INFORMATION TO SUBSCRIBERS.

The following cases only are admitted to the ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL: Rheumatic and kindred Diseases (Arthritis, Myalgia, Neuritis, &c.), Disorders of the Liver, Gout, Lead Poisoning and Skin Diseases.

The following cases are NOT eligible for admission to EITHER Institution:—

- (1) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (2) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (3) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (4) Persons suffering from fits or of unsound mind.
- (5) Persons suffering from neurasthenia.
- (6) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.
- (7) Persons of such advanced age or in such impaired health as to be unfit to undergo the treatment provided.

Cases convalescent from an infectious disease are not admissible until the expiration of six weeks from the period of infection ceasing.

Patients are admitted in the order in which the Recommendations are received. As there is usually a long Waiting List early application is desirable.

Patients must not present themselves for admission until they have received an Admission Card from the Secretary.

The Hon. Physicians attend on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays at 2 p.m. to admit Patients. Punctual attendance is essential.

Any infringement of the rules or any misconduct will render the Patient liable to instant dismissal.

The Committee of Management have many Applications each year from Patients for admission, which they are reluctantly compelled to refuse. Subscribers, who may have no Patients to recommend, are earnestly requested to send their Recommendations to the Secretary, that they may be used by the Committee for such deserving cases.

Visiting Days : Saturdays and Sundays, 2-0—4-30 p.m.

The Hospital is just under a mile from the Railway Station.

All Subscriptions are due annually on January 1st in each year and all Recommendations must be paid for in advance.

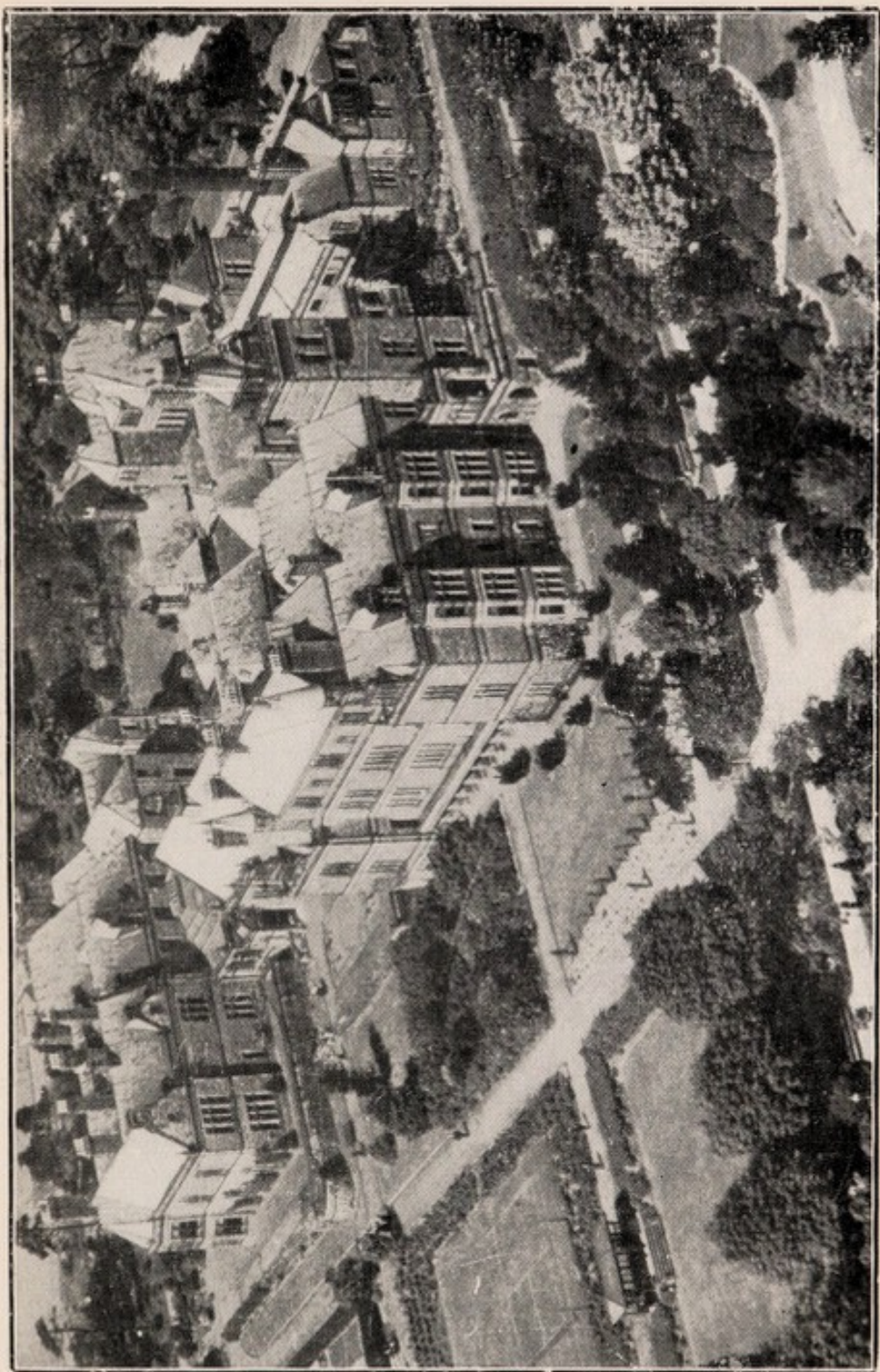
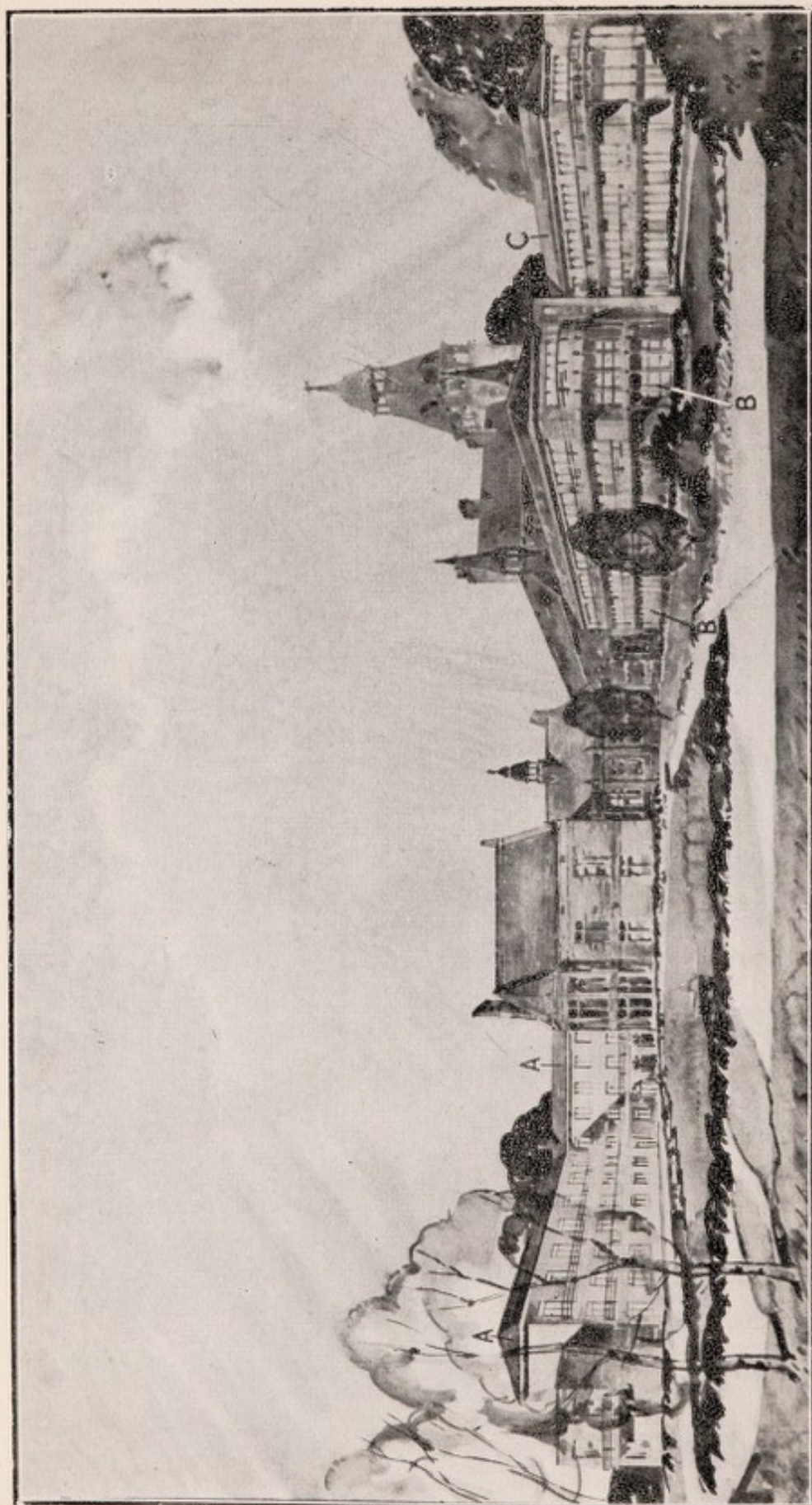


