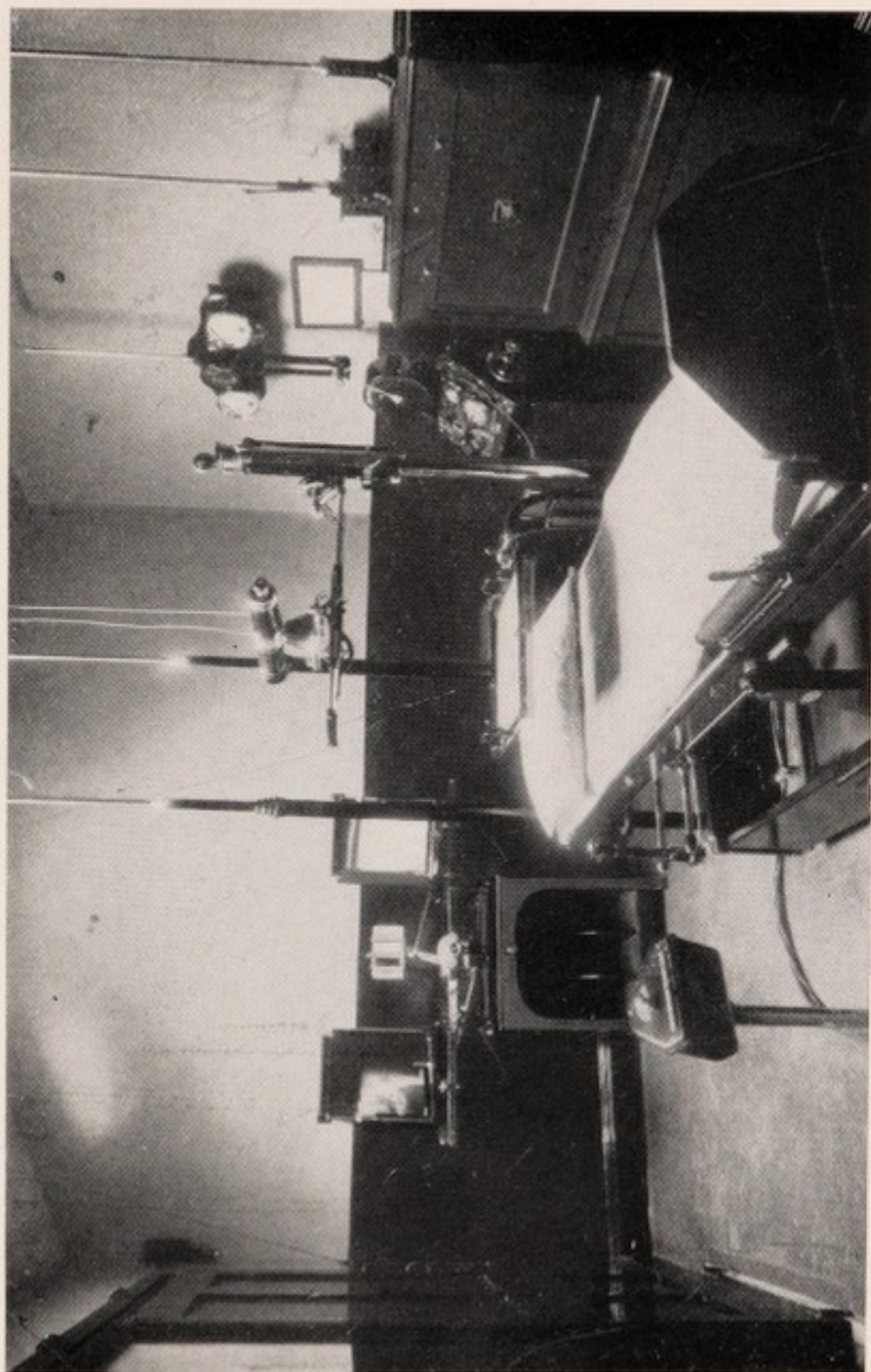

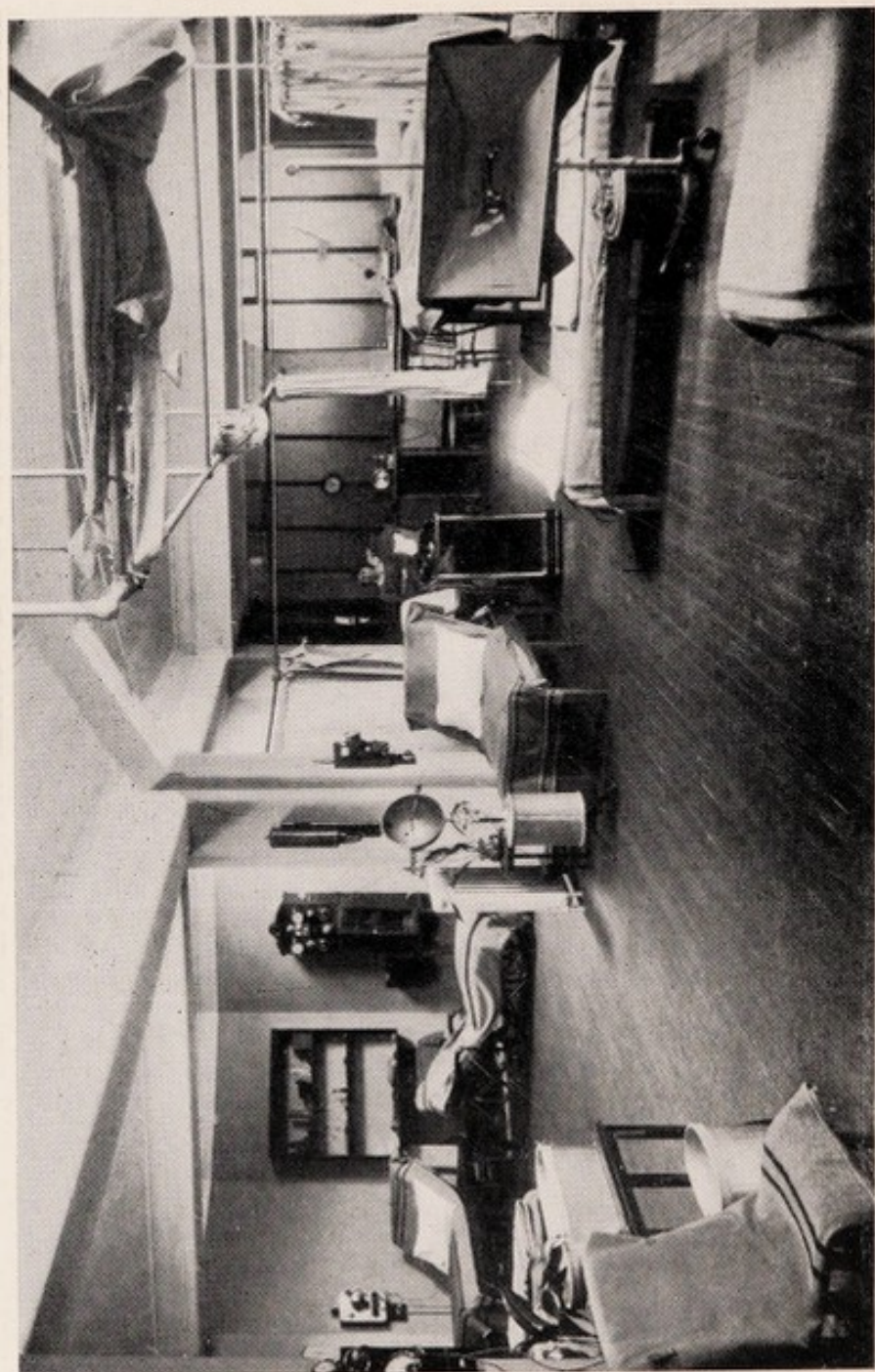

# RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE HARROGATE ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL.

