



ANNUAL MEETING

Saturday, 8th March, 1941.

The 115th Annual General Meeting of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home was held on Saturday, 8th March, 1941.

Col. W. F. Collins, D.S.O., J.P., D.L., presided. Among those present were The Mayor of Harrogate (Coun-E. J. Wheater, J.P.), C. E. Carter, Esq., J.P. (Chairman of Board of Management), Stanley Barnes, Esq. (Hon. Treas.), Herbert Crowther, Esq., LL.B., J.P. (Hon. Treas. Grey Cross Campaign), Coun. J. S. Holmes, J.P., J. W. May, Esq., Arthur Woodhead, Esq., Dr. G. L. Kerr Pringle, M.C., Dr. A. C. Sharp, Dr. R. Nimmo Watson, Dr. J. L. Wesley-Smith, Dr. Henry Mathers, Dr. Dorothy Potter, A. Woodmansey, Esq., Rev. Joseph Bell, A. H. Whalley, Esq., The Matron (Miss E. C. Baynes), and the Secretary (Mr. E. P. L. Dixon, M.A.).

Apologies for absence were received from Lord Harewood (The Patron), Viscount Mountgarret (President), Mr. and Mrs. W. Arthur Taylor, Mrs. J. J. Norton, M.B.E., Dr. Wm. Yeoman, Mr. Magnus E. Mail, Mrs. Geldart, and Dr. Muriel Keyes.

Col. Collins moved the adoption of the various Reports.

MR. C. E. CARTER (Chairman of the Board of Management) seconding, said that 1940 had been a very difficult year. They had had to meet rising prices and frequently recurring extraordinary charges. The accountants had told them that for the first time in 20 years there was a deficit. Previously they had been in the happy position of ending the year with a small but comfortable balance on the credit side. He hoped, however, that this was not the final word. The deficit was not large and he hoped that when the final settlement with the Ministry of Health was arrived at, the payments would enable them to wipe out the deficit. He wished to take this opportunity of reminding the Ministry that the Hospital got nothing free except fresh air and sulphur water. They could not feed soldiers on that and

would be glad to have something on account. No payments in respect of the interim returns had been received since the middle of November last. Meantime their bills had to be

paid and the bank overdraft was going up.

He was much concerned with their prospects for 1941. All expenditure was being rigorously scrutinised, but the purchasing power of the pound was not what it was three years ago and, on a conservative estimate, they would require an income at least 25 per cent. above their normal income. How to obtain that increase was the problem they had to face. The basis of interim payments was fixed provisionally on their costs for 1937. Everyone knew that such a basis was not applicable to 1941 and he thought the time had come for a revision of that basis. Were this done, it would be

one possible source of increased income.

Formerly they had had considerable grants from the Friendly Societies but these had been for some years discontinued. He thought these Societies should now come forward and help them over their difficulty. The Hospital was national in its scope and was founded more than 100 years ago to benefit those who were not in a position to pay for spa treatment themselves and in the past it had been largely supported by voluntary contributions. The majority of their subscribers, even in these difficult days, had continued to support them most loyally, but they were hard hit by taxation and could hardly be expected to shoulder additional burdens. They could however help very materially by paying their annual subscriptions under the covenant scheme. There was no trickery about the scheme; it had been authorised by Acts of Parliament and was as legal as the Income Tax. With Income Tax at its present rate of 8/6 in the f a subscriber, at no cost to himself, could increase his subscription to the Hospital by about 70 per cent. They hoped that many of their subscribers would agree to do this; the possibilities were tremendous and could result in an increase of income of approximately £1,700. They could not afford to let such an opportunity slip by. Those who paid surtax would by adopting the scheme, actually pay less since they could make the gross payment a charge on their surtax return. The information would be circulated to each subscriber in a leaflet with the Annual Report and he hoped there would be a widespread response to their appeal. They were also asking the patients to pay a little more towards the cost of their maintenance. They had done this after very careful consideration and under the stress of absolute necessity.

The Reports were unanimously adopted.

MR. STANLEY BARNES (Hon. Treasurer) moving the adoption of the Accounts, stated that subscriptions had shown a considerable falling off and he feared for a similar decline during the coming year.

MR. HERBERT CROWTHER seconding the adoption of the Accounts, said that the Hospital was very fortunate in having completed its new Boiler House before the War began. He was sure, from personal experience, that the Hospital was too modest in proclaiming the value of its work.

