

The following cases only are admitted to the ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL: Rheumatic and kindred Diseases (Arthritis, Myalgia, Neuritis, &c.), Disorders of the Liver, Gout, Lead Poisoning and Skin Diseases.

The following cases are NOT eligible for admission to EITHER Institution:—

- (1) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (2) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (3) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (4) Persons suffering from fits or of unsound mind.
- (5) Persons suffering from neurasthenia.
- (6) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.
- (7) Persons of such advanced age or in such impaired health as to be unfit to undergo the treatment provided.

Cases convalescent from an infectious disease are not admissible until the expiration of six weeks from the period of infection ceasing.

No Patient can be admitted except on the Recommendation of a Subscriber.

Recommendations are issued on the following terms :-

- To Regular Annual Private Subscribers at the rate of One Recommendation for each Two Guineas subscribed.
- (2) To Occasional Subscribers (i.e., persons whose names have not appeared in the Subscription List during the preceding year) at the rate of One Recommendation for every £2 10s. subscribed.
- (3) To Life Governors at the rate of One Recommendation Annually for Life for each Donation of £40.
- N.B.—Each Patient is expected on admission to pay 19/6 per week towards the cost of Board on forms (1), (2) or (3).
- (4) To Contributory Schemes, Societies, etc., which offer their members Hospital or Convalescent Home treatment, One Recommendation at the rate of £3 10s. (5/- per day) for a minimum stay of two weeks.
- (5) To every Clergyman, Minister, Hotel, Boarding House or Lodging House Proprietor or other person, collecting and paying over a sum of £3 3s. at the rate of One Recommendation for each £3 3s. collected.
- N.B.—Patients using Recommendation Forms (4) or (5) will NOT be charged the weekly Board Fee.

Recommendations are in no case issued to Patients or their Relatives.

Any payment to the Subscriber by a Patient or his or her Relatives of the whole or any part of the cost of a Recommendation will render such Recommendation invalid and disqualify such Patient for admission. Subscribers are requested to ascertain carefully the circumstances of each Patient before giving the Recommendation in order to prevent any abuse of the Charity.

One Recommendation entitles a Patient to Two Weeks' Medical Attendance and Treatment in the Hospital or Home. Should an extension of time be advised by the Hon. Physician, the Patient may remain upon the production of a further Recommendation and payment of the Board Fee for each additional Two weeks.

Recommendations for the Hospital are available for The Rawson Convalescent Home and vice versa, provided the cases are suitable.

ADMISSIONS BY PAYMENT.

In certain cases approved by the Committee, Patients unable to afford private treatment in Harrogate may be admitted to the Home without Recommendation on their own payment in advance at the rate of £3 10s. for Two Weeks, including maintenance.

GENERAL INFORMATION.

Patients of either sex from all parts of the United Kingdom are eligible for admission.

No Out-patients are accepted for treatment.

The Hospital is open throughout the year, and a larger number of patients can be admitted with little delay during the winter months.

Recommendations, with the Medical Certificate attached, must be properly filled up on both sides and signed by the Subscriber and by a registered Medical Practitioner respectively before being forwarded to the Secretary. Patients are admitted in the order in which the Recommendations are received. As there is usually a long Waiting List early application is desirable.

Patients must not present themselves for admission until they have received an Admission Card from the Secretary.

The Hon. Physicians attend on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays at 2 p.m. to admit Patients. Punctual attendance is essential.

Any infringement of the rules or any misconduct will render the Patient liable to instant dismissal.

The Committee of Management have many Applications each year from Patients for admission, which they are reluctantly compelled to refuse. Subscribers, who may have no Patients to recommend, are earnestly requested to send their Recommendations to the Secretary, that they may be used by the Committee for such deserving cases.

The Hospital is just under a mile from the Railway Station.


All Subscriptions are due annually on January 1st in each year and all Recommendations must be paid for in advance.

ANNUAL MEETING

Saturday, 3rd February, 1940.

The 114th Annual General Meeting of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home was held on Saturday, 3rd February, 1940.

The Right Hon. the Earl of Harewood, K.G., G.C.V.O., D.S.O., presided. Among those present were The Mayor of Harrogate (Coun. J. Carus Topham, J.P.), The Archdeacon of Leeds (The Ven. D. M. M. Bartlett), C. E. Carter, Esq., J.P. (Chairman of the Board of Management), Stanley Barnes, Esq. (Hon. Treasurer), Herbert Crowther, Esq., LL.B., J.P. (Hon. Treas. LORD HAREWOOD, in moving the adoption of the various Reports, advised the Committee of Management to express their wishes to the proper officials so that the Hospital might not be put to uses for which its equipment was altogether unsuited. The Hospital was now in an utterly different position from that of a year ago and there was very little to say about its future. His experience was that if you want something badly enough you generally get it, and if, from their experience of the Hospital, its layout and so forth, the Committee knew in what direction lay its most useful form of national service and properly put those views before the right authorities, they would probably prevail.