*Revised February, 1934.*

## Title and Purposes of the Hospital.

1. The Hospital having been built with a view to affording to deserving persons, free of expense, the benefits of the Harrogate waters and treatment, shall be denominated "THE HARROGATE ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL." No patients shall be admitted except such as in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and the Committee of Management are suitable cases for such treatment.

## Constitution.

2. The Officers shall consist of a Patron, President, Vice-Presidents, Twelve Trustees, Honorary Consulting Physicians, Honorary Physicians and the Honorary Treasurer.

3. All the real estate belonging to the Hospital shall be vested in the names of six Trustees, and the personal estate in the names of six Trustees, but subject to the control of the Subscribers as to any appropriation for the benefit of the Hospital, which may be agreed upon by them at any annual general meeting, or special meeting called for the purpose.

4. Whenever the number of Trustees, either of the real or personal trust estate, shall be reduced to three by all or any of the following means, viz., death, resignation, refusal, incapacity to act, or permanent residence out of England, the Committee of Management (as specified in Rule 27) shall by any writing under their hand fill up the vacancies by appointing three new Trustees, and upon every such appointment the surviving or continuing Trustees shall transfer such real or personal trust estate respectively vested in them so as to vest it respectively jointly in the surviving or continuing Trustees and such new Trustees.

## Privileges of Subscribers.

5. Recommendations for the admission of Patients are issued on the following terms:—

(a) To Regular Annual Subscribers one recommendation for each Two Guineas subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued:

PROVIDED ALWAYS that Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards whose names appear in the Subscription List for 1924 shall, so long as they continue to subscribe annually, retain the privilege of recommending one patient for each guinea so subscribed, the number of recommendations to be issued at this rate to such old subscribers to be limited and determined by the amount of the first subscription sent in any one year, but in no case shall exceed Five. Old Subscribers entitled to this privilege who require to recommend additional patients beyond the number to which they may be entitled by their first subscription in any year may do so on payment of Two Guineas for each additional recommendation.

(b) To Occasional Subscribers (i.e. persons whose names have not appeared in the Subscription List for the preceding year) at the rate of one recommendation for every £2 10s. 0d. subscribed.

N.B.—Patients using these recommendation forms (a) and (b) will be expected to pay on admission a sum of 10s. 6d. per week towards the cost of board.

(c) To Contributory Schemes, Societies, and other bodies of persons, etc., which offer their members or contributors Hospital or Convalescent benefit, one recommendation for each £3 10s. 0d. paid, being at the rate of 5s. per day for a minimum period of two weeks, and pro rata for each additional week's stay.



N.B.—Patients admitted under these recommendations (c) will NOT be charged the Board Fee of 10s. 6d.

(d) Every donor of £40 to the Endowment Fund shall be a Life Subscriber, and shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for every full sum of £40 so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued.

(e) Executors of persons bequeathing sums of money to the Endowment Fund of the Hospital shall be entitled to ONE recommendation for every £25 paid to the Treasurer, but to not more than FOUR, whatever the amount of the legacy bequeathed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which the Legacy is paid, or in the following year.

(f) Every Clergyman, or minister of any Denomination, who shall transmit a congregational collection to the Treasurer, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. so contributed during the year.

(g) Every Hotel, Boarding-house, or Lodging-house Keeper or other person, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. collected and paid to the Treasurer during the year.

These recommendations (f) and (g) shall be available within 12 calendar months from the date of issue.

6. In no case shall any part of the cost of a recommendation be paid by the patient or any member of his or her family. Any such payment shall disqualify for admission.

7. Recommendations for the Hospital will be available for the Rawson Convalescent Home should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.

8. The following cases only are admitted to the Hospital: Skin Diseases, Rheumatism and kindred diseases (Arthritis, Myalgia and Neuritis), Disorders of the Liver, Gout and Lead Poisoning.