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VIEW FROM AIR OF THE HOSPITAL AND GROUNDS.

ANNUAL MEETING,

Thursday, 20th January, 1938.

The 112th Annual General Meeting of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home was held on Thursday, 20th January, 1938.

The Right Honourable The Earl of Harewood, K.G., G.C.V.O., D.S.O., presided. Among those present were The Right Honourable Viscount Mountgarret (President), C. A. Rhodes, Esq., J.P. (Vice-President), The Mayor of Harrogate (Ald. J. B. Charles, J.P.), Col. E. W. Stanyforth, C.B., Col. W. F. Collins, D.S.O., Sir Loraine G. Dunbar, C. E. Carter, Esq., J.P., (Chairman Board of Management), Stanley Barnes, Esq. (Hon. Treasurer), R. A. Breare, Esq., Herbert Crowther, Esq., LL.B., W. H. Ferrand, Esq., J.P., C. A. Laurence, Esq., W. Apologies for absence were received from Matthew Stephenson, Esq., J.P., Dr. L. J. Hobson (Vice-Presidents); Major J. W. Dent, J.P., Sir John Eaglesome, K.C.M.G., The Archdeacon of Leeds (The Ven. D. M. M. Bartlett), Major J. W. Tattersall-Wright, H. Chapman, Esq., J.P., Mr. and Mrs. W. Arthur Taylor, Mr. J. S. Holmes, Mrs. Norton, Dr. Geoffrey Holmes, Dr. J. L. Wesley-Smith, Dr. H. Mathers and Dr. Muriel Keyes.

LORD HAREWOOD, in moving the adoption of the Reports and Accounts, drew attention to the increased cost per head, due largely to the general rise in the cost of living. The significance of that fact should not be overlooked. The Committee had decided that certain alterations and extensions were necessary. Because of that decision, with which he entirely agreed, **the supporters of the Hospital would have to put all their energy into that support, so that they might be able to bring the Hospital into the highest possible state of efficiency in the future,** and at the same time maintain their traditional position of carrying on without a debt. It was not the intention of the Committee to rush into extravagant expenditure, until they

saw first where the money was coming from. Although research was valuable he hoped the Committee would never lose sight of the fact that their first responsibility was to alleviate the sufferings of their patients.

MR. STANLEY BARNES (Hon. Treasurer) seconding the motion, referred to a slight falling off of subscribers, and said this seemed to show that new supporters were not coming forward in sufficient numbers to replace those who, for various reasons, had fallen out. He hoped that the coming year would show improvement in that respect. The expenses were up by about £600. This was largely due to the great increase in the cost of living and it spoke rather well that the rise had not been greater. The Laboratory was doing remarkably good work but there was a deficit on it of about £500 and, until they could get something by way of further endowment, they would have to go on bearing the expenditure as best they could. The extensions contemplated would necessitate a much larger income, which he estimated at between £3,500 and £4,000 a year. Failing increased support the only alternative would be to fall back on their endowments, and that was one of the things which no Hospital should be called upon to do.

The Reports and Balance Sheet were unanimously adopted.

LORD HAREWOOD moved a vote of thanks to the Chairman and Committee of Management and proposed the re-election of the following members due to retire by rotation:—Sir John Eaglesome, K.C.M.G., Messrs. C. A. Laurence and W. Townend, and that Mr. A. Woodhead be elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. H. Chapman. Also that the nominees of the Hon. Medical Staff—Dr. R. Nimmo Watson, Dr. W. Yeoman, Dr. T. Glen Reah and Dr. D. H. Collins be, and are hereby, appointed representatives on the General Committee.

Lord Harewood emphasised the great amount of work which the Committee had been put to in going through the various schemes which had been submitted to them for developing the Hospital on right lines. They had taken a great deal of trouble and, he was glad to think, had exercised due regard for economy and in the future intended to launch their scheme of development. The Committee deserved their thanks for their management of the Hospital during the past year.

MR. C. A. RHODES seconding, said that the subscribers to the Hospital had every reason to congratulate themselves upon last year's Committee. It was many years since the Hospital had shown a deficit and this year there was a small profit. He saw no chance of a reduction of the cost of living in the immediate future, but he felt sure the subscribers would acknowledge what was due to the Committee for their careful management in making income meet expenditure. With regard to the Appeal he thought they could rely on the Committee not to embark upon any expense until they saw where the money was coming from. Doubtless the first requirements of the Hospital would be the first charges on whatever was received from the Appeal. Research work was a long process and called for great patience, but it was another aspect altogether of their activities; their first task was to alleviate suffering.

MR. C. E. CARTER (Chairman of the Committee of Management) replying, said they had been fortunate for many years in being able to live within their income but the time had come when they must rely more on outside support. It was true that expenses had gone up, but there was also the possibility that income might increase and so enable them to meet the extra expenditure. Their work and their need for help were not sufficiently well known; their patients were drawn from all over the British Isles; less than 4% were Harrogate people. They had a right to expect support from all parts of the country to help in raising the funds that were required. The Hospital was truly a National Hospital though unfortunately many people still regarded it as a purely Harrogate Institution. Their technical adviser had told them that their boiler equipment was inadequate and rapidly growing obsolete. It was imperative that this state of affairs should be remedied without delay and instructions had been given for the architect to prepare the necessary plans. Again, the accommodation for their nurses was scattered and barely sufficient for their needs. They must make better provision in this respect when such things were being done everywhere for nursing staffs. They would therefore have to go in for a Nurses' Home. The Medical Staff were always asking for more and put forward suggestions with which they were entirely in sympathy. They wanted their patients to have all the help that was humanly possible, so that when a poor man came for treatment he would be as well looked after and helped to get better as his more wealthy brother who came to the town under different conditions.