Mr. C. E. Carter (Chairman of the Board of Management) seconding, said that when the Ministry of Health took over the Hospital at the beginning of last September they increased the accommodation to 300 beds by adding 150 beds. This could only be done by utilising as wards, Bathrooms, Treatment Rooms, Recreation Rooms, etc. That was all very well so long as the Hospital was purely an air raid casualty Base Hospital, but if they were to do any of the work for which they were specially equipped—that is the treatment of rheumatism cases—then these rooms would have to be cleared and made available for their ordinary purposes again. That would reduce the number of beds to 200. At the present time they had about 60 Military Sick in the Hospital and they had been advised that they would probably be receiving more rheumatic cases from the Military later on. If the present number of patients were increased to 100 or to 150, then they would have only 100 He wanted the or 150 beds left for air raid casualties. authorities seriously to consider if it were worth while for the Hospital to continue as an air raid casualty Base Hospital. If they were to treat Military patients they might possibly have some vacancies for civilian cases but they certainly would have very little room for air raid cases. It was for the Ministry to decide which type of work was the more important. It seemed to him absurd to keep the buildings waiting month after month for the sake of an eventuality which might never come. When the Ministry took over in September the times were certainly critical. If the Ministry were still fearful that terrible things might happen, it had had ample time to make provision elsewhere for these casualties. It appeared to him that the best service they could render to the State was to open the Hospital out as a Military Rheumatism Hospital. If such cases did not fill the Hospital, they might possibly be able to take a certain number of civilian cases. The administration would be difficult but he was prepared to take some risk in the rehabilitation of the Hospital. It was not at present rendering the best service to the country of which it was capable.

The Reports were unanimously adopted.

MR. STANLEY BARNES (Hon. Treasurer), moving the adoption of the Accounts, said that if the war continued the Spa Hospitals would have to revert to being rheumatic treatment Hospitals for members of the Forces as in

1914-18. They were appealing to their subscribers to continue their subscriptions as far as they possibly could. They were doing this for two reasons. First, because when the war was over and the Hospital reverted to its peace time activities, they would have to spend large sums on renewals and repairs and additions to plant. The second reason was that when a subscriber had once given up it was not easy to get him to start again.

MR. HERBERT CROWTHER, seconding the adoption of the Accounts, said he did not think there was any need to worry about what would happen after the war. Referring more particularly to the Grey Cross Campaign he said that when they considered that the Campaign was only launched in May, 1938 and closed in September, 1939—16 months, including the unsettled period from Munich to the outbreak of war—they would agree that the amount of £38,000 subscribed and promised under covenant was nothing to be ashamed of. The expenses incurred in raising this sum were only £2,000 and they had a balance at the bank of £11,327. He was confident that they would be able to make this Hospital as prosperous—and even more prosperous—than it ever had been.

The Accounts and Balance Sheet were unanimously adopted.

In moving a vote of thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Board of Management for their services during the past year and that the following Members due to retire by rotation be re-elected, viz.: Mr. C. E. Morris, Mr. R. A. Breare and Dr. G. L. Kerr Pringle, and that the nominees of the Hon. Medical Staff—Dr. A. C. Sharp, Dr. W. Yeoman, Dr. R. P. J. Rutherford and Dr. H. Mathers—be appointed to the Board, Lord Harewood said that during the past year a specially heavy burden had been thrown upon all those interested in the Hospital since everything to which they had been accustomed had been utterly dislocated and entirely new arrangemnets had had to be made. He felt sure that the Subscribers would be very grateful to the Committee for the way in which they had met the national emergency.

In seconding the resolution The Mayor, speaking from personal experience, paid tribute to the public work of various members of the Committee. In response, Mr. Carter spoke of the development of the Research Department of the Hospital—a scheme which had been inaugurated at the suggestion of Lord Harewood some seven years ago. Dr. Collins had been with them for five years and, although the work was not spectacular it had been very valuable and had brought great kudos to the Hospital and to Harrogate. The work had been interrupted by the war and Dr. Collins had taken up another appointment, but, it was hoped that he would be able to come back since they had funds in hand sufficient to carry on the work for another three years. In conclusion Mr. Carter expressed their appreciation for the work of the new Matron.

MR. W. H. FREEMAN moving the re-election of Mr. Barnes as Hon. Treasurer, which was seconded by Dr. Kerr Pringle, said that they could all feel satisfied that, whatever might be the situation, the finances of the Hospital and its problems would be satisfactorily dealt with by Mr. Barnes.

Mr. Barnes briefly replied.

Councillor J. S. Holmes moved and Mr. Arthur Woodhead seconded, a vote of thanks to the Members of the Hon. Medical Staff for their services and proposed their re-election. He said that both the town and the Hospital were deeply engaged in the treatment of the terrible disease of rheumatism which caused so much wastage in the national life. He hoped that in spite of the difficulties ahead both would be able to carry on their work unremittingly.

DR. C. G. HITCHCOCK, in replying, said it was no exaggeration to say that the Hospital as a Base Hospital for air raid casualties was not, in his opinion, being put to the best possible use. With its unique facilities it would be vastly more useful were it to treat cases of rheumatism and injuries to the limbs among the members of H.M. Forces.

Messrs. Lowrey, Weston & Whalley, Chartered Accountants, Leeds and Harrogate, were appointed auditors for the ensuing year on the proposal of Dr. Nimmo Watson, seconded by Dr. A. C. Sharp.

A vote of thanks to Lord Harewood was expressed by The Archdeacon of Leeds (The Ven. D. M. M. Barlett), to which Lord Harewood briefly replied.

Report of the Committee of Management.