The following cases are **not** eligible for admission :

- (1) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (2) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (3) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (4) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (5) Persons suffering from fits or of unsound mind.
- (6) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.

9. Cases convalescent from an infectious disease shall be inadmissible until a term of six weeks has elapsed from the period of infection ceasing.

10. The Committee of Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Hospital, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE RAWSON CONVALESCENT HOME.

*Revised February, 1934*

### Title and Purposes of the Home.

11. The Rawson Convalescent Home, having been erected in connection with the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital on land the property of the said Hospital, shall be conducted under the Officers and Committee of Management of the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital, with the addition of the three Trustees hereinafter referred to.



12. The Institution shall be used solely as a Convalescent Home. Only such patients shall be admitted as obtain a recommendation from a Subscriber of the Home or Hospital, and are, in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and Committee of Management, suitable. It is contrary to the design of the Home to relieve persons whose circumstances enable them to pay the full cost of a visit to Harrogate.

#### **Constitution.**

13. The Property belonging to this Institution shall be vested in three Trustees. Any vacancy in their number to be filled up by the remaining Trustee or Trustees.

14. The Convalescent Home shall be charged for all expenses of the Hospital and Home in proportion to the number of patients admitted. Donations from Hotels, Lodging-houses, Hospital Sunday, and other sources of revenue (excepting legacies or donations to the endowment funds, which shall be kept separate) shall be apportioned on the same principle. This apportionment of receipts and expenses shall commence January 1st, 1898, and shall not be altered without the approval of a Committee consisting of the Patron, the Chairman of the Committee of Management, the Honorary Treasurer, and the Home Trustees for the time being.

#### **Privileges of Subscribers.**

15. Recommendations for admission of Patients are issued on the following terms:—

(a) Annual subscribers of Two guineas and upwards shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for each Two guineas so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued:

PROVIDED ALWAYS that Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards whose names appear in the Subscription List for 1924 shall, so long as they continue to subscribe annually, retain the privilege of recommending one patient for each guinea so subscribed, the number of recommendations to be issued at this rate to such old subscribers to be limited and determined by the amount of the first subscription sent in any one year, but in no case shall exceed Five. Old Subscribers entitled to this privilege who require to recommend additional patients beyond the number to which they may be entitled by their first subscription in any year may do so on payment of Two Guineas for each additional recommendation.

(b) To Occasional Subscribers (*i.e.* persons whose names have not appeared in the Subscription List for the preceding year) at the rate of one recommendation for every £2 10s. 0d. subscribed.

N.B.—Patients using these recommendation forms (a) and (b) will be expected to pay on admission a sum of 10s. 6d. per week towards the cost of board.

(c) To Contributory Schemes, Societies and other bodies of persons, etc. which offer their members or contributors Hospital or Convalescent benefit, one recommendation for each £3 10s. 0d. paid, being at the rate of 5s. per day for a minimum period of two weeks, and pro rata for each additional week's stay.

N.B.—Patients admitted under these recommendations (c) will NOT be charged the Board Fee of 10s. 6d.



(d) Every donor of £40 or upwards to the Endowment Fund shall be a Life Subscriber, and be entitled to recommend one patient annually for every full sum of £40 so subscribed. These Recommendations are only available in the year in which they are issued.

(e) Executors of persons bequeathing sums of money to the Endowment Fund of the Home shall be entitled to ONE recommendation for every £25 paid to the Treasurer, but to not more than FOUR, whatever the amount of the legacy bequeathed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which the Legacy is paid, or in the following year.

(f) Every Clergyman or Minister of any Denomination who shall transmit a congregational collection to the Treasurer shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. contributed during that year.

(g) Every Hotel Proprietor, Boarding-house, Lodging-house keeper or other person, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. collected and paid to the Treasurer during the year.

These recommendations (f) and (g) shall be available within 12 calendar months of the date of issue.

#### Admission by Payment.

16. In certain cases approved by the Committee patients may be admitted to the Home without recommendation on their own payment in advance at the rate of one pound fifteen shillings for each week.