The Mayor (Coun. E. J. Wheater, J.P.) moved a vote of thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Board of Management for their services during the past year and that the following members due to retire by rotation be reelected, viz.: Messrs. H. Crowther, D. P. Wilks, J. W. May, and W. A. Taylor, and that the nominees of the Honorary Medical Staff—Dr. A. C. Sharp, Dr. W. Yeoman, Dr. R. Nimmo Watson, and Dr. H. Mathers—be appointed to the Board.

The Rev. Joseph Bell seconded the resolution, which was carried unanimously.

Mr. Carter, replying, said the Committee worked together most harmoniously and it had given him no little pleasure to be their Chairman.

COUN. J. S. Holmes moved and Mr. J. W. May seconded a vote of thanks to Mr. Stanley Barnes for his services as Honorary Treasurer and that he be re-elected for the ensuing year.

MR. ARTHUR WOODHEAD moved and MR. HERBERT CROWTHER seconded a vote of thanks to the Members of the Honorary Medical Staff for their services and proposed their re-election. He said he could not find words with which adequately to express their indebtedness to the Medical Staff for all they had done and were doing for the Hospital. Voluntary Service was a marked social feature of these days, but in no form was it more valuable than in that so readily given by the Medical profession.

Dr. A. C. Sharp thanked the Meeting for the cordial reception they had given to the resolution. The times were difficult but people were naturally reluctant to leave their homes and a decline in the number of civilian applicants might be regarded as inevitable. The Medical Staff were a united body. He thanked the Matron and the Nursing Staff for the support they had given to the Doctors.

Mr. Carter moved and the Honorary Treasurer seconded the adoption of the new scale of charges, notice of which had been previously sent to all subscribers.

The scale was unanimously adopted without comment or criticism.

DR. Wesley-Smith proposed and Mr. A. Woodmansey seconded the re-election of Messrs. Lowrey, Weston and Whalley, Chartered Accountants, Leeds and Harrogate, as Auditors for the ensuing year.

Mr. Whalley, on behalf of his firm, thanked the Meeting for their re-appointment.

A vote of thanks to Col. W. F. Collins for presiding was moved by Mr. Carter and seconded by the Honorary Treasurer.

Report of the Committee of Management.

To the Right Honourable The Earl of Harewood, K.G., G.C.V.O. D.S.O., and Subscribers of the Royal Bath Hospital and Rawson Convalescent Home, Harrogate.

Motives of economy and discretion combine to induce your Committee to be somewhat more brief than usual in presenting their report for the year 1940. It has been thought desirable, in giving the number of admissions to show the figures for three years instead of for the usual two years so that there may be comparison with 1938, the last full year of normal working.

During the past year the basis on which the Hospital has worked under the instructions of the Ministry of Health has been changed twice and it is, for the time being at least, "suspended from the Emergency Medical Services" and has for the past 9½ months reverted to its peace time functions. How long this state of affairs may continue it is of course impossible to predict as it is wholely dependent upon the direction which future developments, both at home and abroad, may take.

For these reasons to attempt statistical comparison with past years—or even with 1939 when conditions were quite different—would be both futile and misleading.

All things considered, the number of civilians availing themselves of the treatment has not been markedly fewer than might have been expected, though the long waiting list associated with pre-war days has never appeared likely to materialise. For the first time in its history the Hospital was open for civilians during Christmas but although the number remaining was comparatively small, it may reasonably be expected to increase as time goes on and the fact that the Hospital is open at this season becomes more generally known.

The number of Military cases of the rheumatic type admitted has been remarkably constant and the conduct of the men good. Those who were here at Christmas were highly appreciative of the efforts made by the Matron and Staff to

cater for their enjoyment.

During the year some much needed and long overdue improvements in the accommodation for the domestic staff have been carried out and all the exterior woodwork of the buildings has been re-painted. This was last done seven years ago and it was considered necessary to preserve the fabric from serious deterioration.

It is an open secret that plans are being matured for a campaign against rheumatism on a national scale in which there is every reason to believe that the Hospital will be called upon to play an important part. Details of this however are not yet sufficiently worked out to enable particulars to be given.