To The Right Honourable The Earl of Harewood, K.G., G.C.V.O., D.S.O., and Subscribers of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home, Harrogate.

It is to be noted that the figures of admission and re-admission of patients during 1939 refer only to the first eight months of the year, since, on the outbreak of War, by previous arrangement, the patients were evacuated to their homes within 24 hours, and the Ministry of Health "adopted" the Hospital as a Base Hospital, though the Board of Management continues to be responsible for the maintenance of its services.

The War has divided the year into two sharply contrasted periods. For the first eight months work proceeded on normal lines, although the extensive alterations and improvements effected in the Kitchens and the change-over to the new Boilers necessitated the postponement of the re-opening after Christmas by two weeks beyond the usual date. This has inevitably affected the figures in all Departments—admissions, treatments, finance, etc., and it must be borne in mind that for any comparison with the figures for the previous year those for 1938 must be reduced by approximately one third.

PERSONAL

Death has removed during the past year three members of the Board who have been actively associated with the Hospital for many years and your Committee, conscious of the good service each alike, in his individual capacity, has given to promoting the welfare of the Hospital, sincerely laments their loss.

Mr. Rhodes joined the Board in 1917. Two years later he was elected Chairman, a post he held until 1937, when he decided to resign. In recognition of his interest in the work during the difficult post-war years of reconstruction, he was elected to be a Vice-President and as such continued to attend the monthly meetings of the Board from time to time until shortly before his death.

The association of Dr. Hobson with the Hospital extended over a period of 50 years, first on the Honorary Medical Staff, afterwards as a member of the Board of Management. He did particularly valuable work, when the Hospital was under the direction of the Military Authorities during the Great War; he, also, was elected a Vice-President to mark the jubilee of his Hospital career.

Mr. Chapman joined the Board in 1931. He interested himself in the management of the garden and attended the weekly meetings of the House Committee with exemplary regularity until increasing infirmity necessitated his resignation in 1938.

Your Committee accepted with great regret the resignation of Dr. Holmes owing to his departure from Harrogate. His lucid and relevant contributions to the discussions at the Board meetings were of great value and his insight and enthusiasm were a source of stimulus to others. By his departure a valuable link with the larger world of Rheumatism has been severed.

Miss Hayes, after holding the post of Matron for twelve months, returned to the South to take up a similar appointment. Her successor, Miss E. C. Baynes, has had varied experience both in the South and in the North, having held posts at Ancoats, Windermere and at the Royal Masonic Hospital. She has tackled with courage the various problems necessitated by the "upgrading" of the Hospital.

Much internal reorganisation has been necessary to enable the Hospital to meet the requirements of the Ministry The Day Rooms, of Health for a Base Hospital. Dining Hall, Electrical Department and Billiard Rooms have had to be converted into Wards, and additional sluice rooms and kitchen accommodation have to be arranged for. This has involved provision on of extra apparatus and stores extensive scale in all departments, medical, surgical, bedding, hardware, etc. Much of this has been provided by the Ministry of Health but heavy demands have been made on the resources of the Hospital especially in the matter of suitable clothing for bed patients. This need has to some extent been met by a party of voluntary workers under the capable direction of Mrs. Kerr Pringle and Mrs. C. E. Carter, whose labours deserve the warmest thanks. Considerable additional supplies are however, still needed, but these can no longer be provided unless gifts of both materials and money are forthcoming to supplement the private efforts which have already been made by the workers themselves and their friends.

A special word of thanks is due to Miss Ackernley and others for the time and trouble which they have devoted to thoroughly reorganising and cataloguing the Hospital Library and arranging for the regular provision of reading matter for the patients.

For some weeks after the outbreak of hostilities the Hospital was occupied in completing its reorganisation, but it was felt to be highly desirable that this should be tested, even on a modest scale. Arrangements were made, with the concurrence of the Hospital Officer, representing the Ministry of Health in Leeds, to admit an agreed number of military sick and casualties. This number has been reached and even exceeded at times. It has further been arranged with the Authorities of the Northern Command that cases of a rheumatic type throughout their area shall be sent to the Hospital for appropriate treatment. To what extent this scheme will develop only the future can show.

During the four years of the last war a total of 4,106 Rheumatic cases, on a 200 bed basis, received special treatment and it is the opinion of your Committee that the

Hospital would best serve the national interest were it to play a part similar to that it fulfilled then, rather than adopt the somewhat ill-fitting role of a Base Hospital. The requirements of a hospital of this latter type can be far more competently and completely met by hospitals of the "general" type, which, more suitable structurally, already possess the necessary equipment and organisation to some extent, whereas the facilities provided by a Spa Hospital cannot be improvised elsewhere than at a Spa centre. Moreover it appears to be inevitable that, as the war continues, an ever increasing number of cases will require the specialised treatments, which a Spa Hospital alone can give.

It would be equally hazardous to conjecture when the Hospital will be able to resume its normal working. Applications from intending patients continue to be received and have to be regretfully declined, but your Committee is alive to the desirability of renewing at the earliest possible date its relations with many charitable and industrial and other bodies which have been in the habit of sending their members here throughout a long series of years, and the rupture of these relations is sincerely to be deplored.