SIR L. G. DUNBAR proposed, and MR. W. TOWNEND seconded a vote of thanks to Mr. Stanley Barnes for his services as Hon. Treasurer, and proposed his re-election for the following year.

The motion was carried, and MR. BARNES replied.

COL. W. F. COLLINS, D.S.O., moving a vote of thanks to the members of the Hon. Medical Staff and their re-appointment, with the additions of Dr. C. T. Gasking and Dr. H. Mathers as Assistant Hon. Physicians, said the Medical Staffs of all Hospitals earned their deepest thanks and admiration. Their devotion to duty did not receive the recognition it deserved. It was only due to the Medical Staff that acknowledgement should be made of the enormous amount of work which they did.

MR. HERBERT CROWTHER seconding, said voluntaryism was one of the great principles of their national life and at no time had they had a greater number of people giving their services to social work. In this respect the Hospital was extremely fortunate and they owed a great debt of gratitude to the Staff for maintaining the health of the patients and perpetuating traditions which were the pride of this country and the envy of others.

DR. W. YEOMAN (Chairman of the Medical Staff) responding, said it was a great privilege and pleasure to work for such a Hospital. Their work entailed infinite patience and sympathetic understanding of each individual case, but dealing as they did with a disease process of long standing they could not hope for speedy or dramatic results. An excellent team spirit prevailed among the whole staff so that the work was carried out smoothly and efficiently. They were very gratified that the Committee had decided to proceed with a public appeal to increase the accommodation in the Hospital. They would then be able to study the more acute stages of rheumatism under the most advantageous conditions. The Empire Rheumatism Research Council had been set up to tackle the whole problem and he thought they might well consider the enlargement of the Spa Hospitals as an integral part of their scheme. It was more economical to expand a unit already in existence which was known to be doing good work than to start a new one in a new area, and he hoped that the appeal would receive sympathetic

and practical recognition and support from the Council in due course. He could assure them that the Staff would do all in their power to further the interest of the Hospital during the strenuous days ahead.

MR. T. B. NEWTON (Newcastle) proposed, and DR. G. L. KERR PRINGLE seconded the re-election of the Auditors, Messrs. Lowrey, Weston and Whalley (Leeds and Harrogate).

VISCOUNT MOUNTGARRET, moving a vote of thanks to Lord Harewood for presiding, said they were grateful to him for all that he had done and was doing to help the Hospital in every way he could. His voluntary work did not get less as the years went by, yet his interest in and work for the Hospital was increasing, as was evidenced by his readiness to broadcast an appeal on behalf of the Hospital.

THE MAYOR (Ald. J. Boehrer Charles) said that as they knew he had, with his numerous engagements, a pretty crowded time, but, after all, his lasted only for a year, whereas Lord Harewood's public life went on for ever.

LORD HAREWOOD, acknowledging, said he hoped that in a year or two they would have built a new Nurses' Home and that they would be even more proud of their buildings than they were of the existing buildings.

Report of the Committee of Management.

PERSONAL.

The departure of Mr. C. A. Laurence from Harrogate has created a vacancy which will be difficult to fill. Despite the handicap of indifferent health, Mr. Laurence has taken an active interest in the affairs of the Hospital and has seized many opportunities of promoting its welfare. Although it will be necessary

to find a successor in the Chairmanship of the House Committee, it is greatly to be hoped that Mr. Laurence will consent to continue to serve on the Board of Management, where his astute judgment and practical counsel will be of great value.

It is with genuine regret that your Committee has accepted the resignation of the Matron, Miss A. Mossman, who will end her connection with the Hospital early in the New Year. Miss Mossman, who is a friend of the Hospital of many years' standing, came to the help of the Board of Management at no little personal sacrifice, rather more than two years ago at a difficult time. By her tact, patience and personal example of tireless devotion to duty she has triumphed over many obstacles and leaves her post with the affectionate esteem of all who have been privileged to work with and under her. It is the sincere hope of your Committee that Miss Mossman may be spared for many years to enjoy the retirement which she has so well earned.

As her successor your Committee has appointed from sixty applicants Miss Ethel Hayes, who comes with excellent credentials from London and the South.

Although the past year has been marked by no events of striking importance it may well prove to have been momentous in the history of the Hospital. The formation of an Empire Rheumatism Council for the promotion of Research together with a campaign headed by The Minister of Health and Lord Horder is arousing public interest in the far reaching aspects, physical and economic, of this disease. The Minister of Health has stated that Rheumatism is responsible for no less than one-sixth of our industrial invalidism and costs the Nation annually £17,000,000, with a loss of approximately $5\frac{1}{2}$ millions of working weeks. Such figures emphasise the need for vigorous action on a large scale and your Committee feels that a National Specialising Hospital, such as this, which enjoys very special opportunities for research and clinical facilities, must not lag behind in this crusade. They therefore asked the Honorary Medical Staff to sketch in outline, and in order of importance, developments for future years which they regard as essential and desirable. This programme has been subjected to prolonged and cautious scrutiny by a sub-committee appointed for the purpose, and the architect engaged by them has set out its various features. Your Committee has decided to make a public appeal for £70,000 and has appointed Mr. J. Taberner from York as whole-time Appeal Organiser. The sum asked for may appear

to be large but it is many years since the Hospital made any general appeal for funds and, as has been already stated, the purpose for which it is needed is increasingly recognised as one of urgent national importance. Mr. Taberner's office will be in the "Herald Buildings," which occupy a central position in the town and your Committee desires to take this opportunity of thanking most cordially one of its members, Mr. R. A. Breare, who has so generously placed this accommodation at their disposal free of all cost. As no rooms are available in the Hospital itself, the value of this offer free of rent, rates, heating and lighting is deeply appreciated.

As the first item in this programme your Committee has decided to proceed with the building of a Nurses' Home. It is fully expected that in the future considerable additions will have to be made to the Nursing Staff as the work develops in extent and complexity. At the present time the available accommodation is taxed to the full and the Staff has to be housed in different parts of the buildings a condition of affairs which complicates administration and does not conduce to efficiency.

Apart from its plans for the future your Committee has decided that a new and larger Boiler House is an imperative need. The present plant is barely adequate to meet the routine demands made upon it and there is no reserve for additional requirements or in the event of a breakdown. The approximate estimate for this is £6,000 and the Architect is now engaged upon the plans and specifications.

In the early part of the year the Hospital was most fortunate in enjoying almost complete immunity from the widely prevalent influenza epidemic. This was remarkable in view of the fact that fresh patients were arriving almost daily from affected centres. Apart from a rather exceptionally long list of casualties among the domestic staff the health of the Staff has been good.

During the past year a heating installation has been supplied to the existing Sisters' Wing, and an automatic stoker has been fitted to the Robin Hood heating boiler. This it is hoped will effect a considerable saving in fuel charges and maintain an even temperature throughout the day and night.