PERSONAL

Your Committee records with deep regret the loss in January of Dr. A. W. Hinsley Walker, J.P., after a very brief illness. Dr. Walker joined the Staff in 1891, the same year as that in which Mr. Shaw was appointed Secretary. He continued to serve as Honorary Physician until 1922, when he retired from active service and was appointed Hon. Consulting Physican in recognition of the work he had done so faithfully. This position as well as that of a member of the Governing Body he held up to the time of his death. It will thus be seen that his association with the Hospital lasted for just fifty years. Dr. Walker will long be remembered by all with whom he came in contact for his unfailing geniality and kindness of heart, which endeared him to patients and staff alike. After his medical duties ceased, he maintained his interest in the Hospital by attending the weekly meetings of the House Committee with unfailing regularity until the week before his death. His long record of devoted service will not speedily be forgotten.

The numerous calls upon their time for participating in various war activities has perforce somewhat restricted the attendances at meetings of some members of your Committee. Mr. Derek P. Wilks is away on active service and the increasing demands upon the services of Mr. Herbert Crowther and Mr. C. E. Morris have made them infrequent visitors. This has thrown an additional burden upon a few who have fully responded to the call made upon them so that the affairs of the Hospital cannot in any degree be said to have suffered through neglect or lack of supervision.

FINANCE

The rise in the cost of commodities, coupled with the fact that Hospitals are not exempt from the Purchase Tax, together with increases in the cost of labour, has inevitably resulted in greatly increased expenditure under practically all heads. This is shown by a comparison of the per capita charges for 1938, the last full normal working year, 5/7 per day, with those ruling throughout 1940, 7/10 per day. On the credit side income shows a serious shrinking, though your Committee wishes to take this opportunity of expressing its sincere thanks to all those who have in any way continued their support during these times of financial stringency.

In these circumstances your Committee views the future with some degree of apprehension and, after very careful consideration, has decided that the time has now come when some increase in charges must be made. These will be submitted in detail to the Annual Meeting, when, it is hoped, they will be approved and ratified. It has been the endeavour of your Committee to make these increases as moderate as circumstances will allow, but some such increases are unavoidable under existing conditions. The supporters of the Hospital may rest fully assured that your Committee will keep a close scrutiny on all expenditure and will adopt the cautious policy which the needs of the situation demands. For until the final adjustment with the Ministry of Health has taken place—and it is impossible to forecast when this will be—the exact financial position cannot be precisely known.

LEGACIES

During 1940 the following amounts were received and have been credited to Endowment Account:— Mrs. A. E. Richardson (9th distribution), £45; Miss Ada Lightowler, £10; James Hamilton Brown, £89/16/8; Ezra Naylor, £801/12/-.

Miss Anne Newton bequeathed £1,000 for the purpose of endowing a bed. This is the first bequest of this kind in the history of the Hospital—a period of 115 years—Mr. Holdsworth Wilson left £200 for promoting the research work of the Laboratory and this sum has been invested in 3% Defence Bonds.

GREY CROSS CAMPAIGN

This is perforce suspended indefinitely. In addition to the instalments payable under the seven years' Covenant Scheme, some small sums have been received. These together with the Bank Interest have enabled the Committee to invest £10,000 in Harrogate Corporation Mortgage 2\frac{3}{4}\% and £3,000

in 21% National War Bonds.

During the past twelve months the effort to raise 20,000 Shillings by donations from patients towards the Endowment of a Bed has increased by £265. This may be considered a very satisfactory result in view of the present difficult times and the far from easy circumstances of many of the donors. Though there is still a long road to travel, there is good reason to hope that in time the end will be attained.

THANKS

The cordial thanks of your Committee are due to many kind friends who have given most generously of their time and services to promote and maintain various Hospital activities. Among these your Committee desires, at the risk of appearing invidious, to single out for special mention, Mrs. E. M. Mackay, Mrs. Norman Rae, Miss D. M. Dickinson, and Miss M. H. Freeman for their regular attendance and voluntary help with the Nursing Services of the Hospital by which they have helped to lighten the work of the professional staff.

Miss Young has given ungrudging help for several months with the clerical work on the Military side. This has been as invaluable as it has been cheerfully forthcoming.

Miss Ackernley and Miss Kirk have not merely carried out a "drastic purge" on the Library but have made a new catalogue, added a large number of recent and attractive books and attend, with unfailing regularity twice a week for the changing of them.