Considerable sums of money have had to be expended in "blacking out" the entire irregular block of buildings and in taking various protective measures by the provision of shutters, sandbags and buckets, stirrup pumps, etc. Some of this expenditure it is hoped to recover from the Ministry in course of time, but progress towards this end is slow. In connection with this work special thanks are due to Mr. C. E. Morris for much valuable practical advice and for the ingenuity he has shown in overcoming some difficult problems.

FINANCE

The figures on the Revenue Account though given up to the 31st December really refer to 8 months full working only, since, from the beginning of September, income from all sources, with the exception of investments, has practically ceased and similarly the expenditure since this date has been taken over and defrayed by the Ministry of Health. Apart from this important consideration attention is called to a few items of particular interest. The per capita cost of provisions shows a slight reduction and the same applies to the Surgery and Dispensary, though the expenses of the X-Ray Department again show an upward trend, largely

owing to the greatly increased cost of essential materials. Under the heading "Domestic" various items give cause for misgiving. Though only eight as against twelve months' expenditure is involved, Furniture Renewals show an actual increase of £100 and Crockery £26, while the outlay on Linen is practically the same (£255: £263). A decrease in Gas of £104 is to a great extent accounted for by the use of the new "Esse" Cookers, the cost of the Anthracite for maintaining which is now a charge on the Fuel Account. Printing and Stationery again shows a positive increase, which is largely due to the demands of the Honorary Medical Staff. These various increases, though naturally offset by a decrease in the majority of the items results in a per capita rise per week of no less than 6/8 or nearly 1/- per day. The seriousness of this rise is emphasised by the fact that the decrease of income under most of the heads, with the exception of dividends, is so marked that it could not have been made good had twelve months normal working been completed. It is therefore apparent that serious efforts will have to be made before long to increase the annual income if the work of the Hospital is not to be greatly curtailed and its development, which is so urgently needed in many directions, retarded or checked.

Meanwhile it is the earnest hope of your Committee that all those, who have supported the work of the Hospital so loyally in the past, will endeavour to continue their financial help so far as they possibly can. Even in the event of the war proving shorter than at present appears likely, the Hospital will be faced with much unavoidable and heavy expenditure before it can revert to its peace time working. With every month that passes, the depreciation of buildings and plant must inevitably increase and it is vitally necessary that funds should be available to make good these defects, so that there may be the minimum of delay before normal work among the civilian population is restarted.

LEGACIES

Report of the Hon. Medical Staff

-:0:-

In spite of the uncertainty felt throughout the year on account of political upheavals in Europe and the cessation of the normal activities of the Hospital on the declaration of war in September, the Honorary Medical Staff wish to present a record of their work.

The death of Mr. C. A. Rhodes was a sad loss. He had the welfare of the hospital very much at heart and it was during his years of Chairmanship that the modernization of the Institution was commenced.

But for the coming of war the much needed Nurses' Home would now have been in process of erection. Medical Staff appreciate the tireless and enthusiastic activities of members of the Development Committee and they trust that when normal times are restored the same spirit will carry the full development scheme to maturity.

During the year a new type of case-sheet has been introduced. This allows of a more complete clinical record of rheumatic patients which, it is hoped, may prove helpful in the preparation of statistical data.

As a result of extensive work in the Research Department a new technique for estimating the sedimentation rate and a new contrast-bath method of treatment have been introduced into the routine work of the Hospital. The former gives a more accurate estimation of the severity and progress of rheumatic disease and enables the value of particular lines of treatment to be more carefully assessed than was formerly possible. The latter has proved of value in the treatment of Raynaud's Disease and of the circulatory defects associated with rheumatoid arthritis. Should this war bring cases of trench feet to the Hospital, this new method of hydrological treatment should be of great use.

The Medical Staff give a warm welcome to the new Matron, Miss E. C. Baynes. She entered upon her duties at a difficult period in the history of the Hospital and the Staff feel that her appointment was a very opportune one.

The resignation of Dr. T. Glen Reah is recorded with great regret.

On September 1st, the Hospital was taken over by the Ministry of Health who appointed Dr. G. L. Kerr Pringle as Medical Superintendent and the existing Medical Staff and personnel have been retained. The Hospital has been earmarked for the treatment of cases of rheumatic disease occurring among members of His Majesty's Forces. The Staff hope that soon the special resources of the Hospital in the treatment of rheumatism may also be extended again to the civilian population.

Report of the Medical Superintendent

2nd September to 31st December, 1939.

Since the Hospital was opened on October 30th for the reception of Service sick and casualties, 146 cases have been admitted. These have mainly been cases of Respiratory and Gastro-intestinal diseases, as will be seen from the subjoined list.

On December 18th an arrangement was entered into between the Deputy-Director of Medical Services, Northern Command, and the Hospital Officer for the area, that all cases belonging to the Rheumatic Group in the Northern Command should be sent in to the Hospital for the special treatments provided by this Hospital. Thus before long it is hoped that the Hospital will be fulfilling its normal function. At the same time it will be necessary to keep in reserve accommodation in the event of casualties resulting from air raids.

CLINICAL LABORATORY

Until the outbreak of War in September the resources of the Laboratory continued to be used freely both for the routine investigation of patients and for research work on rheumatism. Unfortunately hostilities changed all this and for a time the Laboratory Staff was busily engaged in organising an efficient blood donors' service against emergency demands. In November the Laboratory resumed its work again when the Hospital began to care for Military sick cases.