The Fire Policy on the buildings has been increased from £60,100 to £112,000 at an annual premium of £89-17-0.

The Annual Meeting of the Yorkshire Branch of the British Medical Association was held at the Hospital on 26th June, when Dr. Geoffrey Holmes was elected President for the forthcoming year and delivered his Presidential Address.

The figures for Bath treatments show an increase of 541, despite the fewer number of patients admitted; and the Swedish Remedial Exercises (Men) have jumped from 339 to 732, an increase of 393. Dry Massage on the other hand has dropped by nearly 2,000. Electrical treatments show a total increase of 245. Two or three other methods appear to have fallen into complete disuse but the Ultra Violet Ray has risen from 360 to 504 and the Infra Red Ray installed during the year, has been used in no fewer than 681 cases. The number of Radiographic examinations is almost identical with that of 1936, 892 as against 875, and details are given, for the first time, showing particulars of the various films taken. A further innovation is the list for the plaster casts, etc., taken.

Your Committee again desires to express its thanks to the Baths and Wells Committee of the Harrogate Corporation and to the General Manager of the Royal Baths, Mr. H. Roberts, for their unfailing courtesy and sympathetic co-operation in supplying various mineral waters and Harrogate Mud in addition to the use of three wells in the Valley Gardens at a purely nominal rent.

FINANCE.

That the results for the past year are by no means so good as those for 1936 is briefly accounted for by the facts that expenditure has increased and receipts have decreased. For the former something must be attributed to the rise in the cost of living, especially of such important items as fuel and bread, and exceptional expenditure has been increased by painting exterior iron work (£90) and installing a Robot Automatic Stoker (£250), both of which items have been met out of current income. And though the figures under the different headings might, in many instances, have been expected to show a reduction in view of the fact that fewer patients were admitted, they, on the contrary, show marked similarity to the figures of the previous year. In these circumstances an increase in the maintenance costs per head is seen to be inevitable. This has risen from £1-18-10 per week to £2-1-5, an increase of 2/7 per week, or roughly 10/- per month. The full significance of this is best realised in the case of a patient who comes for a month on

two recommendations given by a subscriber whose forms are issued on the old terms of one guinea each. If the patient pays the Board Fees, the total amount received for four weeks is four guineas, whereas the cost to the Hospital is no less than £8-5-8 or nearly twice that amount. To make good this difference involves a heavy drain upon all other sources of income, such as Investments, Donations, Hospital Sunday Collections, etc. Even under the most favourable conditions, where the payment made is £7 per month there is the far from negligible difference of £1-5-8 in respect of each individual case.

On the income side there are noticeable reductions in the receipts from annual subscriptions (£170) and each of the items grouped under Services Rendered shows a falling off amounting to no less than £400, and nothing has been received by grants from the Approved Societies. The fall in Bank Interest is offset and explained by the increase in the Dividends from Investments.

The surplus for the year £494 representing approximately 4% may in all the circumstances, be regarded as satisfactory, though it should give cause for no undue complacency. That the Hospital is alive to the need for maintaining and developing its efficiency is in itself likely to preclude the possibility of the balances of past years recurring in the future.

Though a surplus of £23 on the Convalescent Home has been converted into a loss of £28, the income has maintained itself and shows a slight increase. Here, income is handicapped by a relatively small endowment, a remark which applies still more to the Laboratory, the working expenses of which continue to rise year by year in the face of a stationary income. The actual rise in expenditure, £50, is however more than accounted for by the purchase of a microscope (£62).

Lastly, your Committee desires to express its sincere thanks to all those who have in any way supported the work of the Hospital during the past year. Many of them are subscribers of long standing and their constancy and loyalty are of more than merely financial value to those who are devoting their services voluntarily to the interests of the institutions under their management. It should not be unreasonable to hope that considerable additions will be made to their number as the result of the greater publicity which the work of the Hospital is to receive during 1938. In this connection your Committee is much gratified to be able to inform its supporters that Lord

Harewood has kindly consented to broadcast an appeal on behalf of the Hospital. It is hoped to arrange with the British Broadcasting Corporation for this to take place sometime during 1938.

LEGACIES.

The only sums received during the year have been from the Executors of the late Mrs. M. A. Morris £250 ; and a seventh distribution from the estate of the late Mrs. A. E. Richardson of £112-10-0. These sums have been placed to the credit of the Hospital Endowment account for investment.

Report of the Hon. Medical Staff.

During the past few years there has been evidence of an increasing national interest in rheumatic disorders and of a wider recognition of the importance of these disorders not only from the medical but from the economic aspects.

The work of the Royal Bath Hospital in investigating the causes and combating the effects of Rheumatism has often been stressed, but the value of the treatments given at the Hospital is best exemplified by the fact that, in spite of the establishment of clinics and treatment centres in many areas, there is no diminution, but rather an increase, in the demand for admission to the Hospital from all over the country.

The Hospital has thus available a vast field of clinical material for investigation into the nature and treatment of Rheumatism of which the Research Fellow and the Medical Staff endeavour to make the fullest use. It is worthy of particular note that amongst the patients admitted there is a small proportion suffering from the less common forms of Rheumatism and from the rarer diseases of the bones and joints. It has not infrequently been found that by the investigation of rare diseases knowledge has been obtained of the normal mechanism of the body and also information of much value acquired on the more common diseases.

The Hospital has well equipped Radiological and Pathological Departments, but if it is to maintain its position as a centre of treatment and research in the Rheumatic Disorders, it is imperative that the wards of the Hospital be modernised. The necessity for wards for bed cases becomes more and more urgent and their provision increasingly essential for the treatment of the more acute forms of Rheumatism, for surgical treatment of the deformities resulting from Rheumatism and for various investigations which can only be carried out under constant ward observation.

The Medical Staff welcomes therefore the decision of the Committee of Management to make an Appeal for funds in order to enable these additions and alterations to be made.

The plans include the provision of a Deep Pool Bath and a Hubbard Tank both of which are now being extensively used in Balneo-therapy, the form of treatment upon which the reputation of the Hospital was founded and is being maintained. It may be emphasised that the enlargement of the Hospital will throw an added strain on the accommodation of the Bath House which is already taxed to its utmost, and it is hoped that it will be possible to reconstruct this department.

The Committee of Management continues readily to co-operate with the Medical Staff in maintaining the equipment of the Hospital in an efficient state and during the past year a modern Infra-Red Lamp, a new anaesthetic apparatus, and a new dental chair are items of major expenditure which will be of great value to the departments concerned. The conversion of one of the baths to enable Nauheim Baths to be given will be of great use in the treatment of the more debilitated patients.

A warm welcome is given to Dr. C. T. Gasking and Dr. H. Mathers who have been appointed Honorary Assistant Physicians.

Much more special use of the Sulphur Water for lavage (rectal and other) would be made, if facilities within the Hospital were available.

MURIEL KEYES, L.R.C.P., L.R.F.P.S.,

Research Department.