17. Recommendations for the Home will be available for the Royal Bath Hospital should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.

18. Convalescent cases, or cases of debility, are eligible for admission to the Home.

The following cases are **not** eligible :—

- (1) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (2) Persons in advanced stages of consumption.
- (3) Persons suffering from any skin disease.
- (4) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (5) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (6) Persons subject to fits or of unsound mind.
- (7) Persons incapable of attending to themselves

19. Cases convalescent from an infectious disease are not admissible until the expiration of six weeks from the period of the infection ceasing.

20. The Committee of Management reserve the right to refuse admission or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Convalescent Home, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.



### **By-Laws and Regulations for Patients.**

21. Every applicant for admission must procure a recommendation from a Subscriber, accompanied by the Certificate, properly filled up by a qualified Medical Practitioner, as to the suitability of the case. Each patient, when so admitted, shall pay a sum not exceeding 10/6 for each week of his or her stay towards the cost of his or her board, unless it be proved to the satisfaction of the Committee that such patient is entirely unable to meet such charge, in which case the Committee may, in their absolute discretion, remit such charge, either wholly or in part.

Each patient may be admitted for a period not exceeding two weeks on production of a Subscriber's recommendation, and shall be entitled to board, lodging, baths, medical attendance, &c. When further treatment is deemed desirable by the Hon. Physicians an extension of time may be granted, with the sanction of the Committee of Management, on production of a further recommendation for each two weeks of such extension.

22. No patient can be re-admitted until the expiration of three calendar months from the date when he or she was last discharged from the Hospital, except under special circumstances, and by special leave of the Committee of Management.

23. It shall be in the power of the Committee instantly to dismiss any patient who in their judgment conducts himself or herself in an improper manner, or who does not conform to the Rules, Regulations, and By-laws of the Institution.

24. Each patient is required to bring a proper change of clean body-linen, and to pay for the washing of it outside the Hospital.

### **RULES RELATING TO BOTH**

## **The Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital and The Rawson Convalescent Home.**

25. The Hospital shall be open throughout the year. The Home shall be opened in March each year and closed for the admission of patients on the second Thursday in November, or at such other times and such other periods in each year as the Committee of Management may decide to be necessary.

26. No Subscriber shall have power to recommend a patient or do any other special act until his or her subscription has been paid.

Annual Subscriptions shall be deemed due on the 1st January in each year.

When any subscription shall be in arrear for 2 years the subscriber's name shall be omitted from the published list.



27. The Government of the Royal Bath Hospital and of the Rawson Convalescent Home shall be vested in a Committee of Management consisting of the Patron, the President, the Vice-Presidents, the Trustees of both Institutions, the Honorary Consulting Physicians appointed before 31st December, 1930, (who shall be *ex-officio* members of the Committee until the Annual General Meeting of 1936), the Honorary Treasurer, four members of the Honorary Medical Staff (three at least of whom shall be Honorary Physicians), and sixteen other members, all of whom shall be elected by the subscribers at the Annual General Meeting. Of the sixteen other members four shall retire annually and shall be eligible for re-election. Three members of the Committee shall form a quorum.

28. The Committee shall have power to engage and dismiss all paid officials, to fix the amount of salaries, and make such orders, according to the spirit of these Rules, as they shall think expedient for the management of the Hospital and the Home.

Three or more of the Committee shall attend at the Hospital every Thursday afternoon to transact general business. In the event of a special meeting of the Committee being requisite, the same shall be called by the Secretary, when directed to do so by the chairman of the Committee or three of its members.