It is hoped that when happier conditions prevail generally, fuller provision of our invaluable waters and special treatments within the Department, and the long overdue allocation of special beds will be available. So would this Hospital then take its place as a pioneer in the Spa treatment of the special diseases of women as it has in the treatment of the Rheumatics.

British Spas with their sulphur waters, peat, mud and fango, are as well endowed by Nature as any Continental Spa; they only need to bestir the mselves.

Research Department.

Research into Rheumatism at this Hospital was perforce abandoned at the beginning of September, but up till this date work had proceeded along satisfactory lines, special attention having again been given to the pathological differentiation of the Rheumatic diseases.

Two papers have been published during 1939:

- "Observations of the Pathology of Acute Rheumatism and Rheumatoid Arthritis" (Annals of the Rheumatic Diseases; Jan. 1939).
- "The Pathology of Osteo-Arthritis" (Brit. Jour. of Rheumatism; April 1939).

A third paper was published in the October issue of the Annals of the Rheumatic Diseases, which described a new technique for the estimation of the blood sedimentation rate. This paper was the outcome of investigations and experiments performed co-operatively by laboratory workers at the rheumatic hospitals at Buxton, Bath, Droitwich, and at this Hospital, and the four authors of the paper represented the four hospitals. Not only has this publication shown the advantages to be derived from co-ordinating research activities in the different centres but it has resulted in a standardization of the method of performing the important sedimentation test in the four leading spa hospitals, so that results of tests performed in one hospital may be precisely compared with results of the test obtained from another hospital.

It had been our hope to collaborate in further research activities had the work not been interrupted by war.

Meanwhile the records and the equipment of the Research Department, which have been gradually accumulated during the five years of its existence will enable us to resume the work with the loss only of time when peace is restored.

GREY CROSS CAMPAIGN

The ever-increasing menace of the international situation inevitably hampered the Appeal throughout the year, and on the outbreak of War activities ceased and the engagement of the professional Organiser was terminated. Nevertheless the progress made has given cause for gratification.

The outstanding event of the year was undoubtedly the Appeal made by Lord Harewood in the B.B.C.'s "Week's Good Cause" on Sunday, April 2nd. Much care and thought had been given to the necessary preparatory work and this was amply repaid by the result. The speaker's voice came through with a clarity and impressiveness, which was the subject of widespread favourable comment and the financial gross result (£1,786 3s. 5d.) must be regarded as highly satisfactory in view of the difficult times. It is with particular pride and pleasure that we have to record a most gracious and generous contribution from H.M. Queen Mary.

The Ladies' Auxiliary again merits sincere thanks for its work in organising various events during the summer months which brought in a nett total of \$277 10s. 0d. The throwing open to the public of many gardens in the neighbourhood, by kind permission of their respective owners, though sometimes handicapped by unfavourable weather and counter-attractions which militated against large attendances, yielded a total of £108 8s. 0d. A very successful two days' Exhibition of Embroidery, etc., held at the Harrogate Hydro by kind permission of the Management, was organised by Mrs. Kerr Pringle and other ladies, with invaluable assistance by Mrs. Langley Moore, and produced £61 16s. 0d. A Bridge Drive, held at Nidd Hall by the kindness of Lord and Lady Mountgarret, yielded a profit of \$46 15s. Od. A Gymnasium Display arranged by Miss Holmberg brought in £20, and a Pantomime given by the Whixley Players, under the direction of Miss Rhodes and sponsored by Dr. Muriel Keyes, added a further £13 8s. 0d. It had been hoped to hold a Ball in the Autumn, under the direction of Mrs. Wesley-Smith and the date had actually been fixed, but had perforce to be abandoned.

It should be noted that the effort to obtain £1,000 for the endowment of a bed by gifts of 1/- and upwards from old patients has grown from £90 in 1938 to £430 in 1939. Although this sum falls far short of the amount aimed at, it represents many acts of real generosity and self-denial from widows, old age pensioners and others in humble circumstances. In this connexion thanks are specially due to Mr. W. J. Moxon for his ungrudging voluntary help in sending out the letters of Appeal. Without his cheerful and unflagging industry and zeal such progress as has been made would have been impossible.

The completion of the new Boiler House and Heating Equipment has involved an expenditure of £7,260 on the fund. It has now been in operation for twelve months and has given every satisfaction, while the opinion of those qualified to speak is general that the work has been well planned and efficiently carried out.

The design for the new Nurses' Home has been approved after most careful scrutiny and examination. The plans had been submitted to and approved by the Corporation, tenders had been invited and received, and the amounts of the various contracts had actually been scheduled for consideration by the Board of Management when the outbreak of War checked further progress. Had it not been for this catastrophe, it may fairly be assumed that considerable headway would have been made by now with the building operations.

To all who, by the sacrifice of time or money or of both, have contributed to the Fund, the Committee wishes, through the medium of this Report, to convey its grateful thanks. Though it is always invidious to particularise, special mention must be made of the Ladies' Auxiliary Committee, many of whom have worked indefatigably, and of the Directors of Messrs. R. Ackrill Ltd. for again placing, at the disposal of the Hospital, offices for the Organiser and his Staff entirely free of cost.

Much has been accomplished, much yet remains to be done, but the time to consider this, even in outline, is not yet.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE

HARROGATE ROYAL BATH HOSPITAL

Revised February, 1934

Title and Purposes of the Hospital

1. The Hospital having been built with a view to affording to deserving persons, free of expense, the benefits of the Harrogate waters and treatment, shall be denominated "The Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital." No patients shall be admitted except such as in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and the Committee of Management are suitable cases for such treatment.