During the past year the work of the department has again been directed to research into the aetiology of the rheumatic diseases and of rheumatoid arthritis in particular. Researches into causation of disease demand careful investigation and analysis of clinical symptoms and of pathological phenomena as well as experimental work of many types. The rheumatism research organization of the University of Leeds in conjunction with this Hospital provides exceptional opportunities for all such investigations, and after more than three years' work here, I am assured that there is nowhere at the present time a scheme for research into this particular subject founded on a better plan, a plan which is not only wide enough to allow for new investigations as the occasion demands but a plan which is also capable of great expansion when the time comes. Since there is now an increasing number of men engaged on rheumatism research in other centres both at home and abroad, and since almost any investigation could be carried out here, it has been important to decide on the particular lines of inquiry which can be pursued more efficiently here than elsewhere. My visit last year to America, by acquainting me with contemporary research into rheumatism has been of great value in making this decision. With these considerations, I have deemed it important to devote the greater part of my time to the collection of pathological data with a view to contributing something to the fundamental pathological knowledge of rheumatic disease, the paucity of which has been so grave a disadvantage in its scientific study. The observation of patients in the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital and the accumulation of related data from clinical and radiological examinations made here should enhance the value of this work. It may be emphasised that there are few workers engaged on the scientific and laboratory study of rheumatism who have better opportunities of maintaining direct contact with the clinical manifestations of the disease and that the large number of patients suffering from the rarer as well as the commoner forms of the disease is highly advantageous to this study.

A further investigation which is being made here concerns the reactions of the peripheral circulation in rheumatism to temperature influences. This work is an extension of that which was proceeding here before the new research organisation came into being. Apart from some recent observations on the reactions of the blood cells to certain methods of physical treatment, and some work on the reactions to gold therapy

which our late house-physician has completed, therapeutic investigations have been in abeyance. This has been due to the difficulty in estimating the lasting effects of treatment in this Hospital in which there is no out-patient or "after-care" clinic. Many patients from distant parts of the country are completely lost sight of, and the three or four weeks for which an in-patient stays is often too short a period on which to make a sound assessment of progress. It would be of great value for research into treatment if the Hospital were equipped with wards into which the more seriously ill patients could be admitted for long periods.

I am very grateful for the way in which every encouragement is given to the research work by all members of the Hospital staff and by the Board of Management.