29. A House Committee shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, and shall meet at the Hospital as often as may be necessary, at such an hour as they may appoint. They shall examine the books of admission and discharge, and all other books kept by the officers, including the register of the attendance of the Honorary Physicians and Chaplain, and the "Visitors' Book." They shall investigate any complaint of neglect or misconduct of anyone connected with the Institution. They shall examine and sign all such accounts as may require to be laid before the next monthly meeting of the Committee of Management for payment. They shall procure and submit once a year to the Committee of Management for approval, all contracts for drugs, provisions, coals, &c., required for the use of the Hospital and Home. They shall examine, from time to time, the inventories of household goods, furniture, linen, &c., belonging to the Institutions. They shall replace and renew, from time to time, as circumstances may require, all such internal fittings and furniture of the Hospital and Home as may urgently require renewal, and shall superintend all alterations and improvements sanctioned by the Committee of Management, and shall be generally responsible for keeping the grounds and buildings in order.

30. Whenever a vacancy or vacancies shall occur in the Honorary Medical Staff, the Secretary shall, when requested by the Committee of Management, give notice thereof by advertisement in the Medical and Local Press. Applicants, who shall be fully qualified and registered, shall forward their diplomas and testimonials, if required, to the Committee of Management, who may thereupon proceed to election, or they may in their discretion defer the appointment to the next Annual General Meeting.

31. The Honorary Physicians or a sufficient number of them, shall attend at the Hospital on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, to examine applicants for admission; and shall visit the Hospital three times per week, or as often as they may think necessary.

32. The Committee shall have power on the recommendation of the Hon. Medical Staff to appoint such specialists in an honorary capacity as may conduce to the better treatment of the patients.



33. The Honorary Treasurer shall pay all monies which he shall receive to the credit of the Hospital and Home at its Bankers, and all payments due from the Hospital and Home shall be made by cheques, signed by himself and two of the Committee. He shall invest, on securities approved by the Committee, when requested by them, all monies available for investment.

34. The Auditor shall examine the accounts, and return the same properly audited, to the Secretary, within 14 days after they have been received, and shall receive such a fee as the Committee of Management may think proper.

35. The Secretary shall collect and forthwith pay over to the Treasurer all subscriptions; attend and act as Clerk at all meetings of the Subscribers and Committees; make out the annual accounts for the auditor, and perform such other duties as the Committee of Management may direct.

36. The Matron shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, subject to three months' notice on either side; she shall devote the whole of her time to her duties, and shall see that the affairs of the Hospital and Home are conducted with the greatest possible attention to regularity, cleanliness, and economy, and shall conform to such By-Laws and instructions as the Committee of Management may from time to time decide upon.

37. The Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers shall be held at the Hospital on the Third Thursday in January in each year, or within 28 days thereof (of which seven days' notice shall be given by circular), for the purpose of receiving the reports of the Committee and Auditor, determining if any and what substantial alterations of or additions to buildings, shall be undertaken, and for electing the members of the Committee of Management and an Auditor. Nominations for election to the Committee of Management, signed by two subscribers as proposer and seconder, must reach the Secretary at least fourteen days before the Annual General Meeting.

38. The Chairman of the Committee of Management shall, within ten days after receiving a requisition in writing, signed by five Subscribers, convene by circular a special meeting of Subscribers for considering the purpose stated in such requisition only.

39. The Committee of Management shall have power to make such By-Laws (not inconsistent with these rules and regulations) as they may think necessary for the internal management of the Hospital and Home, and alter and annul the same as occasion may require; such new By-Laws to be in force until confirmed or otherwise at the next Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers, and printed copies of such By-Laws shall be affixed in conspicuous parts of the Hospital and Home, for the guidance of the Officers and the observance of the patients.

40. No general rule or regulation shall be altered, except by the Subscribers at the Annual General Meeting, or at a meeting specially called for the purpose; in all cases 14 days' notice shall be given to the Secretary of the proposed new rule; and seven days' notice shall be given by the Secretary to all Subscribers (together with the names of the Subscribers proposing the same), prior to the holding of the meeting at which such alteration is proposed to be made.

41. At all meetings, whether of the Subscribers or of the Committee of Management, all questions shall be decided by the vote of the majority of those present. In the event of the voting being equal the presiding Chairman of the meeting shall be entitled to give a second or casting vote. In no case is it permissible to vote by proxy.