Constitution

2. The Officers shall consist of a Patron, President, Vice-Presidents, Twelve Trustees, Honorary Consulting Physicians, Honorary

Physicians, and the Honorary Treasurer.

3. All the real estate belonging to the Hospital shall be invested in the names of six Trustees, and the personal estate in the names of six Trustees, but subject to the control of the Subscribers as to any appropriation for the benefit of the Hospital, which may be agreed upon by them at any annual general meeting, or special meeting called

for the purpose.

4. Whenever the number of Trustees, either of the real or personal trust estate, shall be reduced to three by all or any of the following means, viz., death, resignation, refusal, incapacity to act, or permanent residence out of England, the Committee of Management (as specified in Rule 27) shall by any writing under their hand fill up the vacancies by appointing three new Trustees, and upon every such appointment the surviving or continuing Trustees shall transfer such real or personal estate respectively vested in them so as to vest it respectively jointly in the surviving or continuing Trustees and such new Trustees.

Privileges of Subscribers

5. Recommendations for the admission of Patients are issued on the following terms:—

(a) To Regular Annual Subscribers one recommendation for each Two Guineas subscribed. These recommendations shall

only be available in the year in which they are issued:

PROVIDED ALWAYS that Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards whose names appear in the Subscription List for 1924 shall, so long as they continue to subscribe annually, retain the privilege of recommending one patient for each guinea so subscribed, the number of recommendations to be issued at this rate to such old subscribers to be limited and determined by the amount of the first subscription sent in any one year, but in no case shall exceed Five. Old subscribers entitled to this privilege who require to recommend additional patients beyond the number to which they may be entitled by their first subscription in any year may do so on payment of Two Guineas for each additional recommendation.

- (b) To Occasional Subscribers (i.e. persons whose names have not appeared in the Subscription List for the preceding year) at the rate of one recommendation for every £2 10s. 0d. subscribed.
- N.B.—Patients using these recommendation forms (a) and (b) will be expected to pay on admission a sum of 10s. 6d. per week towards the cost of board.

- (c) To Contributory Schemes, Societies, and other bodies of persons, etc., which offer their members or contributors Hospital or Convalescent benefit, one recommendation for each £3 10s. 0d. paid, being at the rate of 5s. per day for a minimum period of two weeks, and pro rata for each additional week's stay.
- N.B.—Patients admitted under these recommendations (c) will NOT be charged the Board Fee of 10s. 6d.
- (d) Every donor of £40 to the Endowment Fund shall be a Life Subscriber, and shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for every full sum of £40 so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which they are issued.
- (e) Executors of persons bequeathing sums of money to the Endowment Fund of the Hospital shall be entitled to one recommendation for every £25 paid to the Treasurer, but not more than FOUR, whatever the amount of the legacy bequeathed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in which the Legacy is paid, or in the following year.

(f) Every Clergyman, or minister of any Denomination, who shall transmit a congregational collection to the Treasurer, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. 0d.

so contributed during the year.

(g) Every Hotel, Boarding-house, or Lodging-house Keeper or other person, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. 0d. collected and paid to the Treasurer during the year.

These recommendations (f) and (g) shall be available

within 12 calendar months from the date of issue.

- 6. In no case shall any part of the cost of a recommendation be paid by the patient or any member of his or her family. Any such payment shall disqualify for admission.
- 7. Recommendations for the Hospital will be available for the Rawson Convalescent Home should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.
- 8. The following cases only are admitted to the Hospital: Skin Diseases, Rheumatism and kindred diseases (Arthritis, Myalgia and Neuritis), Disorders of the Liver, Gout and Lead Poisoning.

The following cases are not eligible for admission:

- (1) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (2) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (3) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (4) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (5) Persons suffering from fits or of unsound mind.
- (6) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.
- Cases convalescent from an infectious disease shall be inadmissible until a term of six weeks has elapsed from the period of infection ceasing.
- 10. The Committee of Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Hospital, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE

RAWSON CONVALESCENT HOME

Revised February, 1934

Title and Purposes of the Home

11. The Rawson Convalescent Home, having been erected in connection with the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital on land the property of the said Hospital, shall be conducted under the Officers and Committee of Management of the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital.

with the addition of the three Trustees hereinafter referred to.

12. The Institution shall be used solely as a Convalescent Home. Only such patients shall be admitted as obtain a recommendation from a Subscriber to the Home or Hospital, and are, in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and Committee of Management, suitable. It is contrary to the design of the Home to relieve persons whose circumstances enable them to pay the full cost of a visit to Harrogate.

Constitution

 The Property belonging to this Institution shall be vested in three Trustees. Any vacancy in their number to be filled up by the

remaining Trustee or Trustees.

 The Convalescent Home shall be charged for all expenses of the Hospital and Home in proportion to the number of patients admitted. Donations from Hotels, Lodging-houses, Hospital Sunday, and other sources of revenue (excepting legacies or donations to the endowment funds, which shall be kept separate) shall be apportioned on the same principle. This apportionment of receipts and expenses shall commence January 1st, 1898, and shall not be altered without the approval of a Committee consisting of the Patron, the Chairman of the Committee of Management, the Honorary Treasurer, and the Home Trustees for the time being.