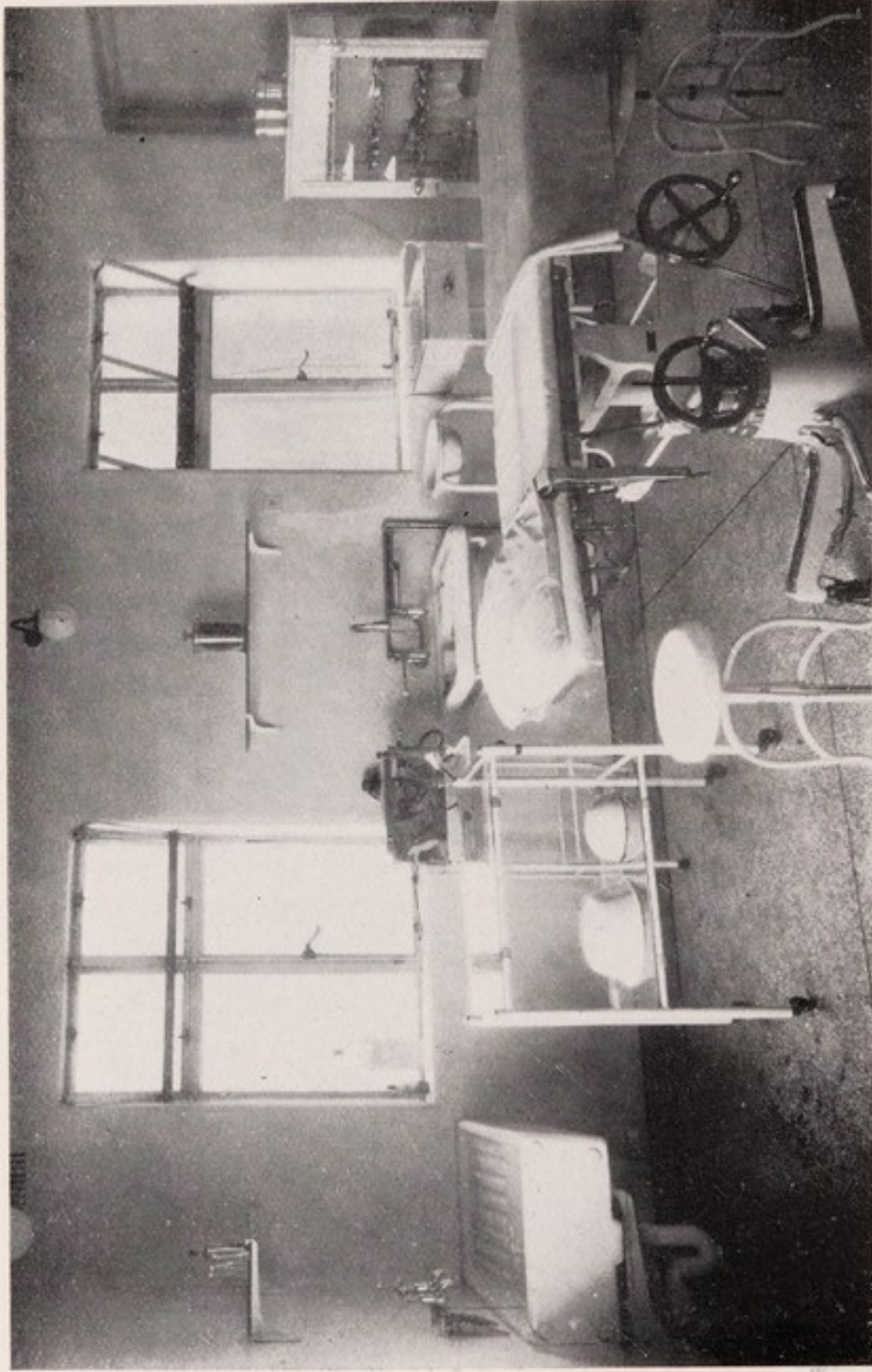

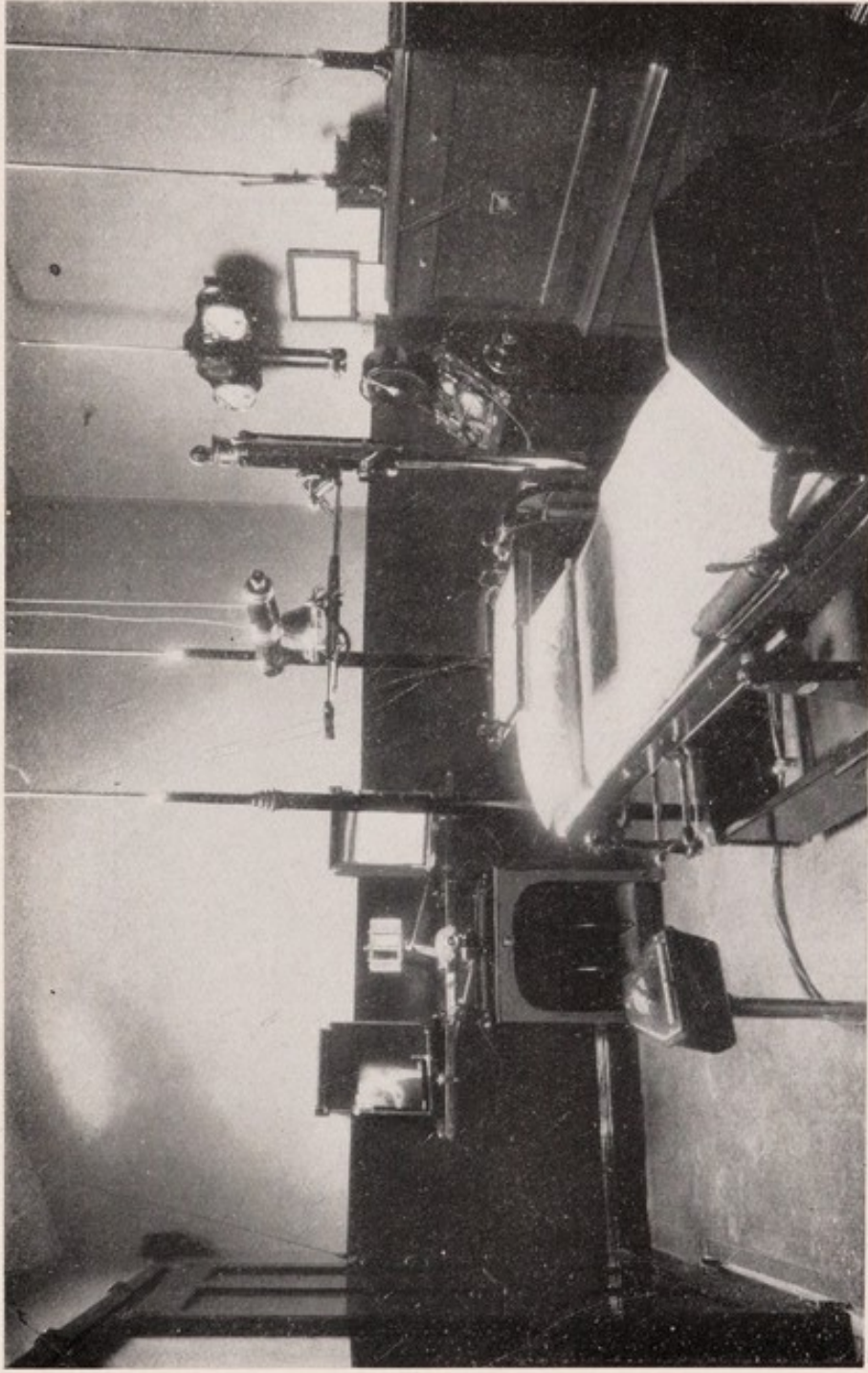

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RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE HARROGATE ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL.

Revised February, 1934.

Title and Purposes of the Hospital.

1. The Hospital having been built with a view to affording to deserving persons, free of expense, the benefits of the Harrogate waters and treatment, shall be denominated "THE HARROGATE ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL." No patients shall be admitted except such as in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and the Committee of Management are suitable cases for such treatment.

Constitution.

2. The Officers shall consist of a Patron, President, Vice-Presidents, Twelve Trustees, Honorary Consulting Physicians, Honorary Physicians and the Honorary Treasurer.

3. All the real estate belonging to the Hospital shall be vested in the names of six Trustees, and the personal estate in the names of six Trustees, but subject to the control of the Subscribers as to any appropriation for the benefit of the Hospital, which may be agreed upon by them at any annual general meeting, or special meeting called for the purpose.

4. Whenever the number of Trustees, either of the real or personal trust estate, shall be reduced to three by all or any of the following means, viz., death, resignation, refusal, incapacity to act, or permanent residence out of England, the Committee of Management (as specified in Rule 27) shall by any writing under their hand fill up the vacancies by appointing three new Trustees, and upon every such appointment the surviving or continuing Trustees shall transfer such real or personal trust estate respectively vested in them so as to vest it respectively jointly in the surviving or continuing Trustees and such new Trustees.

Privileges of Subscribers.

5. Recommendations for the admission of Patients are issued on the following terms:—

(a) To Regular Annual Subscribers one recommendation for each Two Guineas subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued:

PROVIDED ALWAYS that Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards whose names appear in the Subscription List for 1924 shall, so long as they continue to subscribe annually, retain the privilege of recommending one patient for each guinea so subscribed, the number of recommendations to be issued at this rate to such old subscribers to be limited and determined by the amount of the first subscription sent in any one year, but in no case shall exceed Five. Old Subscribers entitled to this privilege who require to recommend additional patients beyond the number to which they may be entitled by their first subscription in any year may do so on payment of Two Guineas for each additional recommendation.

(b) To Occasional Subscribers (*i.e.* persons whose names have not appeared in the Subscription List for the preceding year) at the rate of one recommendation for every £2 10s. 0d. subscribed.

N.B.—Patients using these recommendation forms (a) and (b) will be expected to pay on admission a sum of 10s. 6d. per week towards the cost of board.

(c) To Contributory Schemes, Societies, and other bodies of persons, etc., which offer their members or contributors Hospital or Convalescent benefit, one recommendation for each £3 10s. 0d. paid, being at the rate of 5s. per day for a minimum period of two weeks, and pro rata for each additional week's stay.

N.B.—Patients admitted under these recommendations (c) will NOT be charged the Board Fee of 10s. 6d.

(d) Every donor of £40 to the Endowment Fund shall be a Life Subscriber, and shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for every full sum of £40 so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued.

(e) Executors of persons bequeathing sums of money to the Endowment Fund of the Hospital shall be entitled to ONE recommendation for every £25 paid to the Treasurer, but to not more than FOUR, whatever the amount of the legacy bequeathed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which the Legacy is paid, or in the following year.

(f) Every Clergyman, or minister of any Denomination, who shall transmit a congregational collection to the Treasurer, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. so contributed during the year.

(g) Every Hotel, Boarding-house, or Lodging-house Keeper or other person, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. collected and paid to the Treasurer during the year.

These recommendations (f) and (g) shall be available within 12 calendar months from the date of issue.

6. In no case shall any part of the cost of a recommendation be paid by the patient or any member of his or her family. Any such payment shall disqualify for admission.

7. Recommendations for the Hospital will be available for the Rawson Convalescent Home should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.

8. The following cases only are admitted to the Hospital: Skin Diseases, Rheumatism and kindred diseases (Arthritis, Myalgia and Neuritis), Disorders of the Liver, Gout and Lead Poisoning.

The following cases are **not** eligible for admission :

- (1) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (2) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (3) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (4) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (5) Persons suffering from fits or of unsound mind.
- (6) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.

9. Cases convalescent from an infectious disease shall be inadmissible until a term of six weeks has elapsed from the period of infection ceasing.

10. The Committee of Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Hospital, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE RAWSON CONVALESCENT HOME.

Revised February, 1934.

Title and Purposes of the Home.

11. The Rawson Convalescent Home, having been erected in connection with the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital on land the property of the said Hospital, shall be conducted under the Officers and Committee of Management of the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital, with the addition of the three Trustees hereinafter referred to.

12. The Institution shall be used solely as a Convalescent Home. Only such patients shall be admitted as obtain a recommendation from a Subscriber of the Home or Hospital, and are, in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and Committee of Management, suitable. It is contrary to the design of the Home to relieve persons whose circumstances enable them to pay the full cost of a visit to Harrogate.

Constitution.

13. The Property belonging to this Institution shall be vested in three Trustees. Any vacancy in their number to be filled up by the remaining Trustee or Trustees.