Mr. Sam Hempsall has spared himself neither time nor trouble in arranging a most attractive series of weekly entertainments for the patients, and hearty thanks are also due, and are freely accorded, to all those who have so cheerfully faced the rigours of the black-out—many of them after a day's work—to alleviate the somewhat monotonous routine of Hospital life. Considerations of space forbid a detailed list which includes many whose names are household words in Harrogate, and your Committee can only ask all from the greatest to the least—and some of the performers were very small—to accept their thanks and appreciation of their efforts to give pleasure to others.

Mrs. Hempsall, besides giving invaluable help at these Concerts, has shared the duties of Honorary Organist at the Sunday Services with Miss Cauldwell and to both of these ladies sincere thanks are due.

Others—notably the Congregation of St. Luke's Church, Mrs. Burrows, Mr. & Mrs. Hempsall, Mrs. May & Mrs. Skelsey—have most kindly given hospitality to some of the more severe Military cases; this kind thoughtfulness undoubtedly exercises a most beneficial effect upon their condition and general outlook.

The visit each month of E.N.S.A.'s travelling cinema has provided a series of well selected films which have been a source of real enjoyment.

Report of the Hon. Medical Staff.

During the year the Hospital has not been used to its full capacity by civilians. Several causes account for this; among them difficulties of transport and a natural reluctance of patients to leave their homes in war time. Also many doctors may not realise that the Hospital is once again available for civilian patients. As all the essential services of the Hospital are actively working, the Medical Staff hopes doctors will send their patients, who require investigation and the Harrogate treatment, as they have done in the past.

The Staff were sorry to lose the services of Dr. G. L. Kerr Pringle as Medical Superintendent. During his period of office he brought the services of the Hospital to a high state of efficiency.

The soldiers recommended for admission have been selected cases, either belonging to the Rheumatic group or orthopædic cases requiring physio-therapy.

We feel that much greater use could be made of the special facilities of the Hospital, if medical officers in the Services were more aware of the benefits which physical treatment can effect in suitable cases. It is hoped that the Authorities who are planning further Rheumatic treatment centres will first use fully the Spa Hospitals.

The research work has been temporarily suspended owing to the war; the Director, Dr. Douglas H. Collins having been assigned to an E.M.S. Hospital. This work has proved of inestimable value and its early resumption is desired by us all.

Dr. C. Trist Gasking, Assistant Physician, volunteered for Army Service and is now a Hospital Registrar.

Gynæcological Department.

After the Hospital was re-opened to Women 27 cases were referred. Swabs were sent to the Laboratory for culture in 25 cases. No Diathermy or other special electrical treatment could be given in the Department, as its rooms had been taken over for other purposes; but 13 cases received other treatments.

The Electricity Department again gave certain treatments, mainly D'arsonval, which is invaluable in Pruritis cases, and it is hoped that some means of 'screening' this machine will be evolved.

CLINICAL LABORATORY

With the opening of the Hospital early in the year for civilians as well as Military patients the activities of the Clinical Laboratory soon became prominent. During the year 4,181 specimens from patients were examined. Research into the comparative value of the different methods of performing the sedimentation test has continued and it is hoped that the results will be made available shortly through the Medical press.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE

Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital

Title and Purposes of the Hospital

1. The Hospital having been built with a view to affording to deserving persons, free of expense, the benefits of the Harrogate waters and treatment, shall be denominated "The Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital." No patients shall be admitted except such as in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and the Committee of Management are suitable cases for such treatment.

Constitution

2. The Officers shall consist of a Patron, President, Vice-Presidents, Twelve Trustees, Honorary Consulting Physicians, Honorary

Physicians, and the Honorary Treasurer.

3. All the real estate belonging to the Hospital shall be invested in the names of Trustees, and the personal estate in the names of six Trustees, but subject to the control of the Subscribers as to any appropriation for the benefit of the Hospital, which may be agreed upon by them at any annual general meeting, or special meeting called

for the purpose.

4. Whenever the number of Trustees, either of the real or personal trust estate, shall be reduced to three by all or any of the following means, viz., death, resignation, refusal, incapacity to act, or permanent residence out of England, the Committee of Management (as specified in Rule 27) shall by any writing under their hand fill up the vacancies by appointing new Trustees, and upon every such appointment the surviving or continuing Trustees shall transfer such real or personal estate respectively vested in them so as to vest it respectively jointly in the surviving or continuing Trustees and such new Trustees.