Privileges of Subscribers

Recommendations for admission of Patients are issued on the following terms :-

(a) Annual subscribers of Two guines and upwards shall be entitled to recommend one patient annually for each Two guineas so subscribed. These recommendations shall only be

available in the year in which they are issued:

PROVIDED ALWAYS that Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards whose names appear in the Subscription List for 1924 shall, so long as they continue to subscribe annually, retain the privilege of recommending one patient for each guinea so subscribed, the number of recommendations to be issued at this rate to such old subscribers to be limited and determined by the amount of the first subscription sent in any one year, but in no case shall exceed Five. Old Subscribers entitled to this privilege who require to recommend additional patients beyond the number to which they may be entitled by their first subscription in any year may do so on payment of Two Guineas for each additional recommendation.

(b) To Occasional Subscribers (i.e. persons whose names have not appeared in the Subscription List for the preceding year) at the rate of one recommendation for every £2 10s. 0d.

N.B.—Patients using these recommendation forms (a) and (b) will be expected to pay on admission a sum of 10s. 6d. per week towards the cost of board.

(c) To Contributory Schemes, Societies and other bodies of persons, etc., which offer their members or contributors Hospital or Convalescent benefit, one recommendation for each £3 10s. 0d. paid, being at the rate of 5s. per day for a minimum period of two weeks, and pro rata for each additional week's stay.

N.B.—Patients admitted under these recommendations

(c) will NOT be charged the Board Fee of 10s. 6d.

(d) Every donor of \$40 or upwards to the Endowment Fund shall be a Life Subscriber, and be entitled to recommend one patient annually for every full sum of £40 so subscribed. These Recommendations are only available in the year in which they are issued.

(e) Executors of persons bequeathing sums of money to the Endowment Fund of the Home shall be entitled to ONE recommendation for every £25 paid to the Treasurer, but to not more than four, whatever the amount of the legacy bequeathed. These recommendations shall only be available in the year in

which the Legacy is paid, or in the following year.

(f) Every Clergyman or Minister of any Denomination who shall transmit a congregational collection to the Treasurer shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. 0d.

contributed during that year.

(g) Every Hotel Proprietor, Boarding-house, Lodginghouse keeper or other person, shall be allowed to recommend one patient for every £3 3s. 0d. collected and paid to the Treasurer during the year.

These recommendations (f) and (g) shall be available

within 12 calendar months of the date of issue.

Admission by Payment

- 16. In certain cases approved by the Committee patients may be admitted to the Home without recommendation on their own payment in advance at the rate of one pound fifteen shillings for each week.
- 17. Recommendations for the Home will be available for the Royal Bath Hospital should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.
- 18. Convalescent cases, or cases of debility, are eligible for admission to the Home.

The following cases are not eligible :-

- Women advanced in pregnancy.
- Persons in advanced stages of consumption. (2)
- (3) Persons suffering from any skin disease.
- (4) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (5) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (6) Persons subject to fits or of unsound mind.
- Persons incapable of attending to themselves.
- 19. Cases convalescent from an infectious disease are not admissible until the expiration of six weeks from the period of the infection ceasing.
- 20. The Committee of Management reserve the right to refuse admission or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Convalescent Home, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.

Bye-Laws and Regulations for Patients

21. Every applicant for admission must procure a recommendation from a Subscriber, accompanied by the Certificate, properly filled up by a qualified Medical Practitioner, as to the suitability of the case. Each patient, when so admitted, shall pay a sum not exceeding 10/6 for each week of his or her stay towards the cost of his or her board, unless it is proved to the satisfaction of the Committee that such patient is entirely unable to meet such charge, in which case the Committee may, in their absolute discretion, remit such charge, either wholly or in part.

Each patient may be admitted for a period not exceeding two weeks on production of a Subscriber's recommendation, and shall be entitled to board, lodging, baths, medical attendance, &c. When further treatment is deemed desirable by the Hon. Physicians an extension of time may be granted, with the sanction of the Committe of Management, on production of a further recommendation for each two weeks of such extension.

- 22. No patient can be re-admitted until the expiration of three calendar months from the date when he or she was last discharged from the Hospital, except under special circumstances, and by special leave of the Committee of Management.
- 23. It shall be in the power of the Committee instantly to dismiss any patient who in their judgment conducts himself or herself in an improper manner, or who does not conform to the Rules, Regulations, and Bye-laws of the Institution.
- 24. Each patient is required to bring a proper change of clean body linen, and to pay for the washing of it outside the Hospital.

RULES RELATING TO BOTH

The Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital

The Rawson Convalescent Home.

- 25. The Hospital shall be open throughout the year. The Home shall be opened in March each year and closed for the admission of patients on the second Thursday in November, or at such other times and such other periods in each year as the Committee of Management may decide to be necessary.
- 26. No subscriber shall have power to recommend a patient or do any other special act until his or subscription has been paid.

Annual Subscriptions shall be deemed due on the 1st January in each year.

When any subscription shall be in arrear for 2 years the subscriber's name shall be omitted from the published list.