14. The Convalescent Home shall be charged for all expenses of the Hospital and Home in proportion to the number of patients admitted. Donations from Hotels, Lodging-houses, Hospital Sunday, and other sources of revenue (excepting legacies or donations to the endowment funds, which shall be kept separate) shall be apportioned on the same principle. This apportionment of receipts and expenses shall commence January 1st, 1898, and shall not be altered without the approval of a Committee consisting of the Patron, the Chairman of the Committee of Management, the Honorary Treasurer, and the Home Trustees for the time being.

Privileges of Subscribers.

15. Recommendations for admission of Patients are issued on the following terms:—

(a) Annual subscribers of Two guineas and upwards shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for each Two guineas so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued :

PROVIDED ALWAYS that Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards whose names appear in the Subscription List for 1924 shall, so long as they continue to subscribe annually, retain the privilege of recommending one patient for each guinea so subscribed, the number of recommendations to be issued at this rate to such old subscribers to be limited and determined by the amount of the first subscription sent in any one year, but in no case shall exceed Five. Old Subscribers entitled to this privilege who require to recommend additional patients beyond the number to which they may be entitled by their first subscription in any year may do so on payment of Two Guineas for each additional recommendation.

(b) To Occasional Subscribers (*i.e.* persons whose names have not appeared in the Subscription List for the preceding year) at the rate of one recommendation for every £2 10s. 0d. subscribed.

N.B.—Patients using these recommendation forms (a) and (b) will be expected to pay on admission a sum of 10s. 6d. per week towards the cost of board.

(c) To Contributory Schemes, Societies and other bodies of persons, etc. which offer their members or contributors Hospital or Convalescent benefit, one recommendation for each £3 10s. 0d. paid, being at the rate of 5s. per day for a minimum period of two weeks, and pro rata for each additional week's stay.

N.B.—Patients admitted under these recommendations (c) will NOT be charged the Board Fee of 10s. 6d.

(d) Every donor of £40 or upwards to the Endowment Fund shall be a Life Subscriber, and be entitled to recommend one patient annually for every full sum of £40 so subscribed. These Recommendations are only available in the year in which they are issued.

(e) Executors of persons bequeathing sums of money to the Endowment Fund of the Home shall be entitled to ONE recommendation for every £25 paid to the Treasurer, but to not more than FOUR, whatever the amount of the legacy bequeathed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which the Legacy is paid, or in the following year.

(f) Every Clergyman or Minister of any Denomination who shall transmit a congregational collection to the Treasurer shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. contributed during that year.

(g) Every Hotel Proprietor, Boarding-house, Lodging-house keeper or other person, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. collected and paid to the Treasurer during the year.

These recommendations (f) and (g) shall be available within 12 calendar months of the date of issue.

Admission by Payment.

16. In certain cases approved by the Committee patients may be admitted to the Home without recommendation on their own payment in advance at the rate of one pound fifteen shillings for each week.

17. Recommendations for the Home will be available for the Royal Bath Hospital should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.

18. Convalescent cases, or cases of debility, are eligible for admission to the Home.

The following cases are **not** eligible :—

- (1) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (2) Persons in advanced stages of consumption.
- (3) Persons suffering from any skin disease.
- (4) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (5) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (6) Persons subject to fits or of unsound mind.
- (7) Persons incapable of attending to themselves

19. Cases convalescent from an infectious disease are not admissible until the expiration of six weeks from the period of the infection ceasing.

20. The Committee of Management reserve the right to refuse admission or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Convalescent Home, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.

By-Laws and Regulations for Patients.

21. Every applicant for admission must procure a recommendation from a Subscriber, accompanied by the Certificate, properly filled up by a qualified Medical Practitioner, as to the suitability of the case. Each patient, when so admitted, shall pay a sum not exceeding 10/6 for each week of his or her stay towards the cost of his or her board, unless it be proved to the satisfaction of the Committee that such patient is entirely unable to meet such charge, in which case the Committee may, in their absolute discretion, remit such charge, either wholly or in part.

Each patient may be admitted for a period not exceeding two weeks on production of a Subscriber's recommendation, and shall be entitled to board, lodging, baths, medical attendance, &c. When further treatment is deemed desirable by the Hon. Physicians an extension of time may be granted, with the sanction of the Committee of Management, on production of a further recommendation for each two weeks of such extension.

22. No patient can be re-admitted until the expiration of three calendar months from the date when he or she was last discharged from the Hospital, except under special circumstances, and by special leave of the Committee of Management.

23. It shall be in the power of the Committee instantly to dismiss any patient who in their judgment conducts himself or herself in an improper manner, or who does not conform to the Rules, Regulations, and By-laws of the Institution.

24. Each patient is required to bring a proper change of clean body-linen, and to pay for the washing of it outside the Hospital.

RULES RELATING TO BOTH

The Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital and The Rawson Convalescent Home.

25. The Hospital shall be open throughout the year. The Home shall be opened in March each year and closed for the admission of patients on the second Thursday in November, or at such other times and such other periods in each year as the Committee of Management may decide to be necessary.

26. No Subscriber shall have power to recommend a patient or do any other special act until his or her subscription has been paid.

Annual Subscriptions shall be deemed due on the 1st January in each year.

When any subscription shall be in arrear for 2 years the subscriber's name shall be omitted from the published list.

27. The Government of the Royal Bath Hospital and of the Rawson Convalescent Home shall be vested in a Committee of Management consisting of the Patron, the President, the Vice-Presidents, the Trustees of both Institutions, the Honorary Consulting Physicians appointed before 31st December, 1930, (who shall be *ex-officio* members of the Committee until the Annual General Meeting of 1936), the Honorary Treasurer, four members of the Honorary Medical Staff (three at least of whom shall be Honorary Physicians), and sixteen other members, all of whom shall be elected by the subscribers at the Annual General Meeting. Of the sixteen other members four shall retire annually and shall be eligible for re-election. Three members of the Committee shall form a quorum.

28. The Committee shall have power to engage and dismiss all paid officials, to fix the amount of salaries, and make such orders, according to the spirit of these Rules, as they shall think expedient for the management of the Hospital and the Home.

Three or more of the Committee shall attend at the Hospital every Thursday afternoon to transact general business. In the event of a special meeting of the Committee being requisite, the same shall be called by the Secretary, when directed to do so by the chairman of the Committee or three of its members.

29. A House Committee shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, and shall meet at the Hospital as often as may be necessary, at such an hour as they may appoint. They shall examine the books of admission and discharge, and all other books kept by the officers, including the register of the attendance of the Honorary Physicians and Chaplain, and the "Visitors' Book." They shall investigate any complaint of neglect or misconduct of anyone connected with the Institution. They shall examine and sign all such accounts as may require to be laid before the next monthly meeting of the Committee of Management for payment. They shall procure and submit once a year to the Committee of Management for approval, all contracts for drugs, provisions, coals, &c., required for the use of the Hospital and Home. They shall examine, from time to time, the inventories of household goods, furniture, linen, &c., belonging to the Institutions. They shall replace and renew, from time to time, as circumstances may require, all such internal fittings and furniture of the Hospital and Home as may urgently require renewal, and shall superintend all alterations and improvements sanctioned by the Committee of Management, and shall be generally responsible for keeping the grounds and buildings in order.