Privileges of Subscribers

- 5. Recommendations for the admission of Patients are issued on the following terms:—
 - To Regular Annual Private Subscribers of Two Guineas, One Recommendation Form, valid for two weeks, for each Two Guineas subscribed.

(2) To Regular Annual Private Subscribers of One Guinea, One Recommendation Form, valid for one week.

N.B.—(A Regular Annual Subscriber shall be deemed to be one whose name has appeared in the Subscription List

for the previous year.)

- (3) To Occasional Subscribers (i.e. persons whose names have not appeared in the Subscription List during the preceding year) One Recommendation Form for every £3 10s. subscribed.
- (4) To Life Governors at the rate of One Recommendation Form annually for Life for each donation of £40.
- (5) To every Clergyman or Minister collecting and paying over a sum of £3 3s. 0d. at the rate of One Recommendation for each £3 3s. 0d. collected.

N.B.—Each patient is expected to pay on admission 15/per week towards the cost of Board on Forms (1), (2), (3,)
(4) and (5).

(6) To Contributory Schemes, Societies, etc. which offer their members Hospital or Convalescent Home treatment, One Recommendation Form at the rate of £4 4s. 0d. (6/- per day) for a minimum stay of two weeks and beyond that period proportionately per extra week or weeks.

N.B.—Patients using Recommendation Forms (6) will NOT be charged the weekly Board Fee of 15/-.

The minimum stay is TWO WEEKS. One Recommendation Form at the guinea rate entitles a patient to one week's Medical Attendance and Treatment in the Hospital or Home. One Form at the two guinea rate entitles a patient to a stay of two weeks. Should an extension of stay be advised by the Hon. Physician, the Patient may remain upon the production of a further Recommendation Form (or Forms) and payment of the Board Fee for the additional period.

These recommendations (5) and (6) shall be available within 12 calendar months from the date of issue.

- 6. In no case shall any part of the cost of a recommendation be paid by the patient or any member of his or her family. Any such payment shall disqualify for admission.
- 7. Recommendations for the Hospital will be available for the Rawson Convalescent Home should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.
- 8. The following cases only are admitted to the Hospital: Skin Diseases, Rheumatism and kindred diseases (Arthritis, Myalgia and Neuritis), Disorders of the Liver, Gout and Lead Poisoning.

The following cases are not eligible for admission:

- Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (2) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (3) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (4) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (5) Persons suffering from fits or of unsound mind.
- (6) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.
- Cases convalescent from an infectious disease shall be inadmissible until a term of six weeks has elapsed from the period of infection ceasing.
- 10. The Committee of Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Hospital, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE Rawson Convalescent Home

Title and Purposes of the Home

- 11. The Rawson Convalescent Home, having been erected in connection with the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital on land the property of the said Hospital, shall be conducted under the Officers and Committee of Management of the Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital, with the addition of the three Trustees hereinafter referred to.
- 12. The Institution shall be used solely as a Convalescent Home. Only such patients shall be admitted as obtain a recommendation from a Subscriber to the Home or Hospital, and are, in the opinion of the Honorary Physicians and Committee of Management, suitable. It is contrary to the design of the Home to relieve persons whose circumstances enable them to pay the full cost of a visit to Harrogate.

Constitution

- 13. The Property belonging to this Institution shall be vested in three Trustees. Any vacancy in their number to be filled up by the remaining Trustee or Trustees.
- 14. The Convalescent Home shall be charged for all expenses of the Hospital and Home in proportion to the number of patients admitted. Donations from Hotels, Lodging-houses, Hospital Sunday, and other sources of revenue (excepting legacies or donations to the endowment funds, which shall be kept separate) shall be apportioned on the same principle. This apportionment of receipts and expenses shall commence January 1st, 1898, and shall not be altered without the approval of a Committee consisting of the Patron, the Chairman of the Committee of Management, the Honorary Treasurer, and the Home Trustees for the time being.

Privileges of Subscribers

- 15. Recommendations for the admission of Patients are issued on the following terms:—
 - To Regular Annual Private Subscribers of Two Guineas, One Recommendation Form, valid for two weeks, for each Two Guineas subscribed.
 - (2) To Regular Annual Private Subscribers of One Guinea, One Recommendation Form, valid for one week.