- 27. The Government of the Royal Bath Hospital and of the Rawson Convalescent Home shall be vested in a Committee of Management consisting of the Patron, the President, the Vice-Presidents, the Trustees of both Institutions, the Honorary Consulting Physicians appointed before 31st December, 1930 (who shall be ex-officio members of the Committee until the Annual General Meeting of 1936), the Honorary Treasurer, four members of the Honorary Medical Staff (three at least of whom shall be Honorary Physicians), and sixteen other members, all of whom shall be elected by the subscribers at the Annual Meeting. Of the sixteen other members four shall retire annually and shall be eligible for re-election. Three members of the Committee shall form a quorum.
- 28. The Committee shall have power to engage and dismiss all paid officials, to fix the amount of salaries, and make such orders, according to the spirit of these Rules, as they shall think expedient for the management of the Hospital and the Home.

Three or more of the Committee shall attend at the Hospital every Thursday afternoon to transact general business. In the event of a special meeting of the Committee being requisite, the same shall be called by the Secretary, when directed to do so by the chairman of the Committee or three of its members.

- 29. A House Committee shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, and shall meet at the Hospital as often as may be necessary, at such an hour as they may appoint. They shall examine the books of admission and discharge, and all other books kept by the officers, including the register of the attendance of the Honorary Physicians and Chaplain, and the "Visitors' Book." They shall investigate any complaint of neglect or misconduct of anyone connected with the Institution. They shall examine and sign all such accounts as may require to be laid before the next monthly meeting of the Committee of Management for payment. They shall procure and submit once a year to the Committee of Management for approval, all contracts for drugs, provisions, coals, &c., required for the use of the Hospital and Home. They shall examine, from time to time, the inventories of household goods, furniture, linen, &c., belonging to the Institutions. They shall replace and renew, from time to time, as circumstances may require, all such internal fittings and furniture of the Hospital and Home as may urgently require renewal, and shall superintend all alterations and improvements sanctioned by the Committee of Management, and shall be generally responsible for keeping the grounds and buildings in order.
- 30. Whenever a vacancy or vacancies shall occur in the Honorary Medical Staff, the Secretary shall, when requested by the Committee of Management, give notice thereof by advertisement in the Medical and Local Press. Applicants, who shall be fully qualified and registered, shall forward their diplomas and testimonials, if required, to the Committee of Management, who may thereupon proceed to election, or they may in their discretion defer the appointment to the next Annual General Meeting.
- 31. The Honorary Physicians or a sufficient number of them, shall attend at the Hospital on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, to examine applicants for admission; and shall visit the Hospital three times per week, or as often as they may think necessary.
- 32. The Committee shall have power on the recommendation of the Honorary Medical Staff to appoint such specialists in an honorary capacity as may conduce to the better treatment of the patients.

33. The Honorary Treasurer shall pay all monies which he shall receive to the credit of the Hospital and Home at its Bankers, and all payments due from the Hospital and Home shall be made by cheques, signed by himself and two of the Committee. He shall invest, in securities approved by the Committee, when requested by them, all monies available for investment.

34. The Auditor shall examine the accounts, and return the same properly audited, to the Secretary, within 14 days after they have been received, and shall receive such a fee as the Committee of Management

may think proper.

35. The Secretary shall collect and forthwith pay over to the Treasurer all subscriptions; attend and act as Clerk at all meetings of the Subscribers and Committees; make out the annual accounts for the auditor, and perform such other duties as the Committee of

Management may direct.

- 36. The Matron shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, subject to three months' notice on either side; she shall devote the whole of her time to her duties, and shall see that the affairs of the Hospital and Home are conducted with the greatest possible attention to regularity, cleanliness, and economy, and shall conform to such Bye-Laws and instructions as the Committee of Management may from time to time decide upon.
- 37. The Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers shall be held at the Hospital on the Third Thursday in January in each year, or within 28 days thereof (of which seven days' notice shall be given by circular), for the purpose of receiving the reports of the Committee and Auditor, determining if any and what substantial alterations of or additions to buildings, shall be undertaken, and for electing the members of the Committee of Management and an Auditor. Nominations for election to the Committee of Management, signed by two subscribers as proposer and seconder, must reach the Secretary at least fourteen days before the Annual General Meeting.
- 38. The Chairman of the Committee of Management shall, within ten days after receiving a requisition in writing, signed by five Subscribers, convene by circular a special meeting of Subscribers for considering the purpose stated in such requisition only.
- 39. The Committee of Management shall have power to make such Bye-Laws (not inconsistent with these rules and regulations) as they may think necessary for the internal management of the Hospital and Home, and alter and annul the same as occasion may require; such new Bye-Laws to be in force until confirmed or otherwise at the next Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers, and printed copies of such Bye-Laws shall be affixed in conspicuous parts of the Hospital and Home, for the guidance of the Officers and the observance of the patients.
- 40. No general rule or regulation shall be altered, except by the Subscribers at the Annual General Meeting, or at a meeting specially called for the purpose; in all cases 14 days' notice shall be given to the Secretary of the proposed new rule; and seven days' notice shall be given by the Secretary to all Subscribers (together with the names of the Subscribers proposing the same), prior to the holding of the meeting at which such alteration is proposed to be made.
- 41. At all meetings, whether of the Subscribers or of the Committee of Management, all questions shall be decided by the vote of the majority of those present. In the event of the voting being equal the presiding Chairman of the meeting shall be entitled to give a second or casting vote. In no case is it permissible to vote by proxy.