30. Whenever a vacancy or vacancies shall occur in the Honorary Medical Staff, the Secretary shall, when requested by the Committee of Management, give notice thereof by advertisement in the Medical and Local Press. Applicants, who shall be fully qualified and registered, shall forward their diplomas and testimonials, if required, to the Committee of Management, who may thereupon proceed to election, or they may in their discretion defer the appointment to the next Annual General Meeting.

31. The Honorary Physicians or a sufficient number of them, shall attend at the Hospital on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, to examine applicants for admission; and shall visit the Hospital three times per week, or as often as they may think necessary.

32. The Committee shall have power on the recommendation of the Hon. Medical Staff to appoint such specialists in an honorary capacity as may conduce to the better treatment of the patients.

33. The Honorary Treasurer shall pay all monies which he shall receive to the credit of the Hospital and Home at its Bankers, and all payments due from the Hospital and Home shall be made by cheques, signed by himself and two of the Committee. He shall invest, on securities approved by the Committee, when requested by them, all monies available for investment.

34. The Auditor shall examine the accounts, and return the same properly audited, to the Secretary, within 14 days after they have been received, and shall receive such a fee as the Committee of Management may think proper.

35. The Secretary shall collect and forthwith pay over to the Treasurer all subscriptions; attend and act as Clerk at all meetings of the Subscribers and Committees; make out the annual accounts for the auditor, and perform such other duties as the Committee of Management may direct.

36. The Matron shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, subject to three months' notice on either side; she shall devote the whole of her time to her duties, and shall see that the affairs of the Hospital and Home are conducted with the greatest possible attention to regularity, cleanliness, and economy, and shall conform to such By-Laws and instructions as the Committee of Management may from time to time decide upon.

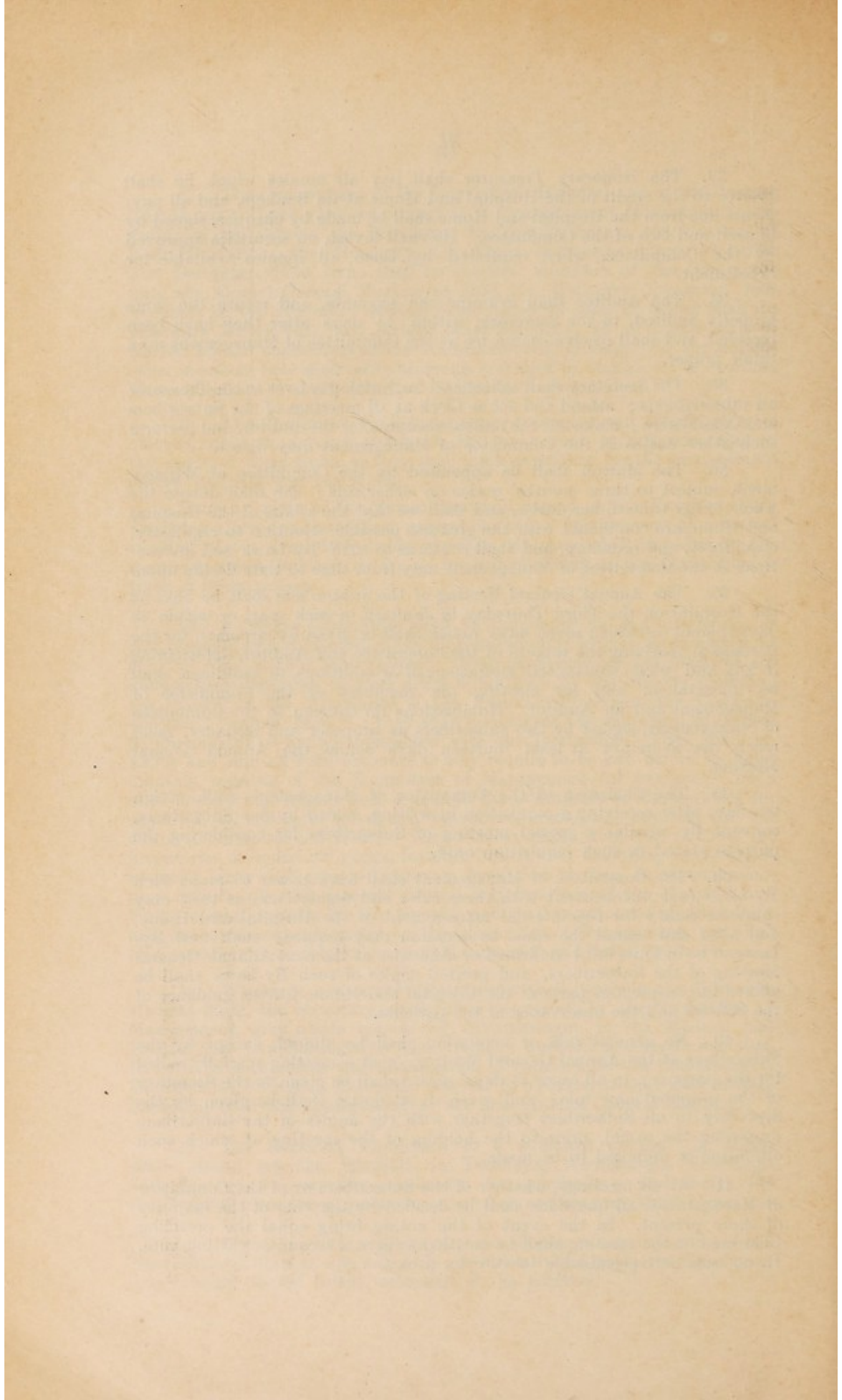
37. The Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers shall be held at the Hospital on the Third Thursday in January in each year, or within 28 days thereof (of which seven days' notice shall be given by circular), for the purpose of receiving the reports of the Committee and Auditor, determining if any and what substantial alterations of or additions to buildings, shall be undertaken, and for electing the members of the Committee of Management and an Auditor. Nominations for election to the Committee of Management, signed by two subscribers as proposer and seconder, must reach the Secretary at least fourteen days before the Annual General Meeting.

38. The Chairman of the Committee of Management shall, within ten days after receiving a requisition in writing, signed by five Subscribers, convene by circular a special meeting of Subscribers for considering the purpose stated in such requisition only.

39. The Committee of Management shall have power to make such By-Laws (not inconsistent with these rules and regulations) as they may think necessary for the internal management of the Hospital and Home, and alter and annul the same as occasion may require; such new By-Laws to be in force until confirmed or otherwise at the next Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers, and printed copies of such By-Laws shall be affixed in conspicuous parts of the Hospital and Home, for the guidance of the Officers and the observance of the patients.

40. No general rule or regulation shall be altered, except by the Subscribers at the Annual General Meeting, or at a meeting specially called for the purpose; in all cases 14 days' notice shall be given to the Secretary of the proposed new rule; and seven days' notice shall be given by the Secretary to all Subscribers (together with the names of the Subscribers proposing the same), prior to the holding of the meeting at which such alteration is proposed to be made.

41. At all meetings, whether of the Subscribers or of the Committee of Management, all questions shall be decided by the vote of the majority of those present. In the event of the voting being equal the presiding Chairman of the meeting shall be entitled to give a second or casting vote. In no case is it permissible to vote by proxy.