 - (3) To Occasional Subscribers (i.e. persons whose names have not appeared in the Subscription List during the preceding year) One Recommendation Form for every £3 10s. subscribed.

Admission by Payment

16. In certain cases, approved by the Committee, Patients unable to afford private treatment in Harrogate may be admitted to the Home without a Recommendation Form on their own payment in advance at the rate of FOUR GUINEAS for two weeks (6/- per day) including maintenance.

Form of application obtainable from the Secretary.

- 17. Recommendations for the Home will be available for the Royal Bath Hospital should the case comply with the Rules and Regulations of that Institution, and be, in the opinion of the Medical Staff, more suited for treatment therein.
- 18. Convalescent cases, or cases of debility, are eligible for admission to the Home.

The following cases are not eligible:-

- (1) Women advanced in pregnancy.
- (2) Persons suffering from consumption.
- (3) Persons suffering from any skin disease.
- (4) Persons suffering from Neurasthenia.
- (5) Persons suffering from infectious or contagious disease.
- (6) Persons subject to fits or of unsound mind.
- (7) Persons incapable of attending to themselves.
- 19. Cases convalescent from an infectious disease are not admissible until the expiration of six weeks from the period of the infection ceasing.
- 20. The Committee of Management reserve the right to refuse admission or to discharge any patient whose case may be found unsuitable for the treatment afforded by the Convalescent Home, or who may be likely to be objectionable or injurious to the other inmates, or for any other reason.

Bye-Laws and Regulations for Patients

21. Every applicant for admission must procure a recommendation from a Subscriber, accompanied by the Certificate, properly filled up by a qualified Medical Practitioner, as to the suitability of the case. Each patient, when so admitted, shall pay a sum not exceeding 15/for each week of his or her stay towards the cost of his or her board, unless it is proved to the satisfaction of the Committee that such patient is entirely unable to meet such charge, in which case the Committee may, in their absolute discretion, remit such charge, either wholly or in part.

Each patient may be admitted for a period not exceeding two weeks on production of a Subscriber's recommendation, and shall be entitled to board, lodging, baths, medical attendance, &c. When further treatment is deemed desirable by the Hon. Physicians an extension of time may be granted, with the sanction of the Committe of Management, on production of a further recommendation for each two weeks of such extension.

- 22. No patient can be re-admitted until the expiration of three calendar months from the date when he or she was last discharged from the Hospital, except under special circumstances, and by special leave of the Committee of Management.
- 23. It shall be in the power of the Committee instantly to dismiss any patient who in their judgment conducts himself or herself in an improper manner, or who does not conform to the Rules, Regulations, and Bye-laws of the Institution.
- 24. Each patient is required to bring a proper change of clean body linen, and to pay for the washing of it outside the Hospital.

RULES RELATING TO BOTH

The Harrogate Royal Bath Hospital

The Rawson Convalescent Home.

- 25. The Hospital shall be open throughout the year. The Home shall be opened in March each year and closed for the admission of patients on the second Thursday in November, or at such other times and such other periods in each year as the Committee of Management may decide to be necessary.
- 26. No subscriber shall have power to recommend a patient or do any other special act until his or her subscription has been paid.

Annual Subscriptions shall be deemed due on the 1st January in each year.

When any subscription shall be in arrear for 2 years the subscriber's name shall be omitted from the published list.

- 27. The Government of the Royal Bath Hospital and of the Rawson Convalescent Home shall be vested in a Committee of Management consisting of the Patron, the President, the Vice-Presidents, the Trustees of both Institutions, the Honorary Treasurer, four members of the Honorary Medical Staff (three at least of whom shall be Honorary Physicians), and sixteen other members, all of whom shall be elected by the subscribers at the Annual Meeting. Of the sixteen other members four shall retire annually and shall be eligible for re-election. Three members of the Committee shall form a quorum.
- 28. The Committee shall have power to engage and dismiss all paid officials, to fix the amount of salaries, and make such orders, according to the spirit of these Rules, as they shall think expedient for the management of the Hospital and the Home.

Three or more of the Committee shall attend at the Hospital every Thursday afternoon to transact general business. In the event of a special meeting of the Committee being requisite, the same shall be called by the Secretary, when directed to do so by the chairman of the Committee or three of its members.

- 29. A House Committee shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, and shall meet at the Hospital as often as may be necessary, at such an hour as they may appoint. They shall examine the books of admission and discharge, and all other books kept by the officers, including the register of the attendance of the Honorary Physicians and Chaplain, and the "Visitors' Book." They shall investigate any complaint of neglect or misconduct of anyone connected with the Institution. They shall examine and sign all such accounts as may require to be laid before the next monthly meeting of the Committee of Management for payment. They shall procure and submit once a year to the Committee of Management for approval, all contracts for drugs, provisions, coals, &c., required for the use of the Hospital and Home. They shall examine, from time to time, the inventories of household goods, furniture, linen, &c., belonging to the Institutions. They shall replace and renew, from time to time, as circumstances may require, all such internal fittings and furniture of the Hospital and Home as may urgently require renewal, and shall superintend all alterations and improvements sanctioned by the Committee of Management, and shall be generally responsible for keeping the grounds and buildings in order.
- 30. Whenever a vacancy or vacancies shall occur in the Honorary Medical Staff, the Secretary shall, when requested by the Committee of Management, give notice thereof by advertisement in the Medical and Local Press. Applicants, who shall be fully qualified and registered, shall forward their diplomas and testimonials, if required, to the Committee of Management, who may thereupon proceed to election, or they may in their discretion defer the appointment to the next Annual General Meeting.
- 31. The Honorary Physicians or a sufficient number of them, shall attend at the Hospital on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, to examine applicants for admission; and shall visit the Hospital three times per week, or as often as they may think necessary.
- 32. The Committee shall have power on the recommendation of the Honorary Medical Staff to appoint such specialists in an honorary capacity as may conduce to the better treatment of the patients.

33. The Honorary Treasurer shall pay all monies which he shall receive to the credit of the Hospital and Home at its Bankers, and all payments due from the Hospital and Home shall be made by cheques, signed by himself and two of the Committee. He shall invest, in securities approved by the Committee, when requested by them, all monies available for investment.

34. The Auditor shall examine the accounts, and return the same properly audited, to the Secretary, within 14 days after they have been received, and shall receive such a fee as the Committee of Management

may think proper.

35. The Secretary shall collect and forthwith pay over to the Treasurer all subscriptions; attend and act as Clerk at all meetings of the Subscribers and Committees; make out the annual accounts for the auditor, and perform such other duties as the Committee of

Management may direct.

36. The Matron shall be appointed by the Committee of Management, subject to three months' notice on either side; she shall devote the whole of her time to her duties, and shall see that the affairs of the Hospital and Home are conducted with the greatest possible attention to regularity, cleanliness, and economy, and shall conform to such Bye-Laws and instructions as the Committee of Management may from time to time decide upon.

- 37. The Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers shall be held at the Hospital on the Third Thursday in January in each year, or within 28 days thereof (of which seven days' notice shall be given by circular), for the purpose of receiving the reports of the Committee and Auditor, determining if any and what substantial alterations of or additions to buildings, shall be undertaken, and for electing the members of the Committee of Management and an Auditor. Nominations for election to the Committee of Management, signed by two subscribers as proposer and seconder, must reach the Secretary at least fourteen days before the Annual General Meeting.
- 38. The Chairman of the Committee of Management shall, within ten days after receiving a requisition in writing, signed by five Subscribers, convene by circular a special meeting of Subscribers for considering the purpose stated in such requisition only.
- 39. The Committee of Management shall have power to make such Bye-Laws (not inconsistent with these rules and regulations) as they may think necessary for the internal management of the Hospital and Home, and alter and annul the same as occasion may require; such new Bye-Laws to be in force until confirmed or otherwise at the next Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers, and printed copies of such Bye-Laws shall be affixed in conspicuous parts of the Hospital and Home, for the guidance of the Officers and the observance of the patients.
- 40. No general rule or regulation shall be altered, except by the Subscribers at the Annual General Meeting, or at a meeting specially called for the purpose; in all cases 14 days' notice shall be given to the Secretary of the proposed new rule; and seven days' notice shall be given by the Secretary to all Subscribers (together with the names of the Subscribers proposing the same), prior to the holding of the meeting at which such alteration is proposed to be made.
- 41. At all meetings, whether of the Subscribers or of the Committee of Management, all questions shall be decided by the vote of the majority of those present. In the event of the voting being equal the presiding Chairman of the meeting shall be entitled to give a second or casting vote. In no case is it permissible to vote by proxy.
